### TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Polls Will Be Open From 11:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Springfield in the (L.S.) County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Springfield on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at eleven of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will approve the continuance of the survey of Town Forest and the sale of Timber.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for use as a set-off against budget appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amount indicated; or take any other action thereon.

Purpose: Dump \$7,500.00

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to raise and appropriate \$45,000 for the purpose of purchasing a new dump truck, plow and body to be used by the highway department, and, further, to authorize the withdrawal of \$11,300.00 from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund and the transfer of \$20,000.00 from surplus funds for the purchase and raise the balance from taxes.
- 7. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to establish a procedure whereby the Town Hall shall be available for the use of all non-profit Town organizations upon reasonable request and without charge therefore.
- 8. (By Petition) To see if the Town of Springfield shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses,

schools and agencies in the Town of Springfield, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire.

9. (By Request) "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b, and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000?"

(Yes or No by printed ballot and use of Checklist.)

10. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law: No person, firm, or corporation shall erect any new dwelling, garage, mobile home, school bus or other enclosure for habitation to be used as a dwelling within the Town of Springfield without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Selectmen or designated person. Permits shall be issued or denied within seven days from the date of receipt of the completed application. No permit shall be issued without appropriate sewage facility approval. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provision of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of \$10.00 each day of neglect to obtain such a permit. This ordinance shall be effective April 1, 1984.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 12. To hear the reports of the Officers and Standing Committees.

## Annual Report for Year 1983

The Volunteer Fire Department would like to thank the townspeople again for our new fire truck. It will continue to be one of the greatest assets to the town for the protection of lives and property - now as well as in the future.

1983 was a great success in achieving needed repairs including the insulating of our fire station. In appreciation for all the members who gave many hours of hard work and training - well done.

The greatest amount of appreciation and thanks go to the Hook and Ladder Ladies. Their time and hard work enabled this small volunteer fire department to purchase badly needed communications equipment.

The total sum the Fire Department and the Hook and Ladder Ladies spent was \$2,464.00. The following items were purchased:

- 1. Fire salvage covers.
- 2. Two Motorola portable radios with the town's own working frequency and Kearsarge's frequency also.

- Seven Motorola pager radios which are carried by the fire department members and will get the fire call to them if they are out of town or at work.

#### **HEALTH OFFICER, ANNUAL REPORT, 1983**

The water in Baptist Pond and Lake Kolelemook was tested this summer for the first time in several years. The water samples from Baptist Pond were all safe for drinking, but the coliform counts in several of the samples from Lake Kolelemook were high enough to raise questions about the safety of drinking it and in one sample near the public beach the count was well above the acceptable values and was definitely unsafe to drink. Notice was sent to all residents around the lake warning them not to use lake water for drinking unless they tested it in their own intakes or treated it by boiling or other means. With the increasing population of the town and around the lake, it is unwise to drink untreated lake water even if next summer's cultures are once again at safe levels. The state is investigating the source of contamination but has not found it yet. If they do not find it by next summer, the town will make further efforts to do so. People drawing water from Baptist Pond should also start making arrangements to treat it or find another source as it is unlikely that this water will escape contamination as population pressures increase.

The town ordinance concerning new houses and trailers went into effect this year although it had been promulgated in 1982. As reported last year it forbids building or moving in a trailer until plans for sanitary facilities have been filed with the state and forbids occupancy before the facilites have been approved by the state. Violation is punishable by a fine of \$10 for every day of non-compliance. This ordinance has been largely ignored, although similar requirements have always existed under state law.

The contamination of Lake Kolelemook indicates that it is no longer safe to ignore the town and state requirements. A resident's right to do as he pleases ends when he may endanger his neighbor's health by polluting his well. It is hoped that enforcement of the law will not require legal prosecution.

The society's major function will be to collect and preserve material which may help to establish or illustrate the history of the town, the area, its settlement, its development, its progress, and its population.

During the past months, meetings included speakers Bud Lauridsen of New London, and Verna Cote of Georges Mills. August was the month for a picnic/hiking tour of Perleytown and Fowlertown. The moving of old records from the town hall to the municipal building was accomplished during October. Future investigations include family histories, early industries, town buildings and records, old houses, cemeteries, mines, and trails.

Our immediate goal is to be accepted as a non-profit, tax exempt organization. Gifts to the society may then become tax-deductible by the donor. We are currently arranging to take possession of a building with one acre of land recently offered to the society.

Membership is divided into three classifications: individual active members, business members, and life members. Meetings of the society are held on the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. at the Libbie A. Cass Memorial Library. The society welcomes new members.



#### LIBBIE A. CASS ANNUAL REPORT - 1983

Many changes this year. Louise Jacewicz's resignation from the Board was accepted with deep regret. Our thanks to Louise and Stanley for their devoted service and their many gifts over the years such as the carpeting, table and chairs in the children's room, the chemical commode, the exhaust fan and other improvements. Muriel Tinkham was appointed to fill the vacancy and we are fortunate to have another enthusiastic Trustee and one who also has had library experience.

The State Library has discontinued the bookmobile service, although we can still secure books via inter-library loan. A new tentative accreditation plan promulgated by the State Library will require that the library remain open ten hours a week and have a librarian with a professional degree or one who is enrolled in the Public Library Techniques courses to be offered by UNH. We will try to meet these requirements when they go into effect. The former book mobile collection was offered free to local libraries and we returned from Concord with hundreds of volumes. We have joined LUV (Librarians of the Upper Valley) a cooperative which secures discounts on books and supplies and stretches the budget.

Again this year we have sponsored a Halloween and the annual Christmas party with the Recreation Committee. A summer story hour was held and thanks to Nancy Edgar Howard for so ably conducting it and making it a success. A scholarship offered to a graduating Springfield senior from Kearsarge High School went to Tracy Woodger who is attending UVM.

New shelves were added to the adult room and a ramp entrance to facilitate access and egress. As was mentioned last year in the report, the library is running out of space and as Springfield continues to grow, thought must be given to utilizing or acquiring additional space.

The book, bake and white elephant sale netted \$425.80. Proceeds helped finance the scholarship and the presents and parties given for the children. Income from the Green Trust Fund is used primarily for the children's collection.

Our heartfelt thanks to the following volunteers without whom we could not keep open for the eight hours a week. #### SPRINGFIELD SOLID WASTE COMMISSION - 1983 REPORT

During 1983, the Solid Waste Commission was actively seeking to identify and evaluate all available options for handling solid waste in a cost-effective and convenient manner in the immediate future and over the longer term. The clear objective is to develop an economical, accessible system for transfer/transportation and final processing/disposal in accordance with Town Meeting instructions.

Commissioners continued to represent the Town in regional and sub-regional efforts. Until the August Town Meeting vote to withdraw from both groups, George Thomson was the town representative to the NH/VT Solid Waste Project and the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal District with Jay Booker as alternate. In the fall, the Town joined the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Solid Waste District with George Thomson as representative and Jay Booker and George Green as alternates. This district membership ensured Town compliance with the statutory October district deadline.

In addition to visiting 6 transfer and disposal facilities, the Commission met on a weekly basis for most of the year to examine available options with Selectmen, officials from neighboring towns, solid waste contractors, the Regional Planning Director, and the Chairman of the State Solid Waste Board among others. In June a preliminary report was prepared analyzing various alternatives including systems costs in nearby communities. The analysis demonstrated that alternative systems were available.

At year's end, the Solid Waste Committee was considering the following options for collection, transfer and transportation.

- 1. Continue with Sunapee.
- 2. Joint venture with Grantham.
- 3. Transfer station in Springfield.
- 4. Collection by private contractors.

Final disposal will depend upon the most economical tipping fee. Present options include:

- 1. Rockingham VT (BFI)
- 2. Rochester NH (LRD)
- 3. Claremont NH (NH/VT Project)
- 4. Saugus MA (GDS)

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT 1983

The outstanding event of a successful year has, of course, been the 'ground breaking' for the new construction project. This will include the expansion of the present Physical Therapy Department, creation of a new waiting and admitting room area, new emergency entrance, and trauma room. It will also include converting the existing emergency room into a second operating room, enlarging examination rooms, as well as a recovery room for surgicare patients. These changes will recognize the general trend toward more ambulatory care and outpatient services. The generous support of the community for the past few years has enabled New London Hospital to finance some 26% of the total cost, through use of donated funds. This is an enviable record for us, and a tribute to the communities served.

New London Hospital is currently maintaining an ongoing dialogue with representatives of Valley Regional, Newport, Concord, and Franklin hospitals, as all are concerned with the best possible implementation of Regional Health Planning. Each hospital is represented by a physician, an administrator and a trustee.

Myer S. Bornstein, M.D. has been accepted as an Associate Medical Staff member, with privileges in obstetrics and gynecology.

In December, there was a joint meeting of the Board of Trustees and the Medical Staff in order to meet and be addressed by Sylvio Dupuis, the new Commissioner of Health and Welfare of New Hampshire.

Hospital Day once again provided pleasure and satisfaction to the surrounding communities, as well as to the many out of state visitors attending. Thanks to its success, the hospital was able to purchase new equipment which ultimately will benefit all of us. Note: Hospital Day 1984 has been moved to the second Saturday in August.

The Long Range Planning Committee has been given the go-ahead for an in depth study of corporate restructuring.

The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals made its extensive study of New London Hospital in all its ramifications, with the result that accreditation has been granted for the next three years.

In conclusion, a happy note: New London Hopital's per diem rate is right in line with comparable local hospitals and is below the average rate.
