**TOWN WARRANT**  
**STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Surry in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Surry on Tuesday the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing,
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid construction on highways and raise the sum of \$571.50 for the same, or will accept State Aid for construction on class five roads and raise the sum of \$137.76.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs on highways and bridges.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the aid of poor.
6. To see how much money the town will raise for the repair and care of the Town Hall, or take any action thereto.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Old Home Day, or take any action in relation thereto.
8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
9. To see how much money the town will raise for defense purposes, or take any action in relation thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$35.00 for the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$500.00 for the care of the Wright and Garvin burial lot in the Village Cemetery.

13. To hear the reports of the town officers.

14. To allow accounts.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Surry:

I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

### ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Miss. Evelyn Wanner, a graduate of the four year elementary curriculum at Keene Teachers' college, was elected to fill the vacancy in the teaching position at the North End School.

In the assignment of preference ratings, schools have been classified as a necessary productive agency. This recognition is given to facilitate the process of procuring equipment and supplies which are necessary for their maintenance. Thus is emphasized the importance which education has in the program for the defense of the principles of democracy.

The present emergency places on our school a two-fold responsibility; namely:

1. The general education and training of pupils to produce intellegent and helpful members of American society.
2. The development of attitudes toward democracy and the attainment of the basic knowledge and skills necessary for the realization of our immediate objectives.

The democratic pattern for education provides that mental and emotional attitudes shall be well balanced and shaped by intellectual understanding.

The responsibility of our schools should be extended to serve adults as well as the younger pupils. It is recognized that the public schools must assume some responsibility for the thought and well being of all people capable of profiting from instruction—either academic or practical. The democratic principles of freedom of thought and action may be safely entrusted to a generation of people who are prepared in our schools for this responsibility.

Care must be exercised that the long range program of our schools shall not suffer from the pressure of other important objectives demanding immediate attention and support. Competition from expanded industrial defense preparations has already caused a scarcity of qualified teachers. The larger towns and cities will undoubtedly seek to maintain their school standards by looking to the districts which are on a low salary schedule for candidates to fill their vacancies. Other school costs are advancing and are bound to increase still more. Some of this increase may be offset by practicing measures of strict economy when consistent with efficiency. Although certain temporary adjustments in the use of instructional materials will be compelled by the present emergency, no retrenchment in our general education program should be made as a result of misguidance in measures designed to effect economy. Your children are entitled to the best instruction that modern education can provide within the range of local facilities and reasonable financial support. The welfare of each local community and the future of our country depend upon the attitudes developed in well organized and supported public schools.

The new edition of the Elson-Gray reading system has been adopted as the basal reading program for the three primary grades. These books are in use this year in grade 1. It is hoped that new books may be purchased each year until all three grades are equipped with this modern program. The system is complete with reading readiness material, pre-primers, primers, graded readers, work books, and supplementary devices.

The possibility of danger threatening the lives of the civilian population in the modern type of warfare has placed a new responsibility on the schools. Each teacher has been informed of the general principles governing the organization of schools prepara-

tory to an air raid attack. Plans have been outlined in each school to take care of the pupils either in the school building or in the immediate vicinity of the school. All plans providing for an air raid emergency refuge follow the recommendations of the State Defense Council and will have the approval of the superintendent and local air raid warden.

Emergency fire exits were provided at the rear of each of the school buildings. A quart size Fyre-Fyter fire extinguisher was in-

stalled in each building. New curtains were installed on all windows in both schools.

A full day institute for the rural school teachers of this area was held at Westmoreland. On November 7, nineteen school superintendents from the central and southwestern area of the state met at the Vilas school at Alstead for an all day conference.
