#### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

#### TOWN OF MADBURY, N. H.

March 13, 1956

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday the 13th day of March A.D. at 11 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles.

Article 1. To choose the following Town Officers:

A town clerk for the ensuing year. A selectman for the ensuing three years. A treasurer for the ensuing year. A collector of taxes for the ensuing year. Two auditors for the ensuing year. A trustee of trust funds for the ensuing three years.

Article 2. To choose all other town officers.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$7500. in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$269.07 for Class V highways to match the sum of \$1793.78 to be contributed by the State.

- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$2062.85 for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V roads within the Town: Perkins and Pendexter, such sums to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of chapter 83, laws of 1951 as amended by chapter 31, laws of 1953, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Madbury.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70. for the Seacoast Regional Development Association.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 to reimburse Joe Cole for damage to truck on Drew Bridge.
- Article 8. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$500 to be set aside as a fund to purchase a new fire truck. A like sum to be appropriated each year for five years if the town so desires.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the incinerator ordinance as printed in the Town report.
- Article 11. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to replace the bridge over Bellamy River (known as Drew Bridge) with State Bridge Aid and make appropriations for the same (\$7,000).

- Article 13. To see what action the Town will take on the building code posted with the warrant.
- Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### RECORD OF TOWN MEETING MARCH 8, 1955

ARTICLE 1. Balloting for town officers:

For Town Clerk: Edna P. Twombly received 28 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year. The oath of office was administered by Moderator Kenneth S. Morrow.

For Selectman: Daniel W. Hoyt received 33 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing three years.

For Treasurer: Loretta J. Morrow received 30 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Collector of Taxes: Paul M. Raynes received 34 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Auditors: Dorothy S. Dugan had 33 votes and Lillian H. Rinta had 23 votes and the two were declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Trustee of Trust Funds: Voted that the clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for John V. Dahlberg who was declared elected for the ensuing three years.

- ARTICLE 2. Voted that the selectmen be empowered to appoint all other necessary town officers.
- ARTICLE 3. Voted that selectmen and town treasurer be authorized to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$7500 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.
- ARTICLE 4. Voted to raise \$269.12 for Class V highways to match the sum of \$1794.13 to be contributed by the state.

- ARTICLE 5. Voted that because of new and expanding industries, the Jet Bomber Base and increasing population, the town shall join with other towns in the area instructing its representatives to the general court to call for a state water pollution commission study program within the Piscataqua River Basin.
- ARTICLE 6. Voted to table a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70 for the Seacoast Regional Development Association.
- ARTICLE 7. Voted to approve a total budget of \$12,549.12 for the current year.
- ARTICLE 8. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Report of Mr. John S. Elliott, Chairman of Water Commission.

Report of Fire Chief James Colprit accepted.

- ARTICLE 9. Voted to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars as a Class VI highway that portion of the old turnpike (Road to Cocheeo) extending from Freshet Road northwesterly to the Durham town line.
- ARTICLE 10. Voted to table the article to raise \$150 for payment to the state auditors for auditing the 1954 town records.
- ARTICLE 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Voted that the town hall be closed for use by public dances.

# REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Citizens of Madbury:

The record for 1955 shows a slight increase in fires. Our largest loss occurred in September when the cottage of Demeritt's corner burned. Most of our fires were purely accidental. The remainder could have been prevented by better housekeeping.

Now is the time to:

Be more careful in cigarette and match disposal.

Clean that chimney.

Fix up the incinerator and get a permit.

Learn to store and handle fuel oils carefully.

Overhaul that old electrical system to handle the ever increasing load of appliances.

Dispose of your rubbish.

Clean around your buildings so fire cannot be communicated to them.

Check your fire extinguishers.

Tell your family what to do in event of fire.

For several years the Town Appropriation has not met the basic expenses of the department. I am, therefore, recommending a larger appropriation.

Our fire equipment is in good working condition. However, our truck is fourteen years old, and some thought should be given to replacement. In order that replacement may be discussed an article has been inserted in the Town Warrant.

I ask your careful consideration of the fire department needs, and thank you for your past cooperation.

## Incinerator Permit Ordinance

1. INCINERATOR PERMITS. No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or shall burn or cause to be burned any material whatsoever unless an incinerator permit is first obtained from the Fire Chief.

2. EFFECTIVE. All incinerator permits issued by the Fire Chief shall be effective immediately and shall remain valid for one year after date of issue.

3. TIME OF ISSUE. All incinerator permits issued by the Fire Chief shall be obtained no later than the first day of April of each year, provided that, the Fire Chief in his discretion may issue said permits any time during the year.

4. DESCRIPTION OF INCINERATOR. No incinerator permit issued shall be valid unless the incinerator shall consist of a steel drum, twenty-three (23) inches in diameter, with a one quarter inch hardware cloth cover and said incinerator surrounded by an area of mineral earth extending not less than two feet in diameter, provided that, a device of equal safety shall be approved by the Fire Chief.

5. LOCATION. No incinerator permit shall be valid unless all incinerators shall be located no less than twenty-five (25) feet from any building, and it is further provided, no less than fifty (50) feet from any forest land as defined in Chapter 233, Section 35, Revised Laws, Forest Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

6. NULL AND VOID. All incinerator permits shall be null and void when the incinerator does not meet the requirements set out in section (4) above; or the weather is unfavorable; or a proclamation closing woodland is in force; or anytime that the Fire Chief in his discretion declares said incinerator permits null and void. 7. LIABILITY OF TOWN. No liability shall attach to the town nor is any liability implied in the event that fire escapes from control of any person holding a valid incinerator permit.

8. No EXEMPTION FROM LIABILITY. No exemption is implied by this incinerator permit from the following liabilities: (a) payment of damage to the person or property of another. (b) Payment of the suppression costs to the town. (c) Prosecution for failure to comply with this ordinance.

9. FORESTRY LAWS. This ordinance shall not derogate from or affect the provisions of the Forest and Brush Fires; Preventive Measures Chapter 224, Revised Statutes Annotated 1955.

10. PENALTIES. Whoever is found guilty of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than five dollars.
