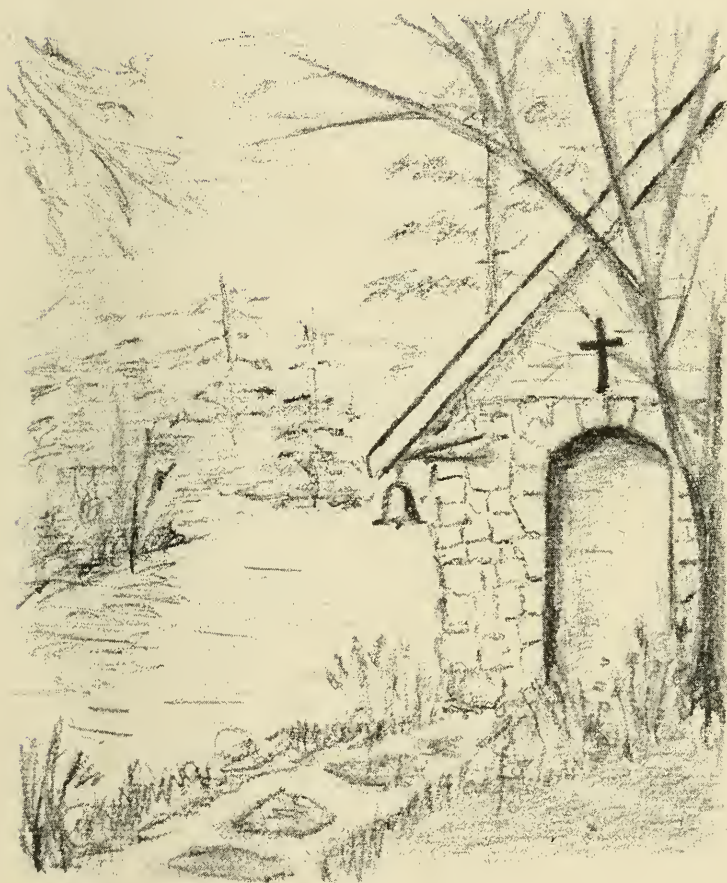

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*Reproduced on the cover is a sketch of The Chapel of the Little Gate to the City of Gladness. On behalf of the Town of Hampton Falls the Board of Selectmen dedicates this year's Town Report to the memory of Miss Frances Healey, who with her father built the Chapel on the bank of the Hampton Falls River.*

*The picturesque Chapel was consecrated May 30, 1927, by Bishop Dallas and has been a place of pilgrimage ever since. There have been several baptisms, confirmations, and marriages in the Chapel, and it is open to all at all times for prayer and meditation. The crucifix on the altar was brought back from Spain at the turn of the century. The tile of St. Francis and the Wolf is a very old one from Bugio. The pewter candlesticks and almsbasin came from an old English chapel. The old ship's bell outside hung for years over an ancient Bermuda mansion, and the lignum vitae relief of Our Lord was carved in Peru.*

*Miss Healey was born in Hampton Falls on the Fourth of July, 1886, the daughter of George and Harriet Dodge Healey. She was graduated from Wellesley College and travelled extensively throughout the world. She was renown for her countless active interests — her sheep, her loom, her bees, her garden, her writings, and especially her church.*

*Upon her decease, Miss Healey bequeathed to the Town of Hampton Falls the sum of Five Thousand Dollars, the interest to be used for books, in memory of her father, George Clifford Healey.*

## MINUTES OF THE 1963 TOWN MEETING

---

Hampton Falls Town Meeting was called to order at 3 o'clock in the afternoon by the Moderator, Richard Bohm, who read the warrant. Ballots were counted and at 3:25 the polls were declared open. Supervisors certified the checklist contained 498 legal voters.

The Moderator call the meeting to order at 7:30 and the flag saluted.

The Moderator ruled "Once an article taken up in the Budget or Warrant is finished, no further action may be taken on it, with the exception of one reconsideration in case of error or misunderstanding."

2. "There will be a limit of two (2) amendments to any article or any motion on part of a specific article."

3. Any lengthy motion will be submitted in writing to the Moderator."

As the Warrant was read in its entirety at 3 o'clock it was not read again at this time.

Article 2. A motion was made by George Pond that items listed in the budget that are special articles in the Warrant be omitted at this time, namely Fire Department, Care of Trees, Town Road Aid and Advertising and Regional Association. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Motion Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, Seconded by Ralph Farley to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Town Officers Salaries. Carried.

A motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for Town Officers Expenses. Carried.



Motion was made to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for Election and Registration Expenses by Robert Weaver. Seconded by Arnold Rasmussen. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Expenses of Town Hall. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Employee's Retirement and Social Security. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Motion carried.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Ralph Farley the sum of \$700.00 be raised and appropriated for Police Department. Carried.

Motion was made by George Vigneau, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$658.00 for Insurance. The additional \$58.00 over the amount requested in the budget to cover cost of increasing the coverage of the insurance on the Library from \$13,000.00 to \$20,000.00. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by George Pond to raise and appropriated the sum of \$500.00 for Damages and Legal Expenses. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, Seconded by Lillian Walker to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 for Health Department. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for Vital Statistics. Carried.

Motion was made by William Wagner, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$130.00 for Beacons. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Edward Pevear, Seconded by

Winthrop Story to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Town Dump. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Town Maintenance, Summer. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Town Maintenance, Winter. Carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley, supported by Oakes to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for Street Lighting. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for Tarvia. Motion carried.

Motion was made by George Vigneau, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Libraries. Carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Town Poor. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, Seconded by Joseph Oakes to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for Old Age Assistance. Carried.

Motion was made to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165.00 for Memorial Day and Veterans Association by George Merrill, Seconded by Arthur Huddell. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Parks. Seconded by Robert Walker. Carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$475.00 for Cemeteries. Carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Swain, Seconded by

Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52.00 for Town Clock.

Motion was made by Wesley Powell to amend the motion, that the Board of Selectmen be empowered to use from the 1963-1964 balances sufficient funds to put the clock in repair. Seconded by John Trumbull. Amendment carried. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, Seconded by George Stard to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Interest on Temporary Loans. Carried.

Motion was made by George Merrill, seconded by Alphonse Lemire, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 for County Taxes. Motion carried.

Motion was made by George Merrill, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise the sum of \$94,407.24 for School Taxes. Carried.

ARTICLE 3. Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Edward Pevear to adopt Article 3 as read. (Town to contribute \$1,752.67 Town Road Aid). Carried.

ARTICLE 4. Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, Seconded by Edward Pevear to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,012.56 in payment for services to the Town of Hampton Falls by the Hampton Falls Volunteer Fire Department. Carried.

ARTICLE 5. Moderator declared a recess at 8:38 o'clock for the purpose of the third Zoning Hearing.

Meeting was called to order at 10:09 P.M.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Ralph Farley to adopt the Revised Zoning Ordinance recommended by the Planning Board by a Yes or No secret ballot.

Motion to amend by Russell Merrill, Jr., Seconded by Edward Pevear the check list be used. Amendment carried.

Motion by Richard Swain, Seconded by Joseph Oakes the polls be closed at 10:18. Motion carried. Polls were declared closed.

Motion was made by Lillian Walker to adopt the Revised Ordinance recommended by the Planning Board. Seconded by Winthrop Story.

Motion to amend the motion by Lillian Walker to limit the debate as of 10:46. Seconded by Robert Walker. Carried.

Motion was made by Wesley Powell to amend Section 6B to read — Discontinuance. If a nonconforming use is discontinued for more than 5 years, any use to which the land, building or structure is subsequently put shall be according to the stipulations of this ordinance. Seconded by William Marston. Amendment carried.

Motion by Wesley Powell to amend Section 3A under Article IV Signs—to include: This section shall not be deemed to interfere with present signs or present usage of property for signing in the Agricultural-Residential Zone. Seconded by James Elton. Amendment carried.

Motion was made by Deane Parrish to amend Article III section 4C by striking Height Requirements. Seconded by Cynthia Trumbull. Amendment did not carry.

Motion was made by William Marston to amend Article III by striking Section 6 C and D. Seconded by William Wagner. Mr. Wagner withdrew his second. Seconded by Russell Merrill, Jr. Amendment did not carry.

Motion was made by Arthur Pell, Seconded by Donald Alston to amend Article V section 2A-2 to read “the structural alteration or restoration, moving or demolition of any building, structure or part thereof,” etc. Amendment carried.

Motion was made by Wesley Powell, Seconded by

Lillian Walker to amend Article 8, section 1 by deleting "lawfully adopted rules, regulations or" and inserting "laws and/or" to read "Whenever the requirements of this Ordinance are at variance with the requirements of any other laws and/or ordinances, the most restrictive, or that imposing the higher standards shall govern. Amendment carried.

Motion was made by Wesley Powell, Seconded by John Trumbull to strike out Article 9, section 1 definition Home Occupation in its entirety. Amendment carried.

Motion was made by Wesley Powell, Seconded by Harold Tanner to amend Article 9 Section 1 to strike the definition Sign, Advertising. Amendment carried.

Amended of Mrs. Walker, Second of Mr. Walker withdrawn.

Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Ralph Farley that when this meeting be adjourned, it be adjourned until 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Motion was made by Marjorie Davies to amend the motion to adjourn until Wednesday night. Seconded by John Trumbull.

Motion was made by Russell Merrill, Jr., to adjourn until 7:30 Saturday evening. Seconded by John Trumbull. Carried.

ARTICLE 5 passed as amended 111 for, 49 against.

Moderator ruled "No other action on warrant would be taken up at this meeting.

Ballots were counted and 267 were found to have been cast with the following results:

March 16, 1963. Hampton Falls adjourned Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator Richard Bohm. The Flag was saluted by the assembly.

Moderator reread his rulings regarding action on articles in the warrant and amendments.

ARTICLE 6. Motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by Donald Janvrin to adopt the article as read. Motion carried.

Hearing was declared at 7:35 for the purpose of discussing the Building Regulations and the Moderator recessed the meeting.

The hearing was declared closed and the meeting called to order at 8 o'clock.

ARTICLE 7. Motion was made by George Pond, Seconded by Ralph Farley to adopt as amended.

Motion was made by James Elton, Seconded by Donald Alston to amend Section VI, 2, by adding "of the part or parts so reconstructed, remodeled or altered." Amendment carried.

Motion was made by Arvid Gustavson to amend Section XI to read "Wherever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute or ordinance that provision which imposes the greater restriction or higher standard shall govern." Seconded by Cynthia Trumbull.

31 Yes 54 No Motion did not carry.

Motion was made to amend Section XII by George Pond, by changing the word "or" to "of" to read: by any court of competent authority etc. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Carried.

Article 7 was adopted as amended.

ARTICLE 8. Motion was made by Ralph Farley,

Seconded by Robert Walker to adopt as read.

Motion was made by George Vigneau to amend the motion by deleting "and by vote fix and regulate his compensation." Seconded by Alphonse Lemire. Motion to amend and second were withdrawn.

Motion to amend by George Vigneau by adding "of town" to read: To authorize the Selectmen to appoint an Inspector of Buildings who shall hold office for a term of one year, and by vote of town fix and regulate his compensation as authorized by Section I Chapter 156, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. Motion as amended carried.

ARTICLE 9. Motion was made by George Merrill, Seconded by Richard Swain to pass over this article indefinitely. Motion did not carry.

Motion was made by Lillian Walker to raise and appropriate, for economic advancement of the Town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in co-operation with other communities, the sum of \$200.00. Seconded by George Stard. Carried.

ARTICLE 10. Motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by Earl Warfield to pass over. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 11. Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,150.00 for a central heating plant for the Town Hall. Seconded by Edward Pevear. Carried.

ARTICLE 12. Motion was made by Russell Merrill, Jr., Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to adopt as read.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by Richard Swain, Any action on this article be done by Yes or No secret ballot. Amendment carried. Moderator ruled the check list was to be used.

89 No 36 Yes Motion did not carry



ARTICLE 13. Motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by George Vigneau to adopt as read. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 14. Motion was made by Donald Janvrin. Seconded by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$479.52 for new street lights.

Motion by Imogen Wagner to raise and appropriate the sum of \$159.12 to install new street lights at the school, the Fire Department and Sanborn's corner. Seconded by John Trumbull. Motion as amended carried.

ARTICLE 15. Motion was made by Donald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 to pay for the printing of the Valuation Books. Seconded by Ralph Farley. Carried.

ARTICLE 16. Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, Seconded by Eugene Heal to adopt as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 17. Motion was made by Ralph Farley to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Brush and/or Poison Ivy removal. Seconded by George Pond. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 18. Motion was made by Eugene Heal, Seconded by Donald Janvrin to pass over. Carried.

ARTICLE 19. Motion was made by Ralph Farley, Seconded by Alphonse Lemire to accept as read. Carried.

ARTICLE 20. Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin to vote the Selectmen and Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Seconded by Ralph Farley. Carried.

ARTICLE 21. Motion was made by John Trumbull, Seconded by Cynthia Trumbull, that Barbara and Dennis Royal be nominated as Hog Reevers. Motion to close nominations by Russell Merrill, Jr., duly supported. Both

motions carried, Barbara and Dennis Royal were declared elected and took the oath of office in open meeting and were presented with the badge of office.

It was recommended by Richard Swain the Highway Agent be instructed to hire equipment and men in town whenever possible. Recommendation seconded by Edward Pevear.

Motion was made by Winthrop Story, Seconded by Edward Pevear the meeting be dissolved at 11:03. Carried.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

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During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.

2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump - its safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.

3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.

4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Lets all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools

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I am pleased to take this opportunity to present my third annual report to School Board Members and voters of Supervisory Union No. 21.

In December of 1963 there were in these eight districts 3,738 pupils in grades K-12 attending schools, and a total of 250 school personnel, including: administrators, teachers, nurses, secretaries, cafeteria staff, and custodians — an increase of 219 pupils over the previous year and a total of 9 additional staff members.

Charts which follow show the distribution of pupils by districts and the number of employees in the several categories in each district.

### Committee of Eight Studies Union-wide Problems

Considerable thought is being given by a committee composed of representatives from each of the eight districts within Supervisory Union No. 21. Mrs. Helen Coorsen of South Hampton, Mrs. Viola Brown of Seabrook, Mrs. Helen Potvin of Rye, Mr. George Miller of North Hampton, Mrs. Carol Cole of New Castle, Mr. Robert Weaver of Hampton Falls, Mrs. Olga Cassassa of Hampton and Mr. John Trumbull of Winnacunnet School Board, Hampton Falls are committee members.

One exploratory meeting was held on January 16, 1964, and the second meeting is scheduled for January 30, 1964.

The Seabrook School Board is working with a building committee to provide classrooms which are needed to house the increased enrollments. Very likely Seabrook will provide for its own pupils in grades 1-8 for several years to come. Long-range plans are uncertain at this time, and additional facilities are needed without delay.

South Hampton has already provided an addition to meet the classroom shortage in that District.

Hampton Falls may be sending, if voters in the districts concerned approve, their sixth graders to the Hampton Academy building on a tuition basis for a period not to exceed three years, while further study is given to possible district reorganization. This interim measure seems to me to be a practical way to hold action in abeyance until the appropriate long-range plans can be finalized.

North Hampton has a conspicuous space problem. A citizens' advisory committee is working cooperatively with the School Board to find some reasonable solution. Possibly North Hampton, Hampton, and Hampton Falls will decide to jointly provide for the junior high grades. It seems to me that such a plan would have both educational and economic benefits to all three districts.

Rye School District is to again consider a building program which, if approved, would provide improved facilities at the Junior High level as well as the additional classrooms needed. It may be desirable for Rye to accept, under some long-term arrangement, seventh and eighth grade students from nearby Greenland.

New Castle seems ready to work out some long-term arrangement with Portsmouth which surely could work to the advantage of both Town and City.

These suggestions record only a few of the possibilities which need further consideration. We shall look to the "Committee of Eight" to make specific

recommendations after giving careful study to this rather involved and exceedingly important matter.

### Foreign Language Curriculum

A thoroughly competent committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Russell Raymond, Principal of the North Hampton Elementary School, is completing a comprehensive statement of recommendations which will lead to the reorganization of modern foreign language instruction within the schools serving the Winnacunnet area. The names of other committee members follow: Mr. Otis Mudge and Mrs. Doris Valley of the Winnacunnet High School; Mr. Albert Belanger of the Hampton staff, Mr. Ronald Pomerleau, who teaches in North Hampton and Hampton; and Mrs. Gail Jenkins and Mr. Charles Coveney of the Seabrook faculty.

The study has been both intensive and extensive with state-wide recognition coming to the Committee.

The recommendations of the Committee are being followed in part this year, and it is expected that there will be full compliance in all districts for the school year 1964-65. Some of the basic recommendations follow:

1. The study of French should begin in grade six and the opportunity should be given to students to continue the study through grade twelve.

2. All pupils in grade six are to have the opportunity to take French if it will not be detrimental to the pupil's effort to acquire the usual skills for the grade. Only those determined to have achieved success in the study are to take it in grade seven. An elimination may take place during the year.

3. Pupils will not be marked with letter grades in French in grade six. A progress report will be given.

Pupils will receive marks in grade seven through grade twelve.

4. Grade six classes will meet a minimum of three 30-minute periods each week and those for grades seven and eight will meet for four 45-minute periods each week. French II, III, IV, V, will meet for five 50-minute periods.

5. The same basic text is to be used in all schools following the program. The basic texts for level one will be those of the HOLT, RINEHART, WINSTON COMPANY —

- a. ECOUTER ET PARLER for book one.
- b. PARLER ET LIRE for the second book.  
French II - LIRE ET ECRIRE

6. All teachers of a foreign language should be specialists in the language.

7. The guide prepared by this committee should be followed by all teachers of French in the cooperative district in order that a proper evaluation may be made in the future.

8. The introductory program is to commence with imitative behavior using the audio-lingual approach.

9. The study of formal grammar or structure does not belong in the audio-lingual phase.

10. The instructors in the language will recommend which pupils will take the French II when entering high school.

11. Pupils entering grade seven who have not had French previously will not be permitted to take French until grade nine.

12. Students should be able to begin a two-, three-, or four-year sequence in high school. Administrators

should discourage students from planning to take just one year of a language. Students starting in high school are more mature and may be expected to have a more concentrated program.

13. The work of level one will have its work divided approximately as follows: Listening 50%, Speaking 30%, Reading 15%, and Writing 5%.

14. Homework assignments should be given for each class period.

15. Language laboratories are essential for high school use. Junior High students will find them of value in working for more precise pronunciation. There are many types of laboratories, and before purchasing one, it should be seen in operation.

Mr. Raymond's leadership and the work of this committee is recognized as professionally significant.

#### Business Administrator Proposed for Supervisory Union No. 21

The work load at the Supervisory Union Office is such that an additional person is needed to effectively attend to business matters. The repair and maintenance work on eleven school buildings requires more supervision than the present staff is able to give. Also help is needed in the interests of business economy to supervise more closely the budgeting-procurement-accounting cycle of school business.

The eight districts served now have more than 3,700 pupils enrolled and about 250 employees, including: teachers, nurses, custodians, and lunchroom workers. The several school boards have studied the staffing problem and, with encouragement from the State Department of Education, have unanimously voted to include an article in the warrant of each separate district.

The State Department of Education has indicated that this Union is high on a priority list to receive \$2,500 annually to be used to help defray the salary for such position, providing voters approve the school boards' recommendation.

The business of Supervisory Union No. 21 exceeds 2 million dollars annually, and the full-time attention of a trained business administrator to serve as an assistant to the superintendent is being recommended as a practical and necessary solution to the problem.

A starting salary of \$6,000 has been suggested with \$2,500 from State funds, and \$3,500 raised through proration to the eight school districts. The cost to each district has been computed to include both the Winnacunnet assessment and the pre-existing district assessment as shown below:

### Achievement Tests of Basic Skills (Grades 3 - 8)

The Iowa Test of Basic Skills provides for the measurement of certain skills involved in reading, work-study, language, and arithmetic. These skills are crucial and determine, to a considerable degree, the extent to which a pupil can profit from continued instruction.

The tests are designed more to measure the ability to apply generalizations than the remembering of them. Thus a youngster must not only know the rules for capitalization, but he must also demonstrate his understanding of the rules by using them.

Teachers use achievement tests to become quickly and dependably acquainted with the educational accomplishments of each pupil. They need such objective information to adapt instruction to individual and group needs.

Another purpose is to supply the pupil and his parents with important information needed in the selection of appropriate educational goals.

These tests also provide school officials with an objective and dependable basis for the evaluation of school and class achievement. We can identify curriculum strengths and weaknesses, and a comprehensive analysis will reveal implications concerning the effectiveness of instruction.

From test results we may measure growth as well as present standing. Two students scoring at the same level may represent quite different rates of growth. It is hardly enough to determine achievement, we must evaluate the achievement in terms of the pupil's capacity. In fact, it would not be especially important to determine present position unless it is considered in the light of other factors. Please keep in mind that achievement test results provide only a partial basis for evaluating instruction as you consider the union-wide averages.

This year's union-wide averages compare favorably with the schools across the Nation which were selected at random to make up the normative sample. Union No. 21 third graders scored on the average above 91 per cent of the schools included in the normative sam-

ple; the average fourth grade score was above the score of 84 per cent of the schools sampled; the fifth grade averaged higher than 88 per cent of the schools; sixth graders out-distanced 85 per cent; seventh graders scored on the average above 83 per cent of the schools; and this Union's eighth grade exceeded 86 per cent of the schools used to prepare the norms.

To bring fuller meaning to these statistics, one should realize that New England's norms are usually higher than the norms prepared for the Nation as a whole. Nevertheless, these scores are very favorable indeed.

All seven communities within Union No. 21 can well be proud of the pupils, and the educational opportunity which is being provided from tax dollars to insure human progress.

#### A Point of View

Increased costs of education, as hesitant as we may be to accept them, are surely to be preferred over the more costly alternatives such as expanded welfare services and penal custody.

Although no single factor can be held entirely responsible for human progress, a quality education made available to youth seems to me to hold great promise.
