Lt. Governor and Commander in Chief Sealed with the Seal of Sd. Province of Newhampshire for a Town Ship to the Inhabitants of ye Town of New Castle as att large appears by Sd. Grant Recorded in the Province Records Lv. 5 p. 69.*

*The first year being as above stated 1693 Mr. Jno. Clark Mr. James Randall and Mr. Francis Tucker were Selectmen and Mr. John Leach was Constable for said Town Province of Newhampshire.*

*Whereas an Act pased by the Lt. Governor and Councel and Representatives of this Province convehghened in general asembly the last Tewsday of July 1693 intituled an act For raising mony for the suport of ye Government and Repairing of fortifications and for Reimbursing ye Treasurer.*

*Pursuant to Sd. act these are in there Majesties names to require you forthwith to make Such Rate and assesments within your Town and in such propotion as Sd. Act direct Comiting a list thereof to the Constable or Constables of ye Town to Collect the same.”*

## TOWN WARRANT 1963

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Rockingham, ss

To the inhabitants of the Town of New Castle, in said County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said New Castle, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing. The polls for the election of town officers will open at ten of the clock in the forenoon and shall not be closed before six of the clock in the afternoon.

2. To hear the reports of agents, officers, committees, boards and others heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation for the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to incur temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the year 1963 upon the credit of the Town, and issue its notes therefor in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act.

5. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within a reasonable time after they receive notice of the

taxes assessed against them and to fix the amount of such discount and the time within which such discount shall be allowed.

6. To see if the Town will vote to participate with the other towns and cities in the area in the advertising, promotional and publicity activities of the New Hampshire Seacoast Regional Development Association as authorized by law and to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money therefor.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid from the State for the construction of town roads and to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money therefor.

8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell for removal such buildings in the Camp Langdon purchase area as they may decide are in excess of the needs of the Town; such sales to be made by negotiation after advertising in the Portsmouth Herald once a week for three consecutive weeks, and to be made at such prices and terms as the Selectmen believe to be in the best interests of the Town.

9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any equipment such as plumbing fixtures, heating equipment, electrical apparatus, etc., located in the Camp Langdon purchase area which they may decide are in excess of the needs of the Town; such sales are to be made at such prices as the Selectmen believe to be in the best interests of the Town.

10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to lease for a period of years one or more of the buildings in the Camp Langdon area to any charitable or public organization such as the YWCA, YMCA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, etc., to be used for recreational purposes, provided that the lessee shall assume all expense and liabil-

ity to persons and property in connection with such lease and use, with no expense to the Town.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to draw up and enforce a set of temporary rules for the operation and protection of the Camp Langdon area.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the piece of land on Cranfield Street on which the old school once stood; the Selectmen are authorized to hire a surveyor to furnish an accurate plan and description of the land to be offered for sale; such sale to be made to the highest bidder at a public auction after advertising in the Portsmouth Herald once a week for three consecutive weeks.

13. To determine what action the Town wishes the Selectmen to take in regard to the roof over the porch attached to the front of the Town Hall, and to appropriate such sums of money to carry out the action voted.

14. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following ordinance: **THE TOWN OF NEW CASTLE ORDAINS:** That it shall be unlawful for any person having custody or control of any vehicle to park or cause the same to be parked in front of the New Castle Fire Station on Main Street, other than proper fire vehicles. A person who shall violate this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not more than Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) plus the cost of any necessary towing charges.

15. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following ordinance: **THE TOWN OF NEW CASTLE ORDAINS:** That it shall be unlawful for any person having custody or control of any vehicle to park or cause the same to be parked on a street or public highway within eight feet of a fire hydrant within the Town other than fire apparatus. A person who shall violate this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not more than Fifteen



Dollars (\$15.00) plus the cost of any necessary towing charges.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P. L. 560, 83rd Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be made by the United States to the Town of New Castle to aid in defraying the cost of preliminary report and plan preparation for extending 8" water main from Portsmouth Avenue to the City of Portsmouth via Goat Island as illustrated at the March 13, 1962 Town Meeting. (Submitted by the Water Commissioners).

17. To see if the Town will vote to re-name the Camp Langdon purchase area any one of the following names, all of which are closely associated with the Town's past: The Outalong, Outalong Common, Outalong Park, Great Island Common, Great Island Park, or any other name which the Town may desire.

18. To see if the Town will vote to delete the following amendment to the zoning laws which is identified as Amendment No. 2 under Section IV — Regulations Governing Districts, sub-section C No. 2 which refers to the requirement that all building permits must be obtained from the Selectmen. The proposed deletion in connection with such building permits from the Selectmen was passed on August 15, 1962 as follows:

2. In the event of any owner of record making application for a permit that a hearing be held before the Board of Selectmen after public notice consisting of placing a notice of said application in two public places within the Town of New Castle and after notice by registered mail to all abutters, a hearing be held within thirty days after the date of said application.

19. To see if the Town will vote to participate with other Towns in the area in the cost and construction of an airport to be located in Stratham, New Hampshire and to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for this purpose.

20. To transact such other business as may legally come before said meeting.

## SELECTMEN'S ANNUAL LETTER

To the Citizens:

On the front cover we have reprinted a portion of the record of the first meeting organizing the Town of New Castle in 1693, vol. 1, page 1 of the official Town Records. We thought that you might be interested to know that times haven't changed much, after all, and taxes have been with us for a long time.

You voted at the last Town Meeting to purchase the Camp Langdon area. After many conferences with government representatives we were notified in December that the Town's application had been given final approval, and a certified check was forwarded to the General Services Administration. Actual transfer of title took place on January 3, 1963.

In order that you may be familiar with the use of the area we have inserted in this book the Report of the Inspector for the National Park Service, which was based on our original application. The area will be open for inspection by residents of New Castle from 1 to 5 P.M. on Sunday, March 10. The buildings marked with red posters at that time are those which we propose to retain for future use.

A special Town Meeting was held on August 15 for the purpose of approving certain changes in the Zoning Ordinance. We believe that further clarification of this Ordinance is desirable.

In the fall there was a woods fire off Wentworth Road, at which time the hose owned by the Fire Department proved to be seriously deteriorated by old age, and when placed under pressure it disintegrated. Upon request of the Fire Chief the Selectmen approved the immediate

purchase of 800 feet of new hose, even though this purchase exceeded the Fire Department's budget.

In accordance with the vote of last March, the Selectmen have engaged the services of Anderson-Nichols Engineering Co. of Concord to make application for the Federal Planning Loan for initial sewer planning. As of this date we have not been advised as to costs nor required completion date of a sewer system. Our action, as above, satisfies the requirements of the N. H. Water Pollution Board.

As you ordered last March, we have razed the old school house on Cranfield Street. The Selectmen believe that the land is not required by the Town and should be sold.

Route 1B through the Town, that is Wentworth Road, Main Street, Cranfield Street, and Portsmouth Avenue is state highway. The very fine repaving job done last spring was a state project and cost the Town nothing. We have called the state's attention to the need for raising and widening the causeway to prevent damage from future high tides.

Recognizing that the problem was too great for action by individual towns, the Southeast Mosquito Control Committee made a serious effort to obtain State funds for mosquito control last summer, but no funds were available. It is hoped that the present session of the General Court will take some favorable action.

The Selectmen meet on the second and last Monday of each month at 7 P.M., but the first hour is used for making vouchers and paying bills, so that it is about 8 P.M. before they may consider other business. You are welcome at any meeting.

## AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

Section 13 (h) of the Surplus Property Act of 1944, (58 Stat. 770), as amended, authorizes the disposal by the General Services Administration to States, political subdivisions, instrumentalities thereof, and municipalities of surplus real properties, together with surplus improvements and equipment located thereon, which have been determined by the Secretary of the Interior to be suitable and desirable for public park and public recreation areas or as historical monuments for the benefit of the public and which, in the case of historical properties, have been recommended for historical monument use by the Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings and Monuments.

This report is submitted in accordance with the authority to make the necessary determination delegated to the Director of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation by the Secretary of the Interior on July 9, 1962 (27 F. R. 6719). The purpose of this report is to determine the recreation needs, describe, and evaluate the prop-



erty desired by the applicant in respect to its proposed use, and to recommend disposal determination.

### APPLICATION

The Town of New Castle, County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, acting by and through its Board of Selectmen, Ralph S. Frobisher, Chairman, is seeking by application, dated February 9, 1962, to acquire for public park and recreation area purposes, under the provisions of Public Law 616, 80th Congress, the 27-acre surplus tract (N-NH-421) identified as Camp Langdon Annex, Wentworth Avenue, New Castle, New Hampshire.

### PROGRAM OF UTILIZATION

It is proposed to utilize the property for public park and recreation area purposes by developing and maintaining it as a Town waterfront park. This property adjoins the other 2.3-acre portion of Camp Langdon which was transferred to the Town on March 16, 1960 for park and recreation purposes and will provide proper access, parking and visitor services for the users of the beach on said 2.3-acre tract .

The Camp Langdon area will provide the public with approximately one-quarter mile of accessible ocean frontage, a goodly portion of which is the much treasured, sandy type, swimming beach. It would also provide permanent public access to the waterfront. The existing macadam roadways and other areas within Camp Langdon will provide adequate access and suitable parking for several hundred autos and ample area to provide parking expansion, which future years will certainly require.

The former Parade Ground in Camp Langdon is a level area and during the years has been used for ball games by Service personnel. This area, together with the area in the northeast corner of Camp Langdon, which lies adjacent to the beach, offers an ideal solution to the great need the Town has for this recreation.

This area affords the opportunity, also, for launching facilities for small craft. Boats could also make use of the existing docking facilities in fair weather, particularly. This latter item is suitable for only limited use, however, due to the fact that it is against the open sea and is apt to be quite rough, even in summer.

The areas along the shoreline are ideally suited for picnicking

and the Town plans to provide a suitable number of tables, benches, and out-of-door cooking facilities.

### INVESTIGATION

The investigation of the applicant agency and a field inspection of the surplus tract were made on August 27 by the undersigned. The application was reviewed and discussed with Selectmen Ralph S. Frobisher and John F. Hodgdon and the property inspected with the same Selectmen. Selectman Jack Hassett also joined in part of the inspection and the related discussion.

### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

The Town of New Castle comprises approximately one square mile of land area. The Township is an island at the mouth of the Piscataqua River and sets adjacent in that respect to Kittery Point, Maine. The island Town of New Castle is connected by a highway bridge, (Route 1-B), with the Town of Rye at its southerly end and a series of highway bridges (Route 1-B) with the City of Portsmouth at its northwesterly point.

The 1960 census showed a population of 823, an increase of 40% in the past ten years. The Town of New Castle has practically no public land, except for the two acres, plus, which were purchased from the Federal Government some two years ago and which were a part of this Camp Langdon Federal Property. The only other public land is that belonging to the New Castle school, which contains a total of about two acres. This school lot, at present, provides a small baseball area. However, due to the population growth, a school addition is certain to be needed within the next few years, rendering impossible the continued use of this small area of the schoolhouse lot except for the very youngest of school aged children.

During the past five years the Town pursued court litigation involving the ownership of approximately 700 feet of ocean beach, known as "Sandy Beach." This court case was recently reported out by the Master, adverse to the Town's position. This leaves the Town of New Castle with but approximately 300 feet of ocean beach ownership by outright title on the 2.3 acres of Camp Langdon land which was purchased from the Federal Government in 1960. Furthermore, since the above court action, the last mentioned public owned property is without access from public highways from an outright title standpoint.

The City of Portsmouth, lying to the northwest of New

Castle, has a population of about 25,000. In addition, Pease Air Force Base, with a Service personnel of about 8,000, lies largely within the Portsmouth City Limits. It is estimated that there is a permanent population of 100,000 within a 25-mile radius and a summer population of nearly double this figure.

As previously stated, the only New Castle land area belonging to the public is the Elementary School playground and its small ball field, together with a small outdoor asphalt basketball court. These facilities are constructed for the use of the school children in the first six grades. Future school expansion will narrow, if not preclude the use of this area. Junior and Senior High School students attend classes in Portsmouth schools and at present there are no facilities for these young people, and the Town does not presently own any land suitable for the construction of such facilities.

The parking area at the existing beach is exceedingly limited and can accommodate but about a dozen automobiles, some of which must be parked partially on private property.

The tract is easily accessible by public roads via Wentworth Avenue, the Town's principal street, on which it borders. It faces on the Atlantic Ocean for approximately 1200 feet, including a small beach area and some good scenic rock-bound coast. Inland it includes a small marshy section along its northern boundary. The balance is all very good park type upland with numerous rock outcropping interspersed with plots of sandy soil. The coastline itself is scenic, but the views from it of the ocean, old Fort Constitution, Whalesback Lighthouse, Portsmouth Harbor activity and, on a clear day, the Isle of Shoals are outstanding and fully deserve the proposed provision for public enjoyment. The area contains numerous fine mature pines and maples which, together with the parade ground and other mowed areas, give it a pleasing parklike appearance.

The existing buildings in Camp Langdon were constructed in 1940 and were of the temporary, wood-frame, World War II, two-story barracks type with a planned maximum life of ten years.

Camp Langdon, acquired by the Federal Government circa 1910, has been used by the Government only in time of war. From about 1920 until 1940 it was vacant, unattended land the people roamed it at will. Since the end of World War II, this condition again existed until the Navy acquired it in 1954, when some of the dilapidated buildings were demolished and others repaired,

somewhat, for use by U. S. Navy prisoners. Should the Town of New Castle acquire Camp Langdon, it would propose to demolish these unsightly buildings which detract from the aesthetic beauty of the Town and which present a distinct fire hazard.

The Town Planning Board is giving detailed study to the schedule for converting this property into a public park and careful consideration is being given to the practicability of retaining a few of the structures for current recreation purposes, such as Building No. 190, Maintenance Garage and Building No. 172, Exchange Building as a Park Concession Center; Building No. 130, Camp Recreation Building as a Community Recreation Center; Building No. 128, Firehouse as a Youth Center; and possibly one or two more, the rest will be promptly salvaged to remove the risk of vandalization. The Water Storage Tank will be retained for public use, as will the existing roads which provide good access for park users. Existing water and sewer lines will be retained for use in connection with meeting present and future needs for visitor facilities. The existing gate from Wentworth Avenue at Tarawa Avenue will be used as the park entrance. The existing pier will be used as a scenic outlook, for fishing, and possibly for limited boat access.

Every effort will be made to adapt existing improvements to public recreational use, such as using the coal bunkers as softball or tennis courts, the several concrete floor slabs as game courts, etc.

No estimate of the cost of conversion to future use is available, as this will be a step-by-step process over a period of years, commencing with the removal of the majority of unusable buildings as soon as possible. It is hoped to be able to have sufficient salvage value from these buildings to defray the cost of restoring their sites to a natural condition or converting them to some other recreational use. The last Town Meeting appropriated the sum of \$2,000, in anticipation of the transfer of this property, for initiating the cleanup and conversion of this property for public park purposes.

All of the land of this tract is required to make a sound park area. In fact, the portion in the southwest corner presently retained for use by the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve is an integral part of this park unit and should also be acquired by the Town as soon as the needs of the Marine Corps Reserve can be met otherwise. The existing sewer and water lines and easements

are not detrimental to be proposed uses, but are, in fact, useful. The existing electric distribution lines will be adapted to park use or salvaged.

The adjoining lands to the north and west are residential, and to the south a privately held natural area, and are mutually compatible to the proposed uses of this property.

The provision of the proposed type of oceanfront park space is extremely important in this small island town and can be expected to constitute an increasingly important contribution to the park and recreational area needs of the Town with the passage of time. There is at present no higher possible benefit to the public than that proposed by this application.

The Town Planning Board and a Special Town Land Committee have been directly involved in the evaluation of this property for the proposed uses and the unanimous adoption of articles at the March 13, 1962 Town Meeting authorizing the purchase of this property, and the \$15,000. required for its purchase is an unusual indication of public endorsement for a park proposal. It is proposed to operate the area by local appropriations. The expenses of maintaining and operating this property may be partially financed by fees and charges collected for admission and special services.

### CONCLUSIONS

On the basis of information contained in the application, supplied by the applicant agency, and obtained through field inspection and investigation it is concluded that:

1. There is a critical need for additional public seacoast for the types of park and recreational uses proposed for this property.
2. This property is excellently constituted and located to furnish the park and recreational uses proposed.
3. The Town of New Castle is considered qualified to improve, operate, and maintain this property for the proposed purposes.

### RECOMMENDATION

Based on the findings of this report and the material contained in the application, it is recommended that favorable consideration be given to the application dated February 9, 1962 by

the Town of New Castle, to acquire the surplus property, totaling 27 acres, identified as Camp Langdon Annex, Wentworth Avenue, New Castle, New Hampshire (N-NH-421) for public park and recreation area purposes, at fifty percent of the fair market value, under the provisions of Public Law 616, 80th Congress.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

1962

### CONDENSED SUMMARY OF POLICE REPORT

(A complete report will be given from the floor)

I wish to thank the Citizens, Teachers, School Board and the Selectmen for their cooperation for the past year. We can look back with a great deal of pride upon the accomplishments achieved. We have passed our 11th year without a motor vehicle fatality. One person was injured in a motor vehicle, the first in over five (5) years.

943 calls were answered for the year. 226 calls were from 12 midnight to 6:00 a.m. 19 missing persons under 21. 12 missing persons adults. 17 domestic. 33 drunkardness, disturbing the peace. 1 arson. 4 first aid. 6 ambulance calls. 33 night emergency calls. Recovered stolen property at hotel. 29 dogs reported missing — all returned 6 killed by cars. 7 cats reported missing. 6 boats recovered. 32 windows found open in closed houses 5 doors found open, etc. 63 recommended suspension of drivers licenses. 702 warnings. 376 defective equipment tags. 7 cars towed impeding traffic and snow removal. 73 Municipal court cases, 10 less than 1961.

A few things to REMEMBER FOR 1963 and cut those 73 court cases to (0). SLOW DOWN AND LIVE. Accidents are Avoidable; Alertness Avoids Accidents. COMPLETE stop at STOP SIGNS. 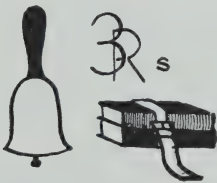

You are hereby notified to meet at the TOWN HALL in the said district of NEW CASTLE on MONDAY the ELEVENTH day of MARCH, 1963, at 7:30 P. M. in the evening, and to cast ballots from that hour until at least nine o'clock in the evening of said day for candidates for the following district offices:

1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

And you are also notified to meet at the same place at 7:30 P.M., o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

5. To see what action the District will take in relation to the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen.

6. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in the warrant.

7. To see if the District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the District the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapters 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.75 to defray the District's share of the cost thereof.

8. To see if the District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

9. To see if the District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

10. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the District will authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the District the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the District will designate the Superintendent of Schools as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

11. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by the Town.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

In this, my second report to School Board Members and voters of Supervisory Union No. 21, an attempt is being made to cover three points:

District Membership and Staff

Space Requirements for Increasing Student Membership

Some Recommendations of Interim Commission on Education

The first topic, "Student Membership and Staff" is included as background information which is requisite for an understanding of the business of this Supervisory Union.

Supervisory Union No. 21 continues to include eight school districts, namely: Hampton, Hampton Falls, New Castle, North Hampton, Rye, Seabrook, South Hampton, and Winnacunnet Cooperative. In December of 1962 there were in these eight districts 3,519 pupils in grades K-12 attending schools and a total of two hundred forty-one school district personnel including administrators, teachers, nurses, secretaries, cafeteria staff, and custodians — an increase of two hundred pupils over the previous year and a total of twelve additional staff members.

Charts which follow show the distribution of pupils by districts and by grades and the number of employees in the several categories in each district.

The second topic, "Space Requirements for Increasing Student Membership" is presented as a union-wide problem. It may be very desirable to propose and examine solutions which cross individual school district boundary lines in an effort to find the best possible plan. Board members in several districts will remember the school year 1962-1963 as a year of much study regarding space needs and possible building programs.

In Hampton a \$475,000.00 addition is well on its way toward completion. Mr. Irving Hersey, of Durham, New Hampshire, is the architect of this addition which provides 11 general classrooms, 2 science rooms, a cafeteria, music room, library, physical education room, and boys' and girls' shower and locker areas. Mr. Winston Titus, of Laconia, New Hampshire, is the general con-

tractor and it is expected that the second story classrooms will be occupied during this school year.

In Hampton Falls School Board members are giving thought to how best to provide for their elementary pupils. The problem in Hampton Falls, as in many other such communities, is that the gradual increase in pupils is reaching the point where a separate teacher and a separate classroom should be provided for each grade level. Six teachers and six classrooms are needed, and only five of each are available. Board members are interested in exploring all possibilities, including the extension of the Winnacunnet Cooperative to include all twelve grades or sharing facilities with other districts on a tuition basis. It could well be that study committees, composed of citizens from several communities, may find solutions which are not now conspicuous.

New Castle is the only district without a school building problem. The Maude H. Trefethen School houses grades 1-6 inclusive, with students in grades 7-12 attending the Portsmouth Schools on a tuition basis.

In North Hampton a study is just getting underway as a result of the completion of this year's membership projection which projection clearly requires serious attention be given to space needs in the near future for this fast growing community.

The Rye School District rejected a plan for an addition to the Junior High School at the March 1962 School District Meeting. The Board has worked diligently and effectively to improve last year's proposal and has a plan which seems to overcome objections voiced last year. One may expect that the action of voters regarding this issue will serve to identify the 1962-1963 school year, and in the interest of quality education I urge support of the Board's proposal.

Seabrook School District may, if the voters support the Board's thinking, have a committee appointed to study the future space needs. School population charts

have been studied and the Seabrook School Board considers that a committee is needed to thoroughly investigate this matter.

In South Hampton the distribution of pupils at each grade level is such that another teacher is needed and this would require another classroom. Fortunately some preliminary thought has been given to anticipate this need and it is hoped that a way can be found to provide the additional space without undue delay.

Winnacunnet school building needs will be covered more comprehensively in a separate report to voters of the Winnacunnet Cooperative School District. However, it is apparent that the addition needed should be such that the total school can accommodate 1200 students. Conservative estimates give evidence of this need.

With seven of the eight districts having a space problem, our thinking should include the possibility of cooperative action, and it is for this reason that this presentation crosses district lines.

The third and final topic to be presented, "Some Recommendations of the Interim Committee on Education", has been very much in the news and will, I expect, be of continuing interest.

From the time the joint resolution was adopted and the fifteen member commission named, school men have held high hopes for the outcome of such a comprehensive study—here would be outstandingly competent lay people investigating, in a positive setting, the total educational function within our State.

The three major areas of investigation included (1) the organization and grouping of public school districts into supervisory unions. (2) post secondary education, and (3) public school finance.

The recommendations have been quoted from the Preliminary Report of the Interim Commission dated December 20, 1962 and can be found following this report. I trust these recommendations made to the General Court will be of interest to voters.

I sincerely appreciate the cooperation and many kindnesses which have been extended me as Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 21. I pledge my best efforts to the responsibilities and duties of this office.

### REPORT OF SUBCOMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

1. It is recommended that the existing 48 supervisory unions be organized into 34 supervisory districts, in accordance with a Master Plan for educational organization.

2. It is recommended that the Authorized Regional Enrollment Area concept be adopted.

3. It is recommended that tuition charges by A. R. E. A. schools be fixed at the following levels:

Elementary	\$260.00
Junior High	324.00
High School	440.00

4. It is recommended that state incentive aid be awarded to A. R. E. A. schools on the basis of each average daily memberships crossing town lines, as follows:

Elementary	\$ 45.00
Junior High	60.00
High School	75.00

### REPORT OF SUBCOMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SCHOOL FINANCE

1. The Commission recommends that New Hampshire adopt the goal of assuming at state level *at least* twenty per cent of the costs of local public school education within the next ten years or by the end of the



2. The Commission recommends that this goal be accomplished by a gradual increase in state assistance during the next decade keeping the ratio at all times at approximately 60% equalization grant and 40% flat grant. As more money becomes available for equalization grants in the years ahead, favorable consideration should be given to reducing the present standard for required local effort now set at 14 mills and, in order to keep flat grants at the recommended 40%, to adopting the State Board of Education's plan for transportation aid and other reasonable flat grant plans.

3. The commission recommends against attempting to reach this goal in any one or two bienniums, believing that the projected state assistance should only be increased gradually over the next decade, hand in hand, with improvements in local school district organization, in other words, that reorganization should keep pace with such increased assistance, the legislature to be the judge of this pace. Money alone will not solve the problem; there must be a willingness to see that it is put to productive use.

4. The Commission recommends a substantial program of state "reorganization aid" to assist local school districts in attaining better area grouping, as recommended in another part of this report. There will be in the long run substantial economics through such reorganization, as well as better schools.

5. The Commission recommends a substantial program of state appropriations to implement its recommendations in the field of higher education as set forth in another part of this report.

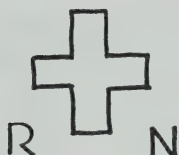
6. For the next biennium, new revenue will have to be raised to implement the recommendations of this Commission. However, such needed new revenue can clearly be raised by reasonable increases in the rates

of several existing state taxes (as the Commission recommends in the body of its report), and tax revision in the form of new broad base taxation is not needed if our recommendations for the next biennium are the sole requirement for us to consider (as we have decided).

The Commission has not attempted to prejudge the financial situation of the state beyond the next biennium but has included in its report useful statistical information concerning the yields of a number of different taxes now in use in other states, for the information of the legislature and the chief executive.

Public finance must keep pace with the needs of our public schools and colleges. It is now evident that our public school and college system cannot give an adequate training for "the age of automation and space", unless it is supported by a broader revenue base than the basic property tax which dates from "the age of the horse and buggy". Twenty per cent of the population is now enrolled in the public school system, a large enterprise, which deserves no less than our best in public support, as an "investment" in the future of this state and its communities.

The above recommendations have obviously been taken directly from the Interim Report and are presented here to make them permanently available to the voters of this Supervisory Union.



## SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

### February 1962 to February 1963

Physical examinations during the Spring of 1962, conducted by Dr. Harold H. Hoefle, Jr., once again proved the health record of New Castle pupils is excellent. Sixty-six children were examined and no serious health problems were detected. Minor ones were reported to parents.

Visual acuity tests have been held through Grades 3-6. Five children have been referred for further testing.

One pupil has received special hearing tests at the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center. Because we do not have the necessary equipment in New Castle, it is not possible to conduct audio tests. When a teacher or parent feels it is necessary, arrangements are made to have the tests conducted at the Center.

A pre-school clinic was held in June with Dr. Hoefle in attendance. Health checkups for 1963 have been scheduled for February.

The teachers, who have had first aid training, have treated countless small injuries received at the school playgrounds. In case of serious injury a parent would be notified and urged to seek medical treatment for the child.

The school nurse examines children who have been absent three or more days, before they can return to school. Twenty-eight inspections have been made during the past year.

There have been no widespread epidemics during the past year and only eight cases of communicable diseases reported.

School personnel were checked in September for tuberculosis. This must be done every year. Tuberculin tests will be given to pupils in the fall. This is done every two years under the sponsorship of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

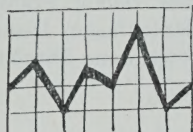
We appreciate the cooperation of parents and teachers as well as others whose combined efforts maintain the excellent health record at the Maude Trefethen School in New Castle.
