TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th of March next at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, business meeting to begin at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, (polls not to close earlier than 6 o'clock in the afternoon), to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Selectman for one year, one Treasurer for one year, one Road Agent for one year, one Library Trustee for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for one year, one Auditor for one year, and all such officers and agents as may be necessary for transaction of Town's business for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept state town road aid for Class IV and V roads, and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$485.49 for same, the State to contribute \$3,236.61.
- ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Subsidy money for the maintenance of Class IV and V highways, the estimated amount to be \$5,652.67.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend the money for additional Highway Subsidy, estimated to be \$3,644.59, for the construction or reconstruction of Class IV and V highways within said Town.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend the Duncan Fund, allotment to be \$4,061.54, for the maintenance of Class V highways.

- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the General Expense of the Highway Department.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer and winter maintenance of roads.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Dump.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the upkeep of cemeteries.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting brush.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Newport Hospital.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Street Lights and Town Buildings.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Social Security on Town Employees for the ensuing year.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for use during the year in anticipation of taxes.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$337.35 to support the NH/VT Solid Waste Program and authorize the Selectmen to transfer said amount from the Solid Waste Fund.
- ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use of Highway Dept. equipment for the purpose of snow removal at the entrance to the Croydon Volunteer Fire Dept. and the East Village Church.
- ART. 18. To determine the will of the people in relation to the construction of a dam in Newport which is planned to flood Sichol Swamp at Croydon Flat.

- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to go on record that its citizens ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U. S. Congress to request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries. (submitted by petition)
- ART. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Insurance.
- ART. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of the Library, including librarian's salary, heat, etc. Librarian's salary to be paid directly by the Town.
- ART. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Newport Area Home Health Agency.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Newport Ambulance Service.
- ART. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.
- ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer the sum of \$11,000 from the Tax Map account to the Capital Reserve Fund for new equipment. (Requires two-thirds majority.)
- ART. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for a new police cruiser and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw said amount from the Capital Reserve Fund for new equipment.
- ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for bridge replacement and to transfer the Bridge Fund, so called, into this fund.

- ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund for bridge replacement and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw said amount from the Revenue Sharing Account.
- ART. 29 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$750.00 for the purpose of up-dating reappraisal of property and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw said amount from the Revenue Sharing Account.
- ART. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Capital Reserve Fund for New Equipment.
- ART. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for a new hopper sander for the use of the Highway Dept., and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw said amount from the Capital Reserve Fund for new equipment.
- ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,246.47 to secure the repayment of current land use taxes on Blue Mt. Forest Association.
- ART. 33. To see what sum of money the Town wishes to raise and appropriate for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.
- ART. 34. To see what sum of money the Town wishes to raise and appropriate for the planning board.
- ART. 35. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.
- ART. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Assistance.
- ART. 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the present police cruiser by sale using sealed bid system.
- ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Croydon and to the health and welfare of the people of Croydon. These actions shall include:
 - 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.

2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. (Submitted by petition)

- ART. 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to relinquish the deed to Lot #398 of Map #8 to L. A. Whipple; this property was acquired from L. A. Whipple by tax sale arising from confusion of the boundary line between the towns of Springfield and Croydon.
- ART. 40. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the building code in relation to building in flood hazard areas, as proposed by the Planning Board.
- ART. 41. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Croydon Volunteer Fire Department.
- ART. 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a contract for services from the Croydon Volunteer Fire Department.
- ART. 43. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUMMARY OF TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1982

Town Officials elected by ballot were as follows:

Moderator for 2 years

Selectman for 3 years

Auditors for 1 year Kenneth Spence & Ramona Truell

The Town voted to raise and appropriate a total of \$83,633.07 which are itemized on page 20 of this report.

As in previous years, the Selectmen were empowered to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

- Art. 21. Plow the Kemp Road in Winter submitted by petition. There was no one present to speak for the article of those who had signed the petition. While the road was not named in the article, it is the Kemp Road. Someone asked why it was not plowed and Selectman Harry Newcomb explained that this piece of road was given to the Town by Mr. Kemp and accepted as a "Summer Road" only due to the steep pitch of the road and it is also quite narrow. The Town Clerk looked up the original record and read it to the audience. There are two families now living on that road and they knew the restriction of summer maintenance only when they moved there. After a bit more discussion, the Town voted NOT to change the status and not to plow it or maintain it in the winter. (Donna Leslie/Eileen Avery)
- Art. 22. Plain Paper Copier .. (Rita Gross/Jan Pellerin) The Town Clerk spoke at length in favor of obtaining a plain paper copier for the use of the Town and recommended it be used without cost for all public functions such as the local fire department or Women's clubs, or Scouts (boys/girls) or such local organizations and Officials of the Town but to charge a nominal fee for private use. After several questions and comments, The Town voted to withdraw funds from the Capital Reserve Fund, not to exceed \$4,500.00, for a plain paper copier.
- Art. 23 Solid Waste .. This article was voted on by ballot throughout the day. Gerald Gross, who had been a member of the committee from Croydon, and spoke on the article. He said

there was a good summary on page 48 of the Town Report and since none of us had the reports early enough to read it, the Town Clerk read it in open meeting. When the votes were counted at the end of the day, the count was 67 YES .. 42 NO .. and 14 ballots were found to be blank.

Art. 24 Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association .. James Grenier/Ronald Leslie) After a bit of explanation to the newer members of the Town that the DLSR Asso. is principally in business to advertise the area to Tourists and we rather, "Keep N. H. a secret". The Town voted NOT to raise any money for their support.

Art. 26. Establish bridge fund .. (J. Grenier/H. Newcomb) .. following the general discussion of the need for a bridge fund and various bridges throughout the Town that need repairs, the Town

voted to pass the article as written.

Art. 27. Twice a year billing of taxes. (Janet Pellerin/Agnes MacKenzie) .. After considerable discussion, and the voice vote being indefinite, the Moderator requested a standing vote. The result was 24 YES and 21 NO. The Town voted to have twice a year billing for property taxes.

Art. 28. Revaluation .. (R. Leslie/J. Grenier) There was a great deal of discussion on this article. Donna Leslie made a motion to have this voted by ballot. The Town agreed. When the ballots were counted, there were 32 YES and 24 NO. The Town will be revalued and \$12,000.00 will be withdrawn from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund and any balance raised by taxation next year.

Art. 29. Repair/reconstruction of Town Bridges. The Town voted to appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to repair Town bridges. This money to be withdrawn from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. (NOT RAISED BY TAXES)

Art. 30. Donna Leslie reported that Sadie Muzzey Park in back of the Town Hall is in need of being cleaned. Rita Gross pointed out that there is money in the S. Muzzey trust fund and perhaps the Selectmen could see that some was used to clean up the Park.

Mr. Edward Hunt wondered if the name of the Newport Road could be changed because of the confusion of two North Newport Roads off Route 10. Eleanor Hunt described how difficult it was to tell visitors how to reach their house. Harry Newcomb said the Fire Department had signs coming and they had renamed the road. (Croydon Brook Rd.??)

Eeanor Hunt also mentioned that the roof of the church needed to be fixed this summer and would appreciate any donations from

interested townspeople.

Janet Pellerin mentioned that the bulletin board at the Croydon Flat was nearly inaccessable in the winter and could it be moved to the small common. Rita Gross told her it was gone entirely at present, having been hit by the snowplow. Hopefully the Selectmen will have it put up next summer.

Ailene Avery brought attention to the fact that the beach at Rocky Bound was filthy and she wondered who was responsible for having it cleaned. Some discussion followed but no action taken so far as I could ascertain.

Yvonne Evans complained that the snow on the Turnpike Road was making the road narrower. The Road Agent will probably push it back.

Rita Gross asked if the special accounts were slowly being cleared up and the money returned to the General Fund, what was going to happen to the Dry Hydrant account. Harry Newcomb said that it had been on the books longer than he wished it had, but that they really hoped to install at least one this year.

Willis H. Ballou, Jr., requested that the time of 1:00 P. M. for the business meeting be included on the Warrant so that everyone would know when the Town business would be taken up. Everyone agreed that this was a good idea.

Sanford Speer said the Fire Department hoped to hold "OPEN HOUSE" in the new building on April 25th with the Fire Auxiliary serving refreshments.

Yvonne Evans asked Willis Ballou, Jr., if he was considering starting a "FAST SQUAD". He said he had considered it but it takes a great deal of time and training and he wasn't sure how many would be interested. If anyone is interested, please contact him.

Marilyn Thorson mentioned that Michelle Bourassa of Croydon was the Newport Carnival Queen this year. She was applauded. Jim Spence won a history award. The younger generation is making the Town proud.

Eleanor Hunt wanted more information on the Yield Tax. She could find no figures in the Town Report that agreed with the figures that the Blue Mountain Forest Association had claimed to have paid the Town of Croydon. Bud Gross and the Selectmen thought the figure may have represented the amount paid to ALL the Towns in the Park, but that was not the way it read in the Argus newspaper. No conclusions were reached.

At 6:00 P. M. the polls were declared closed. The ballots were counted and the results read in open meeting. The meeting. was declared closed at 6:55 P. M.

PARKING

- Section I. No person shall be allowed to leave any vehicle unattended on any public right-of-away or road in the Town of Croydon so as to obstruct the passage of man or vehicle.
- Section 2. Any vehicle so illegally parked shall be subject to removal by tow away and the owner held responsible for all charges incurred because of such action. The owner of any vehicle illegally parked, but not removed shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$20.00 or imprisoned not more than six months.
- Section 3. Any person summoned for violation of this regulation may waive court action with the Town by paying a \$10.00 fine to the Town Clerk of Croydon.

SNOW REMOVAL

Our library consultant from Concord spent a couple of days at our library this summer getting me started on some much needed weeding of our non-fiction shelves. The books were then donated to the Croydon Volunteer Firemen's Auction. That was a small part of the task of getting the books categorized and ready for cataloging in a card catalog. Most of the categorizing is done but the catalog is going to take a while longer.

Films from the State Library continue to be used at the Croydon Village School bi-weekly as a library program and the children use the library at least once a week.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N. H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/Towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

NEWPORT AREA HOME HEALTH AGENCY 1982 REPORT

The basic services of Skilled Nursing, Physical Therapy and Home Health Aide provided by Newport Area Home Health Agency increased slightly during 1982 with some shifts in utilization by individual towns. The Agency has added blood drawing (for analysis) in the home to its services.

The Agency's Well Child Clinic remains well attended. Adult screening clinics were held successfully in Grantham and Goshen in addition to the regular sessions in Newport.

The Agency continues to work in cooperation with the Counseling Center of Sullivan County to help those with Mental Health problems.

Newport Area Home Health Agency staff in cooperation with New Hampshire Division of Welfare personnel is providing regular sessions for those with special parenting problems. This is part of the Child Abuse and Neglect Program which is supported by United Way.

As a new service in Community Health Promotion and Education the Agency sponsored an eight week course on Self Care of the Elderly. This program is to be repeated in February 1983.

Newport Area Home Health Agency appreciates the support of the Towns and will continue to provide high quality service to all those who need Home Health Care.

UPPER VALLEY LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

REPORT TO THE TOWN OF CROYDON

During the past year the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council has participated in many activities that benefited Croydon directly or indirectly. Some of these are described below.

The Council staff monitors new and proposed planning related legislation to assess its impact on Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council communities and alert town officials to the changes and their possible impact on the town. Much time has been spent this past year in reviewing the new solid waste facilities and plan rules proposed by the NH Solid Waste Bureau, alerting your town officials to staff concerns about them, and testifying in Concord. We have worked closely with Leon Geil, Sullivan County Engineer, and Ted Siegler, NH/VT Solid Waste Project Manager, on this.

This Council is currently assisting a State committee to rewrite New Hampshire planning and related legislation. Staff has reviewed two drafts of a completely recodified version and it is being prepared for introduction as a legislative bill in this session.

Council staff prepared a residential land regulation inventory of all area New Hampshire communities for the New Hampshire Finance Authority so that agency could assess regulation costs on housing prices.

The Council staff has aided the Croydon Planning Board and the Croydon Board of Selectmen to develop land use controls so that the Town remains eligible for the Federal flood insurance program. The staff has provided professional assistance to the Planning Board and to Town Counsel in subdivision regulation interpretation and in master plan review.

The Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture Series which was attended by a total of 194 persons from towns throughout the region.

The Council prepared a report, Economic Profiles, which analyzed employment, income, and demographic trends throughout the

region. To date, some three hundred copies have been distributed or purchased by communities, banks, real estate firms and consultants for use in fiscal studies, market analyses and grant applications.

As always staff members have been available to assist town officials with planning related questions and problems.

Once again Croydon residents are reminded that any new construction or additions require a building permit. Any request for a permit for the construction of a new home must be accompanied by an approved sewage permit from the State of New Hampshire.

BUILDING CODE AMENDMENT

Section V-A Floodplain Development Regulations

The following regulations shall apply to all lands designated as flood hazard areas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in its "Flood Insurance Study for the Town of Croydon, N. H." together with the associated Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Flood Boundary and Floodway maps of the Town of Croydon, dated April 18, 1983 which are declared to be a part of this Ordinance.

- 1. All proposed development in any special flood hazard area shall require a permit. The term "development" is defined to mean "any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations."
- 2. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements (meaning any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either (a) before the improvement or repair is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged, and is being restored, before the damage occurred) to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including pre-fabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

The term "substantial improvement" does not include either:

 a) any project for improvement of a structure in order to comply with existing State or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions, or

- b) any alteration of a structure listed on the National Register of Historic Places or a State Inventory of Historic Places.
- 3. Where new and replacement water and sewer systems (including on-site systems) are proposed in floodprone areas the applicant shall provide the Building Inspector with assurance that new and replacement sanitary sewage systems will be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and on-site water disposal systems be located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding.
- 4. The Building Inspector shall maintain for public inspection and furnish upon request any certification of floodproofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest flood (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been floodproofed, the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed. This information must be furnished by the applicant.
- 5. The Building Inspector shall review proposed developments to assure that all necessary permits have been applied for and/or received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by Federal or State law, including Section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1334. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to certify these assurances to the Building Inspector.
- 6. In riverine situations, prior to the alteration or relocation of a watercourse, the applicant for such authorization shall notify the N. H. Office of State Planning and Wetlands Board and submit copies of such notification to the Building Inspector and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Further, the applicant shall be required to submit copies of said notification to those adjacent communities as determined by the Building Inspector.

Within the altered or relocated portion of any watercourse, the applicant shall submit to the Building Inspector, certification provided by a registered professional engineer assuring that the flood carrying capacity of the watercourse has been maintained.

The following requirements shall apply in specific zones designated on the Flood Insurance Rate Maps:

- 7. In unnumbered "A" zones, as defined on the community's Flood Insurance Rate Map, the Building Inspector shall obtain, review, and reasonably utilize any 100 year flood elevation data available from a Federal, State, or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structure have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100 year flood level, and (ii) that all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structure have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or flood-proofed to or above the 100 year flood level.
- 8. In zones "Al through A30," as defined on the community's Flood Insurance Rate Map, for new construction and substantial improvements, the Building Inspector shall require that:
 - a) Residential structures have the lowest floor (including base-elevated to or above the 100 year flood level.
 - b) Non-Residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100 year flood level; or together with attendant utility and sanitary facilities, to be designed so that below the 100 year flood level the structure is watertight with walls substantially impermeable to the passage of water and with structural components having the capability of resisting hydrostatic and hydrodynamic loads and effects of buoyancy.
- 9. In zones "AI through A30," where floodproofing is used in lieu of elevation, a registered professional engineer or architect shall certify to the Building Inspector that the floodproofing methods used are adequate to withstand the flood depths, pressures, velocities, impact and uplift forces and other factors associated with the IOO year flood.
- 10. In zones "Al through A30" for new, substantially improved, or expanded mobile home parks, and for mobile home placement not in existing mobile home parks, the Building Inspector shall require that:
 - a) Stands or lots are elevated on compacted fill or on pilings so that the lowest floor of the mobile home will be at or above the 100 year flood level;

- Adequate surface drainage and access for a hauler are provided; and,
- c) In the instance of elevation on pilings:
 - 1. lots are large enough to permit steps;
 - piling foundations are placed in stable soil and are no more than ten feet apart; and,
 - reinforcement is provided for pilings that extend more than six feet above the ground level.
- 11. In unnumbered "A" zones and in zones "AI through A30," mobile homes shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement by providing over-the-top and frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (i) over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four corners with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long shall require one additional tie per side; (ii) frame ties be provided at each corner with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long shall require four additional ties per side; (iii) all components of the anchoring system shall be capable of carrying a force of 4,800 pounds; and (iv) any additions to the mobile home shall be similarly anchored.

Article 7: It was moved by Marilyn Thorson and seconded by Janet Pellerin that the Town Report be accepted as printed. It passed without dissent on a voice vote and was so declared.

Harry Newcomb reported at this time on the findings of the Town purchasing their own bus. The bus rental rate will be going up from \$29.23 per day to \$64.99 per day. It was the recommendation of the Committee to purchase the bus the Town is presently renting. Mr. Newcomb felt that \$1,000. would be a sufficient amount for maintenance providing there were no major problems. It was pointed out by Marilyn Thorson that the Town could consider the possibility of renting a bus if a breakdown did occur.

Article 8: Marilyn Thorson made the motion that \$207,186.00 be raised and appropriated for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the District. Rita Gross seconded the motion. The Moderator said this would be taken up by line item.

Mr. Gross wanted to know if the increase in the salary of teacher and substitute was based on 10%. Mrs. Truell explained that \$14,485.00 was for the teacher's salary and \$90.00 was for substitutes. Mr. Grenier wanted to know if the total handicapped amount was for one child alone. Mr. Sokul replied, "no". Mrs. Gross inquired if the tuition was more for special education students in Newport. No. Mr. Pellerin asked if a study had been done to see if there was any way the Town could fulfill its legal obligations and save the Town money. Mr. Sokul said that they were going to try to send the out of district child to Claremont next year. Mr. Newcomb asked what our position is if we say we can't afford extra money for special aducation. Mr. Sokul informed him that the Town would be breaking the law and the parents could pursue the matter to get the education for their child required by law.

A voice vote was taken and defeated the motion to appropriate \$207,186.00 for the support of the School.

Mrs. Truell wanted to amend the original amount allotted for heat from \$1,725.00 to a lower figure of \$1,380.00.

Mrs. Thorson asked to amend the original amount allotted for gasoline from \$2,228.00 to \$1,823.00 Mr. Grenier amended that the salary of the bus driver be adjusted to reflect a 10% increase for a final figure of \$4,004.00.

A second motion was made by Mr. Grenier and seconded by Donna Leslie to appropriate \$203,679.00 and passed without dissent on a voice vote.

Article 9: An award in the form of a certificate and a belt buckle was presented to Harry Newcomb, by the Moderator, from the Ryder Truck Rental Inc. for driver safety. Mr. Newcomb was driver of the month in October, 1981.

The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 11:58 AM, March 9, 1982, and after the above results of the polls the meeting adjourned sine die at 7:00 PM.
