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CITY GOVERNMENT

ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT

Tuesday, January 2, 1934.

The members of the city government for the municipal years of 1934 and 1935, having met for organization, agreeably to the provisions of the City Charter, the convention was called to order by Hon. William H. Watson, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Hon. William H. Watson made the announcement that, George F. T. Trask having been notified of his election to the office of mayor for the term of two years, was present for the purpose of taking the oath of office. The oath of office was administered by Hon. William H. Watson, who introduced the Mayor to the aldermen and councilmen elect and to the citizens present.

Prayer offered by Very Reverend Dean Scott at the Inauguration of George F. T. Trask as Mayor, January 2, 1934.

While the object of my prayer primarily is to ask the blessing of God upon the Mayor and other city officials who today assume the responsibility for the civic affairs of Keene during the next two years, I deem it proper to call your attention to the fact that the whole country and its public servants are much in need of divine guidance. The prayer which I am about to read was written in the early days of this Republic when the founders were men of faith who did not hesitate to lean upon God's help in all their great responsibilities. The prayer was composed by Archbishop Carroll, a great patriot and a wise churchman. I ask you all to enter deeply into its spirit.

"We pray Thee, O God of might, wisdom and justice, through whom authority is rightfully administered, laws are enacted and judgment decreed, assist with Thy holy spirit of counsel and fortitude the President of these United

States, that his administration may be conducted in righteousness and be eminently useful to Thy people over whom he presides, by encouraging due respect for virtue and religion, by a faithful execution of the laws in justice and mercy, and by restraining vice and immorality. Let the light of Thy divine wisdom direct the deliberations of Congress and shine forth in all the proceedings and laws framed for our rule and government, so that they may tend to the preservation of peace, the promotion of national happiness, the increase of industry, sobriety and useful knowledge, and may perpetuate to all the blessings of equal liberty.

"We pray Thee for his Excellency the Governor of this State, the members of the Legislature, for all judges, magistrates and other officers who are appointed to guard our political welfare. We pray Thy blessings upon our Mayor, our Aldermen, our Councilmen and all other city officials entrusted with the well being and progress of this community, that they be enabled by Thy powerful protection to discharge the duties of their respective stations with honesty and ability."

After the prayer Mayor Trask delivered his inaugural address. Frank H. Whitcomb was elected city clerk and William B. Stickels, city messenger and it was voted: that the convention now rise, the aldermen and councilmen to meet in their respective rooms at 7:30 o'clock on Thursday Evening, Jan. 4, for the transaction of general business.

THE MAYOR'S ADDRESS

Gentlemen of the City Councils and Fellow Citizens:

We are about to begin a new administration of our City Government. This administration differs from any previous administration, as according to an amendment to our city charter passed by the State Legislature, this city government has been elected for a two-year term.

This is an experiment that may be advantageous, or it may possibly be a disadvantage. My experience has been that the enthusiasm of many elected to the councils soon dies out after they have taken office. You can readily see what the second year would be if this should happen to any number of you who have been chosen to administer the affairs of the City for the next two years. On the other hand, I can see that if the interest is well sustained, the experience of the first year would be of great value the second year.

That we are living in trying times needs no comment from me. Conditions are changing so rapidly that it is very difficult to plan for the future, but there always have been and always will be problems in government as there are in private business, and we must face these problems as they arise with deliberation, bearing in mind that we are but the servants of all the people of our city, and if we apply the principles of sound business to the management of the city's affairs as we would in private business, keeping constantly in mind that it is the people's money we are spending, there should be little cause for criticism.

Trouble must be expected when the outgo constantly increases while income decreases. As the income of the city is practically all derived from taxes, I believe you should give this subject your keenest attention.

The maladjustment of taxes is for the advantage of the few to the disadvantage of the many. It is also true that the reckless and aimless expenditure of public funds results in a tax burden to all, whether the resident is a home owner or a home renter. We maintain a board of tax assessors at an expense of about \$3,000 a year. This board is elected by your council and its members are, or should be, selected for their fitness to appraise values for tax purposes in an equitable, impartial manner.

In 1930 the city became involved in a number of tax suits, and I find that the expense in legal fees for defending these suits, according to the city reports, was about \$2,500.00, and large sums of money were returned to protesting taxpayers. There is something wrong in a system that permits large taxpayers who can well afford the legal expense of fighting a tax levied by the assessors you have employed, involving the city in an expensive lawsuit, when the small taxpayer has no redress if he believes his taxes are too high, as the amount involved is not sufficiently large to warrant him spending money to prosecute his claim. I have reliable information that two-thirds of our taxes are paid by the home owners of our city.

To prevent a tax disadvantage to the many, this administration should strive for an equitable adjustment of values. Those who have too high a tax should have it lowered; those whose taxes are too low should at once have them increased. To prevent burdensome taxes, it should be our aim to prevent the spending of public money for any purpose unless absolutely necessary.

FINANCE

The outgoing committee on finance have submitted for your consideration estimates on which to base your appropriations for the various departments. You should give these estimates your most careful study before taking final action.

The bonded indebtedness of the city is now \$210,500.00, of which \$78,000.00 is water bonds. As the water department is self-sustaining, these bonds need not give us great concern. I sincerely hope we may be able to carry on for the next two years without any increase in the bonded debt, and it would be a satisfaction to us all if the present indebtedness could be reduced.

HIGHWAYS

The highway department, because of the large expenditures necessary for its maintenance, is perhaps from a financial standpoint the most important of all city departments. I am pleased to state that nearly all of our roads and streets are in very good condition. I believe it to be sound economy that they be kept so.

There are no major projects of construction contemplated for the coming year, but there should be no neglect of our roads and streets that have been improved. The application of oil and tar has long been recognized as the most practical method of preserving gravel roads, and a little extra expenditure along this line may result in large savings in the future.

There is need of replacement of some of the motor equipment of this department. Careful attention should be given to this situation by the committee on highways.

A matter that will require the attention of this committee is the problem of the West Street Bridge. That this bridge is unsuitable for present-day traffic is generally conceded. A careful study should be made as to whether or not it is advisable to spend from \$5,000 to \$8,000 for repairs of questionable value, or to spend twenty to thirty-five thousand dollars for a new bridge. I am sure that the committee will give this question proper attention.

There has been considerable work done on the Branch Road in resurfacing and grading and there are two small obsolete bridges on this road that should be replaced as a matter of safety.

We would all like to see the old car tracks removed from Main and West Streets, and this should be done when the city's finances warrant it. I was pleased to note that the finance committee recommended an appropriation for sidewalks. There is much need for this work in outlying districts.

WATER DEPARTMENT

Our city is fortunate in having one of the best supplies of pure water of any city in the State. If the Federal Works administration

honors our request for funds with which to extend the water system around the Five Mile Drive and the elimination of dead ends, we will have a water system that will be adequate for many years. I am strongly in favor of the Five Mile Drive extension even if the city has to finance it, but would not be in favor at this time of the city's undertaking the sewage disposal plant from city funds.

Some new equipment for this department is needed.

I believe this department to be well supervised and that the committee is competent to handle its problems.

PUBLIC HEALTH

I regret to state that my observations and the information I have received lead me to believe that this important department has not functioned for some time in accordance with the provisions of the city ordinance and the state laws. I strongly urge that a committee of one alderman and two councilmen be appointed to make a thorough investigation of this department with instructions to report their findings, with recommendations, back to the councils as early as possible.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

That we have an excellent volunteer fire department is a matter of common knowledge. The officers are alert and efficient and the morale of the men appears to be of a high order. The city will soon be called upon to replace one piece of apparatus for answering still alarms. This is one department where we cannot afford to practice economy to the extent of lowering its efficiency. Arrangements should be made for more frequent inspection of buildings in the fire zone as a fire prevention measure.

PARKS

Our parks under the supervision of the Park Commissioner are well taken care of, and the Commissioner should have your whole-hearted support.

POLICE

Because the police department is governed by the Police Commission, you will have little to say about its conduct. However, as citizens and members of the city government, it should be your duty and your desire to take an active interest in its conduct and to do all in your power to promote a spirit of good will and support to this department upon which the lives and property of our citizens are so largely dependent for protection.

CONCLUSION

There is one other subject upon which I wish to touch briefly. I am optimistic in my belief that the worst of the depression is over, and I am grateful for the help of State and Federal authorities for the assistance they have rendered in the relief of unemployment and welfare work, but I feel that the responsibility of seeing that our people who, through no fault of their own, have been reduced to a condition of want do not suffer for the ordinary comforts of life is ours to consider.

I urge you to be regular and prompt in your attendance at all meetings, and it is my desire that you may work in a spirit of harmony and co-operation in all matters, allowing always that the other fellow may be right even if his opinion differs from yours.

Two years of service are ahead of us. May we all serve with the thought that Keene is our city. May we make it a happier, more prosperous city.

ORDINANCES AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

CITY OF KEENE

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred thirty-three.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to rentals of City Hall.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That on and after passage of this resolution the following shall be the rates for rental of City Hall, including all necessary heat, lights, stage help, ushers and police:

Local parties or organizations including one man for lights and one officer \$25.00; other than by local parties or organizations including one man for lights and one officer \$30.00; local parties or organizations for dance, etc., requiring two stage hands, ushers and officer \$29.00. Other than by local parties or organizations for dance, etc., requiring two stage hands, ushers and officer \$34.00. Local parties or organizations for dance, etc. requiring two stage hands and officer \$27.00. Other than by local parties or organizations for dance, etc. requiring two stage hands and officer \$32.00; matinees \$15.00; rehearsals \$15.00; use of kitchen \$3.00; wrestling or boxing including one man and two officers \$33.00. Each hour after 12:00 o'clock for all reservations \$5.00.

All police officers shall be engaged through the City Marshall. All ushers and stage hands shall be engaged through the City Hall Committee and the City Messenger is authorized to collect a deposit of not over 25% at the time of making reservations, which deposit may be forfeited in case of cancellation. Saturday night dances shall conform with the Ordinances of the City of Keene and the regulations of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen.

Passed December 7, 1933.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to indemnity to Federal Government in Sewage Disposal System.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

Whereas it is provided by Public Laws of New Hampshire that the Mayor and Aldermen may layout a sufficient quantity of land of any person for the purpose of constructing main drains or common sewers; and whereas it is further provided in such layout the damages shall be assessed by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen and that any person aggrieved by the decision of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen in the layout or in the assessment of damages may appeal to the Superior Court by petition within sixty days after the return of the decision of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen is made and recorded; and whereas said damages must fall by statute on the City of Keene for payment and whereas the Federal Government has requested a statement from the City of Keene that it would assume all responsibility and liability in the matter of the adjudication of any condemnatory proceedings or claims for damages.

Be it hereby resolved that the City of Keene does assume all responsibility and liability in the matter of the adjudication of any condemnatory proceedings or claims for damages in the execution of the so-called sewage disposal system and the Mayor and City Solicitor are hereby empowered and authorized to give a statement of indemnity to the Federal Government covering this matter.

Passed December 7, 1933.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to a Patrol Car.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the Joint Standing Committee on Police be and it is hereby authorized to purchase in exchange for the old car a suitable patrol car, the expenditure not to exceed the sum of five hundred dollars.

Passed December 7, 1933.

To the City Councils:

The following is an excerpt from the will of Chloe P. H. Eyers:

I have paid the City Clerk the said sum of Four Hundred Dollars and request the Councils to accept the fund in accordance with the provisions of the bequest.

ESTATE OF CHLOE PRIME HOLBROOK EYERS

I give and bequeath to the City of Keene the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400), as trustee, in trust, to hold, manage and invest the same, and use the income thereof in the suitable care and maintenance, including the providing of flowers, of the Daniel H. Holbrook lot in Greenlawn Cemetery in said Keene, which fund shall be known as the Daniel H. and Caroline L. Holbrook Fund.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to the Daniel H. and Caroline L. Holbrook Cemetery Fund.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the City of Keene, by its councils, hereby accepts The Daniel H. & Caroline L. Holbrook cemetery fund of Four Hundred Dollars, in trust, however, the income to be used in the care of the Daniel H. Holbrook lot in Greenlawn Cemetery including the providing of flowers.

The City Clerk shall receipt for said fund, which shall be invested by the Trustees of Trust Funds according to law.

Passed December 21, 1933.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to transfer of Appropriations.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the balance of the appropriation heretofore set apart for City Aid to Dependent Soldiers and their families amounting to the sum of \$1,115.11 and the balance of the appropriation for Old Age Assistance amounting to the sum of \$1,913.64 be transferred to the appropriation set apart for City Paupers.

Passed December 21, 1933.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to Cemetery Funds.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene as follows:

rower"), and the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA (here-
in called the "Government").

PART ONE

GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. **Amount of Loan and Grant, Purchase Price and Purpose.** Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement the Borrower will sell and the Government will purchase \$140,000 aggregate principal amount of the bonds. (herein called the "Bonds"), of the Borrower, being part of an authorized issue of \$170,000, at 100 per centum of the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest, and, in addition to the amount of Bonds to be purchased, the Government will make a grant (herein called the "Grant"), to the Borrower of not to exceed 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project as herein described, but such Grant together with the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds purchased, and any other funds, (herein called "Other Funds"), received directly or indirectly from the Government or any agency or instrumentality thereof to be used to aid the financing the construction of the Project, shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event shall such

aggregate amount exceed \$170,000, (except for such payment, if any, as may be made under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof), the proceeds derived from the sale of the Bonds and the amount paid on account of the Grant, (except for such payment, if any, as may be made under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof), to be used for the construction by the Borrower of a sewage disposal plant, comprising intercepting sewer, pumping station and treatment plant, (herein called the Project), and for other and incidental purposes: all pursuant to the Borrower's application, (herein called the "Application"), P. W. A. Docket No. 3401, the proceedings authorizing the issuance of the Bonds, Title 11 of the National Industrial Recovery Act, (herein called the "Act"), approved June 16, 1933, the Constitution and Statutes of the State of New Hampshire including particularly:

Public Laws of New Hampshire, 1926, Chapter 59.

2. Description of Bonds.

- (a) **Designation.** Sewage System Bonds.
- (b) **Principal Amount.** \$140,000.
- (c) **Type.** Negotiable general obligation coupon bond.
- (d) **Registration.** Registerable at the option of the holder as to principal only.
- (e) **Date.** February 1, 1934.
- (f) **Interest.** 4 per cent per annum, payable August 1, 1934 and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of February and August in each year.
- (g) **Maturities.** February 1 in each year.

- (h) **Security.** General obligations of the Borrower, payable from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limit as to rate or amount upon all the taxable property within the territorial limits of the Borrower.
- (i) **Place and Medium of Payment.** At a bank or trust company in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York in such funds as are, on the respective dates of payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, legal tender for debts due the United States of America.
- (j) **Denomination.** \$1,000.

3. **Form, Text and Sample of Bond.** The Bonds shall be in form and text satisfactory to the Legal Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, (herein called "Coun-

sel for the Government’’). Before the Bonds are prepared, the Borrower shall submit a sample or specimen bond with coupons for approval by Counsel for the Government.

4. **Method of Taking Up Bonds.** The Bonds shall be taken up and paid for in blocks from time to time as funds are needed for the Project, or the entire issue may be taken up and paid for by the Government at one time, in the discretion of the Finance Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, (herein called the “Finance Division”).

5. **Amount of Bonds to be Taken Up.** The Government shall be under no obligation to take up and pay for Bonds beyond the amount which, together with Other Funds, and the amount to be paid to the Borrower on account of the Grant as provided in this Agreement, shall be necessary, in the judgement of the Engineering Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works (herein called the “Engineering Division”), to complete the Project. In case any of the Bonds are sold to purchasers other than the Government, the principal amount of Bonds which the Government is obliged to take up and pay for shall be correspondingly reduced.

6. **Deposit of Bond Proceeds and Grant; Retirement Fund.** The Borrower will pay all accrued interest which it receives from the sale of the Bonds at the time of the payment therefor (and any payment which may be made on account of the Grant under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof), into an interest and bond retirement fund account. It will deposit the remaining proceeds from the sale of the Bonds and any payments made on account of the Grant under provisions of paragraph 8 and paragraph 10, PART 11 hereof in a bank or banks which are members of the Federal Reserve System, in a special account or accounts, each of such special account to be continuously secured by a pledge to the Borrower of direct obligations of the United States of America having an aggregate market value, exclusive of accrued interest, at all times at least equal to the balance on deposit in each such account. Such securities will either be deposited with the Borrower or be held by a trustee or agent satisfactory to the Finance Division, provided that the trust or agency agreement is satisfactory to Counsel for the Government. Provided, however, that at the option of the Finance Division such special account or accounts may be secured by a surety bond, or bonds which shall be in form, sufficiency and substance satisfactory to Counsel for the Government or such special account or accounts may be placed with a trustee under a Trust Agreement, both, the trustee and Trust Agreement to be satisfactory to Counsel for the Government and to the Finance Division. Any balance or balances remaining unexpended in such special account or accounts after the completion of the Project and which are not required to meet unpaid obligations incurred in connection with the construction of the Project shall be paid into said interest and bond retirement fund account, and, together with the accrued interest aforesaid, shall be used solely for the payment of the interest on and the principal of the Bonds, or said unexpended balance or balances may be used for the purchase of such of the Bonds as are then outstanding at a price, (exclusive of accrued

interest), not exceeding the principal amount thereof. Any Bonds so purchased shall be cancelled and no additional bonds shall be issued in lieu thereof. Such Bonds, when cancelled, shall be submitted to the Government for recording.

7. **Disbursement of Bond Proceeds and Grant.** The Borrower will expend the funds in such special account or accounts only for such purposes as shall have been previously specified in certificates accompanying the requisitions for such funds filed with the Government and approved by Counsel for the Government, or such funds shall be used for purchasing Bonds as provided in this Agreement.

PART TWO

1. **Approval of Agreement.** Within a reasonable time after the receipt of the Agreement, the Borrower shall adopt a resolution setting forth the Agreement in full, approving the same, and authorizing and directing the execution thereof by the official or officials designated to sign the same on the Borrower's behalf. Promptly thereupon, the Borrower shall cause such official or officials to sign the Agreement.

2. **Preliminary Proceedings by Borrower.** When the Agreement has been signed on behalf of the Borrower, the Borrower shall promptly:

- (a) Send to the Government three signed counter-parts of the Agreement and a certified copy of the Resolution adopted by the Borrower pursuant to Paragraph 1, PART TWO, hereof together with certified extracts of the minutes pertaining to the adoption and any papers, certificates and other documents which may be requested by Counsel for the Government;
- (b) Retain municipal bond counsel satisfactory to the Finance Division to assist the Borrower in the proceedings relative to the authorization, issuance and sale of the Bonds, and to give such legal opinions relative thereto as may be requested by the Counsel for the Government;
- (c) Submit to the Government plans, drawings, and specifications of the work and materials to be employed upon the Project; the latest data as to the expected cost of the Project; a statement as to when and how it is proposed to advertise for bids and to let contracts for the work; a statement as to when and how it is proposed to acquire the necessary lands, easements, franchises, and rights-of-way; an estimate as to the amount of money that will be needed at the time of the sale of the Bonds; and any other details or data that may be requested by the Engineering Division;
- (d) Submit to the Government all such authorizations, permits, licenses and approvals from Federal, State, county, municipal and other authorities as Counsel for the Government may deem advisable then to be obtained in connection with the Project or the Bonds;
- (e) Take all the proceedings necessary for the authorization and issuance of the Bonds.

3. **First Bond Requisition.** As soon as the provisions of Paragraph 2, PART TWO, hereof, shall have been complied with to the satisfaction of Counsel for the Government, the Borrower will file with the Government a requisition requesting the Government to take up and pay for such amount of the Bonds as, together with Other Funds, will provide sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period (or, in the discretion of the Finance Division, a requisition to take up and pay for the entire amount thereof at one time), specifying the principal amount, serial numbers and maturities (which maturities shall be satisfactory to the Finance Division) of the Bonds of such block and the date when it is desired to complete the delivery thereof (which date shall not be earlier than ten days after the Government's receipt of such first Bond requisition, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the first Bond requisition to be accompanied by a complete transcript of all bond proceedings to date, together with such certificates, forms, opinions, letters, statements and other documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

4. **First Bond Payment.** If the first Bond requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of the first Bond requisition, the Government will arrange to take up and pay for such amount of the bonds as, together with Other Funds, will provide, in the judgment of the Engineering Division, sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period, or, in the judgment of the Finance Division, the entire amount of the Bonds, the first Bond payment to be made at the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, Boston, Massachusetts, (herein called the "Reserve Bank"), or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of such Bonds, (having all unmatured coupons attached), together with such documents as may be requested by and which shall be in form, sufficiency and substance as theretofore approved by Counsel for the Government.

5. **Subsequent Bond Requisitions.** Unless all of the Bonds shall have been previously delivered and paid for, from time to time after the first Bond payment, but not oftener than once a month, (unless otherwise satisfactory to the Engineering Division), the Borrower will file a requisition with the Government requesting the Government to take up and pay for an additional block of the Bonds of such amount, as, together with Other Funds and such portion, if any, of the Grant, requested simultaneously with such Bond requisition, will provide sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period, specifying the principal amount, serial numbers and maturities, (which maturities shall be satisfactory to the Finance Division), of the Bonds included in such block and the date when it is desired to complete the delivery thereof, (which date shall be not earlier than ten days after the Government's receipt of such Bond requisition, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), each Bond requisition to be

accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

6. **Subsequent Bond Payments.** If a Bond requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of such Bond requisition, the Government will arrange to take up and pay for such additional amount of the Bonds as, together with Other Funds, and such portion, if any, of the Grant, paid simultaneously with the payment for such amount of the Bonds, will provide, in the judgment of the Engineering Division, sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period, each Bond payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery of such block of Bonds, (having all unmatured coupons attached), together with such documents as may be requested by and which shall be in form, sufficiency and substance as theretofore approved by Counsel for the Government.

7. **Grant Requisition.** The Borrower may, with any Bond requisition filed in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 5, PART TWO, hereof (or at any time after the final block of Bonds shall have been delivered and paid for, but not oftener than once each week thereafter), file a requisition requesting the Government to make a payment to the Borrower on account of the Grant, each Grant requisition to be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

8. **Grant Payments.** If a Grant requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of such Grant requisition (but not earlier than ten days after the receipt thereof, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the Government will pay to the Borrower a sum of money, which, together with all previous Grant payments, and Other Funds, shall be equal in aggregate amount to 25 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials shown to have been employed upon the Project to a date not later than the date of such Grant requisition; provided, however, that such Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments, Other Funds, and the amount paid for the Bonds shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event shall such Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments and Other Funds exceed in aggregate amount the sum of \$30,000; each Grant payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of its receipt therefor.

9. **Final Grant Requisition.** Within a reasonable time after the Project has been completed and all costs incurred in connection therewith have been determined, the Borrower may file a requisition with the Government requesting the Government for the final

portion of the Grant, the Final Grant requisition to be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

10. **Final Grant Payment.** If the final Grant requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of the final Grant requisition (but not earlier than ten days after the receipt thereof, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the Government will pay to the Borrower a sum of money, which, together with all previous Grant payments, and Other Funds, shall be equal in aggregate amount to 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project; provided, however, that the final Grant payment together with all previous Grant payments, Other Funds, and the amount paid for the Bonds shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event shall the final Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments and Other Funds, exceed in aggregate amount the sum of \$30,000; the final Grant payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of its receipt therefor.

11. **Cancellation of Bonds.** In the event that \$30,000 shall be less than 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project, and if, within a reasonable time after the completion of the Project, the Borrower shall have filed with the Government the final Grant requisition, and if the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, the Government will cancel, in so far as possible, and in such order as may be satisfactory to the Finance Division, Bonds and/or coupons in an aggregate amount equal to the difference between the aggregate amount of all Grant payments together with Other Funds, and 30 per centum of the cost and the labor and materials employed upon the Project; and for such reasonable time and to this end, the Government will hold Bonds in such amount as may be necessary to effectuate the purpose and intent of this Paragraph, unless payment of such difference shall have been otherwise provided for by the Government.

PART THREE

CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS

IN CONSIDERATION OF THE GRANT, THE BORROWER
COVENANTS THAT:

1. **Construction Contracts.** All construction contracts made by the Borrower and all subcontracts for work on the Project shall be subject to the rules and regulations adopted by the Government to carry out the purposes and control the administration of the Act, and shall contain provisions appropriate to insure that:

- (a) **Convict Labor.** No convict labor shall be employed on the Project, and no materials manufactured or produced by convict labor shall be used on the Project.

- (b) **30-Hour Week.** Except in executive, administrative and supervisory positions, so far as practicable and feasible in the judgment of the Government, no individual directly employed on the Project shall be permitted to work more than thirty hours in any one week, or, except in cases of emergency, on any Sundays or legal holidays; but in accordance with rules and regulations from time to time made by the Government, this provision shall be construed to permit working time lost because of inclement weather or unavoidable delays in any one week to be made up in the succeeding twenty days.

(c) **Wages.**

(1) All employees shall be paid just and reasonable wages which shall be compensation sufficient to provide, for the hours of labor as limited, a standard of living in decency and comfort;

(2) All contracts and subcontracts shall further prescribe such minimum wage rates for skilled and unskilled labor as may be determined by the Government and shall be subject to all rules and regulations which the Government may promulgate in connection therewith. Such minimum rates, if any, shall also be stated in all proposals of bids submitted including those of subcontractors; and a clearly legible statement of all wage rates to be paid the several classes of labor employed on the work shall be posted in a prominent and easily accessible place at the site of the work. All contractors shall keep a true and accurate record of the hours worked by and the wages paid to each employee and shall furnish the Government with sworn statements thereof on demand.

(3) All employees shall be paid in full not less often than once each week and in lawful money of the United States of America in the full amount accrued to each individual at the time of closing of the payroll, which shall be at the latest date practicable prior to the date of payment, and there shall be no deductions on account of goods purchased, rent, or other obligations, but such obligations shall be subject to collection only by legal process.

- (d) **Labor Preferences.** Preference shall be given, where they are qualified, to ex-service men with dependents, and then in the following order:

(1) To citizens of the United States and aliens who have declared their intention of becoming citizens, who are bona fide residents of the City of Keene, and/or Cheshire County, in the State of New Hampshire and,

(2) To citizens of the United States and aliens who have declared their intention of becoming citizens, who are bona fide residents of the State of New

Hampshire provided, that these preferences shall apply only where such Labor is available and qualified to perform the work to which the employment relates.

- (e) **Employment Services.** To the fullest extent possible, labor required for the Project and appropriate to be secured through employment services, shall be chosen from lists of qualified workers submitted by local employment agencies designated by the United States Employment Service, provided, however, that organized labor, skilled and unskilled, shall not be required to register at such local employment agencies but shall be secured in the customary ways through recognized union locals. In the event, however, that qualified workers are not furnished by the union locals within 48 hours (Sundays and holidays excluded) after request is filed by the employer, such labor may be chosen from lists of qualified workers submitted by local employment agencies designated by the United States Employment Service. In the selection of workers from lists prepared by such employment agencies and union locals, the labor preferences provided in Sub-Paragraph (d) *supra*, shall be observed in accordance with such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe.
- (f) **Human Labor.** In accordance with such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe, the maximum of human labor shall be used in lieu of machinery wherever practicable and consistent with sound economy and public advantage; and to the extent that the work may be accomplished at no greater expense by human labor than by the use of machinery, and labor of requisite qualifications is available, such human labor shall be employed.
- (g) **Accident Prevention.** Every construction contract for work on the Project shall contain an undertaking to comply with all applicable provisions of the laws and building and construction codes of the State, Territory District and/or municipality in which the work is done and with any regulations for the protection of workers which may be promulgated by the Government.
- (h) **Compensation Insurance.** Every construction contract for work on the Project shall contain a provision requiring the employer to furnish compensation insurance for injured workers and to give proof of such adequate insurance satisfactory to the Government.
- (i) **Persons Entitled to Benefits of Labor Provisions.** Every person who performs the work of a laborer or of a mechanic on the Project, or any part thereof, shall be entitled to the benefits of the labor and wage provisions hereof, regardless of any contractual relationship between the contractor or subcontractor and such lab-

orer or mechanic. There shall be no discrimination in the selection of labor on the ground of race, creed or color.

- (j) **Bonding of Contracts.** Construction contracts shall be supported by adequate surety or other bonds or security satisfactory to the Government for the protection of labor and material men employed on the Project or any part thereof.
- (k) **Materials.** So far as articles, materials, and supplies produced in the United States are concerned, only articles, materials and supplies produced under codes of fair competition adopted pursuant to the provisions of Title I of the Act, or under the President's Reemployment Agreement, shall be used in work on the Project, except when the Government determines that this requirement is not in the public interest or that the consequent cost is unreasonable. So far as feasible and practicable, and subject to the above, preference shall be given to the use of locally produced materials if such use does not involve higher cost, inferior quality or insufficient quantity, subject to the determination of the Government; but there shall be no requirement providing price differentiations for or restricting the use of materials to those produced within the Nation or State.
- (l) **Inspection and Records.** The Government, through its authorized agents, shall have the right to inspect all work as it progresses and shall have access to all pay rolls, records of personnel, invoices of materials, and other data relevant to the performance of the contract.
- (m) **Reports.** Subject to such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe, contractors and subcontractors shall make reports in triplicate to the Government monthly within five days after the close of each calendar month on forms to be furnished by the United States Department of Labor, which reports shall include the number of persons on their pay rolls, the aggregate amount of the pay rolls, the man hours worked, wage scales paid to various classes of labor and the total expenditures for materials. The contractors shall also furnish to the Government the names and addresses of all subcontractors at the earliest date practicable.
- (n) **Compliance with Title I of the Act.** All contractors and subcontractors must comply with the conditions prescribed in Sections 7 (a) (1) and 7 (a) (2) of Title I of the Act.

(2) **Restriction as to Contractors.** No contract shall be let to any contractor or subcontractor who has not signed and complied with the applicable approved code of fair competition adopted under Title I of the Act for the trade or industry or subdivision thereof

concerned, or, if there be no such approved code, who has not signed and complied with the provisions of the President's Reemployment Agreement.

(3) **Termination for Breach.** The Borrower will enforce compliance with all the provisions of this part of this Agreement, and, as to any work done by it in connection with the construction of the Project, will itself comply therewith. All construction contracts shall provide that if any such provisions are violated by any contractor or subcontractor, the Borrower may, with the approval of the Government, and shall at the request of the Government, terminate by written notice to the contractor or subcontractor the contract of such contractor or subcontractor, and have the right to take over this work and prosecute the same to completion by contract or otherwise and such contractor or subcontractor and his sureties shall be liable for any excess cost occasioned thereby and/or, if so requested by the Government, the Borrower shall withhold from such contractor or subcontractor so much of the compensation due to him as may be necessary to pay to laborers or mechanics the difference between the rate of wages required by the contract and the rate of wages actually paid to the laborers and mechanics.

(4) **Force Labor.** Provided however, that if prices in the bids are excessive, the Borrower reserves the right, anything in this Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, to apply to the Government for permission to do all or any part of the Project by day labor, upon such conditions as the Government may impose, with the understanding that all provisions in this Agreement, including those relating to labor, wages, hours and recruitment, shall be observed.

PART FOUR

Not R-E IV-I

1. **Construction of Project.** Upon receiving payment for the first block of Bonds, the Borrower will promptly commence or cause to be commenced the construction of the Project and the Borrower will thereafter continue such construction or cause it to be continued to completion with all practicable dispatch, in an efficient and economical manner, at a reasonable cost, and in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement as to the labor and materials to be employed upon the Project, and plans, drawings, specifications and construction contracts which, except for sub-contracts, shall be in form satisfactory to the Engineering Division, and in accordance with such engineering supervision and inspection as the Government or its representatives may require. Except with the prior written consent of Counsel for the Government, no materials or equipment for the Project shall be purchased by the Borrower subject to any chattel mortgage or any conditional sale or title retention agreement.

2. **Completion of Project.** Upon the completion of the Project

the Borrower will furnish to the Government a certificate of the Borrower's engineers certifying to such completion, to the total cost of the Project and to such other matters as the Engineering Division may request, such certificate to be accompanied by such data as the Engineering Division may request.

3. **Information.** During the construction of the Project the Borrower will furnish to the Government all such information and data as the Engineering Division may request as to the construction, cost and progress of the work. The Borrower will furnish to the Government and to any purchaser from the Government of 25 per centum of the Bonds, such financial statements and other information and data relating to the Borrower and the Project as the Finance Division or any such purchaser from time to time may reasonably require.

4. **Conditions Precedent to the Government's Obligations.** The Government shall be under no obligation to pay for any of the Bonds or to make any Grant:

- (a) **Cost of Project.** If the Engineering Division shall not be satisfied that the Borrower will be able to construct the Project within the cost estimated at the time when the Application was approved by the Government, such estimated cost being the amount of \$170,000 unless, in the event that additional funds appear to the Engineering Division to be necessary in order to pay in full the cost of the construction of the Project, the Finance Division shall be satisfied that the Borrower will be able to obtain such funds, as needed, through additional borrowing or otherwise, in a manner satisfactory to Counsel for the Government;
- (b) **Compliance.** If the Borrower shall not have complied to the satisfaction of Counsel for the Government, with all the provisions contained or referred to in this Agreement and in the proceedings authorizing the issuance of the Bonds, theretofore to be complied with by the Borrower;
- (c) **Legal Matters.** If Counsel for the Government shall not be satisfied as to all legal matters and proceedings affecting the Bonds, the security therefor or the Project;
- (d) **Representations.** If any representation made by the Borrower in this Agreement or in the Application or in any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, or in any document submitted to the Government by the Borrower shall be found by Counsel for the Government to be incorrect or incomplete in any material respect;
- (e) **Financial Condition.** If, in the judgment of the Finance Division, the financial condition of the Borrower shall have changed unfavorably in a material degree from its condition as theretofore represented to the Government.

5. **Representations and Warranties.** The Borrower represents and warrants as follows:

- (a) **Authorization.** All necessary authorizations, permits, licenses and approvals from Federal, State, county, municipal and other authorities in connection with the Project or the Bonds have been or will be obtained;
- (b) **Litigation.** No litigation or other proceedings are now pending or threatened which might adversely affect the Bonds, the construction and operation of the Project, or the financial condition of the Borrower;
- (c) **Financial Condition.** The character of the assets and the financial condition of the Borrower are as favorable as at the date of the Borrower's most recent financial statement, furnished to the Government as a part of the Application, and there have been no changes in the character of its assets or in its financial condition except such changes as are necessary and incidental to the ordinary and usual conduct of the Borrower's affairs;
- (d) **Fees and Commissions.** No fee or commission has been or will be paid by the Borrower or any of its officers, employees, agents of representatives, and no agreement to pay a fee or commission has been or will be entered into by or on behalf of the Borrower, or any of its officers, employees, agents or representatives, in order to secure the loan and/or Grant hereunder;
- (e) **Affirmation.** Every statement contained in this Agreement, in the Borrower's Application, and in any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, and in any other document submitted or to be submitted to the Government by or on behalf of the Borrower is, or when so submitted will be, correct and complete, and no relevant fact materially affecting the Bonds, the Grant, the Project or the obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement has been or will be omitted therefrom.

6. **Indemnification.** The Borrower will indemnify the Government and all purchasers of the Bonds from the Government against any loss or liability incurred by reason of an inaccuracy or incompleteness in any representation contained herein. In the event that there shall be any such inaccuracy or incompleteness, the Government shall be entitled (in addition to the above right of indemnification and any other right or remedy) to return any or all of the Bonds to the Borrower and recover the price paid therefor by the Government.

7. **Use of Governments' Name.** Without the prior written consent of the Government, the Borrower will not refer to this Agreement or to any purchase by the Government of the Bonds as an inducement for the purchase of any securities (including Bonds repurchased from the Government) of the Borrower, and will not permit any purchaser from it of any such securities to do so.

8. **Sale of Bonds by the Government.** The Borrower will take all such steps as the Government may reasonably request to aid in the sale by the Government of any or all of the Bonds. Upon request, the Borrower will furnish to the Government or to any purchaser from the Government of 25 per centum of the Bonds, information for the preparation of a bond circular in customary form, signed by the proper official of the Borrower, containing such data as the Government or such purchaser may reasonably request concerning the Borrower and the Project.

9. **Expenses.** The Borrower will pay all costs, charges and expenses incident to compliance with all the duties and obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the cost of preparing, executing and delivery the Bonds and obtaining all legal opinions requested by Counsel for the Government.

10. **Supplemental Documents.** The Borrower will furnish to the Government such supplemental documents as Counsel for the Government may request in connection with the Bonds, the Grant, the Project or the obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement.

11. **Waiver.** Any provision of this Agreement may be waived or amended with the consent of the Borrower and the written approval of the Engineering Division, Finance Division, and Counsel for the Government, without the execution of a new or supplemental agreement, if, in the opinion of Counsel for the Government, which shall be conclusive, such waiver or amendment does not substantially vary the terms of this Agreement. No waiver by the Government of any such provision shall constitute a waiver thereof as applied to any subsequent obligation of the Borrower or the Government under this Agreement.

12. **Agreement Not for the Benefit of Third Parties.** This Agreement is not for the benefit of any person or corporation other than the parties hereto, their respective assigns or the successors of the Borrower, and neither the holders of the Bonds nor any other person or corporation, except the parties hereto, their respective assigns or the successors of the Borrower, shall have any rights or interest in or under this Agreement, except as expressly provided for herein.

13. **Interest of Member of Congress.** No member of or Delegate to the Congress of the United States of America shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement, or to any benefit to arise thereupon.

14. **Validation.** The Borrower hereby covenants that it will institute, prosecute and carry to completion insofar as it may be within the power of the Borrower, any and all acts and things to be performed or done to secure the enactment of legislation or to accomplish such other proceedings, judicial or otherwise, as may be necessary, appropriate or advisable to empower the Borrower to issue the Bonds and to remedy any defects, illegalities and irregularities in the proceedings of the Borrower relative to the issuance of the Bonds and to validate the same after the issuance thereof to the Government, if in the judgment of Counsel for the Government

such action may be deemed necessary, appropriate or advisable. The Borrower further covenants that it will procure and furnish to the Government, as a condition precedent to the Government's obligations hereunder, a letter from the Governor of the State of New Hampshire in form satisfactory to Counsel for the Government and expressing the covenant and agreement of said Governor to effectuate insofar as it is within his power the covenant of the Borrower as hereinabove in this Paragraph expressed.

15. **Miscellaneous.** This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto when a copy thereof, duly executed by the Borrower and the Government, shall have been received by the Borrower. This Agreement shall be governed by and be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto, their respective assigns and the successors of the Borrower, and shall inure to the benefit of the holders from time to time of any of the Bonds; provided, however, that no rights of the Borrower hereunder shall be assignable except with the prior written consent of the Government. All obligations of the Borrower hereunder shall cease upon payment in full of all the Bonds.

16. **Promotion of National Recovery.** The Borrower covenants to discharge faithfully and with all possible dispatch the duties and obligations imposed upon it by this Agreement, it being the purpose of this Agreement to enable the Borrower to secure the benefits of the Act, foster employment, promote the public welfare and thereby assist in the recovery program of the President of the United States.

17. **Undue Delay by the Borrower.** The Government shall have the right to rescind the allotment for the Project and annul any obligation to make a loan or a grant to the Borrower unless the Borrower shall within a reasonable time:

- (a) Sign and return to the Government three counterparts of this Agreement as provided in Paragraphs 1 and 2, PART TWO, hereof. (For the purposes of this sub-paragraph 17 (a) a reasonable time shall be deemed to be ten days in the ordinary course of events or such longer period as shall be allowed in the absolute discretion of The Federal Administrator of Public Works);
- (b) Comply with all the provisions of Paragraph 2, PART TWO, hereof, including particularly sub-paragraph (e) relating to the authorization and issuance of the Bonds;
- (c) File requisitions with the Government in accordance with the provisions of Paragraphs 3 and 5, PART TWO, hereof; and
- (d) Commence or cause to be commenced the construction of the Project.

The Federal Emergency Administrator of Public Works shall determine in his absolute discretion what constitutes a reasonable time within the meaning of this Paragraph 17.

18. **Construction of Agreement.** If any provisions of this Agreement shall be invalid in whole or in part, to the extent that it is not invalid it shall be valid and effective and no such invalidity shall effect, in whole or in part, the validity and effectiveness of any other provision of this Agreement of the rights or obligations of the parties hereto, provided, in the opinion of Counsel for the Government, the Agreement does not then violate the terms of the Act.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the City of Keene, Cheshire County, New Hampshire and the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA have respectively caused this Agreement to be duly executed as of the day and year first above written.

LOAN AGREEMENT dated as of, 193 . . . between the CITY OF KEENE, CHESHIRE COUNTY, NEW HAMPSHIRE (herein called the "Borrower"), and the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA (herein called the "Government").

PART ONE

GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. **Amount of Loan and Grant, Purchase Price and Purpose.** Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the Borrower will sell and the Government will purchase \$22,000 aggregate principal amount of the bonds, (herein called the "Bonds"), of the Borrower, at 100 per centum of the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest, and, in addition to the amount of Bonds to be purchased, the Government will make a grant, (herein called the "Grant"), to the Borrower of not to exceed 30 per centum of the

cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project as herein described, but such Grant together with the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds purchased, and any other funds, (herein called "Other Funds"), received directly or indirectly from the Government or any agency or instrumentality thereof to be used to aid in financing the construction of the Project, shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event shall such aggregate amount exceed \$28,000, (except for such payment, if any, as may be made under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof), the proceeds derived from the sale of the Bonds and the amount paid on account of the Grant, (except for such payment, if any, as may be made under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof), to be used for the construction by the Borrower of extensions to its water distribution system, (herein called the "Project"), and for other and incidental purposes; all pursuant to the Borrower's application, (herein called the "Application"), P. W. A. Docket No. 3453, the proceedings authorizing the issuance of the Bonds, Title II of the National Industrial Recovery Act, (herein called the "Act"), approved June 16, 1933, the Constitution and Statutes of the State of New Hampshire and the Charter of the Borrower including particularly: Chapter 59, Public Laws of New Hampshire, 1926.

2. Description of Bonds.

- (a) **Designation.** Water Bond.
- (b) **Authorized Principal Amount.** \$22,000.
- (c) **Type.** Negotiable general obligation coupon bond.
- (d) **Registration.** Registerable at the option of the holder as to principal only.
- (e) **Date.** February 1, 1934.
- (f) **Interest.** 4 per cent per annum, payable August 1, 1934 and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of February and August in each year.
- (g) **Maturities.** February 1st in each year.

- (h) **Security.** General obligations of the Borrower, payable as to both principal and interest from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limit as to rate or amount upon all the taxable property within the territorial limits of the Borrower.
- (i) **Place and Medium of Payment.** At the office of the City Treasurer, Keene, New Hampshire, in such funds as are, on the respective dates of payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, legal tender for debts due the United States of America.
- (j) **Denomination.** \$1,000.

3. **Form, Text and Sample of Bond.** The Bonds shall be in form and text satisfactory to the Legal Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, (herein called "Counsel for the Government"). Before the Bonds are prepared, the Borrower shall submit a sample or specimen bond with coupons for approval by Counsel for the Government.

4. **Method of Taking Up Bonds.** The Bonds shall be taken up and paid for in blocks from time to time as funds are needed for the Project, or the entire issue may be taken up and paid for by the Government at one time, in the discretion of the Finance Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, (herein called the "Finance Division").

5. **Amount of Bonds to be Taken Up.** The Government shall be under no obligation to take up and pay for Bonds beyond the amount which, together with Other Funds, and the amount to be paid to the Borrower on account of the Grant as provided in this Agreement, shall be necessary, in the judgment of the Engineering Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, herein called the "Engineering Division"), to complete the Project. In case any of the Bonds are sold to purchasers other than the Government, the principal amount of Bonds which the Government is obliged to take up and pay for shall be correspondingly reduced.

6. **Deposit of Bond Proceeds and Grant; Retirement Fund.** The Borrower will pay all accrued interest which it receives from the sale of the Bonds at the time of the payment therefor (and any payment which may be made on account of the Grant under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof), into an interest and bond retirement fund account. It will deposit the remaining proceeds from the sale of the Bonds and any payments made on account of the Grant under provisions of Paragraph 8 and Paragraph 10, PART TWO, hereof in a bank or banks which are members of the Federal Reserve System, in a special account or accounts, each of such special accounts to be continuously secured by a pledge to the Borrower of direct obligations of the United States of America having an aggregate market value, exclusive of accrued interest, at all times at least equal to the balance on deposit in each such account. Such securities will either be deposited with the Borrower or be held by a trustee or agent satisfactory to the Finance Division, provided that the trust or agency agreement is satisfactory to Counsel for the Government. Provided, however, that at the option of the Finance Division such special account or accounts may be secured by a surety bond, or bonds which shall be in form, sufficiency and substance satisfactory to Counsel for the Government, or such special account or accounts may be placed with a Trustee under a Trust Agreement, both the Trustee and the Trust Agreement to be satisfactory to Counsel for the Government and to the Finance Division. Any balance or balances remaining unexpended in such special account or accounts after the completion of the Project and which are not required to meet unpaid obligations incurred in connection with the construction of the Project shall be paid into said interest and bond retirement fund account, and, together with the accrued interest aforesaid, shall be used solely for

the payment of the interest on and the principal of the Bonds, or said unexpended balance or balances may be used for the purchase of such of the Bonds as are then outstanding at a price, (exclusive of accrued interest), not exceeding the principal amount thereof. Any Bonds so purchased shall be cancelled and no additional bonds shall be issued in lieu thereof. Such bonds, when cancelled, shall be submitted to the Government for recording.

7. **Disbursement of Bond Proceeds and Grant.** The Borrower will expend the funds in such special account or accounts only for such purposes as shall have been previously specified in certificates accompanying the requisitions for such funds filed with the Government and approved by Counsel for the Government, or such funds shall be used for purchasing Bonds as provided in this Agreement.

PART TWO

1. **Approval of Agreement.** Within a reasonable time after the receipt of the Agreement, the Borrower shall adopt a resolution setting forth the Agreement in full, approving the same, and authorizing and directing the execution thereof by the official or officials designated to sign the same on the Borrower's behalf. Promptly thereupon, the Borrower shall cause such official or officials to sign the Agreement.

2. **Preliminary Proceedings by Borrower.** When the Agreement has been signed on behalf of the Borrower; the Borrower shall promptly:

- (a) Send to the Government three signed counter-parts of the Agreement and a certified copy of the resolution adopted by the Borrower pursuant to Paragraph 1, PART TWO, hereof, together with certified extracts of the minutes pertaining to its adoption and any papers, certificates and other documents which may be requested by Counsel for the Government;
- (b) Retain counsel satisfactory to the Finance Division to assist the Borrower in the proceedings relative to the authorization, issuance and sale of the Bonds, and to give such legal opinions relative thereto as may be requested by Counsel for the Government;
- (c) Submit to the Government plans, drawings, and specifications of the work and materials to be employed upon the Project; the latest data as to the expected cost of the Project; a statement as to when and how it is proposed to advertise for bids and to let contracts for the work; a statement as to when and how it is proposed to acquire the necessary lands, easements, franchises, and rights-of-way; an estimate as to the amount of money that will be needed at the time of the sale of the Bonds; and any other details or data that may be requested by the Engineering Division.
- (d) Submit to the Government all such authorizations, permits, licenses and approvals from Federal, State, county, municipal and other authorities as Counsel for the Government may deem advisable then to be obtained in connection with the Project or the Bonds;

(c) Take all the proceedings necessary for the authorization and issuance of the Bonds.

3. **First Bond Requisition.** As soon as the provisions of Paragraph 2, PART TWO, hereof, shall have been complied with to the satisfaction of Counsel for the Government, the Borrower will file with the Government a requisition requesting the Government to take up and pay for such amount of the Bonds as, together with Other Funds, will provide sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period (or, in the discretion of the Finance Division, a requisition to take up and pay for the entire amount thereof at one time), specifying the principal amount, serial numbers and maturities (which maturities shall be satisfactory to the Finance Division) of the Bonds of such block and the date when it is desired to complete the delivery thereof (which date shall not be earlier than ten days after the Government's receipt of such first Bond requisition, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the first Bond requisition to be accompanied by a complete transcript of all bond proceedings to date, together with such certificates, forms, opinions, letters, statements and other documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

4. **First Bond Payment.** If the first Bond requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of the first Bond requisition, the Government will arrange to take up and pay for such amount of the Bonds as, together with Other Funds, will provide, in the judgment of the Engineering Division, sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period, or, in the judgment of the Finance Division, the entire amount of the Bonds, the first Bond payment to be made at the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, Boston, Massachusetts, (herein called the "Reserve Bank"), or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of such Bonds, (having all unmatured coupons attached), together with such documents as may be requested by and which shall be in form, sufficiency and substance as theretofore approved by Counsel for the Government.

5. **Subsequent Bond Requisitions.** Unless all of the Bonds shall have been previously delivered and paid for, from time to time after the first Bond payment, but not oftener than once a month, (unless otherwise satisfactory to the Engineering Division), the Borrower will file a requisition with the Government requesting the Government to take up and pay for an additional block of the Bonds of such amount, as, together with Other Funds, and such portion, if any, of the Grant, requested simultaneously with such Bond requisition, will provide sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period, specifying the principal amount, serial numbers and maturities, (which maturities shall be satisfactory to the Finance Division), of the Bonds included in such block and the date when it is desired to complete the delivery thereof, (which date shall be not earlier than ten days after the Government's receipt of such Bond requisition, unless otherwise satisfac-

tory to Counsel for the Government), each Bond requisition to be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

6. **Subsequent Bond Payments.** If a Bond requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of such Bond requisition, the Government will arrange to take up and pay for such additional amount of the Bonds as, together with Other Funds, and such portion, if any, of the Grant, paid simultaneously with the payment for such amount of the Bonds, will provide, in the judgment of the Engineering Division, sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period, each Bond payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery of such block of Bonds, (having all unmatured coupons attached), together with such documents as may be requested by and which shall be in form, sufficiency and substance as theretofore approved by Counsel for the Government.

7. **Grant Requisition.** The Borrower may, with any Bond requisition filed in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 5, PART TWO, hereof (or at any time after the final block of Bonds shall have been delivered and paid for, but not oftener than once each week thereafter), file a requisition requesting the Government to make a payment to the Borrower on account of the Grant, each Grant requisition to be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

8. **Grant Payments.** If a Grant requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of such Grant requisition (but not earlier than ten days after the receipt thereof, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the Government will pay to the Borrower a sum of money, which, together with all previous Grant payments, and Other Funds, shall be equal in aggregate amount to 25 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials shown to have been employed upon the Project to a date not later than the date of such Grant requisition; provided, however, that such Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments, Other Funds, and the amount paid for the Bonds shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event shall such Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments and Other Funds, exceed in aggregate amount the sum of \$6,000; each Grant payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of its receipt therefor.

9. **Final Grant Requisition.** Within a reasonable time after the Project has been completed and all costs incurred in connection therewith have been determined, the Borrower may file a requisition with the Government requesting the Government for the final

portion of the Grant, the final Grant requisition to be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

10. **Final Grant Payment.** If the final Grant requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of the final Grant requisition (but not earlier than ten days after the receipt thereof, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the Government will pay to the Borrower a sum of money, which, together with all previous Grant payments, and Other Funds, shall be equal in aggregate amount to 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project; provided, however, that the final Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments, Other Funds, and the amount paid for the Bonds shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event shall the final Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments and Other Funds, exceed in aggregate amount the sum of \$6,000; the final Grant payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of its receipt therefor.

11. **Cancellation of Bonds.** In the event that \$6,000 shall be less than 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project, and if, within a reasonable time after the completion of the Project, the Borrower shall have filed with the Government the final Grant requisition, and if the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, the Government will cancel, in so far as possible, and in such order as may be satisfactory to the Finance Division, Bonds and/or coupons in an aggregate amount equal to the difference between the aggregate amount of all Grant payments together with Other Funds, and 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project; and for such reasonable time and to this end, the Government will hold Bonds in such amount as may be necessary to effectuate the purpose and intent of this Paragraph, unless payment of such difference shall have been otherwise provided for by the Government.

PART THREE

CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS

IN CONSIDERATION OF THE GRANT, THE BORROWER COVENANTS THAT:

1. **Construction Contracts.** All construction contracts made by the Borrower and all subcontracts for work on the Project shall be subject to the rules and regulations adopted by the Government to carry out the purposes and control the administration of the Act, and shall contain provisions appropriate to insure that:

- (a) **Convict Labor.** No convict labor shall be employed on the Project, and no materials manufactured or produced by convict labor shall be used on the Project.

(b) **30-Hour Week.** Except in executive, administrative and supervisory positions, so far as practicable and feasible in the judgment of the Government, no individual directly employed on the Project shall be permitted to work more than thirty hours in any one week, or, except in cases of emergency, on any Sundays or legal holidays; but in accordance with rules and regulations from time to time made by the Government, this provision shall be construed to permit working time lost because of inclement weather or unavoidable delays in any one week to be made up in the succeeding twenty days.

(c) **Wages.**

(1) All employees shall be paid just and reasonable wages which shall be compensation sufficient to provide, for the hours of labor as limited, a standard of living in decency and comfort;

(2) All contracts and subcontracts shall further prescribe such minimum wage rates for skilled and unskilled labor as may be determined by the Government and shall be subject to all rules and regulations which the Government may promulgate in connection therewith. Such minimum rates, if any, shall also be stated in all proposals of bids submitted including those of subcontractors; and a clearly legible statement of all wage rates to be paid the several classes of labor employed on the work shall be posted in a prominent and easily accessible place at the site of the work. All contractors shall keep a true and accurate record of the hours worked by and the wages paid to each employee and shall furnish the Government with sworn statements thereof on demand.

(3) All employees shall be paid in full not less often than once each week and in lawful money of the United States of America in the full amount accrued to each individual at the time of closing of the payroll, which shall be at the latest date practicable prior to the date of payment, and there shall be no deductions on account of goods purchased, rent, or other obligations, but such obligations shall be subject to collection only by legal process.

(d) **Labor Preferences.** Preference shall be given, where they are qualified, to ex-service men with dependents, and then in the following order:

(1) To citizens of the United States and aliens who have declared their intention of becoming citizens, who are bona fide residents of the City of Keene and/or County of Cheshire in the State of New Hampshire and,

(2) To citizens of the United States and aliens who have declared their intention of becoming citizens, who are bona fide residents of the State of New

Hampshire provided, that these preferences shall apply only where such labor is available and qualified to perform the work to which the employment relates.

- (e) **Employment Services.** To the fullest extent possible, labor required for the Project and appropriate to be secured through employment services, shall be chosen from lists of qualified workers submitted by local employment agencies designated by the United States Employment Service, provided, however, that organized labor, skilled and unskilled, shall not be required to register at such local employment agencies but shall be secured in the customary ways through recognized union locals. In the event, however, that qualified workers are not furnished by the union locals within 48 hours (Sundays and holidays excluded) after request is filed by the employer, such labor may be chosen from lists of qualified workers submitted by local employment agencies designated by the United States Employment Service. In the selection of workers from lists prepared by such employment agencies and union locals, the labor preferences provided in Sub-Paragraph (d) *supra*, shall be observed in accordance with such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe.
- (f) **Human Labor.** In accordance with such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe, the maxim of human labor shall be used—in lieu of machinery wherever practicable and consistent with sound economy and public advantage; and to the extent that the work may be accomplished at no greater expense by human labor than by the use of machinery, and labor of requisite qualifications is available, such human labor shall be employed.
- (g) **Accident Prevention.** Every construction contract for work on the Project shall contain an undertaking to comply with all applicable provisions of the laws and buildings and construction codes of the State, Territory, District and/or municipality in which the work is done and with any regulations for the protection of workers which may be promulgated by the Government.
- (h) **Compensation Insurance.** Every construction contract for work on the Project shall contain a provision requiring the employer to furnish compensation insurance for injured workers and to give proof of such adequate insurance satisfactory to the Government.
- (i) **Persons Entitled to Benefits of Labor Provisions.** Every person who performs the work of a laborer or of a mechanic on the Project, or any part thereof, shall be entitled to the benefits of the labor and wage provisions hereof, regardless of any contractual rela-

tionship between the contractor or subcontractor and such laborer or mechanic. There shall be no discrimination in the selection of labor on the ground of race, creed or color.

- (j) **Bonding of Contracts.** Construction contracts shall be supported by adequate surety or other bonds or security satisfactory to the Government for the protection of labor and material men employed on the Project or any part thereof.
- (k) **Materials.** So far as articles, materials, and supplies produced in the United States are concerned, only articles, materials and supplies produced under codes of fair competition adopted pursuant to the provisions of Title I of the Act, or under the President's Reemployment Agreement, shall be used in work on the Project, except when the Government determines that this requirement is not in the public interest or that the consequent cost is unreasonable. So far as feasible and practicable, and subject to the above, preference shall be given to the use of locally produced materials if such use does not involve higher cost, inferior quality or insufficient quantity, subject to the determination of the Government; but there shall be no requirement providing price differentiations for or restricting the use of materials to those produced within the Nation or State.
- (l) **Inspection and Records.** The Government, through its authorized agents, shall have the right to inspect all work as it progresses and shall have access to all pay rolls, records of personnel, invoices of materials, and other data relevant to the performance of the contract.
- (m) **Reports.** Subject to such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe, contractors and subcontractors shall make reports in triplicate to the Government monthly within five days after the close of each calendar month on forms to be furnished by the United States Department of Labor, which reports shall include the number of persons on their pay rolls, the aggregate amount of the pay rolls, the man hours worked, wage scales paid to various classes of labor and the total expenditures for materials. The contractors shall also furnish to the Government the names and addresses of all subcontractors at the earliest dates practicable.
- (n) **Compliance with Title I of the Act.** All contractors and subcontractors must comply with the conditions prescribed in Sections 7 (a) (1) and 7 (a) (2) of Title I of the Act.

2. **Restriction as to Contractors.** No contract shall be let to any contractor or subcontractor who has not signed and complied with the applicable approved code of fair competition adopted under Title I of the Act for the trade or industry or subdivision there-

of concerned, or, if there be no such approved code, who has not signed and complied with the provisions of the President's Reemployment Agreement.

3. **Termination for Breach.** The Borrower will enforce compliance with all the provisions of this part of this Agreement, and, as to any work done by it in connection with the construction of the Project, will itself comply therewith. All construction contracts shall provide that if any such provisions are violated by any contractor or subcontractor, the Borrower may, with the approval of the Government, and shall at the request of the Government, terminate by written notice to the contractor or subcontractor the contract of such contractor or subcontractor, and have the right to take over the work and prosecute the same to completion by contract or otherwise and such contractor or subcontractor and his sureties shall be liable for any excess cost occasioned thereby and/or, if so requested by the Government, the Borrower shall withhold from such contractor or subcontractor so much of the compensation due him as may be necessary to pay to laborers or mechanics the difference between the rate of wages required by the contract and the rate of wages actually paid to the laborers and mechanics.

4. **Force Labor.** Provided, however, that if prices in the bids are excessive, the Borrower reserves the right, anything in this Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, to apply to the Government for permission to do all or any part of the Project by day labor, upon such conditions as the Government may impose, with the understanding that all provisions in this Agreement, including those relating to labor, wages, hours and recruitment, shall be observed.

PART FOUR

1. **Construction of Project.** Upon receiving payment for the first block of Bonds, the Borrower will promptly commence or cause to be commenced the construction of the Project and the Borrower will thereafter continue such construction or cause it to be continued to completion with all practicable dispatch, in an efficient and economical manner, at a reasonable cost, and in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement as to the labor and materials to be employed upon the Project, and plans, drawings, specifications and construction contracts which, except for sub-contracts, shall be in form satisfactory to the Engineering Division, and in accordance with such engineering supervision and inspection as the Government or its representatives may require. Except with the prior written consent of Counsel for the Government, no materials or equipment for the Project shall be purchased by the Borrower subject to any chattel mortgage or any conditional sale or title retention agreement.

2. **Completion of Project.** Upon the completion of the Project the Borrower will furnish to the Government a certificate of the Borrower's engineers certifying to such completion, to the total cost of the Project and to such other matters as the Engineering Division may request, such certificate to be accompanied by such data as the Engineering Division may request.

3. **Information.** During the construction of the Project the

Borrower will furnish to the Government all such information and data as the Engineering Division may request as to the construction, cost and progress of the work. The Borrower will furnish to the Government and to any purchaser from the Government of 25 per centum of the Bonds, such financial statements and other information and data relating to the Borrower and the Project as the Finance Division or any such purchaser from time to time may reasonably require.

4. **Conditions Precedent to the Government's Obligations.** The Government shall be under no obligation to pay for any of the Bonds or to make any Grant:

- (a) **Cost of Project.** If the Engineering Division shall not be satisfied that the Borrower will be able to construct the Project within the cost estimated at the time when the Application was approved by the Government, such estimated cost being the amount of \$28,000, unless, in the event that additional funds appear to the Engineering Division to be necessary in order to pay in full the cost of the construction of the Project, the Finance Division shall be satisfied that the Borrower will be able to obtain such funds, as needed, through additional borrowing or otherwise, in a manner satisfactory to Counsel for the Government;
- (b) **Compliance.** If the Borrower shall not have complied, to the satisfaction of Counsel for the Government, with all the provisions contained or referred to in this Agreement and in the proceedings authorizing the issuance of the Bonds, theretofore to be complied with by the Borrower;
- (c) **Legal Matters.** If Counsel for the Government shall not be satisfied as to all legal matters and proceedings affecting the Bonds, the security therefor or the Project;
- (d) **Representations.** If any representation made by the Borrower in this Agreement or in the Application or in any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, or in any document submitted to the Government by the Borrower shall be found by Counsel for the Government to be incorrect or incomplete in any material respect;
- (e) **Financial Condition.** If, in the judgment of the Finance Division, the financial condition of the Borrower shall have changed unfavorably in a material degree from its condition as theretofore represented to the Government.

5. **Representations and Warranties.** The Borrower represents and warrants as follows:

- (a) **Authorizations.** All necessary authorizations, permits, licenses and approvals from Federal, State, county, municipal and other authorities in connection with the Project or the Bonds have been or will be obtained;

- (b) **Litigation.** No litigation or other proceedings are now pending or threatened which might adversely affect the Bonds, the construction and operation of the Project, or the financial condition of the Borrower;
- (c) **Financial Condition.** The character of the assets and the financial condition of the Borrower are as favorable as at the date of the Borrower's most recent financial statement, furnished to the Government as a part of the Application, and there have been no changes in the character of its assets or in its financial condition except such changes as are necessary and incidental to the ordinary and usual conduct of the Borrower's affairs;
- (d) **Fees and Commissions.** No fee or commission has been or will be paid by the Borrower or any of its officers, employees, agents or representatives, and no agreement to pay a fee or commission has been or will be entered into by or on behalf of the Borrower, or any of its officers, employees, agents or representatives, in order to secure the loan and/or Grant hereunder;
- (e) **Affirmation.** Every statement contained in this Agreement, in the Borrower's Application, and in any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, and in any other document submitted or to be submitted to the Government by or on behalf of the Borrower is, or when so submitted will be, correct and complete, and no relevant fact materially affecting the Bonds, the Grant, the Project or the obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement has been or will be omitted therefrom.

6. **Indemnification.** The Borrower will indemnify the Government and all purchasers of the Bonds from the Government against any loss or liability incurred by reason of any inaccuracy or incompleteness in any representation contained herein. In the event that there shall be any such inaccuracy or incompleteness, the Government shall be entitled (in addition to the above right of indemnification and any other right or remedy) to return any or all of the Bonds to the Borrower and recover the price paid therefor by the Government.

7. **Use of Government's Name.** Without the prior written consent of the Government, the Borrower will not refer to this Agreement or to any purchase by the Government of the Bonds as an inducement for the purchase of any securities (including Bonds repurchased from the Government) of the Borrower, and will not permit any purchaser from it of any such securities to do so.

8. **Sale of Bonds by the Government.** The Borrower will take all such steps as the Government may reasonably request to aid in the sale by the Government of any or all of the Bonds. Upon request, the Borrower will furnish to the Government or to any purchaser from the Government of 25 per centum of the Bonds, information for the preparation of a bond circular in customary form, signed by the proper official of the Borrower, containing such data

as the Government or such purchaser may reasonably request concerning the Borrower and the Project.

9. **Expenses.** The Borrower will pay all costs, charges and expenses incident to compliance with all the duties and obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the cost of preparing, executing and delivering the Bonds and obtaining all legal opinions requested by Counsel for the Government.

10. **Supplemental Documents.** The Borrower will furnish to the Government such supplemental documents as Counsel for the Government may request in connection with the Bonds, the Grant, the Project or the obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement.

11. **Waiver.** Any provisions of this Agreement may be waived or amended with the consent of the Borrower and the written approval of the Engineering Division, Finance Division, and Counsel for the Government, without the execution of a new or supplemental agreement, if, in the opinion of Counsel for the Government, which shall be conclusive, such waiver or amendment does not substantially vary the terms of this Agreement. No waiver by the Government of any such provision shall constitute a waiver thereof as applied to any subsequent obligation of the Borrower or the Government under this Agreement.

12. **Agreement Not for the Benefit of Third Parties.** This Agreement is not for the benefit of any person or corporation other than the parties hereto, their respective assigns or the successors of the Borrower, and neither the holders of the Bonds nor any other person or corporation, except the parties hereto, their respective assigns or the successors of the Borrower, shall have any rights or interest in or under this Agreement, except as expressly provided for herein.

13. **Interest of Member of Congress.** No member of or Delegate to the Congress of the United States of America shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement, or to any benefit to arise thereupon.

14. **Validation.** The Borrower hereby covenants that it will institute, prosecute and carry to completion insofar as it may be within the power of the Borrower, any and all acts and things to be performed or done to secure the enactment of legislation or to accomplish such other proceedings, judicial or otherwise, as may be necessary, appropriate or advisable to empower the Borrower to issue the Bonds and to remedy any defects, illegalities and irregularities in the proceedings of the Borrower relative to the issuance of the Bonds and to validate the same after the issuance thereof to the Government, if in the judgment of Counsel for the Government such action may be deemed necessary, appropriate or advisable. The Borrower further covenants that it will procure and furnish to the Government, as a condition precedent to the Government's obligations hereunder, a letter from the Governor of the State of New Hampshire in form satisfactory to Counsel for the Government and expressing the covenant and agreement of said Governor to effectuate insofar as it is within his power the covenant of the Borrower as hereinabove in this Paragraph expressed.

15. **Miscellaneous.** This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto when a copy thereof, duly executed by the Borrower and the Government, shall have been received by the Borrower. This Agreement shall be governed by and be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto, their respective assigns and the successors of the Borrower, and shall inure to the benefit of the holders from time to time of any of the Bonds; provided, however, that no rights of the Borrower hereunder shall be assignable except with the prior written consent of the Government. All obligations of the Borrower hereunder shall cease upon payment in full of all the Bonds.

16. **Promotion of National Recovery.** The Borrower covenants to discharge faithfully and with all possible dispatch the duties and obligations imposed upon it by this Agreement, it being the purpose of this Agreement to enable the Borrower to secure the benefits of the Act, foster employment, promote the public welfare and thereby assist in the recovery program of the President of the United States.

17. **Undue Delay by the Borrower.** The Government shall have the right to rescind the allotment for the Project and annul any obligation to make a loan or a grant to the Borrower unless the Borrower shall within a reasonable time:

- (a) Sign and return to the Government three counterparts of this Agreement as provided in Paragraphs 1 and 2, PART TWO, hereof. (For the purposes of this sub-paragraph 17 (a) a reasonable time shall be deemed to be ten days in the ordinary course of events or such longer period as shall be allowed in the absolute discretion of The Federal Emergency Administrator of Public Works);
- (b) Comply with all the provisions of Paragraph 2, PART TWO, hereof, including particularly sub-paragraph (e) relating to the authorization and issuance of the Bonds;
- (c) File requisitions with the Government in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 3 and 5, PART TWO, hereof; and
- (d) Commence or cause to be commenced the construction of the Project.

The Federal Emergency Administrator of Public Works shall determine in his absolute discretion what constitutes a reasonable time within the meaning of this Paragraph 17.

18. **Construction of Agreement.** If any provision of this Agreement shall be invalid in whole or in part, to the extent that it is not invalid it shall be valid and effective and no such invalidity shall affect, in whole or in part, the validity and effectiveness of any other provision of this Agreement or the rights or obligations of the parties hereto, provided, in the opinion of Counsel for the Government, the Agreement does not then violate the terms of the Act.

LOAN AGREEMENT dated as of 1934
between CITY OF KEENE, NEW HAMPSHIRE (herein
called the "Borrower") and the UNITED STATES OF
AMERICA (herein called the "Government").

PART ONE

GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. **Amount of Loan and Grant, Purchase Price and Purpose.** Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the Borrower will sell and the Government will purchase \$6,500 aggregate principal amount of the bonds (herein called the "Bonds") of the Borrower, at 100 per centum of the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest, and, in addition to the amount of Bonds to be purchased, the Government will make a grant (herein called the "Grant") to the Borrower of not to exceed 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project as herein

described, but such Grant together with the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds purchased, and any other funds (herein called "Other Funds") received directly or indirectly from the Government or any agency or instrumentality thereof to be used to aid in financing the construction of the Project, shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event such aggregate amount exceed \$9,000, (except for such payment, if any, as may be made under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof), the proceeds derived from the sale of the Bonds and the amount paid on account of the Grant, (except for such payment, if any, as may be made under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof), to be used for the construction by the Borrower of a park development, including grading, filling, seeding and laying of pipe (herein called the "Project") and for other and incidental purposes; all pursuant to the Borrower's application (herein called the "Application") P. W. A. Docket No. 4276, the proceedings authorizing the issuance of the Bonds, Title II of the National Industrial Recovery Act (herein called the "Act") approved June 16, 1933, the Constitution and Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, and the Charter of the Borrower including particularly:

Public Laws of New Hampshire, 1926, Chapter 59.

Public Laws of New Hampshire, 1926, Chapter 54.

Public Laws of New Hampshire, 1926, Chapter 42.

2. Description of Bonds.

(a) **Designation.** Security Bond of the City of Keene, New Hampshire.

(b) **Authorized Principal Amount.** \$6,500.

(c) **Type.** Negotiable, general obligation, coupon bond.

(d) **Registration.** Registerable at the option of the holder as to principal only.

(e) **Date.** February 15, 1934.

(f) **Interest.** 4 per cent per annum, payable on the fifteenth day of August, 1934, and semi-annually thereafter on the fifteenth day of February and August of each year.

(g) **Maturities.** February 15, in each year without option of prior redemption as follows:

(h) **Security.** General obligations of the Borrower, payable as to both principal and interest from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limit as to rate or amount upon all the taxable property within the territorial limits of the Borrower.

(i) **Place and Medium of Payment.** At the office of the City Treasurer in the City of Keene, New Hampshire in such funds as are, on the respective dates of pay-

ment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, legal tender for debts due the United States of America.

(j) **Denomination.** \$500.

3. **Form, Text and Sample of Bond.** The Bonds shall be in form and text satisfactory to the Legal Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works (herein called "Counsel for the Government"). Before the Bonds are prepared, the Borrower shall submit a sample or specimen bond (with coupons) for approval by Counsel for the Government.

4. **Method of Taking Up Bonds.** The Bonds shall be taken up and paid for in blocks from time to time as funds are needed for the Project, or the entire issue may be taken up and paid for by the Government at one time, in the discretion of the Finance Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works (herein called the "Finance Division").

5. **Amount of Bonds to be Taken Up.** The Government shall be under no obligation to take up and pay for Bonds beyond the amount which, together with Other Funds, and the amount to be paid to the Borrower on account of the Grant as provided in this Agreement, shall be necessary, in the judgment of the Engineering Division of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works (herein called the "Engineering Division"), to complete the Project. In case any of the Bonds are sold to purchasers other than the Government, the principal amount of Bonds which the Government is obliged to take up and pay for shall be correspondingly reduced.

6. **Deposit of Bond Proceeds and Grant; Retirement Fund.** The Borrower will pay all accrued interest which it receives from the sale of the Bonds at the time of the payment therefor (and any payment which may be made on account of the Grant under the provisions of Paragraph 11, PART TWO, hereof) into an interest and bond retirement fund account. It will deposit the remaining proceeds from the sale of the Bonds and any payments made on account of the Grant in a bank or banks which are members of the Federal Reserve System, in a special account or accounts, each of such special accounts to be continuously secured by a pledge to the Borrower of direct obligations of the United States of America having an aggregate market value, exclusive of accrued interest, at all times at least equal to the balance on deposit in each such account. Such securities will either be deposited with the Borrower or be held by a trustee or agent satisfactory to the Finance Division, provided that the trust or agency agreement is satisfactory to Counsel for the Government. Provided, however, that at the option of the Finance Division such special account or accounts may be secured by a surety bond, or bonds which shall be in form, sufficiency and substance satisfactory to Counsel for the Government, or such special account or accounts may be placed with a Trustee under a Trust Agreement, both the Trustee and the Trust Agreement to be satisfactory to the Finance Division. Any balance or balances remaining unexpended in such special account or accounts after the completion of the Project and which are not required to meet unpaid obligations incurred in connection with the construction of the Project shall

be paid into said interest and bond retirement fund account, and, together with the accrued interest aforesaid, shall be used solely for the payment of the interest on and the principal of the Bonds, or said unexpended balance or balances may be used for the purchase of such of the Bonds as are then outstanding at a price, (exclusive of accrued interest), not exceeding the principal amount thereof. Any Bonds so purchased shall be cancelled and no additional bonds shall be issued in lieu thereof. Such Bonds, when cancelled, shall be submitted to the Government for recording.

7. **Disbursement of Bond Proceeds and Grant.** The Borrower will expend the funds in such special account or accounts only for such purposes as shall have been previously specified in certificates accompanying the requisitions for such funds filed with the Government and approved by Counsel for the Government, or such funds shall be used for purchasing Bonds as provided in this Agreement.

PART TWO

1. **Approval of Agreement.** Within a reasonable time after the receipt of the Agreement, the Borrower shall adopt a resolution setting forth the Agreement in full, approving the same, and authorizing and directing the execution thereof by the official or officials designated to sign the same on the Borrower's behalf. Promptly thereupon, the Borrower shall cause such official or officials to sign the Agreement.

2. **Preliminary Proceedings by Borrower.** When the Agreement has been signed on behalf of the Borrower, the Borrower shall promptly :

- (a) Send to the Government three signed counter-parts of the Agreement and a certified copy of the resolution adopted by the Borrower pursuant to Paragraph 1, PART TWO, hereof, together with certified extracts of the minutes pertaining to its adoption and any papers, certificates and other documents which may be requested by Counsel for the Government;
- (b) Retain municipal bond counsel satisfactory to the Finance Division to assist the Borrower in the proceedings relative to the authorization, issuance and sale of the Bonds, and to give such legal opinions relative thereto as may be requested by Counsel for the Government;
- (c) Submit to the Government plans, drawings, and specifications of the work and materials to be employed upon the Project; the latest data as to the expected cost of the Project; a statement as to when and how it is proposed to advertise for bids and to let contracts for the work; a statement as to when and how it is proposed to acquire the necessary lands, easements, franchises, and rights-of-way; an estimate as to the amount of money that will be needed at the time of the sale of the Bonds; and any other detail or data that may be requested by the Engineering Division;

- (d) Submit to the Government all such authorizations, permits, licenses and approvals from Federal, State, county, municipal and other authorities as Counsel for the Government may deem advisable then to be obtained in connection with the Project or the Bonds;
- (e) Take all the proceedings necessary for the authorization and issuance of the Bonds.

3. **First Bond Requisition.** As soon as the provisions of Paragraph 2, PART TWO, hereof, shall have been complied with to the satisfaction of Counsel for the Government, the Borrower will file with the Government a requisition requesting the Government to take up and pay for such amount of the Bonds, as together with Other Funds, will provide sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period (or, in the discretion of the Finance Division, a requisition to take up and pay for the entire amount thereof at one time), specifying the principal amount, serial numbers and maturities (which maturities shall be satisfactory to the Finance Division) of the Bonds of such block and the date when it is desired to complete the delivery thereof (which date shall not be earlier than ten days after the Government's receipt of such first Bond requisition, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the first Bond requisition to be accompanied by a complete transcript of all bond proceedings to date, together with such certificates, forms, opinions, letters, statements and other documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

4. **First Bond Payment.** If the first Bond requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of the first Bond requisition, the Government will arrange to take up and pay for such amount of the Bonds as, together with Other Funds, will provide, in the judgment of the Engineering Division, sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period, or, in the judgment of the Finance Division, the entire amount of the Bonds, the first Bond payment to be made at the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, Boston, Massachusetts (herein called the "Reserve Bank"), or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of such Bonds, (having all unmatured coupons attached), together with such documents as may be requested by and which shall in form, sufficiency and substance as theretofore approved by Counsel for the Government.

5. **Subsequent Bond Requisitions.** Unless all of the Bonds shall have been previously delivered and paid for, from time to time after the first Bond payment, but not oftener than once a month, (unless otherwise satisfactory to the Engineering Division), the Borrower will file a requisition with the Government requesting the Government to take up and pay for an additional block of the Bonds of such amount, as, together with Other Funds, and such portion, if any, of the Grant, requested simultaneously with such Bond requisition, will provide sufficient funds for the construction

of the Project for a reasonable period, specifying the principal amount, serial numbers and maturities, (which maturities shall be satisfactory to the Finance Division), of the Bonds included in such block and the date when it is desired to complete the delivery thereof, (which date shall be not earlier than ten days after the Government's receipt of such Bond requisition, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), each Bond requisition to be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

6. **Subsequent Bond Payments.** If a Bond requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of such Bond requisition, the Government will arrange to take up and pay for such additional amount of the Bonds as, together with Other Funds, and such portion, if any, of the Grant, paid simultaneously with the payment for such amount of the Bonds, will provide, in the judgment of the Engineering Division, sufficient funds for the construction of the Project for a reasonable period, each Bond payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery of such block of Bonds, (having all unmatured coupons attached), together with such documents as may be requested by and which shall be in form, sufficiency and substance as theretofore approved by Counsel for the Government.

7. **Grant Requisition.** The Borrower may at any time after the execution of this Agreement but not oftener than once a week, file a requisition requesting the Government to make a payment to the Borrower on account of the Grant, each Grant requisition to be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

8. **Grant Payments.** If a Grant requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of such Grant requisition (but not earlier than ten days after the receipt thereof, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the Government will pay to the Borrower a sum of money, which together with all previous Grant payments, and Other Funds, shall be equal in aggregate amount to 25 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials shown to have been employed upon the Project to a date not later than the date of such Grant requisition; provided, however, that such Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments, Other Funds, and the amount paid for the Bonds shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event shall such Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments and Other Funds, exceed in aggregate amount the sum of \$2,200; each Grant payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of its receipt therefor.

9. **Final Grant Requisition.** Within a reasonable time after the Project has been completed and all costs incurred in connection therewith have been determined, the Borrower may file a requisition with the Government requesting the Government for the final portion of the Grant, the final Grant requisition to be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by Counsel for the Government.

10. **Final Grant Payment.** If the final Grant requisition and the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice to the Borrower, and within a reasonable time after the receipt by the Government of the final Grant requisition (but not earlier than ten days after the receipt thereof, unless otherwise satisfactory to Counsel for the Government), the Government will pay to the Borrower a sum of money, which, together with all previous Grant payments, and Other Funds, shall be equal in aggregate amount to 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project; provided, however, that the final Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments, Other Funds, and the amount paid for the Bonds shall not exceed in aggregate amount the total cost of the Project, and in no event shall the final Grant payment, together with all previous Grant payments and Other Funds, exceed in aggregate amount the sum of \$2,500; the final Grant payment to be made at the Reserve Bank or at such other place or places as Counsel for the Government may designate, against delivery by the Borrower of its receipt therefor.

11. **Cancellation of Bonds.** If the Borrower, within a reasonable time after the completion of the Project, shall have filed the final Grant requisition with the Government, and if the documents accompanying the same are satisfactory in form, sufficiency and substance to Counsel for the Government, then, in addition to the Grant payments made under the provisions of Paragraph 8 and 10, PART TWO, hereof, the Government will cancel, in so far as possible, and in such order as may be satisfactory to the Finance Division, Bonds and/or coupons in an aggregate amount equal to the amount, if any, by which 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project exceeds the aggregate of all such Grant payments and Other Funds; and for such reasonable time and to this end, the Government will hold Bonds in the amount necessary to effectuate the purpose and intent of this Paragraph, unless payment of such excess shall have been otherwise provided for by the Government.

PART THREE

CONSTRUCTION WORK

IN CONSIDERATION OF THE GRANT, THE BORROWER COVENANTS THAT:

1. **Construction Work; Contracts; Force Account.** In consideration of the Grant, the Borrower covenants that: All work done by the Borrower and all construction contracts made by the Borrower and all subcontracts for work on the Project shall be subject to the rules and regulations adopted by the Government to

carry out the purposes and control the administration of the Act. The Borrower may employ labor by force account on the Project, upon such conditions, not inconsistent with the Act, as the Government may impose, and, as to any work done by the Borrower in connection with the Project, the Borrower will comply with the applicable provisions of PART THREE of this Agreement, unless specifically relieved therefrom by the Government. All construction contracts made by the Borrower shall contain, and all work done by the Borrower shall be governed by, provisions appropriate to insure that:

- (a) **Convict Labor.** No convict labor shall be employed on the Project, and no materials manufactured or produced by convict labor shall be used on the Project;
- (b) **30-Hour Week.** Except in executive, administrative and supervisory position, so far as practicable and feasible in the judgment of the Government, no individual directly employed on the Project shall be permitted to work more than 30 hours in any one week, or, except in cases of emergency, on any Sundays or legal holidays; but in accordance with rules and regulations from time to time made by the Government, this provision shall be construed to permit working time lost because of inclement weather or unavoidable delays in any one week to be made up in the succeeding 20 days;
- (c) **Wages.**

(1) All employees shall be paid just and reasonable wages which shall be compensation sufficient to provide, for the hours of labor as limited, a standard of living in decency and comfort;

(2) All contracts and subcontracts shall further prescribe, and all work done on force account shall be subject to, such minimum wage rates for skilled and unskilled labor as may be determined by the Government and shall be subject to all rules and regulations which the Government may promulgate in connection therewith. Such minimum rates, if any, shall also be stated in all proposals of bids submitted including those of subcontractors; and a clearly legible statement of all wage rates to be paid the several classes of labor employed on the work shall be posted in a prominent and easily accessible place at the site of the work. All contractors shall keep a true and accurate record of the hours worked by and the wages paid to each employee and shall furnish the Government with sworn statements thereof on demand. The Borrower shall also keep a true and accurate record of the hours worked by and the wages paid to each employee working on force account on the Project and shall furnish the Government with sworn statements thereof on demand;

(3) All employees shall be paid in full not less often than once each week and in lawful money of the United States of America in the full amount accrued to each individual at the time of closing of the pay roll, which shall be at the latest date practicable prior to the date of payment, and there shall be no deductions on account of goods purchased, rent, or other obligations, but such obligations shall be subject to collection only by legal process;

- (d) **Labor Preferences.** Preference shall be given, where they are qualified, to ex-service men with dependents, and then in the following order:

(1) To citizens of the United States and aliens who have declared their intention of becoming citizens, who are bona fide residents of the City Keene and/or Cheshire County in the State of New Hampshire, and

(2) To citizens of the United States and aliens who have declared their intention of becoming citizens, who are bona fide residents of the State of New Hampshire, provided, that these preferences shall apply only where such labor is available and qualified to perform the work to which the employment relates;

- (e) **Employment Services.** To the fullest extent possible, labor required for the Project and appropriate to be secured through employment services, shall be chosen from lists of qualified workers submitted by local employment agencies designated by the United States Employment Service, provided, however, that organized labor, skilled and unskilled, shall not be required to register at such local employment agencies but shall be secured in the customary ways through recognized union locals. In the event(however, that qualified workers are not furnished by the union locals within 48 hours (Sundays and holidays excluded) after request is filed by the employer, such labor may be chosen from lists of qualified workers submitted by local employment agencies designated by the United States Employment Service. In the selection of workers from lists prepared by such employment agencies and union locals, the labor preference provided in Sub-Paragraph (d) *supra*, shall be observed in accordance with such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe:

- (f) **Human Labor.** In accordance with such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe the maximum of human labor shall be used in lieu of machinery wherever practicable and consistent with sound economy and public advantage; and to the extent that the work be accomplished at no greater expense by human labor than by the use of machinery, and labor of requisite qualifications is available, such human labor shall be employed.

- (g) **Accident Prevention.** Every construction contract for work on the Project shall contain an undertaking to comply with all applicable provisions of the laws and building and construction codes of the State, Territory, District and/or municipality in which the work is done and with any regulations for the protection of workers which may be promulgated by the Government.
- (h) **Compensation Insurance.** Every construction contract for work on the Project shall contain a provision requiring the employer to furnish compensation insurance for injured workers and to give proof of such adequate insurance satisfactory to the Government. The Borrower shall furnish compensation insurance for workers employed on force account, and shall give proof that such insurance is adequate to the satisfaction of the Government.
- (i) **Persons Entitled to Benefits of Labor Provisions.** Every person who performs the work of a laborer or of a mechanic on the Project, or any part thereof, shall be entitled to the benefits of the labor and wage provisions hereof, regardless of any contractual relationship between the contractor or subcontractor or the Borrower and such laborer or mechanic. There shall be no discrimination in the selection of labor on the ground of race, creed, or color.
- (j) **Bonding of Contracts.** Construction contracts shall be supported by adequate surety or other bonds or security satisfactory to the Government for the protection of labor and material men employed on the Project or any part thereof.
- (k) **Materials.** So far as articles, materials, and supplies produced in the United States are concerned, only articles, materials and supplies produced under codes of fair competition adopted pursuant to the provisions of Title I of the Act, or under the President's Reemployment Agreement, shall be used in work on the Project, except when the Government determines that this requirement is not in the public interest or that the consequent cost is unreasonable. So far as feasible and practicable, and subject to the above, preference shall be given to the use of locally produced materials if such use does not involve higher cost, inferior quality or insufficient quantity, subject to the determination of the Government; but there shall be no requirement providing price differentiations for or restricting the use of materials to those produced within the Nation or State;
- (l) **Inspection and Records.** The Government, through its authorized agents, shall have the right to inspect all work as it progresses and shall have access to all pay rolls, records of personnel, invoices of materials, and

other data relevant to the performance of the contract, or work done on force account;

- (m) **Reports.** Subject to such rules and regulations as the Government may prescribe, contractors and subcontractors and the Borrower shall make reports in triplicate to the Government monthly within 5 days after the close of each calendar month on forms to be furnished by the United States Department of Labor, which reports shall include the number of persons on their pay rolls, the aggregate amount of the pay rolls, the man-hours worked, wage scales paid to various classes of labor and the total expenditures for materials. The contractors shall also furnish to the Government the names and addresses of all subcontractors at the earliest dates practicable;
- (n) **Compliance with Title I of the Act.** All contractors and subcontractors must comply with the conditions prescribed in Sections 7 (a) (1) and 7 (a) 2 of Title I of the Act;

2. **Restrictions as to Contractors.** No contract shall be let to any contractor or subcontractor who has not signed and complied with the applicable approved code of fair competition adopted under Title I of the Act for the trade or industry or subdivision thereof concerned, or, if there be no such approved code, who has not signed and complied with the provisions of the President's Reemployment Agreement.

3. **Termination for Breach.** The Borrower will enforce compliance with all the provisions of this part of this Agreement, and, as to any work done by it on force account or otherwise in connection with the construction of the Project, will itself comply therewith. All construction contracts shall provide that if any such provisions are violated by any contractor or subcontractor, the Borrower may, with the approval of the Government, and shall at the request of the Government, terminate by written notice to the contractor or subcontractor the contract of such contractor or subcontractor, and have the right to take over the work and prosecute the same to completion by contract or otherwise and such contractor or subcontractor and his sureties shall be liable for any excess cost occasioned thereby and/or, if so requested by the Government, the Borrower shall withhold from such contractor or subcontractor so much of the compensation due to him as may be necessary to pay to laborers or mechanics the difference between the rate or wages required by the contract and the rate of wages actually paid to the laborers and mechanics.

PART FOUR

1. **Construction of Project.** Upon receiving a Bond payment under the provisions of Paragraph 4, PART TWO, hereof, the Borrower will promptly commence or cause to be commenced, the construction of the Project (unless such construction has already been commenced), and the Borrower will thereafter continue such construction or cause it to be continued to completion with all practicable dispatch, in an efficient and economical

manner, at a reasonable cost, and in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement as to the labor and materials to be employed upon the Project, and the plans, drawings, specifications and construction contracts which, except for subcontracts, shall be in form satisfactory to the Engineering Division, and in accordance with such engineering supervision and inspection as the Government or its representatives may require. Except with the prior written consent of Counsel for the Government, no materials or equipment for the Project shall be purchased by the Borrower subject to any chattel mortgage or any conditional sale or title retention agreement.

2. **Completion of Project.** Upon the completion of the Project the Borrower will furnish to the Government a certificate of the Borrower's engineers certifying to such completion, to the total cost of the Project and to such other matters as the Engineering Division may request, such certificate to be accompanied by such data as the Engineering Division may request.

3. **Information.** During the construction of the Project the Borrower will furnish to the Government all such information and data as the Engineering Division may request as to the construction, cost and progress of the work. The Borrower will furnish to the Government and to any purchaser from the Government of 25 per centum of the Bonds, such financial statements and other information and data relating to the Borrower and the Project as the Finance Division or any such purchaser from time to time may reasonably require.

4. **Conditions Precedent to the Government's Obligations.** The Government shall be under no obligation to pay for any of the Bonds or to make any Grant:

- (a) **Cost of Project.** If the Engineering Division shall not be satisfied that the Borrower will be able to construct the Project within the cost estimated at the time when the Application was approved by the Government, such estimated cost being the amount of \$9,000, unless, in the event that additional funds appear to the Engineering Division to be necessary in order to pay in full the cost of the construction of the Project, the Finance Division shall be satisfied that the Borrower will be able to obtain such funds, as needed, through additional borrowing or otherwise, in a manner satisfactory to Counsel for the Government;
- (b) **Compliance.** If the Borrower shall not have complied, to the satisfaction of Counsel for the Government, with all the provisions contained or referred to in this Agreement and in the proceedings authorizing the issuance of the Bonds, theretofore to be complied with by the Borrower;
- (c) **Legal Matters.** If Counsel for the Government shall not be satisfied as to all legal matters and proceedings affecting the Bonds, the security therefor or the Project;

- (d) **Representations.** If any representation made by the Borrower in this Agreement or in the Application or in any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, or in any document submitted to the Government by the Borrower shall be found by Counsel for the Government to be incorrect or incomplete in any material respect;
- (e) **Financial Condition.** If, in the judgment of the Finance Division, the financial condition of the Borrower shall have changed unfavorably in the material degree from its condition as theretofore represented to the Government.

5. **Representations and Warranties.** The Borrower represents and warrants as follows:

- (a) **Authorizations.** All necessary authorizations, permits, licenses and approvals from Federal, State, county, municipal and other authorities in connection with the Project or the Bonds have been or will be obtained;
- (b) **Litigation.** No litigation or other proceedings are now pending or threatened which might adversely affect the Bonds, the construction and operation of the Project, or the financial condition of the Borrower;
- (c) **Financial Condition.** The character of the assets and the financial condition of the Borrower are as favorable as at the date of the Borrower's most recent financial statement, furnished to the Government as a part of the Application, and there have been no changes in the character of its assets or in its financial condition except such changes as are necessary and incidental to the ordinary and usual conduct of the Borrower's affairs;
- (d) **Fees and Commissions.** No fee or commission has been or will be paid by the Borrower or any of its officers, employees, agents or representatives, and no agreement to pay a fee or commission has been or will be entered into by or on behalf of the Borrower, or any of its officers, employees, agents or representatives, in order to secure the loan and/or Grant hereunder;
- (e) **Affirmation.** Every statement contained in this Agreement, in the Borrower's Application, and in any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, and in any other document submitted or to be submitted to the Government by or on behalf of the Borrower is, or when so submitted will be, correct and complete, and no relevant fact materially affecting the Bonds, the Grant, the Project or the obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement has been or will be omitted therefrom.

6. **Indemnification.** The Borrower will indemnify the Government and all purchasers of the Bonds from the Government

against any loss or liability incurred by reason of an inaccuracy or incompleteness in any representation contained herein. In the event that there shall be any such inaccuracy or incompleteness, the Government shall be entitled (in addition to the above right of indemnification and any other right or remedy) to turn any or all of the Bonds to the Borrower and recover the price paid therefor by the Government.

7. **Use of Government's Name.** Without the prior written consent of the Government, the Borrower will not refer to this Agreement or to any purchase by the Government of the Bonds as an inducement for the purchase of any securities (including Bonds repurchased from the Government) of the Borrower; and will not permit any purchaser from it of any such securities to do so.

8. **Sale of Bonds by the Government.** The Borrower will take all such steps as the Government may reasonably request to aid in the sale by the Government of any or all of the Bonds. Upon request, the Borrower will furnish to the Government or to any purchaser from the Government of 25 percentum of the Bonds, information for the preparation of a bond circular in customary form, signed by the proper official of the Borrower, containing such data as the Government or such purchaser may reasonably request concerning the Borrower and the Project.

9. **Expenses.** The Borrower will pay all costs, charges and expenses incident to compliance with all the duties and obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the cost of preparing, executing and delivering the Bonds and obtaining all legal opinions requested by Counsel for the Government.

10. **Supplemental Documents.** The Borrower will furnish to the Government such supplemental documents as Counsel for the Government may request in connection with the Bonds, the Grant, the Project or the obligations of the Borrower under this Agreement.

11. **Waiver.** Any provision of this Agreement may be waived or amended with the consent of the Borrower and the written approval of the Engineering Division, Finance Division, and Counsel for the Government, without the execution of a new or supplemental agreement, if, in the opinion of Counsel for the Government, which shall be conclusive, such waiver or amendment does not substantially vary the terms of this Agreement. No waiver by the Government of any such provision shall constitute a waiver thereof as applied to any subsequent obligation of the Borrower or the Government under this Agreement.

12. **Agreement not for the Benefit of Third Parties.** This Agreement is not for the benefit of any person or corporation other than the parties hereto, their respective assigns or the successors of the Borrower, and neither the holder of the Bonds nor any other person or corporation, except the parties hereto, their respective assigns or the successors of the Borrower, shall have any rights or interest in or under this Agreement, except as expressly provided for herein.

13. **Interest of Member of Congress.** No member of or Delegate to the Congress of the United States of America shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement, or to any benefit to arise thereupon.

14. **Validation.** The Borrower hereby covenants that it will institute, prosecute and carry to completion insofar as it may be within the power of the Borrower, any and all acts and things to be performed or done to secure the enactment of legislation or to accomplish such other proceedings, judicial or otherwise, as may be necessary, appropriate or advisable to empower the Borrower to issue the Bonds and to remedy any defects, illegalities and irregularities in the proceedings of the Borrower relative to the issuance of the Bonds and to validate the same after the issuance thereof to the Government, if in the judgment of Counsel for the Government such action may be deemed necessary, appropriate or advisable. The Borrower further covenants that it will procure and furnish to the Government, as a condition precedent to the Government's obligations hereunder, a letter from the Governor of the State of New Hampshire in form satisfactory to Counsel for the Government and expressing the covenant and agreement of said Governor to effectuate insofar as it is within his power the covenant of the Borrower as hereinabove in this Paragraph expressed.

15. **Miscellaneous.** This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto when a copy thereof, duly executed by the Borrower and the Government, shall have been received by the Borrower. This Agreement shall be governed by and be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto, their respective assigns and the successors of the Borrower, and shall inure to the benefit of the holders from time to time of any of the Bonds; provided, however, that no rights of the Borrower hereunder shall be assignable except with the prior written consent of the Government. All obligations of the Borrower hereunder shall cease upon payment in full of all the Bonds.

16. **Promotion of National Recovery.** The Borrower covenants to discharge faithfully and with all possible dispatch the duties and obligations imposed upon it by this Agreement, it being the purpose of this Agreement to enable the Borrower to secure the benefits of the Act, foster employment, promote the public welfare and thereby assist in the recovery program of the President of the United States.

17. **Undue Delay by the Borrower.** The Government shall have the right to rescind the allotment for the Project and annul any obligation to make a loan or a grant to the Borrower unless the Borrower shall within a reasonable time:

- (a) Sign and return to the Government three counter-parts of this Agreement as provided in Paragraphs 1 and 2, PART TWO, hereof. (For the purposes of this subparagraph 17 (a) a reasonable time shall be deemed to be ten days in the ordinary course of events or such longer period as shall be allowed in the absolute discretion of The Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works);

- (b) Comply with all the provisions of Paragraph 2, PART TWO, hereof, including particularly sub-paragraph (e) relating to the authorization and issuance of the Bonds;
- (c) File requisitions with the Government in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 3 and 5, PART TWO hereof; and
- (d) Commence or cause to be commenced the construction of the Project.

The Federal Emergency Administrator of Public Works shall determine in his absolute discretion what constitutes a reasonable time within the meaning of this Paragraph 17.

18. **Construction of Agreement.** If any provisions of this Agreement shall be invalid in whole or in part, to the extent that it is not invalid it shall be valid and effective and no such invalidity shall affect, in whole or in part, the validity and effectiveness of any other provision of this Agreement or the rights or obligations of the parties hereto, provided, in the opinion of Counsel for the Government, the Agreement does not then violate the terms of the Act.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the CITY OF KEENE, CHESHIRE COUNTY, NEW HAMPSHIRE and the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA have respectively caused this Agreement to be duly executed as of the day and year first above written.

GRANT AGREEMENT
between

PART ONE

1. **Purpose of Agreement.** Subject to the terms and conditions of this Grant Agreement (herein called the "Agreement") the United States of America (herein called the "Government") will, by grant, aid the CITY OF KEENE, (CHESHIRE COUNTY, NEW HAMPSHIRE) (herein called the "Grantee") in financing a project (herein called the "Project") consisting of the construction of an intercepting sewer, pumping station, and sewage disposal plant, all pursuant to the Grantee's application (herein called the "Application"), P. W. A. Docket No. 3401, Title II of the National Industrial Recovery Act (herein called the "Act") and the Constitution and Statutes of the State of New Hampshire (herein called the "State").

2. **Amount of Grant.** The Government will make and the Grantee will accept a grant (herein called the "Grant") in an amount equal to 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project. In no event shall the Grant be in excess of \$56,000. The determination by the Federal Emergency Administrator of Public Works (herein called the "Administrator") of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project shall be conclusive.

3. **Grant Requisitions.** From time to time after the execution of this Agreement, the Grantee may file a requisition with the Government requesting the Government to make a payment on account of the Grant. Each requisition shall be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by the Administrator (a requisition together with such documents being herein collectively called a "Requisition").

4. **Grant Payment.** If a Requisition requesting the Government to make a payment on account of the Grant is satisfactory in form and substance to the Administrator, the Government will pay to the Grantee at such place or places as the Administrator may designate, against delivery by the Grantee of its receipt therefor, a sum of money equal to the difference between the aggregate amount previously paid on account of the Grant, and

- (a) 25 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials shown in the Requisition to have been employed upon

the Project if the Requisition shows that the Project has not been completed, or

- (b) 30 per centum of the cost of such labor and materials if the Requisition shows that the Project has been completed and that all costs incurred in connection therewith have been determined.

5. **Grant Advances.** At any time after the execution of this Agreement the Government may, upon request of the Grantee, if in the judgment of the Administrator the circumstances so warrant, make advances to the Grantee on account of the Grant, but such advances shall not be in excess of 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials to be employed upon the Project, as estimated by the Administrator.

6. **Deposit of Grant: Construction Accounts.** The Grantee shall deposit the Grant promptly upon receipt thereof, and all funds which will be required in addition to the Grant to complete the Project, in a separate account or accounts (each of such separate accounts herein called a "Construction Account"), in a bank or banks which are members of the Federal Reserve System and of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and which shall be satisfactory at all times to the Administrator.

7. **Disbursement of Monies in Construction Accounts.** The Grantee shall expend the monies in a Construction Account only for such purposes as shall have been previously specified in Requisitions filed with the Government and as shall have been approved by the Administrator. Any monies remaining unexpended in any Construction Account after the completion of the Project shall be used to meet obligations (including bonds or other indebtedness) incurred in connection with the construction Project. When there are no longer any such obligations outstanding the Grantee may use such monies for any other purpose.

8. **Other Financial Aid from the Government.** If the Grantee shall receive any funds directly or indirectly from the Government or any agency or instrumentality thereof, other than the Grant, to aid in financing the construction of the Project, to the extent that such funds are so received the Grant shall be reduced.

9. **Construction of Project.** As soon as practicable after the execution of the Agreement, the Grantee (unless it has already done so) shall commence or cause to be commenced the construction of the Project, and the Grantee shall thereafter continue such construction or cause it to be continued to completion with all practicable dispatch, in an efficient and economical manner, at a reasonable cost and in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement, plans, drawings, specifications and construction contracts which shall be satisfactory to the Administrator, and under such engineering supervision and inspection as the Administrator may require. Except with the written consent of the Administrator, no materials or equipment for the Project shall be purchased by the Grantee subject to any chattel mortgage, or any conditional sale or title retention agreement.

10. **Completion of Proceedings.** As soon as practicable after the execution of this Agreement, the Grantee (unless it has already

done so) shall obtain, or will take proceedings appropriate to obtain funds, which, together with the Grant, will be sufficient to pay all costs of constructing the Project.

11. **Information.** During the construction of the Project the Grantee shall furnish to the Government all such information and data as the Administrator may request as to the construction, cost and progress of the work.

12. **Representations and Warranties.** The Grantee represents and warrants as follows:

- (a) **Litigation.** No litigation or other proceedings are now pending or threatened which might adversely affect the construction and operation of the Project, or the financial condition of the Grantee;
- (b) **Financial Condition.** The character of the assets and the financial condition of the Grantee are as favorable as at the date of the Grantee's most recent financial statement, furnished to the Government as a part of the Application, and there have been no changes in the character of its assets or in its financial condition except such changes as are necessary and incidental to the ordinary and usual conduct of the Grantee's affairs;
- (c) **Fees and Commissions.** It has not paid and does not intend to pay any bonus, fee or commission in order to secure the Grant hereunder;
- (d) **Affirmation.** Every statement contained in this Agreement, in the Application, and in any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, and in any other document submitted to the Government is correct and complete, and no relevant fact materially affecting the Grant or the Project, or any of the duties or obligations of the Grantee under this Agreement has been omitted therefrom.

13. **Expenses.** The Government shall be under no obligation to pay any costs, charges or expenses incident to compliance with any of the duties or obligations of the Grantee under this Agreement including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, any legal, engineering or accounting costs, charges or expenses incurred by the Grantee.

14. **Waiver.** Any provision of this Agreement may be waived or amended with the consent of the Grantee and the written approval of the Administrator, without the execution of a new or supplemental agreement.

15. **Interest of Member of Congress.** No Member of or Delegate to the Congress of the United States of America shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement, or to any benefit to arise thereupon.

16. **Naming of Project.** The Project shall never be named except with the written consent of the Administrator.

17. **Undue Delay by the Grantee.** If in the opinion of the Administrator, which shall be conclusive, the Grantee shall delay for

an unreasonable time in carrying out any of the duties or obligations to be performed by it under the terms of this Agreement, the Administrator may cancel this Agreement.

18. **Conditions Precedent to the Government's Obligations.** The Government shall be under no obligation to make any part of the Grant:

- (a) **Financial Condition and Budget.** If, in the judgment of the Administrator, the financial condition of the Grantee shall have changed unfavorably in a material degree from its conditions as theretofore represented to the Government, or the Grantee shall have failed to balance its budget satisfactorily or shall have failed to take action reasonably designed to bring the ordinary current expenditures of the Grantee within the prudently estimated revenues thereof;
- (b) **Cost of Project.** If the Administrator shall not be satisfied that the Grantee will be able to complete the Project for the sum of \$200,273, or that the Grantee will be able to obtain, in a manner satisfactory to the Administrator, any additional funds which the Administrator shall estimate to be necessary to complete the Project;
- (c) **Compliance.** If the Administrator shall not be satisfied that the Grantee has complied with all the provisions contained in this Agreement theretofore to be complied with by the Grantee;
- (d) **Legal Matters.** If the Administrator shall not be satisfied as to all legal matters and proceedings affecting the Grant or the Project;
- (e) **Representations.** If any representation made by the Grantee in this Agreement or in the Application or in any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, or in any document submitted to the Government by the Grantee shall be found by the Administrator to be incorrect or incomplete in any material respect.

19. **Rescission of Previous Loan Agreement.** It is specially understood and agreed that a certain Loan Agreement heretofore entered into by and between the parties hereto as of February 2, 1934 for the purchase by the Government of certain bonds of the Grantee and the making of a grant to aid in financing the construction of the Project, by mutual consent, is hereby cancelled and rescinded.

IN CONSIDERATION OF THE GRANT, THE GRANTEE COVENANTS THAT:

1. **Construction Work.** All work on the Project shall be done subject to the rules and regulations adopted by the Administrator to carry out the purposes and control the administration of the Act. The following rules and regulations as set out in Bulletin No. 2, Non-Federal Projects revised March 3, 1934, entitled, "P. W. A. REQUIREMENTS as to BIDS, CONTRACTORS' BONDS, AND CONTRACT, WAGE, AND LABOR PROVISIONS AND GENER-

AL INSTRUCTIONS as to APPLICATIONS AND LOANS AND GRANTS", shall be incorporated verbatim in all construction contracts for work on the Project (in such construction contracts all blank spaces shall be filled in as provided in said Bulletin, the term "borrower" as used therein being construed as meaning "Grantee"):

"1. (a) **Convict Labor.**—No convict labor shall be employed on the project, and no materials manufactured or produced by convict labor shall be used on the project.

"(b) **Thirty-hour week.**—Except in executive, administrative, and supervisory positions, so far as practicable and feasible in the judgment of the Government engineer, no individual directly employed on the Project shall be permitted to work more than 8 hours in any 1 day nor more than 30 hours in any one week; Provided, That this clause shall be construed to permit working time lost because of inclement weather or unavoidable delays in any 1 week to be made up in the succeeding 20 days.

"(c) No work shall be permitted on Sundays or legal holidays except in cases of emergency.

"2. **Wages.**—(a) All employees directly employed on this work shall be paid just and reasonable wages which shall be compensation sufficient to provide, for the hours of labor as limited, a standard of living in decency and comfort. Such wages shall in no event be less than the minimum hourly wage rates for skilled and unskilled labor prescribed by the Administrator for the zone or zones in which the work is to be done, viz:

Skilled labor
Unskilled labor

"(b) In the event that the prevailing hourly rates prescribed under collective agreements or understandings between organized labor and employers in effect on April 30, 1933, shall be above the minimum rates specified above, such agreed wage rates shall apply: Provided, That such agreed wage rates shall be effective for the period of this contract, but not to exceed 12 months from the date of the contract.

"(c) The above designated minimum rates are not to be used in discriminating against assistants, helpers, apprentices, and serving laborers who work and serve skilled journeymen mechanics and who are not to be termed as "unskilled laborers."

"(d) The provisions of this contract relating to hours and minimum wage rates for labor directly employed on the project shall for the purposes of this contract, to the extent applicable, supersede the terms of any code adopted under Title 1 of the act permitting longer hours or lower minimum wage rates.

"(e) All employees shall be paid in full not less often than once each week and in lawful money of the United States, unless otherwise permitted by the Government engineer, in the full amount accrued to each individual at the time of closing of the pay roll, which shall be at the latest date practicable prior to the date of payment, and there shall be no deductions or rebates on account of goods purchased, rent, or other obligations, but such obligations

shall be subject to collection only by legal process: Provided, however, That this clause shall not be construed to prohibit the making of deductions for premiums for compensation and medical aid insurance, in such amounts as are authorized by the laws of.....
.....to be paid by employees, in those cases in which, after the making of the deductions, the wage rates will not be lower than the minimum wage rates herein established.

“(f) A clearly legible statement of all wage rates to be paid the several classes of labor employed on the work, together with a statement of the deductions therefrom for premiums for workmen’s compensation and/or medical aid insurance authorized by the laws of....., should such deductions be made, shall be posted in a prominent and easily accessible place at the site of the work, and there shall be kept a true and accurate record of the hours worked by and the wages, exclusive of all authorized deductions, paid to each employee, and the engineer inspector shall be furnished with a sworn statement thereof on demand.

“(g) The Board of Labor Review (herein called the “Board”) shall hear all labor issues arising under the operation of this contract and such issues as may result from fundamental changes in economic conditions during the life of this contract.

“(h) The minimum wage rates herein established shall be subject to change by the Administrator on recommendation of the Board. In the event that, as a result of fundamental changes in economic conditions, the Administrator, acting on such recommendation, from time to time establishes different minimum wage rates (referred to in paragraphs 2 (a), (b), and (c) hereof) all contracts for work on the project shall be adjusted accordingly by the parties thereto so that the contract price to the contractor under any contract or to any subcontractor under any subcontract shall be increased by an amount equal to any such increased cost, or decreased in an amount equal to such decreased cost.

“(i) Engineers, architects, and other professional and subprofessional employees engaged in duties normally done at the site of the project shall receive at least the prevailing rates for the various types of service to be rendered, provided that in no case shall professional employees receive less than the following weekly compensation for 40 hours or less irrespective of the number of hours employed: \$36.00 in the northern zone; \$33.00 in the central zone; and \$30.00 in the southern zone. Where the working week is longer than 40 hours, weekly compensation shall be increased proportionally. Compensation under this paragraph shall be subject to the approval of the Government Engineer.

“3. (a) **Labor preferences.**—Preference shall be given, where they are qualified, to ex-service men with dependents, and then in the following order: (1) To citizens of the United States and aliens who have declared their intention of becoming citizens, who are bona fide residents of (political subdivision and/or county)..... and (2) to citizens of the United States and aliens who have declared their intention of becoming citizens, who are bona fide residents of (State, Territory, or district).....: Provided, That these preferences shall apply only where

such labor is available and qualified to perform the work to which the employment relates.

“(b) **Employment services.**—To the fullest extent possible, labor required for the project and appropriate to be secured through employment services shall be chosen from the lists of qualified workers submitted by local employment agencies designated by the United States Employment Service: Provided, however, That union labor, skilled and unskilled, shall not be required to register at such local employment agencies but, if such labor is desired by the employer, shall be secured in the customary ways through recognized union locals. In the event, however, that employers who wish to employ union labor are not furnished with qualified union workers by the union locals which are authorized to furnish such labor residing in the locality within 48 hours (Sundays and holidays excluded) after request is filed by the employer, all labor shall be chosen from lists of qualified workers submitted by local agencies designated by the United States Employment Service. In the selection of workers from lists prepared by such employment agencies and union locals, the labor preferences provided in section (a) of this paragraph 3 shall be observed, and preference shall be given to those unemployed at the date of registration, who, at the date of selection, have no other available employment.

“(c) **Compliance with Title I of the Act.**—The following sections 7 (a) (1) and 7 (a) (2) of Title I of the Act shall be observed:

“(1) That employees shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, and shall be free from the interference, restraint, or coercion of employers of labor, or their agents, in the designation of such representatives or in self-organization or in other concerted activities for the purpose of collective bargaining or other mutual aid or protection; (2) that no employee and no one seeking employment shall be required as a condition of employment to join any company union or to refrain from joining, organizing, or assisting a labor organization of his own choosing.

“4. **Human labor.**—The maximum of human labor shall be in lieu of machinery wherever practicable and consistent with sound economic and public advantage; and to the extent that the work may be accomplished at no greater expense by human labor than by the use of machinery, and labor of requisite qualifications is available, such human labor shall be employed.

“5. **Compensation insurance.**—Every employer of labor shall provide, if permitted by the laws of....., adequate workmen's compensation insurance for all labor employed by him on the project who may come within the protection of such laws and shall provide, where practicable, employers' general liability insurance for the benefit of his employees not protected by such compensation laws, and proof of such insurance satisfactory to the Government engineer shall be given. Where it is not permitted by law that such insurance be provided, some method satisfactory to the Administrator must be provided by which the employees may, by paying the entire amount of the premiums, derive a similar protection.

“6. **Persons entitled to benefits of labor provisions.** There shall be extended to every person who performs the work of a laborer or of a mechanic on the project or on any part thereof the benefits of the labor and wage provisions of this contract, regardless of any contractual relationship between the employer and such laborer or mechanic. There shall be no discrimination in the selection of labor on the ground of race, creed, or color.

“7. **Withholding payment.**—Under all construction contracts, may withhold from the contractor so much
(The borrower)

of accrued payments as may be necessary to pay to laborers or mechanics employed on the work the difference between the rate of wages required by this contract to be paid to laborers or mechanics on the work and the rate of wages actually paid to such laborers or mechanics.

“8. **Accident prevention.**—Reasonable precautions shall at all times be exercised for the safety of employees on the work and applicable provisions of the Federal, State, and municipal safety laws and building and construction codes shall be observed. All machinery and equipment and other physical hazards shall be guarded in accordance with the safety provisions of the Manual of Accident Prevention in Construction of the Associated General Contractors of America, unless and to the extent that such provisions are incompatible with Federal, State, or municipal laws or regulations.

“9. **N. R. A. Compliance.**—The contractor shall comply with each approved code of fair competition to which he is subject, and if he is engaged in any trade or industry for which there is no approved code of fair competition, then as to such trade or industry with an agreement with the President under Section 4 (a) of the National Industrial Recovery Act (President’s Reemployment Agreement), and shall have the right,
(The borrower)

subject to the approval of the Government engineer, to cancel this contract for failure to comply with this provision and make open market purchases or have the work called for by this contract otherwise performed at the expense of the contractor. So far as articles, materials or supplies produced in the United States are concerned, no articles, materials or supplies shall be accepted or purchased for the performance of the work nor shall any subcontracts be entered into for any articles, materials or supplies, in whole or in part produced or furnished by any person who shall not have certified that he is complying with and will continue to comply with each code of fair competition which relates to such articles, materials or supplies, and/or in case there is no approved code for the whole or any portion thereof then to that extent with an agreement with the President as aforesaid.”

“10. (a) **Inspection of records.**—The Administrator, through his authorized agents, shall have the right to inspect all work as it progresses, and shall have access to all pay rolls, records of personnel, invoices of materials, and any and all other data relevant to the performance of this contract. There shall be submitted to

the Administrator through his authorized agents, the names and addresses of all personnel and such schedules of the cost of labor, costs and quantities of materials, and other items, supported as to correctness by such evidence, as, and in such form as, the Administrator, through his authorized agents, may require. The submission and approval of said schedules, if required, shall be a condition precedent to the making of any payment under the contract.

“(b) There shall be provided for the use of the engineer inspector such reasonable facilities as he may request. In case of dispute the Government engineer shall determine the reasonableness of the request.

“11. **Reports.**—Every employer of labor on the project shall report within 5 days after the close of each calendar month, on forms to be furnished by the United States Department of Labor, the number of persons on their respective pay rolls directly connected with the project, the aggregate amount of such pay rolls, and the man-hour work, wage scales paid to the various classes of labor, and the total expenditures for materials. Two copies of each of such monthly reports are to be furnished to the Government engineer and one copy of each to the United States Department of Labor. The contractor under any construction contract shall also furnish to to the Government engineer and to the

(The borrower)

United States Department of Labor the names and addresses of all subcontractors on the work at the earliest date practicable.

“12. There shall be provided all necessary services and all materials, tools, implements, and appliances required to perform and complete entirely and in a workmanlike manner the work provided for in this contract. Except as otherwise approved in writing by the Government engineer, such services shall be paid for in full at least once a month and such materials, tools, implements, and appliances shall be paid for at least once a month to the extent of 90 percent of the cost thereof to the contractor, and the remaining 10 percent shall be paid 30 days after the completion of the part of the work in or on which such materials, tools, implements, or appliances are incorporated or used.

“13. **Signs.**—Signs bearing the legend Public Works Project No. shall be erected in appropriate places at the site of the project.

“14. All reasonable rules and regulations which the Public Works Administration may prescribe toward the effectuation of the matters covered by paragraphs 1 to 13, inclusive, shall be observed in the performance of the work.

“15. **Subcontractors.**—(a) Appropriate provisions shall be inserted in all subcontracts relating to this work to insure the fulfillment of all provisions of this contract affecting such subcontractors, particularly paragraphs 1 to 14, inclusive.

“(b) No bid shall be received from any subcontractor who has not signed U. S. Government Form No. P. W. A. 61, revised (March 1934).

“16. **Termination for breach.**—In the event that any of the provisions of paragraph 1 to 15, inclusive, of this contract are vio-

lated by the contractor under the construction contract or by any subcontractor under any subcontract on the work,.....
 may, subject to the approval of the Government
 (The borrower)

engineer, and upon request of the Administrator, shall terminate the contract by serving written notice upon the contractor of its intention to terminate such contract, and, unless within 10 days after the serving of such notice such violation shall cease, the contract shall, upon the expiration of said 10 days, cease and terminate. In the event of any such termination.....may take over the
 (The borrower)

work and prosecute the same to completion or otherwise for the account and at the expense of the contractor and/or such subcontractor, and the contractor and his sureties shall be liable to.....
 (The borrower)

for any excess cost occasionedin the event of
 (The borrower)

any such termination, andmay take possession of
 (The borrower)

and utilize in completing the work, such materials, appliances, and plant as may be on the site of the work, and necessary therefor. This clause shall not be construed to prevent the termination for other causes provided in the construction contract.

“17. **Definition.**—The term “Act” as used herein refers to the National Industrial Recovery Act. The term “Government engineer” as used here, shall mean the State engineer (P. W. A.) or his duly authorized representative, or any person designated to perform his duties or functions under this agreement by the Administrator. The term “engineer inspector” as used herein refers to State engineer inspectors, resident and assistant resident engineer inspectors, and supervising engineers, appointed by the Administrator. The term “materials” as used herein includes, in addition to materials incorporated in the project used or to be used in the operation thereof, equipment and other materials used and/or consumed in the performances of the work.”

2. **Restriction as to Contractors.** The Grantee shall receive no bid from any contractor, nor permit any contractor to receive any bid from any subcontractor, who has not signed U. S. Government Form No. P. W. A. 61, revised March, 1934.

3. **Bonds and Insurance.** Construction contracts shall be supported by adequate surety or other bonds or security satisfactory to the Administrator for the protection of the Grantee, or materialmen, and of labor employed on the Project or any part hereof. The contractor under any construction contract shall be required to provide public liability insurance in an amount satisfactory to the Administrator.

4. **Force Account.** All construction work on the Project shall be done under contract, provided, however, that if prices in the bids are excessive, the Grantee reserves the right, anything in this Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, to apply to the Administrator for permission to do all or any part of the Project on a force account basis.

This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto when a copy thereof, duly executed by the Borrower and the Government, shall have been received by the Borrower. This agreement shall be governed by and be construed in accordance with the laws of the State. If any provision of this Agreement shall be invalid in whole or in part, to the extent it is not invalid it shall be valid and effective and no such invalidity shall affect, in whole or in part, the validity and effectiveness of any other provision of this Agreement or the rights or obligations of the parties hereto, provided, however, that in the opinion of the Administrator, this Agreement does not then violate the terms of the Act.

Three Contracts were made to the following:

Contract No. 1: to J. H. Ferguson Co. of Providence, R. I., covering all the pipe lines.

Contract No. 2: to Central Engineering and Construction Co. of Pawtucket, R. I. covering the Pumping Station and Disposal Field.

Contract No. 3: to the Starkweather Engineering Co. of Boston, Mass. for the pumping equipment.

Work began Sept. 25th on Contract No. 1; and progressed rapidly until the flood of Nov. 30th, when work stopped for three days.

Hard luck seems to follow Contract No. 2 on account of clay.

Under P W A Project No. 3453 the water system was greatly improved by connecting the West Keene pipe in Park Ave.

Park Ave., Maple Ave., Court St. and West Surry Road with the 12" main in the East Surry Road.

The Altitude Valve was moved nearer to Sylvan Lake, so that all the water used in the City is filtered.

Under the F E R A several dead ends have been eliminated. Thirty men are now employed on this work.

The maintenance of the Meter Department was increased due to the removing old worn meters and installing new ones. The old meters have been in service from twenty to thirty years.

Under the C W A drains were installed in the Arlington and Pine Banks section.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF HIGHWAYS

To His Honor the Mayor and Members of the City Councils:

I submit the following report of the highway department for the year ending November 30, 1934.

Mention was made in last year's report of the C. W. A. fund of \$18,000.00 allotted us. The fund was later increased by an additional \$14,000.00 and we were able to continue the work of graveling roads until April, thus providing work for some 200 men. Much of this work was carried on under considerable difficulty owing to the extreme cold and the unusual amount of snow but we feel that a great deal was accomplished. If we are to get the full benefit of the money spent these roads should be oiled.

Marlboro Road Project. Early in 1934 we received check for \$2,838.66 from the State of New Hampshire in final settlement for this work thus clearing what appeared as an overdraft in the last report.

Work on class five roads was continued this year, a representative of the State together with City Highway committee, selected the outlying roads in this class where the most benefit would be derived. The sum of \$9,316.64 was appropriated by the State, and was expended on 6.21 miles of road as follows: Ferry Brook road, \$895.92; Sullivan Nims road, \$1,587.23; Old Gilsun road, \$749.70; Gunn road, \$2,446.59; Hurricane road, \$1,302.49 and Chapman road \$2,334.70.

Metal or concrete pipes were furnished by the state and included in the above figures for the Ferry Brook road and the Sullivan Nims road, replacing all the wooden box culverts. Thus greatly reducing maintenance charges. Labor was furnished from the Federal Reemployment Office.

In addition to the expenditures of State money on the above class five roads, the City Highway Department has furnished lumber, cement, and steel for the building of two concrete culverts over Ferry Brook, explosives and equipment for the removal of 470 cubic yards of solid rock, and 3,520 cubic yards of gravel used as a surface coat for these roads.

Shade trees are having a hard time to survive the attacks of insect pests, and continued watchfulness is necessary to preserve our trees. Work this year to the amount of \$2,729.55 has been done. \$1,354.52 of this was expended under direction of the Highway committee for pruning and feeding, and the Highway Department has spent the balance in spraying, where insects were at work, tree removal and pruning.

The widening, straightening and raising of the walks on Ashuelot street was the largest single expenditure; other walks which were raised or surfaced with stone included River St. and several streets in West Keene. The entire expense for this work was \$1,808.16.

With several miles of dirt walks in the city there is ample room for improvement by surfacing with suitable material.

The collection of rubbish was made twice this year as usual.

For the past two years there has been talk of repairing West Street bridge, it is now apparent that something must be done. A survey of the bridge shows that many of the steel roadway beams are in bad condition and the plank floor needs renewing. To replace these beams with new steel and lay an entirely new floor of treated lumber would cost about \$5,000.

These repairs together with painting, should make this bridge adequate for the next ten or fifteen years' traffic.

Several other bridges need cleaning and painting, and if put off much longer the cleaning will be more costly than the painting.

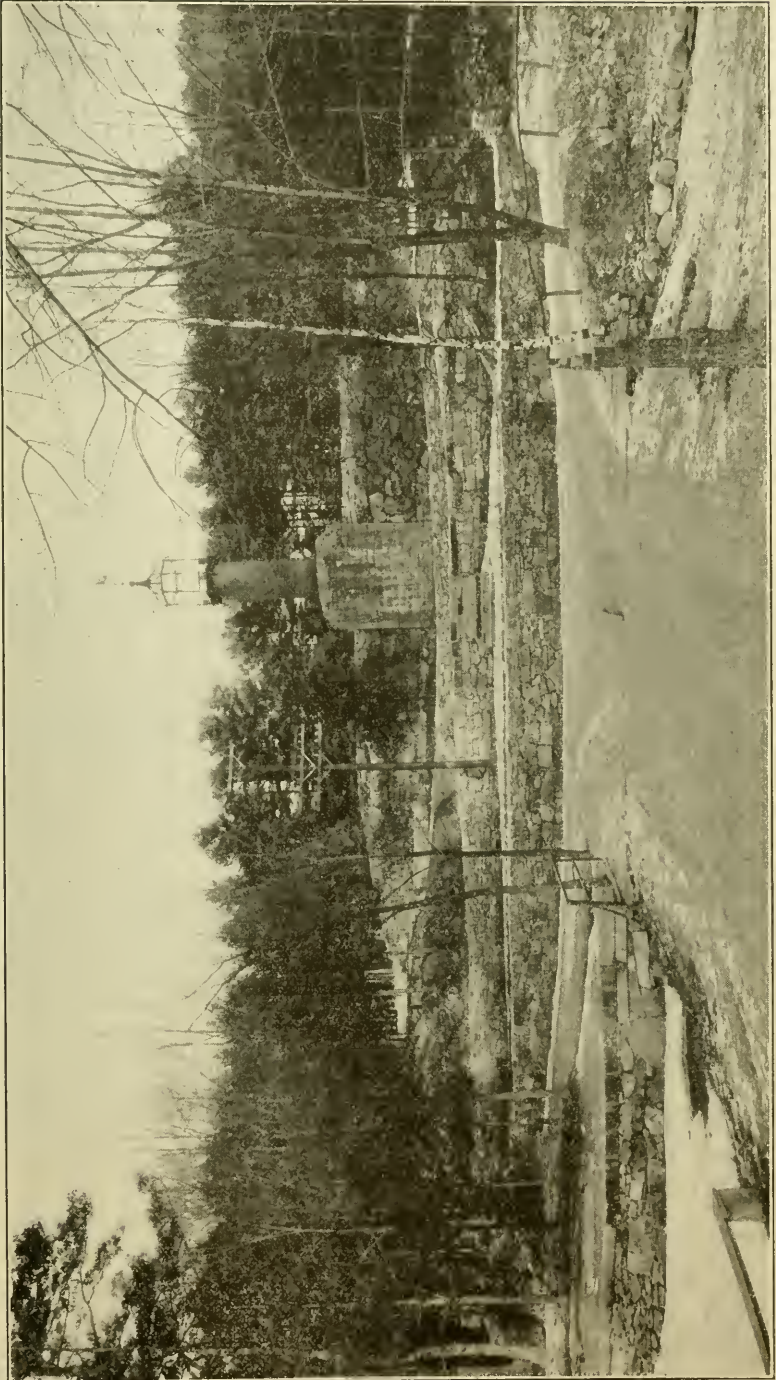

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONER

To the Honorable Mayor and City Councils:—

It is gratifying to report that, through your co-operation, the past year has seen the fulfillment of a hope of several years, in the conversion, through filling and grading, of an old marsh into a recreation field at City Park, adjacent to the Robin Hood Lake. This P. W. A. Project, made possible by your appropriation of \$9,000, of which approximately \$2,800 will be paid by the federal government, was completed at about \$300 less than the estimate and, it is hoped, will prove a popular playground for the hundreds who daily visit this area during the summer.

In addition to this, an average of about 40 men from the Transient Camp were employed in the area about the old Octagon Reservoir and in Robin Hood Park for over four months at no cost to the city except supervision and transportation. Many thousands of dollars in improvements were accomplished

by this means and I am glad to pay a compliment to the morale and endeavors of most of these men. This work included building a new road from Roxbury Street to the lake and widening and straightening the road from the lake to North Lincoln Street, clearing and grading the interior of the old Octagon Reservoir and rebuilding the walls and terracing and grading its surroundings. Wide paths were also built from this reservoir to Sunset Rock, from the swimming pool to Sunset Rock and along the west and north shores of Robin Hood Lake. All this was accomplished at a cost to the city of only \$1,400, including filling and loam and, in addition to a great improvement in the appearance it is expected that it will greatly increase the use and enjoyment of the beautiful public park.

During the summer season the swimming pool was in constant charge of life guards and enjoyed the largest use in its history; swimming classes for various ages were held, Red Cross life saving instruction and tests given and the season ended with a water carnival with an attendance of 800 contestants and spectators.

Lesser improvements have been made at several of the other parks including grading and planting and it has been the endeavor to maintain them in an attractive a manner as possible. The principal expenditures of the year have been as follows:

With the increased interest in winter sports it is also hoped that the Drummer Lot can be improved for skiing and coasting.

REPORT OF CITY PHYSICIAN

To His Honor the Mayor, and the City Councils:

During the past year, while the N. H. Relief Administrators has been controlling the distribution of funds, all indigent persons in need of medical care have had the privilege of specifying the physician whom they desired to attend them. Hence many city cases have been attended by the other physicians of Keene and surrounding towns. Conversely, some county cases have been attended by the city physician. This arrangement has seemed satisfactory.

There has been criticism because some welfare obstetric cases were taken to the hospital, instead of being cared for at home. However, out of 13 such cases I have hospitalized only 4—one because of a very serious heart condition, and three because the home conditions were such that there were absolutely no facilities for care.

I have made every effort to co-operate with the administration in keeping expenses as low as possible.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

To the Members of the Board of Health, Keene, N. H.:

I hereby submit a report of my work for the year ending December 1, 1934.

From December 12, 1933 to May 19, 1934 I recorded 632 cases of measles with the name of each patient, their address, their age, by whom reported, the date the card was put up and the date the card was removed for each patient. I am thankful to Mr. Thompson the Superintendent of the Schools, Mrs. Davey, the school nurse and all the school teachers for reporting to me all the absentees in the schools so that the health nurse, Mrs. Emery, could find out the nature of the disease that kept them out of the schools. I was not obliged to put up a single card for measles as this is left to the discretion of the health officer but the public had to be educated to that new quarantine and I thought it would be better to let time do it. All cases of contagious diseases were reported weekly to both Concord, N. H. and Washington, D. C.

I have also started a campaign of education on whooping cough. Good result will be obtained as soon as the mothers realize that whooping cough causes twice as many deaths as measles, scarlet fever and diphtheria combined. I have started to apply the new quarantine in cases of scarlet fever, etc., dispensing with formaldehyde and making the people use more soap and boiling water instead. The burning of formaldehyde gave the people a false sense of security and they neglected useful precautions in the prevention of contagious diseases. I have also quarantined the patient so that the working people could work. Such a quarantine saved the city some money and will continue to do so in the future.

As soon as snow disappeared I started a campaign to clean up the dumps with very good results. The owners of such places showed good public spirit and I am very thankful to them for their willing cooperation.

The plumbing inspection was done for me by Mr. John Fitzgerald and Mr. John Simpson, plumbers. I know the plumbing inspection was not done according to the law but I did the best thing possible under the circumstances. It didn't take me long to find out that two-thirds of the milk sold in Keene didn't come up to the law requirements and that pasteurized milk is the only safe milk to use. Tuberculin test protects against tuberculosis only. Last

December a federal agent made for me an inspection of the barns, cattles, equipments of the milk producers whose milk was sold in Keene and he also reported the dates of tuberculin test, the amount of daily production of milk, cream, etc. This spring I had Dr. T. V. Dedrick, V. S., make another such inspection and no milk license was granted by me without having the milk producer's application approved by him first.

As Keene is too big a center for the State Board of Health to take care of, I have devoted most of my time during the last few months to find a health officer qualified to make analysis of milk, water, food, etc., and one who could also devote more time to inspection of kitchens where food is served to the public and also to inspection of barber shops, etc. After finding such a man I have done my best to convince the Mayor and a Committee of the City Council to have such a man for health officer with a laboratory of his own and independent of any political influence. I feel sure that the Mayor and the Committee have accepted my suggestions and have done everything possible so that the City of Keene will start the year 1935 with a real Board of Health.

I have kept a daily record of almost all the other minor work such as removal of nuisances, cleaning of dirty cellars and frozen pipes and diagnosis of contagious and infectious diseases.

The health nurse, the plumbing inspectors and the milk inspector were all paid out of my own salary with no extra charge to the City for stationery, telephone calls, postage stamps, etc.

A thousand thanks to both of you, Mr. Simpson and Mr. Bell, for your loyal and constant support in both our private meetings and the meetings with the Committee of the City Council.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF KEENE PUBLIC LIBRARY

To the Honorable Mayor and City Councils:
Gentlemen:

Early in the past year the repairs and painting of the interior of the library building were completed. During the summer and autumn the exterior of the building has been repaired and painted and is now in good condition. To cooperate with the City Government in lessening the expenses, at the January meeting of the Board of Trustees, it was voted to close the library on Sundays.

The library hall continues to be used by the Historical Society of Cheshire County for their regular meetings. It is also used occasionally by the Garden Department of the Keene Woman's Club.

At the story telling hour on Saturday mornings it is a gratification and pleasure to see it filled with interested children. The interest and patronage by them of their special room makes the children's department outstanding.

Splendid work has been done by the efficient librarian and her excellent staff during a very difficult time in the history of the library. Increased demands by the unemployed public and the general readers for new books, especially fiction, have been met with patience and the best help they could give. The usefulness of the library to the public has been lessened and impaired by the reduction in the city's appropriation for the purchase of new books. Formerly the money received from fines which usually amounted to between \$600.00 and \$700.00 was added to its appropriation for the purchase of books. This year the City Government changed the ordinance and the money is no longer available for this purpose. Consequently less books have been purchased and many complaints have been made by borrowers. The trustees request that this amount be available once more for the purchase of books.

The resignation of Mrs. Charles H. Hersey from the permanent board has been lately received and accepted with sincere regret. The two vacancies on this board will be filled at an early date.

Interesting statistics and details of the work and activities will be found in the librarian's report hereby appended.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Trustees of the Keene Public Library:

The report for the year 1933-34 is herewith presented.

The public library is and must be the foundation, the central support of any system of adult education, wrote Ray Stannard Baker, and adult education, leisure time activities and student work are keeping the library staff more than ever occupied with aiding, advising and answering the questions of the groups just mentioned.

In addition to the routine work, book-notes were prepared for a space in the Sentinel each week through the winter and spring; classes in library usage have been conducted, and the librarian and children's librarian have given book talks before various organizations.

Summer vacation reading was successfully carried out with the co-operation of the schools. The decorations, posters and exhibits for Book Week were furnished by the young people themselves and showed the use made in practical ways of library books, and the enjoyment received from them. The library exhibit was arranged to follow the theme of this year's celebration—Ride the book-trail to knowledge and adventure—and comprised new editions of old books and as many new titles as could consistently be bought from the recent publications.

The choice of books has been given great care in order to gain full value for every dollar spent and yet supply as much recreational and informational reading as possible. Of necessity, readers must be disappointed at times in not being able to get promptly a book much wanted, but the reserve system has proved more useful than ever, as for two cents any book will be saved for the one requesting the privilege. 1,050 postal cards for this purpose have been sold this year.

Library Hall has been used by the Historical Society of Cheshire County, the Garden department of the Keene Woman's Club, and various groups of the P. T. A. organization.

Almost a year ago, the library was enabled to engage the services of a book-mender for three weeks through CWA funds. Due to the very busy year, much of this work had accumulated. Through the same agency the library interior was redecorated, and now that the exterior woodwork has been painted the building is greatly improved in appearance and has been a source of gratified comment from very many borrowers.

In common with libraries all over the country, the Keene library has experienced a large increase in circulation during the two previous years, and again in common with many libraries, Keene has had a drop this year. The library has loaned 109,433 volumes, 79,198 of which were fiction. The average daily circulation was 364. The number of volumes at the end of the year was 29,796. The total number of new borrowers registered during the year was 729, which brings the registration since September, 1930 to 6,859 or in other words, practically 50% of the population are library borrowers.

The librarian and one assistant attended the annual meeting of the N. H. Library Association in Exeter in September, and the children's librarian attended the fall meeting of the Round Table of Children's Librarians in Boston.

The advice of the Trustees and the willing co-operation of the assistants has been much appreciated.

In the matter of the suit of Henry Claywood vs. the City of Keene, the jury trial was held at the September Term of the Superior Court 1934 and the jury awarded a judgment of \$175.00 for the plaintiff.

In the matter of the suit brought by the City of Keene vs. Ida Tatelman et als, this suit was brought in an effort to secure an injunction against the use of the premises on Winchester Street as a junk yard and is in substitution for the case of the City vs. Louis Tatelman, whose death prevented further action on that case.

There are now pending against the City nineteen suits for abatement of taxes. Trial of such suits is long and expensive for the City. Present economic circumstances makes an adjustment of tax values a difficult problem. These tax suits will probably be disposed of or referred for hearing during the year 1935.

During the year 1934 there has been a tremendous amount of legal work concerning the three projects undertaken by the City of Keene under the direction of the Federal Administration of Public Works. The so-called five mile water extension project has been completed as has the so-called Robin Hood Park project. Both of these projects presented considerable effort and time on the part of your City Solicitor. The third project known as the Sewage Disposal Project is still under construction and with various complications which arose and with the necessity of laying out rights of way have involved a very great expenditure of time by your City Solicitor. This work has been done promptly as it has been called for and every effort has been made to cooperate with the City Councils and with other City officials in an effort to carry on the projects with all possible speed.

All criminal complaints falling within the jurisdiction of the City Solicitor were prosecuted in the Keene Municipal Court. The City Solicitor has also

advised the officers of the City Government as to the law in various matters and has effected the collections of some bills owed to the various departments of the City.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS

The City Playground Committee hereby submits the following report for the season 1934. First of all we wish to acknowledge the hearty support rendered us by his Honor the Mayor and the members of both Boards of the City Government. The returns of the City's investment in this Civic Activity cannot be measured by dollars and cents. Where is there a better playground in all New England to foster health than Wheelock Park? It has only one drawback. Many parents have informed us, "the children eat us out of house and home, when they return from Wheelock Park." Hence the health record has been outstanding and no serious injuries have been suffered by the children. A grand total of 8,500 child-days have been enjoyed by Keene youngsters this season, the average attendance being about 250. The all time attendance record at the playground was shattered in July when 425 children invaded the Park grounds.

This summer the Playground has been under the supervision of eight supervisors, headed by Miss Emily B. Watson as directress and Miss Etta Field as assistant directress. They were ably supported by Miss Ruth Callahan, Miss Margaret Stearns, Miss Harriet I. Spaulding, Miss Constance Gooch, Miss Janet Whitcomb and Paul Nordman. All of these supervisors are preparing themselves for this kind of work—and to this trained staff belongs the entire success of this season's work.

The routine activities have included all kinds of games, handicraft, nature study, singing, dramatics and swimming in Robinhood lake. Miss Whitcomb and Miss Stearns are to be congratulated for their excellent work with the children at Robinhood.

"Lake George"—with its new cement apron, as in the past proved very popular. Constantly changing filtered water, constant vigilance of instructors, upholds our motto, "Cleanliness is next to Godliness."

For the year 1935 your committee recommends the sum of \$1,200 plus whatever your honorable board sets apart for sliding.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

December 1, 1934.

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

I hereby submit my report for the year ending November 30, 1934.

There were 24 bell alarms, 455 still alarms, making a total of 479 alarms, 25 of these calls were out of town.

The number of alarms the department has answered for the year is the largest number on record of the department. The increase in alarms is mostly chimney fires, owing to more people burning wood, also to chimneys not being properly taken care of.

The fire loss for the year will be the largest the department has had in a good many years in valuation, but not the largest in business blocks consumed by fire. In 1865 the business blocks from Roxbury Street to City Hall were burned, the valuation of property at that time was far below the present value.

The fire in the Lane Block on August 17 was not only one of the largest fires the department has had to extinguish but was a different type of a fire. This fire which started in the basement of the W. L. Goodnow Co. had reached such a high temperature of heat that it had melted the connections of the gas meters, also the ammonia tank of the refrigerating plant. Thus retarding the progress of the firemen in reaching the seat of the fire, then as the firemen started to ventilate the second floor a hot air explosion took place and then through the large light shaft in the center of the building the fire immediately spread to all parts of the block. All the department's apparatus and equipment was in service at this fire.

The Motor Fire Apparatus and its equipment are in very good condition. There has been purchased for the department a 600 gallon triple combination, pump, hose and booster, carries 1,200 feet of 2½" hose and a 100 gallon booster tank. This pump was given the Underwriters test at the swimming pool on Beech Hill and passed the requirements with extra capacity. With this piece of apparatus the city is as well equipped for apparatus as any city of its size. This piece of equipment will save the city nearly the interest on its purchase price, as it uses clear water instead of soda and acid.

The State of New Hampshire Forestry Department has placed in Keene a 40 gallon portable forest fire pump and 2,000 feet 1½" hose for same. The state maintains and services the pump and hose. This pump is for the use of any town in the county, the costs to the towns will be to pay the operator and mileage on the truck. The Kissel Combination is used to transport this equipment.

The department has on hand 10,200 feet of double jacket rubber lined fire hose, and about 1,200 feet of linen unlined hose at South Keene. There has been 300 feet of unserviceable hose turned over to the Water Department.

The Fire Alarm system is in very good condition. All the circuits have been trimmed out from branches and limbs, also wires and cross arms have

been put into good shape. There have been two fire alarm boxes purchased for replacement, these are Box 51, Winchester Street corner Blake; and Winchester Street corner Winchester Court.

There has been installed on fire alarm battery four copper-oxide rectifiers. These rectifiers give the batteries a continuous charge or are floating on the line, supplying the line current and giving the battery a slow rate of charge at all times. This does away with half of the regular battery and nearly doubles the life of same at less cost of charging.

The Board of Engineers recommend the purchase of 1,000 feet of fire hose, two fire alarm boxes, also rubber coats, boots and mittens.

To His Honor the Mayor, and Joint Standing Committee on Fire Department, Board of Engineers, Officers and members of the fire department, and to the Police Department, I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation for the aid and support rendered me during the year.

GRANT AGREEMENT
between
CITY OF KEENE,
(CHESHIRE COUNTY, NEW HAMPSHIRE)
and the
UNITED STATES OF AMERICA
P. W. A. Docket No. 3401

PART ONE

1. **Purpose of Agreement.** Subject to the terms and conditions of this Grant Agreement (herein called the "Agreement") the United States of America (herein called the "Government") will, by grant, aid the CITY OF KEENE, (CHESHIRE COUNTY, NEW HAMPSHIRE) (herein called the "Grantee") in financing a project (herein called the "Project") consisting of the construction of an intercepting sewer, pumping station, and sewage disposal plant, all pursuant to the Grantee's application (herein called the "Application"), P. W. A. Docket No. 3401, Title II of the National Industrial Recovery Act (herein called the "Act") and the Constitution and Statutes of the State of New Hampshire (herein called the "State").

2. **Amount of Grant.** The Government will make and the Grantee will accept a grant (herein called the "Grant") in an amount equal to 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project. In no event shall the Grant be in excess of \$56,000. The determination by the Federal Emergency Administrator of Public Works (herein called the "Administrator") of the cost of the labor and materials employed upon the Project shall be conclusive.

3. **Grant Requisitions.** From time to time after the execution of this Agreement, the Grantee may file a requisition with the Government requesting the Government to make a payment on account of the Grant. Each requisition shall be accompanied by such documents as may be requested by the Administrator (a requisition together with such documents being herein collectively called a "Requisition").

4. **Grant Payment.** If a Requisition requesting the Government to make a payment on account of the Grant is satisfactory in form and substance to the Administrator, the Government will pay to the Grantee at such place or places as the Administrator may designate, against delivery by the Grantee of its receipt therefor, a sum of money equal to the difference between the aggregate amount previously paid on account of the Grant, and

- (a) 25 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials shown in the Requisition to have been employed upon

the Project if the Requisition shows that the Project has not been completed, or

- (b) 30 per centum of the cost of such labor and materials if the Requisition shows that the Project has been completed and that all costs incurred in connection therewith have been determined.

5. **Grant Advances.** At any time after the execution of this Agreement the Government may, upon request of the Grantee, if in the judgment of the Administrator the circumstances so warrant, make advances to the Grantee on account of the Grant, but such advances shall not be in excess of 30 per centum of the cost of the labor and materials to be employed upon the Project, as estimated by the Administrator.

6. **Deposit of Grant: Construction Accounts.** The Grantee shall deposit the Grant promptly upon receipt thereof, and all funds which will be required in addition to the Grant to complete the Project, in a separate account or accounts (each of such separate accounts herein called a "Construction Account"), in a bank or banks which are members of the Federal Reserve System and of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and which shall be satisfactory at all times to the Administrator.

7. **Disbursement of Monies in Construction Accounts.** The Grantee shall expend the monies in a Construction Account only for such purposes as shall have been previously specified in Requisitions filed with the Government and as shall have been approved by the Administrator. Any monies remaining unexpended in any Construction Account after the completion of the Project shall be used to meet obligations (including bonds or other indebtedness) incurred in connection with the construction Project. When there are no longer any such obligations outstanding the Grantee may use such monies for any other purpose.

8. **Other Financial Aid from the Government.** If the Grantee shall receive any funds directly or indirectly from the Government or any agency or instrumentality thereof, other than the Grant, to aid in financing the construction of the Project, to the extent that such funds are so received the Grant shall be reduced.

9. **Construction of Project.** As soon as practicable after the execution of the Agreement, the Grantee (unless it has already done so) shall commence or cause to be commenced the construction of the Project, and the Grantee shall thereafter continue such construction or cause it to be continued to completion with all practicable dispatch, in an efficient and economical manner, at a reasonable cost and in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement, plans, drawings, specifications and construction contracts which shall be satisfactory to the Administrator, and under such engineering supervision and inspection as the Administrator may require. Except with the written consent of the Administrator, no materials or equipment for the Project shall be purchased by the Grantee subject to any chattel mortgage, or any conditional sale or title retention agreement.

10. **Completion of Proceedings.** As soon as practicable after the execution of this Agreement, the Grantee (unless it has already
