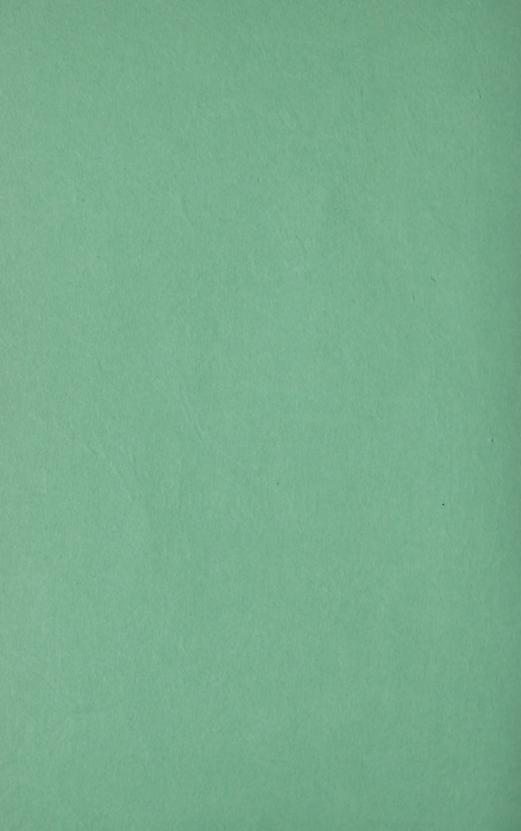

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont in the county of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Piermont Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.
 - 4. To raise and appropriate money for Town Road Aid.
- 5. To raise and appropriate money for Care of Cemeteries.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Street Lights.
- 7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.
- 8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Fire Department, also for extra equipment if felt necessary to lower insurance rates.
- 9. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.
- 10. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committees for same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 12. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountain Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc., as a part of the Cooperative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10ϕ per \$1000 of the assessed valuation of the town for 1949.

- 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deeds or otherwise.
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 16. To see if the Town wishes to remodel the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate money for same.
- 17. To see if the Town wishes to pipe water to the South Lawn Cemetery and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 18. To discuss a village water supply and see if the Town wishes to put any article in the 1956 warrant regarding this matter.
- 19. To see if the Town wishes to install a blinker light and to raise and appropriate money for same.
- 20. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

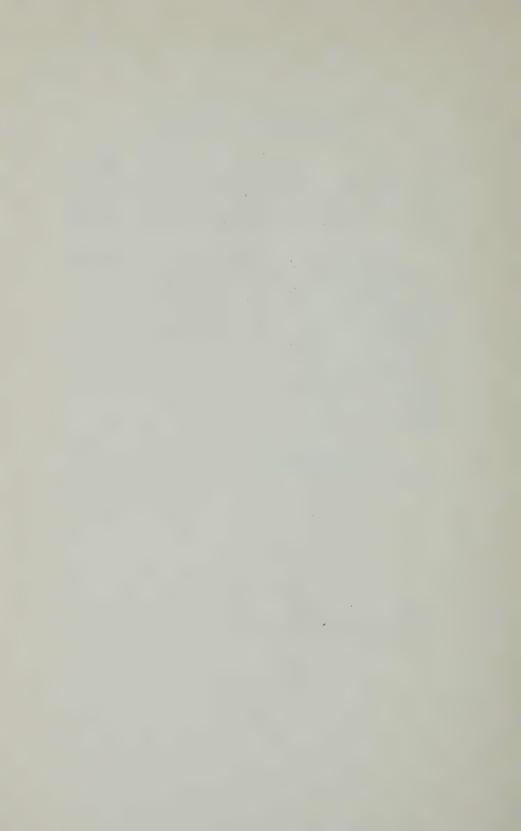

- 2. Be sure that all lighted material cigars, cigarettes and matches is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.
- 3. Secure the required written permission to burn from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow.
- 4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

- 8. - 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of a school lunch program for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to transport its secondary school pupils to high school.*
- 11. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the previous article.

- 12. To see if the district will vote to transport the elementary pupils from the Alcide Fagnant Corner and from the residences of Freeman Robie and Stephen Underhill.
- 13. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of the previous article.
- 14. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Contrary to National, as well as State per pupil cost increases, the Piermont school budget for 1955-1956 shows a 3.47% decrease, not including special articles.

This is primarily accounted for by a drop in high school tuition enrollment. It is only temporary, however, as the present census shows a high school population increase of 12 from the present 24 to 36 by 1960. Tuition rates have also increased state-wide from the 1952-1953 state average of \$310.00 to \$325.00 for 1953-1954, and will be well above the latter figure for 1954-1955.

The increased costs, in general, are due to increased services.

Transportation for high school pupils is being accepted as a desirable service in many districts, and is being asked for by several parents in this district. An article appears in the warrant to be voted upon.

Of the 26 pupils currently enrolled in high school, 7 are attending Haverhill Academy and 17 are at Bradford Academy.

The Piermont Village School has an enrollment of 79 pupils, an increase of four. Census figures again show increased enrollment until 1959, at which time, approximately 90 students will be in attendance. This increase will need additional housing, which may be met in two ways. One, by adding to the present building. Secondly, by joining a centralized high school district and sending the junior high (7th and 8th grades) pupils to it, thus relieving the over-crowded condition in the village school. The second plan would undoubtedly be the most beneficial to the student, because of the offering of a more varied list of subjects taught and services rendered. Also, considering the ever-increasing tuition rates in the secondary schools, it would probably be more economical.

Mr. Elwyn Farnham, of Norwich, Vermont, replaced Mr. Rittenburg as principal of the Village School. Mr. Farnham attended Plymouth Normal School and the University of Vermont, and has had many years of successful teaching experience.

Mrs. Lurena Day, assisted by Mrs. Shirley Metcalf, is again serving excellent, well-balanced hot lunches to the pupils. The contributions by citizens and organizations, to this program, are greatly appreciated, including that of the V. F. W.

It has been said that if it is better to travel than to

arrive, it is because traveling is a constant arriving, while arrival ends further traveling and is most easily attained by going to sleep. Let us keep awake that the best interests of youth may be served.

Acknowledgment is hereby made to the School Board members for their administrative interest and cooperation, to the teachers for their conscientious endeavors, and to the citizens of Piermont for their loyal support and interest in the welfare of the school system.

Your attention is directed to the report of the school nurse, which follows this report.

During the school year, home visits were made to parents of first grade children. This gave an opportunity to explain the health services offered by the school and to discuss any health needs of the child. Pamphlets concerning eyes, ears, teeth, immunizations, and basic food requirements were left with the parent.

Routine vision screening was done in all grades. Written notices were sent home when symptoms of defects were found. With these notices, went a form for the eye doctor to fill in after his examination. We would like these completed forms returned to the school for the health records. In this way, the school can follow any special recommendations that are made by the doctor.

The puretone audiometric hearing test was done in Grades 1, 2, 4, 6, and 8. Hearing tests were done in the other grades when a new pupil entered school, when there was a question of difficulty in hearing, and when the child had failed the test the previous year.

I want to thank Mr. Bennett, the teachers, the parents, and the pupils for their kind cooperation during the year.
