TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Mont Vernon in the County of Hillsborough in the said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mont Vernon on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at 2:00 of the clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Mont Vernon Planning Board.

**Action on succeeding Articles is deferred
until 7:30 P. M.**

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

4. To act on reports of all Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, Committees, etc., and raise and appropriate any money relative thereto.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid for construction of Class V Roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$782.52 for said purpose. (State will add \$5,216.81)

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to engage the State Tax Commission to make a complete re-appraisal of all taxable property in the Town of Mont Vernon. (The estimated cost to be \$3,900.00)

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 as this year's portion of the total cost of \$3,900.00 for complete re-appraisal of the Town.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 to replace five of the present street lights in Mont Vernon with 3,500 lumen mercury lights.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to replace worn-out fire hose. To be administered by the Board of Firewards.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purpose of the renovation of the heating system in the upstairs of the Fire House, drilling a well and installing a pump, and adding more toilet facilities with the necessary additions to the present building. The committee to oversee this project to consist of a member of the Board of Selectmen, a member of the Board of Firewards and a member of the School Board, these members to be selected by their respective Chairmen.

12. To see if the Town will vote to rescind action previously taken providing for the election of a Road Agent and vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Road Agent, such vote to take effect as of the Annual Town Meeting in March 1970.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a used Road Grader to be equipped with a plow and wing.

14. . To see if the Town will vote to start a contingency fund for the purchase of Road Equipment and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for such a fund.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted match is an adventure, burn fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result — escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
2. To *never* discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn —
 - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for *all* debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal braziers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
 - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on *grass* by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
 - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire *before* you light the match.
4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

MONT VERNON PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Mont Vernon Planning Board met eight times during the past year, with most of the efforts devoted to the development of a proposed Zoning Ordinance for consideration by the voters of Mont Vernon at this Town Meeting. A series of three informal open meetings were held to give everyone an opportunity to express his opinion as to what should or should not be included in the new Zoning Ordinance, followed by two Public Hearings on the proposal. It is hoped that townspeople will recognize the need for such regulation, if Mont Vernon is to grow in a manner that is best for the interests of all residents. To date our town has been very fortunate, in that we have acquired no major nuisances that might have been seriously detrimental to the town. Your support of the Zoning Ordinance is needed. When you vote, be sure to look for the Zoning question on the ballot.

MONT VERNON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Mont Vernon Conservation Commission completes its first year with notable accomplishments. The commission has studied the capabilities of town owned lands and will offer suggestions for use on each parcel. A \$250.00 grant was approved by the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trust. These funds have been budgeted and will be used to further the work of the commission. The commission purchased a complete set of aerial photographs of the town. These will be mounted and made available to the Town Officers and other interested groups. A survey will be initiated in 1969 to determine the needs of the town by the residents. Other studies will include Purgatory Falls area, wetlands survey, mapping, feasibility of organizing a Town Forest, and solid

waste disposal for the town. Suggestions from the residents are always welcome.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 12, 1968 — Mont Vernon, N. H.

2:00 p.m. — The Annual Town Meeting declared open by Moderator George D. Kittredge who proceeded to read the Warrant.

MONT VERNON SCHOOL BOARD

The 1968-69 school year has been a year of encouragement. Our principal, Mr. Gerald Britton, has done an excellent job in molding a teaching team that we can all be proud of even under such adverse conditions of having the sixth grade in Milford. We appreciate his cooperation as well as that of every member of our teaching staff.

The proposed budget reflects what appears to be a large increase in tuition for the students we send to Milford. However, the major portion of this increase is due to the increase in the actual number of students attending the AREA School.

The School Board completed the purchase of ten acres of land on Harwood Road as directed at the Special School District Meeting on August 14, 1968. We are requesting a deficiency appropriation to cover the purchase price as well as legal expenses incurred when a resident of the town challenged the action taken at the Special School District Meeting.

The most important challenge facing not only the School Board but each and every resident is the future of our school system. At the District Meeting held in March of 1967, a School Study Committee was appointed and in their final report dated October 20, 1967, they recommended immediate integration of Mont Vernon students in the fifth and sixth grades of the Milford School system and then as a second choice, the construction of a new school building of general type construction such as cement block of approximately 9,800 square feet at an estimated cost of \$17 per square foot. This area they felt would accommodate 210 pupils in seven classrooms. The second Study Committee appointed at the March 1968 School District Meeting, reported to the Town at the Special School District Meeting on August 14, 1968. They recommended a six classroom school of approximately 9,600 square feet. This proposal, as well as two alternates, were defeated at the August meeting. As a result,

the School Board appointed an advisory committee to review the school expansion requirements. They have found that the need for classroom space in Mont Vernon is real and immediate and that a minimum of four classrooms be built at once.

The Milford School Board has been contacted again this year to see if they would take our fifth and sixth grades on a tuition basis or continue to lease us a bare classroom as they did this year. We have been advised that they cannot accept our children on a tuition basis neither can they lease us the classroom as they will need it for their own students. The School Board, therefore, contacted the surrounding towns of Amherst, New Boston and Franconia to see if they could lease us space. In each instance, we were advised that they too were having space problems and were in no position to assist Mont Vernon at this time.

The enrollment in the Village School has increased from 97 students during the 1966-67 school year to 128 students as of January 1969; less than two years and over a 30% increase. **WE MUST TAKE SOME ACTION NOW TO PROVIDE CLASSROOM SPACE FOR THESE STUDENTS!** Projections prepared by the last two Study Committees indicate that our total enrollment at the Village School for the first six grades will approach 200 in the 1973-74 school year; just four years away. It is difficult to say that an enrollment of 200 would require seven classrooms as the actual distribution of students by grade may necessitate nine or ten classrooms.

Admittedly, there are numerous "stop gap" solutions that will prove adequate for a year or two. But, each of these "stop gap" solutions cost either as much or more than the annual payments would cost for a new school building and probably wouldn't qualify for State Building Aid of 30%. Then in two or three years, we still face the same problem.

The School Board requests careful consideration by each resident of the complex problems now facing the school district.

We would also like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has contributed time and energy towards providing the best possible education for our children, not only now, but in the future.

ADMINISTRATIVE SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of Mont Vernon:

The responsibility of the school, in our democratic society, is to provide an educational program within which framework all students may become all they are capable of becoming. We are continually driving towards fulfilling this goal as we move forward only to pause a moment to review the past.

Our year began under the fine leadership of John A. Murphy, Jr., Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Murphy resigned from this position during the summer of 1968 when he accepted a position for advancement. The impact of Mr. Murphy and his untiring efforts will long be felt in Supervisory Union #40. Great strides in education were made during his reign as Superintendent here.

After Mr. Murphy's resignation, Mr. Donald Desmarais, Hollis High School Principal, was appointed to fulfill the roll of Superintendent until an interim superintendent could be located. Mr. Desmarais is to be congratulated for his outstanding efforts as Acting Superintendent for Supervisory Union #40.

In August, we were indeed fortunate to locate Mr. Lewis F. Foote, Retired Superintendent, to guide and direct us as Acting Superintendent for the period of August 1 to December 20. An admirable job was done by Mr. Foote. In December, Supervisory Union #40 found their new Superintendent to again lead the districts toward fulfilling its educational philosophy.

Another of our fine leaders found his opportunity to further his education. Mr. Edward J. Lawton, Teacher Consultant for the past two years, resigned in August to pursue a Doctoral Program at the University of Virginia. Mr. Lawton worked closely with the elementary staff and should be congratulated for the improvements that he has made in the elementary program of our Union. In August, a Teacher Consultant was appointed replacing Mr. Lawton to continue his role.

MONT VERNON VILLAGE SCHOOL

At the present time, there are several areas of concern facing the Mont Vernon School District. The first area is that of available space. During the 1968-69 school year, the sixth grade was in Milford under a rental contract with them. However, the teacher and the students were still under the direct control of the Mont Vernon School District. There are problems under this situation. A program of this type is difficult to administer and control. In addition, the fifth and sixth grades cannot organize or participate in any activities which would be beneficial to both grades. The learning situation in the sixth grade cannot be at its optimum level since they must share an auditorium with two other classes from Milford.

Another area of concern is the curriculum. In order to keep pace with the changing curriculum in this Supervisory Union and particularly to prepare the students for entrance to junior high school, several things have to be considered. First of all, textbooks must be purchased. When the textbooks were examined during the summer, many of the books were out-dated. Replacement of textbooks was necessary. There was a shortage of books for the various classes in most of the disciplines. If new textbooks are purchased every five years on a rotating basis the cost could be kept to a minimum.

Various types of equipment are necessary for keeping pace with the modern elementary curriculum. Never has there been a more exciting time in which to teach. Equipment and materials available today give the teacher the

flexibility they have needed. The introduction and development of a lesson is no longer bound by stereotyped methods for through the use of the new media today, every problem can have a new approach. We have added to our audio-visual equipment but must continue to increase this each year so the teachers may continue to exercise their full classroom potential. A variety of science equipment is necessary as science today is taught by having the students "Learn by Doing": that is, the students do many of the experiments themselves and draw their own conclusions instead of having the teacher do all demonstration experiments.

Class schedules were changed this year. All classes are self-contained, that is, each teacher teaching all of the subjects at that particular grade level with the exception of science in grades four and five. Under this class arrangement, each teacher has groups within each subject where possible. This allows faster students to go ahead and slower students to work more at their own pace. Each teacher is expected to follow the Supervisory Union #40 Curriculum Guidelines.

AREA SCHOOL REPORT

Because of increased enrollments, crowded conditions, large class sizes and the advent of a new school, we are going to have to ask for an increase of eight new teachers. This will bring our class sizes to somewhere near normal and allow for much better teaching and learning.

In the Milford Junior Senior AREA School, many new and exciting things are being done in education each and every year. Our teachers are making learning an interesting experience. Such things as increased use of visuals, team teaching, more pupil participation in instruction, experimental projects, some independent study, multi-text approaches to subject matter, in-depth studies of certain areas rather than survey courses, and a seemingly increased desire on the part of most of the pupils to learn, are all adding up to a much better "educational product", being graduated.

The new courses introduced into the Social Studies cur-

riculum are proving to be much more stimulating and instructive to the pupils than were the traditional ones. Such courses as American Domestic Affairs, Comparative Governments, 20TH Century United States, Afro-Asian History and Far Eastern affairs seem to be proving their worth.

Reading continues to be a serious problem indicating the need for a reading center. We increased the program to include more pupils, but are still not able to fulfill the needs of all the pupils.

With the great increase in the numbers of pupils each year, our ration of "pupils to books" in our library is still far short of the recommended number per pupil.

All of our Vocational areas are working cooperatively with industry and many of our pupils are receiving "on the job" training. We are most grateful to the industrial people in the area for their fine cooperation. The areas involved are Foods Service, Business Education, Drafting and Machine Shop.

Our Computer Math program was continued this year through the fine cooperation of the Bean Fund of Amherst and the Kaley Fund of Milford. To both these committees, we extend our appreciation for their kind and continued support of our school and it's pupils.

* Note: Spanish was not introduced to the curriculum last year as was reported in the annual message.

Space continues to be a serious problem at the secondary level. We find our AREA School with an enrollment of 1,275 pupils in a building which houses 1,000 pupils comfortably. Through no one's fault, the construction of our new Junior High School building got off to a late start and at this writing, it does not seem possible that it will be ready for occupancy in September of 1969. This will create a serious problem for us. It would be practically impossible and even dangerous (in home areas) to try to accomodate all of next year's grades seven through twelve in the one building. We currently have very over-crowded conditions in the lunch room and many of our classes are much too

large. We will not have enough classrooms each period to accomodate the increase in the number of sections we will have. Therefore, some plan will have to be devised to house all of our pupils until the new building is ready.

To the citizens of Mont Vernon, we express our sincere appreciation for your continued support.

SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

August 14, 1968

A special School District Meeting was opened at 7:34 p.m. August 14, 1968 by the Moderator, George D. Kittredge. After an opening prayer led by Rev. Eleanor Allen and the salute to the flag by the Moderator, the Warrant was read.

Mr. Walter Kilian, Chairman of the School Board, introduced the new Interim Superintendent, Mr. Lewis Foote.

The Moderator announced the status of the meeting in that a two-third vote would be necessary to pass all articles and that a paper ballot would be taken where necessary. Mr. Lawrence Corbett, Mr. Oswald Williams, Mrs. Dorothy Smith and Mrs. Mary Ann Harris were asked to pass out the paper ballots and to count them after the vote.

Article 1: To see if the district will appropriate a sum of money for acquiring land and for construction and originally equipping and furnishing an eight-classroom elementary school and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise; or to take any other action hereunder. Mr. Kilian moved: To see if the district will appropriate \$236,037 for acquiring land and for construction and originally equipping and furnishing an eight-classroom elementary school and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise. It is further understood that two of the eight classrooms will be unfurnished and that the School Board be authorized to carry out the intent of this motion. Mrs. Robert Naber seconded. After discussion, Mr. Kilian moved to amend the motion to read \$226,037. Amendment was seconded and so voted. Discussion followed. Mr. Frank E. Tower called for vote; seconded. 192 paper ballots cast; 128 needed for a 2/3 vote. Yes - 66; No - 126. Article 1 was defeated.

Article 2: To see if the district will appropriate a sum of money for acquiring land and for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing a six-classroom elementary school and to determine whether such appropriation shall be

raised by borrowing or otherwise; or take any other action hereunder. Mr. Kilian moved: To see if the district will appropriate \$199,415 for acquiring land and for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing a six-classroom elementary school and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise and that the School Board be authorized to carry out the intent of this motion. Mrs. Virginia Harcovitz seconded. After discussion a paper ballot was called for. 189 paper ballots cast; 126 needed for a 2/3 vote. Yes - 78; No - 111. Article 2 was defeated.

Article 3: To see if the district will appropriate a sum of money for acquiring land and for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing a four-classroom elementary school and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise and take any other action hereunder. Mr. Kilian moved: To see if the district will appropriate \$164,047 for acquiring land and for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing a four-classroom elementary school and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise and that the School Board be authorized to carry out the intent of this motion. Mr. Robert Damoiseau seconded. After discussion, a paper ballot was called for. 176 paper ballots cast; 118 needed for a 2/3 vote. Yes - 78; No - 98. Article 3 was defeated.

Mr. Vernon Wilkins moved to reconsider Article 1; seconded by Mr. Donald Cheever and so voted by a majority voice vote. Mr. Wilkins moved to amend Article 1 to read; To see if the district will raise and appropriate \$9,000 to enable the School Board to complete purchase of ten acres of land upon which a \$1,000 deposit has been made and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise; and that the School Board be authorized to carry out the intent of this motion. Seconded by Mr. Cheever. After discussion, a hand vote on the amendment was taken - 85 - Yes; 24 - No. Mr. Roland Richards moved to amend to read: The land purchased to be used for

school purposes only. Seconded by Mr. Damoiseau and so voted by a majority voice vote. The amended article was voted in favor of by hand vote: 73 - Yes; 19 - No.

Mr. Alton Ryder moved to reconsider Article 2; seconded by Mr. Damoiseau. A hand vote was taken: 36 - Yes; 52 - No. Motion defeated.

Mrs. Jean Darling moved to give a rising vote of thanks to the Committee which was done.

Mr. Sliney moved for adjournment, seconded. By majority hand vote, the Moderator declared adjournment at 11:10 p.m.

MONT VERNON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Thursday, March 14, 1968

The annual meeting of the Mont Vernon School District was opened at 4:07 P. M. by the Moderator, George D. Kittredge. The warrant was read, and the polls were opened for voting on Article 1-5. Article 5 being incorrectly printed and as it was the intent of the School District, the election of two auditors for the ensuing year was included on the ballot and so declared.

At 7:35 P. M. the voting was suspended and the Meeting called to order by the Moderator. Reverend Eleanor Allen offered prayer which was followed by the Salute to the Flag led by Police Chief Roland Christie.

The Warrant having been read at the 4 o'clock opening of the Meeting and hearing no objection to not reading its entirety again, Article 6 was taken up.

Article 6 — To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district. Mr. Robert Naber moved that we consider this Article with Article 9. The motion was seconded and so voted.

Article 7 — To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Mr. Walter Kilian moved to accept all reports as printed

in the Town Report and the report of the School Study Committee of October 20, 1967 which was forwarded to all property owners. The motion was seconded and so voted.

Mr. Charles Miville moved that we consider Article 12. Robert Damoiseau seconded the motion and so voted.

Article 12 — To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$220,000 for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an elementary school and to determine if such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise. Mr. Robert Straw moved to amend Article 12 to read — To see if the District will vote that a Study Committee be appointed by this School District Meeting to investigate available lands within Mont Vernon and to empower the Committee to place option binders not to exceed \$1000.00, if necessary, on suitable land; and to obtain an architect who will provide basic plans for an elementary school building designated by the Study Committee; and that the sum of \$10,000.00 be raised and appropriated to allow this to be accomplished so that such plans or alternate plans and information may be presented to a Special School District Meeting for final vote on August 14th, 1968. Roland Christie seconded the motion. Walter Kilian moved to amend to read — on or about June 18th. Motion seconded and defeated. Alton Ryder moved to amend to read — during the month of June. Seconded and amendment was defeated. John Riesenberg moved to table the amendment and vote on new building; motion ruled out of order. Alton Ryder moved for previous question. Original amendment defeated. Mrs. Naber moved to adopt Article 12 as printed. John Riesenberg seconded the motion. School Board Chairman Robert Naber presented figures concerning the building in question, population projections and school enrollments. Walter Kilian moved to amend Article 12 to read — That the sum of \$214,000 be appropriated for acquiring land and for constructing thereon and originally equipping and furnishing an elementary school and that in order to raise this appropriation the school

board be authorized to issue \$214,000 bonds or notes of the school district under the Municipal Finance Act and that the district authorize the school moderator to appoint a committee of four to serve with the School Board and jointly act as Building Committee to oversee construction and/or renovation of elementary school facilities. William Plummer seconded motion. Robert Straw moved to amend by adding — after the architect's study and upon submitting report to the Study Committee and prior to the awarding of contracts a special School District Meeting be called for approval by the townspeople. Roland Christie seconded and so voted. Roland Christie moved for the previous question. The amended amendment carried. John Riesenbergh moved for the previous question, the amended article. A paper ballot was mandatory. Results: 160 ballots cast — 92 — Yes 68 No. Needing 2/3 (106) majority to pass Article 12 as amended was defeated.

Article 8 — To choose committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Walter Kilian moved — That the district authorize the school moderator to appoint a committee of four to serve with the School Board and jointly act as a Building Committee to oversee construction and/or renovation of elementary school facilities. Robert Naber seconded. Mrs. Margaret Clark moved to amend the motion to read — and their findings brought to a special School District Meeting the third week in June for vote of the District. Robert Naber seconded and the amendment carried. The motion as amended carried.

Alton Ryder moved to take up Article 13: William Plummer seconded and so voted.

Article 13 — To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$25,000 for renovating the Town Hall to be used as classroom facilities and to determine if such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise, and further to increase the budget accordingly. Robert Straw moved to strike out \$25,000 for renovating the Town Hall and all following and amend

Article 13 to read — to see if the District will vote that the Study Committee previously appointed by this School District Meeting investigate lands within Mont Vernon and to empower the Committee to place option binders not to exceed \$1000.00, if necessary, on suitable land; and to obtain an architect who will provide basic plans for an elementary school building designated by the Study Committee; and that the sum of \$10,000.00 be raised and appropriated to allow this to be accomplished so that such plans or alternate plans and information may be presented to a Special School District Meeting for final vote before August 14th, 1968. William Plummer moved to table motion. John Riesenberg seconded, motion defeated. Robert Damoiseau seconded the amendment and called for vote. Amendment carried. John Riesenberg moved to table the amended article. Joseph Devine seconded, motion defeated. Robert Thayer moved to strike out to raise the sum of \$10,000 and all following and amend to read — to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for this purpose. Donald Hartleb seconded. Water Kilian moved for this question which was defeated. Walter Kilian moved for previous question and the amended article carried.

Article 9 — To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Robert Naber moved to accept a budget of \$137,561. Motion seconded. Robert Thayer moved to delete reading teacher, Donald Hartleb seconded and motion defeated. Virginia Smith moved to delete fringe benefits in the amount of \$1200 for summer education. Robert Thayer seconded and motion defeated. Roland Christie called for previous question and the motion carried.

Article 10 — To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forth-

coming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire or from any other source. Roland Christie moved to adopt article as printed, seconded.

Robert Thayer moved to amend by deleting "U. S. Government," seconded by Donald Hartleb. Amendment defeated. Article 10 carried.

Article 11 — To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 197-1, a-g inclusive, i.e. to elect the district officers at the annual town meeting. Vernon Wilkins so moved. Motion seconded and so voted.

Article 14 — To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Hearing none, Roland Christie moved to revert back to Article 1-5 and all who had not had a chance to vote were allowed to do so. At 11 P. M. it was moved and seconded that the polls be closed and so voted.
