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## TOWN WARRANT

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THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chester, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs*

You are hereby notified to meet at Stevens Memorial Hall, in said Chester, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of highways in accordance with the provisions of Section 4, Chapter 35 of the Laws of 1905 and pass any vote relating thereto.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$525.15 (the State to give \$2100.61) for class five roads.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the state in 1936 in building the state-aid road from Chester to Sandown in accordance with the provisions of chapter 209 of the Laws of 1935.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to issue a note of the town for \$2,000 payable serially in accordance with the Municipal Bond Statute in order to provide funds for the payment of the town's share of the expense of building the state-aid road from Chester to Sandown.

8. To see if the town will vote to refund the debt of \$2,000 incurred in 1935 in paying its share in rebuilding the Chester and Sandown State-aid road and for that purpose to authorize its Selectmen to issue a serial note of the town for \$2,000 in accordance with the Municipal Bond Statute, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to care for the town poor.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase books and defray the running expenses of the Public Library.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the decoration of soldiers' graves.

12. To see if the voters desire to rescind the vote taken at the last annual town meeting regarding the use of the Australian Ballot System.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lights.

14. To see if the town will vote to purchase a McCormick Deering Tractor for snow removal and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

15. Should action on the above article be in the affirmative, to see if the town will authorize its Selectmen to issue Serial notes of the town in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bond Act, in payment of the purchase price of said Tractor or any part thereof, and pass any vote relating thereto.



16. To see if the town will vote to purchase the Fordson tractor that is at the present time leased to the town.

17. Should actions on article 16 be in the affirmative to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450, this being the amount necessary to pay to purchase said Fordson tractor.

18. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

19. To see if the town will vote to finish the basement under the Old Town Building and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

20. To see what action the town will take regarding the rental of Stevens Memorial Hall to the various organizations in town.

21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

22. To choose agents or committees in relation to any article embraced in the Warrant.

23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for use of the Fire Department.

24. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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The school problem in Chester has been essentially changed since the 1934-1935 report was issued. An overcrowded condition in the Primary room has been the cause of the change. This has made it necessary to open and provide facilities for an additional school.

### SPECIAL DISTRICT APPROPRIATION

At a special school meeting authorized under Chapter 120, Sec. 3 of the Public Laws, the district generously voted an appropriation of \$500 to be used by the School Board in repairing the Primary Schoolhouse. Now, Chester being a State-aided district, is by law and State regulations, required to maintain "standard elementary schools." One of the requirements of a "standard school" is that there shall not be more than 42 pupils in a room when there are pupils in four or more grades.

Last year's school records show that the total enrollment in the Primary room was 53 pupils in four grades with an average attendance of 45; a continuation of these conditions would have resulted in loss of State aid.

The appropriation of \$500 for repairs brought this whole matter to the attention of the State Department of Education when plans for needed repairs were presented for approval.

### THE PLAN ADOPTED

Numerous conferences between local and State school officials resulted in the adoption, by the School Board, of plans jointly worked out with the State Board. As a final result the



Primary building was remodeled into a two-room building well lighted, well heated and very convenient. This building is now capable of handling 50 pupils and is today accommodating primary grades one and two in one room and grammar grades, six, seven, and eight, in the other room. Grades three, four, and five are in the old building across the street.

#### FINANCES

It became evident after the plans for remodeling were reduced to the most economical form, that the \$500 appropriation was not sufficient to meet the minimum requirements of the State Department but it was thought that by rigid economy there might be sufficient unused balances from the appropriations already voted at the regular school meeting to absorb whatever overrun might occur, and this would have been the case but for an increase in high school attendance amounting to over \$300.

It now appears that a special appropriation of \$260.87 asked for in the Warrant will balance the budget for the year ending June 30, 1936.

#### SCHOOLS AND OPERATING EXPENSES

In the natural course of administration an additional school will cost about \$900 for operating expenses; \$724 of this increase has been returned to the district as additional State-aid, thus bringing the total, this year, up to \$1,362.16. This same amount will be received next year and thereafter so long as four schools are required. Thus Chester is benefitted by a better classification of pupils, less pupils per teacher, and better school rooms, at a small increase in the tax levy above that of three years ago.

The people of Chester will be interested in figures taken from a State Board of Education report for the year ending June 30, 1935.

This report shows the cost per pupil of elementary education (not including high school) in every district in the state:

The highest cost was \$328.19 per pupil; the lowest was \$40.52; Chester's per pupil cost as shown in this same report was \$55.18. The three neighboring towns, Londonderry, Derry and Auburn, show \$56.54, \$58.18 and \$59.01 respectively as their per pupil cost. Manifestly the public schools in these towns are not adding unnecessarily to the taxpayer's burden.
