

It must be realized that reduction of the funds recommended by the Board of Selectmen will result in a reduction in the level of services to be received in the coming year, and in some instances — a reduction in efficiency.

You are urged to become familiar with the services provided by your community. The facilities and time of your elected representatives and the administrative personnel are always available to assist in the understanding of this most necessary and complex business.

With a budget last year that exceeded two million dollars, with continual rising costs, and with increased demands on our time and money, we must each strive constantly to become and remain accurately informed in order to demonstrate the responsibility that must accompany any democratic system of government.

The Moderator opened the meeting at ten o'clock in the forenoon with the reading of the Warrant (as far as Article 3), and the Return.

The Reverend William G. McInnes, Interim pastor of the First Congregational Church gave the following invocation:

Almighty God, God of our Fathers, our Father: We pray for Thy presence, Thy guidance, and Thy Blessing.

We give Thee thanks for the goodly heritage we have in this great land and this fair town.

May Thy grace direct and empower us to preserve and extend these Thy blessings for the future.

Let thoughtfulness and consideration for others, courtesy and good humor, unselfishness and responsible citizenship prevail amongst us. Help us to remember the children and the youth, the aged and the needy, and when all is done may we hear in our hearts Thy "Well done, good and faithful servants."

In Thy Holy Name. Amen.

Young people from the seventh and eighth grades who assisted with the microphones during Town Meeting were: Gary Caraker, Marlene Cheadle, David Cushman, Richard Ross, Donna George and Charles Pierson.

The Moderator announced rules for re-consideration, and proper working of Motions, and requested that all persons speaking give their names.

Mr. Roland Paige raised objection to the time of closing being set in the Warrant. He felt that the voters should determine the time. Mr. Douglass Hunter made the motion that the polls for Balloting remain open until 8 o'clock in the evening. Seconded. So Voted.

Moderator Langley asked that Attorneys employed to represent either individuals or groups, disclose the names of persons hiring them and request permission of the Meeting to speak.

Articles 1 and 2 appear on the Ballot.

#### Article 3. BUDGET

The Chair recognized Mr. David B. Drummond, Chairman of the Budget Committee, who gave the following report:

The gross budget recommended in Article #3, by the Budget Committee for 1967 is \$960,208, which is \$81,711 less than requested by the Selectmen and Town Manager. The anticipated income is \$319,600 or \$60,000 more than estimated by the Selectmen. When we first looked at this budget, we could see \$7.45 being added to the tax rate. If the Budget Committee's Budget is approved, we visualize an increase of \$1.58 per thousand and this includes Articles 6, 12, and 13 that have the Budget Committee's Recommendations.

The Budget Committee held nine (9) Executive Sessions and two (2) Public Hearings in preparing its recommendations for this Town Budget. The completed Budget has been published in the local newspaper, as required by law, and posted in various public buildings in our town. It also appears in the Annual Report of the Town of Hampton.

The Budget Committee reviewed six (6) Special Articles that totaled \$109,769 in expenditures. Of these Special Articles, two (2) were recommended as written and one (1) was recommended for a reduced amount of dollars. Three (3) of the Special Articles were NOT RECOMMENDED. Before I report on the \$960,208, I would like to cover these Special Articles at this time in this report!

Special Article #6, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55,000 for the purpose of a re-valuation of property in the Town of Hampton by the State Tax Commission, or authorize the Board of Selectmen to hire a competent appraisal firm approved by the State Tax Commission is RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee. It has been twelve (12) years

since the Town has been appraised and we feel certain that many inequities have occurred. We feel that revaluation at this time would insure that every taxpayer would be paying a fair share of taxes. The State Tax Commission has informed the Selectmen that if Hampton's tax rate exceeds \$80/per thousand, they will issue an order for revaluation of the town.

Special Article #11, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000 for the installation of a sanitary sewer system on Belmont Circle is NOT RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee. The Committee felt that a systematized plan for sewerage construction was being exercised by the Town Manager and that his recommendations for doing the worst places first, should be followed.

Special Article #12, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to install a storm drainage system on Mary Batchelder Road starting at, or near, the property owned by Mrs. Charles Plastridge and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 400 feet is RECOMMENDED. The Selectmen agree that there is a real serious problem there.

Special Article #13, asks the Town to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Portsmouth Mental Health Clinic. The Budget Committee's recommendation is \$500. About forty (40) Hampton citizens use this service and some of them are unable to pay for it.

Special Article #14, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$32,000 for the installation of a sanitary sewer system on Hutchinson Drive and Oak Road is NOT RECOMMENDED. In the Sewer Construction Account, there is money allotted toward this sewer project.

Special Article #16 favoring \$268.95 for the Community Action Program is NOT RECOMMENDED. This is a federal program, and an appropriation is not necessarily for local use.

Before reviewing the major items of the Budget appearing on pages 10, 11 and 12 of this Town Report, I should like to point out that the pay increases totaling \$25,740 for the Sewer, Highway, Fire and Police Departments, as requested by the Selectmen, have been recommended by the Budget Committee. The Committee has recommended a total \$2,955 for increases covering the Town Manager, Tax Collector, Stenographer and Engineer. The Selectmen requested a total of \$4,899. In addition to pay increases we have recommended in this budget, fringe benefits for all Town

employees amounting to \$11,000. This will pay the cost of Blue Cross and allow pay for seven (7) State holidays. The total package for pay increases and fringe benefits amounts to \$39,695. The total amount requested by the Selectmen was \$51,504.

If you will kindly turn to pages 10, 11, and 12 of the Town Report I will review the major items of the Budget as Recom-

mended by the Budget Committee in column 3.

#### PURPOSE OF EXPENDITURES

The Town Officers' Salaries shows an increase of \$2,000 over the 1966 Budget. This allows a \$1,400 increase in the Town Manager's Salary and a \$600 increase to the Tax Collector. The total increase requested by the Selectmen in this account was \$3,464. A \$2,300 increase for the Town Manager and \$1,164 more for the Tax Collector.

The Town Officers' Expenses are budgeted at \$575 over last year. There is a \$550 increase for the Stenographer; \$100 more for postage and \$200 more for the Audit, plus miscellaneous small adjustments. There is a \$300 decrease in the Town Manager's expenses. This \$15,750 is \$415 less than requested by the Selectmen.

Tax Maps — The Selectmen requested \$16,210 in this account, but the Budget Committee has reduced this amount by \$3,210 to \$13,000. This account also includes the salary of the Engineer and line men, and also the costs for maintaining the Martell property, where the tax maps are developed and kept. The Town Manager has promised that all lands west of Lafayette Road will be done in pencil by July 1, 1967 and all tax mapping guaranteed to be finished by December 31, 1967.

Election and Registration Expense is down \$400 this year, due to the fact that we will have one (1) election this year. Last year we budgeted for two (2) more elections.

District Court Expenses — The Budget Committee approved the amount requested by the Selectmen in this account. The \$525 increase in this account represents slight increase for the Associate Justice and Clerk.

Expenses of Town Hall and Other Town Buildings — This account is \$400 less than last year's budget and \$1,000 less than requested by the Selectmen. A member of the Budget Committee

made a motion to reduce the sub-account on repairs and painting from \$1,500 to \$500 and agreed to do the painting himself, if extra help was needed.

Expenditures on State Parks — The responsibility for cleaning the beach should rest with the State and not the town, but until the State appropriates money to do this, we must foot the bill. This \$9,000 is the same amount that was budgeted last year. If the State does assume this responsibility, the \$9,000 will not be spent.

The Police Department Budget is up \$11,533 over last year's appropriation. This represents the wage increases, fringe benefits and an attempt to have a 3-3-3 man coverage at all times. There are \$700 in parking fines credited to this account and a reduction of building maintenance of \$750. The total amount requested by the Selectmen was \$124,667. The Budget Committee reduced the amount by \$3,367.

The Fire Department Budget is \$105,411 and this represents an increase of \$16,037 over last year. Salary increases and benefits amount to \$9,500 of increase and there is \$2,800 in this budget to hire four (4) young college men during the summer (ten weeks) to cover the station. The Town Manager and Selectmen said they couldn't always depend on Call men in the summer and that this would be added insurance for coverage. They had requested seven (7) men for \$4,900. There is additional money in the Budget for fire hose because a considerable amount of hose was lost at Merrill's fire and the need for replacement this year is greater.

Hydrants — This account is up slightly over 1966 to allow for the installation of three (3) new hydrants in the system. At the present time we have 154 hydrants in the system and pay a rental fee of \$160 for each.

Mosquito and Tree Spraying is budgeted the same as last year at \$3,000. This is \$2,000 less than requested by the Selectmen. An amount of \$1,000 will be used for Spring dusting and \$2,000 for spraying.

Civil Defense is budgeted at \$1,500, which is the amount requested by the Selectmen. A report from the Civil Defense Director showed that though 10% of items acquired under this account had been superfluous, the other 90% had benefitted the town greatly, and could be considered real bargains.

Ambulance Service is budgeted at \$2,400 the same as last year.

Rubbish Collection will continue on the same basis this year as it was last year. This account includes the wage and benefits in-

crease for the men and a decrease in the gas and oil account to more nearly reflect actual expenditures on gas and oil last year.

The Sewer account is budgeted at \$84,500, down \$600 from last year and also \$6,200 less than requested by the Selectmen. The Budget Committee's budget reflects the salary and fringe benefits for the men for 1967. We have also credited Sewer Permit fees to this account.

Town Dumps is budgeted at \$4,850 more than last year and \$2,087 more than was actually spent last year. The increases reflect an addition of a dump attendant (whose job it will be to discourage dump pickers and non-resident dumpers) and also \$2,000 more for the purchase of gravel for the dump.

Highways and Bridges - Maintenance is \$10,213 more than in the 1966 budget. In these accounts are monies for patching material, gravel and sand, trucks and labor, contracted services, tarring, plowing and salting. Wages and fringe benefits amount to \$5,200 of the increase plus additional monies for the purchase of both sand and gravel for road work, since the Town's supplies of each are almost depleted.

Street Lighting is budgeted the same as last year - \$39,000. General Expenses — Highway Department is budgeted at \$14,500, as requested by the Selectmen. The \$500 increase over the 1966 budget is for gas and oil. There is \$3,000 for repairs to equipment in this account.

Town Road Aid is actually divided into two (2) parts. Town Road Aid "A" is for class 4 and 5 roads, such as Woodland Road or Landing Road; and Town Road Aid "B" for Winnacunnett Road, High Street and Lafayette Roads only. Under aid "A", the Town pays 15% and the State 85%. Under aid "B" the Town pays 50% and the State 50%. This budget includes \$1,127 in "A" and the State will add \$7,512. Under the "B" portion, the amount is \$7,560 for 1967 and \$6,740 for an unpaid portion of "B" funds by the Town in 1965.

Libraries — The Budget Committee reviewed and studied the State's survey on the Town Library and concurrs that we must strengthen our library. Last year we budgeted \$9,000 for the library. This year the Library Trustees asked for \$18,863. With all the other increased expenses in our Town, we could not see how we could budget an increase of over 100%. We do agree, however, that more books are necessary, more money is needed

for a Librarian and, therefore, have increased the budget in 1967 to \$14,500.

Public Welfare is an account that can have considerable variation in it. We have recommended the \$14,000 requested by the Selectmen and Town Manager.

Parks and Playgrounds is budgeted at \$13,625, which is \$2,025 less than requested by the Selectmen. In this account is \$3,500 for money towards the Band at Hampton Beach. There is also \$2,000 for tree planting and care. The same amount as was in last year's budget. Wages in the account amount to \$6,000.

Recreation Commission is budgeted at \$4,000, a slight increase over 1966. The \$4,000 is made up of \$2,000 for wages, \$1,000 for supplies and materials and \$1,000 for youth activities.

The Public Service Account is down \$300 from last year. The \$6,000 in this account provides \$1,000 for Christmas tree lights and \$5,000 for cemeteries. The \$5,000 appropriation will be used to pave one more street in the cemetery and the balance along with income from the Cemetery Association will be sufficient to take care of the maintenance of the cemetery.

The Conservation Commission asked for an appropriation of \$100 for signs and markers showing and designating conservation areas. The Selectmen recommended this expenditure and the Budget Committee felt that the Conservation Commission should have some support in appreciation for its past work. We do not look for this to become "habit-forming"!

Damages and Legal Expenses — We have budgeted the same amount as last year. This account can vary quite a bit. At the present time the Town has many cases pending.

Advertising and Regional Associations is up \$55 over last year's budget. \$6,500 of this total is for the Chamber of Commerce, as in previous years.

Employees' Retirement and Social Security is increased to cover salary adjustments in 1967 and the Social Security increased rate from 4.2 to 4.4% of \$6,600.

Parking Spaces — The Selectmen requested \$21,300 for this account. The Budget Committee reduced this request \$9,200 to a total of \$12,100. The major increase in this account is for the enlargement of Island Path and Ashworth Avenue parking lots and some resurfacing on the High Street parking lot. There will also be six (6) more lights installed in the Ashworth Avenue Parking lot.

Special Activities is budgeted \$2,000 below the requests of the Selectmen and \$2,000 more than last year's budget. The increase

is for new street signs and also since the speed laws are changing this spring, new speed signs will be needed and most of the present ones must be moved to comply with over population density changes. The large oil drums used for trash at the beach will be replaced with baskets having plastic liners. The \$2,000 cut is because the Budget Committee did not approve an expenditure of \$11,000 for a Sweeper under account 1200 "New Equipment" and therefore it is not necessary for another \$2,000 in this account for a Sweeper operation.

The Planning and Zoning Board account is reduced \$3,750 from last year's budget. Last year there was money in this account to up date the Master Plan. This has not been done yet and the money has been carried over into 1967 liabilities.

Interest — The interest on our Bonded Debt is reduced by one (1) year of payment on the debt but the cost of borrowing money in anticipation of taxes will be higher this year. The money market is tight.

Highways and Bridges — This account is up \$26,500 over last year's budget. \$25,000 of this increase is to complete sewer extensions on Leavitt Road (\$8,500); Cliff and Dumas (from Ocean Blvd. to intersection) (\$10,000) and Hutchinson Drive (as far as dollars permit) (\$6,500). Also under this Highway and Bridges account is \$25,000 for Sewer Reconstruction. This appropriation is to cover the final costs of the penetrant system and will complete the entire system throughout the Town. The system carries a lifetime guarantee.

New Land and Buildings — This account is \$4,000 less than last year and the Budget Committee lowered the Selectmen's request from \$6,500 to \$1,500. The \$1,500 is for rent of the Casino Garage at Hampton Beach. The Committee eliminated the \$5,000 for a Town garage foundation and grading.

New Equipment – The Budget Committee reduced the request of the Selectmen \$23,200 from \$47,975 to \$24,775. The Sweeper, Police Patrol Wagon, Sewer Truck, and the International 460 were NOT RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee. We have recommended replacing both police cruisers, which will have approximately 70,000 miles on them by the time they are traded. The patrol wagon has only 25,000 miles on it. We have also favored replacement of the 1961 International truck used for Beach Cleaning and salting, since the salt damage has made it impossible for this truck to pass inspection any longer. We also included \$16,000 for the Rubber Tire Loader with Plow and Wing. The

Town Manager said that this piece of snow fighting equipment could eliminate the need for many outside contractors. There is also \$875 in this account for Fire Alarm Boxes.

Insurance coverage under one blanket policy costs \$15,000. This includes coverage on Vehicles and Equipment, Workmen's Compensation and Accident, Public Liability, Fire and Extended Coverage, Bonds, Money and Securities. The additional \$6,600 this year is the cost of Blue Cross for the employees.

Annual Charges — This account is \$55,000 less than last year's budget. This decrease is a result of principal payment on the \$1,160,000 Sewer Construction Bonds of 1961, having dropped to \$54,000 per year for the next ten (10) years.

Page 10 shows anticipated revenues of \$319,600 for 1967.

The net result of the Budget Committee's work, which incidently consumed collectively over 700 hours spent going through this budget item by item (and in this report to you I have touched on the highlights) is to present a budget, including our recommendations on Articles 6, 12 and 13 that will only add \$1.58 to our tax rate for Town Government.

We would like to express our appreciation for the very fine cooperation we received from the Town Manager, the Selectmen and the Department Heads during the preparation of this Budget.

Article 4.

#### BORROWING MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

Mrs. Louisa Berry moved that Article 4 be adopted as read. Seconded by Leonard Lamprey. So voted.

Article 5.

#### DISPOSAL OF REAL ESTATE BY TAX DEED

Mr. Robert Bridle moved that Article 5 be adopted as read. Seconded by Kenneth Malcolm. So voted.

Article 6.

#### RE-VALUATION

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham moved that Article 6 be adopted as read. Seconded by Leonard Lamprey.

Selectmen Walter Vanderpool spoke in favor of Article 6, re-

minding the assembly that this is the most important article in the Warrant. The Board of Selectmen favor Article 6, and it has been approved by the Budget Committee.

Approximately 6500 parcels of property have to be assessed

by a "part time Board of Selectmen."

He cited examples of valuable business property which is under valued. Some additional valuation has been picked up by having tax maps made. The Tax Commission says if tax rate exceeds \$80. per thousand it will demand a re-valuation at 100%. They may refuse to approve a rate if it exceeds \$80.00.

It is possible for the Board of Selectmen to make a percentage increase across the board. If passed by Town Meeting the Tax Commission will go along with rate exceeding \$80. until revaluation is in effect. After a re-valuation, the valuation of property increases, and the rate decreases. Majority of tax bills do not change too much. It may take one year to one and one-half years to complete project.

Method of Financing: Town Manager Boehner said that this \$55,000. could be taken out of working capital or surplus and will not affect tax rate.

Mr. Vanderpool asked that the voters seriously consider this article and reminded them that as long as we have such a high Federal Budget, some of this attitude brushes off on towns.

Selectman Hackett said that once system is set up, he felt that a full-time assessor would be necessary to keep it up to date. There have been 12 different men on the Board of Selectmen since 1954 with a variety of opinions. Easy to see why it is possible to have unequal valuations. In reply to a question by Mr. Bridle concerning the publication of a Valuation Book Mr. Hackett said that would require specific funds. Suggested anyone wishing this done put an article in the Warrant for Town Meeting to that effect.

Mr. Russell McGuirk said that there will always be inequities in taxation and asked if the Tax Commission would go along with a percentage increase. Reply: Overall assessment is not the answer. Board unanimously favor re-valuation.

Mr. Wilfred Sanders agreed that a full time assessor is needed, and felt that such a man could do the job over a longer period of time. Suggested a full time Assessor and Building Inspector.

Mr. James Tucker amended Article 6 to read as follows:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55,000. for the purpose of a re-valuation of property in

the Town of Hampton by the State Tax Commission." Seconded by Mrs. Louisa Berry.

Discussion following. Some felt that the amendment would nulify the article. Too restrictive. As the article reads, any firm doing re-valuation must be approved by the Commission. Mr. Robert Whitman said that any Private Firm would submit their results to the Board of Selectmen. People can then appeal to the Board. He felt it unwise to limit the Article.

Representative Herbert Casassa said that 9 new assessors had been requested by the Tax Commission. He felt it dangerous to vote the amendment.

Mr. Arthur Hinkley felt that a full time Assessor and Building Inspector would be too heavy a load for one person and would vest too much authority in one man. Mrs. L. Berry moved the previous question. Seconded and Voted. Mr. Tucker's amendment to Article 6 was not carried. Mr. Bertrand Roy amended Article 6 to read:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000. by hiring full time assessors and such other personnel as may be necessary to carry out equalization of valuation."

Town Counsel John W. Perkins said that he felt that it would be an error to Amend Article 6.

Wilfred Cunningham moved the previous question. Seconded Carried by 2/3 vote.

Vote on amendment: Mr. Roy's amendment was not carried. Article 6 was voted as read, under motion of Wilfred Cunningham.

Article 7.

#### HOUSING AUTHORITY

Town Manager Boehner said that passage of Article 7 would:

- 1. Allow the Town to appoint a Housing Authority. This would consist of five persons not in employ of the Town. They could make a study to determine need for Housing for the Elderly.
- 2. The Town could accept interest free advances to aid in future planning which is necessary to the future welfare of the Town. He mentioned the need for planning at the beach end of the Exeter and Hampton Expressway. Mr. Boehner felt that the Town should take advantage of this opportunity.

Attorney Wilfred Sanders, Jr., representing the Hampton

Beach Precinct, and also speaking as an individual voter, said that the matter of a Housing Authority had been brought up at several town meetings. No one is opposed to Housing for the elderly, but passage of Article 7 gives very broad powers. He felt that the Planning Board could do all necessary work, and did not believe that there exists unsafe or unsanitary conditions in Hampton, in any great number. The taking by Eminent Domain is one condition to be feared.

Selectmen Lawrence Hackett felt that non-resident property owners would be affected by the passage of Article 7.

Mr. Howard Page said it was "Urban Renewal" whatever it was called. Urged defeat of Article 7, and moved that Article 7 be indefinitely postponed. The Moderator stated that this article must be voted by "Yes" and "No" ballot according to law.

Result of voting: In Favor -43 votes. Against -107 votes. Article 8

#### PUBLIC DUMPS

Town Manager Boehner said that a count of vehicles using the Hampton Dump on five different days produced the following figures:

16 out of 44 vehicles were from out of town

32 out of 127 vehicles were from out of town

34 out of 143 vehicles were from out of town

20 out of 58 vehicles were from out of town

15 out of 49 vehicles were from out of town

Twenty dump fires caused 342 man hours of fire fighting. Trucks - 66 hours. This is costly to the Town. Mr. Boehner moved the adoption of Article 8 as read. Seconded by Wilfred Cunningham.

Mr. Robert Bridle made the amendment that this article be taken up section by section. Seconded. Voted.

Sections 1, 2, and 3 approved as read.

Section 4, amended by Bertrand Roy, seconded by Kenneth Boehner, to change period to a comma and add "provided such property is within Hampton Boundaries." So Voted.

Section 5, Mr. D. Drummond made the amendment that \$20.00 be substituted for \$2.00 in part B, and that \$50.00 be substituted for \$5.00 in part C. Seconded by W. Cunningham.

Result of voting: 38 against amendment. 36 in favor. Amendment not carried.

Bertrand Roy amended Section 5, part B. to read \$5.00 in-

stead of \$2.00, and \$7.50 instead of \$5.00. Seconded, So Voted. Section 6. Amended by Louisa Berry, seconded, to add "Except by authorization of the Selectmen."

Sections 7 and 8 remained as read.

Article 8 passed as amended.

Article 9.

#### **PRECINCT**

The Chair recognized Mr. Wallace Robinson, sponsor of this article, who said that in 1907 the Beach needed additional fire protection. The Precinct was formed primarily for that function. The Town has outgrown need for Precinct, and the division "hamstrings" elected officials. The Town is seeking better overall government. We are one Town. The big resistance to this idea is money. \$30,000. for promotion of the Beach area. The Precinct has \$195,000. in assets to turn over to the Town. Mr. Robinson moved adoption of Article 9 as read. Seconded by Norman Royal.

Attorney Wilfred Sanders, Jr. spoke in opposition to Article 9. He said that the Precinct Tax, usually about \$6.00 per thousand, would be picked up by the Town and would add \$2. or \$3. to the over-all tax rate. Problems at the Beach differ from the Town. The Beach wishes to appropriate money for the Hotel Association, Band, Playground, advertising, and Children's Day. Mr. Sanders said that the matter should be acted upon by the Precinct first, then brought to the Town Meeting.

Mr. Robinson said that the same proceedure was being followed as in the Town of Lancaster. A 2/3 vote is required by the Precinct.

Mr. Ralph T. Harris said that the Precinct and the Town officials enjoyed the best of cooperation. Recreation is Hampton's greatest industry. The Precinct raised \$40,000. for the Chamber of Commerce and although he is one of the largest tax payers he does not object to paying the Precinct Tax.

Mr. Robert Preston said that Recreation is the second largest industry in New Hampshire. Hampton Beach does more business per square mile than any other place in the State.

#### Article 10.

#### DOG ORDINANCE

Article 10 appears on the Ballot. Result of voting: 834 in favor. 331 against.

#### Article 11.

#### SEWER SYSTEM FOR BELMONT CIRCLE

This article not recommended by the Budget Committee. Motion by David Drummond to indefinitely postpone. Seconded by K. Boehner. So Voted.

Article 12.

#### STORM DRAINAGE - MARY BATCHELDER ROAD

Mr. Henry LaDuke, sponsor of the article, spoke in favor, and explained conditions of drainage on Mary Batchelder Road. He moved adoption of Article 12. Seconded by Robert Bridle. So Voted.

Article 13.

#### PORTSMOUTH MENTAL HEALTH CLINIC

Mr. Robert Preston spoke in favor of Article 13 telling of the work of the Clinic in Rockingham County and its value to Hampton residents. It is valuable as a "preventative service." He said that he appreciated the fiscal problems of Hampton, but amended Article 13 to \$1,000. (instead of \$500. as recommended by the Budget Committee.) Seconded by Kenneth Malcolm.

Mr. Robert Bridle cited the amount contributed to the Clinic by Hampton men who work at the Ship-yard.

Representative Shindledecker spoke in favor of Mr. Preston's amendment.

Attorney Sanders said that he had experience with clients needing psyciatric treatment.

Bertrand Roy amended Mr. Preston's amendment to read \$500. as recommended by the Budget Committee.

In favor of Mr. Roy's amendment: 58 votes. Against: 60 votes. Article 13 was voted as amended by Robert Preston.

Article 14.

### SANITARY SEWER – HUTCHINSON DRIVE & OAK ROAD

Mr. David Drummond moved indefinite postponment of this article. Seconded. So Voted.

Article 15.

#### SALE TO ST. JAMES LODGE OF HAMPTON

Mr. Douglass Hunter explained that the Town took this piece of land by tax deed. The State of New Hampshire took 90% of the lot when the Expressway went through.

The Town has no access to this bit of land in front of St. James Lodge. The Town would either have to cross Lodge property or go over the State fence to reach it.

Mr. Hunter moved the adoption of Article 15 as read. Seconded. Passed by large majority.

Article 16.

#### COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM

Mr. David Drummond moved indefinite postponment of Article 16. Seconded. So Voted.

Article 17.

#### ZONING

This article appears on Ballot. Result: In Favor: 593 votes. Against: 314 votes.

Article 18.

## OTHER BUSINESS

On behalf of the Board of Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett thanked the Budget Committee and others who have given of their time for the benefit of the Town during the past year.

Motion to adjourn, seconded. Voted.

#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

January 9, 1968

Board of Selectmen Hampton, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1967, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Library, Cemetery Association, Trustees of Trust Funds, Hampton Municipal Development Authority and Construction Account W.P.C. Project - Sewer.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1966 — December 31, 1967 (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1966 and December 31, 1967, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$124.38 in 1967.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therin.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1967 are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of

\$6,758.49, less and overdraft of appropriations of \$6,142.64, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$615.85.

### Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1967, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1967, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

#### Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit K)

A statement of bonded indebtedness as of December 31, 1967, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit K.

#### **AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### **GENERAL COMMENTS**

## Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$141,045.97 to \$86,921.59 during 1967 as shown herewith:

#### Overdraft of Overlay Account:

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), there was a net overdraft of appropriations on the amount of \$6,142.64, as indicated herewith:

However, it may be explained that included in the total appropriation overdrafts was an overdraft of \$8,564.67 in the "Overlay" account. The amount which is raised for "Overlay" is determined by the Selectmen rather than voted by the Town Meeting, so that it is not actually an appropriation account. Abatements, discounts and refunds are charged to this account. Therefore, it is noted that with the elimination of this item of \$8,564.67 from the total overdrafts, there was actually a net unexpended balance of budgetary appropriations as shown herewith:

It is recommended that a tax collector's deed be given for any property that remains unredeemed after two years from date of tax sale.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Cafetorium of the Hampton Academy Junior High School on Tuesday the twelfth day of March, 1968, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- \* ARTICLE 1. To choose by Non-Partisan Ballot, one Selectman for three years, one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, and one Collector of Taxes for one year, and four members of the Municipal Budget Committee for three years.
- \* ARTICLE 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year. (The Polls for the election of officers and to vote on any other articles which may appear on the ballot, will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.)
- \* ARTICLE 3. To choose Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Conventions of the various political parties to be held to nominate Party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.
  - ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
  - ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any Real Estate acquired through tax deeds, any sale to be at Public Auction.
  - ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,059,092.00.
  - ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the construction of a Public Works garage facility 80 ft. by 100 ft.

long to include a foundation, heating plant, lighting, plumbing, and toilet facilities, and office and stock room area, for the purpose of maintaining and storage of equipment, generally described in certain preliminary drawings by Chester Leach, C. E., and to further see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Forty-five Thousand (\$45,000.) Dollars for such purposes, and whether the town will vote to raise Twenty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$22,500.00) through the issuance of notes upon credit of the town for that portion of the sum so raised and appropriated and will vote to authorize the selectmen to negotiate, and issue such notes, and to fix the rate of interest, and all other terms thereof, and to take such other action as may be required to effectuate the purpose of this vote in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA Chapter 33 and any amendments relating thereto.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will instruct the Board of Selectmen to appoint a study committee for the purpose of preparing a charter that will better meet the organizational needs of the town by consolidating the governmental activities between the Town and the Precinct.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer the land located on Tax Map 13, Lot #22, to the Hampton Cemetery Association for their purposes and uses.

ARTICLE 10. On Petition of Mabel D. Hobbs and nineteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to authorize the Hampton Cemetery Association to quit-claim to the Advent Christian Church of Hampton, for such price as the Cemetery Association may deem reasonable, a portion of land described by Tax Mat 13, Lot #22, not to exceed,17,500 square feet, provided that the Cemetery Association finds that such portion of the land is not needed for its uses and purposes.

ARTICLE 11. On Petition of Ruth Nutter and twenty-three other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. for Christmas lights and decorations.

(Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 12. On Petition of Paul E. Moody and twenty-eight other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,250. for the installation of a sanitary sewer system on Grey Avenue and Tobey Streets.

(Submitted without recommendation by Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 13. On Petition of (Mrs.) Elaine A. Manix and twenty-three other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to improve Birch Road in accordance with Town Standards so that it may be accepted as a public way.

(Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

\* ARTICLE 14. On Petition of the Hampton Industrial Development Committee and 28 legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949, and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, to change the following areas of land in the Town of Hampton to Industrial Districts.

Beginning at a point at the southwesterly boundary of Pinky Cabin land, so-called, which said point is three hundred (300) feet southerly from Winnacunnet Road; thence running easterly on a line parallel with and three hundred (300) feet southerly from Winnacunnet Road to a point three hundred (300) feet westerly from Richard Street; thence turning and running southerly on a line parallel with and three hundred (300) feet westerly from Richard Street to a point; thence turning easterly and running easterly, northeasterly and northerly on a line three hundred (300) feet from and parallel to the junction of Richard and Elaine Street to a point at land now zoned "Residence B" which said point is three hundred (300) feet southerly from Winnacunnet Road; thence turning easterly and running along the southerly boundary of Residence B. to the northwesterly boundary of "Residence C" which said point is three hundred (300) feet southerly from Winnacunnet Road; thence turning southerly and running in a southerly and southwesterly direction along the westerly boundary of "Residential C" district to a point three hundred (300) feet northeasterly of Tide Mill Road:, thence turning northwesterly and running on a line parallel to and three hundred (300) feet northerly

from Tide Mill Road to a point; thence continuing northerly along a line parallel to and three hundred (300) feet easterly from Landing Road to a point three hundred (300) feet southerly from Winnacunnet Road; thence turning and running easterly along a line parallel to and three hundred (300) feet from Winnacunnet road to the point of beginning.

(Not recommended by Planning Borad)

\* ARTICLE 15. Beginning at a point on Tide Mill Road which is three hundred (300) feet southerly from the junction of Landing Road and Tide Mill Road; thence running along the southwesterly side of Tide Mill Road to the intersection of "Residence A" and "Residential C" districts; thence turning and running southwesterly along said "Residential C" district to the northerly boundary of the Exeter-Hampton Expressway; thence running in a northwesterly direction along the northerly boundary of said Exeter-Hampton Expressway to a point which is three hundred (300) feet southeasterly from Landing Road; thence running in a northeasterly direction on a line parallel to and three hundred (300) feet southeasterly from Landing Road to the point of beginning.

(Not recommended by Planning Board)

\* ARTICLE 15-A. To amend the Zoning Ordinance Article III, Section 3, Paragraph 2, to read as follows: In a Business District all manufacturing except that clearly incidental to the business lawfully conducted on the premises, or Light Manufacturing as defined and approved by the Planning Board in each individual application, is specifically prohibited.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

- \* ARTICLE 16. That the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampton be amended by striking out of Article III, Section 3A, the following words, "In a Seasonal Business and Recreational District, no building or land shall be used for the sale of intoxicating liquors or intoxicating beverages of any kind, whether by the bottle, by the can, by the glass or otherwise."

  (Not recommended by the Planning Board)
- \* ARTICLE 17. To amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampton, N. H. by including the below described area in "Residence B" and to be designated as Ocean Boulevard North, and by excluding the same area from "Residence "A".

Beginning in the Westerly sideline of Ocean Boulevard North at a point 571 feet Southerly from the southerly sideline of North Shore Road; thence turning and running Westerly by a line at right angles to Ocean Boulevard 300 feet to a point; thence turning and running Northeasterly and Northerly by a line parallel to and 300 feet Westerly from the Westerly sideline of Ocean Boulevard North to the North Hampton Town Line; thence turning and running Easterly by said North Hampton Town Line; 300 feet, more or less, to the Westerly sideline of Ocean Boulevard North; thence turning and running Southerly and Southwesterly by the Westerly sideline of said Ocean Boulevard North to the point of beginning. (Not recommended by the Planning Board)

\* ARTICLE 18. To amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampton, N.H. to change the general configuration of the Zoning Boundaries as they are depicted on "Zoning Map, Hampton, New Hampshire, 1965", in such a manner as to reflect the following:

(Change from Residence B to Residence A)

Beginning at a point in the extension to the westerly side-line of Ring's Restaurant land so-called, at the intersection of the southerly side-line of Winnacunnet Road, thence running southerly 300 feet along said side-line projection, to a point, thence turning in a westerly direction and running westerly 300 feet from the southerly side-line of said Winnacunnet Road to the westerly side-line or the projection thereof of Pinky Villa Cabins land, so-called, thence turning and running northerly 300 feet by the westerly side-line of the Pinky Villa Cabins land to the southerly side-line of said Winnacunnet Road, thence turning easterly and running along the southerly side-line of Winnacunnet Road to the point of beginning.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

\* ARTICLE 19. To amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton, N. H. Residence B, Winnacunnet Road, to Residence A, Winnacunnet Road, as follows:

Beginning at a point at the westerly side-line of Ring's Restaurant land so-called, at the intersection of the northerly side-line of Winnacunnet Road, thence running northerly 300 feet along the westerly side-line of Ring's Restaurant land so-called, to a point, thence turning in a westerly direction, 300

feet northerly from the northerly side-line of said Winnacunnet Road and running westerly 300 feet from the northerly side-line of said Winnacunnet Road to the projection of the westerly side-line of Pinky Villa Cabins land, so-called, thence turning and running southerly along said side-line projection 300 feet to the northerly side-line of Winnacunnet Road, thence turning easterly and running along the northerly side-line of Winnacunnet Road to the point of beginning.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

\* ARTICLE 20. To change Article VI, Section 3, to read as follows:

A Building Inspector shall be appointed annually by the Board of Selectmen, and in the event of the disability, absence, or disqualification of the Building Inspector, the Selectmen shall appoint an Inspector to act in his stead.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

In the Children's Room re-arrangement of the stacks, and the addition of a table, chairs, rug, film screen, and permanent low shelving have greatly increased the facilities.

The Magic Green Carpet Story Hour started in June and is held one morning each week for one half hour. This is open to pre-school children and is usually a combined film program and picture-book story time. The average summer attendance was 45-50; during the school year it is about 25.

The Junior Film Program, held one afternoon each week, started in October. The films are borrowed from the State Library and are either historical, scientific, or recreational in theme. Eight programs were held with a total attendance of 1.315.

In addition the Headstart children and some of the classes from the schools have visited the library for story hours, films, and orientation programs.

The children's books have been completely cataloged, and the books for the Junior High age have been brought upstairs in a separate section. An adult browsing area has been established near the peg-board display area, and the adult bookmobile books are shelved there. The assistant librarian has arranged for exhibits and displays in this area which contribute and added interest.

We are utilizing the services of the State Library for centralized purchasing and cataloging. This enables us to enjoy at least a 37% discount on our purchases, and all catalog cards for new purchases come to us free of charge.

I wish to express my appreciation:

To the members of the Hampton Garden Club for their floral displays which have added spots of beauty and interest to the library, and for their gifts of books and magazines.

To the members of the Mother's Circle for their donation of \$50 towards the purchase of children's books.

To the members of Oceanside Grange for their gift of \$100 for books in honor of Mrs. Margaret S. Noyes, librarian of the Lane Memorial Library for 35 years.

### 1967 ANNUAL REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In compliance with its enabling legislation, R.S.A., Chapter 36-A, the Hampton Conservation Commission submits the following report to the Board of Selectmen and citizens:

During the year meetings were held to consider the following:

- 1. Election of officers, welcoming new members, communications, Conservation Commission News, available to each member, definition of a right-of-way, suitable markers to identify rights-of-way to salt or fresh waters, and offers of gifts of marshland.
- 2. Request for permission to accept gifts of marshland. On October 9, 1967 "The Board of Selectmen approved the right of the Conservation Commission to accept gifts of land for conservation purposes; providing this land is located within the bounds for these purposes by Article 20 of the 1964 Town Meeting, and verified by a map outlining the area."
- 3. Distribution of brochure, "A Heritage of Beauty and Value" concerning salt marshland in New Hampshire. A consultation was held with Hampton Falls and Seabrook Commissions on this illustrated leaflet. Any citizen may secure a copy at the Lane Public Library or from the Commission members.
- 4. Position of the Commission on a request to fill marshland in Hampton adjacent to tidal waters under a new State law in Chapter 483 concerning Tidal Waters.

A statement was filed with the N.H. Port Authority that "the Commission wishes to be recorded officially as favoring conservation of the Town's natural resources: its salt marshes and tidal waters, pollution of which shuold be kept to a minimum. May the Port Authority be mindful of the conservation for posterity of the natural beauty of the area, and the preservation of the life-sustaining qualities of the marshes, which once destroyed can never be restored."

The Commission in accordance with its enabling legislation believed it was morally obligated to make a statement on this issue, which cocerns the Town's natural resources.

The Conservation Commission voted to recommend that any future hearings of the N.H. Port Authority on petitions relating to Hampton marsh filling or development be held within the Town's limits.

If any citizens know of old rights-of-way, please contact any of the Commission members. The \$100.00 appropriation received by the Commission for partial use in marking public rights-of-way to salt or fresh bodies of water, was banked until the type of sign is decided.

### SANITARY ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

1967 Expenditures: Leavitt Magrath, Employess - Full Time: 9 \$113,553.21 Supt. Employees - Part Time: 0

Your Sanitary Engineering Department Waste Water Treatment Plant is located at the end of Tide Mill Road. Two pumping stations, one on Church Street and one at the lower end of Winnacunnet Road. We have five Lift Stations located on the following streets, Longwood Drive, Exeter Road, High Street, Kings Highway, and Plaice Cove. The approximate value of the above is \$1,030,000.00.

Approximately 90% of the beach and 60% of the compact area of the town is presently in the sewer system. We have 144,716 feet or 27.3 miles of sewer mains in the ground. The approximate value of these mains, \$2,226,000.00.

Total approximate value of buildings, lift stations, and sewer mains is \$3,256,000.00.

The annual influent of sewerage into our system is 300 million gallons, of this approximately 3 million gallons or 1% are solids. This includes 168,225 gallons of septic tank sludge. Our system is a sanitary sewer system which precludes water from street, roof, floor, outside shower drains or sump pumps.

This department is responsible for the proper chlorinating of effluent and the maintenance of 16 sewerage pumps, 75 electrical motors ranging from ½ to 30 HP, 10 Electrical consoles, Imhoff Tank, Primary Clarifier, Control Chamber, Chlorine Contact Tank, 9 Wet Wells, 2 Sludge Storage Tanks.

We also have the responsibility of inspecting all sanitary sewer laterals. The number of inspections made in 1967 were 400. We also constructed a 176 foot sewer main on Leavitt Ave., and a 500 foot main on Dumas Ave.

In 1967 we had 23,000 feet of mains cleaned, surveyed by TV and sealed.

This year a contract was let for \$269,000.00 to replace an obsolete 3,500 foot 12 inch force main across the march and the Beach pumping station. This should be completed late in the spring of 1968.

In addition to the regular inspections, the fire department made regular day to day inspections of alley ways in the beach area during the resort season.

Firefighters were present at all fireworks displays, and all dances where more than four hundred people were in attendance.

### TRAINING AND PLANNING

Company drill programs were conducted for a minimum of two hours daily on all aspects of fire fighting. In addition to company drill, a training program of four hours a week for all permanent personnel is required to cover all regular and special training.

During the past year fourteen hundred (1,400) hours of training was

received by eleven (11) permanent firefighters in addition to regular scheduled working hours.

Four buildings were acquired by this department for training purposes. These buildings ranged from four room, single story houses to a 12 room, two story house. Over one hundred (100) hours of training was received by 60% of the call and permanent personnel under actual fireground conditions. All training was conducted and supervised by Capt. Howard Stickney.



1967 was a very busy year for the Police Department. Crime in Hampton increased which was consistant with the National trend. Criminal offenses and traffic accidents were investigated in greater numbers than ever before. Of special note was the drastic increase in burglaries and drug abuse.

New programs were instituted by the Police Department including an expanded firearms training program, a school safety program, an inservice training program and the opportunity for the Chief of Police to attend the 79th session of the F.B.I. National Academy in Washington, D.C.

Also instituted was a weekly informative news release in area news-papers entitled "Signal 46" which is intended to provide a line of communication between the police department and the community in the first phase of a police/community relations program.
