WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

State of New Hampshire

L.S.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Enfield qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whitney Hall in said Town of Enfield on the thirteenth day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose by ballot to serve for three years, one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, one Library Trustee, one Fire Ward, and one member of the Recreation Commission; to serve for one year, one Treasurer, one Clerk, one Tax Collector, one Highway Agent, one Overseer of Public Welfare, one Police Chief, one Cemetery Agent, one member of the Recreation Commission, two Auditors and such other necessary town officers as are required by law to be chosen for the ensuing year.

Polls will be open at 9:30 A.M., and will not be closed before 6.00 P. M. Articles in Warrant will be taken up beginning at 1.30 P. M.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, the sums so borrowed to be paid before the end of the fiscal year in which the debt was incurred.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the sale or lease of any or all of such parcels of real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds for non-payment of taxes or any or all parcels of real estate acquired through other deeds, where such parcels are not in public use, or required for public use,

and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver, in the name of the Town, suitable deeds or leases of such real estate, subject to such conditions or restrictions as may be voted by the meeting.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,011.51 for Town Road Aid and to receive the sum of \$6,743.38 from the State, or act thereon.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that piece of town highway which runs from the present Dulac Nursing Home situated in the westerly part of Enfield, down the hill south westerly from the present Dulac buildings to the right of way of Interstate Highway number 89.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote that, if the purpose or objects, hereinafter designated, for which appropriations for the year 1962 may have been made, have not been fully accomplished during the fiscal year, then the funds so appropriated or unexpended on the unfinished portion of said object shall be placed in a Capital Reserve fund dedicated to the purpose or object of its conception until such time as the Board of Selectmen, acting as Agents for the town, shall have the opportunity or occasion for the fulfilling or completion of/or for the purpose or objects for which said appropriation was created.

The specially designated purposes for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1962, are as follows: the net earnings of the town trucks, grader and shovel loader, if one is purchased, derived from highway appropriations for replacement purposes. Also any unexpended Civil Defense funds. Also any unexpended balance of special appropriation for Whitney Hall.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Budget and raise or appropriate the various sums recommended and posted by the Budget Committee, or act thereon.

ARTICLE 8. Pursuant to a petition of ten or more legal voters:

Resolved: No. 1. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to have the N. H. State Tax Commission representatives reappraise all the real estate of the town of Enfield.

No 2. That the selectmen of Enfield be required to use the figures furnished by such reappraisal for assessment purposes for 1963 by applying whatever percentage necessary of full value to raise required funds, such percentage to be used the same on each parcel of property in Enfield.

No. 3. That to meet said appropriation, there is hereby authorized the issue of general obligation notes of the town of Enfield aggregating Six Thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) in principal amount, payable over a period of time not to exceed four years, said notes to be issued under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act and any other authority thereto enabling. The date, maturities and denomination of said notes shall be determined by the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Board of Selectmen. Said notes shall have the Town Seal affixed, shall be signed by the Selectmen and countersigned by the Town Treasurer: said notes shall bear interest at such rate, and shall otherwise be in such form as shall be determined by the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, but subject to the provisions of this resolution and to applicable provisions of law.

ARTICLE 9. As recommended by the Budget Committee.

To see if the town will vote to purchase a new

shovel loader at a cost not to exceed thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$13,500.00) for highway department work, and to raise and appropriate the money to pay for same as follows; eight thousand dollars to be taken from General Fund, the balance of not to exceed fifty five hundred dollars to be raised by taxation, or act thereon.

ARTICLE 10. Pursuant to a petition of ten or more legal voters.

To see if the town will vote to discontinue in the town of Enfield, subject to gates and bars, the highway beginning on the Oak Hill road opposite the A.B. Walker residence, running westerly to the Boys Camp road, connecting between Bicknell Brook bridge and the Boys Camp.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to charge the Town Highway Department rental for use of town owned equipment such as trucks, grader, and shovel loader if any, on a percentage basis, instead of using fixed rates per hour as is done at present.

Such percentage figure to be established by the Board of Selectmen annually, after consultation with the Highway Agent and Budget Committee as to present and future equipment requirements. The percentage deduction to be applied on the four major annual maintenance items viz; Summer, Winter, Bridges and Culverts, and Oilings; also any outside earnings.

The proposed deduction to be net rental, and the Highway Agent to maintain and service the town owned equipment out of his appropriations.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to accept from the Enfield Bicentennial Committee, any unexpended balance on hand July 1, 1962; said sum to be placed in Capital Reserve, and dedicated to the purpose

of the establishment of permanent facilities for the preservation of Enfield Historical Records; this fund to be administered by a Commission consisting of the Board of Selectmen, Library Trustees and the Town Historian.

ARTICLE 13. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, officers or committees, here-to-fore chosen, and pass ony vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To take any vote or transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE REPORT

The following is a report of the activities of the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the town of Enfield for the year 1961.

Vaccine was furnished the School Doctor and School Nurse for Salk vaccine and Diptheria and Tetanus shots for school children. They conducted their own clinic.

A series of Immunization Clinics were held at Whitney Hall on the following dates: May 17, June 6 and July 12 for preschool age children. Immunizations were administered by Dr. Henry Brown assisted by Mrs. Lois Reed, R.N. of the N. H. Department of Health and a local community committee.

A preschool Dental Fluorine Program was sponsored by the Enfield P. T. A. and was held from July 19-28 of 1961. Mrs. Marjorie Plaisted, Dental Hygeinist of the N. H. Department of Health Dental Service did the cleaning, fluorine treatments and educational instruction to the children and mothers. This was held at the Methodist Vestry.

This proved to be a very successful program. Sincerest thanks to the PTA for clerks assisting the dental hygienist, and for the use of the Methodist Vestry.

A Tuberculin Sterneedle Testing Program was conducted at the school on September 26. The test was given to a total of 404 from grades 1-12 and included school personnel. Total reactors to the tests when read were 18. These were followed through by family groups and chest x-rays were recommended. Several had x-rays

at their family physician and others attended the Chest x-ray Clinic at Lebanon on October 30. These chest clinics are held in spring and fall in Lebanon and conducted by N.H. Department of Health. The Local Physician and School Nurse and others are notified of these clinics and follow-up reports are sent to the parties concerned.

Resusci-Ann a demonstration life size doll was loaned to the school Nurse for demonstrations on mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. The demonstrations were given to the high school, various grades and at the Baltic Mill. This is available through the Accident Prevention Division of the N. H. Department of Health.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the following for their excellent assistance in making the above activities available to the people of the town. Sincerest thanks to Dr. Henry Brown, Mrs. Olson, School Nurse, members of the PTA, Mrs. Lois Alger for her professional assistance and others who assisted with clerical work or helped in any way to the success of the program.

Home visits were made in the town on babies and preschool children. Arrangements have been made for children to attend Cripple Children's Clinics, Pediatric Clinics and others as necessary. Follow-up visits have been made.

I am happy to be of assistance to the people of Enfield and assist in promoting Health Activities for the benefit of the town.

The Bicentennial Committee wishes to express their deep appreciation to the Chairmen and workers on all the various committees; to Secretary Dorothy Harbison and Treasurer John Noonan; to the Enfield School Board, Principal Lovejoy and the teaching staff; to the High School Alumni Association and to the many fine social organizations in town; to Dr. Channing Swan, Mrs Marguerite Melcher, the Roberts brothers, The Shaker Singers and Harry Nichols; and to all others who directly or indirectly gave encouragement, wrote or contributed financially in order to make this occasion a memorable one in the history of our town. Not least among the latter should be special thanks to our Summer residents for their interest and cooperation.

The weather was favorable; events were well attended and received with enthusiasm; the Fireworks and Parade drew many visitors from surrounding towns; the Dinner a success in every respect with 316 present, the largest number of people ever to sit down to eat together in this community; a wealth of historical material was collected and permanently placed on file; an interesting booklet and a Town map were published and best of all it was a special pleasure to welcome back so many former residents and friends.

In addition to the financial report given below of the money voted by the Town, we would report that the Committee received outright gifts from individuals and organizations of \$674.00 and earned \$453.80. Out of this money we paid \$500.00 for fireworks, ½ share of the expense of publishing booklets (\$175.00) and several other miscellaneous small bills leaving a balance

of approximately \$400.00. The Executive Board voted unanimously to place an article in the 1962 Town warrant asking the Town to accept whatever balance remains, as a Fund for the purpose of establishing a Town museum, in order that a safe and proper place may be provided for the preservation of the historical material now in the Town Historian's care.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Enfield:

I present herein my annual report for 1961, my eighth annual report as the superintendent of Schools in Enfield:

### School Building Needs

In my last several reports I have pointed out the need for added school facilities. The overcrowded situation has become more and more acute. The situation this year became even more critical with an increase of forty-eight pupils in grades one through eight and twenty-two pupils in grades nine through twelve. Enfield has its back against the wall as far as school facilities are concerned. It must build other facilities itself or join with other communities in a cooperative school district. It now seems apparent that Lebanon could not accept the high school pupils on a tutition basis. It seems to me that the cooperative school district is the sound answer, both from an economical and educational point of view.

The bright side of the picture is the enthusiam that there seems to be in Enfield and its neighboring communities for a cooperative school district. I am delighted with the response that the Enfield people are making to the study now under way with Canaan and other communities. It is the most encouraging sign that I have seen since coming to this Supervisory Union. Great credit is due the Enfield School Board for the dynamic leadership that it has taken. I am sure too, that all of us are appreciative of the splendid spirit of cooperation that has come from the other communities in connection with this study. They are, of course, just as much interested as Enfield. We are all deeply indebted for the splendid help that is being given in connection with the study by representatives from the State Department of Education. They have been untiring in their efforts and their advice and counsel has been, and will continue to be, invaluable. Much more will be heard from the study committee about the cooperative school district. I will say no more about it at this time except to express the hope that it will become a reality in the very near future.

### GENERAL SITUATION IN THE SCHOOLS

In spite of the overcrowded conditions, good work is being done in the school. For details of that work and also the overcrowding, I refer you to the report from Mr. Richard S. Lovejoy, principal of the school. His report follows mine.

### SCHOOL FINANCES IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

For the sake of brevity, and in order to emphasize the situation, the balance of my report will deal with the financing of education in New Hampshire. We who are in public school work, whether as members of the professional staff or of the school boards, are concerned and troubled about the present financing of education, and particularly in New Hampshire. We know that we have the responsibility to maintain and improve the educational program to the greatest extent possible within the money now available. I believe and hope that we are doing so. We can, however, go just so far without very materially increased budgets.

Without substantial added funds we cannot meet increased enrollments that have entered the schools and will continue to enter, nor can we continue to provide the educational programs demanded by the increasing complexities of our society. We cannot meet inflation; it is estimated that 8.3% of the increased expenditures for schools between 1958-59 and 1961-62 has been due to inflation. (School Management Magazine, January, 1962) Without more money we cannot compete with continuously rising teachers' salaries. If we want to attract and retain quality teachers, we must be in a position to compete. Without that money, we cannot buy the equipment, the textbooks, reference books and library materials needed by those teachers in order to do good work. We cannot adequately maintain our buildings and equipment, meet

the continuously rising costs for fuel, transportation, insurance, and the many other costs that go into operating the schools.

If we who are connected with the schools are concerned about the rising costs, I am sure that the taxpayers are at least equally concerned. Our concern is to provide the quality of education that we believe the parents and other citizens want for the boys and girls of the community. The taxpayer has the same concern, but also the more direct and personal concern, evidenced in his question: "Where is the money coming from?" The tax on property is becoming almost prohibitive, and particularly in New Hampshire, where real estate and personal property bear most of the burden.

Statistics are sometimes boring, but I think that all of us should not only be aware of, but dynamically concerned about the following data: —

Each one who studies the above information will draw his own conclusions. To me, for the dates given, the following is evident:

- 1. New Hampshire's adult population has to pay for the public education of a smaller percentage of pupils than most states. It stands 46th out of 50.
- 2. It has a personal income per pupil enrolled in public schools that is well above average—12th out of 50.
- 3. For 1959-60 it was in the lowest eleven states in the percent of personal income going to public education.
- 4. Its expenditure per pupil is below the national average. It stands 29th out of 50.
- 5. It has not kept pace with the rest of the country in increasing, since 1950, its expenditure per pupil.
- 6. Its average teacher's salary is well below the national average. In fact, it stands 33rd. Furthermore, in terms of salary, New Hampshire is becoming relatively less able to compete for New England teachers, and the other New England states better able to recruit New Hampshire teachers. The teachers are the schools.
- 7. Its state aid to education is unreasonably low as compared with the rest of the country. In the percent of revenue from the state it stands next to the bottom.
- 8. It naturally follows that the principal local source of revenue, namely real estate, is carrying a very heavy burden. New Hampshire stands 2nd in the 50 states in the percent of school revenue from local sources.
- 9. Even when state and local tax collections are combined, New Hampshire stands 35th in per capita general collections (1959), 31st in per capita collections for education (1959), and 44th in per capita expenditures for education (1960).

The above are generalizations for the state as a whole. The situation varies from community to community. All, however, feel the burden on real estate.

I believe the above figures to be reliable. They are merely the statement of objective data. Some may differ with my interpretations. How can anyone, however, who is truly interested in education or in the burden on real estate, help

but agree that New Hampshire must have a greatly improved and more realistic program of state aid to education? We are told by some that New Hampshire needs no new taxes. What, then are we to do: sacrifice education, or place an even heavier burden on real estate? It certainly does not look as though we would get added federal aid in the near future. We will get added state aid only when the people of New Hampshire are sufficiently aroused to demand it and to demand it in an organized and emphatic way.

In conclusion, I wish to again thank the members of the School Board, of the school staff, and of the citizens of the community for their continued support and help.

### REPORT OF SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

### Mr. Richard S. Lovejoy

The school year 1961-1962 at the Enfield Village School began with a decided increase in enrollment. In grades 1 through 8 this increase amounted to 48 pupils, or 17%; and in the high school the increase was 22 pupils or 27%.

### OVERCROWDING

The comparative enrollments of grades 1 through 12 for the school year 1960-61 and this year are shown below:

We have two double grades this year—Mrs. Tibbetts with 18 first graders and 11 second graders; and Mrs. Hall with 24 second graders and 6 third graders. Double grades are definitely to be avoided whenever possible, as obviously a teacher cannot give as much time or individual attention to two grades with their different levels of subject matter as they can with one grade. However, in these cases it is unavoidable,

since not to have them would mean a class of 53 in grade one and 40 in grade three. Such classes are much too large and would mean much loss of valuable individual time per pupil. The State Department of Education recommends 25 pupils as the maximum size of a class—whether elementary or secondary. Thus it can be seen by referring to the enrollment breakdown our classes are also too large in grades 1, 5, 6, and 8. Grade 7 is already divided into sections, thus does not fall in this category.

To alleviate the situation of large classes in grades one, five ,and six, Mrs. Patty Hart was hired as a part-time assistant for these grades. We were fortunate to be able to procure her services, as she is of inestimable help and frees the respective teachers so that they are able to spend more time in actual subject matter instruction and individual attention to the decided benefit of the pupils.

The increased enrollment in the high school this year made it necessary to use the gymnasium as a study hall in order to free a room in the high school for classes. This, of course, resulted in loss of physical education for the high school students. It has also curtailed physical education in the lower grades. We are, however, able to give physical education to the seventh and eighth grades four periods a week.

The use of the gymnasium for study halls has also necessitated using Whitney Hall for group instrumental instruction during the morning of band day.

### CURRICULUM

I feel that substantial progress has been made this year in improving the educational standards in the Enfield school, as indicated by the following:

- a) The part-time employment of Mrs. Hart as an assistant in grades 1, 5, and 6, as previously mentioned.
- b) The addition of a Special Class being taught by Miss Amy Bond. This class was set up for those children who seemed to be having great difficulty in doing regular school

work. This is a small class and enables Miss Bond to give each child more special and individual attention than is possible in a regular classroom.

This class has already paid dividends as is evidenced by the progress that all students are making, and I wish to commend Miss Bond for her enthusiastic and sincere efforts.

- c) Rinehart Writing System we are taking part in this program for the second year. Teachers and pupils find it very worthwhile and the students, especially those in the lower elementary grades, show significant progress in their penmanship.
- d) We are now affiliated with the National Honor Society and have our own Chapter in Enfield High School. This Honor Society has more than 8500 chapters throughout the United States. We hope by having this chapter and membership to raise the scholastic standards of the school, as student membership in the chapter is based on scholarship, leadership, service and character.

### COMPREHENSIVE HIGH SCHOOL

Up to and including this year Enfield High School has had no trouble qualifying as a Comprehensive High School under the Minimum Standards and Recommended Practices for New Hampshire Secondary Schools, Grades 9-12, as set up by the New Hampshire State Department of Education. However, the Department has revised these standards, with emphasis on building facilities and equipment, and has also set up a two-track curriculum system whereby a minimum program of general (non-college) subjects must be offered in English, mathematics, and science. They hope to make this revision effective starting with the next school year of 1962-63.

With this in mind, the Superintendent, School Board, and Principal have studied the matter carefully. We can meet the requirements, as far as the subjects are concerned, by hiring an additional math and science teacher, and by adding a course in Shop Mathematics, a course in Senior Science, and by sectioning the English classes of grades 10, 11, and 12—grade 9 English is already sectioned.

However, our real difficulty would be in the area of building facilities and equipment. Of course, with one more teacher and five more subjects we would be even more crowded for space than we are now Members of the State Department have already visited the school and indicated to us that under the new regulations we would fall short of approval on building facilities and equipment because of the library, the split home economics set up, the laboratory, and the physical education program.

What would it mean not to be a Comprehensive High School? It would mean that if a student wanted to take a subject or subjects not offered at Enfield High School, the town of Enfield would have to pay the tuition of that student to go to Lebanon or Hanover.

There seem to be three courses open because of this dilemma — 1) to add additional rooms, including a library, to the existing building; or 2) to build either a new elementary school or a new secondary school, (and if a new elementary school were built, then much remodelling would have to be done to the high school) or 3) to form a Cooperative School District with adjacent towns.

This latter plan is now being studied by the School Boards of Enfield, Canaan, Orange, Grafton and Dorchester.

In my opinion, a Cooperative School District is the most logical answer — both from an educational and a financial viewpoint. It has the unreserved support of the New Hampshire State Department of Education. It should be given the deepest consideration by every citizen as it is a means of offering to the children — our future citizens and leaders — a wider variety of educational opportunities, both academic and vocational: It would mean students would be able to progress according to their individual abilities as the classes

would be large enough in the required subjects to enable them to be grouped according to ability.

It should also be mentioned that such a cooperative school district will be an influential and encouraging factor to people desiring to settle in this area.

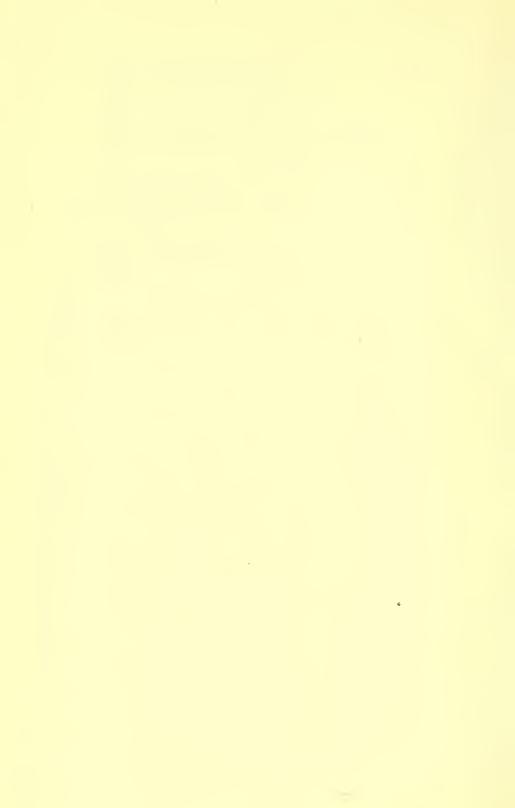
