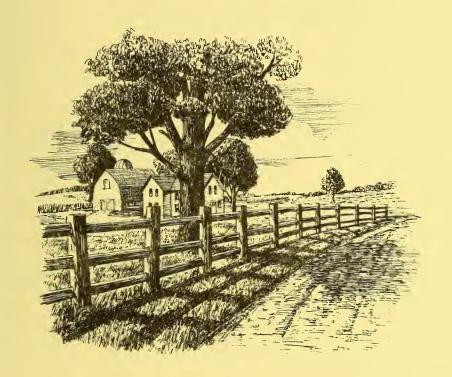

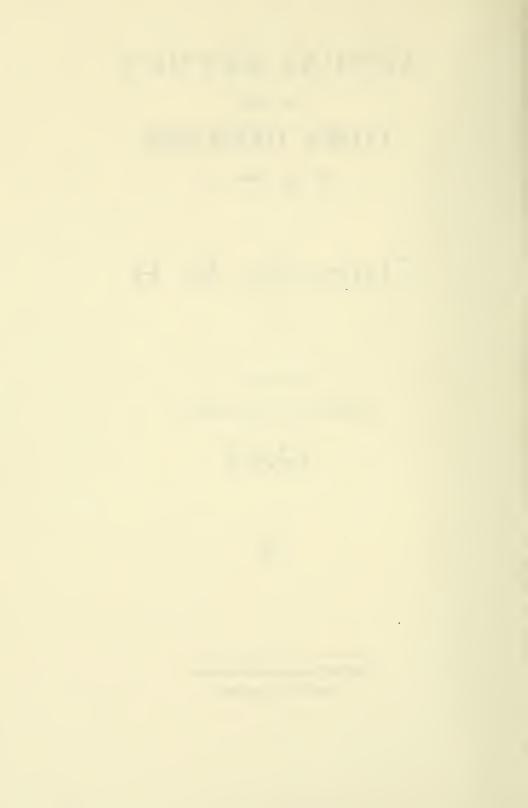

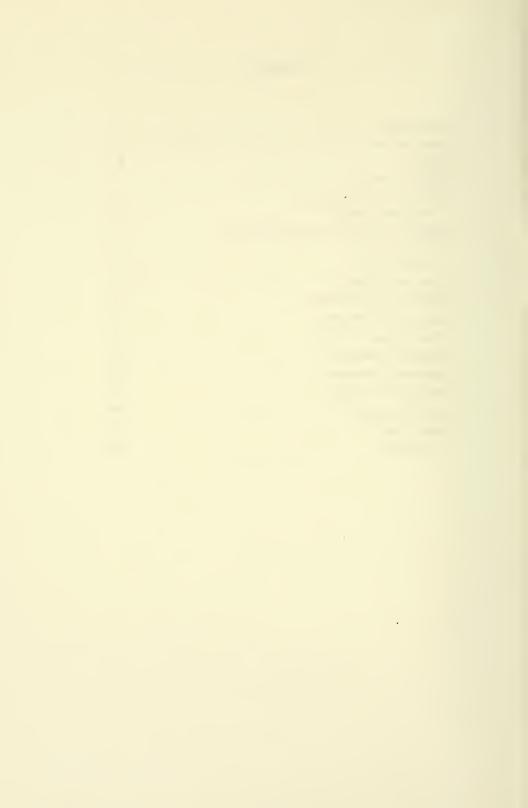

The Polls Will Be Open From 1:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at 1:00 of the clock in the P.M., to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

The business meeting shall begin at 7:30 P.M. in the evening.

- 2. To act upon the following articles in this warrant.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the ensuing year for General Government.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the protection of persons and property.
- To see what action the Town will take regarding the plowing of driveways.
- To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer and winter maintenance of highways.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for general expenses of the highway department and chloride.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for sanitation.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for health.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for welfare.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for interest on tax anticipation notes.

- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum \$400.00 to run the Town lines.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for insurance.
- 15. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for reappraisal of property and authorize the withdrawal of this sum from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 16. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to update the tax map and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 17. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the construction or reconstruction of the Deadwater Stream Bridge, this sum to be used from Surplus.
- 18. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for a new furnace for the Town Hall, this sum to be funded from Surplus.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend such Federal, State, or other governmental unit or private source of funding which becomes available during the year in accordance with R.S.A. 31:95-b.

Motion made by Kathy Keezer that the salaries of District Officers be frozen at the 1982-83 level of \$890. The motion was seconded by Curt Keezer. Vote: 4 yes, 10 no, 1 abstained.

Motion was made by Lucien Fillion to raise \$1,250 for District Officers salaries. Rosemary Schanz seconded the motion. Vote: 13 yes, I abstained.

Motion was made to raise \$75.00 for School Census by Lucien Fillion. Motion was seconded by Rosemary Schanz. Vote: 12 yes, 3 no.

The motion was made by Lucien Fillion to appropriate \$100 for Board of Education Services, \$30 for Treasurer's Bond, \$55 for postage, \$50 for advertising, \$100 for dues and fees and \$300 for miscellaneous. The motion was seconded by Rosemary Schanz. Vote: 11 yes, 0 opposed, 1 abstained.

Motion was made by Lucien Fillion to raise \$6,259 for the Office of the Superintendent plus \$150 for travel expenses. Rosemary Schanz seconded the motion. Vote: 18 yes, 0 opposed.

The motion was made by Paul McKinnon to raise \$12,000 for pupil transportation to and from school. Motion was seconded by Lucien Fillion. Vote: 18 yes, 0 no.

ARTICLE 5. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Peter Foskett made the motion to thank the School Board for the work done. Seconded by Mrs. Foskett. Vote: Unanimous.

Mrs. Foskett made a motion that a committee be appointed to study and look into the feasibility of buying a school bus for Clarksville. The motion was seconded by Rosemary Schanz. Mrs. Foskett offered her services to work on the committee. Vote: 17 yes, 0 against.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

A RECOMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE

On April 26, 1983, the National Commission on Excellence in Education submitted its final report to U. S. Secretary of Education, Terrell H. Bell. The report, now commonly referred to as the "Nation At Risk Report", has rekindled public interest and concern on the quality and status of education in our Nation. The Commission's report gave particular attention to an assessment of the quality of teaching and learning in our Nation's public and private schools, colleges, and universities, and also, to defining problems which must be faced and overcome if we are successfully to pursue the course of excellence in education.

Reaction to the report has been varied and wide spread. In our state alone, three formal studies are presently being conducted in response to the sweeping indictment made by the Commission. Areas being studied are the curriculum in high schools, graduation requirements, the length of the school day, the school year, and the time on task spent on various subjects both in the classroom and on homework assignments.

Although it is anticipated that New Hampshire schools will fare fairly well in terms of the Commission's findings, (recent public reports indicate that New Hampshire ranks top in the Nation in regard to Scholastic Aptitute Tests taken by seniors) there is concensus by all concerned with education that there is a need for a recommitment to excellence; from the parent, the student, the school, the community, and ultimately the nation.

Because of their timely importance and relevance the following excerpts from the Commission's report are presented:

"We define 'excellence' to mean several related things. At the level of the individual learner, it means performing on the boundary of individual ability in ways that test and push back personal limits, in school and in the workplace. Excellence characterizes a school or college that sets high expectations and goals for all learners, then tries in every way possible to help students reach them. Excellence characterizes a society that has adopted these policies, for it will then be prepared through the education and skill of

its people to respond to the challenges of a rapidly changing world. Our Nation's people and its schools and colleges must be committed to achieving excellence in all these senses."

"The task of assuring the success of our recommendations does not fall to the schools and colleges alone. Obviously, faculty members and administrators along with policymakers and the mass media, will play a crucial role in the reform of the educational system. But even more important is the role of parents and students, and to them we speak directly. TO PARENTS: You know that you cannot launch your children into today's world unless they are of strong character and welleducated in the use of language, science, and mathematics. They must possess a deep respect for intelligence, achievement, and learning, and the skills needed to use them; for setting goals; and for disciplined work. That respect must be accompanied by an intolerance for the shoddy and second-rate masquerading as good enough.

You have the right to demand for your children the best our schools and colleges can provide. Your vigilance and your refusal to be satisfied with less than the best are the imperative first step. But your right to a proper education for your children carries a double responsibility. As surely as you are your child's first and most influential teacher, your child's ideas about education and its significance begin with you. You must be a living example of what you expect your children to honor and emulate. Moreover you bear a responsibility to participate actively in your child's education. You should encourage more dilligent study and discourage satisfaction with mediocrity and the attitude that says 'let it slide'; monitor your child's study; encourage good study habits; encourage your child to take more demanding rather than less demanding courses; nuture your child's curiosity, creativity, and. confidence; and be an active participant in the work of the schools. Finally help your children understand that excellence in education cannot be achieved without intellectual and moral integrity coupled with hard work and commitment. Children will look to their parents and teachers as models of such virtues.

TO STUDENTS: You forfeit your chance for life at its fullest when you withhold your best effort in learning, when you give only the minimum to learning, you receive only the minimum in return. Even with your parents' best example and your teachers' best effort, in the end it is your work that determines how much and how well you learn. When you work to your full capacity, you can hope to attain the knowledge and skills that will enable you to create your future and control your destiny. If you do not, you will have your future thrust upon you by others. Take hold of your life, apply your gifts and talents, work with dedication and self-discipline. Have high expectations for yourself and convert every challenge into an opportunity."

Copies of the entire report are available to any interested person and may be obtained in the Office of the Superintendent of Schools.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

School nursing originated in England in the 1890's. It took root in the United States in the early 1900's and was well established by the 1920's. Today, the school nurse is the staff member responsible for protecting and promoting the health of all students. The goal of the school nurse is to maximize each child's potential to learn and to grow by providing the best possible health care. Our school program this year attempted to meet this goal through the use of screening programs, physical examinations, assistance from state and community agencies, immunization clinics, dental programs and parental support.

Dr. Marjorie Parsons again provided professional medical advice as our school physician and Mary Sasser, family nurse practitioner, assisted her.

We expanded our school health program to include a CPR course from the American Heart Association and a Multi-Media First Aid course from the American Red Cross. These courses were offered to faculty members and to students in grades eleven and twelve.

Also new this year was a Developmental Screening Clinic made available through NCES for children four and five years old. The children were tested for fine and gross motor skills, concepts and communication.

NCES was helpful in providing our district with equipment for impedance screening. Robin Henne, hearing consultant, tested the children for middle ear dysfunctions.

The N.H. Lung Association made available a program for high school students that pointed out the hazards of smoking. Different bodily functions were measured before and after smoking to show the effects of that activity. Mr. Pinci, our science teacher, conducted the program.

The American Cancer Society sponsored their Great American Smoke Out in November. The third grade students enjoyed sending helium balloons into the air. They received antismoking buttons and learned about the risks of smoking.

Our district also began several much needed drug and alcohol prevention programs. The ME/ME Program was designated for grades one through six and the Ombudsman Program for grades seven and eight. Workshops were held for school personnel involved in implementing each program. The ultimate goal of the programs is drug abuse prevention through improving self

esteem and decision making.

The SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving) program was introduced this year. SADD has four goals: to help eliminate the drunk driver and save lives; to alert high school students to the dangers of drinking and driving; to conduct community awareness programs; and to organize peer counseling programs to help students who may have concerns about alcohol. Roland Biron was elected president of Pittsburg's SADD program. State Trooper John Barthelmes was invited to the school to lecture and to present a film concerning drunk driving. Robert Weber accompanied the students to Concord for the state SADD meeting.

The school nurses and the Staff Development Committee organized a Nutrition Workshop in May. It was presented by the New England Dairy and Food Council for the purpose of developing nutrition programs in the classrooms, grades K-12. Teaching kits were provided to the teachers who attended the workshop.

The State Department of Education required each child entering school to be completely immunized. Tuberculin testing, however, was no longer deemed necessary by the state due to the low incidence of tuberculosis in our area.

In closing, I wish to thank all those in the community who have helped me make this such a successful year.
