

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Surry in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Surry on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$137.91 for Town Road Aid.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the Repairs of Highways and Bridges.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for repairs and care of the Town Hall, or take any action in relation thereto.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for defense purposes, or take any action in relation thereto.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the aid of the poor.

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9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

10. To see if the town will favor the discontinuance for public use of that part of the Wright Grove and Village Cemetery and any and all roads or rights of way pertaining thereto, which the Selectmen of the Town of Surry have optioned to the United States Government in connection with the Surry Mountain Reservoir.

11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the Dort Road so called, starting at the State Road leading from Surry to Alstead and discontinue through Surry Mountain Reservoir to a big elm tree north of J. V. Stillings barn.

•12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the old State Road through the Surry Mountain Reservoir, starting at a big stone at the top of the hill by the Town Hall and going north to the new State Road from Surry to Alstead.

13. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the old State Road through the Surry Mountain Reservoir from Surry to Keene starting at a cement post on the west side of the road at the boundary line of said Reservoir, south of Francis L. Bain land going south on the said road to the south boundary of said Government land to the end of a stone wall on the west side of said Road.

14. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the Wilbur Road so called from the east boundary line of Katherine Woods to the old Joslin Road so called.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust from the estate of Hattie B. Carpenter for the care of the Frank D. W. Carpenter and Bradley Britton burial lots in the Village Cemetery. 17. To hear the reports of the town officers.

18. To allow accounts.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Surry:

I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

No changes were made in the teaching positions this year.

Instruction in the schools is being accomplished in accordance with the standards for the State. Standard achievement tests are given each year and reports are required relative to the work completed in all grades.

Our testing program is principally diagnostic in nature. The purpose is to diagnose difficulties and weaknesses which may occur in the fundamentals. The results are used as a guide to instruction and as a basis for remedial work. In each school a program of remedial work is developed as the needs of the pupils are indicated by the results of the tests. Attention is given to individual as well as to group needs.

During the past year the schools in the supervisory union have engaged in many activities associated with the conduct of the war. The teachers, in addition to their regular duties, have directed salvage drives, promoted the sale of war savings stamps and bonds, participated in various phases of civilian defense, and have conducted rationing registrations. This added responsibility has required many extra hours of study, planning and work. However, it has been accepted by the teachers as a patriotic duty and as an opportunity to serve the people in the communities where they are teaching.

Practically all of the schools took an active part in the salvage drive. War Savings Stamps were on sale in most of the schools. A summary of reports received from all schools showed that over one hundred tons of scrap were collected by the pupils and several thousand dollar's worth of stamps and bonds were purchased.

Teachers and janitors have been especially economical in the use of school supplies. Although we have not as yet been out of stock on any items, it is evident that certain materials now in stock cannot be replaced or at least cannot be purchased within the limits of reasonable economy. As we approach this situation we must expect to restrict our needs to essential materials which we shall undoubtedly be able to purchase in limited quantities.

ENROLLMENT, JANUARY 15, 1943

In accordance with the recommendation of the State Board of Education and the new regulations of the Office of Defense Transportation, the school bus route serving the south end of the town was discontinued. The pupils living in this section are now attending school in Keene. Since Transportation to Keene is provided without expense and full reimbursement is made by the State for the tuition paid, the arrangement is economical and has helped to relieve the over-crowded condition at the village school.

Events of recent date have made us especially mindful of the safety of pupils while in the school building. In all of our schools the need for regular fire and air raid drills has been emphasized. Regardless of the size of building and the number of pupils enrolled, these drills should be conducted at regular intervals during the year. School buildings have been under constant surveillance for fire hazards, availability of exits, and location, supply, and condition of fire fighting equipment. However, not enough attention has been given to the safety of pupils and adults during special programs held either in the school rooms or in other public buildings. In the interest of public safety, I recommend that the same precautions now taken to assure the safety of pupils while in attendance at school be extended to school activities, programs, and entertainments held in the school building or at the town hall.

The shortage of teachers which became increasingly apparent during the summer months has developed into a very serious problem. The schools in the supervisory union opened for the fall term with nineteen new teachers. This represents a forty-one percent turnover. Fortunately, all vacancies were filled by qualified permanent teachers when school began in September. The situation is further complicated in rural areas by the rationing of gasoline and tires and the difficulty of locating desirable boarding places. Because of the very limited supply, the situation next year will be even more serious. Although we cannot hope to compete with the financial inducements offered by defense industries and larger districts, we are fortunate that teachers as a group are professionally minded and prefer teaching to other work. Also many teachers prefer to work in smaller towns if conditions can be made at all suitable. However, there is a limit to the sacrifice which they can be expected to make in view of the opportunities offered elsewhere.

HEALTH

A great deal is said these days about the importance of health education. The nation was shocked to find so many people below ordinary health standards when men were called into service. Wartime is no time to neglect health, in fact the war is proving a powerful stimulus to the improvement of health.

A health program depends upon many things: Good health habits, such as adequate and proper diet, sufficient rest, and understanding the laws of hygiene; proper medical care, with regular physical examinations and periodic dental checkups; the correction of physical defects; the provision of suitable housing. All of these are the responsibility of every individual and every agency in the community. The contribution of the school in this field may be almost unlimited.

It is the right of every child to be helped to learn the fundamental rules of health. Our schools should place more emphasis on good health habits, a study of nutrition for all pupils, physical education, and the importance of regular physical examination with remedial follow up.

Prophylactic tooth brushes were provided at 10 cents each to the pupils. Cod Liver Oil was provided, and served in the schools to all.

It is doubtful if a dentist can be found to do clinic work at the schools this year. Parents should know this, in order that they may arrange to have as many as possible of their children's teeth cared for at the dentists' offices. If called upon, the school nurse would be pleased to assist in arranging appointments.

BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

At the North End school the side walls and ceiling were painted. New shades were purchased and fitted. An electric wall plug was installed. A new wire fence was built on the three sides of the school lot bordering the pasture land.

At the Village school the ceiling was whitened and an electric wall plug was installed. The sink drain was repaired and new drainage basin provided. New shades were provided for all of the windows.
