THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to Vote in Town Affairs:

[L. s.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Newbury, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from a point just south of the residence of Joseph Croteau to its intersection with the highway near Chalk Pond.

4. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Sutton road to the Twiss place, so called.

5. To see if the town will vote to discontinue its right and title to a section of the County Road from a point near the Old Pond to a point near the buildings owned by Carlos F. Bartlett.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

To the Members of the School Board:

The year ending June 30, 1922, and covered by this, my third annual report, is marked by a complete change in the staff of teachers and by the repair and improvement of several school buildings.

ORGANIZATION.

As so frequently occurs in the rural schools, changes to other occupations, to more attractive teaching positions, and to attendancet in normal school, removed at the close of the previous school year three efficient and valuable teachers, who had served in the same schools continuously for two or more years.

Due to the lack of boarding facilities and to the small enrollment at Baker Hill, this school was closed and the three pupils were transported to District Number Two.

ENROLLMENT AND ATTENDANCE.

The total school enrollment of Newbury was seventy-four. Fifteen of these attended the Warner high school, one the Henniker high school, one the Newport high school, and one attended the elementary school in Bradford. There were also two tuition pupils from Sunapee and one from Goshen enrolled in the Mt. Sunapee school.

INSTRUCTION.

Results in penmanship and spelling have shown the most marked improvement during the year. The Palmer method of writing is used. The penmanship of the pupils at Mt. Sunapee and later at the District Number Two school rates among the highest in this Union District. This work has been of especial value to the pupils of the first four grades.

Rapid perception instruction in spelling, which employs in reproduction the simultaneous use of eye, ear,

hand and voice, has enabled the average pupil to attain a much higher degree of accuracy as measured by the Ayer's Scale, which includes the one thousand most commonly used words. This work has been supplemented by individual drill in dictionary study.

I wish to mention another type of training essential to the future efficiency of every boy and girl. I refer to a feeling of personal responsibility for and pride in the care and neatness of school grounds, school rooms and all school equipment and materials. In addition to thorough text-book instruction, this interest in a well-kept school equipment was particularly evident at the South.

HEALTH.

Since the report of last year seven treatments have been secured.

Following is the report of the medical inspection made by Dr. L. H. Cogswell:

The fact that over 77 per cent of those examined have defective teeth leads me to repeat a recommendation made last year that some provision be made to bring dental treatment within the reach of the school children. In the majority of homes I find the parents able and willing to pay for the necessary treatment if it can be brought into the town. A dental clinic maintained by the local Red

Cross, King's Daughters, or Grange for a period of three or more days each year would contribute much to the mental and physical efficiency of those who go out from the schools.

BUILDING IMPROVEMENT.

The changes made in the South schoolhouse place it in a leading group of remodeled one-room rural school buildings. The location of windows and seats has been so changed as to admit light in the proper direction and to remove all cross-light and window glare from the blackboards. Two sections of new blackboard have been added. In type of heating, lighting and sanitary facilities the schoolhouse at the South compares favorably with similar buildings in other progressive communities.

The repair and new equipment of the Number Two District building have removed the most unsanitary conditions existing in any of the school buildings. The dilapidated walls have been refinished with wall board. All wooden blackboards have been replaced with Hyloplate boards; and an additional section has been added. The desktops have been refinished. A much needed book and supply closet has been built. The most valuable sanitary improvement is a Kaustine chemical toilet and underground sewerage disposal tank. This change also adds about thirty per cent more woodshed space. A tile culvert has been put in between the road and the school grounds. Although this school building is now overcrowded with pupils and poorly located for safe and ample playground facilities, it contains the most up-to-date equipment of any school in the town.

CONCLUSION.

I wish to commend the teachers for the professional spirit in which they have accepted my criticisms and

have adopted suggestions. Also their suggestions have been of value to me. It has been a pleasure this year to share with the school board and other citizens some part in the progress of your schools.
