PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note.

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple—

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
 - 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
 - 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles—use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home—Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dublin qualified to Vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 8, 1960 at eleven o'clock in the Forenoon (polls will be open from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m.) to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Water Commissioner, Library Trustee, Trustee of Trust Funds, member of the Cemetery Committee, and member of the Planning Board.
 - 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers.
- 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote(s) relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by tax deed.
- 6. To see if the Town will accept certain trust funds for the care of cemetery lots.
- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for Town Road Aid.
- 8. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray charges for the ensuing year and for any other purposes mentioned in the Town Budget.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town Hall repairs and improvements or take any action relating thereto.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the improvement of certain land purchased from Mrs. Halldis Prince for Cemetery purposes.

- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the clearing and construction of fire holes or take any action relating thereto.
- 12. To see what sum of money shall be raised and appropriated for new road construction or take any action relating thereto.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for a new road brush, and/or road maintainer, or what action it will take in this regard.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to the Capital Reserve Fund.
- 15. To see what action the Town will take with regard to the following Zoning Ordinance:

To promote the health, safety, and general welfare of the community; to promote efficiency and economy in the development of the community; to promote safety from fire, panic and other dangers; and to promote the preservation of the rural charm of the community by good civic design and arrangements as well as wise and efficient expenditures of public funds, the following Ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of Dublin pursuant to the authority conferred by Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated.

A. Establishment of Districts

For the purpose of this Ordinance the Town of Dublin shall consist of one district including the entire area of the Town.

B. Commercial Junk Yards

No land in the Town shall be used as a commercial junk yard for the storage and sale of metal junk, scrap paper, rags or discarded materials of any kind.

C. Signs

No outdoor advertising sign or structure shall be permitted on any tract of land in the Town except:

- 1. A sign shall be a permitted sign which either identifies the premises or the occupation of the owner or occupant of the property on which it is placed; pertains to the sale or lease of the property on which it is placed; or advertises products or goods raised or made in the Town or some other business or service establishment located and operated within the Town.
- 2. A maximum of four such permitted signs with an area of not more than twenty-five square feet each shall be allowed within the Town for any permitted purpose, but not more than two of such signs shall be placed on a tract of land other than

the tract owned or occupied by the person maintaining the signs.

D. Drive-in Theatres

No land in the Town shall be used as a drive-in theatre.

E. Industry

No land in the Town nor any new buildings hereafter erected thereon nor any old or new buildings hereafter altered thereon shall be used for any industrial purpose unless, if ten or more employees including the officers and directors are at any time employed, permission is granted by vote of the Town at a meeting duly warned and held. Industries employing less than ten may at any time request permission to operate with more than ten employees. For the purposes of this Ordinance, a use for an industrial purpose shall include any use pertaining to the manufacture, processing or storage of goods, products or materials, other than agricultural, for sale or distribution partly or wholly at wholesale.

The Selectmen shall not be required to call a Town meeting for the above purpose unless it is satisfactorily proved to them that the industry will meet the following requirements:

- 1. Its building and all of its industrial activities will be located at least sixty feet from the nearest line of any public highway and not less than twenty feet from each side line and the rear line of the property on which it is located.
- 2. Adequate off-street parking facilities will be provided for freight and delivery trucks and for employee parking.

F. Industrial Operations

No industry, regardless of the number of employees, shall be operated in the Town in a manner which is offensive by reason of the emission of smoke, dust, gas, noise, odor or fumes, or which results in contamination or pollution of the air, soil or water.

G. Mobile Homes, Trailers and Trailer Parks

- 1. **Definitions**: For the purposes of this Ordinance, the following definitions are adopted:
 - (a) a trailer means a vehicle or similar portable structure having no foundation other than wheels, jacks or skirting, and having any, all or none of the following: running water, sanitary facilities, bath facilities and toilet.
 - (b) a trailer park means a plot of ground upon which two or more trailers are parked and occupied for living purposes, regardless of whether or not a charge is made for such accommodations.

- 2. A trailer park may be established on any tract of land within the Town.
 - (a) provided that no trailer shall at any time be located on the tract at a distance of less than three hundred feet from any dwelling house on an adjoining tract of land or at a distance of less than three hundred feet from any public highway, and
 - (b) provided further that all laws of the State and all regulations of the State Department of Health applicable to the operation of such parks are complied with.
- 3. No commercial exhibition for the sale of two or more trailers shall be allowed on any land within the Town.
- 4. The owner of any tract of land within the Town or anyone permitted by him to do so, may locate on that tract a single trailer for his own use and occupancy and that of his family.
 - (a) for a period of not exceeding ninety days in any twelve month period, and
 - (b) for a period beyond ninety days, provided, at the expiration of ninety days, he shall have begun the construction of a permanent home on the tract, or he shall have placed such vehicle upon a permanent foundation and shall have complied with all laws of the State and all regulations of the State Department of Health applicable to trailers when located in a trailer park. No such single trailer shall at any time be located, either temporarily or permanently, at a distance of less than one hundred feet from any public highway.

H. Commercial Residential Subdivisions

The owner of any plot of land intended for development or subdivision into residential building lots shall file with the Planning Board a plan or map of the proposed subdivision and shall obtain the approval of the Planning Board thereon before proceeding with the development or sale of lots in said subdivision.

It shall be the duty of the Planning Board to inspect the site of such proposed subdivision and to require that each building lot shall have an area of at least one half acre and that provision be made for such roadways and other areas for common use as will eventually be acceptable by the Town. When satisfied that the proposed plans meet these requirements and are in harmony with and conducive to the general welfare of the Town and the neighborhood, the Planning Board shall approve the plans but in no sense shall this approval be deemed an acceptance by the Town of the street or streets shown on the plans.

I. Non-Conforming Uses

Any lawful use of land or of a building or part thereof at

the time of the adoption of this Ordinance may be continued although such use does not conform to the provisions of this Ordinance.

No present non-conforming use of land or of a building or part thereof may be hereafter changed to another non-conforming use.

No present non-conforming use shall be extended or enlarged beyond the limits or area occupied by such non-conforming use on the effective date of this Ordinance.

J. Board of Adjustment

The Selectmen shall make the initial appointment of a Board of Adjustment of five members, one for a term of five years, one for a term of two years, one for a term of two years and one for a term of one year, each term to expire on Town Meeting Day in each year and each member to serve until his successor is elected and without compensation. After the initial appointment of a Board of Adjustment, upon the expiration of the term of any member of the Board, or in the event of a vacancy in the membership of the Board, a successor shall be elected in the same manner as other officers of the Town at the next Town Meeting.

The Board shall have the authority granted to it by statute but when an objection is raised by a majority of the owners of property within a radius of five hundred feet of the property as to which a variance is sought, the Board shall hold a public hearing to receive evidence on both sides and shall have authority to decide whether to exercise its powers and to grant a variance only after such public hearing.

K. Penalties

Whoever violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of such violation.

L. Enforcement

Upon any well-founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

M. Saving Clause

The invalidity of any section or provision of this Ordinance shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof.

N. Amendments

The provisions of this Ordinance may be amended or changed at any regular or special Town Meeting by a majority of the voters present and voting except in those cases where a larger vote is required because of a protest against a change as provided by statute. No amendment or change in this Ordinance shall be considered at any Town Meeting unless the provisions of the proposed amendment have been included in the Warrant by which the Town Meeting is warned.

O. Effective Date

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

During the year 1959, all roads were dragged and scraped several times, ditches cleaned, leaves removed from culverts and ditches. Due to heavy summer traffic dirt roads required more treatment than in the past, especially scraping. All roads received gravel surfacing where necessary.

The damage on Monument road from beaver was considerable as the culverts and brook overflowed washing out road several times necessitating gravelling and installation of extra culverts to take care of the water. Other roads suffered from same cause and had to be repaired.

Funds from the special appropriation were spent on this road and to repair washout from entrance to Haskins to the Meadow road. Gravelled this road also.

The corner on Upper Jaffrey road near Metevier residence was widened, trees cut, road gravelled and banked to prevent further accidents there. Culverts were installed at corner of Catholic Church road toward Fairfield residence, and another between there and McKenna residence, road gravelled and tarred this area. Funds used from the above appropriation.

On the road between Blount corner and Hollingsworth road culverts were installed to drain ditches and road gravelled.

Tarred road from Brown's Cove to Brook drive, and road from Brook drive to Golf club, raked shoulders and road regravelled and two applications of tar applied. This road now completed. Tar patched all roads where needed. Walker road tarred also part of Old Harrisville road.

This year the TRA funds were expended on the Goldmine road which was completed from road near Latti hill to Bonds Corner road bridge. Next year this road should have another coat of tar.

Heavy rains this fall completely washed out the Troy road near Rev. Weld's residence necessitating rebuilding part of same, also Old Marlboro road washed badly in spots, several other minor washouts occurred also. All roads were gravelled and culverts replaced or repaired where necessary.

All roads plowed, sanded and salted during winter.

The members of the Highway Department, workmen, and I, thank the voters for their co-operation and assistance during the year.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF THE CEMETERY

There were nine burials in the Dublin cemetery during 1959, two of them cremations.

The sale of burial lots returned \$170, and \$400 was contri-

buted for the use of two Perpetual Care lots.

Much pleasure was expressed by our many citizens who used the newly installed water supply for the first time. Two outlets are now in use and a third is contemplated which would carry water to the south section of the cemetery.

Crushed stone, and gravel have been applied near the main entrance with which to enlarge the parking area. Fallen and leaning gravestones have been restored to place; high winds and winter weather invariably upset some of the older stones. Much needed loam was provided last fall with which to reinforce the sparsely covered sandfill in the lake section.

A new 22 inch rotary mower was purchased in early summer. This machine, together with the smaller 18 inch model, provides

excellent cutting equipment.

The giant old pine, windswept, weatherbeaten, decaying, which stood alone in the lake section, has been cut down and removed. Two young rockmaples will take its place, the gift of Mr. George Davis.

REPORT OF THE DUBLIN FIRE DEPARTMENT

From January 1 to December 31, 1959, the Department answered nine calls. Three of them were for grass fires, and three for chimney fires. There was one call in October for a washout on Route 101, at Brookside House, during heavy rains and flood waters. Other fires were of miscellaneous origin.

The radio system has worked out very successfully, particularly in the case of the aforementioned washout, on Route 101, where the mobile and portable units enabled traffic to continue on without any long interruption.

Because of the change in our telephone system in 1959. (converting from a central office and operators to dial), a complete new system in reporting fires was necessary. Therefore we adopted the red network system. This comprises four phones located as follows: one at the fire station, and one each at the Emerald, Scribner's Store, and Beech Hill Farm. All residents should familiarize themselves with the working of this system. Each householder should have a Dublin Fire Card posted in front of his telephone which gives the Dublin fire phone number in large letters at the top of the card. By dialing this number, all four red network phones ring simultaneously. When a party answers at anyone of these locations, he can press a lever which causes the siren to blow. We tried to locate these phones in as few places as was feasible in order to avoid any unnecessary expense to the town, and yet insure the town's being sufficiently covered day and night. Another siren or air horn should be installed in the lower section of town. The Bond's Corner area would be desirable and would serve the eastern part of town. The expense would be small. The personal phone numbers of the Fire Chief and Fire Wardens are also listed on this card in case of a failure of the red network system. These cards can be procured at the Emerald, Scribner's, or the IGA Store.

Your fire department now consists of thirty-six officers and members who are at your service twenty-four hours a day, three hundred sixty-five days of the year. We run a check on all fire department radios every Sunday at 11 a. m.; through our Mutual Aid System of Southern New Hampshire and Vermont.

When the Town House was being reshingled this past year, the large siren was transferred from the back of the building to the ridge of the roof, which makes it much more efficient.

We were truly fortunate in not having had many fires during 1959 and trust that we may be as lucky in 1960. The easiest way to fight a fire is to prevent it.

Work on the improvement of the town's fire holes got off to a good start this past year. Brush has been cut away and the holes deepened with the help of a bull dozer, making access to water more easily available. I hope that with another appropriation in 1960, we shall be able to complete this work.

To the officers and members of the Department who have faithfully served and to the Board of Selectmen whose fine cooperation has been most helpful, I wish to express sincere thanks.

Among the many gifts given to the Library during the past year we are especially grateful to the townspeople for the Bell and Howell movie projector, in honor of Mr. Henry Gowing, a trustee for forty five years. The response was so generous that in addition twelve folding chairs were purchased, and a book fund established in Mr. Gowing's name.

We deeply appreciate the landscaping done by the Dublin Garden Club, and the beauty it has given the building. The gift is in memory of Mrs. J. L. Mauran. We thank Mr. and Mrs. William T. King for the expenses involved in piping the water outside so that the shrubs and trees can be properly cared for.

The library has long needed identification from the outside. We thank Mr. and Mrs. Robert Krogman for making possible the gold colored lettering which is now a permanent addition over the entrance. We also appreciate their gift of a tape recorder.

During the fall months two events which gave pleasure to many adults and children were given by two talented women in the community. We thank Mrs. Mary Walker for giving the basic materials and demonstration on making Christmas wreaths. We thank Mrs. Tudor Richards for the puppet show.

We thank the following people for books and other kind services: Dr. Fred S. Piper, Mrs. Grenville Clark, Mrs. Edith Curtis, Mr. Ray W. Smith, Mrs. C. J. Leonard, Beech Hill Farm Mrs. C. F. Taplin, Mrs. G. L. Foote, Mrs. Grice Kennelly, Mrs. Beekman Pool, Mrs. George Markham, Mrs. Edward Parish, Mrs. Robb Sagendorph, Mrs. Melvin Walker, Mrs. William Walsh, Mrs. Fred Brening, Mrs. Russell Eaves, Mike and Carol Cuddihee, Mrs. George Carr, and Rev. Lyman Rutledge. We thank WKNE for the tape recording of Mr. Hector McCarthy's piano recital over radio.

Educational films have been shown once a month. The average attendance for children has been between twenty five and thirty. One family film, Picasso, shown in the evening last summer, brought out forty five people. The State Library

loaned us an excellent collection of books on the artist's life and paintings. The films have introduced new subjects and all programs have been related to the objectives of the library. As a result the circulation has increased.

A reading incentive program was started last summer. It was not as successful as we had hoped for. We plan to try again this summer and hope for closer cooperation with the school and the parent. The school children are making greater use of the library with required reading and term papers.

We were awarded State Aid Fund money for children's books. Carefully selected books were chosen, and the list sent to the State Library for their approval and purchase. Sixty nine titles have been added from this source. Sixty seven adult books and one hundred and fifteen children's books were added by the town. The Bookmobile has stopped several times during the year and over one hundred and fifty volumes have been borrowed from this collection.

We wish to accomplish these goals for the new year. We need shelves for reference books, and many new basic reference books. The New Hampshire public library standards suggest that a library of Dublin's population be open ten hours weekly. Our library is now open seven and a half hours. We wish to increase the hours to that new minimum. A telephone extension from the Town Hall is recommended. A telephone can add to library service and establish a town calendar so that public events need not conflict.

We have other plans for the new year which do not call for money, but the combined talents and cooperation of the community. Some interesting events already scheduled are: a puppet show by the Girl Scouts, an exhibit of Miss Janet Appleton's paintings, and two outstanding films, Albert Schweitzer, and Our Mr. Sun. National Library Week will be observed April 3—9.

I wish to thank the trustees for the help, support and encouragement they have given me.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the balance sheet of the Town of Dublin, New Hampshire, as of December 31, 1959 and the related statements of revenues and appropriations and expenditures for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

Scope of the Examination

Explanatory comments on the major balance sheet items follow:

Cash on hand and in bank-Treasurer-\$36,821.73. Cash in bank was reconciled with the treasurer's books and the balance per bank statement was confirmed by corresponding directly with the depository.

Taxes Receivable—\$6,925.64. The uncollected taxes agreed with the collector's detailed listing. Approximately 75% of the outstanding property taxes were verified by corresponding directly with the taxpayers.

Capital Reserve Fund—\$1,206.84. The sum of \$1,000.00 was transferred from the general fund as voted by the Town. Interest received amounted to \$8.00. This fund is in the custody of the trustees of trust funds.

Due to School Department—\$32,779.33. The balance due to the school department was computed as follows:

Unappropriated surplus—\$10,513.75. This balance represents the net assets of the general fund as reflected by the books and as ascertained from other sources.

Revenues and Appropriations

The receipts as shown by the records were verified from the remitter in so far as practicable. The total receipts and disbursements as reflected in the Selectmen's books agreed with those recorded in the treasurer's books. An inspection of vouchers and cancelled checks indicated that the disbursements were supported by invoices or other documents and were being properly recorded.

Trust Funds

The balance of cash on deposit in the checking account and in the various savings accounts was confirmed to us directly by the depository. Securities on hand were inspected by us. We verified the dividends and interest received during the year.

The income received during the year on common fund investments was distributed to the various funds included in the common fund on a proportionate basis. Disbursements were made to various beneficiaries of the trusts. The Town was paid \$471.06 as a reimbursement for wages paid on cemetery work. Cancelled checks for these disbursements were inspected by us. There were no securities bought or sold during the year.

Dublin Public Library Fund

We inspected securities on hand and confirmed the balance in the various savings accounts by direct correspondence with the banks. The library trustees paid \$16.45 to the Town of Dublin. This amount was traced to the cash receipts book of the treasurer.

March 10, 1959

It was voted to keep the polls open from 9 A. M. to 6 P. M.

The meeting was opened by the moderator at approximately 11:30 A. M.

The first article to be considered was Article V. The salaries for the 1959-60 school year were moved, seconded and voted as follows: Chairman of the school board \$50.00, each other member \$25.00, treasurer \$50.00, clerk \$15.00, auditors \$10.00 each and moderator and ballot clerks to be paid at the rate of \$1.25 per hour.

Article VI. Moved, seconded and passed that the reports as printed be accepted and filed with the clerk.

Article VII. This article was laid on the table.

Article VIII. Moved, seconded and passed that the school district raise and appropriate \$58,527.00 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

Article IX. It was voted that the school board be authorized to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district such sums of monies as may be made available under the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864 (for pur-

poses outlined under Titles III, V, and VIII thereof) and that the district appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for said purposes, \$200.00 of which amount shall be received as an assessment by the town, and a like amount to be received from federal sources.

The only change in the teaching staff this year is Mrs. Jeanne E. Deschenes replacing Mrs. Pauline M. Jacobs, who resigned as teacher of Grades five and six. Mrs. Deschenes was a member of the teaching staff in previous years.

B. School Program

The school year 1959-60 opened with an enrollment of 110 children at the Dublin Consolidated School. The teaching staff with one exception remained intact. Mrs. Pauline Jacobs decided to retire from teaching, and, although we regretted Mrs. Jacob's decision, we were pleased that Mrs. Jeanne Deschenes was interested in returning.

Although the present enrollment is the largest in recent years, there is no evidence to warrant concern for pupil housing in the near future. Our projections indicate but slight change in the current figures.

During the year new books and supplies have been secured, not only for the purpose of implementing the program as such, but more particularly to better provide for the individual needs of the youngsters at each grade level. Our staff has been particularly conscious of the need for group teaching, not only in reading, but in the other tool and content courses.

The Iowa Achievement Test and the Science Research testing programs were used in our school. These test results are valuable guides in determining areas of instruction in which more emphasis is needed and also as a guide in curriculum development.

On November 11 an open-house program was conducted as a part of National Education Week. Many parents attended and enjoyed the opportunity of conferring with the teachers. We feel that such conferences are important and that parents should make a special effort to closely follow the progress of their children.

This year the school has continued to participate in athletic contests with other schools. Once again we wish to thank Mr. Charlton MacVeagh for the use of the trampoline. These activities are an important part of the school program in teaching not only certain skills but more particularly good conduct and sportsmanship.

Grades 5 and 6, under the supervision of Mr. Christiansen and Mrs. Deschenes, attended Sargent Camp for one week during the month of October. This activity proved a very worthwhile experience for the children and we trust that it will be continued with greater interest by all concerned in future years.

School dances and socials have been held on a Friday night of each month and are very popular with the children. These socials are an effective means of teaching children social graces, and parents should make an effort to attend.

The school has had field trips to the State House in Concord, the capital buildings and the Museum of Science in Boston. In addition the fourth, seventh, and eighth grades made a study of the paper industry through a trip to the Monadnock Paper Mill at Bennington. These trips are a vital part of education and give experiences that cannot be found in text books.

The cafeteria program has operated very satisfactorily under the direction of Mrs. Nellie Crossley, with able assistance from Mrs. Daniel O'Rourke. Approximately 18,000 lunches were served during the past year. The teachers and staff wish to express their appreciation for this excellent program.

Mr. Albert Rajaniemi has done an outstanding maintenance job. We, in the community, can take pride in our school. In the past year we have had many visitors and have received many compliments on its appearance.

The school district is taking advantage of the National Defense Education Act the provisions of which provide matching funds for apparatus and equipment in science, mathematics, and foreign languages. This current year we have limited our participation to the field of science. This program is of three year's duration and will be continued during 1960-61.
