## TOWN WARRANT

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### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown, in the County of Hillsborough, and in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in Goffstown Village on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First—To choose all Town Officers and Agents for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.

Second—To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Goffstown Public Library.

Third—To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and improvement in our cemeteries.

Fourth—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and improvements at the Barnard Playground.

Fifth—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars to purchase a sand and gravel loader with a built in screen, the same to be used for screening and loading sand and gravel for highway maintenance. Agreeably to the petition of Herman G. Hall and eleven others.



Sixth—To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow from time to time, as needed, certain sums of money in anticipation of taxes, not to exceed in total at any time the sum of                      dollars, giving the Selectmen the right to renew said loans in anticipation of taxes as may be found necessary.

Seventh—To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town through the Tax Collector's Deeds.

Eighth—To see if the Town will vote to allow its Selectmen to renew the Bridge note, so called, held by the Hillsborough County Savings Bank, upon which eight thousand (\$8000.00) dollars is due August 1, 1941, at such times as the bank may require.

Ninth—To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class Two Road, known as the Shirley Hill Road, and to raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of One Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty-nine (\$1989.00) Dollars, the State to contribute an equal sum, or will vote to accept State Aid for improvement of Class Five Roads and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred and 19/100 (\$1100.19) Dollars, the State to contribute Four Thousand Four Hundred and 77/100 (\$4400.77) Dollars.

Tenth—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the suppression of the White Pine Blister Rust.

Eleventh—To see if the Town will vote to buy five hundred feet of two and one-half inch fire hose, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Twelfth—To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of the Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Thirteenth—To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid on or before the first Saturday in July 1941, and if so at what per-cent.

Fourteenth—To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a light on Rosemont Avenue, so called, west of the Mast Road, and to raise and appropriate money for the same. Agreeably to the petition of Wilfrid A. Olivier and twenty-seven others.

Fifteenth—To see if the Town will vote to dispense with three road agents and have one road agent. Said road agent to receive a salary of \$1600.00 per year, said agent not to be allowed to own any trucks or equipment directly or indirectly. That the town of Goffstown purchase and maintain a suitable car for said agent, this to become effective at the annual meeting in March 1942, said agent to be responsible for all highway equipment. Agreeably to the petition of Nathan A. Tirrell and fourteen others.

Sixteenth—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen: to (1) accept and improve the extension of Summer street, already built, into the land of A. Kenneth Hambleton, (2) to build extensions to this street to a house or houses when such house or houses are built within this land. Agreeably to the petition of W. H. Marshall and eleven others.

Sixteen and one-half—To see if the Town will vote to correct the dangerous traffic conditions at the corner of

Pleasant Street and South Main Street—by laying out the Entrance of Pleasant Street straight to South Main Street and to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for the same. Agreeably to the petition of Wade H. Knowlton and thirteen others.

Seventeenth—To see if the Town will vote to resurface Warren Ave., so called, and apply tarvia so as to eliminate the rough surface and dusty condition, and to raise and appropriate money for the same. Agreeably to the petition of Charles Hennessey and forty-two others.

Eighteenth—To see if the Town will vote to accept and improve Foch Street, so called, beginning at the Mast Road and extending westerly about fifteen hundred feet, and to raise and appropriate money for the same. Agreeably to the petition of Oliver Boucher and thirty-eight others.

Nineteenth—To see if the Town will vote to accept and improve Edmond Street, so called, beginning at Pinard Street and running northwesterly about five hundred feet, and to raise and appropriate money for the same. Agreeably to the petition of Wilfred J. Cloutier and fourteen others.

Twentieth—To see if the Town will vote to accept and improve Haig Street, so called,—said street begins at westerly side of Mast Road and extends westerly; and to raise and appropriate money for the same. Agreeably to the petition of Zeb. Barry, Jr. and thirty others.

Twenty-first—To see if the Town will vote to accept and improve Louis Street, so called, and to grade and gravel this street. Also to raise and appropriate money for the same. Agreeably to the petition of Willie Denoncourt and fifteen others.

Twenty-second—To see if the Town will vote to accept and improve the westerly end of Libby Street, so called, and raise and appropriate money for the same. Agreeably to the petition of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Bussier and twenty others.

Twenty-third—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor, construction and maintenance of highways and bridges, and all other necessary Town expenses for the ensuing year, including the amount required for Memorial Day.

Twenty-fourth—To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Twenty-fifth—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## RECORD OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

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Goffstown, N. H.—March 12, 1940

Meeting called to order at ten o'clock in the forenoon by Moderator, Alfred W. Poore. Article One of the Warrant read and check list posted. Voted that the polls be now opened for voting. That the balance of the warrant be read and Articles 2 to 19 be taken up and acted on at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, that the polls close at 6:00 o'clock P.M. That our next annual Town Meeting open at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Polls now open for Voting. Blank Ballots counted.

1:30 o'clock P.M. Balance of Warrant read by Clerk. The following officers were elected in open meeting:

Report of Budget Committee was given at this time by Chairman, Raymond C. Greer.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) for the Goffstown Public Library.

ARTICLE 3. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the maintenance and improvement of our cemeteries.

ARTICLE 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for maintenance and improvement in Barnard Playground.

ARTICLE 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars for redecorating the interior of the Town Hall at Grasmere.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to dismiss the article.

ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of not over Thirty-six Hundred (\$3600.00) for the purchase of a new Fire Truck. Voted that the Board of Selectmen, Fire Chief and Fire Wardens' be a committee to purchase a new Fire Truck.

ARTICLE 8. Remarks by Mr. Prugh regarding the borrowing of money in anticipation of taxes and rate of interest paid on the same. Motion made by Mr. Prugh that a discount of 2% be allowed on all 1940 Real Estate Taxes paid by July 1st. Motion was carried. This motion was allowed by the moderator as if we were working under article 19. After some discussion regarding the law on discount on taxes passed in 1875 it was voted to recind the vote on motion made by Mr. Prugh. Voted to recind the vote on discount of taxes taken in 1875. Motion was made again by Mr. Prugh that a 2% discount be allowed on all 1940 Real Estate taxes paid by July 1st. Amendment to the above motion: That all 1940 tax bills on



Real Estate be discounted 2% if paid within thirty days of delivery of tax bills by the Tax Collector. Amend lost. Vote on the original motion was in the affirmative. Returned back to article 8.

Voted to allow the Selectmen to borrow from time to time as needed certain sums of money in anticipation of taxes, not to exceed in total at any one time the sum of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars giving the Selectmen the right to renew said loan as may be found necessary. Said money to be obtained from New Hampshire institutions at lowest rate of interest obtainable.

ARTICLE 9. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town through the Tax Collectors Deeds.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to allow the Selectmen the right to renew the Bridge note, so called, held by the Hillsborough County Savings Bank, upon which nine thousand (\$9000.00) Dollars is due August 1st, 1940 at such times as the bank may require.

ARTICLE 11. Voted to accept State Aid for Class Five Road and raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Forty-seven and 13/100 (\$947.13) Dollars, the State to contribute Three Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty-eight and 37/100 (\$3,788.37) Dollars.

ARTICLE 12. Voted to accept for Town purposes only, the gift of the Bretton Inn lot on Main Street formerly owned by Fred A. Condon and acquired by the donors from his Estate.

ARTICLE 13. Voted to dismiss this article.

ARTICLE 14. Voted to combine Articles 14, 15 and 16 and raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2000.00) Dollars for the purpose mentioned.

ARTICLE 17. Motion made that we raise and appropriate the sum of (\$82,129.06) as recommended by the Budget Committee for Town Expenses. After some discussion this motion was withdrawn.

Voted that we raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-six Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-nine and 06/100 (\$86,229.06) Dollars to defray Town expenses, this amount to include all previous appropriations heretofore raised.

ARTICLE 18. Voted to accept the Printed Town Report.

ARTICLE 19. Voted the Polls be again opened for voting. Polls closed at 6:00 o'clock P.M. and ballots counted.

ART. 4. It was voted that the Precinct raise and appropriate the sum of (\$5,000.00) five thousand dollars to defray expenses of the fire department.

ART. 5. Voted to adopt the reports of officers as printed in the Town Report.



ART. 6. Upon motion by A. Kenneth Hambleton voted that it is the sense of this meeting that the Water Commissioners appoint a Superintendent of Water Works.

Voted that the measurements of the location of the various shut-offs for street mains be compiled and placed on file in the Engine House, that they may be readily referred to in case of emergency.

Voted to adjourn at 8:30 P.M.

## PRECINCT AND TOWN REPORT OF FIRES

1940-1941

During the past year we have responded to the calls for 55 fires, 17 in the Precinct and 38 in the Town.

Precinct: 10 chimney, 3 building, 3 grass, 1 asphalt.

Town: 12 chimney, 10 building, 13 brush, 2 grass, 1 dump.

In summing up these fires we find that the value of property in which fires occurred and on which insurance was paid to be \$336,800, and the insurance on was \$144,300, and insurance paid \$24,470.29 and there was \$6,823.75 paid on contents.

We asked in our report in 1940 for a chance to say "Thank you" for a new truck. At this time we most sincerely do say it. Thank you, and the boys feel the same. By this addition to our equipment we feel that for a town of our size we are well equipped for the present.

We wish to thank the citizens for their co-operation in the past year and at the same time ask for a little more co-operation by not trying to see if they can get to the fire before the apparatus.

Many of the fires this year have been large ones and the Board of Wardens appreciate the work that the firemen have done in trying to control them, and also feel that the town people should do the same when it is considered that all the men are call men and must drop everything at the call for help.

## REPORT OF BARNARD PLAYGROUND COMMISSION

---

The Playground Commission has had an outstanding year. The flagstaff was reset, and the flag has been flown on all legal holidays. The baseball diamond was used regularly, in season, by the High School and Town teams. The children's equipment has been greatly enjoyed.

Through the co-operation of the Red Cross a swimming instructor was at the playground twice a week for six weeks. As many as thirty children participated in these lessons. As the season advanced the water supply diminished and became disagreeable for swimming, showing that it was most desirable to make provision for an ample, free flowing water supply. This has been done. Water was diverted from Mountain Brook, making it necessary to lay 520 ft. of 6 inch Akron pipe. This also provides a good skating area in the winter.

General repairs have been taken care of. A permanent sign was placed at the tennis courts to restrict their use. A tennis tournament was played by the high school students. The American Legion had a Fourth of July celebration and several lawn parties were held on the grounds. The Barnard Playground has unquestionably been visited by many more children this year than in the preceding year.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

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### GOFFSTOWN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

The resignations of Mr. Stanley W. Wright, Headmaster, Mrs. Dorothy Lovell, Music Instructor, and Miss Elizabeth Scribner, English teacher, were accepted by the Board with regrets.

Mr. Wright has advanced to a better position as Principal at Pinkerton Academy in Derry, N. H. Mrs. Lovell is to devote her full time to the study of music. Miss Scribner resigned to be married.

Mr. Alva Z. Allen was elected Headmaster to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Wright's resignation. Mr. Allen is a Dartmouth College graduate and has had four years' teaching experience at Milford and Rochester, N. H. High Schools. Mr. Allen comes to us highly recommended by his former employers. Miss Marion Lathe of Manchester, N. H. was elected as English teacher. Miss Lathe has had five years' English teaching experience at Canaan, N. H. High School. Mrs. Doris Buswell, experienced in music instruction, was elected as Music Instructor.

Due to a large increase in the number of tuition pupils in attendance this last year it was necessary to elect an extra teacher after school opened last fall. Mrs. Elizabeth Graves, an experienced high school teacher, was secured for this position. It is felt that this increase in pupils is a desirable trend and that the additional pupils should bring in sufficient revenue to pay for the extra expense undergone by your School District.

Your School Board has tried to maintain the school property in good condition by making the necessary repairs and improvements. We have been fortunate this year in not having any major catastrophe to damage the equipment.

The White building has been covered with one coat of paint. Also the remainder of the Domestic Science equipment was installed. The school now has a Manual Training and General Shop Course for the boys and a Domestic Science Course for the girls which are equal to any in the State for a school the size of Goffstown High School. The books of the School Board and the Treasurer have been audited by a Certified Public Accountant of Manchester, New Hampshire.

The School Board again wishes to thank the Superintendent, the teachers, and the parents for their co-operation during this year.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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## GOFFSTOWN SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

*To Members of the School Board and Citizens:*

At the end of last school year in June, three of our teaching staff severed their relation with us. Stanley W. Wright, who for nine years had been headmaster, resigned to accept the Headmastership of Pinkerton Academy at Derry. This "professional advance" was earned and merited by Mr. Wright. His capable work and experience here had eminently qualified him for larger responsibility. The congratulations and good wishes of his many friends indicate the place he won here.

Miss Elizabeth Scribner, after two years here as teacher of English, resigned to marry and is now residing in Madison, Wisconsin.

For the Headmastership, Alva Z. Allen of Brookline, Massachusetts, graduate of Dartmouth College and having taught four years in Milford, New Hampshire, and one year in Rochester, was chosen. In addition to the classroom work, he was connected with and promoted many extra-curricular activities. Mr. Allen's "major" is in Sciences.

Miss Marion Lathe, of Manchester, New Hampshire, graduate of New Hampshire University, with five years of teaching experience, was elected to take up all the high school English of five different groups.

Mrs. Dorothy Lovell resigned as Supervisor of Music. Her successor, Mrs. Doris Buswell of Andover, New Hampshire, was chosen. Mrs. Buswell has had experience directing school orchestras and school groups. She is now



in charge of music at Proctor Academy, Andover High School, and Pembroke Academy in addition to our own.

Twelve have dropped out, eleven of them freshmen, so at the present time there are 151 registered. It will be noted that the senior class of this year will be followed by a class of 41, or approximately that on the basis of present enrollment. If the entering freshman class in September, 1941, is as large as that of the last few years (above 50) the approximate enrollment in the high school would be, counting the present classes at the present number (omitting seniors)—41, 43, and 41, with a freshman group of 50, the total would be approximately 175.

At present, however, there are new factors entering in which may tend to reduce the high school enrollment. One is the changing "fare limit" to Bartlett Corner, which will mean for pupils living as most of them do, two fares, or a walk of some distance. This may result in the transfer of some to Manchester. A second factor which may reduce high school enrollment is that more "jobs" will be open to young folks in the upper "teens." While it will affect but little, if any, this present school year, there are "openings" right now, more than the recent preceding years.

Adding the totals for this year for "high" and elementary 163 and 147, there has been a total enrollment of 310. The present total is about 20 less—those who have left or moved away.

A State law requires instruction for "Physically Handicapped" children unable to attend school, but who are entitled to schooling. In this district there is no one who comes within this classification. There are no blind, deaf, or crippled children in this district.

The "Home Economics" course, now in its second year, under the direction of Charlotte Redden, has enrolled 25, four of whom are boys, engaged in the study of "Foods and Nutrition." The equipment is fairly adequate. There are three new electric ranges installed by the Public Service Company, an electric refrigerator, five movable kitchen cabinets, five tables for working space and storage of utensils, two hot water units have been provided, four sewing machines, two electric and two "foot-power," electric iron, cooking utensils, dishes for a small number, two wall cabinets built-in last year.

This matter of choosing and preparing and cooking of foods may seem like a very elementary matter, so elementary that it need not have a place in a school program. "Food" is a fundamental necessity. Even though we do not "live to eat" all must eat to live. Scientists and chem-

ists and food specialists have been finding out many things, many surprising things about various items of food. They tell us about a "balanced diet"—talk of vitamins and calories. When you go to your doctor with a "misery" he will probably ask you what you are eating and drinking. Until recently, tooth paste "ads" shouted that "a clean tooth never decays." That is not true. Decay of teeth is more largely due to lack of proper food. Many young men today, probably from 25% to 33 1/3% of those who want to enlist in the army or navy, are refused as physically "unfit for service." The highest single cause for rejection is "defective teeth." Defective teeth are due principally to a defective diet. We live in a "land of plenty." Seldom, if ever, do we hear of anyone who died from lack of food. Multitudes die because of foods. Recent magazine articles relate almost unbelievable results of experiments upon "run-down" and undernourished people. No, this cooking business isn't a mere pastime but an endeavor to acquaint pupils with materials and means which make for healthier and more effective living.

The "Shop" under the guidance of Mr. Jones has grown in numbers; enrolled this year are 29 high school boys and 8 girls, and 24 junior high school boys or a total of 61. But this growth in numbers has not meant less work or jobs carelessly done. Rather, the number of items made has grown and the quality of performance is of higher grade due to constant insistence of industry on accuracy, and staying with a project until it is completed. The fellows find no satisfaction in any work that falls to pieces before it is finished. Naturally they take pride in a well-turned out table or bookcase or boat or any worthwhile useful article. Interest on the part of the pupils has increased. Recently a visitor was looking around the shop watching the boys at work, asking questions of them now and then. He came to one very busy fellow—so busy he scarcely noticed the visitor—who after being asked a question replied, "Sorry,

sir, but the period is only forty minutes and I've so much to do—" and continued working. The visitor was surprised and amused and found in that a striking evidence of the boy's absorbing interest in the task at hand.

The Commercial Department has had an increase in the stenography and typewriting classes this year. The enrollment numbers 21 in beginning shorthand, 22 in beginning typewriting, and 15 in personal typewriting—a class for those who desire typewriting for their own use, without including shorthand.

Several of these pupils acted as assistant registrars in the registration for the draft last October.

The Office Practice class has had some practical work in the school office, and last fall about seventeen pupils from this department visited a business machines exhibit held in Manchester.

*The Broadcaster*, a school newspaper, is being published weekly this year and is under the direction of the Commercial Department.

Three new typewriters were purchased this year, replacing old ones, and making available a total of fifteen machines. The other equipment in this department is made up of a portable Ditto duplicating machine. It would appear that more and varied business machines are needed in order to give adequate training to pupils desiring this type of training.

Anna Karanikas won first place in the Prize Speaking Contest here last spring. Later she entered the State Contest at the University of New Hampshire. The contestants there were those who had won first place in their respective schools. Anna won first place among these competitors from various parts of the State—a fine demonstration of her splendid ability. Our congratulations again.

Dr. Backus has co-operated again this year with Miss Walker in the work of health supervision. You will find the following report of Miss Walker is indicative of the

varied and various special items that are included in the work in a year.

The age rule for children for entering Grade I is that they must be five years and eight months old September 1, or in other words, must be six years old by the following January 1.

The attendance for the high school last year was 97%—an enviable record. Thirty high school pupils had a perfect attendance for the year.

The attendance for the grades last year:

An average of 94.5%—a very good record.

There has been for years the endless argument about the ways of education—the purpose of education—and the materials to be used. This discussion is still on, and will continue time without end.

A basic frame-work set up in the “Middle Ages” gave rise later to the “Academic” aim centering about Mathematics, Science, languages, and history had for its purpose “fitting” of young people for college entrance. Sounds well, but some open-eyed person dared to mention the obvious fact that not all high school folks go to college, so that these who were and are in the majority were not getting a fair deal on this basis.

As a reaction there came the endeavor to get some “practical” subjects in the curriculum such as “commercial” subjects—typing, stenography, bookkeeping; also manual training and “shops”—cooking and sewing.

Others—agreeing in part with the above ideas—maintain still that the schools are too far “bookish”—too far removed from real life. The “problems” in our books are not the ones they are to meet outside. They tell us there should be a closer correlation somehow of schools and the



actual social and even political matters as they present themselves in any community. These advocates say the schools should not be apart from the community, but an actual active part of the community. Here are some items from the school program in Monroe, Georgia: (1) Students use community business firms to secure job training. Boys work in local garages. (2) Houses under construction become text books for students. (3) Canvass community to discover how many pre-school children are *not* immunized from diphtheria. (4) A free clinic established as an outgrowth of a school project. (5) Community class-jealousies, unsanitary housing, ill-nourished children, famished adults come in for study with a view to improvement of conditions.

Then there are not a few who remind us that all the above pronounced "aims" of education are wholly beside the question, that the sole and fundamental purpose should be the development of personality. Books do not do it, "practical" aspects do not do this, absorption in "social problems" may be helpful in part yet also fails in this fundamental problem, a fundamental for every individual whether he goes to college or stays at home, for everyone no matter where. It is not "book-learning," it is not "marks," it is not in merely being "practical," but something that lies deeper in a human being and directs the outward life in socially useful ways. Personality, we are told, all our effort should be directed to that end. Much truth here.

So what? Well, we still teach youngsters to read and write and spell and acquaint them with the "fundamentals" so-called. There are more pupils than formerly who go beyond high school; we still prepare them for that next step. For those who do not formally go in for higher education we try to train hand and eye and cultivate a bit of skill in some necessary and useful field and give direction. Instead, however, of endeavoring to force all into one mold,

we do try to adapt what we have to offer to the varying needs of pupils. And how they do vary!

The "report cards" now in use give a distinct place for and consideration of desirable traits of character and "manners" if one may use that term. Behavior, attitude toward pupils and teachers and others, consideration for others, willingness to work alone or with others, honesty, reliability—these character traits and expressions are all a part of our task, and not a minor part. "Social adaptation" after all is not merely words. "Personality" is not a figure of speech but something that makes each one of us different from all others. And withal, we remember that our young people are human, as human as the rest of us. They live in a world prepared for them by their elders. What would we say of these young people, were they clearly to blame for the present sad plight of the world!

Schools are not made by "teachers and officers," although they do have an important part. But back of these are the homes, and the parents who earnestly desire the best for their children. And there are childless homes where there is a sincere interest in the welfare of the community's chief asset—their young folks. With all these working together, "good schools" are possible, representing the united effort for a common purpose, and in this community there is this splendid attitude, interest, and co-operation for which I again express my genuine and sincere appreciation.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the School Board and Citizens of Goffstown Town School District:*

Last year at the Bartlett building three teachers were employed instead of four regular teachers and a "special" teacher. It seemed advisable to have four for the current year. Also last year and until Christmas of this year there were three teachers at the Grasmere School. At the holiday vacation, Mrs. Sullivan resigned. Since that time the two other teachers have taken over grades four, five, and six as the number was such as to make that possible. So at present there are four teachers at the Bartlett Building, two at Grasmere, one at Parkers and one at Shirley Hill. At the end of last year Mrs. Grace Rainey who had taught successfully at Shirley Hill for several years resigned. To succeed her the School Board elected Miss Louise Pihl, a graduate of Teachers College at Lowell, Massachusetts, and three years experience. These eight teachers at present are "carrying on".

There were eleven others in Goffstown for short periods. The total tuition due on their account was \$119.

The number of tuition pupils for next year may be reduced somewhat by labor conditions. As matters are at present, there are now more opportunities for work in shops and mills than there have been in recent years. This may lead some members of the upper classes to drop out.

Another item which may cause a number to attend Manchester schools hereafter is the changed fare-limit to Bartlett's Corner. This will mean two fares each way for several as matters stand, unless they walk a considerable distance. To transfer to another school now would mean a new adjustment and possibly confusion and difficulty for some. While the new Public Service arrangement is under way now, probably all will complete the year here. It is hoped that they will.

The total number of children in the district between the ages of 5 and 16 years as shown by the annual school census has been dropping about 20 per year for the last five years. In 1936 the number was 577; in 1940—481.

The Bartlett Building has been used for a number of out-of-school purposes. A clinic for pre-school children is held each month, the naturalization class continues, and some other organizations meet rather regularly. These groups have increased some of the expense items in connection with the care and supervision of the building.

The report of the School Nurse is worthy of your at-

tention which indicates some items of her work at the schools, in homes, and various clinics.

For the continuing cooperation of the School Board and teachers as well as of those outside of official connections, my continuing appreciation.

Arranged for a girl to attend the speech defect classes at the District Nursing Association

Arranged for a girl to go to the heart clinic held the 1st Wednesday of every month at the Balch Hosp.

Dr. Hoffses is the examining physician.

There were 60 home visits made during the school year of 1940. 20 children are taking cod liver oil during the Winter months.

Some of the schools in this Union are taking advantage of the surplus commodities supplied by the Federal Government. Some are enjoying fruit while others are served a hot noon lunch.
