INCINERATOR PERMIT ORDINANCE

- A. No person, firm, or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled, a fire in an incinerator without obtaining a written yearly permit from the Fire Chief.
- B. An improved incinerator shall consist of a steel drum with a wire screen cover, said incinerator to be surrounded by an area of mineral earth extending not less than 2 feet in all directions. A device of equal safety may be used at the discretion of the Fire Chief.
- C. Location: Said incinerator shall not be located closer than twenty-five (25) feet from any building; and not less than fifty (50) feet from forest land. Forest land as defined in Chapter 233, Sec. 35 revised laws, Forest Laws of the State of New Hampshire.
- D. Incinerator Permit is null and void:
 - 1. If fire is kindled in unfavorable weather.
 - 2. If incinerator has been allowed to become unsafe.
- E. If fire escapes from incinerator, no exemption is implied from the following liabilities:
 - 1. Payment of damage to property of another.
 - 2. Payment of suppression costs to town.
 - 3. Prosecution for failure to comply with regulations.
- F. Penalties. Whoever is found guilty of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than five dollars.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING TOWN OF MADBURY

March 8, 1955

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Madbury on Tuesday, the 8th day of March A.D. at 11 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles.

ARTICLE 1. To choose the following Town Officers:

A town clerk for the ensuing year.

A selectman for the ensuing three years.

A treasurer for the ensuing year.

A collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

Two auditors for the ensuing year.

A trustee of trust funds for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all other town officers.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$7500. in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$269.12 for Class V highways to match the sum of \$1794.13 to be contributed by the State.

ARTICLE 5. To see if, (because of new and expanding industries, the Jet Bomber Base, increasing population), the town will join with other towns in the area instructing

its representatives to the general court to call for a state water pollution commission study program within the Piscatagua River basin.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70. for the Seacoast Regional Development Association.

ARTICLE 7. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.

ARTICLE 8. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars as a class VI highway that portion of the old turnpike (Road to Cocheco) extending from Freshet road northwesterly to the Durham town line.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$150. for payment to the state auditors for auditing the 1954 town records.

ARTICLE 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1954

ARTICLE 1. Balloting for town officers:

For Town Clerk: Edna P. Twombly received 54 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year. The oath of office was administered by Moderator Kenneth S. Morrow before the assembled voters.

For Selectman: Richard G. Hale received 65 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing three years.

For Treasurer: Loretta J. Morrow received 54 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Collector of Taxes: Paul M. Raynes received 46 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Auditors: Daniel W. Hoyt and Carleton M. Wentworth each had 24 votes and were declared elected for the ensuing three years.

For Trustee of Trust Funds: Harold S. Jones received five votes and was declared elected for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 2. Voted that choice of all other town officers be left to the discretion of the selectmen.

ARTICLE 3. Voted that the town authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding the the aggregate \$7500 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

- RECESS. Personally appeared the elected officers under Article 1, with the exception of Harold S. Jones, and took the oath of office as prescribed by law before the Town Clerk, Edna Twombly.
- ARTICLE 4. Voted that the town shall raise \$292.72 for Class V highways to match the sum of \$1,951.47 to be contributed by the state.
- ARTICLE 5. Voted that the town shall appropriate \$176 for the installation of a red network of telephones for fire alarm notification.
- ARTICLE 6. Voted that the town raise and appropriate \$69. for the Seacoast Regional Development Association.
- ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise \$12,282.72 for the proposed town budget for the current year. (Schools not included.)
- ARTICLE 8. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Report of Water District activities by Commissioner John S. Elliott.

Report of Fire Chief, James Colprit.

Voted to authorize the tax collector to keep on hand at least \$25. of town moneys as a petty cash fund.

Voted to request a state audit of the town books once every four years to begin with the 1954 records.

ARTICLE 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Voted that the name, "Cherry Lane" be made official for the former "Dishwater Mill Road".

REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Citizens of the Town of Madbury:

In 1954 your Fire Department obtained a valuable improvement with the installation of a Red Phone Network. This service enables townspeople to call one number, Dover 784, which is received in three separate locations. Use of this system helps speed response to alarms, especially during nights and holidays.

Our portable pump was used at a fire for the first time at the government pumping station. It was carried to the head of the fire, and pumped from the brook, helping us to contain and extinguish the two acre slash fire.

Our largest forest fire originated in Lee, and swept into Madbury on the south side of the Hayes road. It was only through the excellent cooperation of six departments that we were able to extinguish this fire that burned 75 acres in Lee and Madbury.

Our greatest loss was the house at Four Maple Farm. The fire having been started by lightning. The Barrington Fire Department received the first call and prevented the spread of flames to the barn.

During the summer a Training course was held. Several men attended each session, but one of our biggest problems remains a shortage of men near our station qualified to operate the fire equipment.

The increased use of oil as fuel has reduced the number of chimney fires, but has increased hazards in oil burners and back yard incinerators. All incinerators should be properly screened and located a safe distance from buildings.

Permits must be obtained for all incinerators and outside fires.

REPORT of SUPERINTENDENT of SCHOOLS

This has been an extremely busy year for your School Board and School Administrators. Much progress has been made toward realizing our objectives of establishing an educationally sound and efficient school system at a minimum cost to the taxpaver. Your School Board has given an endless number of hours to this task of establishing the Cooperative School District. In many cases, there were no precedents to follow, no authorities to lean to, nor any established formulas to abide by. Because of the uncertainty of being able to begin new construction, we have had to set up in reality a dual budget so as to allow for any eventuality. For the main part, it meant combining a budget that would allow us to send our secondary pupils and some elementary pupils to other districts on a tuition basis in case the new construction did not materialize, or being able to care for our own pupils entirely. This, of course, has meant setting up a budget which calls for greater estimated expenditures than if the board could follow one definite course with certainty. At the time of printing this report the uncertainty still is present.

This year the School board wisely followed the course of caring for as many of our pupils in our own schools. By converting the shop into a Kindergarten area at the Oyster River Elementary School, and by making use of two one-room buildings at Lee we were able to care for all of the children from Kindergarten through Grade 8 from the towns of Durham, Lee, and some from Madbury. This course has saved the Cooperative School District much in tuition costs. The secondary pupils continue to go to other districts. Unless we can start new construction this spring, however, we will be forced to send more elementary pupils to other districts on a tuition basis.

The following are some extracts from the School Reports of the Town of Lee which in many ways might be applied today.

1886

"The question of schools is the greatest question of the times, and one that vitally concerns us all. The town system of school which was adopted by the last legislature seems to be misunderstood by many of our citizens. Its purpose is to equalize the educational advantages, as far as possible, of all the children in town. The fundmental principles of a democratic government are equality and union. The district system is anti-democratic. It gave to some children 36 weeks of school per year, to others only ten. By uniting all the districts of the town into one, and establishing schools in such localities as will best accommodate the scholars, only as many schools as their welfare demands, we should avoid many of the unpleasant circumstances which prevent the usefulness of many the the schools."

1887

"School matters during the past year have been in a state of chaos. New laws have been put in force, and what is known as the town system of schools adopted, instead of the old district system. The old district system was faulty and it has been done away with, and it is now our duty to find the faults in this system, and having found them, to do our utmost to correct them, and not condemn the whole system, because in some particular case, it works an injustice whereas the old system did injustice in hundreds of cases. The new schoolhouses which we were led to expect this year, have not been completed, although one is now being constructed, and we have no doubt will be ready for use during the next term."

1888

"Every parent and every voter should feel that the subject of common schools is one in which he or she has a personal interest. Progress is the watchword of the day, and it will not do for us, while striving in other ways to advance the interests of the town, to let the cause of education go backward. We suggest that we make it a special point to let no spirit of revenge or anything which shall prove detrimental to the best interests of the cause get possession of our minds. Make the interest of education the paramount one and all will be well."

1892

(It seems they also had some discipline problems)

"... She became thoroughly interested in the school and worked hard for the interest and advancement of the scholars and would have attained perfect success, but unfortunately the same element came into the school that came near destroying the winter term last year. When parents and guardians allow their boys to go to school armed with revolvers vers, and the boys, themselves, go with no higher ambition than to annoy the teacher and destroy the school property it is useless to expect the school to accomplish what it is designed to do, no matter who may be the teacher or school board."

The following statistical reports and the report of the school principal, Mr. John Day, describe in greater detail our aims and progress. We are very fortunate in having a very able staff of teachers and supervisors. Our school enjoys a top state-wide reputation and our teachers annually are requested to assume leadership in various educational areas.

I sincerely appreciate working with your School Board which has shown unusual interest in the development of our entire school program, and has made so many valuable contributions to insure its success.

(Official School Warrant will be posted as provided by law)
To the Inhabitants of the Oyster River Cooperative
School District qualified to vote in district af-

fairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampshire Hall, Durham in said district on the 13th day of April, 1955, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Member of the School Board

for the ensuing five years.

- 3. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To choose Agents, Auditors and Commit-

tees in relation to any subject in this warrant.

6. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the towns of Durham, Lee and Madbury.

7. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$230.00 to defray the school district's share of the cost

thereof.

8. If the foregoing article is adopted to see if the school district will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the School District Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school in its annual report.
- 10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Works Agency, or other U. S. Government or State Agencies.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
