

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

Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

In compliance with the requirements of the laws of New Hampshire, your Commissioners herewith submit the report of their financial transactions for the year ending December 31, 1911, and a statement of the financial condition of the county at the end of the year, together with the reports of the other county officers required by law, to which is added a copy of the proceedings of various meetings of the County Convention. Attention is called to these reports for detailed information regarding the work done in different departments of the county's business.

The almshouse and house of correction have continued under the management of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Weymouth as superintendent and matron. Their long experience and natural fitness for these positions have made their services of special value to the county and we are glad to report that they will remain the coming year.

We are able to report that the county, as may be seen from an examination of the treasurer's report, is in a very good financial condition.

On Feb. 28th, 1893, the county delegation authorized the issuing of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.) of 4 per cent, 20-year bonds for building the present court house. These bonds mature July 1, 1913.

On March 23rd, 1893, a committee of the county delegation recommended that the county commissioners bond the debt of the county to the amount of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.) and acting under this authority, the commissioners on Dec. 21, 1894, voted to issue \$20,000, of twenty-year, 4 per cent bonds payable Jan. 1st, 1915.

The floating debt taken care of by this last issue of bonds appears to have been contracted in building the present county jail, and in making some enlargements to and improvements in the almshouse. In 1905, your commissioners determined to make an effort to pay for these buildings by creating a fund to redeem these bonds when due, and this policy has been continued to the present time with very gratifying results.

During these seven years, money from the ordinary income of the county to the amount of \$42,700.01 has been set aside for this purpose and invested in savings banks within the county and in nearby municipal bonds, the bonds of the county being purchased whenever they could be obtained, the accumulations to this fund in coupons and bank dividends have been \$5,296.77, making the total amount so invested at the close of business. Dec. 31st. 1911, figuring the bonds at par and accrued interest, and savings bank deposits to amount earned to and due Jan. 1st, 1912, \$47,996.78. As the increase in the sinking fund this past year, over and above the \$6,500 paid for county bonds, has been \$1,627.49, and as \$1,547.49 of this amount has been increase in banks from coupons deposited and interest, it is evident that the money in the fund, with its natural increase, would cash the bonds when due and leave a balance of profit to turn back into the treasury, but the county already owns just one-half (\$15,000) of the first issue of bonds and \$4,000 of the other issue, and as it is expected that the State Tax Commission will hold that these bonds in the hands of individuals are taxable. and as many of them are undoubtedly held in towns where the tax rate will very materially reduce the income derived from them, we expect to have all the remaining outstanding bonds of the county, which is its only debt, offered to us in the near future and shall endeavor to arrange to take care of them as offered.

It may not be out of place to call attention to the fact that the \$19,000 of county bonds now owned by the county carry not only \$19,000, of face value but coupons not yet cut, but which otherwise the county would have had to redeem to the amount of \$1,710, and that the saving to the county on account of the sinking fund will apparently be more than \$9,000.

We reprint the following paragraphs, with the slight changes in figures necessary, from our last annual report, as what we said then, with these changes, applies equally well now:

We publish with this report a table giving the county tax for nineteen years, being the whole period covered by the law which changed the fiscal year of counties to the present basis, and which shows that the tax during the time of the accumulation of the sinking fund has not been excessive as compared with previous years and has been very uniform, which is always desirable, as, when the usual needs of any taxing district have been fairly well determined, an even tax rate is very much preferable to one which is continuously fluctuating.

The regular current expenses of the county for the past year have been, on the whole, below the average. The total amount of orders drawn by the commissioners was \$24,855.55, including the investment in sinking fund. The expense at the farm for maintenance of almshouse, house of correction and jail, \$10,354.94, is less than the average for the past few years, but the number of inmates has been less, making the average price of board figure slightly higher, due to the fact that more than one-half of the expense of any institution of this kind is practically a fixed charge and not dependent upon the number of inmates.

The amount expended for the relief of "external poor" or persons assisted other than at the county farm,

\$5,246.84, which, to get the actual cost to the county, is reduced to \$5,054.70 by collections on various accounts from parties chargeable, amounting to \$192.14, is less than half the sum expended under this head in some previous years, yet every case has been carefully investigated and aid rendered in every instance where the applicants were found to be actually chargeable to this county and could not, either on account of sickness or misfortune, properly care for themselves if they made reasonable endeavor to do so.

We have been greatly aided in our efforts by many charitably disposed citizens and especially by the Laconia Benevolent Association, whereby many persons in temporary need of some assistance have been given material aid and not only prevented from becoming public charges but encouraged to make themselves self-supporting.

We wish to express our most hearty thanks to the various county, city and town officials and all other citizens who have aided us in our efforts during the past year.
