SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This past year, 1984, was the 200th Anniversary of the establishment of the Town of Dalton. We would like to acknowledge this celebrative event before continuing with our report.

A very special thank you to John York, Chairman, and to all the people who served or assisted the Dalton Bicentennial Committee. We would also like to extend a well deserved thank you to the volunteers who worked painting the Town Hall. The Bicentennial Celebration turned out to be a superb event and we believe the Town of Dalton should be very proud of all those who were involved in making it a true success.

Due to bad weather during the past year, major road repairs have had to be done to the Blakeslee Road, Harriman Road, French Road and the Simonds Road. Additional repairs will remain a priority during the oncoming year.

The Highway Department experienced numerous equipment failures resulting in major repairs to both dump trucks. This is reflected in the increased amount of funding in the General Highway Expense Budget. At the present time, the heavy equipment has been checked out and repaired by a certified diesel mechanic and we believe all the equipment to be in good shape. With this in mind, no increase has been made in this budget item from the 1984 amount.

Due to the Revenue Sharing Article passed at last year's Town Meeting, the Town Hall's heating system has been converted to a four-zoned hot water system. We hope this will prove to be more efficient.

The Town of Dalton applied for and received a Federal Grant in the amount of \$15,000 for a housing feasibility study. Included in this grant were funds necessary to complete the Sewerage Study project of 1979. Results of these studies will give us a platform to apply for further grants in both these areas.

General Assistance Guidelines were updated during this past year clarifying actions and responsibilities of the town in this area.

The Revenue Sharing Funds were placed into Certificates of Deposits, resulting in additional earned interest.

This past fall, the State Bureau of Solid Waste Management notified the Dalton Board of Selectmen to close out the old section of the town dump within 30 days or they would take the town to court in violation of regulations. We were instructed, also, to stop open burning. We have complied with their orders to close out the old section and they have both inspected and approved of this action. We are still working on a solution to the problem of open burning.

Working with the town's Tax Maps and records during this past year has revealed numerous errors. During conversations with the company who made the maps, we found that there should have been an open hearing held upon their completion in 1980 and that the maps were not updated for the years of 1981 and 1982. An article has been put into the warrants to correct these areas.

The following items have also been added into the warrants for this coming year:

1) Purchase of either a 2-wheel or a 4-wheel drive truck to be purchased with only Revenue Sharing Funds or combined Revenue Sharing Funds plus a note.

2) Purchase of a local sand pit within the Town of Dalton in order to cut down on the overall expense of purchase and transportation of sand from Twin Mountain.

3) Spend \$1,500. from Revenue Sharing Funds to do the necessary updating of the tax maps, hold an open hearing to ensure corrections and to put present card system into a computer printout system.

4) Requesting Revenue Sharing Funds to purchase the copy machine presently being rented on a monthly basis.

5) Request to raise a percentage of total funds necessary for the re-appraisal of the Town of Dalton within the next three (3) years.

The following items are some of the goals we have set for 1985:

1) High on our list of priorities — Road Repairs! We would appreciate and welcome any and all input submitted to us in this area.

2) Resolve the problem of open burning at the Dalton Town Dump to satisfy both State and Federal Regulations.

3) With the aid of the North Country Council, applications for both a housing rehabilitation grant and a sewer project grant will be submitted to the Office of State Planning. At the present time, the outlook seems to be very favorable for the Town of Dalton.

We are most pleased to announce that the end of fiscal 1984 found us with no outstanding deficits. All notes were Paid In Full and a balance of over \$24,000 remains in the bank. We hope this achievement can be maintained during the fiscal year of 1985.

We wish to thank everyone who has helped and supported us throughout the past year. Your cooperation has enabled the Board to be more effective and efficient in all areas. We truly believe that the Town of Dalton can be progressive while being frugal at the same time.

WARRANT

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dalton on Tuesday the 12th day of March next at 12 o'clock noon to act upon the following subjects. The polls will be open at 12 o'clock and will close at 6 o'clock in the afternoon. The business meeting will be held at the Dalton Elementary School Gymnasium and will open at 7:30 o'clock in the evening.

1. To choose all necessary officers for the year.
2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to issue temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget for 1985 as prepared by the Selectmen and appropriate the amount therein or to make any changes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed at private sale, as the Selectmen, in their discretion, deem equitable and just (R.S.A. 80:42 [land 111]).
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from the State, Federal or other government unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year (R.S.A. 31:95-6).
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,000 for the purpose of purchasing a heavy-duty two-wheel drive truck for the Town Highway Department, with \$2,500 of that amount to come from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve and the remaining \$23,500 to come from funds from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 (federal law).
7. If the above article is not approved by vote of the Town Meeting, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,000 for the purpose of purchasing the truck referred to in the above article, being a two-wheel drive heavy-duty truck.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,000 for the purpose of purchasing a four-wheel drive truck for the Town Highway Department, with \$10,500 of that amount to be raised by notes and bonds and \$23,500 to come from Revenue Sharing Funds, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 (federal law).
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the purpose of purchasing a photocopier, to be reimbursed by funds from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 (federal law).
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the purpose of updating the Town Tax Map, to be reimbursed by funds from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 (federal law).
11. To see if the Town will vote to sell the 1960 International tank truck and put the money in the present Fire Department Capital Reserve Account.
12. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen the right at the end of the year to take what monies are left in the Fire Department Appropriations and put such monies into a Capital Reserve Fund.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase and replacement of Fire Equipment. By Petition.
14. To see if the Town will vote to have the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration conduct a complete revaluation starting in 1987 or thereafter. To establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of conducting such revaluation and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer the fund.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$10,000 per year for the next three years, to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the Lunenburg-Gilman-East Concord Senior Citizens, Inc. To help with the Federal Funding.

17. The town of Whitefield, senior citizens club of which Dalton residents are a part, of the non-profit organization, would like to see, if the Dalton town voters would appropriate the sum of \$400.00 the same as last year, to assist or fund in whole or in part, the Whitefield Senior Center, for the programs for the aging, and the administration thereof, with advice of the State Council on Aging pursuant to R.S.A. 167-A and authorize the withdrawal of the required amount for this purpose from Revenue Sharing Funds under provisions of the state and Local Assistance Act of 1972 (federal law).

18. To see if the Town will vote to approve the purchase of a sand pit, approximately 2 acres, for the amount of \$3,500, to be paid from Highway Block Grant monies.

19. To see if the Town will vote to have school board members voted on at individual Town Meetings.

20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the dedication of certain privately owned roads in the Dalton Ridge Development in said Town, as public roads, to be owned and maintained by the Town of Dalton. The roads are known as Cabot Trail, Kelso Ledge, and Ridge Road (extended), and their current owners are Dalton Gold Mines, Ltd. and David S. Dana. By Petition.

21. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE DALTON PLANNING BOARD – 1984

The first half of 1984 was indeed a busy one for the Dalton Planning Board. There were extra meetings and a hearing in preparation for the final draft of a new set of Subdivision Regulations for the town, and in May, the Board voted their approval. Copies of these regulations are available at the Town Office.

Also in May, Sue Bean, our secretary for ten years, submitted her resignation. Working at night made attendance at our meetings very difficult for Sue, but we shall always appreciate her dedication to the Planning Board. Dick Bowers has taken over Sue's duties as secretary.

Last winter and early spring found the Board working on the latest subdivision ever presented before it. David Dana has embarked on a ten year plan to develop 770 acres on Dalton Ridge, and asked for approval in 1984 of a 138 acre, 14 lot subdivision atop the mountain. He has also added two new roads and improved another road as part of this year's project. After extensive review and deliberation the Board approved this first phase of the Dalton Ridge plan.

In relation to the new roads built on Dalton Ridge in accordance to the engineering plans approved by the Board, the North Country Council held a Subdivision Review Workshop, with on-site inspection of these roads by many area Planning Board members, using them as an example of proper planning and building of roads in a new subdivision.

We approved five other subdivisions in 1984, and still meet in the Selectmen's office every third Thursday of the month at 7:30.

We have no plans to initiate zoning in Dalton, but have enjoyed many discussions on the subject. The input of townspeople on this or any other subject is always welcome at our meetings.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

WHITEFIELD REGIONAL AIRPORT COMMISSION REPORT TO THE TOWN FOR 1984

Nineteen hundred eighty-four was a very exciting and active year for the Whitefield Regional Airport and its Commission. Mr. Donald Herbert moved to Portland, Maine, and resigned from the Commission. The Town of Carroll appointed Mr. Jess Sylvester to the Airport Commission. We look forward to an active and supportive role from the Town of Carroll as well as all towns served by the airport.

In May construction was started on the runway rehabilitation project. Midway Excavators, Inc. completed the superb job ahead of schedule. The resurfacing has greatly improved the runway and makes the airport safer for aircraft.

In March the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission notified the airport that the localizer instrument approach system at Whitefield would be turned off. This left the regional airport with a less accurate and more restrictive NDB approach which would affect safety and severely restrict aviation interest in the North Country. The Whitefield Regional Airport Commission gathered support for repairs to the localizer from citizens of the North Country, politicians and users of the airport.

The New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission refused to ask the Governor's Council for emergency maintenance repair funds. With help from the North Country Council a Community Block Development Grant was obtained for replacement of the approach facility. Most of the local share for the grant came from users of the airport. Construction for replacement of the localizer was started in October and completed in January 1985.

Added to the list of regular corporate users are Bretton Woods Resort and Reilly Tire Company. Corporate Aviation continues to grow at the airport along with an increase in privately owned airplanes being based here. Even an ultralight is now based at the airport.

Gary Sanborn is still selling fuel and renting hangar space and airplanes. Dave Astle gives flight lessons while B & B Aircraft maintenance business is growing.

Nineteen hundred and eighty-five will require the regional airport commission to continue with programs for the improvement and efficient operation of the airport. With continued support from both the business community and the towns served by the regional airport, the airport will be able to support your economic growth and aviation needs. Again thank you for making the Whitefield Regional Airport an active and viable part of the community.

ANNUAL REPORT 1984**

TO: Board of Selectmen & Taxpayers of Dalton
FROM: Bradley Whitcomb, Chief of Police

Gentlemen:

A few years back one of the selectmen asked all department heads to submit their budget requests for the year. To me this should be done each year and not just pick a number out of thin air. Often times I have heard someone ask where such a figure came from. Expenditures for 1984 were \$8,619.67 and we are asking for a sizeable increase for 1985 (\$4,000). The majority of this would go for an hourly increase with the balance for maintenance, education, etc. We have not asked for any increase since 1980 and I do not believe anybody can purchase goods or services for the same price they did 5 years ago.

Ah yes, we all remember the 5¢ cup of coffee (now 35¢), the 30¢ gallon of gas (now 1.15/1.20), the 10¢ gallon of fuel oil (now 1.00), the 2¢ postage stamp (now .22¢), etc., etc. Have you had to hire a carpenter, plumber, electrician, TV repairman, or mechanic lately? Some of these trades have to be licensed and/or certified. Police have to be certified by the state. This is mandated. This means continued education, takes time and time is money one way or another. Now for a breakdown/explanation of our 1985 budget requests.

1. Salaries/mileage	\$10,500.
2. Equipment maint.	500.
3. Education (workshop/seminars)	600.
4. Misc.	400.

1. As stated, no pay increase in 5 years. We believe we should be paid on the same rate as other town employees who receive many other costly fringe benefits. No increase in mileage payments. Only the volunteer fire persons receive less pay. Our volunteer fire persons only get paid in a forest fire situation. They are also being reimbursed for training in certain cases.

2. One half of our communication equipment is 8-10 years old. Recently we have had to have very costly repairs done to make it operable. Radio repairs are currently running \$35-40 PER HOUR.

3. As in any other profession, this is an ongoing necessity. The Training Council and State have mandated almost everything done by police personnel be done by certified persons. We have fallen behind in this item but are in the process of getting it corrected. This is also necessary to keep abreast of the constantly changing laws and decisions being handed down by the court system. You could be in one school or another constantly, however, this will not protect you from CIVIL LIABILITY suits which are more and more frequent.

4. Telephone, dry cleaning, purchase of ammunition, flares, etc., etc., and any other items not appropriate for other categories.

It is said that "If you cast your bread upon the waters, it will get very soggy." If this report has not gotten too soggy, read on further.

A few years back I stated it was a crime the way we treat criminals. This is still very true. We still bear the cost of all this crime in dollars, blood and the inconvenience. The victims are ignored and the criminal coddled and absolved of responsibility for their actions. They keep telling us to rehabilitate the offender even after he has been arrested 16 times. Even if the criminal is arrested and convicted, the same may be sentenced to a relatively short term, if any, in a luxury "detention facility" or a minimum security prison where he/she enjoys probably more benefits and luxury than available at home.

What do we do? We could adopt a better approach to crime control by showing criminals the same kind of mercy they show their victims. We should change our attitude toward crime and see it for what it is: a spreading cancer on society. And like a body cancer, we must excise it through whatever means, however radical, available. We should no longer be soft on crime.

Again the majority of hours and mileage was spent on routine patrol and the checking of property, 250 hours. This is the non-resident benefit and almost all that they receive for the tax dollars they pay. Believe it or not, our non-residents pay 70-75% of the taxes in town. They have no children in our educational system and only ask that their property be intact whenever they can come here for a short period of relaxation. Number two consumer of time was theft and burglary, 154 hours, followed by malicious damage and assists to other agencies with 79 hours each. This past year we had numerous cases of theft, some involving small amounts but a few involved several hundreds of dollars. Assisting other agencies is a common thing as we also received the same courtesy probably to a higher degree and more often. I cannot think of a single time when assistance was asked, whether from a neighboring town or a state agency, when it was not honored. Accidents consumed 67 hours, dog problems 64, H & W (including juveniles) 58, ATV & ATL 25 each, fires 20 and miscellaneous 57 hours. This is a general breakdown of hours (paid) and not audited. As always, there were hours upon hours of UNPAID time expended. Over the past years, we have averaged 80-90 paid hours per month. We would expect to expand on these hours with an increased budget. Also, the public is demanding more and more each year not stopping to think that whatever their request, is going to take time and time is money. Think about it when you get angry at something or someone and demand that the police be immediately available and we are supposed to cure all ills. This is just not a fact. We like our job but still must have the same R & R you have along with making our monthly payments and keep our sanity and family intact. Be reasonable with your requests and demands upon all public servants whether they be local or state or federal agencies. At a couple of "heated" meetings with the selectmen it was suggested that I ought to quit or maybe we needed more help. This was after they received some flak from concerned taxpayers not being satisfied with the way certain situations were handled. It was the result of their having to wait several hours before a police officer was seen. This was not the case as much as a lack of communication between parties involved. As for the need of more help, tell me of any department not being able to use more manpower. It costs money and if it is not available you make do with what you have. Since then we have had an offer from a certified officer to help if wanted. Part of the increase would go for this. Most of the malicious damage and thefts occurred on the "morning side" of the mountain. This is where the extra man resides so I believe he could be utilized very readily. Most people do not stop and remember that we are a PART TIME department and cannot always drop what we are doing and run to their problem. If you, the voters want to have a full time department be prepared to spend \$25-\$35,000. Even then you have no guarantee of a Utopia. Has anybody looked at what Dalton's share of the school budget has done over the same 5 year period????? We have little or no control over this and say very little about it except when we receive our tax bills and when we read the annual report. However, we do not hesitate to spend several hours to trim our locally controlled budget 50 or 100 dollars and in the process cut the legs out from beneath our help.

We thank you for past support and hope to enjoy the same and more in the coming months both financially and morally.

Enough of the "soggy bread," I leave you with this little thought — "Learn to keep alive in your heart that little spark of celestial fire "Conscience." (Quote from George Washington.)

Annual Report for Year Ending December 31, 1984

A total of 41 calls were received and responded to, as well as 9 standbys. The standbys were mutual aid to surrounding towns.

In the last 10 years our calls have increased by over 50%. In 1974, there were 23 calls compared to 50 calls in 1984. With growth and development in the Town of Dalton we can expect more incidents than we have had in the past.

Dalton Fire Dept. has been recognized as one of the best small town fire departments in the North Country and we want to keep it that way. To do so we need help from each and every one of you to do the job.

Remember all the firemen (men and women) are strictly volunteer and every time they are called out they put their life on the line to save life and property for the Town of Dalton.

Fire training continued this past year with pumper operation, hose and fire streams, tanker relays and all other aspects of fire fighting. We have training sessions every fourth Tuesday of each month, officer meetings once a month and regular meetings every second Tuesday of each month.

With continued dedicated support from the community, Board of Selectmen, Ladies Fire Auxiliary, Volunteer Fire Dept., Fire Police and surrounding fire departments, the Dalton Volunteer Fire Dept. is well on its way to becoming a reliable and modern department.

Thank you for making the Fire Department an active part of your community.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

Calendar year 1984 saw the North Country Council, Inc. observe its twelfth year of successful operation for towns in the North Country. The Council, as a regional, non-profit, public planning agency chartered under NH RSA 36:45, is responsible for providing assistance in local community planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation, and municipal services.

In Dalton, we successfully applied to the State for a feasibility study grant to conduct a housing and community attitude survey and to complete an EPA sewage disposal study. The results of the housing survey will lead to an application for federal funding assistance for rehabilitation. We also provided technical assistance to the Selectmen in complying with a State order to correct operational deficiencies at the dump and continue to work on the solid waste plan for the Lancaster Area Solid Waste District.

We worked with the Planning Board in revising the Subdivision Regulations and in reviewing the Dalton Ridge Subdivision. We communicated with the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the State Civil Defense Agency to determine the Town's flood insurance status.

In economic development, the Council hosted in the spring two region-wide economic development conferences with over 200 business, industry and government leaders attending. From the conferences, regional strategies were developed to address such issues as highway improvements, air service, regional promotion, mechanisms for regional communication, development funding, and regional job expansion. As an outgrowth of these conferences, the Council is presently coordinating the preparation of a North Country Videotape project, which, when complete, will examine the potential for industry to locate in the North Country. The Videotape will be available to Chambers of Commerce, local development corporations, and municipalities in order to promote their communities to businesses looking to expand or relocate in the North Country.

The Council has provided information and guidance to several towns on federal and state grant and loan programs. This past year saw well over \$2.0 million in Community Development Block Grant funds come to the region for such activities as housing rehabilitation, water and sewer system improvements, a downtown revitalization study, an industrial park feasibility study, and business revolving loan funds.

Community planning assistance has emphasized master planning and improvement in local land use controls. New state mandates and commercial and residential growth in several towns have created busy work loads for planning boards. The Council's assistance takes many forms: regional workshops, newsletters, regulation review and update, and assistance on a regular or one-time basis for subdivision and site plan applications. Subdivision review workshops were held in Littleton, Campton, and Dalton and we co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture Series in Twin Mountain.

Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems. We rely on and appreciate the involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

DALTON TOWN REPORT

Public Health Nursing Service has continued to serve the Town of Dalton since March 1983. The visiting nurse is available Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on a regularly scheduled basis and evenings and weekends when special arrangements are made.

Skilled nursing visits include such activities as dressing changes, injections, colostomy care, blood pressure checks and health teaching.

Home Health Aides perform such functions as assisting with bathing, shampoos, or following a treatment plan established by the physical therapist, under the supervision of a registered nurse. In our new program, the Homemaker, under the supervision of a registered nurse, assists with housekeeping, laundry, shopping and meal preparation. Most recipients are elderly, and there are medical reasons for needing such assistance.

Children enrolled in our Well Child Clinics, receive physical examinations, immunizations and dental care. Blood pressure clinics are held monthly.

A total of 8,079 visits were made during 1984 to the six town area served by our Agency.

The continued ability of Public Health Nursing Service to meet the health needs of our communities is dependent on the contributions of time, effort and appropriations to the Agency from the communities served.
