

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Ossipee qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the hall of the Ossipee Group Y. M. C. A. Inc., in said town on the Second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects.

Article 1. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for decorating the graves of soldiers.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate twelve hundred dollars (\$1200.00) towards the support of a Health Nurse.

Article 3. To see what amount of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways in the summer.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for breaking roads in winter.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for defraying town expenses and indebtedness.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.00) to be used for the town needy.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to defray expenses of house and forest fires.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the repair and construction of bridges.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) for the Library.

Article 10. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for two new truck blades.

Article 11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes and to allow them to make a discount for early payment of taxes.

Article 12. To see what amount of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on loans.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to issue permits to druggists for the sale of liquor in the Town of Ossipee, for medicinal purposes.

Article 14. To see if the town will approve regulations adopted by the selectmen allowing Sunday Baseball.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 25, Public Laws, State of New Hampshire, relating to holding of caucuses.

Article 16. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under this act. Laws of 1933, Chapter 99, Section 22.

Article 17. To choose a Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Highway Agents, Auditors, and all other Officers and Agents for the ensuing year.

Article 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for repairs, alterations and improvements of schoolhouses and grounds for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for new equipment for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Medical Inspection for the ensuing year.

12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$333.00 for insurance for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the school district will vote to establish a four-year high school in Ossipee and appropriate money to equip and maintain same.

14. To see if the school district will vote to sell the schoolhouse in the Brown District.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as superintendent of schools, it being the fourteenth in the series of such reports.

I congratulate the citizens of Ossipee on having good schools, as usual, in these times of stress and strain. It is the evident belief of Ossipee people that the welfare of the boys and girls is of first importance. In comfortable, well-kept buildings competent teachers are giving instructions in facts of knowledge, and also lessons in self-control and regard for the rights of others. It is well said that education today is not only gathering facts of knowledge but it is also training for lives of service in public welfare.

Jessie Gray, President of the National Education Association, says, "The American common school is the expression of a mighty faith. It has grown up out of need and aspiration. It is the bulwark of those democratic ideals and rights for which mankind has sacrificed and suffered thruout the ages. It is the home of light and of reason. It is the hope of a better tomorrow. The common school is the house of the people."

#### **Repairs and Improvements**

The school property is well kept. Cleaning, varnishing and painting are done each year. During the last year grading has been done at West Ossipee and at the Center. The approach to the Center building is now attractive and well lighted at night. Shingling was done at West Ossipee and Granite. A well was dug and a pump installed at Granite.

Next year Water Village Schoolhouse should be shingled and the building painted outside.

At the Center slate blackboard has been provided for the primary room and additional chair-desks provided for the high school to accommodate the pupils of the third year. I believe a room should be finished off over the front entrance to the building. We are now using the gymnasium very fully, not only for athletics and physical exercises but for classes in woodwork with benches and power machinery. Still further is it used for geography and science classes from the grammar and high schools.

This building is well filled with fine boys and girls and the work is progressing well.

#### High School

Principal Jackman is working hard and, with the help of Miss Kelley and Mr. Bennett, is carrying on the third year work in the high school. This is a fine effort, especially in these times when pupils cannot go elsewhere. Parents and pupils appreciate the new opportunity and the extra work of the teachers. I urge now that the proper steps be taken to provide another room and another teacher, and so another year in high school. There are ten pupils ready to become seniors next year and four of these are tuition pupils. I feel sure that more tuition pupils would come if we could offer four years of work.

For years we have stood as an approved high school and our pupils can transfer to other approved schools of the state. Our scholastic standing is good. Woodwork and laboratory science are interesting. Athletics is well handled and the contestants are well trained. We have had an especially good team in basket ball this winter. A busy high school of forty-two pupils demands attention and is worthy of wholehearted support.

#### Visual Instruction

The motion picture has brought help and enjoyment to the boys and girls. Already there have been pictures of health, safety, kindness to animals, flowers, geography and history. The picture, "Daniel Boone," was given in the school hall and the public invited. This was a strong picture of early pioneer life in the Kentucky region. "Dixie," was a unique picture, showing scenes from the South in the time of the Civil War. It was especially appropriate at the time of Memorial Day. The entertaining picture, "Captain January," was favorably received everywhere. Since we learn more through the eye than any other sense, the picture comes to have special value.

#### Health Work

Medical Inspection is still in the care of our Red Cross nurse, Mrs. Marion Davis. An especially good number of defects have been corrected. Milk and Cod Liver Oil have been furnished, as needed, by federal money.

Granite school attracted wide attention by reaching a banner stage where all necessary defects had been corrected and health standards had been met.

The dental clinic treated 73 children. In January only 12 underweights remained out of approximately 250 children. Many defects were removed by the help of federal money.

A motion picture on health was given in the schools by use of a machine loaned by the County Farm Bureau.

Appreciation is expressed for the earnest work done by our school nurse.

In connection with the health work, parents are reminded that children must be vaccinated before entering school. This should be done not later than August 20. It is not right to wait until school opens and then keep the children out to be vaccinated.

A well attended school exhibition, held last spring, shows that Ossipee citizens are interested in schools and child welfare. The conditions of our country show that we need well-trained citizens, and the way to train is to begin in youth. Honest, loyal, efficient, helpful and law-abiding citizens are not made

in haste. A squash can be grown in one season, but it takes years of slow, hard growth to make a sturdy, spreading oak. The twig can be bent. The tree cannot.

#### Attendance

For the year ending June 30, 1933, we had an average attendance of 204.8 and an average membership of 217.4 and a percent of attendance of 94. We are still below our minimum of 95%. May I ask for still further effort in the matter of regular and punctual attendance? This means much for the success of scholastic work.
