

The third meeting of the Sullivan County Delegation, 1943 session, was held at the State House at the Committee Room No. 100 at 4:00 P. M.

Angus, Densmore, Sterling, Bailey, Kempton, Metcalf. The meeting was called to order by Chairman William Beaman. Calvin Oakes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, discussed with the members the 1943 and 1944 County Budget.

S. W. Colby, County Agent, discussed the Sullivan County Budget Extension cost for 1943 and 1944; also, the services of the 4-H Club members as to man power and for combating forest fires, etc.; and other matters in regard to the budget.

K. E. Barraclough, Forester, of the University of New Hampshire Extension Service, discussed the farm, man power, and service work in Cheshire and Sullivan Counties, to assist timber operators in locating the type timber this market demands.

Henry W. Kiely, Chairman of the Sullivan County Commissioners, talked on the public welfare part of the budget, and the budget in general.

Calvin Oakes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, made recommendations in regard to parts of the budget.

It was voted to increase by \$400.00 (Four Hundred Dollars) the County Farm Bureau Service for 1943 and 1944.

It was voted that the delegation make available the sum of \$500.00 (Five Hundred Dollars) to the Sullivan County Farm Forestry Service in conjunction with Cheshire County if Cheshire County made the same amount of \$500.00 (Five Hundred Dollars) for the same purpose.

It was voted to introduce a bill in the House to raise the Commissioners' salaries to One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.) per year each, for 1943 and 1944.

It was voted to approve the budget as outlined by the Finance Committee.

The fourth meeting of the Sullivan County Delegation was held at the House Balcony, State House, Wednesday, April 7, 1943 one hour after adjournment. The meeting was called to order by Chairman William E. Beaman.

Mr. Beaman discussed House Bill No. 322, an act relating to the

salaries of the County Commissioners of the County of Sullivan. It was moved, seconded, and voted unanimously by the delegation to have said House Bill No. 322 filed with Clerk of the House, as follows: An act relating to the salaries of the County Commissioners of the County of Sullivan ought to pass.

Chairman Beaman discussed the future meeting for April 13, next Tuesday, in regard to the purchase of a coal-burning stoker for the County Home. It was decided to have the clerk send notices to each member of the delegation of further meetings. (This meeting was postponed April 8 by Chairman Beaman.)

It was moved, seconded, and voted unanimously by the delegation to hold the annual meeting of the Sullivan County Delegation at the County Home Saturday, May 1st at 11 A. M. with an inspection of buildings, live stock, and equipment. Dinner to be served.

Calvin Oakes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, discussed the subject of hiring a clerk at the office of Register of Probate to assist Bernice M. Sawyer MacWilliams.

It was moved and seconded and voted unanimously by the delegation to increase Bernice M. Sawyer MacWilliams, for clerk hire, from the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.) to Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.) for the years 1943, 1944.

May 1, 1943

The fifth meeting of Sullivan County Delegation was held at the County Home on Saturday, May 1st, 1943.

The Delegation was cordially greeted by the Commissioners Kiely, Howland and Pierce. With the presence of Commissioner Henry W. Kiely which assisted the members on an inspection through the County Home in general which was enjoyed by all. Next the Delegation was assisted by the three Commissioners and Supt. Grout and shown the heating plant to inspect same and look over the prospect of installing a coal-burning stoker in one or more of the boilers in the heating plant. The reason for this change being due to the shortage of labor and high cost of cord wood and labor to cut same. At 12:30 the members sat down to a most delicious dinner served by Matron Mrs. Grout. Words of grace were submitted by member Leon E. Kempton of Newport. As invited guests were Councilor Harold G. Fairbanks, Senator John R. Kelly of Newport and Oney Z. Russell of the State House, Concord.

After dinner was served, the guests and Delegation members adjourned to the Auditorium for a business meeting. Chairman Beaman called the meeting to order. The following answered the Roll Call:

Maurice Chase made a motion to Amend the above and have the Chairman appoint a Committee of four to serve with the County Commissioners to purchase and have installed the said coal-burning stoker and equipment, not to cost over \$2500.00. It was moved by William A. Sterling to accept the Amendment and seconded by George W. Angus. It was voted unanimously by the Delegation.

Chairman Beaman appointed Chase as Chairman, and Kempton, Beaudry and Angus to act in cooperation with the County Commissioners on the above project. Sydney B. Converse made a motion to extend a standing vote of thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Grout for the wonderful dinner which was voted unanimously by the Delegation.

A discussion by Chairman Beaman in regard to House Bill No. 209, An Act Relative to Membership, Powers and Duties of the Fish and Game Commission. The Commission shall consist of ten members. The Delegation went on record to support the bill when it comes to the House in the near future.

The Chairman and Delegation members instructed the Clerk to write a letter to the Honorable Senator John R. Kelly to use his support for the bill when it comes to the Honorable senate.

Commissioners' Report

In accordance with the Public Law of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Sullivan County herewith present the Annual Report of the County Commissioners, the County Home and House of Correction, Treasurer, Auditors, Solicitor, Clerk of Court, Sheriff, Chaplain, and the Physician of the County Home for the year ending December 31, 1943.

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

In submitting our report again it is our pleasure to announce savings of several thousand dollars in the expenditures of the 1943 Budget, as voted by the County Delegation.

New Relief Cases

Under the Settlement Law passed by the New Hampshire State Legislature in 1938, a person receiving Town Aid for five consecutive years automatically becomes the obligation of the County in which they reside. In 1943 many more cases were turned over to us from the various towns, which continue to add to our expenditures for chronic cases.

Finances

As indicated in this report, our savings appear to be in the amount of \$29,301.85. This figure is misleading as the County Delegation used \$15,785.00 of our 1942 savings to balance the budget for 1944. Our actual savings would therefore amount to \$13,516.86 for the year ending December 31, 1943.

Children

One of the major expenditures by Sullivan County is the Board and Care of children. At present the County is responsible for 61. These children come from families who have lost their parents, or those who are unable or incompetent to care for them. Of the above amount many are under the care and custody of our various County and State Institutions. We have 41 children who are being supported in Foster Homes around the County: Children that are turned over to us come from State Officials, Private Societies, Probation Dept. and the Courts.

Operations at County Home

Expenditures at the County Home are somewhat larger this year because of increased costs of all commodities, equipment, and general repairs. Due to the drastic rulings by the OPA in the price structure of live stock the County Farm has suffered a severe financial loss.

The problem of help at the Home is becoming increasingly acute as many of our employees have left our employment seeking work in the Defense Plants where they can obtain higher wages and shorter hours. In addition to our regular people cared for at the Home, we have had an average of about forty boarders, some of advanced years and others with chronic diseases; these patients take care of their own financial responsibilities.

Heating

Due to the shortage of wood at the County Home, a meeting of the Finance Committee of the County Delegation was called for the purpose of discussing the matter of purchasing a coal stoker for one of the large boilers that is used to heat the Institution. Authorization was received by the County Commissioners and a stoker was installed.

Fire Insurance

In the past years the Fire Insurance Policies at the County Home, exclusive of the Almshouse (Brick Building) have been written for one year. Beginning this year, all policies will be written on a three year basis, effecting a substantial savings to the taxpayers.

Our Invitation

We would like to suggest to the inhabitants of the County that they make it a point at some convenient time to visit our County Home. We are proud of it and would welcome any suggestions which would be beneficial to better operation or maintenance.

Appreciation

To the Citizens of Sullivan County who have assisted us in our work during the past year; to all those employed by the County; Town Officials, State Officials, Chaplain, Physician, and to all Clubs and Organizations who have so kindly contributed to the welfare and happiness of the Inmates and Patients at our County Institution, we are sincerely grateful.

Our Superintendent and Matron

We have again been privileged to work with Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Grout, our Superintendent and Matron, in the supervision and management of our County Home. We wish to thank them for their fine efforts in making a pleasant home for those who live there.

Division of Municipal Accounting State Tax Commission Concord, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 82, Section 27, of the Revised Laws, an audit of the accounts of Sullivan County has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission. The period covered included the fiscal year ended December 31, 1942, and the current year from January 1st to May 31st, 1943. Submitted herewith is the report of this audit, including Exhibits and Schedules as hereafter listed.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Farm.

Finances

In order to present a comprehensive picture of the financial condition of the County during the last ten years and the changes which have occurred in this period, certain statements have been prepared and will be referred to in the comments which follow.

Comparative Balance Sheets - 1933 to 1942, inclusive: (Exhibit I)

It will be noted that the County started this period (1933) with a Net Debt of \$279,603.18. Since then the Net Debt has been reduced each year, except 1938, and as of December 31, 1942 it amounted to \$114,509.72, indicating a decrease during the ten year period of \$165,-093.46. During the same period the bonded debt of the County was reduced by \$164,000. That the decrease in Net Debt exceeded this amount is an indication of sound financial management by the County Officials, inasmuch as in several years during this period the cash surplus was used to reduce the amount raised by County tax. In each such instance the assets were, of course, reduced by a like amount. County Tax Apportionment — 1934 to 1943, inclusive: (Exhibit II)

The apportionment of County Taxes by towns during the years from 1934 to 1943, inclusive, is shown in this Exhibit. The highest County Tax was \$200,000.00, in 1939. From this peak it has dropped to \$120,000.00, in 1943.

Receipts and Expenditures - 1933 to 1942, inclusive: (Exhibit III)

Summaries of receipts and expenditures, classified in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, for the years 1933 to 1942, inclusive, are presented in Exhibit III.

Bonded Debt and Annual Maturities: (Exhibit IV)

The outstanding bonded debt of the County, as of December 31, 1942, amounted to \$150,000. This represented the balance of two issues, the original amount of which totalled \$310,000. The County Building $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ Bonds, issued in 1930, mature at the rate of \$8,000 a year until 1948, and \$7,000 a year in 1949 and 1950, when the final payment becomes due. The Refunding $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ Bonds, issued in 1933, have maturities of \$8,000 a year until 1953, when the final maturity of this issue occurs.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues—1942: (Schedules A and B)

A Net Unexpended Balance of Apppropriations of \$17,009.26, and a Net Excess of Actual Over Estimated Revenues of \$10,037.12, resulted in a Net Budget Surplus for the year of \$27,046.38.

Reconciliation of Change in Financial Condition—December 31, 1941-December 31, 1942: (Schedule C)

During the fiscal year ended December 31, 1942, the Net Debt of the County decreased by \$20,871.04. The factors influencing this change in financial condition were as follows:

All vouchers issued by the Commissioners and orders issued by the Clerk of the Superior Court during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1942, and the period from January 1, 1943 to May 31, 1943, were examined and compared with the Treasurer's checks and corresponding entries in the Treasurer's records. The classification of expenditures was noted.

Totals of receipts and expenditures, as indicated by Treasurer's records, were verified. The Treasurer's balance as of May 31, 1943, was in agreement with the total funds on deposit in the several depository banks as indicated by the reconciliation made of each account. (Schedule F)

Clerk of the Superior Court

The financial accounts and records of the Clerk of Court of Sullivan County were examined for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1942. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

County Farm

An examination was made of the accounts and records of the Superintendent of the County Farm. Receipts of the Farm, as recorded, were compared with remittances made to the County Treasurer.

The use of triplicate receipt forms to be issued by the Superintendent for all monies received is recommended. One copy of the receipt is to be given to the party making the remittance, one copy sent to the County Commissioners and the third copy retained by the Superintendent. Receipts should be serially numbered.

All County Farm receipts should be entered in the Superintendent's Cash Book on the date received.

General Comments

Relief Orders

Recipients should always sign relief orders indicating that the commodities stated therein have actually been received. It was found that this practise has been generally followed in cases where the orders were for groceries and provisions, but only occasional signatures were noted on orders for clothing.

Doctors' bills should indicate the dates on which services were performed.

Sheriff's Expenses Account

The Sheriff should submit itemized expense accounts, indicating by date—services, mileage and other expenses. Payments made by the Sheriff to others should be supported by receipts.

Exemption from Federal Excise Taxes:

Under the provisions of the 1942 Revenue Act, states and subdivisions of local government are exempted from the payment of excise taxes levied on purchases of certain commodities by the federal government. The exemption also applied to the transportation of property. A schedule indicating those commodities on which exemption may be claimed is included herewith.

When making purchases of materials or equipment such as refrigerators, washing machines and other electrical appliances, tires, tubes, gasoline, lubricating oils, automobile parts accessories, etc., the invoice should indicate the gross price, amount of excise tax included and the net price of the equipment or materials purchased. Exemption certificates should be filed to avoid payment of the tax.

Balance Sheet

The petty cash fund of \$200.00, which is permanently in the hands of the Superintendent of the County Farm, should be included as an asset item in the Balance Sheet of the County.

Recording Receipts

All receipt items should be recorded in the Treasurer's book on the date received even though they are not actually deposited in the bank until a later date.

Competitive Bidding

Chapter 108 of the Session Laws of 1941 provides that "Any purchase of equipment or materials made by a county in an amount exceeding fifty dollars shall be by competitive bidding, provided that the county commissioners by unanimous vote may waive the provisions for such bidding."

In order that the interpretation of this law might be clarified the following question was asked the Attorney-General Frank R. Kenison:

"In your opinion does this act apply in cases where orders are made up of different articles, the total amount of which exceeds fifty dollars? This might apply to groceries, provisions, clothing or grain for the County Farm, medical supplies for the Hospital or any other merchandise purchased by the County."

The Attorney-General has ruled as follows:

"Your second inquiry is whether or not Laws 1941 c. 108 requiring competitive bidding in purchases made by County Commissioners applied to groceries, provisions, clothing, grain, medical supplies and other merchandise purchased by the County. The law, Public Laws c. 38 s. 7a (Laws 1941 c. 108) requires competitive bidding for 'any purchase of equipment or materials.' The quoted phrase has no technical meaning and is to be interpreted broadly to effectuate its purpose. A narrow construction of the quoted phrase 'equipment or materials' would be contrary to the legislative intention and would emasculate the purpose of the statute. The act is intended to apply to any purchase including these purchases mentioned in your inquiry. Nor can the dictate of the statute be avoided by consciously and deliberately making consecutive purchases of less than fifty dollars in order to avoid competitive bidding. The fifty dollar limitation was intended to take care of purchases which were made occasionally and was not intended to be a device by which the purpose of the act could be frustrated. The statute does not define competitive bidding but it has been interpreted generally to mean a bona fide attempt to obtain offers or bids from several sources in order that the county may benefit by the lowest price. Since the statute does not determine the manner of ascertaining these offers and bids, it rests with the sound discretion of the County Commissioners as to whether the bids will be in writing and the form which they will take. In cases where competitive bidding cannot fulfill its purpose, it may be waived by unanimous vote of the County Commissioners duly recorded in their offices, together with a statement of the reasons therefor, which are open to public inspection at all reasonable hours."

Our examination disclosed the fact that, except in one instance, no bids were requested in connection with the purchases of materials and supplies by the County during the period covered by the audit. It was furthermore noted that the County Commissioners had unanimously voted to waive competitive bidding in the purchase of various commodities used by the County. A separate vote was taken in the case of each of the following items and the reason stated therein why bids were not asked for: Gasoline, Oils and Greases, Ensilage Cutter, Shoes, Clothing, Seeds, Seed Potatoes, Hardware, Groceries, Typewriter, Meats, Grain, Hospital Supplies, and Wood.

Each vote was properly recorded.

Although it is realized that under present conditions there may

be cases where it is not possible or practical to secure bids, an attempt should be made or the reason for failure to do so clearly stated in each case.

It is our feeling that the intent of the law was to require competitive bidding in each specific instance where the purchase of goods or materials exceeds fifty dollars in amount. A copy of a form suitable for this purpose is included herewith.

Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all County Officials which were examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the standard procedure prescribed by this Division.

Section 31 of Chapter 211, provides that:

"Upon the completion of each audit, as herein provided, a report thereof shall be made to the proper local officials, and a copy of such report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual report of the county, city, town, school district, village district or precinct concerned."

In accordance with the provisions of this law, therefore, the text of this report should be printed in the next annual County report.

Our appreciation and thanks is expressed to the County Officials and their office staffs for the assistance rendered while we were engaged in this audit.

Superintendent's Report

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners:

We herewith submit our annual report for the year ending December 31, 1943. Out of our budget for the year we have endeavored to keep our buildings in repair and have also made a number of improvements in different part of the Institution.

The officers' kitchen has been completely re-modelled by enlarging, laying a hardwood floor, and adding more cupboard space. Some essential new equipment was purchased.

During the past year it has been impossible to obtain enough wood, formerly used for fuel. This lack of wood necessitated the purchase and installation of a coal stoker for one of the heating boilers. In addition to the usual amount used we put in about three hundred and fifty tons of coal for the stoker.

Several pieces of farm equipment have been bought as re-placements. Due to the labor shortage we do not anticipate any increase in crop production and will consider ourselves fortunate if we raise enough for our own use. Heretofore we have usually had a surplus to sell. Our crop production has been very good despite adverse weather conditions, the hay crop being markedly above the average.

Several head of beef stock have been bought to turn out next Spring. This will help our meat situation.

It is hardly necessary to stress the labor problem, as it is universal.

We are grateful for flowers and other pleasures brought to our people. To all who have helped us during the difficult months of 1943 we express our thanks.
