TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Mont Vernon in the County of Hillsborough in the said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mont Vernon on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at 2:00 of the clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to establish a town ordinance requiring a minimum of one acre of land for each unit, tenant or family of occupancy thereon, except that lots of record less than one acre in size, legally identifiable as such at time of passage of the ordinance, shall be exempt.

Action on succeeding articles is deferred until 7:30 p. m.

- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To act on reports of all Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, Committees, etc., and raise and appropriate any money relative thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid for the construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$787.29 for said purpose. (State will add \$5,248.59)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to establish a town Conservation Commission, as set forth in R.S.A. 36A.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to sell to Clarence S. Wood, for the sum of \$500, at private sale and not at public auction, a certain parcel of land now owned by the Town, being the northeast part of Lot No. Seven, more fully described in the deed from Ephrem Paradis to the Town, dated November 3, 1941, and recorded in Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds in Volume 1025 at page 398.
- 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls open at 2:00 p. m. Polls will not be closed before 8:30 p. m.

DALAND MEMORIAL LIBRARY

An Egyptian reader browsing through the first known library in the 21st century B.C. had his choice of a lively collection of stone tablets — not the sort of thing one took lightly.

Mont Vernon readers in the 20th century may have weaker arm muscles, but their brains are far less limited. Available to them is a fine collection of classic and contemporary literature, easily portable and appeal-

ing to all tastes.

In the budget it will be noted that there are two sums called "electric lights." These figures have caused some confusion among the citizenry. The light bill is actually paid by the Daland Trustees, but since the Public Service Company of New Hampshire prefers its money monthly, the Town Trustees pay the bill 12 times a year and are reimbursed by the Daland Fund annually. In the past this event occurred in May, even though the fiscal year ends in December. Starting in 1968 this payment will be made in December, and from now on you will just have to take the auditors' word that it all works out right.

The Library is not all facts and figures, as was shown last February when a group of residents organized a fascinating and noteworthy program, "The Age of Rembrandt." The Librarian and Trustees participated, but special mention goes to Mrs. Jan Havinga, Mrs. Don Cheever, Mrs. Phoebe Flory and Mrs. Anita Andrews.

In closing we will quote from one of our predecessors, Will Woods, whose words are as relevant today as they were 40 or more years ago when he wrote them: "The most potent factor in shaping the living and the destiny of human-kind are the spoken and the written word . . . You, citizens, tax-payers and friends of Mont Vernon have laid a cornerstone which is a foundation upon which will rest the future up-building

of children's children . . . There can be nothing better or greater."

We concur.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Mont Vernon qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fourteenth day of March 1968, at four o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

(Articles 6-14 will be acted upon at 7:30 p. m.)

- 6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.
- 7. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To choose committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire or from any other source.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 197-1, a-g inclusive, i.e. to elect the district officers at the annual town meeting.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$220,000 for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an elementary school and to determine if such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$25,000 for renovating the Town Hall to be used as classroom facilities and to determine if such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise, and further to increase the budget accordingly.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

MONT VERNON SCHOOL BOARD

The 1967-68 school year has been a year of transition. We have grown from a rural school with a very slowly changing enrollment to a rapidly expanding school faced with greater increases in the immediate future. One has but to observe the relentless march of housing along the old Amherst road toward our town to realize the potential growth we face. Current projections made by the School Board predict a Grade 6 enrollment figure of 150 or greater by 1971-72 school year, a short four years from now. In addition, compulsory kindergarten is being debated in Concord and may add 20-25 more students to this figure. Your School Board is proposing a temporary 5-year plan to meet the housing needs of this growth. It is also studying the long range needs and will be calling upon the townspeople to participate in this planning through various study committees.

Providing a staff of teachers and support people is a major problem facing any School Board today. The era of the dedicated, underpaid, conscientious teacher has passed. Today our staff must be drawn from the young graduates who ask "What does Mont Vernon offer me in professional and financial advancement?" Your School Board, in cooperation with the Superintendent's office has been attempting to answer this question. This year, in addition to salary, we are offering fringe benefits enjoyed by many in private industry, including hospitalization and professional advancement payments. The professional advancement payments reimburse, within limits, the expenses which a teacher may incur in qualifying for more advanced degrees. This continued education is of benefit to the teacher and the Mont Vernon school district.

The current school year has seen the implementation of a new approach to elementary education, the "ungraded class" in grades 3-6. This program has not been without its difficulties and faults as in any new program. It is the goal of the Mont Vernon School Board and the Superintendent's office that as the difficulties are resolved, the present program will result in a superior education for the students in Mont Vernon.

This school report would not be complete without special mention of the citizens who contributed time and effort, a precious commodity in a busy world, to the School Advisory Committee. Their report has been previously distributed and their two major recommendations incorporated in the budget and warrant. The School Board also wishes to thank the citizens who have taken of their own personal time to appear at School Board meetings to offer constructive criticism and suggestions for the improvement of the current program. We have listened and incorporated many of these suggestions.

MONT VERNON SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT

Change has been the dominant theme at the Mont Vernon Village School this past year. New personnel, increased enrollment, building space adjustments, a revised program pattern and careful study of imminent and future needs, all have contributed to this theme.

Retirement and relocation by key personnel, along with increased student population, shaped staff needs for 1967. Mrs. Elizabeth Crouch, grade two teacher, was the lone member of the instructional staff to return. We are grateful for her continued devoted service. Miss Pauline Woods continued to make a significant contribution in her capacity as school nurse, and Mr. Samuel Hanscom, school custodian, sustained his fine effort in maintaining the school building and grounds in the best possible fashion. Remaining instructional staff and service positions were assumed by personnel new to the Mont Vernon School.

Mr. Harold Lorenz was appointed principal and assigned to teach Arithmetic and Social Studies in Grades 3-6. Mrs. Phyllis Courage was assigned to teach Grade 1, Mrs. Ruth Trundy to teach Reading in Grades 3-6, Mr. George Marineau to teach Language Arts and Science in Grades 3-6, and Miss Candace Beach to instruct Art and Music in Grades 1-6. In addition, Mr. Richard Cardner became the Union No. 40 Guidance Director; Mrs. Charlotte Saxe began her duties as Speech and Hearing Therapist for Union No. 40, and, in a newly-established position, Mrs. Lillian Barton became the first Union-wide Reading Consultant. We sincerely appreciate the efforts and accomplishments of all these people in meeting the inherent challenge of their positions, in addition to coping with the challenge of adjustment to a new situation.

Enrollment figures increased from 98 students, one year ago, to 112, at the outset of this school year. Aside from its obvious effects on staff needs, noted above, the

increased student population required a further building space adjustment. To provide an additional, needed teaching station, a temporary partition was constructed to divide the previous Grade 1 room. The results provided two barely adequate classrooms, one of which continues to serve Grade 1 and the other established as an Arithmetic-Social Studies room for Grades 3-6 students. What in 1965 was a three-room school house now serves as a five-room structure, with little or no potential for further expansion or housing additional students.

To provide the best possible program for the children, it was necessary to make the most effective use of the talents of the staff members and existing building facilities. The organizational pattern chosen provided for two self-contained classrooms for Grades 1 and 2, with a non-graded, departmentalized approach in Grades 3-6. The latter organization provides an opportunity for children to work at their ability levels, particularly in Reading and Arithmetic. In other subjects, where a group of children is studying the same topic at the same time, the teacher should provide an opportunity for some children to study and explore the topic in greater depth than others, according to abilities. Teachers are assigned to subject areas based upon background strengths; the children, therefore, move from teacher to teacher for certain subjects.

This program is being guided and evaluated through the use of curriculum guides provided by Union No. 40, consultant observation and evaluation from the State level and from within Union No. 40, periodic standardized achievement testing, supplemental reading and subject matter testing and study and research of similar programs.

Increasing enrollment, dated facilities and mounting demands of a modern educational system all clearly emphasize the need for thoughtful study, but early decisions on the immediate and future direction of the educational system in Mont Vernon. Alternatives are being prepared for the School District Meeting. These alternatives will be prepared as a result of contributions by the interested citizens of the District, School Study Committee, Staff, Administration and School Board members. Through this cooperative effort, we trust that the best possible course will be determined.

SYNOPSIS OF SCHOOL MEETING March 8, 1967 – Mont Vernon, N. H.

The annual Meeting of the Mont Vernon School District was opened at 4:21 P. M. by the Moderator, George D. Kittredge. The Warrant was read, and the polls were opened for voting on Articles 1 through 5.

At 7:33 P. M. the voting was suspended and the Meeting called to order by the Moderator. The Salute to the Flag, led by Police Officer Carl Toreson, was followed by prayer offered by Reverend Weible.

The Warrant having been read at the 4 o'clock opening of the Meeting, and hearing no objection to not reading its entirety again, Article 5 was taken up. Mrs.

Dorothy Smith moved that as Article 5 was incorrectly labeled and that the auditors were printed on the ballot, we accept the result of the ballot as cast by the

voters. Motion was seconded and passed.

Article 6 — To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district. Mrs. Dorothy Smith moved that we pass over this article and act on it with Article 11. Motion was seconded and passed.

Article 7—To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Mrs. Maria Havinga moved to accept all reports as printed in the 1966 Town Report. Motion was seconded and passed.

Article 8 — To choose committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Mrs. Dorothy Smith moved to pass over this article and consider Article 9, as this was the only committee to be chosen. Motion was seconded and passed.

The Study Committee will investigate the following areas: present facilities, future requirements and projected revenue sources. All recommendations are to be submitted to the School Board by October 30, 1967. Mrs. Dorothy Smith moved to accept Article 9 as printed. Motion was seconded and passed. Mrs. Smith announced the Study Committee as follows: George D. Kittredge, Charles A. Miville, Paula Pestana, Carl Toreson and Robert Straw.

Article 10- To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,960.00 as a deficiency appropriation. Mrs. Dorothy Smith moved to accept this article as printed. Motion was seconded and passed.

Article 11 — To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Mr. Robert Naber moved to accept the budget of \$117,483, which includes \$75 for the Study Committee and \$6,960 as a deficiency appropriation. Mr. Joseph Devine moved to take up the budget item by item. Motion was seconded and passed. Having a favorable vote on the budget item by item as presented, Mrs. Virginia Harcovitz moved to accept the budget as printed. Motion was seconded and passed.

Article 12 — To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire or from any other source. Mrs. Maria Havinga moved to accept the article as printed. Motion was seconded and

Article 13 — To see if the district will vote to approve the position of Business Manager for Union No. 40 and accept State Aid for that position. Mrs. Maria Havinga moved to accept the article as printed. After discussion, motion was seconded and passed.

Article 15-Mr. George Carleton moved that the names of all persons receiving salaries or wages from the School District be printed in the Town Report next year and each year thereafter. Mr. William Plummer amended the motion "That the individual amounts

be printed that each person received." The amendment was seconded and passed. The amended motion was seconded and passed.

Miss Dora Edwards moved that the Town Reports be available one week before the first meeting. Motion

was seconded and after discussion passed.

Mr. Walter Kilian moved that we give a rising vote of thanks to Mrs. Elizabeth Scully and Mrs. Margaret Clark, who are retiring in June. So voted. As neither teacher was present the Clerk of the School District was instructed to inform them of the complimentary action.

There was discussion on holding School and Town elections on the same day. Mr. Charles Coughlin moved that the School Board study the feasibility of having the voting and meeting on the same day. Motion was seconded and passed.

Mrs. Virginia Harcovitz moved that we give a rising vote of thanks to the School Board, which was unan-

imously done.

Hearing no other business, the suspended action on Articles 1 through 5 was taken up again at 8:55 P. M. allowing all who had not had a chance to vote to do so. At 9:05 P. M. it was moved and seconded that the polls be closed, and so voted.
