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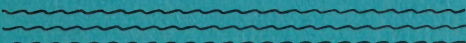

TOWN WARRANT
The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Ipswich in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Appleton Academy in said New Ipswich on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at eleven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: *

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and to raise as estimated therein the necessary funds to transact the business of the Town for the ensuing year.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money, when necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

5. To hear reports of any official or committee and take any action relating thereon.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget of the Electric Light Department.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,004.27 so as to receive \$6,695.14 from the State, for use in Class IV and V highway construction, reconstruction or betterment as provided under N. H. RSA Chapter 241.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of not more than twenty-five thousands dollars (\$25,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a grader for the highway department and to meet this appropriation, the Town be authorized to issue \$25,000.00 in bonds, notes or other evidences of indebtedness pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 33, Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,304.29 to be used in the maintenance and supervision of the Recreation Field, or take any action thereon.

10. To see if the Town will vote to Amend Article 15 as passed in the 1967 Town Meeting and as amended it shall read "to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) for the purpose of providing and installing a well for the playground and filtering system for the swimming pool and to meet this appropriation the Town be authorized to issue \$12,000 in bonds, notes or other evidences of indebtedness pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 33, Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended."

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for two dry hydrants, one at Cemetery Pond and one at Smithville Pond.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$345 for the support of the Monadnock Region Association.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) to be used to improve the entrance road to Pratt Pond by gravelling that section of the road leading from Poor Farm Hill road opposite the residence of Walter Kuusisto for a distance of 2,500 feet in from Poor Farm Hill road. Any work done on this road shall not constitute its acceptance as a town road. (By petition.)

14. To see if the Town will vote to require that all new dwelling-type construction and mobile-home-type dwellings from the acceptance of this article be located on a lot not less than one acre in size. (By petition.)

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the moderator to appoint a five-man planning committee, one of which is to be a Selectman, to study and make recommendations as to the future needs of the Town. (By petition.)

Continuity of the Board of Selectmen was kept when the townspeople re-elected Lester Batchelder last March.

The grader, being twelve years old, has had extensive repairs. Because of breakdowns, this has lost us many hours of work, time and use. This is the reason why Article No. 8 has been placed in the warrant.

We would like to express our gratitude to Seppala & Aho and Mr. William Dunn for equipment loaned to the Town when some of ours were being repaired.

A project undertaken by town employees during favorable weather was the painting of the garages and office. Pride and enthusiasm extended on through till the Christmas Season with the decorating of the Town office and a Christmas tree placed in the center of town.

The Board and the Commissioners have given to the town employees a life and health with major medical insurance coverage. Half of the premiums are paid by the employees. Without these conscientious people, our community could not have operated as effectively as it has.

As you have noticed under "Schedule of Town Property," the Town has acquired several parcels of land through tax collector's deeds. Public auction of these lots will be held at a future date. Public notice will be given on the time and place.

General Report, Calendar Year 1967

ELECTRIC LIGHT COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

Extension to our lines was constructed on North Road to accommodate the building of several homes in that area.

Revision of our domestic rates was made effective October 1, 1967 to coincide with the rate of Public Service Company of New Hampshire. In addition to a reduction per K.W.H., this rate provides a comparable water heating and space heating rate to other utilities.

We are in agreement with the Edward L. Pepin firm, who designed the electrical system for the Mascenic Regional School project, to provide primary service to the school. According to relative specifications we are responsible for furnishing and installing the primary underground service from our facilities to the transformer(s) on the project property. The transformer(s), the primary metering and all related equipment for this metering shall be furnished and installed by the Department. A three-phase line shall be constructed to this project area also. The cost of these facilities to the school project is approximately \$6500, for which allowances have been made in our budget for the fiscal year.

We are contemplating to offer allowances to promote use of electricity in space heating, cooking and water heating to our customers. The amount of the allowances and the conditions of these payments shall be subject to be published when they are determined by the Commissioners.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of New Ipswich, I respectfully submit my final report as the New Ipswich School District Superintendent of Schools. The report of the New Ipswich School District will not include some of the items usually covered, namely, a budget for the coming school year, since this will be taken care of by the Mascenic Regional School District Report which will outline this proposal for New Ipswich.

Staff and Instruction

Only minor changes in staff were necessary this year, fortunately, and thus the school program with its full complement of regular teachers is carrying out a most satisfactory educational program. With the retirement of Miss Elsie Wheeler, Music Teacher, Mr. Clark Greene of Ashby, Massachusetts, a graduate of New England Conservatory, was hired to fill this need within our school. We were very fortunate in being able to hire Mrs. Alethea Masters of Temple to replace Mrs. Ann Read as the Special Reading Teacher. Mrs. Masters has most satisfactorily adapted to this instructional program, providing readily observable assistance to the children that she works with.

Even though we were fortunate in New Ipswich since we did not have to seek out any full-time teachers, and were quite successful in finding qualified part-time staff help, citizens of the community should be made aware of the fact that the critical shortage of teachers at the elementary level, especially at the primary level, continues. At the beginning of the school year there were many more classrooms in New Hampshire this year, than last, that did not have qualified teachers. In spite of the fact that New Ipswich is going to be part of a cooperative which will help to reduce the teacher recruitment problem to some extent, finding teachers to work in small communities is going to continue to be a serious problem until the critical shortage is relieved. Having single grades or grades of more than one section, will help to ease this problem. The best course of action should be to make every effort to hold good staff members that are already employed by providing satisfactory competitive salaries and fringe benefits. I have every reason to believe that

the present attitude of the Mascenic School Board will be to follow this recommendation and help to simplify this very serious and critical problem.

Building and Grounds

The New Ipswich School building is in fairly good condition. Minor irritations regarding the building continue this year as they have in the past, due primarily to the inadequacy of the heating system. This year the severe cold taxed the system to such an extent that school had to be called off one day because of inadequate classroom temperatures. Every once in a while a minor water leakage develops due to heavy rains. Eventually a decision is going to have to be made to replace the roof in its entirety. Some parts of the roof certainly have exceeded the bond limit for the roof installed.

The interior of the building is in satisfactory condition. The school custodian, Mr. Kesti, services the building quite satisfactorily. The toilet facilities, as everyone knows, are rather inadequate for the number of youngsters within the building, but removal of grades five and six to the coming Mascenic School will relieve this problem to some extent., and hopefully before the building is again used to the extent which it is this year, some additional provisions for toilet facilities will have been made.

Cooperative Plan

After many years of fruitless cooperative planning, studying, and voting, everyone knows that the Mascenic Regional School District is a reality and will have full educational responsibility for New Ipswich children as of July 1, 1968. Citizens of New Ipswich should be thankful that there were interested citizens in the community who were willing to devote their time and energy, not only for this study; but to the several studies that have taken place previously, finally resulting in Mascenic.

No thinking citizen, I am sure, will expect that Mascenic is going to solve all the educational problems of the children of New Ipswich, but within the cooperative structure which is established by this organization, hopefully education for children of New Ipswich will be markedly improved. The fact that single grades will now be possible for New Ipswich children is probably the greatest benefit for elementary children of the town.

Warrant Articles

Warrant Articles are designed to assure a school district organization through the end of June to oversee the interests of the district during that period of time. In addition, specific provisions are made for handling any deficit or balance that might occur, to transfer all New Ipswich School District property to the Mascenic Regional School District, and also to satisfactorily close out the financial accounts of the district.

Conclusion

The teachers of the New Ipswich School are to be complimented for the efforts that they are making in behalf of the children of the community during this year. With over two hundred sixty children in the school in nine rooms and six grades, several teachers have split grades with more youngsters than can be satisfactorily attended to. Naturally, a teacher in this situation is constantly striving to meet each child's individual need and therefore is under constant daily strain. The staff has assumed this trying task with no complaints, and with good humor.

It has been a pleasure for me to work with the New Ipswich School Board during this past year and for the past ten years as your Superintendent of Schools. I have always found the Board to be most understanding of the serious school problems, sensitive to the responsibilities that they have to the community, and especially alert to the educational needs of children. Very close cooperation has always existed between the staff, the school board, the citizens, and the superintendent and has thus resulted in a most satisfactory educational program for the children.

I am sure that continued interest on the part of citizens and parents, working closely with the staff of the Mascenic District, will assure for New Ipswich an even better educational program than that which has existed in the past, and one of which all may be exceedingly proud.

Assisted Dr. Cayward with physicals. 250 children were examined.

Notes on the following defects signed by the Doctor sent home.

- 77 carious teeth
- 38 enlarged tonsils
- 2 enlarged neck glands
- 4 cardiac murmur
- 1 wax in ears
- 1 ptosis of left eye
- 1 inflamed throat

Assisted with TB testing. The Ster-Needle test was used. Kindergarten, Grades 1, 4, 7 and High School Seniors tested. 178 children and 28 adults were tested. Those that showed a positive reaction were urged to have a chest x-ray. An x-ray unit from Manchester, New Hampshire came to Appleton Academy to x-ray all positive reactors and their contacts. 68 x-rays were taken. No active cases were found. Testing to be done yearly.

Assisted with Measles Clinic. 31 children received the vaccine.

Mrs. Davis, State Dental Hygienist, spoke and answered questions on the care of the teeth.

Nurse's work included:

- Heights and weights on all the children
- Routine inspections on hair and hygiene
- First aid for cuts, bruises, scratches, sprains, etc.
- Children with fever sent home

Dental hygiene stressed. Crest Program carried out. Tooth brushes and tooth paste given to all third graders. Film strip shown to all.

Assisted with Head Start Program

Titmus Vision Test given to all pupils. Anyone showing a defect was urged to go for further examinations.

Pre-School Registration May 15, 16 and 17, 1967. 39 children registered.

Immunization Clinic was held in Greenville, New Hampshire at the Legion Hall. Many New Ipswich children attended the Clinic.
