WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING  
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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(L. S.)

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: (\*)

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- a. Town Officers' Salaries.
- b. Town Officers' Expenses.
- c. Election and Registration Expenses.
- d. Expenses of Town Hall and other Buildings.
- e. Police Department.
- f. Fire Department.
- g. Spraying Trees.
- h. Pruning Trees.
- i. Health Department including District Nurse.
- j. Vital Statistics.
- k. Insurance.
- l. Sewer Maintenance.
- m. Town Dump and Garbage Removal.
- n. Town Highway Maintenance.
- o. Street Lighting.



- p. Town Road Aid.
- q. Libraries.
- r. Town Poor and Old Age Assistance.
- s. Memorial Day and other Celebrations.
- t. Cemeteries.
- u. Interest.
- v. Sidewalk Construction.
- w. Sidewalk Maintenance.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$301.43 for Town Road Aid, this sum to be matched by a State contribution of \$2,210.53.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$200.00 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, on short term notes for the year 1952 not to exceed \$60,000.00.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to apply to the Concord Hospital deficit from operations, the sum not to exceed \$324.00.

7. To see what action the Town will vote to take, relative to the disposition of the old wooden covered bridge across the Contoocook River, near the village of Penacook, and to raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the disposition of the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the Federal Government, the State of New Hampshire, and the city of Concord, for the construction of a new steel and cement bridge across the Contoocook River, near the village of Penacook, and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to raise and appropriate Boscawen's

proportionate share of the expense of such construction, and that the share shall not be more than one eighth of such construction cost, nor the amount of money so raised to exceed the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) which ever may be the lesser amount.

9. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer any unexpended balance of money from one appropriation to another.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of the special Sewer Committee, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

(\*) Business meeting for appropriations ONLY, will be called at seven o'clock in the evening.

## REPORT OF THE PENACOOK AND BOSCAWEN WATER COMMISSIONERS

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The 1950 program is practically completed and the work planned for 1951 is also completed and in operation.

To review, — School Street has a new main. Water Street from the Daniel Webster Highway is relaid to the river crossing, new mains are laid on the Daniel Webster Highway from the corner of Water Street to the river at the Blue Sunoco Station, new main is installed on Queen Street from the Daniel Webster Highway to our new storage tank and slightly beyond the residence of Roy Fredette and approximately three hundred feet of new iron main was laid at the southerly end of the Jones Hollow relocation job.

Crescent Street was completed early in the season. Queen Street and Water Street hills were resurfaced, partly at the expense of the precinct following the relaying of mains.

The tank has been in operation since early in the summer, and under gravity alone, stays about two-thirds full of water (or 200,000 gallons).

The telemeter system and the chlorinator are now in operation.

It is planned in 1952 to relay a portion of the main on the Daniel Webster Highway north of Howard Johnson's and a portion of Water Street near the McKerley Nursing Home and also the entire length of Fisher Avenue.

The balance of the leaks near the pond are to be fixed this season, but they are where the pipe is not too deep and should not entail too much expense. Until these are fixed it would be wasteful to run the pump for any length of time.

Both the electric pump and the auxiliary gas engine have been tested out and even though we still have the balance

of the leaks to fix, the pump could be used in any emergency that might arise. At the present time however, the town is supplied entirely through the gravity system.

We had to relay one-half mile of main because of the Jones Hollow road job, but received very substantial help from the state in the job.

We would like to call special attention to the financial statement in this report, which for the first time in recent years, contains a complete listing of the precinct's assets.

The net proceeds of the verdict in the Williams law suit will be of great help in carrying out the program of new mains, etc. in 1952.

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Boscawen which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 82, Section 27, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, which provides in part as follows:

“Audit on Motion of Commission. The commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such. xxx”

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is made up in two sections as follows:

Section I — Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1950

Section II — Statistical Table — Ten Year Statement of indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Municipal Court.

**FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

**Comparative Balance Sheets — December 31, 1949-December 31, 1950: (Exhibit A)**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1949 and December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$654.33 during the year 1950.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

**Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—  
Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenue for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,830.29, less a net revenue surplus of \$3,365.94, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$464.35.

**Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)**

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1950, is indicated in Exhibit F.

**AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipts and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

**GENERAL COMMENTS**

**Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes:**

Table I presents a ten year statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes. It will be noted that during the

period from January 31, 1951 to December 31, 1950, the Net Debt decreased from \$8,732.26 to \$2,187.65.

During the same period the assessed valuation increased by nearly \$950,000.00, while the amount of the annual tax levy went from \$43,000.00 to \$119,000.00, an increase of 177%. Uncollected taxes at the close of the year increased from \$8,196.04 to \$37,888.34.

The average local tax rate increased from \$3.06 to \$5.11 per hundred, compared to an increase in the average rate for the state during this period from \$3.41 to \$4.31.

**Balance Sheet — December 31, 1950:**

It is noted that the Town balance sheet of December 31, 1950, which was included in the annual financial report filed with this office and which appeared in the annual printed report, indicated a Net Debt of \$5,783.63. Actually the Net Debt on December 31, 1950, was \$2,187.65, as shown by Exhibit A. Most of this difference was due to the fact that outstanding temporary loans were shown in the Town report as \$14,000.00, whereas the actual amount of loans outstanding was \$10,000.00.

**Selectmen's Records:**

The following suggestions are made relative to the Selectmen's Record of Receipts and Expenditures:

- (1) More attention should be given to the proper classification of expenditures.
- (2) All vouchers should be supported by invoices or bills.
- (3) A more accurate record of notes issued for loans in anticipation of taxes and repayment of such notes.
- (4) The accumulated totals of the several classification columns should be carried forward from page to page in the Selectmen's Record of Receipts and Expenditures. If this procedure is followed, the relation of expenditures to appropriations may be determined at any time throughout the year.

**Conclusion:**

With exceptions as herein indicated, the accounts and records of the Town Officials which we audited were found to be in good order.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual Town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Boscawen for their assistance during the course of the audit.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and

the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the School Board and the Citizens of the Boscawen School District:*

It is my intention to limit this report to one phase of your school needs, namely the situation that exists at the Water Street School.

This is not a new issue for you at all, but it is one that needs your very careful consideration since the economic factor of cost of schools is uppermost in the minds of all citizens these days.

The enrollment of this school is as follows:

Of these twelve children four (4) walk to school while eight (8) are transported. The building is in need of some new equipment such as blackboards, better toilet facilities, better water facilities and constantly will demand general upkeep.

Expenses of the school for the year 1950-51 were as follows:

This does not include an expenditure of \$400.00 for painting the building and putting on a new roof a year or so ago.

The expenses for the current year are more than for last year, because of the added cost of instruction.

You can plainly see from these figures that you are paying a high rate of instruction for the children attending the Water Street School.

The School Board has before suggested and continues to recommend that this School be closed and that the children from that area be transported to the Plains or Main Street Schools. The Superintendent of Schools agrees with this recommendation because he feels that it is in the interests of the children, the people locally and the town as a whole. It is hoped that the citizens of Boscawen will give due consideration to this problem at an early date.

I have been in the employ of your district such a short time that I will not commit myself to making other suggestions for educational changes until I have had an opportunity to study the situations carefully.

I want to commend the people whose interest and efforts have put into effect an excellent lunch program at the Plains School. The need for a similar program at the Main Street School is great. I feel sure that local interest and effort is going to help get a hot lunch program for the boys and girls of Main Street School.

May I take this opportunity to thank all teachers for their cooperation, the School Board for its help and the citizens for their support of our united school effort to provide the children of Boscawen with educational opportunities.

Part 2—During the above years or any of following which a teacher is employed by the Boscawen School Board, if they (the teachers) attend school and acquire six (6) credits, they shall receive \$100 to help pay for their education.

Part 3—The school board shall pay as they feel adequate, with a minimum of \$200., until a teacher shall receive their maximum salary under the above scale.

*Article II*

Part 1—Service in the community

After a teacher has been in the community for ten (10) years, they shall receive a \$200 increase in salary every five (5) years.

This means if any of the above teachers should stay as long as thirty years (30) they would receive the following.

#### Article III—Sick Leave

Sick leave for teachers in this district is accumulative up to ten (10) days.

#### Article IV

All renewal contracts should be out by April 1st so that a teacher who is not to be rehired may seek employment elsewhere.

#### Article V

All the above salary scale remarks do not take effect unless the teachers fill the state requirements of the State Board of Education (Six credits every five years) and being judged as possessing teacher growth and efficiency by the Superintendent.
