TOWN WARRANT  
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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*To the inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead, N. H., in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Center Barnstead on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at nine in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to employ the use of a Ballot marked; "OFFICIAL BALLOT" with the words YES and NO printed on such Ballot in conjunction with latest Valid Check List of the Legal Voters on the Town of Barnstead when the Voters are voting on any issue of accepting a Road, or Roads or any dedication of a parcel, or parcels of land to the Town of Barnstead, or when the Town votes to convey by any method, property, listed as being Town Property. This is to become effective when voted in the affirmative, and shall remain in effect until voted void at any future meeting called as a legal Town Meeting of the Town of Barnstead, N. H.

4. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Conservation Commission as set forth in R. S. A. 36-a, and that the Selectmen appoint said Commission within Fifteen (15) days from the passage of this vote and that a temporary chairman be appointed to call the first meeting of the commission.

5. To see if the Town will vote to join the Towns of Chichester, Epsom, and Pittsfield or any combination of said Towns, for the purpose of employing one or more District Nurses to provide Nurse Service, and to raise and appropriate not more than \$1,989, therefor. This article approved by the Budget Committee..

6. To see what action the Town will take pertaining to the land owned by the Town of Barnstead situated in the

Bounds of the Locke Lake Development, at Center Barnstead, N. H.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Trust Fund; (1) The sum of \$200.00 from Percy A. Davis, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the lot No. 24 of Percy A. Davis located in the Riverview Cemetery, Barnstead, N. H.

I. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and require the selectmen to lay out the following ways when said ways have been approved by the Department of Public Works and Highways as conforming to standards for Class V highways, upon condition that the owner of said ways, namely Locke Development Coporation, shall waive in writing any claim for damages for the property thereby taken:

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) for the purpose of suitable care for the deserted or abandoned cemeteries in the Town of Barnstead, and this sum to be under the supervision of the Selectmen. (RSA. 289:5)

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

On March 14th, 1970 at the Annual Town Meeting of the  
Town of Barnstead, New Hampshire the following Ordinance to  
promote the Health, Safety and General Welfare of the Town  
of Barnstead was adopted.

SECTION 1.

The following regulations will apply to all dwellings and com-  
mercial buildings, constructed after the passage of this ordi-  
nance.

- A. A certificate of intention of building, installing a Mobile Home, or to erect a Commercial Building must be filed with the Town Clerk at least 15 days before action.
- B. Chimneys and Flues must be tiled lined and supported by a foundation which extends at least Two Feet into the ground. Stovepipes which pass through partitions must be protected by adequate fireproof material.
- C. Foundations must be of concrete, cement blocks, brick, or stone. Wood posts may be used, but are to set on a rock, Cement Block Base, or be properly treated.
- D. All electrical wiring circuits must be fused and connections must be made in a metal junction box, with at least No. 14 wire (National Underwriters Specifications).
- E. Dwellings must have adequate sanitary disposal facilities in compliance with the State Department of Health and Welfare.
- F. Buildings will be framed according to suitable building practices. The sides or roofs will not remain covered with any type of building paper excluding Tar Paper for more than a period of one year.
- G. Roofed over basements may be used as living quarters only while the building is being erected, and for not more than a 5 year period. These roofed over quarters must comply with all sanitary and fire regulations as adopted by the Town.

- H. 1.a. Any structure that has been damaged by fire or wind, or has deteriorated to be considered a hazard to safety or health, and can not be repaired, must be eliminated by the owner within six months after notice from the Selectmen.
2. b. Any structure that is damaged by fire or wind, and has deteriorated to a point of being a safety, or health hazard, and is repairable must be repaired by the owner within one year after notice from selectmen.

#### SECTION II.

No building shall be located nearer than 30 feet from the edge of a public highway or a road laid out for acceptance by the Town, to 10 feet from the edge of the lot.

#### SECTION III.

Building lots must have at least 40,000 (Forty Thousand) square feet in area and at least 100 feet frontage.

#### SECTION IV.

The Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of Five members who will serve without pay for the terms as specified in R. S. A. 31:63. The Board shall have authority to allow variances from the terms of this ordinance where it can be shown that unnecessary hardships would otherwise result.

#### SECTION V.

Enforcement of these ordinances shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen and the Board is hereby given the power and the authority to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking the injunction in Superior Court and by any other legal action.

#### SECTION VI.

The ordinances herein stated are enacted under the authority granted by R. S. A. 31:60.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

---

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture - to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 A. M. and after 5:00 P. M. with the following exceptions:  
Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?
3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help"; and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

Town - 2 fires - 1/4 acre

## OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

It was a good year for the library.

It was marked by advances in several areas, one of the most noteworthy of which was the increase in circulation - an increase of 50%, most of it attributal to students. Interestingly, there was an increase in a period during which libraries are apt to show a decrease in circulation - the heart of the summer. But in August 1970 our summer residents took out more books than in any August of previous years.

There were gifts large and small - from the Barnstead Parade Ladies Aid - from organizations donating memorial books - from others.. For all of which the trustees, on behalf of the town, express their thanks. Particularly to the Friends of the Library. Each year through the generosity of its members it makes essential contributions and it did so again in 1970. The most impressive of these is the carpet, installed, for the entire library. It is handsome to look at and comfortable to have. Ante carpet - frigid floors! Post carpet - warm feet!

No annual report would be worthy of the name without an expression of heartfelt thanks to the volunteers for their indispensable services and to the librarian Mrs. Ellen Grau for the many hours she contributed beyond those expected of her. To help lighten her duties the trustees have appointed Mrs. Carolyn Johnson assistant librarian and we hope her stay with us will be a long and rewarding one.

The foregoing are the good things - a shining plus. However, there is a large minus - the library space. It is altogether inadequate and will become alarmingly more so as time goes on. Over the years it has grown in its inventory of books, its services its readers, its student reearchers. At times all this activity and the books, books, books threaten to burst out of the confining walls. We need to expand. With only one thought in mind - the continued growth of an excellent library in a forward looking community - the trustees sincerely hope our fellow citizens will see the wisdom of making an immediate start toward this expansion.

The main room of the library is 24' long. The outdoors area behind this room is approximately 30' and the library needs every bit of it. Without it - where to put the books now overflowing the present available space the additional shelving required? the tables needed for study? the borrowers and readers whose numbers are steadily increasing? The necessity is there and as a community we must face this necessity and make plans for enlarging the library.

It is not impossible and the need is pressing.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board and the Citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my fifth Annual Report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The doors of the School opened this year with an entirely new staff with the exception of one. Richard Check, employed to teach at the seventh and eighth grade level, was also given the administrative responsibilities. Voluntarily Mr. Check dedicated himself to the success of the educational system in Barnstead by spending time prior to September in organizing the new staff. Through his efforts, and the cooperation of a most capable staff, the school year started smoothly.

Mrs. Emma Parent, employed as a part-time clerk, started the long and tedious, but most important, task of bringing all the student records and files up-to-date. The entire staff of the school was developing into a smoothly operating team when tragedy struck. Early Sunday morning, October 4th, a neighbor noticed that the school was on fire. If it were not for her quick action, I am sure more extensive damage would have resulted. The fire departments from the Center and the Parade responded quickly and set to work in stopping the fire from completely destroying the school. The firemen did not stop at that point. They continued to prevent further damage by sweeping all the water and ashes out of the school. They performed admirably well, even tasks far beyond the call of duty.

Before that Sunday was over, the School Board, Administration, staff, fire and police officials were all involved in trying to determine the cause of the fire and the extent of damages. Plans were mapped to make the necessary repairs as soon as possible. The wheels were put into motion, and you can now witness the results. This would not have been possible without a tremendous amount of volunteer help and cooperation from the citizens, students, staff, and the contractors. Three days later, as a result of the selectmen making the town hall available, we were back in business.

There is still work to be done. Every item lost in the fire had to be catalogued, priced, listed, and a complete inventory made for the insurance claim. Just recently we have received payment from the insurance company for the total damage amounting to nearly \$35,000.00. Now comes the job of ordering all of the necessary material, having them received, checked, and processed for payment. We have come face-to-face with a



tragedy affecting everyone; everyone met the challenge and rose above the problems. Many, many thanks to everyone.

We cannot stop now. The problems of the fire are becoming history. We still need to look forward into the future. The student population continues to gradually increase each year. The requirements being placed upon the elementary schools in New Hampshire indicates some weaknesses in your school. Coupling these two problems indicates the need for an addition to the school.

The New Hampshire State Board of Education has approved Minimum Elementary School Standards to become affective September 1, 1972. Those of immediate concern to Barnstead are:

- A. Physical Education shall be taught in the elementary school.
- B. Library services shall be provided for all children.
- C. Schools enrolling 150-300 children shall provide at least 1,000 square feet of library space or one regular classroom.
- D. In schools with between 150-300 children enrolled the elementary school principal shall have at least one-half of his time scheduled for supervision of instruction and other leadership responsibilities.

The Building Committee has studied the problems and will be submitting alternatives to the voters for their action. I encourage your support of the recommendations for an addition to the Barnstead Elementary School.

I want to express sincere appreciation to the parents, business men, citizens, and especially the members of the School Board for their continued understanding and interest.

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#### REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools and the citizens of Barnstead, it is with great pleasure that I submit this my second annual report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

During the months of March, April and May a large percentage of my time is spent in recruiting, interviewing and in cooperation with the principals, evaluating candidates for the professional vacancies in Supervisory Union No. 49.

Many of the candidates have written to the Superintendent's Office requesting an application or an interview. Most of the candidates learn of the positions through announcements of vacancies sent to the colleges and universities throughout New England or through the New Hampshire Employment Security Division of the State of New Hampshire. Some candidates learn of vacancies through friends presently employed in our district or as a result of doing their student teaching in one of the schools in our district.

The candidates are selected on the basis of their qualifications for the position. Deciding which candidate to employ is often a difficult decision. Years of experience, potential for growth, scholarship, personality, past performance, amount of money in budget, number of candidates and their interest in living in the area are all factors to be taken into consideration. The classroom teacher is the most important factor in a child's education, thus the selection of the teacher to be employed is most important.

The citizens of Barnstead should be pleased with the results of the recruiting process this year. Barnstead Elementary School has a very good staff with a good balance of experienced and beginning teachers. Under the leadership of Mr. Richard Check, the principal, the faculty is doing a fine job.

I would like to comment on what I consider to be one of the outstanding attributes of the Barnstead Educational system. The spirit of cooperation between the citizens and the school, and the pride and interest that the citizens of Barnstead take in their school is outstanding. The involvement after the fire was an example, but it is the continuous day-by-day cooperation which is even more impressive. This spirit should be an asset in the future as the school system faces some of the controversial issues in education. Sooner or later the public will be asked to voice their opinions on such issues as Sex Education in the schools, Drug Abuse Education, Mental Health Programs and other issues.

I would like to thank Mr. Damon Russell, Superintendent of Schools, the members of the School Board, and the citizens of Barnstead for their cooperation.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

Barnstead Elementary School — 1970

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those citizens of Barnstead who have helped and supported the Barnstead Elementary School. Interest and cooperation like that of Barnstead's is essential for a successful educational program.

With the end of the 1969-1970 school year, Barnstead witnessed almost a complete turnover in staff. We are indeed grateful for the return of: Lois Johanson, Fourth Grade Teacher; Emma Parent, Clerical Aide; Helen Sweeney, School Nurse; and Charles Eastman, Custodian.

The staff was completed with the addition of: Catherine Buotte, First Grade teacher; Maureen Smith, Second Grade Teacher; Rebecca Fatula, Third Grade teacher; Margo Johnson, Fifth Grade teacher; Robert Landry, Sixth Grade teacher; Susan Johnson, Seventh and Eighth English and Social Studies teacher; and Richard Check, Seventh and Eighth Mathematics and Science teacher. It is my feeling that we have a very fine staff and a high degree of learning takes place under the direction of this staff.

In December, George Tuttle was added as a custodian to meet the maintenance needs of the school.

On the morning of Sunday, October 4th, the Barnstead Elementary School was struck by tragedy. Fire severely damaged the central portion of the building which houses the Third Grade room, the Eighth Grade room, the office, and the storage room. Smoke damage was extensive throughout the entire building. I am sure the damage would have been far more extensive had it not been for a ready and highly efficient fire department at both the Center and the Parade, of which Barnstead can be proud. By the end of 1970, repairs will have been completed and many of the supplies reordered.

While the repairs were being made, the Seventh and Eighth Grade classes utilized the facilities at the Town Hall.

Barnstead can be once again be proud of its townspeople, students and friends for such a unified effort in restoring the school to near normalcy within a matter of days after the fire.

In September total enrollment was 161, and it reached an all time high of 175 in November, 1970. As the enrollment grows and as we try to give the children of Barnstead a superior education, we are made aware of several basic needs. These needs are additional classroom space, an all-purpose room, a school library and the development of a curriculum that meets the needs of the junior high school student.

A new math program has been implemented for all grades after an extensive study by a committee of Supervisory Union teachers. Similar studies for Spelling and Music Curriculums are presently in progress with implementation slated for the 1971-1972 school year.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent of Schools, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, the members of the School Board, and my fellow teachers for their support and cooperation.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March, 1971, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
3. To see if the District will vote to appropriate \$260,000.00 or any other sum, for the purpose of constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Barnstead Elementary School, and to authorize the School Board to issue serial notes or bonds or both upon the credit of the District under the Municipal Finance Act or any other enabling authority, and to take any other action in relation thereto. (Reviewed by Budget Committee and submitted without a recommendation)
4. To see if the District will vote to provide transportation to all children attending the Barnstead Elementary School who live on the West side of Route 28, and those living on the East side of Route 28 who live in excess of one mile from the school, or in excess of one mile from the regular bus route; and to raise and appropriate \$5,500.00 to implement the same. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
5. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
6. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and receive in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational

purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any Federal or State Agency.

7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,000.00 to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year.
8. To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 197:1A through G inclusive, that is, to elect the district officers at the Annual Town Meeting.
9. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF THE BARNSTEAD SCHOOL PLANNING COMMITTEE

---

Motion: Mr. Kent Locke moved that the Moderator appoint a committee of five (5) voters, plus the School Board, to bring in a written report of plans for an Auditorium and/or needed classroom additions to the present school building, to the next Budget Committee meeting and to the School District meeting in 1971. Emma Parent seconded this motion, and it was approved by a voice vote.

The moderator appointed the following committee: Leonard Tasker, Selectman, Mrs. William Parent, Roscoe Tasker, Lois Lichty, and Kent Locke. School Board members of this committee are William Jenisch, Russell Krause, and John Cotton. Mrs. William Parent was elected chairman of the committee.

On April 13, 1970, the first meeting was held with at least one meeting a month from then on to a total of fifteen regular meetings and two public meetings.

As instructed by the voters, the School Planning Committee is ready to make the following report.

The Committee, since it has been formed, has: tried to determine the need for additional classrooms and/or an auditorium; studied enrollment projections - local and state; consulted minimum standards for elementary schools; worked closely with the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Damon A. Russell, the Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Richard M. Hayden, the State Department of Education, and John R. Holbrook Associates of Keene, New Hampshire, an architectural firm; considered various alternatives such as tuitioning students to other towns, portable classrooms, double sessions; visited other schools; met with building committees from other towns; invited representatives of firms which install portable classrooms to give information about these facilities; examined numerous drawings and plans and specifications prepared by Mr. Holbrook's office to determine the best suited to the present and future needs of the town; conducted two public hearings to inform and receive suggestions from the public; decided to present several alternatives to the public; determined the cost of the various alternatives; determined the effect on the tax rate of the various alternatives; pre-

pared a brochure for the public to inform them of the various alternatives so that each citizen of Barnstead may be completely informed of the plans and recommendations and that all voters have ample opportunity to study and discuss them prior to making any decision at a School District Meeting.

As a result of their efforts, the School Planning Committee made a decision to present to the voters four alternatives for their decision. The following article will be inserted in the School District Warrant.

“To see if the District will vote to appropriate \$260,000 or any other sum, for the purpose of constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Barnstead Elementary School, and to authorize the School Board to issue serial notes or bonds or both upon the credit of the District under the Municipal Finance Act, or any other enabling authority and to take any other action in relation thereto.”

Under this article the voters will be authorized to discuss the possible alternatives and take the necessary action of their choice. The alternatives are:

1. The addition of four classrooms and an all-purpose room, complete with kitchen.
2. The addition of four classrooms and an all-purpose room.
3. The addition of two classrooms and an all-purpose room.
4. The addition of four classrooms.

The Committee has presented the alternatives to the Budget Committee as the motion directed.
