THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE  
WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the 6th day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects: (Business Meeting 7:30 P.M.)

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To elect one Selectman for three years.
4. To ballot upon the following question on the official ballot: "Are you in favor of the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?"
5. To ballot upon the following question on the official ballot: "Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Building Code Ordinance as follows:"

Delete Article 5 (a) and insert the following: (a) No building used as a dwelling, accessory building, commercial building, trailer or mobile home shall hereafter be constructed, moved, or altered except in conformity with the regulations herein specified; nor shall any construction or alteration be done without a permit issued by the Building Inspector. Normal repairs or maintenance which do not alter the principle use of a building, shall not be deemed to require a building permit. After issuance of the building permit, construction must be commenced within six months and the exterior completed within two years, except that said Building Inspector may extend the time upon application.

6. To ballot upon the following question on the official ballot: "Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Building Code Ordinance as follows:"

Delete Article 5 (c) (7) and insert the following: (7) All dwellings, trailers, mobile homes and all public and industrial buildings shall be equipped with adequate disposal facilities complying with the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission regulations before a building permit is issued.

7. To ballot upon the following question on the official ballot: "Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Building Code Ordinance as follows:"

Add to Article 10 the following statement: Proceeds of any fines shall be remitted to the Town Treasurer, Salisbury, N. H.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

11. To hear reports of agents, auditors and officers heretofore chosen. 12. To see if the Town will vote to have an audit made by a C. P. A. and to appropriate an estimate of \$1,000.00 to cover such audit. (Included in Town Officers Expenses)

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Franklin Regional Hospital. (Included in the Health Appropriation)

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$998.65 to defray the expenses for services of the Franklin Visiting Nurse Association. (Included in the Health Appropriation)

15. To see if the Town will vote to use \$3,500.00 of the Capital Reserve Fund interest for road maintenance in the Flood Control Basin.

16. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This Commission has membership of more than ten municipalities and has jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the Office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission is to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town. The Commission has only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:45-53. Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, and is advisory to local governments in the Region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from Salisbury.

17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$387.00 as the



Town's share for the studies and operation of Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes,

18. To see if the Town will vote to have the Moderator appoint a special unpaid Advisory Committee of three persons to be known as the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee which will join with other towns on the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board. Such Committee shall make recommendations to Town Meeting for upgrading the town dump including, but not limited to, the advisability of joint action with other town; and that the Town appropriate \$175.00 as the Town's share of costs to undertake this work, conditional upon the terms set forth in the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board's proposed bylaws.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an estimate of \$500.00 to provide a room in the hallway and old rest rooms in the back of the Library Building to be used for an office for the Police Department. (Included in the Town Building Appropriation)

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an estimate of \$1,000.00 for a telephone system in connection with the proposed County Dispatch Service. (Included in the Police Appropriation)

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund already started for the Town Hall and Parking Lot.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Department Equipment.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for Highway Department Equipment.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to start a Capital Reserve Fund for a Rescue Truck.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to start a tax map.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Old Home Day Celebration. (Included in Patriotic Purposes)

27. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 76:15a as

amended by 1971, 454:3 authorizing the semi-annual collection of taxes.

28. To see if the Town will vote to rescind a previous vote of Town Meeting to publish tax assessments each year in the Town Report, and instead, have them published each even numbered year.

29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: The sale of land in the Town of Salisbury shall require a survey map of said land, by a registered surveyor, to be filed with the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen. This survey shall be the responsibility of the seller. Failure to comply with this ordinance will result in a lawsuit against the seller equal to all costs incurred by the Town in obtaining a survey map of the land in question. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen to enforce this ordinance. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

## ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF SALISBURY, NEW HAMPSHIRE

An ordinance to promote the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the community in regulating the use of land in the Town of Salisbury.

### ARTICLE I – PREAMBLE

In order to retain the beauty and rural atmosphere of the Town of Salisbury, New Hampshire, to protect property values, to conserve natural resources, to encourage the most appropriate use of land throughout the municipality, and to promote health, safety, morals, order, convenience, peace, prosperity, and general welfare of its inhabitants, the following Ordinance is hereby enacted by the said Town, pursuant to the authority conferred by New Hampshire Revised Statutes, Annotated, 1955, Chapter 31, Sections 60-89 and as amended. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Town of Salisbury Zoning Ordinance, hereinafter referred to as “this Ordinance”.

### ARTICLE II – DISTRICTS

For the purposes of this Ordinance, the Town of Salisbury is divided into the following districts as shown on the official zoning map to be filed with the Town Clerk upon the adoption of this Ordinance. Residential District Commercial District Agricultural District

### ARTICLE III – INTERPRETATION AND APPLICATION

A. Interpretation – In interpreting any provision of this Ordinance, it shall be held as the minimum requirement, adopted for the promotion of the public health, morals, safety or the general welfare. Whenever any requirement of this Ordinance is at a variance with the requirements of any other lawfully adopted rules, regulations, or ordinance, the most restrictive, or that imposing the highest standard, shall govern.

B. Application – The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to all uses, structures, and lots within the Town of Salisbury, New Hampshire. Whenever any existing use of structure is not in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance, it may continue to exist subject to the provisions of Article VII. Any non-conforming use in existence at the time of passage of this Ordinance shall not be prevented from continuing.

2. Any use not listed as permitted, or as a special exception, shall be prohibited after the effective date of this Ordinance.

### ARTICLE IV – GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. Any junk yard or place for the storage of discarded machinery, vehicles or other scrap materials shall be maintained in accordance with the standards set and enforced by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes, Annotated, 1965,

Chapter 267, Sections A-1 – 16. B. No owner of any land shall permit any ruins caused by fire, explosion, flood, storm or other catastrophe to be left unfinished or incomplete thereon, but shall complete or remove the same within 12 months of date of such occurrence; except when there is property in court litigation, completion or removal shall take place within one year after settlement of such court action. If a building is over 50% damaged, it shall not be reconstructed as a non-conforming use unless such building is to be restored to its original state by its original owner.

C. The removal of clay, sand, gravel, or loam is permitted for private use or for sale. No pit or cellar hole is to be left in an unsightly or hazardous condition.

D. Advertising signs shall be permitted as designated under the various districts. Official Town, State or Federal signs shall be exempt from those regulations.

E. Sanitary Protection – all Sanitary systems shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with standards set and enforced by the New Hampshire State Department of Health and the New Hampshire Water Pollution Commission.

F. No dwelling or structure shall exceed the height of 35' above the elevation of the finished grade adjacent to the building, church spires, silos, belfries, TV antennae and chimneys excluded.

G. No new building lot in any district shall be less than 2 acres in area.

#### ARTICLE V – PERMITTED USES IN ZONING DISTRICTS

A. Residential District. The following regulations shall apply to the Residential District:

Permitted uses:

- Dwellings and residences
- Farms, excluding fur ranching and farms raising more than 10 swine.
- Roadside stands for the sale of farm products.
- Stables for private use only.
- Plant nurseries and greenhouses.
- Churches and museums.
- Recreational areas, including day camps without overnight accommodations.
- Home occupations and professional offices accessory to residencies.
- Accessory uses and buildings.

Property owners of business, profession, or service enterprises shall be



allowed two advertising signs, such signs not to total over 4 sq. ft. in area for each sign. One or more signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed, or signs dealing with business located within the town, shall not exceed a total of 4 sq. ft. No neon, tubular glass, or privately owned flashing electric signs, or signs of more than 4 sq. ft. shall be allowed in this district.

B. Agricultural District. The following regulations shall apply to the Agricultural District.

Permitted uses. 1. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences in such area.

2. General farming, including horticultural, dairying, livestock, veterinarian, poultry raising, and other agricultural enterprises or uses, and the raising of animals for other purposes are permitted in this District.

3. Directional signs relating to a business operated in the Town of Salisbury shall be permitted, provided that directional signs do not exceed 4 sq. ft. for any one enterprise in any two-mile length of road, not including those to indicate change of direction. All other signs in the District shall not exceed 3 sq. ft.

C. Commercial District.

Permitted uses:

1. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences in said district.

2. Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, inns, motels, tourist courts, cabins, including such retail business within these permitted buildings as are conducted for the convenience of the residents or guests shall be permitted.

3. Shops, restaurants and other retail establishments.

4. Garages, parking lots and filling stations.

5. Business offices.

6. There shall be between the center line of the traveled right of way and the extreme front of any building, a minimum distance of 75 feet.

7. No building in a commercial district shall be located within 35 feet of the side and rear property lines.

8. If any proposed use is such as to attract vehicles, space shall be provided on the property to accommodate all such vehicles attracted by the business.

9. Advertising signs which bring attention to the goods or services sold on the premises shall be permitted. These signs shall not be over two in number and not to exceed 32 sq. ft. in area for each sign, nor exceed 20 feet in height. Signs may be illuminated only by continuous indirect white light, with the light sources placed so that they will not constitute a hazard to street or highway driving by glare, and so placed that lighting therefrom does not directly shine into an adjacent residence.

## ARTICLE VI – SIZE OF LOT AND LOCATION OF BUILDING

Each dwelling, trailer or mobile home, or commercial building, shall be located on a lot of a minimum space of two acres. The main building shall be at least 35 feet from each boundary line; garages, tool sheds, etc. to be at least 10 feet from each boundary. It shall have a minimum of 150 feet back from the center of any State highway, or at least 75 feet back from the center of any Town road.

## ARTICLE VI – NON-CONFORMING USES AND BUILDINGS

A. Any non-conforming use or building (other than uses specified in Sect. B below) may continue in their present use, except that any non-conforming use or building may not be:

1. Changed to another non-conforming use.
2. Reestablished after discontinuance for 1 year, except to a use conforming to the district in which it is located.

B. No outdoor advertising structure may continue as a non-conforming use for more than 1 year after the effective date of this Ordinance unless it is designed to direct attention to a business or profession conducted on the premises.

## ARTICLE VIII – ADMINISTRATION

1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given authority and power, to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.
2. After the passage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any structure, building, or to relocate any building in any District, or change the use of land, without first obtaining a permit from the Selectmen. (This permit is to insure that the proposed construction or change in use conforms to the permitted uses in the zone that it occupies, and also that any structure is located a proper distance from the boundaries of the land on which it is built.)
3. The Board of Selectmen shall issue any and all permits requested when such permit is in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.
4. No permit for remodeling shall be required, provided the purpose for which the building is to be used is not changed, and complies with the Town of Salisbury Building Ordinance.
5. Upon any well-founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Board of Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court, or by any other legal action.

## ARTICLE IX – BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Within sixty days of the passage of this Ordinance, the Selectmen shall

appoint a Board of Adjustment consisting of five members, as provided in RSA 31:67, and subject to the provisions thereof.

A. The Board of Adjustment shall consist of five members. Upon adoption of this Ordinance, the Board of Selectmen shall appoint one member to serve for five years, one member to serve for four years, one member to serve for three years, one member to serve for two years, and one member to serve for one year; thereafter, the annual Town Meeting shall annually elect one member for a term of five years. A member shall be removable by the Selectmen upon written charges and after a public hearing. Vacancies for any unexpired term shall be filled by appointment by the Selectmen and such appointee shall hold office until the next annual Town Meeting.

B. The Board of Adjustment is, for all other powers, as set forth in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 31, as amended.

#### ARTICLE X – AMENDMENTS

This Ordinance may be amended as provided by Chapter 31-63, 64 NH Revised Statutes Annotated. However, no amendment shall be acted upon by the Town Meeting until a report shall have been made by the Planning Board. Upon petition of at least 25 voters, a Public Hearing shall be called, not later than January 15.

The Planning Board shall transmit each and every proposed amendment which has been submitted to this Article to the Board of Selectmen prior to the closing date of the town warrant. The Planning Board shall submit its report on each and every proposed amendment in the Town Report or at the final Public Hearing.

#### ARTICLE XI – PENALTY

Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than Fifty Dollars, upon conviction, for each day such violation may exist. Proceeds of any fines shall be remitted to the Town Treasurer, Town of Salisbury, N. H.

#### ARTICLE XII – SAVING CLAUSE

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

#### ARTICLE XIII – WHEN EFFECTIVE

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

## PROPOSED BUILDING CODE CHANGES – 1973

Amendment No. 1 will change Article 5 (a) FROM:

No building used as a dwelling or for commercial purposes or trailer or mobile home shall hereafter be constructed, moved, or altered except in conformity with the regulations herein specified; nor shall any outside construction of an estimated value of \$1,000.00 or more be done without a permit issued by the Building Inspector. Normal repairs, restoration or improvement, interior or exterior which do not alter the principle use of a building, shall not be deemed to require a building permit. After issuance of the building permit, construction must be commenced within six months, and the exterior completed within two years, except that said Building Inspector may extend the time upon application.

TO:

No building used as a dwelling, accessory building, commercial building, trailer or mobile home shall hereafter be constructed, moved, or altered except in conformity with the regulations herein specified; nor shall any construction or alteration be done without a permit to be issued by the Building Inspector. Normal repairs or maintenance which do not alter the principle use of a building, shall not be deemed to require a building permit. After issuance of the building permit, construction must be commenced within six months, and the exterior completed within two years, except that said Building Inspector may extend the time upon application.

Amendment No. 2 will change Article 5 (c) (No. 7) FROM:

All dwellings, trailers, mobile homes and all public and industrial buildings shall be equipped with flush toilet, septic tank and adequate disposal facilities as per State disposal regulations, a State Board of Health percolation test having been made and approved before a building permit is issued.

TO:

All dwellings, trailers, mobile homes and all public and industrial buildings shall be equipped with adequate disposal facilities complying with the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission regulations before a building permit is issued.

Amendment No. 3 leaves Article No. 10 as is: Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$50.00 upon conviction for each day such violation may exist. Upon any well founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, upon their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Proceeds of any fines shall be remitted to the Town Treasurer, Salisbury, N. H.

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Salisbury for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972, which was made by Nathan Wechsler & Company in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

## SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

## FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1972:(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets, as of December 31, 1971, and December 31, 1972, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus of the Town decreased \$924.87 from \$8,215.64 to \$7,290.77 in 1972. The Balance Sheet Surplus of \$7,290.77 represents the Current Surplus (excess of total current assets over current liabilities) on December 31, 1972.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These are as follows:

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Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), net revenue surplus of \$2,839.39, less a net overexpended appropriations of \$1,564.26, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,275.13.

#### Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1972, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Salisbury for their assistance during the course of the audit.

**FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT**

During the past year your Volunteer Fire Department answered six calls; one chimney fire, two kitchen fires, two fires caused by lightning, and one pumphouse fire. We had one stand-by call for Franklin but no equipment was needed.

Our new pumper arrived in February and we held an Open House at the fire station for anyone who wanted to come and see it. This truck is one of the first yellow fire trucks in the state. We have purchased ten feet of 4½ inch soft suction hose for this truck.

Some of the men attended fire school again this year and we have held several training sessions.

We have joined the Twin Rivers Mutual Aid System with eleven surrounding towns. In case of an emergency these towns will aid us at any time without cost. We in turn will assist them whenever needed.

The fire station has been moved back which makes it much easier to approach the highway. We are grateful to the town for appropriating the money for the foundation and to the Ladies Auxiliary for paying to have the station moved.

**REPORT of the FOREST FIRE WARDEN and DISTRICT CHIEF**

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and deastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

The girls have worked very hard and are grateful for any support they have been given. Future support will be appreciated for our aid to the firemen.

## CIVIL DEFENSE AND RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

Your Rescue truck has been called out about ten times this part year; once for a snowmobile accident, three car accidents, once for a base of operation for a lost hunter. The rest being fire related operations.

The Rescue Squad entered a Mutual Aid agreement this past year with the Penacook Rescue Squad and help may be obtained from them if requested by our Rescue unit. Salisbury is very lucky to have eleven licensed first aiders that meet once a month to train. We have also purchased some new equipment this past year, such as burn blankets, Thompson splints, porta-power and a obstetrical kit, also a new stethoscope and aneroid sphygmomanometer.

## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 7, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 1:00 P.M. by Moderator Dana Parks, Jr. After reading of the Warrant by the Moderator the polls were declared open for voting.

A motion was made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the polls remain open to the close of the business meeting.

A motion was made, seconded and voted in the affirmative to adjourn the business meeting until 7:30 P.M. deferring discussion of articles in the Warrant until such time.

The business meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by Moderator Dana Parks, Jr. The Invocation was offered by the Rev. Theodore B. Hadley. Mr. Parks expressed appreciation on behalf of the Town Officers for the excellent dinner served them by the P.T.G. He announced 'snacks' were available—courtesy of the Youth Fellowship Group.

A welcome was extended to guests present at the meeting, Jim Russell of National Public Radio and Steven T. Nelson, Senior Engineer of W.G.B.H., Educational Radio Station of Boston. Permission was granted them to record Salisbury's Town Meeting.

After reading of the Warrant by the Moderator the articles in the Warrant were acted upon as follows:

Articles 1,3,4,5,6,7 & 8—Ballot articles requiring no further action.

Articles 2 & 9—Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative to defer action on articles 2 & 9 pending consideration of Article 10.

Article 10—Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative to defer action on this article until after consideration of Article 22.

Article 11—Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the Selectmen and Town Treasurer be authorized to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12—Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative reports of agents, auditors and officers heretofore chosen be accepted.

Article 13—To see if the Town will vote to have an audit made by a C.P.A. and to appropriate an estimate of \$600.00 to cover expense of such audit. (Included in Town Officers Expenses.) Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative article be accepted as read.

Article 14—Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (included in Health appropriation) for the Franklin Regional Hospital.

Article 15—Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$820.32 (included in Health appropriation) to defray expenses for services of the Franklin Visiting Nurse Association.

Article 16—To see if the Town will vote to use \$2,500.00 of the Capital Reserve Fund interest for road maintenance in the Flood Control Basin. Motion



made, seconded and voted in the affirmative Article be accepted as read.

Article 17—Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the Town pass over this article pertaining to donating \$50.00 to the Dartmouth—Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Article 18—To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the estimated sum of \$3,000.00 to construct foundation and slab to move the Fire Station back onto. Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative Article 18 be re-worded as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the estimated sum of \$3,000.00 to construct foundation and slab on which to move the Fire Station. Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative article be accepted as re-worded.

Article 19—To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to start a Capital Reserve Fund to enlarge the Town Hall and Parking Lot. Article 20—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund started for the purpose of purchasing equipment for the Highway Department. It was brought to the attention of the voters that due to a typographical error the Warrant should have read: 'To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund started for the purpose of purchasing equipment for the Fire Department.' Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative Article 20 be amended to read as intended. Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative Article 20 be accepted as amended. Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the interest from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund be transferred to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established by amended Article 20.

Article 21—To see if the Town will vote to have an outside light installed to light the Town Hall building and Library building. Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative to accept article.

Article 22—To see if the Town will vote to rescind a previous vote of Town Meeting to publish tax assessments each year in the Town Report, or do anything in relation thereto. Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative this article be passed over.

Action taken on deferred articles 10-2-9:

Article 10—To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee. It was brought to the attention of the voters the total recommended budget as shown in the Town Report was incorrect. Total in Report—\$48,834.55. Corrected total—\$51,334.55. Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative Budget be accepted subject to the additions and



deletions made at this meeting. (Total Budget—\$55,334.55)

Article 2—Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same.

Article 9—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget. Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55,334.55 necessary for the Town Budget.

Article 23—To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. A motion was made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the Selectmen appoint a committee to investigate the feasibility of planning and executing a Tax Map of the Town of Salisbury—with permission for said committee to begin work on same if their report is favorable.

Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the polls be closed.

Motion made, seconded and voted in the affirmative the business meeting be adjourned. (8:45 P.M.)
