TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead, N. H. in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town, Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Trust Funds;
- (1) The sum of \$150.00 from Alfred and Olive Whitehouse; The income to be used for the perpetual care of the lot of Alfred and Olive Whitehouse in the Riverview Cemetary.
- (2) The sum of \$100.00 from Ezekiel Babb; The income to be used for the perpetual care of the lot of Ezekiel Babb in the Riverview Cemetary.
- (3) The sum of \$100.00 from Fred Littlefield; The income to be used for the perpetual care of the lot of Fred Littlefield in the Riverview Cemetary.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,216.00 (one thousand two hundred sixteen) for the purpose of hiring two full time employees to operate the ambulance during the daytime period. This sum being based on the amount of \$1.29 each for 943 inhabitants in said Town.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 (Three thousand) and place same in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new Grader at a future date.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2.500 (two thousand five hundred) to renovate the basement of the Oscar Foss Memorial Building.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$50,000 (fifty thousand) for the purpose of making improvements to any of the Class V Roads within the

Town, as determined by Town Authority in Cooperation with the State; such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, and authorized to have the Selectmen determine the date, and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Barnstead.

8. To see if the voters of the Town of Barnstead will authorize the Selectmen of the Town to accept, FOR MAINTENANCE, certain, roads that are ready for acceptance at Locke Lake Colony, and herein described.

To see what sum, if any the voters of the Town will appropriate for maintenance of the above roads.

9. To see if the voters will adopt the following ordinance, to promote the Health, Safety and General Welfare of the Town of Barnstead.

SECTION 1.

The following regulations will apply to all dwellings and commercial buildings, constructed after the passage of this ordinance.

- A. A certificate of intention of building, installing a Mobile Home, or to erect a Commercial Building must be filed with the Town Clerk at least 15 days before action.
- B. Chimneys and Flues must be tiled lined and supported by a foundation which extends at least Two Feet into the ground. Stovepipes which pass through partitions must be protected by adequate fireproof material.
- C. Foundations must be of concrete, Cement blocks, Brick, or Stone. Wood posts may be used, but are to set on a rock, Cement Block Base, or be properly treated.
- D. All electrical wiring circuits must be fused and connections must be made in a metal junction box, with at least No. 14 wire (National Underwriters Specifications).

- E. Dwellings must have adequate sanitary disposal facilities in compliance with the State Department of Health and Welfare.
- F. Buildings will be framed according to suitable building practices. The sides or roofs will not remain covered with any type of building paper excluding Tar Paper for more than a period of one year.
- G. Roofed over basements may be used as living quarters only while the building is being erected, and for not more than a 5 year period. These roofed over quarters must comply with all sanitary and fire regulations as adopted by the Town
- H. 1.a. Any structure that has been damaged by fire or wind, or has deteriorated to be considered a hazard to safety or health, and can not be repaired, must be eliminated by the owner within six months after notice from the Selectmen.
 - 2.b. Any structure that is damaged by fire or wind, and has deteriorated to a point of being a safety, or health hazard, and is repairable must be repaired by the owner within one year after notice from Selectmen.

SECTION II

No building shall be located nearer than 30 feet from the edge of a public highway or a road laid out for acceptance by the Town, to 10 feet from the edge of the lot.

SECTION III.

Building lots must have at least 10,000 (Ten Thousand) square feet in area and at least 85 feet frontage.

SECTION IV

The Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of Five members who will serve without pay for the terms as specified in R. S. A. 31:67. The Board shall have authority to allow variances from the terms of this ordinance where it can be shown that unnecessary hardships would otherwise result.

SECTION V.

Enforcement of these ordinances shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen and the Board is hereby given the power and the authority to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking the injunction in Superior Court and by any other legal action.

SECTION VI.

The ordinances herein stated are enacted under the authority granted by R.S.A. 31:60.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to send Two Representatives to work with the Lakes Region Planning Commission.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to secure assistance from the State Tax Commission in evaluating property for the ensuing year.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if every one understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

FIRE PERMIT

A FIRE PERMIT is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be PRIOR TO 9:00 a.m. AND AFTER 5:00 p. m.

EXCEPTIONS

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain national Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

PENALTIES

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days

2. For kindling a fire by any means willfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.

3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.

 For dropping inflammable material in or near wooland. Maximum is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

To the people of the town who have been our patrons and supporters during this past year, we are happy to have served you and look forward to having you make even more use of the library in the future.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Barnstead School District; I respectfully submit my fourth Annual Report as your Superintendent of Schools.

This is the first year the Barnstead Elementary School has one teacher for each grade. This can not help but improve the conditions under which a student learns. He will be able to function within the class without the distractions of students from a different grade. The level of instruction can be geared more to the ability of the students. This has been a step in the right direction.

In general, the school is staffed with very capable teachers. There has been some problems at the upper elementary level which have not gone unnoticed. The Superintendent's Office has worked diligently to improve the level of instruction for this group of students. Efforts will continue in order to be sure the students involved will not be short changed.

It is difficult to obtain teachers specially trained to teach science, math, or English at the junior high level. A teacher with special training in these disciplines will usually teach at the high school level or at a junior high level where they will teach only in the area of specialization. When a teacher is employed for Barnstead to teach at the upper elementary level, they may have to teach more than one subject to more than one grade level. As I have indicated in the past, the best educational opportunity for the junior high school student is where he can have experience in shop or home economics, music, art, science in a laboratory, physical education in a gymnasium, and most important, academic subjects taught by specially trained instructors. The solution to this problem depends greatly upon the Pittsfield School District. At present there is no room in the Pittsfield schools for Barnstead's seventh and eighth graders. alternative would be to expand the present school to accomodate a more complete junior high program, but the present number of students does not justify this kind of action. Until some solution is found, we will be producing junior high students that have not received the same preparation as most students throughout the State of the same age.

There are some problems awaiting us beyond the horizon. The day will come when kindergarten classes will be mandatory. It won't be long before all students will be requirel to attend

school until the age of sixteen and Barnstead may be required to pay for the transportation. We already have newly developed elementary standards coming into effect by September 1972.

Education is big business. It is constantly growing. More demands are being placed upon the schools, the educators, and, in turn the students and parents. In order to meet the ever increasing demands and pressures will require a re-examination of the role of the State in the support of education. The burden placed upon the property owner is becoming more and more staggering each year. This will continue until the State provides more financial aid to the small towns throughout the State.

I want to express sincere appreciation to the parents, business men, citizens, and especially the members of the School Board for their continued understanding and interest.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools and the citizens of Barnstead, it is with great pleasure that I submit this my first annual report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to many people in the Barnstead School District whose cooperation and support has been so helpful during my first year.

Minimum Standards for Elementary School Approval were adopted by the New Hampshire State Board of Education in June of 1969. These minimum standards pertaining to curriculum, personnel and services which includes library services, health services, guidance services, special education and in-service education will become effective September 1, 1972.

As of this date an elementary school must be approved by the State Board of Education to be eligible for state financial assistance. A school which does not meet the provisions contained in the minimum standards but for which the local school board has adopted and submitted a plan for correcting the substandard condition and the plan has been approved by the Commissioner of Education may also qualify for state financial assistance as a "Conditionally Approved Elementary School."

My first responsibility as Assistant Superintendent was to evaluate the elementary schools in Barnstead relative to the minimum Standards for Public Elementary School Approval and to

determine to what degree the elementary schools in Barnstead meet, failed to meet, or are superior to the minimum standards.

This evaluation has been completed. The Barnstead Elementary schools are superior to the minimum standards in some areas, meet the minimum standards in some areas and do not meet the minimum standards in some areas. A detailed report has been presented to the Barnstead School Board.

One of the requirements of the minimum standards was that the elementary schools should have a written philosophy and statements of objectives. The elementary schools in Barnstead as part of the Supervisory Union No. 49 had a written philosophy and statement of objectives but it was decided to review and rewrite the philosophy and objectives and to have them adopted by the Barnstead School Board as the official philosophy and statement of objectives of the Barnstead elementary schools.

The philosophy and statements of objectives were reviewed and rewritten by a committee of teachers and administrators and were presented to the Barnstead School Board for their approval and adoption. All elementary teachers had several opportunities to express their ideas and to contribute to the development of the philosophy and statement of objectives.

These written statements express the District's convictions on such essential points as the scope of the school's responsibility for the education of youth and what the school is trying to achieve. They serve as basis for determining the direction of educational development, for selecting desireable learning experiences and for the appraisal and evaluation of the effectiveness of the schools. They are more likely to serve these ends if they are understood clearly by parents, teachers, administrators and school board members and if these groups are in agreement with them.

The direction the elementary schools in Barnstead take during the next few years will be determined by the ability and desire of citizens, teachers and administrators to reach or surpass the minimum standards in all areas and the ability and desire of citizens, teachers and administrators to "implement the philosophy and objectives of the elementary school."

I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent of Schools and the members of the School Board for their support and cooperation.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

The year just ended saw significant changes in the operation of your school. A change in administration occurred at the beginning of 1969 with Mr. Justice leaving to further his studies in England. As a result, the new administration reverted the instructional methods in the upper grades to more traditional lines and solidified the disciplinary aspects of the school.

We were fortunate in retaining the services of Mrs. Costa who assumed the responsibilities of the First Grade for the year beginning in September, as well as Miss Muschiette who took over the Second Grade, Mrs. Johanson who remained on as Fourth Grade teacher, and Mr. Charles Eastman as Custodian.

Joining the school in September were Mrs. Deborah Stevens who replaced Mrs. Nelson in third grade, Mrs. Elsie Morse replacing Mrs. Walsh in Fifth Grade, Mrs. Hilda Hiltz replacing Miss Ray as Math and Science teacher for grades six, seven and eight, and Mr. Stewart Clinton in a newly created position of English instructor for grades six, seven, and eight, and Science instructor for grade six.

We did lose the able assistance of Mrs. Marie Carder, Teacher Aide.

The opening of school in September was accomplished with no major problems and instruction has proceeded monthly.

During the first half of the school year we experienced a significant growth in enrollment, with 152 students enrolled on opening day and reaching a high of 170 students by the middle of November. The additional students were absorbed with minimal difficulty.

As a result of the projected increase in the number of homes in Locke Lake Colony, together with other anticipated population increases within the town during the period just ahead, it is a fairly safe assumption that the upward pattern of enrollment will continue, and an eventual student body of over 200 not an unrealistic projection.

During the 1968-1969 school year, the Supervisory Union conducted an intensive study of the Social Studies curriculum for grades one through six which resulted in a new Curriculum Guide and new texts for all students in those grades. In keeping with

this updating, new Social Studies texts, in sequence with grades five and six, were purchased for grade 7. Grade eight was updated at the beginning of the 1968-1969 school year.

We are currently making the same efforts to update the Mathmatics curriculum along the same lines with Mrs. Johanson serving on the Supervisory Union Curriculum Committee. This task is expected to be completed for the beginning of the 1970-1971 school year.
