#### TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the town of Washington, in the county of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, one member of Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of Library Committee for three years, Fire Chief and any other necessary town officers.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of its highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$639.00 and accept State Aid of \$1,278.00 for the construction of S. A. O. highway in said town.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to apply on term note due July 10, 1947, borrowed for Town Hall repairs.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Washington

Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Shedd Free Library.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial day.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of Blister Rust.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or administer any real estate coming to the town through Tax Collectors deede.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to add to the Capital Reserve fund for the purchase of road equipment.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to buy a new truck.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to buy a snow plow for the truck, the money to be appropriated from the Capital Reserve fund.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a power lawn mower to mow the Common.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to take down the ruins and remove all debris of the Lyman house in East Washington, work to be supervised by the Selectmen.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one one-hundredth of one percent of the assessed valuation based on the 1946 assessment to promote the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to widen, scrape, and improve Bailey Road.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of fifty dollars from the estate of Auren L. Powers as a trust fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the Auren and Anson Powers lots in the East Washington cemetery.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to accept from Abbie C. Roby the sum of \$100.00 (trust fund) to be added to the principal of the Andrew J. Cutting lot Fund account, East Washington Cemetery, the income to be used only on the Andrew J. Cutting lot.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to survey and cut out town lines.

Article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

To the School Board and Citizens of Washington:

# Organization

School Board: Amy Farnsworth, Chairman; John V. Dyer, Perley H. Crane.

Superintendent of Schools: Stewart V. McCormack.

Teacher: Susie Benway at the Dole School for a salary of \$1,250. She is a certified teacher. Katherine Shea is Music Supervisor at a salary of \$200.

# Pupil Data

In a very interesting graduation, Mildred Crane was graduated from the eighth grade of the Dole School in June, 1945.

When the Dole School opened in September there were 21 pupils. Since then 2 pupils have left, so that the present enrollment is 19. Of these 19, Windsor sends 7 and 12 are from Washington. Five Washington pupils are attending Hillsboro High and two are in attendance at Towle High in Newport.

The following pupils maintained perfect attendance during the school year 1944-45 for the number of terms indicated: Full year, Donald Crane; three terms, Roberta Barker, Jean Crane, Theodore Drew, and Harry Drew; two terms, Joyce Bigewood, Mildred Crane, Sally Woodrow, and Lilla Woodrow; one term, Sidney Blan-

chard, Charlene Fletcher, Anna Paro, Benjamin Paro, Caroline Strickland, and Marshall Strickland.

# **General Report**

The annual report should perhaps give us some kind of a picture of the kind of education being provided for our youth from the first grade on, but when town meeting day comes around we get all "steamed up" over some little item on the warrant so our over-all problems wait yet another year for discussion. Probably the most distressing feature of present day reaction to educational matters is the extreme inertia of the layman. This inertia results in a lack of information which promotes a lack of understanding and a lack of sympathy towards the whole problem of education. Most distressing is the vehemance and ignorance with which views about education are expressed publicly and privately by many prominent people.

The basis of American democracy is that ALL people have value. Each individual has potential abilities, and given a chance, can make a unique contribution to the good of all.

Even from a narrow, selfish point of view, we cannot afford to have an ignorant and suppressed segment in our society. Whether we like it or not, these people are with us. Each individual becomes a producer and a consumer, hence an asset to our economic life, or he fails to produce and becomes a liability. Such persons become expensive liabilities if they have to be institutionalized, when for evidence we consider that America's annual crime bill exclusive of poverty is TWELVE billions annually while her total bill for education, is nearer TWO billions annually.

The problem in Washington is somewhat unique because of travel conditions. The earnestness of the pupils is no less than in other schools. Their cheerful, hopeful faces as they labor over their daily school tasks makes one glad that he has a part in their educational program.

These children have been provided with the needed lesson tools of the most modern type. Their school is warm and clean. With adequate parental interest and cooperation we can make measurable educational progress which will provide adequate citizenship training for our pupils.

Washington pupils make records in other educational institutions which would indicate that their training properly fits them for life work. As indicated earlier, all pupils may not be benefited by a total academic program beyond the eighth grade. Rather, a broad high school training is indicated for a large percent of our school population.

I wish to call your attention to the accompanying reports. They provide you with pertinent data on the educational program here in Washington, which program represents Washington's attempt to perpetuate and improve its cultural heritage.

In conclusion I wish to thank the school board and citizens for their cooperation in promoting the educational welfare of our pupils.
