



THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Campton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To choose a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention..
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges, and make appropriation for the same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Campton Cemetery, also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in town.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise money to pay notes and interest on account of Hollow Bridge.
- 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for the improvement of the road leading from the Plymouth town line to the Sam Page residence on Beech Hill, and to appoint agents or committees to carry out any vote under this article.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to establish a town dump, and if so vote to raise and appropriate money for the same, and to appoint agents or committees to carry out any vote under this article.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to dredge the brook or build a retaining crib on the Branch Brook, to protect the bridge and road leading to the residence of James Cummings.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Peg Wood Hill road, near the residence of W. S. O'Hearn, across Winter Brook to the end of the road.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of Agents and Officers heretofore chosen.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control.
- 16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.
- 17. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

School Board of Campton School District:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The statistical tables for the year 1936-1937 follow this report.

Three changes have occurred in the teaching staff of the district since my last report. Jessie E. Stott of the West Campton school is succeeded by Doris M. Stimson, a teacher of several years of successful experience. Miss Stimson is a teacher of good scholar-ship and the children are progressing well under her instruction. An extensive standard test was given to grades 4-8 and the children were interested in seeing where they exceeded and fell below their grade scores. Such a course generally motivates study more than the arbitrary statement that one must study more.

Phyllis A. Adams, a graduate of the Keene Normal School succeeds Mrs. Amy B. Morse at the Blair school. Miss Adams is a promising teacher and the children are happily employed in worthwhile activities.

Evelyn A. Pollard of the Village primary room is succeeded by Marion Cotton of Warren. Miss Cotton is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and the State Normal School of Plattsburgh, New York. Miss Cotton is of exceptionally high scholarship and has had special training in remedial reading. With a membership of approximately 36 pupils she has a real challenging situation which she is meeting with success.

Miss Teresa Jenness has resigned her position at the Beebe River primary school to take effect at the close of this term. Carrie Smith of Quincy just graduated from the Plymouth Normal School has been appointed to complete the present year.

Last summer extensive repairs were made at the Campton Center School in the interest of more space and more light. The partition to the chemical toilet

room now discontinued was taken down making a splendid alcove where clothes can be hung up and may also be used as a stage. The blackboard now is on the wall giving considerable more floor space. High windows were installed in place of the lower ones formerly there. The Campton Village school was painted inside, new stoves were installed this winter at the Center and Livermore Falls schools. During the coming year the West Road school should be painted and repairs made on the ceiling.

The Board held 9 meetings last year and attended carefully to school affairs. The per pupil cost of instruction in the schools of the district exclusive of debt, interest and new equipment is \$70.16 as compared with the median of \$77.16 for the state. The district debt is reduced to \$2,500. Approximately 55 children of the district are attending the Plymouth High School.
