

#### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and plowing snow for the ensuing year. \$6000.00.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and building bridges. \$1450 00.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. \$10.00.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library. \$250.00 total.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for support of the Tamworth Community Nurse. Recommended.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of road equipment. \$300.00 recommended.
  - 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Tarvia. Recommended.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Tamworth Fire Precinct.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Wonalancet Fire Precinct.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$725.46. Recommended.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the construction of the Plains road provided the State shall appropriate the sum of \$4000.00 for the same purpose.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for the construction of a bridge on Chocorua river at West Ossipee and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for highway construction and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$131.00 for the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. Recommended.
- 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for promotion of winter business. \$300.00.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate

acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

21. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE'S REPORT

Your Committee this year finds the Town's finances in excellent condition. Economical management aided by other factors has changed last year's small deficit into a surplus of over \$2,000.00. This surplus comprises funds amounting to a total of \$900.00 set up in previous years for tarring roads and repairs to the Town Hall, and allowance has been made for this fact in the preparation of the budget.

The Town is this year faced with a very substantial increase in the County Tax brought about by the State's withdrawal from the field of relief, and is also faced with the cost of a new bridge. Partially offsetting these increases are a reduction in the State tax and a reduction in the sum probably necessary for direct relief. The budget as drawn up, and amounts recommended by your Committee to be raised under the several articles of the Warrant contemplate a tax rate of not exceeding \$3.25. The average rate for the State last year was \$3.43.

## NURSE'S REPORT OF TAMWORTH COMMUNITY NURSE ASSOCIATION, INC.

To the Townspeople:

This year I wish to explain to the people of Tamworth just exactly what the detailed report of the Community Nurse's work means. Heretofore, the report, apparently, has been hastily read and poorly understood; so the Nurse's work has been misunderstood or lightly passed over. Please understand the terms I use and explain, and then read the detailed report. It will mean so much more to you and you will begin to appreciate how much the district and school nurse means to you and your family, and what she does for you and your town.

The work of the Tamworth Community Nurse Association Inc., is the work of the "hospital without walls." Understand exactly what that means and you will know just how much the Tamworth Community Nurse Association Inc., does for you.

Meaning of the terms used in the statistical report: "General Care" signifies any and all actual nursing care given a patient whether it be the taking of a temperature or a complete bedbath.

"Welfare" means the cases where advice was given, but no actual nursing care was carried out: i. e., the weighing of an infant and advice given to the Mother concerning its feeding.

"Social service" means the many favors the nurse did for families—taking in food and clothing, obtaining medicines etc.

"Prenatal" calls signify the visits made upon pregnant women for the complete supervision of each woman, in order to preserve the happiness, health and life of the mother and child.

"Postpartum" calls refer to the calls made to care for the mother after the birth of the child.

"Newborn" refers to the visits on the new

babies, and their daily care for the first two weeks of life.

"Business" means exactly what it says—either school business or district nursing business.

"Schools" refers to the number of actual visits I made to the schools.

"Clinic Calls" mean the number of visits I made to the various homes, all over the entire town of Tamworth, to explain the purpose of our Welfare Baby Clinic, also to obtain written permission from each parent for the giving of Diphtheria toxoid. Please remember that it was the district nurse, who, in addition to her usual work, made the preparations for the Clinic, saw the parents, and arranged for transportation, as well as assisting at the Clinic, and doing some of the follow-up work in the homes after the Clinic.

"Not in" means exactly that. Usually these calls were business or for prenatal care.

Now as you read the report, please interpret the terms used, according to the above meanings, and the tremendous amount of good and work that the nurse does for you, should you realize and I hope appreciate.

In the past year I have distributed over eight hundred (800) articles of clothing; three hundred (300) new pieces and five hundred (500) second hand but usable clothing in good condition. All have been much appreciated, and will continue to be; so if you have any donations, please get in touch with the nurse. "All donations are gratefully received."

I have been able to save the town of Tamworth many dollars, due to the fact that I contacted the State Cancer Commission, and whereas the Town of Tamworth had been paying all the bills for one of the townspeople, now the State Cancer Commission pays for one half of this person's expenses—and that means a big saving to the town. Also, I have con-

tacted the State for aid for a cripple, and expect later to get this affair settled. By giving a powerful medication, whenever it is necessary, I have been able to save the town at least \$50.00 on doctor's bills. This was due to the doctor's recognition and belief in my professional ability.

I have taken over thirty (30) persons to doctor's offices, dentist's offices and to the hospital, when there was absolutely no way of transportation and the visit was most necessary.

I have distributed food, toys, clothes and supplies to many, many families. There is very much social work to be done as well as nursing care and a good nurse does both.

Two thousand five hundred and two (2502) calls, to say nothing of social work, school work, and Clinics, as well as the protection of the town of having a nurse on call at any time, who will go willingly and without charge, at any hour day or night, and render skilled nursing care, is a wonderful service. What greater service can the Tamworth Community Nurse Association Inc., render than this.

The followup work, in the schools, is directly associated with the nurse's visits to the home, and this carrying over of one service to the other makes for better work and satisfaction for all.

The nurse's work is increasing every year, an indication that the nursing service is serving the actual needs of the Community. More patients than ever before could not afford to donate to the Association. Others who used to have special nurses called on our service instead. The number of patients increases yearly, while our income does not, for an organization as ours is directly affected by any change in the economic situation of all classes.

I feel that the Association has accomplished much, but that there is so much more that can and should be done. People are becoming more aware of the value of prevention and systematic care, and are realizing that health is the most precious possession that we can have.

Please support and aid the Tamworth Community Nurse Association, Inc., as it means so much to the health of every individual, man, woman and child, in this Community.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT, TAMWORTH COMMUNITY NURSE ASSOCIATION INC.

The work of the Tamworth Community Nurse Association Inc., has been very well carried out this year by Miss Ruth Allen, R. N. We were very sorry to have Miss Allen resign on January 1, 1938 because of ill health; but we feel most fortunate in having Mrs. Blanche Spaulding, R. N. as our Nurse again.

Besides the regular District and School nursing, Miss Allen successfully arranged for and conducted several Clinics. In April 1937 four trips were made to Center Ossipee to a Tuberculin Clinic. Five children attended each time. In May two were taken to Huggins Hospital, Wolfeboro, for chest plates. On October 21, 1937 the Child Health and Diphtheria Immunization Clinic was held at the High School Building with thirty eight children attending. We, the Committee, feel that much credit goes to our Nurse for her fine work along this line.

The following Statistical report represents the work done in our community during an eight and one half months period in 1937, the half month being the first two weeks in June.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I herewith submit my fifteenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The Educational Policies Commission representing the National Education Association has reached several conclusions relating to the structure and administration of public education. Some of these are as follows:

- 1. "American public education should be made effectively free." Tamworth furnishes free schools with books and supplies. Transportation is furnished to elementary pupils for long distances. Attention is given to health, recreation and ideals of citizenship.
- 2. "American public education is concerned with every individual from early childhood through adult life." Tamworth provides for boys and girls from Grade I through high school. The United States enrolls all children between 7 and 13 and more than 60% of those 14 to 17. Tamworth enrolls all of the first group and a very large percent of those in the second group. It would be a fine thing if some continuation school could be arranged to care for older youth and adult life. It should be possible to arrange for adult classes during the winter, at least.
- 3. "Local units of school administration should provide professional leadership." Tamworth provides good teachers and district supervision under the care of a school board elected by the citizens.
- 4. "Education should be independent from other government functions." Tamworth, as a town, and New Hampshire, as a state, keep school management out of politics, to a commendable degree.
- 5. "Schools must cooperate with other agencies in serving human needs." This suggests that the home, church and school should cooperate. The schools have a heavy burden for the development and welfare of the boys and girls, but homes and churches

should not avoid the primary responsibility.

- 6. "State responsibility in education involves professional leadership." It is desirable that the Commissioner of Education be appointed by the State Board of Education. It is so done in New Hampshire.
- 7. "State responsibility in education involves the equalization of the burden of school support." New Hampshire, by a very wise provision, furnishes state aid for smaller towns.

The schools in Tamworth are generally going well this year with good attendance.

Health work has been under the care of the nurse, Miss Ruth Allen. The work was handicapped somewhat by the fact that the nurse was not with us for the full ten months. A little clinic work was accomplished and a few defects corrected. The report of the nurse is appended. The health work is now under the care of Dr. Remick and the nurse, Mrs. Spaulding. Some way should be found to correct defects found by the examinations.

The property is in good repair. A fine work was done at the high school in laying a cement floor in the basement and installing an oil-burning furnace. A larger water main was laid and flush toilets provided. This makes conditions more sanitary and cleanly. A new heating system is much needed at Bemis School. I recommend also the installation of septic toilets at Chocorua School.

The high school is advancing well under the leadership of Headmaster Louis L. Ramsay. In addition to the regular class work special activities keep up the interest and add to the value of school attendance. Athletics, orchestra work, prize-speaking, plays, educational trips and club activities keep up a live school spirit.

Last June we graduated a fine class of ten. The town should feel proud that a high school can do so

much for its young people. Nearly every pupil who graduates from the eighth grade enters high school.

The following graduates of the high school are now in post-secondary work:

Kenneth Brett continues in the University of New Hampshire.

Margaret Welch continues in the Nurses' Training School in St. Johnsbury.

Louise Hidden continues in Keene Normal School. Frances Hidden is attending Business College in Portland, Maine.

Barbara Mason is training in the Bellevue Hospital in New York.

More of our graduates should go on to higher education.

For the year ending June 30, 1937, we had an average attendance of 159, an average membership of 167 and a percent of 95.
