5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Police Department.

AT ANNUAL MEETING 1976**

Article 2 VOTED, that the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, and Town Trust Funds and other Committees be accepted as printed in the Town Report.

Article 3 VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$101,805.73 (One hundred and one thousand eight hundred five dollars and seventy three cents) to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year, divided as follows:

And that Town Officers be paid at the following rates: Auditors, Ballot Clerks, Fence Viewers, Health Officers, Selectmen, Supervisors of Checklist and Surveyors of Wood and Lumber at \$2.50 per hour; Moderator at \$2.75 per hour; Treasurer at \$600.00 per year; Tax Collector at the rate of three quarters of one percent of the taxes collected; and Town Clerk at \$100.00 per year.

Article 4 VOTED, to indefinitely postpone any action on this article. (New England College exemption).

Article 5 VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$93,472.37 (Ninety three thousand four hundred seventy two dollars and thirty-seven cents) for the repair of Highways and Bridges and repair of purchase of machinery; that \$23,472.37 (twenty three thousand four hundred seventy two dollars and thirty-seven cents) come from the Highway Subsidy fund and that \$70,000.00 (Seventy thousand dollars and no cents) be for Highway expenses.

Article 6 VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$53,773.00 (Fifty three thousand seven hundred seventy three dollars and no cents) for the maintenance of the Police Department.

Article 7 VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,700.00 (Thirty seven hundred dollars and no cents) for the purchase of a fully-equipped cruiser and to retain the present cruiser.

Article 8 VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 (Twelve thousand dollars and no cents) for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

Article 9 VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,500.00 (Eleven thousand five hundred dollars and no cents) for the support of the District Court.

Article 10 VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$549.00 (Five hundred forty nine dollars and no cents) for the support of the Concord Hospital.

Article 11 VOTED that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,577.56 (One thousand five hundred seventy seven dollars and fifty-six cents) for State Aid Construction of Class V Roads.

\$889.60 (Eight hundred eighty nine dollars and sixty cents) for the support of the Community Action Program.

Article 19 **VOTED**, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 (Three thousand three hundred dollars and no cents) to re-roof, paint and renovate the Fire/Police Building.

Article 20 **VOTED**, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,600.00 (Three thousand six hundred dollars and no cents) to install sanitary sewer connections for the Town Hall, Fire/Police Building, Library and Rescue Squad Buildings.

Article 21 **VOTED**, that the Henniker Conservation Commissions Environmental Quality Plan be referred to the Selectmen for distribution to the appropriate agency for review.

Article 22 **VOTED**, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five thousand dollars and no cents) to begin the establishment of a Sanitary Landfill Operation and construct a building to house future equipment.

Article 23 **VOTED** that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (One thousand dollars and no cents) for the Bicentennial.

Article 24 **VOTED**, to indefinitely postpone any action on this article. (To improve Craney Pond Road from Class VI to Class V).

Article 25 **VOTED**, to indefinitely postpone any action on this article. (To improve Locust Lane from Class VI to Class V).

Article 26 **VOTED**, to indefinitely postpone any action on this article. (To improve Centervale Road from Class VI to Class V).

Article 27 **VOTED**, that the Moderator appoint a Study Committee to find alternate swimming facilities for Town Residents.

Article 29 **VOTED**, that the Selectmen be authorized to apply for, accept and expend on behalf of the Town any grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including, but not limited to, disaster aid and highway funds which may now or hereafter be available from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire or any Federal, State or private agency or individual or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 31 VOTED, to indefinitely postpone any action on this article.  
(Depot Hill in Historic District).

Article 32 VOTED, that the Cemetery area behind the Town Hall be  
incorporated into the Historic District.

## HENNIKER RECREATION

The Henniker Recreation Committee, run on a completely volunteer basis, sponsors athletic events for the young people of the Town of Henniker. Basically, these services are divided into three groups of athletics – Basketball under the direction of Joe Clement, Baseball under the direction of Tom Hassler and Swimming under the direction of Carol Hamilton.

The Basketball events are divided into two groups. Youth Basketball has a membership of approximately 40 young men and 8 cheerleaders. These boys, with the vocal support of the young ladies, play in the Merrimack Valley Basketball League with teams from Hopkinton, Chichester, St. John's of Concord, Boscawen, two teams from Penacook and Bow. Their schedule consists of fourteen games culminating with a tournament in Penacook. The Adult team consists of fifteen men. This group plays in the Tri-Mountain Basketball League against Concord, Pembroke, Nashua, Pittsfield, Hudson, Hollis, Merrimack, Bedford, Derry, N.E.A.I. and Manchester, During 1976 the Henniker Men's Team won the Putney, Vermont, invitational tournament and came in third in the Manchester, N.H., tournament.

The Baseball events are primarily for the young men of the Town. Approximately 65 boys participate in the League. There are two teams sponsored in the Kearsarge Mountain League. The first team is for ages 8 through 10, the second for ages 10 through 14. The Inter-Town League consists of young men in the age group 8 through 12.

Swimming is provided at Pleasant Pond each summer season. Lessons for beginners start at the age of 5 and continue through Life Saving and Advanced Lifesaving Courses. A lifeguard is on duty during the summer season, weather permitting.

The Town of Henniker should be proud of the unselfish work of the directors of these programs. Many young men and women benefit from these athletic events, either participating or supporting. We are thankful that this work will continue throughout 1977.

## BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

America's Bicentennial Year has been most inspiring and exciting for all Americans and all the states. Every community and every individual has special achievements and memories of which to be proud. Our Town of Henniker has much to remember, including these special events we enjoyed:

In 1974 the late Dr. William Mandrey, founding president of the Henniker Historical Society and prime mover in the project to save and restore our historic Town Hall, was gratified to announce that the restoration and refurbishing of the Town Hall would be a contribution to America's 200th birthday. He also announced that the town history planned by the late Dr. Francis Childs would be completed by the Historical Society, a project now under-way.

On February 9, 1976, Dr. Mandrey presided over a special Commemorative Service held at the Congregational Parish House in which he took the role of Reverend Jacob Rice, Henniker's first minister. On November 6, 1975, a meeting was held at the Tucker Free Library at which four ancestral portraits of the James Willis Patterson family were presented to the town. Making the presentation were Donald Patterson, a sixth generation descendent of Alexander Patterson who built a log cabin on Liberty Hill in 1763, and his nephew, James Willows.

On November 15, local townspeople, Boy Scouts and Bicentennial Committee members met at the site of the Bound Tree between Henniker, Hopkinton and Warner where the Selectmen performed their official duty of *perambulating the bounds*. A suitable scion of the Bound Tree, (which may be the oldest Bound Tree in America), was selected and transplanted to the green at the Town Hall, where a further ceremony was held.

On February 11, 1976, George Washington's birthday was celebrated with a Colonial supper sponsored by the Historical Society at the Congregational Parish House. Selectmen received the Town Bicentennial Flag and certificates that day at the newly renovated Town Hall. Many dignitaries were present for this event.

On May 2, 1976, the Bicentennial Quilt was unveiled at an Open House in Cogswell Memorial High School and makers of the heirloom quilt, dressed in Colonial costume, served refreshments. The project was initiated and directed by Martha Jones, with more than 40 women making hand-made appliqued and embroidered squares depicting historical and current town areas and buildings. Each of the 49 squares measures 13 by 13 inches. Money is now being raised to provide suitable protection for the quilt.



In May, the Wagon Train, sponsored by the State of Pennsylvania and scheduled to arrive in Gettysburg on July 4th, rolled into Henniker. Accompanied by independent riders and escorted by the County Sheriff's posse, the Wagon Train camped out overnight on the New England College playing fields near the Covered Bridge. Ceremonies were conducted that evening by the national wagonmaster, who accepted scrolls signed by residents of Henniker and surrounding towns representing each community.

An individual contribution to the Bicentennial is the work of Elizabeth Gilbert who has carefully plotted all of Henniker's cemeteries as a Historic record.

On the weekend of July 4, 1976, the biggest celebration of the year was held, beginning with a well-attended Henniker High School Alumni Banquet held at Pat's Peak with Robert French as Chairman.

On July 3 a Bicentennial Parade was held with bands, floats, horses, antique automobiles and fire engines participating. The Bicentennial Quilt was on display at the Bear Hill Grange Hall, and Henniker memorabilia, photographs, and an art display were on view at the Tucker Free Library. A tour of the town's Historic markers was held, and in the evening the traditional Firemen's Ball was held at the NEC Bridges Hall. On Sunday Bicentennial services were held at St. Theresa's and the Congregational Church. A contra dance, with music provided by Dudley Laufman, well-known musician, took place on the Covered Bridge that evening.

On October 10, 1976 Henniker's beautiful mural in the Town Hall was presented to the town and dedicated to the memory of the late Dr. William H. Mandrey. The mural, conceived and designed by Mrs. Willa Brigham, was accepted by the Selectmen early in April. It was completed by the middle of June with thirteen local artists donating eight hundred hours of work.

Although the town appointed an official Bicentennial Committee, the actual working group consisted of everyone in Henniker who helped in any way — those who cooked, ate, sewed, painted, built, attended, worked, and enjoyed all of the marvelous events that have taken place and are still to come. The group that met monthly at the Library and planned events thanks you all for your participation and interest in this Bicentennial Year.

There is still more to come — the Historical Society will present an Amy Cheney Beach Concert at the February meeting and a plaque in her honor will be presented by the Exxon Company. The Bear Hill Grange is having copies of all Henniker Town Reports bound and will present it to the town. (If you have any old copies to donate, please phone the Selectmen.)

## SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE TREATMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE

This eighth report of the Committee authorized by the 1969 Town Meeting covers progress from mid December 1975 to mid-December 1976. It should be read with prior reports for a full picture of events to date.

On September 18, 1976, the Treatment Plant was formally dedicated. It was placed in operation shortly thereafter, processing the connected flows which had been temporarily by-passed to the Contoocook. Considerable work remains to be done in the next construction season to complete connections and close out the old sewage outfalls.

Final inspections, audits and permanent bond sale are currently proceeding satisfactorily. With these completed, sewage collection and treatment will become a continuing major town operating activity.

In future years this municipal operation should render full and clear reports annually.

## HENNIKER RESCUE SQUAD

The Henniker Rescue Squad looks back on this Bicentennial Year as one of change. Our number of calls answered in 1976 stayed relatively equal to 1975, but changes were made in different areas.

Most important of these changes was in training. We spent more time for indepth training on several of the problems associated to our area and environment. At the present time two squad members are teaching an Emergency Medical Technician — Ambulance course in Henniker with two probationary members taking the course, and several other members auditing parts or all of it. The minimum level of training to become a full member of the Henniker Rescue Squad was upgraded to the 81 hour Basic Level Emergency Medical Technician — Ambulance. We were the first volunteer service in the state to require this level of training and we are very proud of it.

Another change is in personnel. We had some fine people leave us to allow themselves to grow, and we gained some new, interesting, and talented people. We now have two women on the Squad and they add a dimension to our service which had been lacking.

Still changing is the appearance of the facilities. We put up a flag pole and a flag which had been flown over the United States Capitol was donated. Inside the building work is progressing and we hope to have an open house sometime in the near future to show the townspeople what has been done with their financial and physical help. We sold the old ambulance to start saving to purchase capital items in the distant future. Some of these items are a replacement ambulance, telemetry equipment for improved radio communications with a medical center, and extrication and rescue equipment.

We hope to have your continued support, financial and other to serve you the best way we can.

## CENTRAL NEW HAMPSHIRE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

At the end of 1976 and six years of operation, the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission had completed several studies of a regional as well as a local assistance nature.

During 1976 the Commission completed the following studies: an historic preservation report listing significant historic sites by community, a community facilities inventory for each community, a study outlining the impact of institutional tax exempt properties within each community. Currently the Commission is preparing a future land use study, a housing needs update study and an economic base study, all from a regional perspective.

In January the Commission delivered to the Town a set of photographic enlargements which were requested by the Selectmen and which serve as a base for the Town tax map.

During September and October 1976 the Commission co-sponsored a series of seminars dealing with the legal aspects of planning. Several officials from Henniker attended and the entire series received favorable comment.

In addition, the Commission answered several questions during the year for members of the Henniker Planning Board.

The Commission hopes to be able to continue to serve the needs of its member communities in future years and greatly appreciates the past support of its activities by the Town of Henniker.

## REPORT OF THE DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

## CONSERVATION COMMISSION

This Bicentennial year brought to the Conservation Commission a full committee membership and new opportunities to apply its talents and responsibilities in trying to help preserve Henniker's natural, historical and other resources.

Work is still progressing on the review and application of the Environmental Quality Plan for Henniker prepared for the Conservation Commission two years ago. The Commission anticipates having the report ready for community-wide distribution sometime in 1977 or early 1978, after joint discussion and review with other town committees.

Perhaps the most challenging assignment undertaken by the Commission this past year is the review and recommendation to the Town to formally accept Nichols Pond (Gulf Road) as a gift from the former Henniker Fish and Game Club. The Commission is currently exploring the possibility of having the land appraised for the purpose of matching the land's appraised value with U. S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funds, to be used to improve the site and its potential as a winter and summer recreational resource for the community.

Other areas that your Conservation Commission is currently working in are a conservation program to preserve the rural character of Henniker's roads, inventory of town, state and federal owned land in Henniker, developing an inventory of natural and ecological sites in town (bogs, etc.), centralizing and filing town resource maps, plans, reports in the Tucker Library, and planning for a Spring Town Clean-up Day.

The Commission feels that the Spring Clean-up Day can be a mutually beneficial undertaking by and for a number of community organizations, and hopes that many will participate in this endeavor to beautify Henniker and its environment.

## CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association is in Henniker on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week. They have an office at the Town Hall and can be reached by dialing 428-3244. If they are needed any other day, a collect call can be made to Concord 224-4093. The Henniker number is listed in the phone book under Henniker, Town of. Please feel free to call either of these numbers if you need service. That is what the nurse is here for, for you!

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association began to service Henniker in September, 1973. The agency provides skilled nursing care to anyone sick in the home, especially those needing continuity of care after discharge from the hospital. They are available to give hypodermic injections, change surgical dressings, and do other treatments prescribed by the attending physician. When indicated, family members have been instructed to give care between nurses visits.

Special services such as physical therapy, occupational therapy and nutrition guidance have been given by the special staff and consultants in order to assist with the rehabilitation of an acute or chronic illness.

When family members are unable to supply all the needed care, a staff of homemaker/home health aides are available to give physical care, do light housekeeping and assist with meal planning and preparation.

The nurses are delighted to advise new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies. They are also glad to work with families and individuals on normal nutrition and sickness and accident prevention.

Anyone in Henniker may request these services — doctor, family, pastors, friends or patient himself. Patients are also referred by clinics and other agencies. All calls are answered, but continuing care of the sick can be provided only under a doctor's order.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association — Henniker number 428-3244 or in Concord 224-4093, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. is all that is necessary to start service or make inquiries. Saturday, Sunday and Holiday calls are only made when there is serious illness. Fees may be scaled to those unable to pay the entire amount.

## TRUSTEES OF THE TUCKER FREE LIBRARY

One of the functions of the Trustees of the Library is to determine how the town feels about the library and whether the services it renders are meeting the needs of its patrons. Everything we have heard this year, either by asking questions or by volunteered information, is that more people are using the library all the time and are finding there more of the books they want.

Like other public institutions, we have a budget problem, and we try to spend the available money where it will do most for our patrons and also increase the facilities of the library itself. One of our dreams at the moment is to finish the attic space in the near future and turn it into a much needed clean and convenient storage area.

One of our useful and interesting activities is the work being done under the direction of Mrs. Willa Brigham and Marion Chase, co-chairmen, in the Archives Rooms. This year another room was added to the Archives area and a group of volunteers works regularly to identify, organize and file records, papers, documents and other such material to preserve our town's history and to make this information available to researchers. Lester W. Huntington and Phil MacLeod have given generous donations of artifacts and records to the collection this year.

The value of such a collection of historical material is very great, both to the town itself and to those attempting to learn about their family history or some other area of the past. At the present moment, the group writing the new town history of Henniker under the direction of Dr. Richard Hudson of the Henniker Historical Society with Ian Morrison and Marion Chase as co-editors are making extensive use of the archives. Anyone wishing to make use of these facilities are asked to leave a message with the librarians so that an appointment can be made.

It is the wish of the Tucker Free Library and of its Trustees to serve the town well as a repository of historical material and artifacts, and to provide a wide selection of reading material to readers of all ages. We appreciate the cooperation we have received this year and we welcome your comments as to ways in which we may improve our services.

I wish to point that the circulation figures for the year were totaled December 8. You can see that the children are reading more than last year, probably partly due to the fact that the second grade has just started coming once a week as a class. The reading of magazines has increased, adult non-fiction is more popular and records have increased in circulation.

We've started a film program this year — running from October to April, once a month on the 4th Wednesday. I'd like to see better attendance at the 7 P.M. showing.

In fines we collected \$18.74 up until December. Then we changed to donations rather than a set fine. In one week the donations totaled \$1.10.

This year we obtained new shelves for the youth section of the stack room and new shelves in the children's room. This makes it much, much easier to find the children and youth books. The Friends paid for half of the shelving in the children's rooms.

In April for National Library Week we had *Meet Your Local Authors Day*. Authors Barbara (Beck) DeYoung, Duane (Bradley) Sanborn, and Sanborn Brown talked to the students from the elementary school. Page Carey, illustrator of Barbara DeYoung's books and Lois Brown were also present.

I have attended three of the required eight Public Library classes at Keene State College and have gotten many good new ideas which I'm trying to implement in the library.

I have written articles for the Messenger frequently to let the taxpayers know what is happening.

In January I will be formulating next year's plans which I hope will include

more displays, Story Hours during the winter, Craft Hours next Christmas season, and increased library use by all residents.

This year our six week Story Hour was run by Carolyn McKean and Linda Connor. Eric Von Schmidt came to sing for the last meeting.

For the summer reading program ten children completed the requirements and went on the trip to Sandra Martin's Little Nature Museum in Weare.

The Friends of the Library had a successful Plant, Food and Book Sale in October. I wish to extend my thanks to Susanne Dobbins for all her work as president of that organization.

We have just recently set up a bookcase in the library's hallway and are selling the books from the room downstairs at ten cents apiece.

## HENNIKER YOUTH SERVICES

Henniker Youth Services was organized in April 1972, by Michael Greenblatt and Kenneth Gilbride with the support and financial backing of the New England College administration, namely, Dr. Jere Chase, President of New England College, and Dr. Paul Daum, Assistant to the President. The underlying principle of the Henniker Youth Services was to create a community arts/recreation program, utilizing the facilities of both the town of Henniker and New England College. In order to ascertain a community consensus as to exactly how this principle would be implemented, an Advisory Board was organized, consisting of townspeople and College Personnel. The initial Board consisted of: Donald Blanchard, Bernell Borden, Mary Ball, Jere Chase, Duane Clement, Louise Leonard, John Hollis, Carol Hamilton, Katherine Patenaude, Robert Scully, Fr. Richard Smith, Rev. John Schule, and Thomas Hassler. Later Advisory Board members were James and Liz Langille, Richard and Arlene Martin, Robert Devantery, R. L. Smith, Deane and Janet Morrison, Robert Seaman, and James Crane.

With the aid of the aforementioned volunteers, the Directors were able to organize programs in art, theatre, dance, sewing, in addition to an extensive field trip series, children's films series, Neighborhood Youth Corp, YMCA winter swimming, and special events at Christmas, Halloween and Easter.

Undoubtedly the most popular of all H.Y.S. programs has been its theatre projects, which included the production of *Godspell* and *Jesus Christ Superstar*. The former was toured throughout Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire in the Fall of 1974. It was the professionalism demonstrated by the Henniker youth in these theatre productions that enabled H.Y.S. to receive almost \$10,000 over a three-year period from the National Endowment for the Arts and the New Hampshire Commission on the Arts. The cast of the productions included Tommy Weston, Bonni Hamilton, Bob Hamilton, Vicki Snair, Pam Snair, Mary Snair, Pam Mortimer, R. L. Smith, David Leonard, Bob Graham, Kathy LaBonte, Bob Ingersol, Gayle Morrison, John Spaulding, Sari Spaulding, Nancy Savage, Denise Tormey, Margery Hudson, Bill McGraw, Dennis Metnick, Sture Nelson, Walter Grant, Trina Schule, Ann Morrison, Carlene Carlson, Debbi Maxwell, Joe Parris, Toby Russell, Perry Pitt and Sue Nelson.

In October 1975 the Directors of H.Y.S., Kenneth Gilbride and Michael Greenblatt, turned over the leadership of H.Y.S. to Carol Hamilton and a corp of volunteers who had been with H.Y.S. since the beginning of 1972. Today Henniker Youth Services continues as a model arts-recreation program.

Since October 1975 our emphasis has changed somewhat. We have regular monthly activities, i.e., YMCA Swim (attendance 50 - 60, coordinator, Pat Brown), Bowling (small ball, attendance 30 - 35, coordinator, Arlene Martin), Movies (attendance 50 - 70, coordinator, Ken Gilbride).

On the fourth Saturday, we have had a variety of activities, i.e., miniature golf (coordinator, Jim Crane), big ball bowling (coordinator, Ray Wood), a discotheque dance, and games night. The attendance at all of our activities has been exceptional.

Each Friday night we sponsor an open gym where the towns young people can meet for group activities — ping pong, volleyball, basketball, or just to chat with a friend (coordinator, Pat Troy).

We sponsored girls' basketball and softball teams for elementary school girls (coaches, Elsie White and Ging Blanchard for basketball; Pat Stafford and Lynn Eilenberger for softball).

Through Job Corp, young people were used to keep Henniker clean and beautiful. Flower pots were hung in the downtown area which added immensely to the color of the town.

We sponsored two theatre presentations this year, *The Me Nobody Nows* in the Fall, and *The Mikado*, a Gilbert and Sullivan musical in the Spring.

For ten weeks a school for the arts was run for elementary school children through adults. The classes included were: elementary sewing, crewel embroidery, knitting, needlepoint, creative dramatics (puppetry, pantomime play acting, interpretive dance), a play production class *The Devil and Daniel Webster* (displayed once during the gala Fourth of July Celebration), a junior high and high school chorale group, classes in pastel chalks and acrylic painting.

We have hopes of having four, nine-week sessions of classes next year to be held during the school day, two days a week. This is not yet approved but we are working on it.

Our summer activities include: a bus to Pleasant Pond daily for anyone interested in going to the pond for the day, trips to the beach, trips to Canobie Lake Park, plus our regular activities.

There will also be a basketball clinic for elementary school youngsters to be held Tuesdays and Thursdays in the evening. Donald West will be in charge of this program. The girls' program will be run by Debbie Knapton, Sue Knapton and Diane Whedon.

It is also hoped that we will be able to use one of the school rooms at the high school for a meeting place for the teenagers with a volleyball net set up outside for activity and a record player for dancing or just listening. This would be open Monday, Wednesday, and Friday nights with Patrick Troy in charge.

We are in the process of planning our bi-centennial parade float with sixteen youngsters already signed up and more expected to participate.

It is our aim to keep our young people so busy with activities and involved with worthwhile people and projects that there will be no time for them to become involved in delinquency activities.

10. To see what sum of money the district will request and accept from the L. A. Cogswell Fund and expend for the cost of replacing the three entrance doors and refinishing the gym floor.

11. To see what action the district will take to dispose of the building on the school grounds known as the "Scout House".

## HENNIKER SCHOOL SYSTEM PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

My report this year will not concern itself with the usual format of enumerating various changes in the curriculum and in the school plant, but instead the report will inform you about one of the Henniker School System's most valuable resources — New England College.

Over the years cooperative efforts by a number of people connected with the college and with your schools have resulted in many contributions by NEC to your schools. Because public relations is not one of my strengths, many of these contributions have gone unnoticed. I hope this report will help to correct this negligence by giving you an up to date list of what NEC is presently doing to help to make the Henniker School System a better one.

First, NEC allows capable seniors at Henniker High School to take courses at the college at no cost to the student or to the school system. Grades and credits are assigned these students as for any regular student in the course. When one considers the limited curriculum available in a small school, this opportunity becomes even more important. This present semester there are seven seniors taking advantage of the opportunity.

In addition to the above, special provisions are made for students who graduate from Henniker High School. If the student graduates from this high school, resides in Henniker, and meets regular admission standards, he will be allowed to enroll at NEC for one-half tuition.

Formal courses are not the only learning experiences that NEC provides the school. The college increases the opportunities available to our students through our Alternative Program. They provide students with work experiences in the various departments. Students from the high school are assigned to a supervisor in a particular department. These students spend part of their school day at the college learning and working. They are paid an hourly wage. In order to do this the college must budget money. This year the figure is four thousand dollars. There are presently five students in the program.

Without the cooperation of the Education Department at the college, the Ungraded Program in the Elementary School would not be as effective. It is important in an individualized program to find and to use as much help as possible. NEC students who are taking courses in education have been very valuable in providing this needed help to our teachers.

Another major contribution by NEC to our school system is their generosity in sharing their physical facilities. Our students have complete use of their library. Their soccer field and their gym have been made available to our soccer team and to our basketball team for practices and for games. Our physical education classes have used their facilities, such as their tennis courts.

The above examples are contributions that exist on a continuing basis. On occasion NEC has helped to solve a particular problem as was the case this past year when we needed a science lab for the seventh and eighth grades



science program. The college donated to the school laboratory furniture and fixtures worth approximately five thousand dollars. This enabled the school to set up a science lab in room 8. Now science in the junior high is no longer a textbook course in a regular classroom, but rather an interesting, exciting lab oriented program. This donation was accomplished primarily through the interest, the hard work and the diplomacy of two NEC faculty members, Dr. Charles Puglia and Mr. Van Pattee.

I hope this report has called to your attention two things: 1) your school's attempt to look beyond its four walls and to utilize other resources to provide your children with as many educational opportunities as possible; 2) the valuable role that NEC plays in meeting the latter.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Although the national economy has been in constant flux with increasing prices and heavy unemployment, the public services have continued uninterrupted. The public schools reflect, to an extent, our economy with emphasis on tight budget control, stringent salary negotiations and keeping at a minimum educational program changes and capital expenditures for new equipment.

Our schools are operating very well with an excellent professional and para-professional staff, good instructional programs and objective evaluation of student progress. We again have an overall increase in enrollment with facilities severely strained in some instances.

As has been the case for years, legislation, court decisions and funding have created changes in educational operation. Title IX has at last guaranteed equal rights with equal opportunity for girls in school and women in teaching and administration including equality of pay. Court decisions have placed responsibility for special services for learning handicapped children upon the local school district with very limited availability of State funding to assist multiple handicapped cases. The question of Federal funding for Title programs and School Lunch programs persists year after year pending the whims of Congress. However, in spite of inconsistent funding, many extremely important changes have come about greatly benefiting our children by providing programs and assistance for special needs.

At the conclusion of this school year I will be terminating my duties and responsibilities as Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 24. The five year tour has gone by rapidly and I look back with mixed emotions on these years. Many good changes have come about and so many things need to be done but I have had the good fortune to have dedicated school administrators and staff in the several schools working hard to improve instructional programs and educational opportunities. I thank you the overall citizenry for your interest, concern and willingness in funding and assisting educational improvement.
