# REPORT OF MONROE SCHOOL DISTRICT

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## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Monroe:

The enrollment at date in each school with the name of the teacher is as follows: North Monroe, eight pupils, William Lang; Number Three, 12 pupils, Gladys Dunkley; The Plain, 36 pupils, Florence Ward; Pollard, 11 pupils, Gertrude Walker. Agnes Little and Samantha Smith substituted at Number Three during the fall term as it was expected that Violet Ward would be able to resume her duties there at any time. The number of pupils at the Plain, at present excessive, is likely to be less another year as there is a large eighth grade to graduate and a possible removal of other pupils. Should the attendance continue at the present figure some change will be necessary to relieve the situation.

The average attendance for the school year ending June 30, 1925 was 94.1 per cent with a little less than four days lost on account of holidays, institutes, and bad weather. Grace Farnsworth and Frank Choate were not absent nor tardy during the year. There were 219 tardy marks, altogether too many.

There were five graduates from the eighth grade, Margaret Bedell, Wallace Brown, Leo Hewey, Ruth Johnson and Amanda Locke. There are ten tuition pupils at McIndoes Academy. Next year this number is likely to be increased by half at least, and the amount of money appropriated for high school tuition must be increased accordingly.

The present state law allows an approved high



school to charge for tuition a rate not in excess of the average for the state for cost of instruction only and not above the per capita cost in that particular school. The average for the state this year is \$97.65. As far as Monroe is concerned this means that, if the per capita cost for instruction at McIndoes Academy amounts to \$97.65 or more, it may charge Monroe pupils that amount for tuition. This rate will change each year as it depends on the yearly average cost of instruction in all of the high schools of the state. It is probable that the rate will increase rather than decrease another year.

The new law also requires towns like Monroe, which send high school pupils to schools in another state, to authorize their school boards by vote in district meeting to make a contract with such out of state schools.

The school and town building at the Plain was painted last fall. The expense was borne by the school district and town together. The underpinning of the same building is in very bad condition and the yard needs grading. Minor repairs are needed in all schools. Additional modern desks should be put into the Plain school and all new furniture is needed at Number Three.
