TOWN WARRANT**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. \$7,600.00

2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and plowing snow for the ensuing year. \$6,000.00. Approved.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and building bridges. \$500.00. Approved.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. \$10.00. Approved.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library. Total \$250.00. Approved.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of road equipment, the sum of \$300.00. Approved.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for support of the Tamworth Community Nurse. Approved.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Tarvia. Approved.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Tamworth Fire Precinct. \$500.00. Approved.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Wonalancet Fire Precinct. \$75.00. Approved.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$727.04. Not approved.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,094.00 to be laid out on the Cleveland road, provided the State shall appropriate the sum of \$2,094.00 for the same purpose. Approved.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$139.00 to the Lake Region Association of New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising of the town, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages in cooperation with other towns in the Lake Region. Approved.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for promotion of winter business. \$500.00. Approved.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for white pine blister rust control to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation department. Approved.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for shovels, fire raker etc., provided the State match it by an equal amount for Forest fires. Approved.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a police officer at South Tamworth, and Chocorua, Sundays and holidays for July, August and September. \$150.00. Approved.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 for the Farm Bureau. Approved.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for a sidewalk from Tamworth High School to the Village Bridge. Approved.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Durrell road, so called, over Hackett Hill. Approved.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

24. To choose a Selectman for three years, to choose a Selectman for one year. Town clerk, Tax collector, Treasurer, Highway agents, Auditors, and all other officers and agents for the ensuing year.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FINANCE COMMITTEE'S REPORT

Your committee once more finds the Town finances in excellent condition with a substantial balance of about \$3000.00, a part of which may be applied to this year's expenditures. This should permit the Town to face the coming year with a tax rate not exceeding \$3.00, despite a small increase, in appropriations contemplative, as recommended by your committee.

The Town poor was an extraordinary large bill this past year because of several medical cases, these have been eliminated, and since the close of the fiscal year the selectmen have made a very advantageous deal with the Hatch-Staples heirs whereby the Town purchased that property for a sum that will allow the Town to recover a large amount of the money expended on that case.

It may appear strange that your committee should recommend article 14 where the State gives only one dollar for each dollar the Town contributes in preference to article 13 where the State gives four dollars to each one of the Town's, there are several reasons. One that money raised under article 13 must be used in resurfacing roads with gravel, this has been done for the past six years and your committee believes that they are pretty well covered, furthermore it feels that this kind of work is of temporary nature and our real solution is in permanent construction. Again in the Stevenson Hill section there is a large group of summer residents who contribute heavily in taxes to our roads, schools and other activities, these people live here approximately three months each year and about the only benefit they can receive for the money they pay the Town is a good road. This they haven't had, through no fault or neglect by the Town. It is simply that the traffic on this road is too great a burden for this kind of road, and your committee thinks that the Town is in position

to, and in justice to these people, should continue with permanent construction this year.

TAMWORTH COMMUNITY NURSE ASSOCIATION

The work of the Tamworth Community Nurse Association Inc., has been very well carried out this year by Mrs. Blanche Spaulding R. N., who came to us Jan. 1st, 1938.

In April eight children were taken to a clinic held in the new clinic building in Laconia, Dr. Hernandez in charge. All of the children obtained glasses, the Rotary Club paying for two pair. In May one child received glasses at Laconia clinic, and three children were taken to Laconia hospital for tonsil and adenoid operations.

In October a pre school clinic was held in the High School building, eleven children being immunized for diphtheria and twenty-nine receiving physical examinations. One child was taken to Laconia hospital for tonsil and adenoid operation. In November three children were taken to the T. B. clinic in Laconia.

The following statistical report is for the nine months of 1938.

The Health Supervision and physical examinations of the school children has been carried on as usual throughout the school term.

During May a Vision Clinic was held with very good results and in May and December, a Nose and Throat Clinic proved successful taking care of several children badly in need of the removal of tonsils and adenoids. In October a diphtheria immunization clinic was held with eleven (11) children receiving Toxoid and twenty-nine (29) children receiving physical examinations.

The Dental clinic began in December at the office

of Dr. Remick and by Dr. Reynolds. Fifty-five (55) children attending and receiving one hundred and seventy-six (176) operations. Total children receiving clinic care during the year, one hundred and eighteen (118).

I wish to thank the Superintendent, School Board, Teachers, Parents, Woman's Club and Rotary Club for their cooperation. Also the Laconia Hospital, Dr. Hernandez, Dr. Reynolds and Dr. Remick for their kindness in making our clinics possible, and all others who have assisted in any way.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I herewith submit my sixteenth annual report as superintendent of schools, it being the twenty-sixth in the series of such reports.

I see boys and girls come to our schools, pass through the grades, graduate (or drop out) and go into higher schools or to work: **and then!!** Well, what then? Have the needs all been met as far as possible? Is the life well balanced? Is there proper preparation for economic and social life? Is he a good citizen? Can he meet the new problems of the day?

Someone has said, "The fact that some pupils move through our usual school classes, year after year, with personality characteristics apparently unchanged, is probably to be interpreted to mean that the usual school routine has not touched the deeper levels of their life at all. The school which sets out to know the whole life of its students, and to help them at their points of greatest need, will find an extraordinary opportunity to be of aid in improving relationships with other people." Our schools are doing some fine work along these lines, but they cannot do it all.

Leadership is needed and we have some fine examples and splendid efforts. "Leadership depends on the ability of the leader to live with, enjoy and direct the life of vigorous youth; together with an idealism and an understanding which guides young people to a worthwhile, efficient maturity and adult life."

Unquestionably the first and most important influence in the child's life is the **home—his home—**and other homes, which make up much of his social environment in rural areas. According to a recent survey only 3% of the single youth now living at home expressed a preference for living away from home. Only a few said they did not want families and homes

of their own. It would seem, then, that the home will remain as an institution—the fundamental social unit.

The work of the Tamworth schools is progressing well this year, and the attendance is good.

The health work is under the care of the nurse, Mrs. Blanche Spaulding, and the school physician, Dr. Edwin C. Remick. Mrs. Spaulding's report is attached.

The property is in good repair. A new heating system is much needed at Bemis School. I recommend also the installation of septic toilets at Chocorua School. More work should be done in enlarging and grading school yards and setting out shrubbery.

The high school work is progressing well under the leadership of Headmaster Louis L. Ramsay. In addition to the regular class work, special activities add interest and value to the high school course. Athletics, orchestra, prize-speaking, plays, educational trips and club activities give an urge to school spirit.

Last June a class of ten was graduated from the high school. It is a matter of pride to the town that a high school can do so much for its young people. The enrollment is the largest in its history. Nearly every pupil who graduates from the eighth grade enters high school. I appreciate the efforts of the high school teachers in helping the freshmen get well started.

The following graduates of the high school are taking post-secondary courses:

Margaret Welch is in the Nurses' Training School in St. Johnsbury.

Louise Hidden is in Keene Normal School.

Frances Hidden is attending Business College in Portland.

Barbara Mason is in training in the Bellevue Hospital in New York.

Ruth Vittum and Joseph Weiss of last June's graduating class are in Plymouth Normal School.

Ethel Young is in Concord Business College.

Teresa Mason entered the University of New Hampshire last fall.
