TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Mason in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mason on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next at one of the clock in the afternoon then and there to bring in your ballots for the following Town Officers:

Town Clerk for one year; Selectman for three years; Town Treasurer for one year; Tax Collector for one year; Highway Agent for one year.

The polls to close at 7 P. M. of the same day.

At eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day, at the same place, to act on the following subjects:

Article #1. To choose all necessary Town Officers not chosen by the non-partisan ballot.

Article #2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article #3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- Article #4. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid on or before a certain date or take any action relating thereto.
- Article #5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any real estate now owned by the town that has been acquired by tax sale, bequest, or gift, if they, with a majority of the Financial Advisory Committee think it advisable or take any action relating thereto.
- Article #6. To see if the town will allow the Tax Collector compensation for collecting the State Head Tax and fix the amount at 8 per cent or take any action relating thereto.
- Article #7. To see if the town will vote to forbid hunting on all private property in the town without the written permission of the property owner.
- Article #8. To see if the town will vote to prohibit the picking of laurel on all private property in the town without the written consent of the property owner.
- Article #9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$600 or any other sum for the purchase of large diameter hose for the Fire Department.
- Article #10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$200 or any other sum, for the reclamation and care of the town's water holes which are used for fire fighting.
- Article #11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to establish a fund to be used for the 200th Anniversary Celebration of the Town's Charter in August of 1968 or take any action relating thereto.

Article #12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the old V Snow Plows or take any action relating thereto.

Article $^{\#}13$. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and Officers heretofore chosen and take action relating thereto.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The year 1965 has been a very active one for many of our Town Officials and various Committees.

Our Police Department under the guidance of Chief Gilson has done an exceptional job during the past year. Its success in apprehending persons responsible for several burglaries in town and obtaining convictions as well as retrieving many of the stolen articles is commendable. Chief Gilson's report deserves your attention and the Selectmen feel that his request for an increase in the Police Budget of \$300 should be granted. We are concerned, however, by the fact that small towns, such as Mason, are not reimbursed for any expenses incidental to Court Cases and we hope to meet with officials of neighboring towns to draft a bill for consideration at the next Legislature in an attempt to correct this apparant injustice.

The report of the Fire Department activities by Chief Hodson represents a forward-looking determination by the Volunteer group. Many favorable comments were heard regarding their timely precautions which were mailed just before Christmas and we understand that another newsletter is being prepared prior to Town Meeting to acquaint the voters with the Volunteer operations to date.

Our Planning Board has been very busy and according to all reports many objectives will be unfolded in the near future.

Because of the danger caused by careless hunters, we have been asked to insert an article in the warrant to forbid hunting on all private property without the written permission of the property owner.

A similar article regarding laurel picking has also been requested.

The fact that Mason is a beautiful town right on the State border encourages many persons from out of State to roam our hills and valleys. One of the most colorful times of year is the fall when the scenery is at its best. It seems paradoxical that citizen land owners in

Mason are forced to remain out of the woods during this season because of indiscriminate shooting. Many towns have regulations regarding hunting on private property and as Mason is being confronted with a constantly increasing number of hunters and pickers, it would appear that now is the time to enact some sort of protective regulation.

Attention is being called to the new Motor Vehicle Junk Yard Law #372 which was passed last year at Concord. A recent article in the New Hampshire Town and City, the official publication of the N. H. Municipal Association, of which Mason is a member, explains the Law in detail with questions and answers. In order to acquaint all-residents and non-residents with this New Law and the penalties involved for non-compliance, the Selectmen have had this article printed in the Town Report.

August of 1968 will be the 200th Anniversary of the signing of Mason's Town Charter and an article has been placed in the warrant regarding this event. It is hoped that a sufficient sum will be established each year for the next three years to make it possible to hold a real celebration of this important occasion.

The Board, at this time, would like to thank all those who have so kindly helped them during the past year.

THE NEW MOTOR VEHICLE JUNK YARD LAW 1965 N. H. 372

Some Questions and Answers for Local Officers

1. What is the definition of a junk yard?

A junk yard is a place of storage for two or more vehicles no longer intended for legal use on the highways or no longer in condition for legal use on the highways, and/or, it it a place of storage for parts or material equal to two or more vehicles.

- 2. When does the new law go into effect?
 The new law went into effect on July 8, 1965 when it was signed by the Governor.
- 3. Who is responsible for the licensing of junk yards?

 The legislative body of the municipality is responsible for the licensing of junk yards. This body consists of the mayor and board of aldermen or the council of the city, the selectmen of the town, or the commissioners of a village district.
- 4. How does one obtain a junk yard permit for a new junk yard? Any person wishing to operate a new junk yard must make a formal application to the legislative body of the municipality where the junk yard is to be located. This application must contain a description of the land to be used by reference to so-called permanent boundary markers. A license fee of twenty-five (\$25) dollars must accompany this application. When necessary, in municipalities having a zoning ordinance and zoning board of adjustment, a certificate of approval must accompany the application.
- 5. Is there any provision for a hearing upon a junk yard license request?

Yes, a hearing has to be held on the application not less than two nor more than four weeks from the date of the receipt of the application by the legislative body. Public notice must be given not less than seven days before the date of the hearing. This notice must be published in a newspaper having a circulation within the municipality. The applicant must also be notified by mail.

6. Must established junk yard owners apply for a license? Those junk yards already established are considered approved and the owner suitable for the issuance of a license. However, by September 7, 1965 he shall have furnished the legislative body information similar to that required by a formal application plus

the \$25 application fee. He will then be issued a license which is valid until April 1, 1966 at which time it must be renewed.

7. Can a junk yard license be transferred to another owner?

No, a junk yard license cannot be transferred to another owner.

8. Does the \$25 license fee have to be paid each year?
The \$25 license fee has to be paid each year (April 1) upon rquest for renewal of a license.

9. What are the fencing requirements under the new law?
Established junk yards must be fenced in, i.e. completely surrounded by at least a six-foot-high fence unless the legislative body reduces the fencing requirement due to sufficient natural or artificial barriers by October 7, 1965. New junk yards must meet these requirements before they are used.

10. What are the setback requirements for the new junk yards? All new junk yards must not be less than 660 feet from the right of way line of Class I, II, III roads and not less than 300 feet from Class IV, V, VI roads. (Note: Old junk yards must be 150 feet from a highway unless they are completely screened from view.)

11. Does this new law pertain to the private citizen who has a couple of junks sitting around his dwelling?

Yes, any person having two vehicles no longer intended for legal use on the highways or no longer in condition for legal use on the highways must comply with this law.

12. How long can new and used car dealers retain junk cars on their premises?
New and used car dealers can retain junk autos for a period of 160 days after receiving them on the premises.

13. Should this law be in conflict with existing local ordinances which prevails? Existing local ordinances shall control when in conflict with this law

14. Are there penalties for not obeying the law?

A maximum fine of \$10 will be assessed for each twenty-four hour period one is in violation of this law. This shall take effect October 7, 1965.

15. Does the law provide for an injunction?

Either the legislative body or the attorney general may obtain an injunction.

16. May the legislative body deny a person a license to operate a junk yard even though all the requirements have been met?

In considering whether or not to issue the legislative body is expected to consider aesthetic considerations and, may deny an applicant a license on these grounds.

Our thanks go to each one.

This past year has brought many good things to our Library. In March Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, head of our Exeter Branch, arrived with news of the new Statewide Development Program. It all began in 1961 with a detailed study of library service in the State providing basic information necessary to the improvement of our library system. Governor Powell next appointed a Governor's Committee for Better Libraries to evaluate the Report and consider what steps might reasonably correct any inadequacies of library service. The program proposed direct financial aid to all affiliated libraries, establishment of service centers, centralized cataloging and purchasing and improved reference and interlibrary loan service. The Governor's Committee recommended that every town which joined the program receive one hundred dollars annually as an outright grant to be used to improve their reference collection. In addition the Committee proposed that each town receive matching grants annually to purchase books and related material. On July 9, 1963, Governor King signed the bill creating a statewide library development system. The Mason Public Library decided that it was important to become a part of this exciting new plan and in May we began to receive the first of our consignment of reference books. As any program is always slow to start, the matching grants have not yet been established but we are hopeful that it will be brought about before too long a time has elapsed.

Meanwhile we are thankful for our Bookmobile which arrives approximately every two months to deliver whatever we choose to take from its shelves and collect those previously left with us.

It is our good fortune that in the past year Mrs. William Clark has joined us as a Library Trustee — replacing Mrs. Woods — and our very real gratitude goes to her and to Mrs. Wentworth, who in lightening the work of the Librarian and her helpers, have given unsparingly of both time and effort in installing a Dewey Decimal System in our Library — a complicated and tedious task extending over many months.

We are saddened, however, at the thought of losing Mrs. Spalding, our Trustee-Treasurer, who resigns her position in 1966 and has provided such constant help that we don't know how we shall manage without her. Thanks and good wishes go with her.

As to special projects — the Junior Scouts under the direction of Mrs. Clark gave the Library a real turnout this fall; washing windows and vacuuming floors and we thank them heartily. Mrs. Clark was also responsible for the unusual and lovely Library window at Christmastime.

In September Mrs. Castle decided to increase daytime library hours from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Not only was this in line with the Statewide Development Program but would give more time in aiding school children in their reference work. She is happy to report that there has been a fine response and that many more books are being withdrawn.

Our new room, built last year, has been enthusiastically used by the upper classes for research and is proving a great addition — in every way. Our concern, however, has been to provide a proper heating unit for it — otherwise it could not be used in cold weather, our busiest time. Luckily a sum of money was given the Library at this crucial period which went far toward paying for it.

All in all, on looking back, this has been a satisfying and productive 12 months. We have just one wish — more money for books! With all this construction and heating our cupboards, like Mother Hubbard's, are becoming a little bare. But this is Mrs. Boyle's forte; she will continue to patch, glue, sew, mend and generally keep them rolling until that hoped-for Grant comes along.

REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE

In the past year the Mason Police Department has tried to improve on its method of operation in an effort to give better service to the Town of Mason. We are now connected with the Nelson Answering Service on a 24 hour emergency service basis. Fred Nelson has the base station for the police radio network in this area. By joining this service, the Mason Police Department is in contact with the base stations at Wilton and Milford, the State Police, and the Police Departments in all surrounding towns. Emergency call cards are available to anyone contacting the Chief of Police.

The members of the Mason Police Department have attended training and educational programs in this area sponsored by the New Hampshire State Police and Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Police uniforms and radio equipment have been purchased by the officers out of their own pockets. We have made every effort to make this department as presentable as other larger departments with funds made available to them by their respective towns. The only time an officer is paid for his time is when he is called directly to investigate a complaint, called by me for assistance, or called by the answering service in my absence. These men have donated many hours of their time over the past year on holiday weekends and at various other times in order to give this town better law enforcement. The law requires an officer to be in attendance at any dance held at the Town Hall. Department members have also donated their services to be at the dances held in the Town Hall for the children of the town. Due to so few social activities for the young children, this policy will be continued.

I have requested an increase in the Police Department budget for the ensuing year in order to put on a weekly patrol. There are a large number of vacant homes and camps in town. As taxpayers, these owners are entitled to police protection. In past years, these places have been easy prey for vandalism and looting. The overlay of this patrol will cover nearly all of the town so that the residents will also benefit. I feel that this patrol will also curb some of the other problems existing in town.

The Town should not expect the Police officers to purchase equipment at their own expense. In the future this equipment should be purchased from within the Department funds, but only if the budget permits.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The fire department is now four years old and progress is quite evident. An 800 gallon tank truck has been rebuilt and added to the department and is now in service. We now have 1,360 gallons of water on wheels.

Two portable radios on our fire frequency have been added this year along with a great deal of other equipment. The Mason Volunteer Fire Department equipment value totaled \$4,025.35 at the end of 1963. At the end of 1965, the equipment total value is \$9,147.55. This equipment was purchased by the Mason Volunteer Fire Department at no cost to the town.

Land for a fire station has been sold to the Mason Volunteer Fire Department by Mr. Robert Whitaker for the princely sum of \$1.00. We owe a great deal to Mr. Whitaker for this gift. More information on the land and the Department's intentions for 1966 will be in a forthcoming newsletter.

Members of the Department attended fire schools at Fitzwilliam and Laconia during the year.

We wish to thank the towns of Greenville and Wilton for mutual aid response this year. Townsend, Mass., also responded to a false alarm call in Mason.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush;
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands — Yours never to enjoy.

REPORT OF THE MONADNOCK REGION ASSOCIATION To the Town of Mason

The Monadnock Region Association maintains a building of its own at the junction of routes #202 and #101 at the Peterborough By-Pass. This combination showroom and information center is staffed by a full-time receptionist-office secretary and an executive secretary who divides his time between the office and the field.

Aside from fixed charges and overhead, the bulk of the money received is used for promotional work, and includes such items as 30,000 Regionaires, 30,000 summer folders, 25,000 fall foliage folders, and tour maps, 25,000 winter ski and sports brochures and maple syrup bulletins. Four season vacations are emphasized. Apple blossom, Laurel, and Fall Foliage tours are publicized and posted in season.

The Association sponsors 4-H activities, high school bands, the N. H. Philharmonic Orchestra, agriculture, industry, and the hotel-tourist trade. In addition, as occasion arises the Association lends its weight for better roads, better and more picnic areas, better hunting and fishing with protection to land owners, better forestry practices and, in short, for all things that tend to make the Region more livable and attractive.

Our exhibition facilities are open and available to anyone in the Region. The local public, as well as the tourist public, are welcome at headquarters anytime.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

The Mason Planning Board underwent a period of reorganization at the end of 1964 with Mr. Adolph Rajala elected as chairman and Mrs. Mary Castle as secretary-treasurer.

In November Mrs. Castle was called upon by the Board to consult with Mr. J. Elbert Baril, Active Planning Director, at Concord, New Hampshire — on the question of Zoning, and at his suggestion a Public Hearing was called on February 1, 1965, to amend Article #3 under Planning Ordinance in the 1962 Town Warrant and for an open discussion of existing problems.

At that meeting the Board was requested to submit a set of zoning regulations which would more nearly cover the growing needs of the town.

In the spring Mr. Rajala resigned as chairman and was replaced by Mr. Eugene Pomerleau. Meetings began to be held regularly this past fall when, with the assistance of Mr. Anthony Robbins; formerly of Wilmington, Massachusetts which has been undergoing a re-zoning program, the Board was able to begin to recommend certain pertinent changes.

Townspeople will hear more about these when the Planning Board calls a Public Hearing in the early spring which it plans to do.

SCHOOL WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Mason qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March 1966 at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials

and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the District will approve the raising and expenditure of tuition money above the High School State Average and 2% rental fee charges as outlined in RSA 194:27, or take any action relating thereto.
- 10. Shall the school district accept the provisions of RSA 195 as amended, providing for the establishment of a Cooperative School District together with the school districts of Wilton, Greenfield, Greenville, Lyndeborough, New Ipswich and Temple, in accordance with the provisions of the proposed Articles of Agreement filed with the School District Clerk.

Article 11. To see if the School District will vote, by ballot, yes to accept or no to reject the following proposal:

Shall the School Board, or a committee of three appointed by the School Board, on behalf and in the best interests of the School District, negotiate a contract with the Trustees of New Ipswich Appleton Academy for the education of the School District students in grades 7 through 12 for a term of not less than fifteen years and present such contract for approval, by ballot vote, at a special meeting of the School District called for that purpose.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Mason, I respectfully submit my eighth annual report as your superintendent of schools.

STAFF AND INSTRUCTION

The Mason school opened this year with two changes in staff. Miss Barbara Smith of Brookline, New Hampshire was hired to teach in the third and fourth grade room, replacing Mrs. Helen Garland. Mr. Dominic DiNardo, Jr. of Quincy, Massachusetts was hired to replace Mr. Robert Rogers as teacher in the fifth and sixth and seventh and eight grade rooms in Mathematics and Science.

Changing fifty percent of a school staff, as one might imagine, can have a serious effect upon the educational program of a school. This has been the case in Mason this year, and it is only now in the second quarter of the year that teachers have become adjusted to the pupils, the general operation of the school, and the proper handling of academic areas. Through the exceptional efforts of the school principal, Mrs. Frost, and Mr. Gibbons, much help has been given the new teachers, helping to make them just as effective as possible. It is sincerely felt that during the latter half of the year continuing improvement will take place to raise the level of instruction to that expected in Mason.

The programs initiated in the last few years have been continued and good progress is being made in Mathematics and Reading.

Through funds made available after the first of the year under the Elementary-Secondary Education Act of 1965, Mrs. Virginia Rafter started working with children who need special help in reading. This program will continue throughout the remainder of the year.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

The regular maintenance and improvement program at the Mason School continue. Provisions are made in the upcoming budget for painting of the outer lobby in the old part of the building, digging a trench in the playground area to carry water away from the slope, and blacktopping the driveway area around the school that is used by the buses. In addition, funds are provided to take care of the installation of the merry-go-round which was obtained from the New Ipswich School District, and to provide shades for darkening the third and fourth grade classroom.

Again, through the use of Title I funds under the Elementary - Secondary Education Act of 1965, a project has been submitted for the installation of a kitchen for a noon lunch program. The project has not, as of this date, been given formal approval on paper, but oral approval has been received. This will improve the school facility considerably and provide a very worthwhile service for children of the community.

FINANCE

There is not much difference in the budget proposed for 1966-67 when compared with the current budget. There is an increase of about \$4,000. in the 210 series "Salaries", however, most of this money is to provide for the accounting of Title I money which is expected to be available during the coming year, namely, \$4,200. \$4,200 is also recorded in the income section of the budget, thus causing no net change in net assessment for schools. An increase of about \$200, is evident in the Transportation section due to additional mileage that is now necessary to transport all elementary children in the district. In the #630 series, an increase of about \$80 provides for garbage and trash removal. It seems that the incinerator at somes times causes smoke and odor in the vicinity of the school which is displeasing to some citizens. In the #1400 series, "Tuition", costs have increased about \$500. due to a slight increase in the number of students attending high school and increased tuition costs anticipated at North Middlesex Regional High School. It is expected that North Middlesex's tuition during the coming year will exceed that of the Academy's which is being held at \$547, meaning that parents will have to take care of the difference. Therefore, an Article is being inserted in the Warrant to have the district assume this obligation.

The total appropriation required to meet the School Board's budget is an increase of about \$4,000 but an increase in estimated income

results in a net increase in assessment for the support of schools of \$1,500.

SPECIAL ARTICLES

Two Special Articles will be found in the school district warrant: one will ask the district to assume responsibility for any additional tuition charge above Appleton Academy's that might be made necessary by the costs at North Middlesex Regional, the second will give citizens of the town an opportunity to vote on the cooperative school arrangement which has been so widely discussed.

FEDERAL AID

This is the first year that Federal Aid became available to schools under the Elementary-Secondary Education Act of 1965. During the present year, as has already been indicated, it is expected that Title I money will be used to provide reading services and a noon lunch facility. The acceptance of this money was approved by a special school district meeting held in December. It is expected that in the coming year a similar amount of money will be available for further projects or continuing projects, and for this reason \$4,200 has been provided in the budget. In addition to Title I money, Title II money under this same Act is available to the Supervisory Union. The purpose of these funds is to provide library material for all youngsters within the Supervisory Union area. These library books would be circulated among the schools as requests and needs develop on the part of teachers. It is expected that during the coming year a similar amount of money will be made available for the continuance of this kind of library project.

COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY

A decision relative to participation in a cooperative school is being asked for in the school warrants of all the towns involved in the study. Hearings have been held in all of the towns and other meetings also have been held, or will be held, in each of the communities to thoroughly familiarize all of the citizens with the advantages and disadvantages of a cooperative arrangement. Cooperation is not a one way street. The general feeling is that the advantages in being a part of a large cooperative district far outweigh the disadvantages which are part

and parcel of such an arrangement. The undersigned's report relative to this matter is found in the cooperative school brochure published to inform citizens regarding this matter. It would be redundant to say much more about the cooperative plan. A far sighted point of view should be taken by the citizens. The long range twenty, thirty to fifty year educational advantages of such a cooperative arrangement are the things that should be very thoughtfully considered. Too often citizens are concerned about immediate incidental considerations and lose sight of the long term advantages of cooperation. This plan will make long term educational provisions for the children of the community and make Mason a better place to live in. Whatever action is taken by the citizens, it is hoped that a decision is arrived at by careful and unemotional evaluation of all facts.

CONCLUSION

Probably as long as a small multiple graded school is operated in Mason, changes in staff are going to take place. Changes that can mean a fifty, or even greater percentage of turnover certainly create serious problems. Good teachers are hard to find. Good teachers are even more difficult to find for small multiple graded schools. We feel that we have done quite well in the additions that we have made to the staff in spite of their inexperience. These folks are working very hard, as are our veteran teachers, and we are optimistic about the educational offering that has been offered, and that will be provided during the remainder of this year.

The School Board has been extremely understanding of the problems of the teachers and has made every effort to provide material things that would make the teaching task more effective. All have been working very hard at the problem and if effort will make a good school, we'll have such a school in 1965-66.
