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COVER: THE ROCKS, 1900

The Rocks was located at the end of the old Rocks Road. It was a docking area used by farmers and fishermen since the mid-1600s. It got its name from the cluster of rocks seen in this photograph.

The Rocks Dock was important economically due to its proximity to the Brown's River which runs to the Hampton Harbor and into the Atlantic Ocean. This landing opened onto the marshland--so vital to the farmers for its abundance of salt hay.

The Rocks also served as a popular recreation site. In this photo the Fogg family is having a clam chowder party. John D. Fogg(1891-1981) is in the foreground and his father, George A. Fogg, is on the far right with the horse and buggy.

Among Ellsworth Brown's(1860-1949) writings about Seabrook is an account of the Seabrook people going to the Rocks Dock on their way to Seabrook Beach:

"Most everyone on the Main Street(Route 1) and some on the side roads looked forward to the annual outing to Cross Beach. This place is now the dunes at Seabrook Reach. It was the custom for many years to go to the beach for a day's outing. They would go down when it was high water, about 5 to 7 a.m., so as to go down with the tide, and return at night with it.

The people would walk or ride to the Rocks in the morning, and as they had a chowder for their dinner at noontime, they carried kettles, pans and other accoutrements, also crackers, bread, pies and cakes. At the Rocks the men had a gundalow in waiting which were used to boat stacks of hay from the marshlands down the river in the late summer.

This gundalow was about 20 feet long and four men would sit on the end-beams and pull two large, long oars, and two men at an oar. Planks were put across to seat the people. Most of the ladies wore old-fashion sunbonnets so they wouldn't get tanned. The steersman took his place and the oarsmen pulled away and we glided peacefully down the river, past Nates Stake and Half Tide Rock and out into the Hampton River. Sometimes we took a tent with us and when we landed that was erected the first thing.

The men would dig clams for the chowder after the tide left the flats. The day was spent in recreation. The chowder seemed to be just as good if a little sand had blown into it, and how good the chowders were to them when their appetites were strengthened by the salt breezes. Late in the afternoon we would start home, after the ladies had gathered all the large shells they could find and the moss for their blanc mange. On the way up the river the wind breezed up and the men had to row harder. Sarah Ann's sunbonnet blew off and landed with the keel down and it sailed away as though it was in a hurry to reach a port.

The part that I remember best was the singing on the boat. And I have often declared that music sounds better on the water. All the old songs were sung."

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New Hampshire

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Charles H. Batchelder December 25, 1891 - September 11, 1973

The town report book is dedicated to the late Dr. Charles H. Ratchelder who so faithfully labored for the town's future development through his membership on the Seabrook Planning Board from 1962 to 1968.

A BIOGRAPHY

Dr. Batchelder was born in Amesbury, Massachusetts, the son of Mary L. Perkins (1864-1924) of Seabrook and Herbert \mathcal{W} . Batchelder (1865-1946) of Amesbury. He was married to Mildred \mathcal{W} . Pierce of Pomponoosuc, Vermont, and they had one child, John P. Batchelder (1919-1969).

In 1913 Dr. Batchelder graduated from what is now the University of New Hampshire with a B.S. degree in the field of Arts and Sciences. That Fall he accepted a professorship at the University of Maine, where he earned his M.A. degree in entomology. In 1920, he enrolled at Cornell University and later received his Doctorate in Entomology.

Afterwards, he accepted a position with the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture and was assigned to the laboratory in Arlington, Mass. In 1934, he was transferred to New Haven, Conn., where he remained until 1944, at which time he was sent to Toledo, Ohio. Dr. Batchelder's work and interest was in developing methods to control the European corn borer which was devastating our farmers' corn crops. In 1948, he was sent to Ankenny, Iowa, where he continued his work on this project.

Less than a year later, Dr. Batchelder was appointed to the Interamerican Institute for Agricultural Sciences in Turrialba, Costa Rica. He saw there an exciting challenge and the chance to learn about and work in a whole new culture. This task entailed eradicating a small rodent which destroyed the abaca plantations, and since the United States purchased hemp, made from the abaca plant, to use in making rope for our naval vessels, it was important to this country to control the destruction of these plants.

Dr. Batchelder learned the spanish language and delivered his lectures and writings in spanish, so that his colleagues and the plantation growers would understand him.

In the late 1950s the call for retirement came. The only element that softened the sorrow of having to leave Costa Rica and its people, for whom he had an ever increasing affection, was the knowledge that he would be coming to Seabrook, offering to him the only bright aspect of retirement.

No structure may exceed the maximum height of $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories or 35 feet, except municipal structures and public and private utility structures, such as windmills, radio, and television towers.

To see if the Town will Vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$250,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of loaning all or any portion of the amount, as needed, to the Seabrook Housing Authority (if said Authority is fully created and empowered under the aforementioned article) said money to be used by the Housing Authority exclusively for studying, planning, construction and operation of an elderly housing project, including the purchasing, leasing, or optioning of land for said project. The Seabrook Housing Authority shall give ten-year non-interest bearing note or notes to the Town, with no requirement of repayment of principal during the term of the note or notes. The Seabrook Housing Authority shall give a mortgage or lien to the town upon any asset owned by the Seabrook Housing Authority to secure the note or notes. At the maturity of a note or notes, the Seabrook Housing Authority shall place an Article in the Town Warrant requesting an extension or forgiveness of said note or notes.

ARTICLE ADOPTED AS AMENDED

ARTICLE 14: read by the Moderator, "On petition of Robert R. Cushing Jr. and twelve (12) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Conflict of Interest Ordinance:

1. The Seabrook Dog Track and the Seabrook Nuclear Project operate under circumstances that are unique to all other businesses in the town. Both are privately owned monopolies that are regulated by state and /or federal laws and agencies. Both have an enormous impact on the town, maintain lobbyists in the legislature to promote their interests, and in the past have used the authority of the state to override the wishes of the Town as defined by voters at town meeting.

In order to assure that the needs and wishes of the townspeople are placed above interests of those regulated monopolies, and to avoid even the appearance of a conflict of interests on the part of key town officials and employees, this ordinance is adopted.

2. The following offices and employees are defined as key town officials and subject to this ordinance: Selectmen, Water Commissioners, Assessors, Police Chief, Fire Chief, Civil Defense Director, Administrative Assistant, Planning Board, Board of Adjustment.

3. Association with the following concerns is defined as a conflict of interest:

a. Yankee Greyhound Racing Inc., its subsidiaries, concessionaires, agents, and others affiliated with the Seabrook Dog Track.

b. Public Service Company of New Hampshire, its partners, subsidiaries, contractors, or othersaffiliated with the Seabrook Nuclear Project.

4. It is incompatable with the positions outlined in paragraph 2 for any individual holding such position to be an employee, consultant or advocate for (whether paid or unpaid) or otherwise do business with any party listed in paragraph 3. To do so shall constitute an immediate forfeiture of position.

5. It shall be a part of any oral or written contract or employment agreement between the town and individuals subject to paragraph 2, that as a condition for employment with the town the employee agrees not to seek or accept employment with any party covered in paragraph 3 for a period of one year following the termination of employment with the town. To violate this constitutes a breach of contract and the town will take legal action for punitive damages against the violating parties.

6. This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption by majority vote at Town Meeting. Provided however that any individual who has held a position subject to this ordinance prior to its adoption and who continues to hold said position at the time of adoption shall be exempt from its authority for a period of six months.

7. If any provisions of this ordinance are held invalid, the other provisions of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby. If the application of the ordinance or any of its provisions to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the application of this ordinance and its provisions to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

8. This ordinance is adopted under the authority granted the town in RSA 31:39-A, effective August 10, 1981.

REGULATION AND LICENSING OF AMUSEMENT DEVICES:

Pursuant to the powers granted by its Corporate Charter and Revised Statutes Annotated 31:41-d:

1. Prohibited Practices and Devices

A. No person under the age of 14 years shall be allowed to operate any amusement device unless accompanied by a parent or guardian. It shall be the duty of the manager, owner or employees of any establishment where amuse ment devices are present to ascertain the age of each person operating or wishing to operate an amusement device.

B. No gambling or wagering shall be permitted. No prizes of any kind or value shall be given away or sold at nominal fee for any reason whatsoever and no cash or "pay-off" shall be given for any reason whatsoever pertaining to a high score, matching number, skill points or other outcome of an amusement device game.

- C. No amusement device shall be licensed which is designed or fitted:
- 1) to allow deposit of multiples of coins before playing;
- with a"knock-off"button and/or internal meter designed to cancel the visible accumlated points and record them internally in the device;
- to allow continuous play under the same scoring by depositing additional coins.

2. License Required

 No person, firm, corporation or association may allow to be operated an amusement device without first obtaining a license from the Board of Selectmen or their designee for said device.

- B. The Board of Selectmen or their designee may establish from time to time reasonable licensing requirements and standards; including number of machines, location and hours of operation, but in no event shall those requirements contain less than the following:
 - That the applicant or applicants must be 18 years of age and of good moral character as reasonably determined by the Chief of Police.
 - 2) That a full description of the premises is submitted with a statement that such premises will be operated in accordance with all applicable local ordinances. No amusement device shall be located other than within a fully enclosed permanent building.
 - 3) That no license will be issued to any person or corporation for amusement devices located within one half mile of the nearest school.

C. The applicant shall pay \$50.00 per year or any part thereof for a license covering from one to three amusement devices; and for each additional device shall pay \$50.00 per year or any part thereof, provided that the applicant may at his discretion remove and replace any device at will without further payment of fee. However, each additional or replaced device must be licensed.

D. Licenses shall be effective from the date granted until December 31, of the year granted. Each License will be reviewed annually by the Board of Selectmen , and renewed upon payment of fees, but only if the person, firm, corporation or association applying for a renewal has been found to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, and the location and operation of the amusement device will be detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the public.

E. Any violation of any of these provisions of this ordinance or requirements and standards authorized pursuant hereto shall constitute a violation of the license and may be considered just cause for the revocation or suspension of the license. If the location and operation for said amusement device proves to be a detriment to the health, safety, and welfare of the public, the license for said device may be revoked or suspended. Any revocation or suspension shall be carried out by the Selectmen only after due notice and hearing.

F. The Board of Selectmen from time to tim_{a}^{may} amend this ordinance to modify, add or delete any provisions thereof. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to abrogate, limit or contradict any state or federal law or regulation.

3. Enforcement

A. During all hours of operation the amusement device shall be open and accessible for inspection by the Selectmen or the Chief of Police or their designated representatives to determine compliance with the terms of this ordinance.

B. Any person, firm, corporation, or association found to be in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation as defined by New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and be subject

to a fine of not more than \$100.00 per day for each violation.

4. Definitions

A. <u>Amusement Device</u>: The term "amusement device" shall mean any machine which, upon the insertion of a coin, slug, token, plate or disc, may be operated by the public generally for use as a game, entertainment, or amusement, whether not registering a score, and whether or not skill is used in its operation. It shall include but not be limited to such devices as electronic games, pinball machines, skill ball, mechanical grab machines, and all games, operations, or transactions, similar thereto under whatever may be indicated. The term does not include vending machines in which are not incorporated gaming or amusement features, nor does the term include any coin-operated rides or devices which solely produce music.

B. <u>Person, Firm, Corporation or Association</u>: The terms person, firm, corporation or association shall include any of those entities or combinations thereof owning an amusement device, or maintaining an establishment where one or more amusement devices are available for general use by the public, or having control over such an establishment.

- 5. <u>Separability</u>: Each separate provision of this ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and it is further ordained that if any provisions of this ordinance are found to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, all other provisions thereof shall remain valid and enforceable.
- 6. Effective Date and Duration:

A. This ordinance shall take effect after public hearing and signature by the Selectmen or after approval and ratification at the Town Meeting and shall be in effect until repealed or modified.

B. There is hereby created a 60 day "compliance period" during which all amusement devices presently in place and operating as of the date of this ordinance and not in compliance with the terms of Section 1 C hereof, shall be brought into full compliance. All other devices shall be properly licensed within 30 days after the date of this ordinance.

ARTICLE I - read by Moderator, "To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Public Health Regulations:

Pursuant to the authority conferred by the provisions of RSA 147, the following regulations are hereby adopted for the purpose of prevention and removal of nuisances and for the general health and safety of the public

A. General Public Health Regulations:

A-1 <u>Rubbish and refuse That Are Menaces to the Public Health</u>: No person shall place or leave, or cause to be placed or left, in or near any highway, street, alley, or public place, or in any pond or other body of water where the current will not remove the same, any rubbish, dirt, soot, ashes, hay, shreds, oyster, clam or lobster shells, manure, swill, tin cans, decaying fruit or vegetables, wastewater, or any refuse animal or vegetable matter whatsoever- nor keep in or about any vacant lot, dwelling-house, b rn, shed, store, shop or cellar any of the aforesaid substances after the same have become putrid or offensive, or a menace to the public health.

A-2 <u>Drains, Privies and Sewers That Are Injurious to Public</u> <u>Health:</u> No person shall suffer or permit any cellar, private drain, pool, sink, privy, sewer, or other place, upon any premises or grounds belonging to or occupied by him or them, to become offensive or injurious to the public health.

A-3 <u>Nuisances in Lots, Buildings and Other Places</u>: The owner, occupant, or any person having control or charge of any lot, tenament, premises, building or other place, shall not cause or permit any nusiance to be or remain in or upon said lot, tenement, building, or other place.

A-4 <u>Pig-Pens, Chicken-Coops, Barnyards</u>: No person shall keep or use any hog-pen, goat-pen, chicken-coop, or barnyard so near to any highway, park or other public place as to be offensive or a menace to the public health, or offensive or a menace to any person residing on an adjoining or abutting lot; nor shall a hogpen, goat-pen, chicken-coop, or barnyard be kept in such a condition as to allow the contents therefrom to be discharged upon said adjacent or abutting lot or upon any street, lane, park, alley or other public place in this town; and no person shall keep or permit to be kept any rooster upon any premises situated within that part of the town zoned other than rural or watershed.

B-3 <u>Cleaning of Obstructed or Offensive Privies and Septic</u> <u>Systems:</u> When any privy, cesspool, drain or septic system shall become offensive or obstructed, the same shall be cleansed and made free; and the owner, agent, occupant, or other person having charge of the premises in which any privy, cesspool, drain or septic system may be situated, the state or condition of which shall be a violation of the provisions of this article, shall remove, cleanse, alter, amend or repair the same within such reasonable time after notice in writing to that effect from the Health Officer as shall be expressed in such notice.

C. Putrified Animal, Seafood or Vegetable Substances to be Removed at Stated Periods:

C-1 <u>Putrified Animal, Seafood or Vegetable Substances to be</u> <u>Removed at Stated Periods</u>: The owner, agent, occupant or other person having the care of any stable, barn, premises or any other place where manure, swill, garbage, fish, shellfish or any The Town Police Department will continue in its present form, operating with all powers authorized to local law enforcement agencies under State law. The Chief will be chosen in a manner set forth in the Town By-Laws. The Chief of Police and all Department employees shall reside within a reasonable commuting distance, up to a 20 mile radius of the Town during the period of their employment. They shall be given twelve months to establish this commuting distance.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The highlights for the town in 1983 included construction of the new community center, adoption of a new town charter, passage of health regulations, establishment of a housing authority, major improvements to the municipal water system and implementation of a summer parking plan at Seabrook Beach.

We started negotiating another five year contract with SCA Disposal Services of New England, Inc., for the disposal of solid waste. The current contract will expire on April 15, 1984. In accordance with RSA 149-M:18, the town has become a member of the Portsmouth Recovery Project.

Perhaps the most controversial subject was the adoption and subsequent amendments to the town charter. On October 18, amendments were made to the following sections in it: conflict of interest; board of selectmen-organization; residency requirements of the police and fire departments; department of public works; overseer of the poor; and the building inspector's enforcement authority.

Selectmen Walter I. Randall resigned about mid-year to take the job of town health officer. His replacement was petitioned to the Superior Court, where former selectman James S. Eaton was chosen to replace him.

The board of selectmen, as the town's water commissioners, adopted rules and regulations for the administration of the water department. On the recommendation of the auditors, we made a ruling that the annual domestic water bills would be due and subject to a \$5 fine after thirty days of their issuance and that the water shut-offs would begin the first of December rather than after December 31. It resulted in a total accounts receivable of less than \$3,000 in this account as of December 31. Previously, the late fee was not charged until after December 31 and the accounts receivable would be in excess of \$20,000. The turn-on service charge was raised from \$5 to \$25 and the installation fee was increased from \$85 to \$235.

The board of selectmen by law holds certain titles and responsibilities from time to time. In its capacity as fence viewers, it was petitioned to view a fence; as overseers of the poor, it appointed board member James C. Falconer as welfare agent. As the board of health, it selected a new health officer, promoted the passage of new health regulations, held monthly meetings and took to court the owners of the Park Place and Leisure Living apartment complexes for their unwillingness to correct their faulty sewage systems.

An increasing amount of time has been devoted to personnel matters. We adopted a safety policy for our employees in the public works departments and now require that permanent employees of the fire and police departments take an annual physical examination.

In response to two cases filed with the New Hampshire Commission on Human Rights, we made several policy changes with regard to hiring. The department heads are no longer allowed to hire new part-time employees without clearance from us, and all openings must be advertised publicly. We no longer accept applications for employment unless a job opening is available. We completed negotiations with the Seabrook Police Association for a two year contract and we are now negotiating a two year contract with the Seabrook Permanent Firefighter's Association. During the year we dealt with seven grievances--six from the police department and one with the fire department. Two cases went to arbitration in which the arbitrator decided against the town; however, the town's position was upheld by the New Hampshire Labor Board when an union employee accused a department head of interfering with union activities.

Upon the recommendation of the fire chief, rules and regulations were adopted for the fire department. The ambulance fee was raised from \$40 to \$100 per run, and a committee was formed to investigate the possible purchase of the Firemen's Association Building and to consider the construction of a new fire station.

A special committee was created to study various retirement programs for those permanent employees not covered by the New Hampshire Retirement System in accordance with a vote of town meeting.

With regard to special committees and projects, we reactivated the Conservation Commission, appointed a Police Station Site Study Committee, authorized the CableVision Committee to negotiate a new franchise for the town, appointed a representative to the licensing hearings for Seabrook Station, and hired a new director of Mosquito Control. An addition was constructed to the garage to the rear of the fire station to house the materials and equipment of the mosquito control program.

Much of our time is consumed by legal cases. In addition to the above mentioned ones with the apartment complexes, the town has entered into a case concerning the town's right to require underground utilities in a subdivision development and another involving an accident with a town vehicle.

Cases that continue from previous years involve the firing of a police patrolmen, the suspending of a department head, the tax abatement of Seabrook Station, the Sunday Racing issue, a zoning violation on Route 1, a police officer encounter with a citizen, and an accident that resulted in an injury at the town's transfer station.

We made a decision to change our town counsel from the firm of Tetler and Holmes to that of Holmes and Ells. We also use the legal services of John Colliander of Exeter should a conflict of interest exist with our counsel, and for cases involving special advise, we employ Robert Fryer of Londonderry and Richard and Gilbert Upton of Concord.

We attempted to control the increasing number of zoning violations that occur. There were sixteen in 1983. In July a directive was issued to the building inspector, police chief and health officer with regard to their responsibility to surveil potential problems. The police chief was requested to have his patrols report suspected violators to us.

With regard to town and leased property, we signed a two year lease with the Seabrook Firemen's Association for the use of the fire station, and the utility companies were notified that from hereon they must consult with the Road Agent whenever a telegraph pole is placed on a right of way. This procedure will assure that poles are not placed too close to the paved section of any town roads.

For the first time in our town's history, we adopted a set of rules for the maintenance of our cemeteries. Through much research at the Registry of Deeds, a survey and a plan was made for new gravesites at the Wildwood Cemetery, and a special committee has been working to replace the Civil War Memorial there. We attempted to plot additional gravesites at the Elmwood Cemetery, but concluded the plan would not be appropriate. We hope to purchase land from abutters there.

Considerable money was spent for surveys for fencing to protect the town from encroachments onto its land. Surveys were made of the rights of way at Seabrook Beach and of the Chase Homestead property. Fences were erected on the southwest boundary at the Chase Homestead, at the entrance to the rock wells on Rt. 107 and on the northside of the land around the Old South Meeting House.

Through our efforts a number of improvements were made at the beach. We implemented a summer parking program which had been prepared by the planning board. Several parking areas east of Rt. 1A were set aside for residents west of the Blackwater River, and over six hundred parking permits were issued to uptown residents. The plan seemed to alleviate much of the parking and traffic problems on the beach roads.

We perambulated the town bounds with the Hampton selectmen and both towns shared the cost of a survey and installation of a boundary marker there. Two ordinances were adopted, one dealing with the use of the town peir and the other regulating the use of the oceanfront dunes.

In 1984, we hope to complete two major projects, the first to put together a comprehensive personnel policy for the non-union employees and the second is to implement the capital improvement program that was adopted by the planning board two years ago.

We would like to express our gratitude and appreciation to Stephen Coes for the dedicated service he gave our town as its first administrative assistant.

We also extend our thanks to the town employees, public officials and members of committees that have so faithfully worked towards the many improvements that were made to our town this year.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT'S REPORT

The Board of Selectmen voted in March to hire me to succeed Stephen Coes as the town's administrative assistant. This position serves as the agent for the selectmen. It functions to coordinate the day to day responsibilities of the three member board. This includes assisting town committees, boards and departments; updating and reporting claims to the insurance company; overseeing the personnel policy; participating in employee grievances; managing the town hall and staff; publishing the annual report; preparing the annual budget; applying for federal funds; assisting the treasurer with the cash flow and tax anticipation notes, along with many other minor tasks.

During the year, I have coordinated the Child in Need of Services (CHINS) cases, which involve teenagers who are sent to special schools or homes by court order. Between 1982-3, the expense to the town was over \$58,000 for nine children. The selectmen have been actively seeking compensation from the parents.

A great deal of my time has been allocated toward re-organizing the Assistant's office and many of the procedures and programs of the Board and some committees. The selectmen's filing system has been revamped and updated with a general index to the contents. To keep abreast of the many decisions of the selectmen, a cross-filing system has been created of subjects addressed at the weekly meetings.

An \$8,000 grant was applied for through the Coastal Zone Management (CZM) program for a study of the sand dunes at Seabrook Reach. The grant was approved and the project was turned over to the Conservation Commission.

In November, I started a new practice of meeting with the town counsel weekly to review projects and questions directed to him by the selectmen. The meetings have been productive and have saved much time for both of us.

On the advise of our insurance consultant, the department heads have been notified of a requirement that all contractors that provide services to the town must produce a certificate of insurance for the town to assure that they have adequate coverage, so that claims will not revert to the town. In addition, the filing system for titles to town vehicles have been updated with the help of department heads and the town clerk.

The selectmen adopted a new policy regarding applications for employment. It will no longeraccept job applications unless an opening has been advertised, and a new employment application form was produced in compliance with the laws as interpreted by the New Hampshire Commission on Human Rights.

The selectmen have directed that the Assistant participate in all interviews and testing for job openings, as well as preparing the public notices for all openings and coordinating the entrance and annual physical examinations for town employees.

The most time consuming aspect to the personnel matters is the reponses that the Assistant has to make to employee grievances. In 1983, I handled twelve separate grievances.

Several efforts were made to assist the selectmen, committees, depart-

ment heads and town officials. A master sheet was prepared of all appointed positions along with expiration dates, so that re-appointments or replacements could be made in a timely manner. A directory of all officials, committee members, boards and department heads was printed and distributed, so that contacts between these groups and officials would be made more easily.

At the close of the state legislative session, copies of the new laws were passed out to the respective responsible boards and officials. A letter was also written to all of the above, explaining each one's responsibility to comply with the Right to Know Law. As a result, minutes of all meetings are kept in the Assistant's office for public review and most everyone seems to be posting their meetings in accordance with this law.

I have devoted much time to the area of planning and zoning. A set of procedures and forms were designed for the Planning Board for subdivision and site plan review hearings. An informational sheet was written for the public which explained the purpose of the Planning Board and the Board of Adjustment. The zoning booklets were updated with the newly adopted amendments and driveway application and permit forms were created for the Planning Board. According to state law, the Planning Board has the sole authority for issuing driveway permits.

Information about the two zoning boards was consolidated at the town hall, so that the public can now obtain all literature available on planning and zoning at the Office of the Appraiser and applications for subdivision and site plan review hearings must go to the Town Clerk.

New building permit application forms were approved by the selectmen and public notices for planning board hearings are now prepared through the office of the Administrative Assistant.

Other work that I have completed through my office includes annual and special town meeting warrants; cemetery regulations; application and permit forms for tag day and junk yards; procedure for a driveway permit application; summer parking ban, town peir, town parks & recreation, and town dunes ordinances; and agendas for the weekly selectmen's meetings.

In the Fall, I attended two lectures in Exeter on planning and zoning and spent two days at the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Municipal Association in Laconia. I obtained information for the selectmen about the new solid waste districting law, welfare, codification of the planning and zoning laws, codification of town ordinances, rock wells and health codes.

I extend my thanks to the Board of Selectmen for giving me an opportunity to work for the town of Seabrook in the capacity of Administrative Assistant. It signed a two year contract with me, effective January 1, 1984, and I look forward to working for the town and future boards during this period. I would like to anticipate that during this time many improvements can be made to our town government.

I also wish to thank all those department heads, committee members, boards and employees that have helped me this year.

The 1982 Revaluation Project

Public hearings were held in February for the purpose of assessment review in cases where assessments may have been in error due to the revaluation process.

The Assessing Department has just completed a market ration study in conjunction with State of New Hampshire Department of Revenue requirements and found that market prices for real estate in general have increased 12% on the average since our 1982 study. We do not like to see this inflationary trend. Causes contributing to this in Seabrook are the scarcity of available land and the attractive assessment rate.

New Construction

New construction and additions to existing construction for 1983 amounted to 250 property additions. At the current rate of permit applications and continued additional construction it is expected that we will exceed the 1983 property additions this coming spring for the tax year 1984.

Town Map Work

A continuing effort is being made to keep the town maps as up to date as possible. Original map mylars have been replaced by a new and better material than was used in the older initial mapping project. Many map corrections have been made and subdivision lines have been put on the maps. This project is in process presently and we hope to complete it soon. There is considrable research necessary throughout the town in order to improve the accuracy of the town maps. However, it has been decided that if the research were scheduled into and along with other work of the Assessing Department, it would be much more economical for the town. Outside engineering costs these days are very high and should be avoided wherever practical.

Mobile Home Changes in New Hampshire

There has been new legislation passed with regard to mobile homes in New Hajpshire. Fundamentally the changes boil down to the following:

- 1. Mobile homes are now to be treated with the same "ground rules" that all other residential or "real" property is treated under New Hampshire law.
- 2. Mobile homes are to be purchased and sold like real estate with regards to requiring a deed and recording.

Public Service Company Application for Tax Abatements Regarding Water and Air Pollution Control Equipment at the Nuclear Station

The State of New Hampshire law allows tax exemptions for water and air pollution control devices. After holding hearings to determine whether equipment petitioned for qualifies for exemption under the law, the New Hampshire Water and Air Pollution Control Commission affirm or deny exemptions. The Abatement and Equipment Exemption list which Public Service Co. petitions for is extensive and involves many millions of dollars in tax exemptions. The town has employed counsel to represent it's view of what exemption requests may have a serious impact upon future tax rates due to the great amount of valuation involved. The nature of the devices and equipment are extremely complicated and technical, so the town also expects to employ qualified engineering talent to aid where appropriate. It is not possible at the present time to estimate the potential disruption of the tax rate.

Public Service Co. V Town of Seabrook

As many may be aware, Public Service Comapny is in the process of court litigation against the Town of Seabrook contending that the assessments for the years 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981 and 1982 (thus far) excessive, unjust and unfair. Public Service Company is requesting tax abatements for all of the foregoing years amounting in the millions also.

The town has employed experts and counsel to represent it in these currently pending cases of law. At present, the outcome is unpredictable. The sucess or failure of the town's defense in this matter may also have a considerable effect upon the future town "tax rate". The Appraising and Assessing Department has made a great effort throughout all these years to be sure that it's assessment procedures and policies toward Public Service Company have been professionally sound and objective. Therefore, we consider the assessments to be strongly defensable both in theory and practice.



CRIME PREVENTION REPORT

This year was a short year for muself as Crime Prevention Officer because I was not appointed to that position until October 21, 1983.

The Crime Prevention Bureau has initiated a new community Crime Prevention Awareness Program which has been accepted with enthusiasn by Seabrook Citizens who have been able to attend one of our lively group conference presentations. The feedback I've been getting after one of our presentations has been very enthusiastic.

The Crime Prevention Bureau along with fellow officers of the BCI Division have held meetings with the Seabrook Townspeople at various locations and have been able to distribute free assorted materials and have also conducted a Crime Prevention Survey for homes and businesses. I am confident that such positive action will help in the overall crime rate reduction in the future.

When the Town Recreation Center is completed I plan to hold biweekly and monthly classes which will be offered free to all our citizens. This will also include a Drug Awareness Program to go along with our Crime Prevention Program. We will be receiving free films from the United States Drug Enforcement Administration which will be of great help for a joint community effort to recognize "drug abuse" within our community.

I am looking forward to a rewarding year in the reduction of crime in our community. I will be attending the Crime Prevention School which is being conducted by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council and I am confident that this education will be an asset to all of us.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH SERVICES OFFICER

This year we concentrated on the reduction of vandalism through increased contact with the youth of the town, trying to get them to realize that they must learn to respect themselves and the rights and property of others. This paid off over the Halloween season in the lowering of vandalism to one rock throwing incident and a few hydrants being turned on.

One new project we embarked upon was the fingerprinting of school-age children. Over five hundred children were fingerprinted during the past year and this project will be on-going this year. With the equipment currently available and the cooperation and patience of my fellow officers the sessions were enjoyed by the children and us.

Under the supervision of the Youth Services Officer, the department held its first annual public auction. Through the cooperation of the newspapers and cable television, we had a good crowd and auctioned off unclaimed bicycles and other odds and ends that are found either by the public or the officers. Every item auctioned off was first run through the National Crime Information Computer twice to make sure that no owner could be located, as a precaution to any problems that might arise. The town general fund realized over \$300.00 for about two hours work, and the evidence storage trailer was cleaned out.

The Youth Services Officer was accepted and received a certificate in Sex Crime Investigation through the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council which will aid the department in the investigation of sex crimes committed both against adults and children. We hope that with the public awareness that the police department has an individual trained in this field, that perhaps more women and children will come forward and report crimes such as rape, incest, and sexual assault more freely, with the knowledge that we can help and will be sympathetic to their feelings and needs.

This past summer we held our third police cadet program, in which four local youths were chosen to work for the Police Department. These teenagers spent one week at the N.H. Police Cadet Academy which is held at St. Anselms College in Manchester. Then they assisted the officers for the remainder of the summer. This program gives the youth the insight into police work which will help them decide whether or not they want to pursue law enforcement as a career. Some of their duties were to help with the record keeping at the station, assist the officers at accident scenes, assist with the evidence logging, and assisting as needed by the officers they were riding with. We hope that this can be an on-going project with new cadets selected each year.

We presented the Patch the Pony safety program to the school children last year, in which basic safety is taught to the students through the use of coloring books, film strips, audio tape cassettes and question and answer periods at the end of the lesson. The students keep the coloring books, a pamphlet for the parents to emphasize what the children have been taught, and a colorful button is also given to them. This year we are having an animated robot visit with the children to talk to them on safety and they will be given workbooks to take home, do assignments, and return for grading and further instruction. This program was paid for entirely by the merchants whose ads appear in the workbooks.

During the year we had:

- 51 New Juvenile Arrests
- 5 Repeat Juvenile Arrests
- 45 Cases entered into Juvenile Court
- 2 Run-aways reported missing who later returned home unharmed.

ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT

The year 1983 showed great progress in the animal control program in the Town of Seabrook. The hours allowed to do this work were increased from ten (10) to sixteen (16) allowing more time to do the work needed.

There were sixty-eight (68) dogs picked up and taken to the kennel or veterinarians. Of those, thirty-three (33) were claimed by the owners, ten (10) were placed either with new owners or a humane society, twenty-two (22) were put to sleep and three (3) died either on the way to, or at, the veterinarians. It is too bad that so many dogs had to be put to sleep because the owners could not take the responsibility to call the station and claim them.

In 1983 there were seventy-five (75) tickets issued for dogs at large, dogs on the beach and unlicensed dogs. Of these, fifteen (15) people did not pay the fines and charges were entered in Hampton District Court. Of the remaining sixty (60) tickets, the Town of Seabrook realized an income of nine hundred seventy-five (\$975) dollars in fine money.

There were four (4) people arrested in the worst curelty to animals case I have seen in fourteen (14) years of animal control work and the charges had to be dropped because the witnesses would not testify in court. I wonder what it takes for people to stand up and be counted when they will watch a dog tied on a chain in its own yard be beaten to the point where one of them has to be put to sleep and another has to be treated by a veterinarian while close to losing its life, and they will not testify against the people that they saw do this deed.

1983 was also the leader in three other areas of animal problems, first, that of damage done by dogs, most of which includes the killing of chickens, ducks and geese. Secondly, the number of dig bites reported in Seabrook increased to an unbeleivable thirty-four (34). And lastly, the number of animals killed by cars topped out this year at forty-two (42). All three of these are the highest I have seen in the four and a half years I have been working in Seabrook. These three reasons alone should show people that it is important to comply with the leash law in town, not only for the protection of people, but also for the protection of property and the animal itself.

I do not want to scare anyone, but feel that it is important for the residents of Seabrook to know, that there have been five (5) positive cases of rabies found in Rockingham County during 1983 and that three (3) of them were found in Seabrook. There is a state law requiring all dogs four (4) months of age or older to be vaccinated against rabies and I would remind everyone to do this. While it is not required by law that cats be vaccinated against rabies, it is recommended by the State Veterinarian and other authorities to protect the animal and also the people that may come in contact with the animal.

It has been a pleasure working with the people of Seabrook for the last four and a half years and I am looking forward to many more good years here. With the limited time allowed for animal control if these figures are to improve I need the help and cooperation of the residents of Seabrook doing their best to comply with the laws relating to animals.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

I submit the following report to the Board of Selectmen, the citizens and taxpayers of the Town of Seabrook.

The year started for this writer in March 1983 after the former Civil Defense Director, Frank J. Palazzo, resigned his office.

First, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Administrative Assistant, Eric N. Small, Fire Chief, Police Chief, Water Department, Road Agent, and many others who have been involved in assisting me to put the Civil Defense Agency back into active operation.

The Civil Defense office was moved from the Chase Homestead to the Fire Department Building, which is our Emergency Operating Center also.

The emergency radio system has been installed in the Civil Defense office. There is more work to be completed on this system in the near future.

The Fire Chief has agreed to operate and man the Seabrook rescue van when needed for the survival of any citizens.

The Seabrook Search and Rescue Diving Team has the use of the rescue boat and trailer and other equipment. The team has been active and a credit to the Town of Seabrook.

There have been many meetings with the Public Service Company in regards to the Evacuation Plan for the Town of Seabrook. The New Hampshire Civil Defense Headquarters has been very cooperative and helpful in assisting me in the proper ways to conduct this section of town government.

During the year 1984 I would like to complete the communication system, research into all hazards in the town and passing through town -- hazards which could cause any type of dangerous disaster.

The evacuation plan has a lot more that has to be put into order, and should be researched and evaluated with population, building and industry expansion.

The Emergency Management Agency will be working closely with me to assist in any funds returnable to the town that are expended from the Civil Defense budget as proposed. At present, it should be 50% of what is expended in the 1984 budget.

I would like to try to have more citizens involved in Civil Defense. It is our town and we will strive to survive any disaster, man made or nature made.

NOAD AGENT REPORT

For the year of 1983 I set up a schedule of work.

On April 4, 1983, the ramp at the beach was repaired and painted and hardware replaced. April 25th. was the beginning of clean up week for two (2) weeks. On April 30th. we planted 24 trees at the Elmwood Cemetery. On May 3rd. we mowed the Methodist Cemetery also cut 2 trees at the Old South Meeting House, on May 16th. These trees were replaced with new trees planted November 8th.

The new road sweeper was delivered May 16th. The Hot Top at Elmwood Cemetery was completed at the cost of \$1,306.44. There was 700 feet of guard rail installed north of the Police Station on May 19th., also on June 14th., Hot Top 90 feet wide and 350 feet long for the parking area was done by Iafolla at the cost of \$11,269.66. From May 18th. through May 23rd. we cleaned the drain at Farm Lane and cleaned the Beach roads with the new sweeper. We put about 50 drums on the seashore and started Lower Collins Street drainage.

Under Town Road Construction we have spent for hot top, gravel, labor, culverts, and equipment hire approximately \$25,720.89. A lot of these roads had to be dug out and gravel replaced to prepare them for hot top. This money was spent on Lower Collins Street, Pine Street, roads in cemeteries, Collins Street, Pine Street, South Main Street, True Lane Folly Mill Road and Ledge Road. Also spent \$42,000 for hot top on South Main Street.

We had to replace 2 tires on the tractor at the cost of \$895.00.

We put in catch basins at Tyngsboro Street, Tilton Street, Portsmouth Avenue, and Newbury Street at the Beach. We installed a new egg-shaped drain at Lower Collins Street. We had to trench and drain Timber Court and install 70 feet of plastic pipe and 70 feet of Aluminum pipe at Lake Shore Drive. In November we painted the 1973 International truck including the salt and sand spreader.

On November 15th. we painted double yellow lines from Walton Road to Washington Street to Farm Lane, also from the Fire Station down South Main Street to the point.

From November 28th. to December 9th. we spent time cutting tree tops on True Road so as to allow the sun to shine on the road. Tamarach Tree Service was hired for this project.

On December 19th. the Beach float was removed.

I am placing Special Articles in the Town Warrant for a low bed to haul the cat, a farm tractor to pull the Beach rake, a new backhoe and a new 6 wheel deisel dump truck.

POLLUTION CONTROL COMMITTEE

The study that was expected to take 2 years is now completed with the exception of a few details to be ironed out. Your committee has worked hard and pushed the engineering firm of E. C. Jordan Co. for its completion. It was felt time was becoming of the essence.

We have had much personal contact with the townspeople as have members of the State Board and the engineers and we feel that the need is becoming critical. We have been told that after 1985 we would be approximately #52 on the list for government consideration only. The prospect of federal funding is very bleak.

We have had two public meetings this year and will have more before the design is completed or any sewer system is built. The committee wishes to reflect the needs and wants of the people.

By law, the engineering firm has to show the most cost-effective way and report how much a sewer system would cost per family. However, Seabrook is in the unique position of being able to proceed and absorb the costs into its tax rate for pennies.

It is great to spend money on high salaries and things we want, but the committee is hopeful that the townspeople are far-sighted enough to see that now is the time to buy something that we need while the money is still flowing so bountifully.

WELFARE OFFICER'S REPORT

The 1984 budget proposals for the Town of Seabrook for the ensuing year, as in the past several years, reflect a trend and continuous increases in the welfare and general assistance appropriations. It is important, from the Selectmen's and Welfare Officer's position however, to explain to the voters and taxpayers of Seabrook that the preponderance of cost in this budget is in the payments of support for "Children in Need of Services", referred to in the courts and welfare circles as "CHINS" cases. To illustrate this ever increasing cost I offer the following data:

For the year 198 a total of:	31 CHINS cases represented	\$ 4,641.07
For the year 198	32:	18,225.52
For the year 198	33:	43,171.15

The total welfare appropriation for the year 1983 was \$50,000 and a total of \$64,657.41 was spent. As can be seen, all but \$21,486.26 was spent on the so called "CHINS" cases, or approximately two thirds of all costs paid out on the general welfare.

All of these cases of "CHINS" are by court decree, under RSA 169:2 of New Hampshire laws, which mandates that a child who is abused, delinquent, neglected, and for other reasons, is in need of care, supervision and various services, must be taken care of, usually in group homes or hospitals at the expense of the town (Seabrook) in which the child's parents reside. The welfare official or Selectmen have little to say as to how the courts direct this care, placement and cost.

There has been endless discussion on this increasing costly social problem which has been thrust upon the courts and ultimately the towns. The Selectmen and Welfare Officer have, however, been pursuing various legal remedies and court actions to have the parents held accountable and to reimburse the town whenever it is financially feasible for them to do so, and some substantial reimbursements are in the process of payment. This and other legal means are being employed by the Selectmen to reduce the costs to the community of these welfare cases, particularly the "CHINS" cases, and it is anticipated that these costs can be kept under control.

There is a further effort in cooperation with other cities and towns in New Hampshire, through the New Hampshire Municipal Association, to introduce legislation in the next session of the General Court to have the law changed so that the financial burden of these "CHINS" type cases will shift to the state and relieve the communities from some of this inordinate financial burden which is becoming a problem and expense to us all.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

As was anticipated in the 1983 Planning Board Report, the work load has increased considerably. The low tax rate and the availability of water are two factors that have influenced the increase of complex site plan reviews. These projects, along with the average subdivisions, plot plan reviews, etc., have precipitated a few changes in the Planning Board's structure this year.

In order to handle this case load in a timely fashion, we have increased our regular meetings to two a month, the first and third Tuesdays. In addition, the need to seek professional assistance in dealing with the more complicated site plan reviews and subdivision proposals became obvious. The Planning Board has retained the Rockingham Planning Commission to aid us during our regular meetings, along with the use of other professionals, as needed.

The third change is the stream-lining of the application procedure. This has been accomplished with the help of the Administrative Assistant, Assessing Office and Town Clerk.

In the past year we have attempted to refer to the Master Plan which was adopted in June, 1983, In doing so, we have proposed a zoning amendment which follows similar lines as is seen on the Future _and Use Map, within the Master Plan.

There is still a serious need to tighten the Site Plan Review regulations, and also to adopt some regulations pertaining to condoniniums

It is our hope to continue to serve you effectively and efficiently in 1984 and to complete the tasks we have set for ourselves.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In May, the Seabrook Conservation Commission was reactivated by the Selectmen with their appointment of five new members: Annabelle Boyd, Jacqueline A. Fushpanski, Stanley A. Hamel, Gertrude B. Humphrey, and Timothy Willis. The following officers were selected: Chairman Hamel, Vice-Chairman Willis, and Secretary Fushpanski.

The Commission met frequently to review applications for permits to the Wetlands Board and much time was spent considering ways to preserve the sand dunes at Seabrook Beach which are the only ones left in New Hampshire.

With help from a state grant and town funds, Applied Economic Research, of Laconia, was hired to study the dunes to give us information on the area covered, property ownership, sources of funding, and land appraisal.

As a result of this study, we are presenting a proposal to the Town Meeting which would allow the Town to acquire the dunes by purchase or eminent domain.

Stanley A. Hamel Chairman I am hereby submitting a report of the Mosquito Control Program as conducted in the Town of Seabrook during 1983.

The staff included myself as Supervisor, two male graduates of the Essex Agricultural and Technical Institute in Hathorne,Mass. and a young lady instructor from Seabrook Elementary School. All were duly examined and certified in Category F-II, Mosquito and Black Fly Control.

Public notices were posted in the Seabrook Post Office and Town Office and further notification went out through the Newburyport Daily News and the Portsmouth Herald.

All known beekeepers in town were notified by certified mail and the location of their colonies duly recorded. Residents, fishermen, recreationists and other potential consumers of water were requested, should any problem arise, to contact mosquito control through the Selectmen's Office.

The 1983 season commenced on April 21st. with spring larviciding of salt marsh sites began later employing Abate 4E at the rate of 1 oz. per acre. Some of the smaller fresh and salt water plots were treated with FLIT M L O at 2 gallons per acre.

Fresh water sites treated by Abate 2G totalled 21.49 acres with 43 lbs. of material. 29.65 acres of salt marsh were treated with 296.5 lbs. of Abate 2G.Abate 4E at the rate of 1 oz. per acre was applied to 13.25 acres of salt marsh, and 5.25 acres of fresh water plots. A total of 88.5 ounces of FLIT M-L-O were applied to 8 salt and fresh water plots totalling 1/3 acres. FLIT M-L-O was applies to control the mosquito in the 4th. instar and pupal stages. The major larviciding effort was concluded on August 16th. with spotty applications on the salt marsh on September 2nd.

The first major emergence of adult mosquitoes occured during the third week in May to kick off the adulticiding program on May 25th. From May 25 through September 8 the major portion of the Town was treated on 15 seperate occasions. On 12 occasions spot treatment of recreational areas such as ball fields were deemed necessary. The hours of adulticiding totalled 79 during which 118.4 gals. of Cythion 91% ULV were dispensed.

During what was purported to be an exceptionally severe mosquito season it is interesting to note that in Seabrook 15 fewer acres than in 1982 were treated in the larviciding program and a lesser amount of pesticides employed than in both 1981 and in 1982. The use of the four CDC-CO2 baited light traps was continued on a weekly basis to determine species present and population fluctuation. Aedes sollicitans, the salt marsh mosquito is the main problem species in Seabrook but notably trap shy. Thus landing and biting counts are more dependable than light traps in determining its numbers. The light traps work more effectively with the fresh water species.

The Leco ULV sprayer was twice calibrated with a proven mass media droplet size within the 18 micron range and distribution standards for ULV application of Cythion 91% ULV insecticide.

Periodic surveys were conducted on private properties to check potential breeding sites, and treated when found positive.

The Board of Selectmen was provided a weekly report of work accomplished.

The program was deemed as very effective and well received by the townspeople, many of whom commended us on our efforts.

A program of brook and stream clearing initiated this year was probably responsible in part for the reduction of fresh water breeding and lesser need for pesticides in the larviciding program.

This will be my final report as Supervisor of Seabrook Mosquito Control as I soon will become a resident of the State of Vermont. I have enjoyed the cooperation of those who I have been serving these past five years, as well as the State Entomologist and the Pesticide Control Board. I Trust that the one to succeed me will be as fortunate.

1983 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SEABROOK RECREATION COMMISSION

The members of the Seabrook Recreation Commission are Vernon Small, Chairman, Diana Randall, Harry Knowles, Charlotte Dow, Richard Beckman, Sal Rubera and James Eaton. The Commission held regular meetings on the first and third Thursday of each month throughout 1983 and with the Recreation Director carried out many of the goals set in 1983. This included continous expansion of leisure programs and facilities for the residents of Seabrook.

Youth programs conducted through the year included: four sessions of daily activities-winter, spring, summer and fall, town football team, cheerleading squad, basketball league, special events and trips. Regular programs were held at the Seabrook Elementary School and Town Parks.

Two hundred and twenty youth were enrolled in the 1983 Winter Session of Activities. Activities included recreation games, floor nockey, arts and crafts, recreational basketball, afternoon movies, teen basketball, karate and basketball league.

One hundred and one youth were enrolled in the Spring Session of Activities. Activities included indoor and outdoor sports, arts and crafts, tee-ball and floor hockey. During this time the lepartment also assisted the Little League Program in which over 153 enrolled. Equipment, clinics, uniforms and officials were provided by the Recreation Department.

One hundred and seventeen youth were enrolled in the Summer Playground Program and fifty-two in the Tennis Program. The Playround Program included daily schedule of recreational activities, preakfast and lunch program, special events and trips. Daily activities included sports, games, arts and crafts, table games and nore. Special events provided were a crazy hat day, olympics, tie lay, crazy dress up day, T-shirt day, crazy shoe day, Christmas in July, puppet show, silly sport day and family night. Many youth participated in the Pepsi Hot Shop Program and Hershey Track and Field feet during the playground program. Two youth represented the Town at the regional Pepsi-Hot Shot Contest held in Boston and fourteen youth represented the town at the State Track and Field Meet held in concord. The summer tennis program operated three days a week during the summer at Governor Weare Park and included instruction and tournments. Three trips were taken during the summer: Hampton Playground, Canobie Lake and Hampton State Park.

Two Hundred and Sixty-five youth were enrolled in the Fall session of Activities. Activities included basketball, recreation james, floor hockey, arts and crafts, soccer games, tumbling, flag tootball, tennis lessons, town Ram Football Team, Ram's Cheerleading squad and movies. Adult and teen activities also were conducted throughout the year and included Women's Volleyball, Men's Volleyball, Women's Fitness, Karate, Women's Softball, Men's Basketball, Craft classes and Line Dancing. One Hundred and Twenty-five were enrolled in the Winter session, 89 in the Spring Session and One Hundred Thirty-eight in the Fall session.

Special Events conducted during the year were the First Annual Easter Egg Hunt, Karate Demonstration, Basketball Banquet, Local Youth Track and Field Meet, Women's Volleyball Tournament-Seabrook to Newport, N. H., Halloween Party and Movies, Christmas Party and Football Banquet. The recreation department also worked with the Friends of Recreation and provided events such as Ice Capades Trip, Bowling Trip and Dinner Play Theater Trip.

The Recreation Commission and Director continued to coordinate the annual Old Home Days which were held in August of 1983. Again, over twenty non-profit groups and municipal departments participated, providing activities such as game booths, refreshment booths, contests, displays, demonstrations and more. Miss Betty Tibbetts was crowned Miss Seabrook 1983 and reigned throughout the weekend activities. Many of the activities available in the past years were provided again such as corn husking, horseshoe pitching, softball tournaments, skillet throwing, field races entertainment and more. New activities provided this year included a pie eating contest, father-son softball game and BMX races. The Grand Opening of Seabrook BMX Track was held in conjunction with Old Home Day Weekend. The department continued to assist the Seabrook Lions Club in providing annual 10 K Road Race as part of the Old Home Day Weekend.

During 1983, the Recreation Department continued to support many of the other town recreation programs such as Little League, Girls Softball, Men's Softball, Pony League, Winnacunnet Little Warriors. Ice Hockey and BMX activities. Assistance was provided in the forms of facilities, equipment, uniforms and officials for many above programs.

The Recreation Commission and Director continued their drive to expand the recreational facilities available in town, during 1983. The Veterans Memorial Park Restrooms and Governor Weare Tennis Court were completed during the year. A BMX track also was constructed and operated August through November.

Many townspeople have volunteered and supported the Commission and Department throughout the year. This support is greatly appreciated and expresses that townspeople have an interest in the growth of opportunity for the community. During 1984, the Commission will be focusing their efforts on eveloping the new Community Center with activities and opportunities or the townspeople of all ages.

Association of Architects and has had extensive experience in the area of elderly housing development and is considered one of the country's foremost experts in the field of energy saving construction techniques. POLICE STATION SITE STUDY COMMITTEE

Mr. Tambling assured us he would assign someone to this project for an early report to us.

LICENSING OF SEABROOK STATION

In April of 1983, the selectmen appointed me to represent the fown of Seabrook as an Interested Municipality in the Licensing Hearings for Seabrook Station before the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

This meant the Town of Seabrook could be present at scheduled nearings, offer testimony and question the adequacy of proposed operating and evacuation plans for Seabrook Station. A license to operate is required of all nuclear power plants before they can become fully operational.

In Seabrook's case, Public Service Company of New Hampshire is responsible for insuring the safety of both on-site operation and off-site evacuation in case of an emergency. Interested parties, called intervenors, have the right to raise issues and interrogate 'SCNH regarding safety issues. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission has been designed as an agency to safeguard and protect the public by insuring that each nuclear power plant has complied with all regulations prior to issuing a license to operate.

To mediate all of these concerns, a three member board is created each time a power company applies for an application to operate a nuclear power plant. The three member board responsible for nearing the case involving Seabrook Station is made up of a lawyer, Helen Hoyt, an environmentalist, Jerry Harbour, and a nuclear ohysicist, Emmett Luebke.

The first in a series of two scheduled hearings was held last August in Dover, New Hampshire. At that time, essentially, three issues were the focus of concern: (1) environmental qualifications of equipment, (2) clarification of emergency action levels, and (3) time estimates to evacuate Seabrook and the ten mile area surrounding us. Studies at that time indicated that it could take us from six to fifteen hours to evacuate the area, according to the weather conditions and beach population at the time of the emergency. Decisions about each of these three issues have not been ruled on as yet by the three member NRC Board.

The second set of hearings will be held in 1984. The sole purpose of these hearings will be to determine the adequacy of the evacuation plans for Seabrook and all the other communities within a ten mile radius. At this point in the timetable, the Town of Seabrook has identified several areas of disagreement with the evacuation plan prepared for us by the State of New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency. These concerns have been filed with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission in the form of contentions. These contentions express the town's concern that we cannot evacuate all of the townspeople as the plan is now designed.

We don't have enough full time staff to carry out some of the emergency procedures, nor do we have the resources necessary to act in an emergency that will ensure the safety of our people. Our roads are not large enough to cover the amount of traffic that may be necessary if a summer evacuation were to occur. Evacuation of our children during school time is a prime concern. Not only will students from Seabrook Elementary and Winnacunnet High School be bused to different places, but at present, there is no feasible way that Berry Bus Transportation can evacuate all of the students in School Administrative Unit #21 at the same time. There simply are not enough buses to successfully complete this task. There are many of these major concerns that need to be resolved in this last set of hearings.

We have requested that these final hearings be held at the Seabrook Community Center in order to assure that townspeople may have access to and be involved to the maximum extent possible. We need your input and participation.

There is much paper work to sort through to keep up with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's point of view as well as Public Service Company of New Hampshire.

Other active intervenors at this time are the New England Coalition on Nuclear Pollution, New Hampshire Attorney General's Office, Massachusetts Attorney General, Seacoast Anti-Pollution League, as well as the interested towns within the ten-mile radius. Information and positions from all of these parties are available at the Seabrook Town Office Building. I also am eager to hear your concerns in order to represent the town to the maximum extent possible.

Please plan on attending the upcoming hearings and participating to whatever degree each of you is able. I would also like to discuss our mutual concerns with you at any time.

SEABROOK DAY CARE CENTER

Seabrook Day Care Center (SDCC) is operated by the Child Development Council, Inc., a non-profit, tax-exempt agency located in Kingston, N.H. SDCC has been in operation in Seabrook since October, 1978, providing child care for working people in the area. SDCC has been licensed by the State of New Hampshire to care for up to 32 children, ages 3-12 years.

Besides daily child care, SDCC provides a nursery/preschool program (3-5 years) and before and after school care (5-12 years). SDCC strives to provide a safe and healthy place where each child can discover about the world; to be creative, cooperative and independent. The program at SDCC is supervised by five qualified staff people. Two snacks, breakfast and lunch are served daily. Special attention is given to provide healthy, nutritious foods. Tuition fees are on a sliding scale, based upon family size and income. Federal money is available (Title XX & USDA) for families within those guidelines. Other funds are used to offset costs for families ineligible for federal assistance. Town of Seabrook funding is used for residents of Seabrook, ineligible for Title XX and USDA funds.

SDCC participates in local hearing, vision, dental and developmental screenings throughout the year. Referrals to vaious social service agencies and Seabrook Elementary School are made for families with special needs.

In 1983, SDCC served 53 families (62 children). Eight out of ten families lived in Seabrook and nearly 7 out of 10 worked in Seabrook. Six out of ten families received some form of assistance for child care costs. The average fee for 1983 was \$4.75/day (SDCC full rate was \$9.60/day). Six out of ten families were single-parent.

1983 was a year of change and turmoil for SDCC. After two meetings of the members of the Rand Church, a decision was made not to renew the day care contract as of December, 1983. A search was begun for alternative housing, when a fire destroyed part of the church, forcing SDCC to immediate emergency housing at the Church of Christ. After the 30-day limit set by State law, unable to return to the Rand Church or find adequate space, SDCC closed temporarily. SDCC is currently working with the Seabrook American Legion to relocate a much needed service for the community.

Regulation and Licensing of Amusement Devices

At a regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Seabrook. New Hampshire, held on June 16, 1983. the following amendment to the ordinance for the Regulation and Licensing of Amusement Devices of March 11, 1983, was enacted. Said amendment is hereby adopted pursuant to the power granted in said Town's corporate Charter and the Revised Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, as amended.

1. Amend Section 2., D. of said ordinance by deleting all provisions of said paragraph and replacing said provisions with the following:

D. Licenses shall be effective from the date granted until December 31 of the year granted. Each license will be reviewed annually by the Board of Selectmen, and renewed upon payment of fees, but only if the person, firm, corporation or association applying for a renewal has been found to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, and the location and operation of the amusement device will not be detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the public.

2. This amendment to Section 2., parpgraph D, of said ordinance will become effective at 12 noon, June 16, 1983.

REGULATION FOR THE USE OF

THE SEABROOK CEMETERIES

- 1. Board of The maintenance of the cemeteries, public and private in Seabrook, New Hampshire, has been delegated to the Seabrook Board of Selectmen.
- Superintendent The Superintendent of Cemeteries shall have complete oversight of cemeteries and no work shall be performed in said cemeteries without his approval.
- 3. Purchase of grave sites Persons desirous of purchasing a burial site should apply to the Superintendent of Cemeteries, who will give all needed information as to size, location, price, etc. Reservation of a grave site will be made only on a deposit satisfactory to the superintendent.
 - Purchase by Any resident of Seabrook, New Hampshire, may purchase resident up to four grave sites at any time. The purchase of additional grave sites must be approved by the Board of Selectmen.
 - Purchase by non-resident Any former resident, or person who has relatives buried in Seabrook, may purchase up to two grave sites at any time subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen.
 - Resale of The purchaser of grave sites may not resell the sites, grave sites except to the Town of Seabrook

- 4. Payments for Payments may be made as follows: one quarter $(\frac{1}{4})$ lots of purchase price at the time of purchase, and the balance in three months, but no deed shall be given until the final payment.
- 5. One burial Only one body may be buried in a lot until the deed in lot is taken.
- 6. Lot owners The owner of any lot shall have the right to use the same for the burial of the dead and for placing of suitable memorials, subject to cemetery regulations.
- 7. Interments No grave shall be opened for interment or for removal except by permission of the superintendent, and the cost of such opening shall be paid for in advance.
- Monuments, stones and grave markers
 Monuments and markers are not allowed until the lot is paid for in full.
 Only one monument or upright stone shall be erected
 - on a four grave lot. On lots of less than four graves, only flat grave markers will be allowed.
- 9. Foundations No monument or headstone will be allowed to be erected unless it rests on a foundation built of solid masonry, with good cement, and from two to six feet deep, as the superintendent shall direct.
- 10. Grade of lots No proprietor or other person shall be allowed to maintain a lot at any other grade, or cause the same to be graded in any other manner, than that established by the superintendent. Grave markers and corner posts shall not extend
 - Grave markers and corner posts shall not extend above the grade level of the lot.
- 11. Hedges, curbings,etc. No hedges or curbings are permitted on any lot; no tablets, or other devices, of wood are permitted on any lot. Trees and shrubs must not be planted without the approval of the superintendent.
 - No fence, railing or inclosure of any kind may be placed upon the boundaries of any lot.
- 12. Protecting In order to protect lots and paths over which heavy lots and paths material is to be moved, masons, stone cutters and grave diggers are required to lay planks.
 - Moving stones across neighboring lots, and attaching guy ropes is forbidden, except at such places as the superintendent may direct. In such work employers must be careful not to injure adjoining lots.
 - All refuse material must be removed, and the grounds must be left in good order.
- 13. Removal of memorials
 Flowers, wreaths, etc., left on the graves or lots will be removed by the employees of the cemetery as soon as possible after they fade, unless otherwise requested. The superintendent is not responsible for anything left on lots.

TOWN DUNES ORDINANCE

At a regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire, held on July 28, 1983, a majority of the Board being present, the following ordinance was adopted pursuant to the powers granted in said Town's Corporate Charter and the Revised Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, as amended:

The restrictions and limitations of this ordinance pertain to a certain parcel of land purchased by the Town of Seabrook from the Oceanside Community Association on March 4, 1982, described as follows: All of the land lying Easterly of and between all water front lots and the Atlantic Ocean, and all the land lying Northerly of and between all water front lots and the Hampton-Seabrook town line, and all the parcels beginning at the termination of certain public streets as follows: State Line Street, New Hampshire Street, Amesbury Street, Newbury Street, Groveland Street, Merrimack Street, Haverhill Street, Lawrence Street, Methuen Street, Andover Street, Dracut Street, Lowell Street, Chelmsford Street, Tyngsboro Street, Nashua Street,Hudson Street, Hooksett Street, Ashland Street and Tilton Street,

1. There shall be no structures, including but not limited to buildings, fences, tents, swimming pools, septic systems, leach fields, boardwalks, flagpoles, picnic tables or permanent or portable toilet facilities located thereon. There shall be no paving or filling on said land nor shall the natural vegetation be removed from the dunes area.

2. The property is to remain forever open and undeveloped. In order to preserve the said dunes from erosion and destruction, that portion of the property identified as the "dunes area" shall not be used for picnicking, sunbathing or other customary beach activities. The "dunes area" shall be that portion of the property beginning with the eastern boundary of the water front lots and extending easterly to the highest point of sand on the dunes. Said dunes usually and customarily support the growth of bunch grass.

The property shall not be used for commercial purposes whether or not such commercial use involves construction of building or other structures.

4. No motor vehicles shall be parked or operated on the property. "Motor vehicles" shall be inclusive and shall include automobiles, trucks, motorcycles, trail bikes and other off-the-road vehicles, except municipal and emergency vehicles in the performance of municipal and emergency duties. In addition, the extensions of Hooksett street, Haverhill Street and State Line Street may be used by commercial fishermen and lciensed lobstermen as access to the beach front by motor vehicles for the sole purposes of retrieving their equipment.

5. No trailers, mobile homes, camping trailers, motor homes, tents or boats shall be operated, parked or occupied on the property. No animals shall be kept on the property.

6. There will be a \$100.00 penalty for any violation of the provisions of this ordinance. 7. This ordinance is intended to supplement, not to replace any other law, statues, or other rules governing the subject to which it is addressed.

8. If any provision of this ordinance or any portion of such provision or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the remainer of such provision and the application thereof to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

9. This ordinance is to take effect on July 28, 1983, 1:00 a.m., and to remain in effect indefinitely.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

TOWN PARKS AND RECREATION AREAS ORDINANCE

At a regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire, held on November 3, 1983, the following ordinance was adopted relevant to parking vehicles and loitering at town parks and recreation areas in the Town of Seabrook. Said ordinance is hereby adopted pursuant to the power granted in said town's Corporate Charter and the Revised Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, as amended, RSA 31:39:

1. The parking of automobiles and other vehicles in designated parking areas adjacent to or on the property of any town park or recreation area is prohibited between the hours of 9:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m. These parking areas shall remain open after 9:30 p.m. during any town approved activity, but will close immediately thereafter.

2. The use of or presence in any town park, recreation area or adjacent park facilities is not permitted except in accordance with the same time limits as specified in paragraph one of this ordinance.

3. Any person violating the above provisions of this ordinance will be subject to a penalty not to exceed one thousand (\$1,000)dollars.

 This ordinance will become effective at 1:00 a.m., November 9, 1983.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

PARKING BAN ORDINANCE

At a regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire, held on February 9, 1984, a majority of the board being present, the following ordinance was adopted pursuant to the powers granted in the Seabrook Home Rule Charter 1983 and the Revised Statues of the State of New Hampshire, as amended:

1. TOWN PIER

No person shall park any vehicle on the town pier parking lot at River Street at any time without a town parking permit. Said permit must be located in a conspicuous place on a window in the vehicle.

2, SEABROOK BEACH

A. No person shall park any vehicle as hereafter defined, from 1:00 a.m. on the Friday of Memorial Day weekend until midnight, September 15 of each year, in the following places at Seabrook Beach:

Ocean Drive	No on street parking at any time.
River Street New Hampshire Street	n n u
State Line Street	No on-street parking at any time on the north side of the street.
Eisenhower Street	No on-street parking at any time on the east side of the street.
Portsmouth Ave.	No on-street parking at any time on the west side of the street.
Woodstock Street	No on-street parking at any time on the north side of the street.
Manchester Street	No on-street parking at any time from Atlantic Avenue to Hooksett Street.
Hooksett Street	No on-street parking on the north side from Suncook Street to Ocean Drive.
Haverhill Street	No on-street parking at any time on the north side of the street.

B. No on-street parking at any time on the south side of any street, except Woodstock Street and Haverhill Street,

C. No on-street parking at any time in the rights-of-way to the beach,

D. On-street parking east of Route 1A on Amesbury Street and Newbury Street, and between Haverhill Street and Hooksett Street, is designated for property owners at Seabrook Beach, with the following exceptions:

On-street parking is allowed for uptown Seabrook residents only on the following streets:

- (1) South side of Haverhill Street,
- (2) East side of Atlantic Avenue from Haverhill Street To Hooksett Street. The Traffic flow on this road will be one way north.
- (3) South side of Hooksett Street extension between Manchester Street and Ocean Drive.

E. Uptown Seabrook residents are defined as any resident of the Town of Seabrook having his/her primary residence west of the Black-water River.

F. All on-street parking will be by special permit only. Permit cards for property owners at Seabrook Beach may be obtained at the Police Station. Permit stickers for uptown Seabrook residents may be obtained at the Town Hall.

3. SEABROOK PROPER

Stard Road New Zealand Road	No on-street parking at any time. No on-street parking at any time from interstate 95 to Lafayette Road.
Rocks Road	No on-street parking at any time from Route 1 to the road leading to the town Transfer Station.

4. PARKING DURING SNOW STORMS:

No person having the custody or control of any vehicle shall stop or cause to be stopped, or park on any public street or highway in the Town of Seabrook, so as to impede or interfere with the proper snow clearing operations of the town.

5. GENERAL RESTRICTIONS:

A. No parking at any time within fifteen (15) feet of a fire hydrant.

B. No parking at any time within twenty (20) feet of an intersection.

C. No parking at any time within fifty (50) feet of an termination of a dead end road,

D. No person shall park any vehicle on any real estate owned by the Town of Seabrook where, at the direction of the selectmen, a sign clearly indicating that parking is not permitted on said premises has been erected.

E. No person shall park any vehicle on any street or road within the Town of Seabrook on which parking is subject to regulation by the selectmen of the town where, at the direction of the selectmen, a sign has been erected.

F. The word "vehicle" as used in this ordinance shall include any bus, highway equipment, motorcycle, motor truck, motor vehicle, semi-trailer, side car, tractor, trailer or other vehicle defined by RSA 259.1 as amended, and shall also include any camper trailer or mobile home whether or not occupied.

G. The selectmen shall issue the permit described in Section 2 hereof to any person who, upon application for such permit, demonstrates that he/she is a resident of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire.

6. PENALTIES:

The following penalities are hereby imposed for violations of this ordinance:

A. \$10.00 for the first violation and \$15.00 for each subsequent violation of Section 1 - 5 of this ordinance.

B. Vehicles illegally parked according to all sections of this ordinance will be subject to towing on the first offense at the owner's expense.

INTENT OF ORDINANCE:

The intent of this ordinance is to supplement, not to replace any other laws, statutes, or other rules governing the subject which is addressed and to consolidate all prior parking ordinances and amendments that were executed on the following dates:

May 19, 1983	January 26, 1984

8. If any provision of this ordinance or any portion of such provision or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the remainder of such provision and the application thereof to other persons and circumstances shall not be effected thereby.

9. This ordinance is to take effect immediately, with the exception of Section 2, which will be in effect from 1:00a.m. on the Friday of Memorial Day weekend of each year until midnight on the 15th. of September of each year.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

PERSONNEL POLICY

TOWN OF SEABROOK

Revised and adopted $\frac{4/8}{82}$.

The following Personnel Policy has been adopted and approved by the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Seabrook to guide the administration of personnel activities. Guidelines set forth in this policy statement shall apply to all personnel working for the Town of Seabrook. Presentation of this information to all employees will serve to instruct them in their rights as well as their responsibilities while in the employment of the Town.

Every person employed by the Town of Seabrook shall receive a copy of this Personnel Policy and shall acknowledge receipt of same in writing.

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A permanent employee shall be defined as a person who has been granted permanent standing and its accompanying benefits by action of the Board of Selectmen or the Town Meeting.

Permanent appointments shall be made in consideration of the recommendations of the Department Head involved and such applications and tests as may be required for the position.

A. Permanent Employment

The Town shall employ, without discrimination as to age, race, color, sex, creed, national origin, marital status, physical or mental handicap, the best qualified persons who are available at the salary level established for town employment. Within the limits of time during which a position must be filled, there shall be as wide a search for qualified candidates as is practicable.

B. Recruitment Policy

Selection and appointment to all job openings will be based solely upon job-related requirements and the applicant's demonstration that he/she possesses the skills, knowledge, ability and other characteristics necessary for successful job performance and career development.

C. Job Description

When a job opening occurs, the Department Head and Administrative Assistant shall review the functions, duties and responsibilities of the position to ascertain whether the job description is still accurate. Any proposed changes in the job description shall be reviewed and approved by the Board of Selectmen prior to advertising the job opening.

D. Job Qualifications

After defining the job, the Department Head and Administrative Assistant shall determine the minimum qualification requirements necessary for successful performance of the job. These qualification requirements will be based on the elements of the job description for the job opening being filled, as well as any other special requirements which may be deemed necessary for the specific job opening.

The requirements will be reviewed and approved by the Board of Selectmen prior to recruitment for the position.

E. Promotion

The Town encourages employees to develop new skills, expand knowledge of their work, assume greater responsibilities and make known their qualifications for promotion to more difficult and responsible positions. Any job opening for a position as department head, Administrative Assistant, or Recreation Director shall be filled in accordance with the provisions of Section I. F. of this Personnel Policy. Any other job opening which may provide promotional opportunity to a permanent Town employee shall be posted in each Department for a minimum of five (5) working days. During that time, any permanent employee of the Town may make application for the job opening in accordance with the provisions of Section I. G. of this Personnel Policy.

If no applications are received from permanent employees within the five (5) day period, recruitment shall proceed according to the provisions of Section I. F. of this Personnel Policy. If applications are received and accepted from permanent employees, recruitment shall proceed according to the provisions of Section I. H. of this Personnel Policy. If no permanent employees qualify for final selection, recruitment shall proceed according to the provisions of Section I. F. of this Personnel Policy.

When two permanent employees appear to be equally well qualified for promotion to any position, preference shall be given to the employee with the greater seniority.

F. Hiring Announcement

Information concerning job openings shall be posted in at least two public places and advertised in the two local newspapers of greatest circulation in a manner designed to give all eligible persons adequate opportunity to make applications and demonstrate their fitness for the particular vacancy involved. The announcement will be made at least ten (10) working days before the last date for filing applications, and will set forth essential facts with reference to the duties and responsibilities, required minimum qualifications, prescribed salary range and hours of work. Should there be any limitations of eligibility to either age or physical characteristics, each hiring announcement shall so state.

G. Applications

An application form, which may be obtained from the Selectmen's Office, will be filled out by all applicants. Applications will be accepted no later than 4:00 P.M. on the last date designated for filing applications. All of the persons whose applications have been rejected will be notified in writing and all other applicants will be notified of times and dates of testing or interviews.

The Selectmen may reject applications for any of the following reasons:

- 1. The applicant is found to lack any of the established qualification requirements for the position.
- The applicant is physically unfit to perform the duties of the position to which he/she has applied, as determined under the provisions of Section I. D. of this Personnel Policy.
- The applicant is addicted to the habitual or excessive use of drugs or intoxicating beverages.
- The applicant has been convicted of a felony or misdemeanor involving moral turpitude or misconduct.
- The applicant has been dismissed from employment for delinquency, insubordination, or misconduct, as substantiated by the previous employer.
- The applicant has resigned under charges of delinquency or misconduct, as substantiated by the previous employer.
- The applicant has intentionally made a false statement in his/her application with regard to any material facts.
- The applicant has practiced or attempted to practice any deception or fraud in his/her application, testing, or in securing eligibility for appointment.
- The applicant does not meet any limitations of eligibility with regards to age or physical characteristics.

H. Testing

In filling a vacant position, the Selectmen shall determine the level and extent of testing to be given for the particular class of position. Where appropriate, competitive examinations will be administered in a manner that will fairly test the fitness of all applicants. In order to avoid the possibility of discrimination, the identity of applicants will be concealed in all examinations. Applicants may be required to submit proof of their age, citizenship, driving records, and military records, and a permanent record of this data will be kept.

I. Ranking

In any examination the minimum score through which eligibility may be earned shall be determined by the Selectmen prior to the administration of the test. All applicants for any position will be notified of their standing, but actual test scores shall not be open to public inspection. Candidates with scores equal to or better than the minimum score shall be interviewed by the Selectmen or an agent designated by them for this purpose. The Board of Selectmen shall make the final selection from the top three ranking candidates for that position, in consideration of the recommendations of the Department Head involved. Applications and test scores will be kept on file for one year, and may be used in any subsequent hiring procedures during that year. Hiring shall be subject to passing a complete physical exam given by a physician designated by the Selectmen. The Town shall bear the expense of said examination.

J. Probation

The purpose of the probationary period is to provide both the employee and employer with an opportunity to determine whether the employee is able to carry out the duties and responsibilities of his/her position. Any employee hired to a permanent position shall be required to successfully complete a six (6) month probationary period.

The Department Head will meet formally with the employee at the conclusion of the third and fifth month of the probationary period to review the employee's performance. The Department Head will offer suggestions if improvement is needed and a summary of his/her comments will be placed in the employee's personnel file. Upon the Department Head's recommendation, the Board of Selectmen may extend the probationary period an additional six (6) months in order to provide the employee with an opportunity to improve his/her performance. Such recommendation shall be in writing and shall state the deficient areas and suggest remedial action. Copies of the recommendation will be forwarded to the employee and entered in the employee's personnel file.

An employee may be terminated for cause at any time during the probationary period. Except in cases of alleged discrimination, a probationary employee shall not be able to appeal such action.

K. Provisional Appointment

When a position becomes vacant and the Department Head or Selectmen believe that said position should be filled without delay, a provisional appointment may be made. After reviewing the applications for the position on file, a person may be selected who meets the minimum entrance requirements and is qualified to perform the duties of such position. Such appointments shall be made a consideration of the recommendations of the Department Head involved. A provisional appointment may not exceed sixty (60) days. No employee benefits shall accrue to employees with provisional appointments. A person receiving a provisional appointment may be considered for permanent employment provided he/she meets the same qualifying requirements as other applicants for the position.

L. Training

Both the Town and its employees benefit from the provisions of educational training opportunities at reasonable expense to the Town. Department Heads shall be responsible for organizing and carrying out training programs designed to improve the quality of performance and to bring about more efficient and economical operations.

SECTION II. ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE REGULATIONS

<u>A. General</u> Standard rules governing attendance and leaves of absence for all permanent employees will be observed as follows:

- Individual hourly attendance and leave records will be maintained by the Department Head and will be forwarded to the Selectmen's Clerk on or before Friday morning. All requests for annual leave shall be made at least one week prior to the taking of any such leave.
- 2. Requests for annual or sick leave shall be filled out, approved by the Department Head, and forwarded to the Selectmen's Clerk with the payroll. Department Heads shall have requests for leave approved by the Board of Selectmen. No payment for leave shall be made until the Selectmen's Clerk has determined said leave is due the employee. In no case shall an employee be paid for leave above and beyond that which he/she is entitled to at the time of the request.
- 3. Vacation schedules for employees in all departments shall be developed by the Department Head. It shall be the policy of each Department Head to schedule vacations over as wide a period as possible in order to provide an adequate number of personnel on-hand at all times. When requests for leave conflict and may hinder the operations of the Department, preference shall be given to the employees with the greater seniority.

B. Annual Leave Each employee of permanent standing shall be allotted annual vacation time with pay in accordance with his/her current term of continuous employment, and in accordance with the following guidelines:

> All permanent employees shall earn annual leave on an accrual basis based on length of service. Accrual shall be based on completed calendar months of service from the date of probationary appointment. However,

no accrual shall be granted for a completed month of service for those employees hired after the 20th of the month. Employees shall be eligible to use accrued leave upon completion of their probation period. Employees shall not accumulate more than one and one half times their annual rate of accrual. Rates of accrual shall be as follows:

Years of Service Monthly Accrual Yearly Accrual 0 - 5 l day 12 days 5 l 1/3 day 16 days For the purposes of this section, one (1) day shall equal eight (8) hours.

- Vacations will be extended to compensate for holidays falling within the vacation period unless other specific arrangements are authorized by the Selectmen.
- Any absence from duty for which leave time is paid, or for official leaves with pay, shall not constitute a break in the service record.
- No employee shall be entitled to work his/her vacation with pay unless special authorization is granted by the Board of Selectmen.
- 5. Time lost by reason of leave of absence without pay, or time otherwise not worked or paid for shall not be considered in computing earned allowances of leave.
- Annual leave for periods less than eight (8) hours shall be granted at the sole discretion of the Department Head.
- Employees will not be allowed to utilize annual leave until they have successfully completed their probationary period.

Upon retirement or resignation, an employee shall receive payment for the number of days of annual leave to his/her credit. Employees removed for cause or submitting resignations without two weeks notice will lose any vacation benefits previously earned.

C. Holidays

Employees of permanent standing shall be entitled to the following paid holidays:

New Years f Washington's Birthday l Veteran's Day Memorial Day (

Fourth of July Labor Day Thanksgiving Christmas Fast Day Columbus Day

Employees of permanent standing who must work on a holiday will receive their regular pay plus payment for the holiday. Employees who are absent for unauthorized reasons on the work day directly preceding or directly following the holiday shall forfeit pay for the holiday.

D. Sick Leave

Sick leave is considered to be an emergency fringe benefit used only as needed. All permanent employees shall accrue sick leave at the rate of one (1) day for each completed month of service from the date of probationary appointment. For the purposes of this section, one (1) day shall equal eight (8) hours. Employees hired after the 20th of the month will not accrue sick leave for that month. Sick leave may accrue to a maximum of 90 days. Employees shall be entitled to sick leave from the date of probationary appointment. Time lost by reason of leave of absence without pay, or time otherwise not worked or paid for shall not be considered in computing earned allowances of leave.

In order to be paid for sick leave an employee must nofity his/her immediate supervisor or Department Head of his/her absence at least one (1) hour before the start of the regular work day, unless physically unable. Failure to do so will result in the forfeiture of pay. The Town reserves the right to request a doctor's statement for any time missed due to illness. Illness for which sick leave may be granted is defined as actual personal illness or bodily injury.

Sick leave will be paid at the employee's base rate of pay. Sick leave will be reduced by $\frac{1}{2}$ day for any use of leave from 1 to 4 hours in length. Leave which exceeds 4 hours in length shall result in sick leave being reduced by one (1) day. An employee returning from a sick leave which exceeds three (3) consecutive work days may be required to supply a doctor's statement certifying that the employee's health is good enough to return to his/her normal duties. Accrued sick leave shall be cancelled at the termination of employment with the Town.

E. Bereavement Leave

Bereavement leave with pay shall be granted when a death occurs in a permanent employee's immediate family (spouse, parent, child, brother, sister, mother-in-law, father-in-law, grandparent, grandchild, step-parent, or a blood relative or ward residing in the same house.) Such leave will be granted up to a period of three (3) consecutive work days. Special leave of one (1) working day with pay shall be granted an employee for the purpose of attending the funeral in the event of the death of his/her sister-in-law, brother-in-law, aunt, or uncle.

F. Leave of Absence

An employee of permanent standing may be granted a leave of absence without pay by the Selectmen upon recommendation of the Department Head concerned. No leave of absence shall be granted until all of the employee's accumulated annual leave has been exhausted. An employee taking a leave of absence shall lose any accumulated sick leave. Such leave of absence without pay shall not exceed one year in length and shall only be granted when it appears, because of the past records of the employee, or because of the purpose for which the leave is requested, that it is in the best interest of the Town to grant the leave. An employee appearing for work on the designated date of return shall be restored to the pay status and benefit levels he/she was at prior to the leave of absence. If an employee does not return to work on the designated date or receive an extension of leave, he/she will be considered to have voluntarily left employment with the Town.

G. Military Leave

Any employee who is a member of the military or naval forces of the State or Nation in an active or reserve status, shall be entitled to all the benefits and privileges granted by existing and future laws. No annual leave or sick leave which the employee may have accumulated shall be lost because of military leave provided, however, that upon entrance or extended active duty an employee shall be paid for all

days of accumulated annual leave remaining to his/her credit. Should the employee not return to the Town's service, all accumulated sick leave shall lapse.

H. Civil Leave

Permanent employees who are called for jury duty shall receive the difference between their normal daily earnings, exclusive of premium considerations, and court reimbursement. In order to be paid, employees must be able to document the length of their duty. Employees who are subpoenaed to testify in court or before boards/commissions shall be paid for time spent testifying based on the employees regular rate of pay. Employees must be able to document date of testimony in order to be paid.

I. Absence Without Leave

Any absence of an employee from duty, including any absence for a single day or part of a day, that is not authorized by a specific grant of leave under the provisions of these regulations, will be deemed to be an absence without leave. Any such absence shall be without pay and may be subject to disciplinary action.

In the absence of such disciplinary action, any employee who is absent for three consecutive days without leave shall be deemed to have resigned. Such action may be reconciled by a subsequent grant of leave if the conditions warrant.

J. Worker's Compensation

The Town of Seabrook provides Worker's Compensation Insurance to cover all employees. Any employee who sustains a personal injury or compensable illness arising out of and in the course of employment shall be paid allowable Worker's Comp for each week of total incapacity to work resulting from the injury or illness. No payments shall be made in any instance when, in the opinion of the Department Head and the Selectmen, the accident occurred as a result of intoxication, willful intent, or violation of rules and regulations. A doctor's statement may be required for any injury/illness incurred on the job which results in lost work time. Employee and Department Head shall report jointly to the Selectmen's Clerk no more than 48 hours after any injury. In case the employee is unable to report, it shall be the responsibility of the Department Head to report to the Selectmen's Clerk. Report form 8a WCA shall be filled out by the employee and signed by the employee and the Department Head. The employee shall retain his/her copy of form 8a WCA. The employee and/or Department Head shall remain while form 8-WC is completed, and shall help the Selectmen's Clerk with any information needed on this form. This form shall be signed by the Selectmen's Clerk and mailed immediately.

K. Hours of Work

With the exception of fire personnel and part-time employees, the normal work week for Town employees shall be five days, with the hours of work to be scheduled by the Department Head. The normal work week for Department employees shall be as follows:

Fire Department employees Forty-two hours Other department employees Forty hours This policy does not guarantee employees a full work-week.

L. Overtime

Personnel shortages, peak workloads and other emergency situations may make it necessary for a permanent employee to work beyond his/her regularly scheduled work week. Hours of work beyond the employee's normal work week for Fire Department personnel or over forty hours in a work week for all other employees shall be considered as overtime. Overtime shall be based on the number of hours worked, provided that holidays and sick leave shall not be considered as hours worked for purposes of overtime calculations.

Overtime shall be paid at one and one half times the employee's current rate of pay. Except in emergency situations, such as snow storms, fires, major accidents or crimes, water main breaks, or the like, Department Heads shall make written requests for approval of overtime to the Board of Selectmen at least twenty-four hours in advance of the time overtime work is scheduled to begin. In emergency situations, overtime may be authorized by the Department Head.

M. Call Back Pay

Permanent employees who are called back to work after the conclusion of their regular work day shall be reimbursed for a minimum of three hours of service at the rate of one and one half times the employee's current rate of pay. If the need for services is less than three hours, the employee will be guaranteed three hours pay at time and one half. If the employee is required to be called back more than once during a single three hour period, the employee shall only be paid for one call back period.

This section does not apply to scheduled overtime, call back times annexed to the beginning of the work shift, or to hold-over time annexed to the end of the work shift.

N. Anniversary Dates

The date of employment shall be considered the employee's anniversary date. That date shall be used to calculate length of service. In cases of probation or longevity wage increases, the first day of the pay period following the anniversary date shall be the effective date of the increase.

SECTION III. DISCIPLINARY AND GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES

- A. <u>DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES</u>: Disciplinary action may be initiated for reasons which include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a. Absenteeism
 - b. Tardiness
 - c. Insubordination
 - d. Unacceptable performance
 - e. Use of alcohol or drugs which impair performance
 - Falsification of documents concerning payroll or other departmental operations
 - g. Willful destruction of public and/or private property
 - h. Obscene language directed at other employees or the public
 - i. Theft of public and/or private property
 - j. Failure to comply with safety requirements

k. Violation of Town or department policies and regulations The disciplinary process will include four steps which shall be as follows:

Step I. VERBAL WARNING

Any supervisor may issue a verbal warning when he/she determines that this would be an appropriate disciplinary measure. The warning should state the reasons for the action and suggest remedial action. At the Department Head's discretion, a record of the warning may be entered in the individual's personnel file. Action will be taken within three (3) working days of the offense. Verbal warning should not be issued to employees in the presence of other employees or the public. Step 2. WRITTEN WARNING

The regular or acting Department Head may issue a written warning when it is determined that this would be an appropriate disciplinary measure. The warning should state the reasons for the action and suggest remedial action.

A copy of the warning shall be entered in the individual's personnel file. Action will be taken withing five (5) working days of the offense. Written warnings shall be purged from an employee's files after one (1) year, provided no further disciplinary actions have been taken.

Step 3. SUSPENSION

1. With Pay: The regular or acting Department Head may suspend an employee with pay for the remainder of a shift if he/she determines such action to be in the best interests of the Department. Upon determination of the Department Head, an employee may be suspended with pay pending investigation of actions which may warrant disciplinary procedures. The employee will receive a written notice from the Department Head stating the reason for the suspension, the length of the suspension, and the effective date.

2. <u>Without Pay</u>: Suspension without pay may result from a single serious action of an employee or from accumulated verbal and/or written warnings. The decision shall be made by the Department Head within ten (10) working days of the most recent offense. The employee will receive a written notice from the Department Head stating the reason for the suspension, the length of the suspension, the effective date, and suggested remedial action. Suspension without pay shall not exceed thirty (30) working days pending investigation or trial of charges against the suspended employee. The Board of Selectmen shall be authorized to approve extensions of suspension periods.

<u>Step 4. DISMISSAL</u>: An employee may be dismissed or demoted for just cause. Such action shall be taken by the Board of Selectmen upon consideration of the facts of the case and recommendation of the Department Head and Administrative Assistant. The Board of Selectmen shall file with the employee, not later than the effective date of the action, a written statement containing the substantial reasons for the action. The Board of Selectmen may initiate disciplinary procedure against
 Department Head or Administrative Assistant, subject to the provisions contained herein.

B. <u>GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE</u> Employees of permanent standing who feel they have received inequitable, arbitrary or capricious treatment because of some condition of employment or the application of these personnel policies or department regulations may appeal for relief from that condition without fear of reprisal.

The grievance process will include three steps which shall be as follows:

<u>Step 1.</u> Any employee(s) may prepare a written statement of a grievance and present it to the Department Head. The employee(s) must initiate such effort within ten (10) working days of the occurrence which is the subject of the grievance. The Department Head shall meet with the grievant(s) within five (5) days of receipt of the grievance and shall note his/her investigations and findings. The Department Head shall provide the employee(s) with a written decision on the matter within five (5) days of the grievance hearing.

Step 2. Any employee(s) dissatisfied with the decision of the Department Head may present his/her grievance in writing to the Administrative Assistant within five (5) working days of the conclusion of Step 1. The Administrative Assistant shall meet with the grievant(s) and the Department Head within five (5) days of receipt of the grievance and shall note his/her investigations and findings. The Administrative Assistant shall complete an investigation of the grievance and inform the employee(s) and Department Head of the results before the end of the fifth work day following the grievance hearing. Step 3. If the grieving employee(s) or Department Head is dissatisfied with the actions of the Administrative Assistant, either may appeal to the Board of Selectmen for a final decision. The appeal shall be in writing and shall state whether a hearing or a review of the facts of the case is requested. Employees appealing a dismissal action may further request a public hearing. If the employee requests a hearing, the Board of Selectmen will arrange to hold such a hearing within ten (10) working days of receipt of the appeal notice. The Administrative Assistant shall notify the aggrieved individual and his/her representative, the Department Head or other individuals against whom the grievance is directed and any other persons the Administrative Assistant deems appropriate, of the date, time, and place of

the hearing. After reviewing all the evidence, the Board of Selectmen shall submit a written decision to all parties concerned within ten (10) working days after completion of the hearing. The decision of the Board of Selectmen shall be final.

No employee shall make an appeal until all previous steps of the grievance procedure have been completed. Failing to appeal an action within ten (10) days of its effective date, the employee shall lose said right to appeal.

SECTION IV.

INTERACTION

<u>A. Departmental Communication</u> Normal operation of any department shall be left to the discretion of the Department Head. Department policy shall be set by the Selectmen. Any Department Head may request a meeting to discuss the policies and proper operation of a department at any time. No work policies, priorities, or requirements shall be discussed, established, or changed without first having a meeting of the Selectmen and the Department Head. As a result of such meeting, the Selectmen shall determine the need for any policy or work priority changes, and shall issue the proper instructions and directives.

<u>B. Severability</u> If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance shall be held to be inoperative, void, or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby. <u>C. Adoption</u> The adoption of this personnel policy will supercede any similar agreements and policies previously made between the Town of Seabrook and its employees, except as otherwise provided.

Leverone and fifteen (15) other legal voters of the Town: To see if the Town of Seabrook shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representatives and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of hugh cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Seabrook, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire.

Article 53: On petition of Anne M. Watts and thirty three (33) other legal voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: Poles for affixing lines and wires for the above ground transmission of electricity, cable TV, and telephone shall be permitted to be installed on the public ways and streets of the Town, but lines and wires from the overhead lines and wires to the premises serviced shall be underground unless the Board of Selectmen shall permit an exception on finding that such permission would not be detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare.

Article 54: On petition of Patricia W. Martel and ten (10) other legal voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars to help defray the expenses of the Seacoast Big Brother/Big Sister organization in the Town of Seabrook.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee) 10A

Article 55: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Capital Improvement Program as prepared by the Seabrook Planning Board in 1983, and further to authorize the Planning Board to prepare and amend any future recommended program of municipal capital improvement projects in accordance with RSA 674:5.

Article 56: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000) Dollars to add to the Capital Reserve Fund, known as the "Motor Vehicle Fund."

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 57: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars for the purpose of adding said amount to the Capital Reserve Fund, known as the "Municipal Building Fund."

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 58: To see if the town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to be known as the "Sewer Fund" for the purpose of constructing a municipal sewer system or sewerage treatment works including the purchase of land therefore, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Million (\$5,000,000) Dollars to be deposited in said fund.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 59: To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the expense of the General Government for the protection of persons and property, for health and sanitation, for highways and bridges, for the support of the Town Poor and for all necessary expenditures for the ensuing year.

Article 60: To transact all other legal business that may come before this meeting.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1982, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In addition, the Town has not capitalized the cost of property and equipment purchased by the Proprietary Fund (Water Department). Likewise, no depreciation expense is recorded on this fund. Generally accepted accounting principles require that property and equipment of proprietary funds be capitalized and depreciated over the useful lives of the assets. The Town's records do not permit the application of adequate procedures to enable us to determine the cost value of capital assets or related depreciation expense on them.

Because of the material effect of the omission of fixed assets and related depreciation on the financial position, we do not express an opinion on the financial statement of this Proprietary Fund.

In our opinion, other then the financial statements of the Proprietary Fund mentioned above, and except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the second paragraph of this report, the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire at December 31, 1982, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined and combining fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT OF THE WATER DEPARTMENT

There were 427,756,920 gallons of water pumped during 1983. This is a 20,057,210 gallon increase over 1982. Industrial and commercial use increased from 86,698,360 to 129,537,950 in 1983. This 42,839,590 gallon increase is mainly contributed to Public Service Company who increased its use by 31,500,000 gallons. Bailey and K. J. Quinn Inc. had increases of 6,000,000 and 3,000,000 gallons respectively.

There were 61 residential services installed. The commercialindustrial services included: Best Western Motel, Papa Gino's, two clam shelling establishments and a two building complex on Route # 1, build by Raven Realty and Trust.

Your water department with only two permanent full time workers and help from part-time (summer hires) men, accomplished many special projects this year. This was done in conjunction with their normal or routine work. These special projects included: surveying almost the entire town, checking the location and conditions of lot line shut-offs, updating shut-off location cards with new owners and street numbers and picking up more revenue by rebilling property owners who have expanded their water use.

About eighty-five (85) water services were replaced on Suncook, Concord, and Tilton Streets in the spring of 1983. This was a continuation of a project started in late fall of 1982 under article # 25. This project was completed this past fall with the resurfacing of many driveways and the entire streets.

A 6" water main was extended about 500' on Pine street to the beginning of Whittier Drive. The installation of water mains, fire hydrants and water services on Whittier Drive was overseen and inspected by your water department as was the 6" connection across from Whittier Drive to Seabrook Mobile Village.

The Dixon Way water main and fire hydrant connections also were overseen and inspected by this department.

About 1000' of new 12" water main and two (2) fire hydrants were installed on the east side of Route # 1 from the north entrance of Ames Department Store to the entrance of the new Seabrook Hardware Complex. This was done to get an adequate supply of water to the Benoit project, while updating the water main on Route # 1.

Under article # 32 about 800' of 8" water main and fire hydrant were installed on Fowlers Court. After the replacing of the eleven (11) water services and the disconnecting of the old 2" water main, the entire street was built up, graded and resurfaced.

About 200 feet of 8 inch water main, a fire hydrant and a water main to be used for a sprinkler line were installed at the cummunity center complex. This was accomplished under article # 31.

The greatest project of 1983 was the installation of a new transmission main on Route 107. This two miles of 12" water main ran from Stard Road to the west end of Weare Road. This project is funded through article #28. This water main when put into use in the spring of 1984, will releive the head pressures at True Road and Route 107 pumping stations allowing them to pump more water more economically. The testing of this line and the final grading and seeding will be completed in the spring of 1984.

A project to increase the water main sizes to 12" on Pickens Avenue, a portion of Route 286 and a portion of South Main Street is being accomplished under 1982 article #25. Methuen Construction Company will be completing this project in the spring of 1984.

Nine hundred feet of chain link fence was erected by the department along the frontage of our True Road pumping stations.

At our well field on Route 107, interior painting, stone work around streams and drains, and site work to make a large lawn was accomplished this year. Also, your Water Department lent considerble amount of help in creating the BMX Bike Track at this well field.

Your Board of Selectmen, On April 21,1983, changed the water bills, due date, late fees, and shut-off date and included them in the Water Department Rules and Regulations and to post that water bills be sent on July 1, due in 30 days, that a late fee of \$5.00 be added after the 30 days, and that a five day shut-off notice be sent on December 10.

Many worthwhile projects to update your water system are planned for 1984. Some of these are: a 4th rock well, site for a 5th rock well, and updating water mains on Woodlawn Avenue, Boynton Lane, Blacksnake Road and Route #1.

We are pleased to report that during 1983 we had an ample amount of water to serve the needs of the town. It should be noted that in the summer months the daily water use rose an additional 1,000,000 gallons per day. Mainly this additional water was used outside. This outside use of water, especially the watering of lawns and gardens, could be curtailed considerably. Lawns and gardens, if watering is necessary to be more effective, should be watered in the evening hours only.

If anyone wishing to find ways to conserve water wants suggestions, they should feel free to call the Water Department and we will be more than pleased to help. Water is an important and precious resource, which shouldn't be wasted. The conservation of this resource is everyone's responsibility.
