LITTLETON WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the 9th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M., and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:30 P.M.), to act upon the following:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the term of three years, one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relating to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this Town?

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Street Lights, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Superintendent of Public Works, Health Officer, Hospital, District Nurse, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Social Security, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, Garbage Disposal, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Region Association, Whitefield Airport, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness, Sewage Treatment Plant, SKI 93, White Mountain Community Services, and other necessary expenses.

Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1971 and to be paid therefrom.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to repair the Cottage Street Bridge; and to raise and appropriate for the aforesaid purpose the sum of Fourteen Thousand Two Hundred and Forty Dollars (\$14,240.00) (the balance of the expense of repair, namely, Fifteen Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$15,760.00) to be paid under Town Road Aid, Class B, by the State of New Hampshire). Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to install the base coat of paving in the parking area (approximately 200 feet by 300 feet) at the swimming pool in Remich Park; and to raise and appropriate for the aforesaid purpose the sum of Twelve Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$12,300.00).

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to repair and widen the Dells Cross Road bridge; and to raise and appropriate for the aforesaid purpose the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00).

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the construction of a sewer line along Highland Avenue and Railroad Street from its present termination on Highland Avenue to the intersection of Drew Street; and to raise and appropriate for the aforesaid purpose the sum of Fifty-two Thousand Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$52,650.00), provided ninety percent (90%) of the aforesaid cost is paid by the Federal Government and the State of New Hampshire.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the construction of a sewer line along the Lisbon Road, Route 302, from the Treatment Plant to or near the intersection of Walker Hill Road, and also a spur line extending along Cross Dell Road to or near the crossing of Dells Brook; and to raise and appropriate for the aforesaid purpose the sum of Five Hundred and Thirty-two Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$532,200.00) provided ninety percent (90%) of the aforesaid cost is paid by the Federal Government and the State of New Hampshire; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act or any other enabling authority.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to convey to the Littleton Union School District, upon expiration of present Lease, the Downings Garage property, situated on the westerly side of Cottage Street in the Town of Littleton, being all of the said property deeded Littleton Town April 23, 1970, recorded Grafton County Registry of Deeds, Book 1116, Page 5. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to sell and convey the so-called Downing's Garage property situated on the westerly side of Cottage Street in the Town of Littleton and being all and the same premises deeded the Town by Downing's Garage, Incorporated, by deed dated April 23, 1970, recorded Grafton County Registry of Deeds, Book 1116, Page 5, to Central Auto Leasing & Sales, Inc., for the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00).

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish the office of Recreation Director, to be chosen by the Park Commission but not to be a member of said Commission, and to be paid a salary of Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$7,800.00) for the ensuing year; and to raise and appropriate for the aforesaid purpose said sum of Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$7,800.00) for said period; and to see if the Town will further vote that thereafter the salary of said Recreation Director shall be paid out of monies appropriated by the Town for the Park Commission.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the construction of the following sewer lines, namely:

- 1) extending along Drew Street from Railroad Street to the end of Drew Street, and
- 2) extending along Brook Road from Railroad Street to within one hundred (100) feet of the Littleton-Bethlehem town line; and to raise and appropriate for the aforesaid purpose a sum not to exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00).

Article 14. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the Warrant.

Article 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1970

The Statewide Library Development Program is moving ahead in spite of much less State Aid than planned and cut federal funds since July 1, 1969. Affiliated libraries, through their District Councils, are reviewing values continually to help the State Librarian and the New Hampshire State Library Commission know where limited funds can best strengthen New Hampshire library service. As a result, catalog cards for recent non-fiction adult books were restored first, followed last fall by catalog cards for all recent books.

Service Center libraries, especially small ones, are not built up to the strength which was planned before the State Library Commission felt they should approve the use of the New Hampshire Statewide Library Card. However, at the Waterville Valley Conference in October 1969 and in District Council meetings which followed, it was made known that most affiliated libraries wished to honor this card. Since July 1, 1970, all affiliated libraries have had the opportunity to honor this card using the rules previously drawn up by the four District Councils and approved by the New Hampshire State Library Commission.

The Littleton Public Library was made a Service Center in September 1966 by the New Hampshire State Library Commission. Since then it has received four grants to strengthen the book collection totalling \$3,162.00. The grant for 1971 is \$1,321.00. In the first six months of the use of the New Hampshire Statewide Borrower's card, Littleton has issued only ten, but she is honoring many cards for nonresidents from nearby affiliated libraries. Most of these borrowers have used the library for years and have paid a small family fee since 1962. The service is now free to N.H. residents who hold New Hampshire Statewide Library Cards.

Two ninth grade English classes visited the library in November 1970 for general instruction in the use of the library. Two tenth grade English classes came for library instruction on writing a research paper. We were visited by about 100 first grade pupils for films and a library tour in April. We also had about 100 children for an Easter story. We had a tour and instruction in how to use the library for a Girl Scout troop. From St. Rose of Lima School, we had a third grade for story hour in September and in October a fourth grade came for films and a tour.

The film program, held in the Children's Room at our library, was again a great success. The films were borrowed from the New Hampshire State Library on a pre-planned schedule and, during the year, we had 37 programs with 1,561 children attending them. Mrs. Earl Appleby's Nursery School group, the Head Start children and the Kindergarten classes under the direction of Mrs. Vivian Riach and Mrs. Bernice Kyte were among the groups that attended some of our programs. Any leaders who might consider bringing their group to our library for films are welcome to come in to talk it over and see what films we have to offer.

Films from the New Hampshire State Library may also be borrowed by our patrons to be used by special groups outside of the library. The only restriction on the films is that they may not be borrowed for school use. During 1970, 12 films were loaned to our patrons for outside use.

Mrs. Ellen Morrow does the "Have You Read" column for The Littleton Courier. She also does the many posters, book displays and exhibits all year and especially National Library Week in mid-April.

A small room off the Children's Room and the Ladies' Room were not painted when much painting was being done in the library in the late 1950's and 1960's. Late 1970 brought a new coat of paint to these small rooms and also the Children's Room, including the bookcases.

Memorial books have been given in memory of Stanley Parker, Rupert E. Willey, Joseph P. Albany, Earle W. Philbrook, Charles Melnick, E. Emmet Beere, Mark Miles, Everett J. Thom, Reta C. Toole, Virginia Alt, Eloise Fisher, Rosalie R. Colby, Enola Evans Ruggles, and Ralph F. Anderson. Thirty-seven books were given as memorials.

Again we do wish to thank the White Mountain Garden Club for their generous gift of books on gardening and related subjects and the beautiful arrangements of flowers on our loan desk from July into September.

The Littleton Public Library received a 3M copying machine in the late summer of 1970 which is to be used primarily for Interlibrary Loan. This library has made frequent use of the teletype machine in the New Hampshire State Library District Office here in Littleton to borrow books from the State Library and other libraries. We wish to thank Mr. Ralph Riley, Consultant, and Mr. John Wright and Harry Paquette for all the times we have been helped by them. We thank the New Hampshire State Library for much service to us.

I wish to thank the Littleton Public Library Board for time given when each person is very busy in so many ways. I hope that Mrs. Ellen Morrow, Miss Patricia Stillings, Miss Mary Miles and Mr. Norman Kinne realize how grateful I am for their respective efforts for the service of the library. The regular library staff is most appreciative of the high school students who are scheduled with them after school and Saturdays. I thank the people of Littleton for their interest in their library.

STREETS AND HIGHWAYS

The T.R.A. project on the Sampson Road was completed this past season.

The department continued with its asphalt resurfacing program.

Also minor improvements were made on back roads, such as the cutting of trees and brush this past fall. Along this line of work there is still much to be done.

SEWERS

This past season we continued the sewer line on the Sampson Road with an extension of 1200 L.F. up to Mr. Hill's property at the top of the hill.

The department also installed a short line on Highland Avenue across the brook to pick up two trailers, so that two septic tanks would be eliminated. Also on the Lisbon Road the department installed 150 L.F. of sewer line to eliminate the septic tank on the Brooks property. Several septic tanks were installed this past season and it looks as though in the future many more will also be installed.

SIDEWALKS

The department did a major portion of work on Grove Street by cementing the edges of the sidewalk to allow for resurfacing with hot top.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

During this past year, the public has shown a great deal of cooperation in the prevention of fires. We wish to express our thanks for a job well done.

Your forest fire warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires, a synopsis of these laws follow.

Fire Permits

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning (SUCH BURNING IS RESTRICTED BY REGULATION TO BE PRIOR TO 9:00 A.M. and AFTER 5.00 p.m.).

An Air Pollution regulation forbids the burning of household waste in towns where such rubbish is collected by the town.

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed under normal conditions with permission of the District Fire Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Direct Services

- A. Psychiatrists, Psychologists, Psychiatric Social Workers and our Community Service Workers were involved directly with 386 new referrals, in addition to the caseloads carried over from the previous year of service. In most cases, interviews and evaluation involved members of families and other as well as the client, amounting to many hours of staff time.
- B. Our clinical staff was consulted for advice and recommendations by resident professionals on numerous occasions. These included problems of behavior symptoms, medication and dosage, referrals to other agencies, family and social relationships, treatment plans, public assistance, and drug abuse.
- C. General Hospital Consultation. Each week a staff psychiatrist has made a regular visit to the Cottage Hospital in Woodsville and the Weeks Memorial Hospital in Lancaster. In addition, the clinical staff has been available on an as-needed basis to the physicians serving patients in the Morrison Hospital in Whitefield and the Littleton Hospital in Littleton. During these consultations the clinical staff has been available to physicians and hospital personnel for conferences concerning individual treatment plans.

School Consultation

- A. The Staff Psychologist and Child Psychiatrist with other staff personnel rendered assistance with individual cases of children having difficulty. They worked with school administrators, guidance counselors, and teachers.
- B. Agency personnel presented seminars and programs relating to the psychiatric aspects of learning to school teachers and others.
- C. The Agency has presented programs on Drug Abuse, Special Learning Disabilities, and the Exceptional Child.
- D. A pilot experimental School for Exceptional Children is being operated by the Agency in Lisbon in cooperation with Supervisory Union #35, the State Department of Education (Special Education), and the New Hampshire Department of Mental Retardation. (A special report follows.)

Resource for Professional Workers

Public Health Nurses, New Hampshire Department of Social Welfare Workers and others have used the agency for consultation and assistance with individual cases and general information. The Agency has:

- A) Discussed the handling of individual cases and has accepted referrals for treatment.
- B) Provided programs centering around common problems through case presentations. It has made available a bimonthly telephone conference with Tufts University Medical School, Department of Psychiatry.
- C) Enlisted the support of other professionals in working out the details of treatment plans, the meeting of crisis situations, and the return of individuals to productive community life and the labor force.
- D) Provided field work training for students from the University of Vermont Medical College and the University of New Hampshire School of Nursing.

POLICE REPORT

Crime and Arrests in Littleton About Even With 1969

Chief Stanley L. McIntyre of the Littleton Police Department in making his annual report for the year 1970, stated that his arrests were about the same as the year 1969. Total arrests 352.

Criminal arrests were slightly ahead of motor vehicle arrests. Leading in criminal arrests were 42 for Minors in Possession of Alcoholic beverages and Procuring alcoholic beverages for minors. Twenty-eight (28) persons were arrested for being drunk. Twelve (12) persons, including one juvenile, were arrested for possessing, being present or selling controlled drugs. Other criminal arrests included: fifteen (15) for assault and battery, thirteen (13) for creating a brawl, and four (4) for disorderly conduct.

Twelve (12) arrests were made on burglary charges. This cleared up burglaries in Sanel Auto Parts, a burglary in Woodsville, for burglarizing a drug store, and through the cooperative efforts of State Police, Lancaster Police and the Littleton Police Department two men arrested, for a burglary in the local Eagles' Club and will face charges in Superior Court. Eleven (11) faced charges of passing fraudulent checks. This is a fast increasing charge, and merchants should be aware of this, as there has been a heavy influx of bad checks of late. Littleton Police will be furnishing merchants with a list of known bad check passers.

Five (5) were brought in for Grand Larceny of more than one hundred dollars and six (6) were brought in for larceny of under one hundred dollars. Other arrests included two (2) for weapons carrying, two (2) for discharging a firearm in the compact part of town, 4 arrests for malicious damage, one (1) Mutilation of the Flag, one (1) for jail escape, six (6) for burning without a fire permit, two (2) failure to answer a summons, and one (1) for being A.W.O.L. Total arrests on criminal charges 188.

Leading in Motor Vehicle arrests were thirty-one (31) for defective equipment, 28 for unreasonable speed, operating under the influence of intoxicating liquor, 23, operating without a license, seventeen (17), operating after revocation of license, ten (10), passing on solid line, seven (7), violation of Littleton Traffic Code and stop sign, thirteen (13). Various motor vehicle violations rounded out the total of one hundred seventy-one (171) violations.

The Littleton Police Department once again won its second bronze American Safety Award (the only town or city in N.H. to ever win this award) for its record of 1969. After thirteen years this record was very tragically interrupted by the death of Brenda Jewett, age 16, who was fatally injured September 6, 1970, on the Lisbon Road. A second youth, Mark Miles, age 19, was fatally injured on the Lisbon-Waterford cut-off road while operating his motorcycle. Littleton Police Department covered 147 accidents, with twenty including personal injury. This was a slight decrease over last year.

Accomplishments by the Littleton Police Department included the Auxiliary Department, winning the state of New Hampshire's Governor Peterson Trophy for the eleventh year in a row.

Six regular police, and four special police have attended or are attending the 20 weeks' course sponsored by the White Mountain Law Enforcement Institute. The ten officers will receive ninety hours in the latest police techniques. Education seems a necessary part of police officers' work.

Meter Revenue for the year 1970 was \$12,331.65, a slight drop below 1969.

Chief McIntyre said "I want to extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to the Board of Selectmen, for their cooperation and support the past year."

The Littleton Police Department through the Governor's Crime Commission, and the Federal Safe Streets Act, had two summer cadets that assisted on traffic, administration and other phases of police work. This ten weeks' program was completely paid for by Federal Funds and through the Governor's Crime Commission. Officer Paul Clark, 24, completing his first year, had one-half of his salary and expenses funded by the National Highway Safety Bureau, through the New Hampshire Safety Agency. So Littleton Police did avail themselves of various Federal Programs of nearly four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00). We do hope to avail ourselves of future programs.

Chief McIntyre stated: "I predict that in keeping with the National and Rural trend crime and arrests will go upward at least eleven per cent. Supreme Court decisions tend to harness the efforts of Law Enforcement. Advising persons of all their rights, and making certain that arrests are in keeping with the most recent court decisions are very much more time consuming then law enforcement was twenty years ago."

Chief Stanley L. McIntyre of the Littleton Police Department spoke to about twenty Driver Training Education Groups at Littleton High School during the year 1970.

Chief McIntyre stated that he had attended two Bombing Seminars, one sponsored by the Boston Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the other by a bombing team from Fort Devens, Mass.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

The year 1970 was a busy one for the Planning Board. Many meetings and public hearings were held in regard to a zoning ordinance in the Town of Littleton. The first proposal was voted down at the annual town meeting in March. There were more meetings and hearings and, at a special meeting held on Primary Day in September, the citizens of Littleton accepted a shorter, more candensed version of the zoning ordinance.

During the year the Board approved additional lots in the Roger Strain Development on West Elm Street.

Representatives of the Public Service Company of New Hampshire were in to talk with the members of the Planning Board about a new transmission line which would cross the Hubert Merrill property.

Mr. James Gannon resigned from the Board after having served since 1959. Mrs. Stephanie McGoldrick was appointed to replace him.

The Planning Board wishes to thank all persons who have attended the meetings and public hearings and offered suggestions during the past year. It is through this type of cooperation that the Board may more effectively serve the Town of Littleton and its citizens.

1970 CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

During the month of April the Commission gave full support to Earth Day activities in the Littleton area. These included educational programs in elementary schools in Littleton and Bethlehem, and a similar program at the Littleton High School. In each case the purpose was to arouse and enlist the energies of young people in a major effort to learn more about the environment and to take whatever action is possible on a local level to protect that environment. A cooperative closed circuit TV presentation was planned by High School and Commission personnel.

Under the direction of Mr. Douglass Jack of the Littleton High School, a massive Clean-up Day occurred in April. The Commission heartily endorsed this effort, and several Commission members participated directly.

During the summer months the Commission continued its supervision of the Dells. Arrangements were made to police the area with regular trash pick-up provided. Brochures have been printed which are available at the Chamber of Commerce office and Information Booth. They are also available to motels and hotels for their use and that of their guests.

Much work remains to be done in accomplishing a survey of Kilburn Crags and to establish actual boundary lines in the Dells. A questionnaire placed in The Courier asking for citizen evaluation of local conservation issues in order of importance drew a disappointing response. It is apparent that many of us are falsely lulled by the beauty and extensive open space of the North Country, making us unaware of the need for effective long-range conservation enlightenment and planning.

The Chairman attended a November meeting which resulted in the creation of a New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions. Our Commission is a member. Commission personnel also attended the November Conference of New Hampshire Tomorrow and encouraged the attendance of one member of the Board of Selectmen.

The Commission continues to enjoy the support of the Littleton Garden Club and the White Mountain Garden Club, as well as the Park Commission.

Originated and participated in the Governor's Snowmobile committee.

Developed the concept of long distance snowmobile trails for northern New Hampshire.

Continued to support the 4-H awards program.

Researched and maintained the expression of local opinions regarding many proposals of the Connecticut River Basin studies.

Maintained an active liaison with the White Mountain National Forest in recommending new projects for the Forest Service.

Acquired land on the Connecticut River at Saddle Island at the Narrows for conservation purposes.

Assisted with the development of Bedell Bridge State Park.

Assisted with the formation of a Connecticut Valley Road Improvement Association which is working to improve the highway system in the Woodsville-Littleton area.

Working to promote a forestry museum in northern New Hampshire.

REPORT OF THE LITTLETON WATER AND LIGHT DEPARTMENT

For the Year 1970

The Department increased the water system by adding a 1.5 million gallon storage tank at the top of Mt. Eustis and a Pumping Station at the junction of Mt. Eustis and Bryn Mawr Roads. Also included in the project were some 9,854' of 8", 10", 12" pipe and 8 new fire hydrants which will better service customers, some of whom were on the Bethlehem system. The project, to be put into full service in the Spring of 1971, has been named the Walter A. Goss Water System in recognition and appreciation of Superintendent Goss' 38 years of service upon his retirement January 1, 1971.

There were four primary extensions in the Electric Department, namely, Manns Hill, Mt. Eustis, Broomstick Hill and one three phase service to the new shopping center on the Lisbon Road.

There were a number of new homes with electric heat and servvices added or changed from 2 wire to 3 wire.

Wire sizes were increased on Highland Avenue, Grove, South Grove, Willow and West Elm Streets and other spotted areas throughout the town.

Four area lights were installed at the Municipal Swimming Pool and mercury street lights replaced regular conventional types at several street junctions throughout the town.



Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed reports must be given to the Town Clerk for the Town's permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Planning Board, Public Library and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1969 and December 31, 1970: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets, as of December 31, 1969 and December 31, 1970, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt of the Town increased by \$43,188.66 in 1970, from \$467,592.79 to \$510,781.45.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2):

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$15,715.77 plus a revenue surplus of \$14,093.57 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$29,809.34.

TREASURER

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1970, in indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1970, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$2,188.66 in 1970, from \$72,407.21 to \$70,218.55, as shown herewith:

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Important to the economy of Littleton 100 years ago were its four stereopticon view manufacturers, chief of which was the Kilburn Brothers firm which was housed in the structure now familiar as the Kilburn Apartments. In the Fall of 1970 the Littleton Area Historical Society, in cooperation with the N.H. Historical Commission, erected the bronze marker shown above which bears the following inscription: "Kilburn Brothers Stereoscopic View Factory—Here from 1867 to 1909 the world famous Kilburn Brothers, Benjamin and Edward, produced and distributed thousands of stereoscopic views. Their collection, largest in the world and collector's items today, provided popular parlor entertainment for generations."
