8. To see what sum of money the town will vote for the construction of the bridge at George Sawyer's.

9. To see if the town will vote for a branch library at Thornton Center, on East side of River.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise money to fight the white pine blister and if so appropriate money for the same.

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11. To see if the town will vote to grant a franchise to a company formed or to be formed as a subsidiary to the Utilities Power Company of Meredith,

N. H., to erect poles and string wires on the highways as a transmission line to convey electrical current through the town from the Utilities Power Company.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March, 1927, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

9. To see if the district will vote to adopt Medical Inspection for the schools and raise and appropriate money therefor.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the School Board:

I hereby submit for your consideration my eighth annual report of the Thornton schools.

The teachers for this year are as follows: Center School—Olive Simonds, the same as last year; Mad River—Mildred Hazeltine, a normal graduate, this position has been filled successfully by Mrs. I. F. Hazeltine for the past four years; West Thornton—Catherine Barnard, who has taught successfully this school before; Lyford—Cadet teachers from the Normal school with the same arrangements as last year.

The Lyford school has increased in numbers since it opened in the fall owing to the lumber operations at the Siding.

Standard tests are to be used again this year to measure progress and efficiency. Standardized tests are more or less an educational yard-stick used to check up the work to see whether or not the pupils are advancing as rapidly as they should.

The school census, taken last September, reported 48 boys and 45 girls or a total of 93 children in town between the ages of five and sixteen. Eighty of the ninety-three were reported attending schools. Twelve of those not in school were between the ages of 5 and 8 and one between 14-16. Six were attending elementary schools outside of the district and six were in high schools.

The health examination was made by Ethel F. Sawyer, R. N. of Lincoln. The examination is of but little value unless the parents endeavor to have the defect reported corrected. The report showed many defective teeth. Those should be treated because the poison from decaying teeth gets into the system and may cause ill health and much suffering. Tonsils and adenoids should receive attention also. "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." The records show but one with perfect attendance, Viz., Ernest Fountain. The per cent of attendance for all schools was 90.94. This is rather low as a good attendance, when not affected by an epidemic, is 95 per cent. The registers show that the poorest attendance is during the cold inclement weather of the winter term.

The school board members made six visits to the schools during the year and held seven board meetings.

The school registers record 160 visits by citizens and 147 by the superintendent of schools.

May we not study the school situation in Thornton to see in what ways we may improve the school efficiency and then unite our forces to raise the standard to a much higher level. No one can do it alone. It must be the result of concerted action, close co-operation and united effort. Shall we not try it?
