To the Inhabitants of the Town of Center Harbor in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Center Harbor on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Highways and Bridges.
- 4 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money for Town purposes, in anticipation of Taxes.
- 5 To see if the Town will vote to raise money to defray expenses of Memorial Day and if so, how much.
- 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$905.50 to defray expenses of street lights in Center Harbor Village.
- 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for aid to Laconia Hospital and if so, how much.
- 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,500. for welfare work.
- 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,200. for maintenance of Fire Department.
- 10 To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Assistance for Class V Roads, the Town to raise \$206.72 the State to contribute \$1,378.11.

- 11 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$99. which is 1/100 of 1 per cent of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural resources of the Town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 12 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for Band Concerts and if so, how much.
- 13 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for oil to be applied to the roads, and if so, how much.
- 14 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$275. for maintenance of the Town Dump.
- 15 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$125. for cleaning and care of sidewalks and roadsides.
- 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300. for maintenance of the wharf and fountain.
- 17 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200. for the control of blister rust.
- 18 To see if the Town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the State Head tax and to fix the amount thereof.
- 19 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500. for support and maintenance of the Nichols' Memorial Library.
- 20 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250. to repair or replace culvert on Kelsea Avenue.
- 21 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the plan adopted in 1952 extending to the employees of the Town the benefits of the Federal Social Security Act and to return the amount raised to the general funds of the Town.
- 22 To see if the Town will choose an agent or agents to care for the Fountain at Center Harbor Village.
- 23 To see if the Town will choose a committee to take care of the Wharf and make regulations for same.

- 24 To see if the Town will choose an agent or agents to care for cemeteries throughout the Town.
- 25 To choose a Road Agent for the Town for the ensuing year. (By Petition.)
- 26 To choose agents or committees in relation to any article in the Warrant and hear any reports of any heretofore chosen.
- 27 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## Report of Forest Fire Warden

---

Once again we are about to enter another forest fire season and once again, your Town Forest Fire Warden is asking you to be careful of fires in our woodlands and along our roadsides. There is nothing more displeasing to the eye than an area of blackened waste. Nine out of ten of these blackened areas are caused by You and You. It is only with your cooperation that we can prevent such an area in our town. A great part of the men and women of this area depend on timber for their weekly pay check, and by you and you being careless, these people are being deprived of a living. We can't even try to prevent fires caused by lightning, but the number of fires caused by this agent is very small. It is you as a smoker, as a debris burner—you as a careless person, who can do a great deal in preventing this most shameful waste of our natural resources.

You can help by making sure your smoking material is out—DEAD OUT, your incinerator is air tight, the area around it is cleaned of all burnable material, that you have had it inspected by your Forest Fire Warden, that you have asked for and received a permit to burn from your Warden. By doing these things, the number of fires is going to be fewer and you will have woodlands to hunt in, to have picnics in, to be able to fish the stream. You will also be proud of your green mountainsides. By not doing this, you will not enjoy yourself at all. It is not too long ago that most of us can still remember the fall of 1947, and we all know that most of those fires during that period could have been prevented if everyone was careful. So, it is only You and You who can prevent this most shameful waste of our woodland by this common enemy—FIRE.

Please remember it is a proud record for you to say that my town had no woods fires this past year and it is only through you and you that this goal can be reached. So—please help us to prevent forest fires.

Article 5. The motion was carried to raise \$209. for the salaries of District Officers.

Article 6. The Auditor reported that the school books were accurate. There were no other reports.

Article 7. It was voted that the town Auditors audit the School District Secretary's and Treasurer's books.

Article 8. It was moved and seconded that the school budget of \$21,586.90 be accepted as outlined by the School Board. The vote was in the affirmative.

Article 9. The motion was made and seconded and passed that Article 9 be accepted as read.

A discussion of a cooperative school followed. The matter was left as voted at the 1950 annual meeting, namely, that the School Board act as a committee to cooperate with the Meredith Board. A motion was made, seconded and carried that the School Board be given power to cooperate with Meredith on an elementary level as well as on a secondary level.

Changing the time of the annual School Meeting was discussed, but no action was taken.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 1 p. m.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

---

## The Trend in School Enrollment

Last year my report mentioned the crowded condition of the Center Harbor school, especially in the primary room. A teacher who has 31 pupils in the first four grades cannot give the individual attention that beginners require. Our present enrollment of 61 in the two rooms is an increase of 10 per cent over last year's figure. We are again almost to the point where we may need to reopen the Town House school.

## Possibility of Expansion

No practical plan has been advanced for new and larger facilities for Center Harbor alone. The plan of cooperation with a neighboring district—probably Meredith—would seem to be the best solution. In Meredith, the School Board and a citizens' committee have given careful consideration to the matter of cooperation with Center Harbor. At a recent meeting of representative citizens of Center Harbor and Meredith, Mr. Paul Farnum of Concord explained the provision of the state law on this subject. An article in our School District Warrant is bringing this question before the voters at the 1953 annual meeting, and a similar article has been included in the Meredith Warrant.

## School Marks

The topic, "Methods of Reporting Pupil Progress," has received much attention in teachers' meetings and parent-teacher groups throughout this supervisory union during the past year. An individual conference between a teacher and a parent (sometimes the pupil also being present) seems to be the most satisfactory method of reporting, especially for the lower grades.

In November, a three day workshop of teachers and parents on this subject was held at Ashland. As usual, many questions were raised and few answered at these meetings; but, several points seemed to be generally accepted. A few of these are stated below:

1. School marks (either "A-B-C-D" or percentage) are undesirable because they emphasize unfair competition and create fear of failure.
2. A pupil's growth in learning involves so many factors that it is impossible to reduce it to any single mark, either letter or number.

3. A mark of C may be given by one teacher for a certain piece of work, whereas another teacher might give a mark of A for the same. No clear definition of marks has ever been made that can overcome this difference of opinion.
4. Parents seem to favor having more detailed reports, covering a pupil's growth in character, good work habits, etc., even though the reports do not come so often.
5. Parents are becoming accustomed to the idea of discussing with the teacher the progress of their children. No longer do they dread the teacher's coming, or meet her at the door with the question, "What is wrong now?" A friendly visit to the school by each parent is coming to be accepted as regular routine.

### **Buildings and Grounds**

Our water supply is available from a nearby artesian well through the generosity of Mr. W. Irving Brown, but we have no guarantee that this arrangement can continue indefinitely. Driving a well of our own would be expensive—and if a new school building elsewhere within a few years is possible, it would seem unwise to spend too much on improvements to our present plant.

Our automatic heaters, which we mentioned proudly in our last report, haven't always proved dependable. We hope that the difficulties will soon be remedied and that the thermostats will respond as intended.

Improvements within the past year include painting the upper grade classroom and the kitchen. A room formerly used as a woodshed is being remodeled for a shop or activity room by a committee of volunteers from the P.T.A.

Through the generosity of the heirs of the Dane estate, an enlarged playground has been provided. Before next fall we hope that the new area will be cleared of brush and boulders and made smooth for our use. We appreciate very much this generous gift for the benefit of our children.
