THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said South Hampton on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at two of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following spjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raises and appropriate money for support of Highways and Bridges.
- 4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for Stockmans Bridge.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$139.22 necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of Class V roads.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for winter maintenance of highways.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest, insurance and Town Officers' bonds.

- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Public Welfare.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Cemeteries.
- 11. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate deeded to the Town for non-payment of taxes.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10.00 for Sibley Relief and \$10.00 for Colonel E. W. Bailey Police Relief Association Fund.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the s um of \$5.00 for Trust Fund recordings.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 to paint inside of Town Hall.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be used for the preparation of a map of South Hampton in its sub-division of personal ownership for use of the Town Assessors.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for legal expenses.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to officially change the name of Hilldale Avenue to the original Love Lane and appropriate the sum of \$5.00 for new road signs so labelled.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to have the Moderator appoint a committee of five citizens to study and recommend certain regulations on the building of new structures in the Town of South Hampton and to submit a report at the 1953 Town Meeting.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of the Old Hearse House.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

It must be very satisfying to you citizens of South Hampton to note the high standings of graduates from your Barnard School in the high schools they now attend. It is a fair measure of the type of instruction you are providing for your young people. The close cooperation between the trustees of the Barnard School and members of the school board is another measure of the feeling that education is a problem for all and can be best met by a cooperative effort on the part of all concerned.

Barnard School pupils are receiving many wonderful educational experiences beyond their usual classroom procedures; by way of group projects; field trips, bank days, and other activities that go to make a full activities program. You are fortunate in having teachers capable of carrying on such programs and it is to the credit of your school board that they are doing everything in their power to maintain such a high type of instruction.

As part of this report, there is a page devoted to Return of District Revenue which shows the actual budget that the School District is using for the current year 1951-52.

Teachers

Mrs. Virginia Rae, Boston University, to replace Miss Myrtle Bean who retired. Mrs. Rae comes to us with two years experience as first grade teacher in the Country Day School, Exeter.

Miss Ann-Marie O'Shea, B. U. School of Music "51" to replace Miss Jean Readio who resigned to be married. Miss O'Shea's musical background has permitted her to fit very nicely into the type of instruction necessary for a Supervisory Union position.

Testing Program

A Union wide testing program has been instituted this year. Children in grades 4, 6, and 8 were tested in October by the University of New Hampshire counseling service. Grades 4 and 6 were given Mental Efficiency tests plus Achievement tests in Reading, Arithmetic and English. Grade 8 was given a battery of tests which included Interest Inventory, Mental Efficiency, Mechanical Aptitudes and Comprehensive Reading. Grade 8 tests shall be used as a medium for counseling and guiding pupils into selection of a high school program best fitted for them in terms of interest and abilities.

These tests are in the hands of the respective teachers who would welcome the opportunity to sit down with any and all interested parents for a discussion of their child's problems as indicated by the tests. Naturally these tests are not infallible, but they are of immeasurable help when supplemented by the teacher's judgment. I urge parents to take advantage of this opportunity to sit down with the teacher and discuss their child objectively.

Guidance

As the value of a testing program must be measured by its use and because the State Department recognizes the value of a full time Counselor in Guidance Work, the Union has voted a sum of money to pay part of such a man's salary. The State Department of Education has consented to match the amount voted by the Union in order to set up a pilot program on a supervisory union basis. This program will be the only such program in the state and will be closely supervised by your Superintendent and the State Guidance Director. It should prove of great value to South Hampton in that it will make

available a man trained in counseling techniques to work with parents, teachers, and children in working toward the solution of problems in mal-adjustment, truancy, and others common to the advanced or retarded pupil.

The School and its pupils lost a very good friend in the death of Mr. Rice. He had given many hours of his time to the welfare and comfort of the boys and girls of South Hampton.

The School Board and myself will deeply miss. Mr. Charles Floyd who has so faithfully and safely transported the school children of South Hampton for so many years.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, Citizens and Teachers for the friendly and cooperative spirit shown me. It has been a real pleasure working with you.

Report of Music Teacher

To the Superintedent and School Board, Citizens of South Hampton:

The first consideration in all music work in the schools is the child; his mental and emotional condition, his tendencies and possibilities for absorbing music.

Besides these above phases of music, the children have had experience in Folk Dancing, Music Listening, and Music Theory.

A Christmas Play was produced in December by the older pupils while the younger group presented tableaux with carols. Both of these, through the combined efforts of teachers and pupils proved successful.

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers, parents, pupils and other citizens for their cooperation.

Health Supervision

To the Superintendent and School Board, Citizens of South Hampton:

Following is a report of the health program from January 1, 1950 to January 1, 1951.

The same program of health supervision in the school has been carried out this year. Monthly inspections of heads, skin, etc., plus visual and hearing tests, examinations of teeth, throats, glands, and posture. Defects found were followed up with home visits and when necessary, ways were provided for the corrections of defects.

Weighing and measuring in September, February and June. Brief health discussions when needed. Pupils in the four upper grades were skin patched for tuberculosis.

Other than a severe epidemic of Chicken Pox, ours was an unusual healthy one.

I am grateful for this opportunity to thank those who have cooperated and given this program such fine support.
