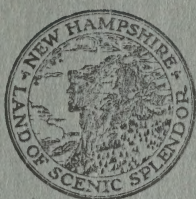

## TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for winter highways.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling roads.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for culverts, bridges and general expenses.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining camp roads.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Public Libraries and where it shall be expended.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting in the Town of Wakefield.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of old cemeteries.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$147.00 which is  $\frac{1}{100}$  of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Lakes Region.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be paid to the Sanbornville Fire Department; also a like sum to be paid to the Union Fire Department.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to be applied on the purchase of the new Fire Equipment.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Poor.



18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be used by the Sanbornville Athletic Association for the development of the skating rink and playground.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 to be expended on the Gilman Road; the State contributing \$6000.00.

20. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the Town in order to secure greater equality as between tax payers and to insure the assessment of all property in the Town on the same standard of value and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

21. To transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

## HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES — IT PAYS!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of

woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this —

1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
5. **HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES** — his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Wakefield:

Probably at no time in the history of this country has the attention of the people been focused so sharply on the problems of education. Seldom, if ever, have these problems been so acute. Competent authorities report that during the past five years 350,000 men and women have left the teaching profession. Marked increases in the cost of supplies and in teachers' salaries have increased the cost of school operation to a serious degree. The tremendous problems of the war years we met and solved. The problems of peace are of no less magnitude. Careful appraisal of the adequacy of the American schools to meet the needs of children and the welfare of the nation is a continuing year to year responsibility of American citizens. We made immeasurable sacrifices of life, strength, and wealth to defend the basic tenet of the American way of life — the dignity and worth of the individual. We must still defend this tenet against hostile political faiths both from without and within. This defense must be built in American schools.

American children have an assignment with destiny that is not optional. They will live in a world of incredible complexity, of racial and class tensions, of international frictions, and of inevitable change. They must find their way in this world and must have the education which will help them do so.

The Sanbornville primary and the Union School buildings are in good condition. The grammar school building in Sanbornville suffers by comparison. The building needs a general re-conditioning on the inside, increased and improved wash room facilities, a fire escape from the second floor and better storage facilities for equipment. The situation of this building is unfortunate in that there is no land adjacent for an

adequate playground. The boys and girls in this building are at an age when they need vigorous, organized, supervised games to relieve tensions created by the unnatural situation whereby they are required to remain still for long periods, and to develop rapidly growing muscles. The possibility of serving hot lunches in the schools deserves serious consideration. Federal funds are available for half of the cost of equipment, and for reimbursement of part of the cost of the meals. In many towns a small charge is made for the lunch and the remainder of the cost borne by some local organization or provided through appropriation. A warm meal at noon is a valuable factor in maintaining good health in school children.
