WARRANT FOR THE TOWN MEETING

The Polls will be open from 1:00 P. M. to 7:00 P. M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the Sixth day of March, next at 8:00 of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - a. Town Officers' Salaries
 - b. Town Officers' Expenses and Town Reports
 - c. Election & Registration
 - d. General Expense
 - e. Expenses Town Hall & Other Town Buildings
 - f. Rent of Grange Hall
 - g. Police Department
 - h. Fire Department
 - i. Insurance
 - j. Planning and Zoning
 - k. Damages and Legal Expenses
 - 1. Civil Defense
 - m. Town Dump
 - n. Interest.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for maintenance of highways and bridges.
 - a. Summer Maintenance
 - b. Winter Maintenance
 - c. Street Lighting
 - d. General Expense of Highway Department
- 4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$734.26 for Class V road construction.
- 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Public Welfare.

a. Town Poor Old Age Assistance

- 6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the Town Library.
- 7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Patriotic purposes.
 a. Old Home Day
 b. Memorial Day
- 8. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$68.00 toward the operating deficit of the Concord Hospital this being based on the number of patients admitted from Webster.
- 10. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the Town, by issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$100,000.00 in anticipation of taxes for the year 1973, said notes payable from said taxes within one year of issuance, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote \$300.00 for the maintenance of the playground and skating area.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,000.00 for the purchase of a new fire truck; \$4,000.00 to be raised by taxes in 1973 and the balance to be paid from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for the years 1972 and 1973, including accrued interest therein.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Tax Commission of the State of New Hampshire to re-value all the taxable property of the Town. (By petition)
- 14. TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO APPOINT committee to establish a sanitary land fill site and to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for expenses.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to designate Bashan and Gerrish roads from Dingit Corner to Deer Meadow Road and Blackwater Road as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17 & 18, for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of the Town of Webster. (By petition)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to aid in the support of the kindergarten classes being held at the Grange Hall. (By petition)

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to change the name of Webster Community Park to the William R. Pearson Memorial Park, in honor of "Bill" Pearson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Pearson, II of Webster.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the establishment of a five member Parks and Recreation Commission whose members are to be appointed by the Selectmen for three years. First appointments to be less than three years to establish sequence of appointments.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to establish the term of road agent for a period of three years. First vote would be Town Meeting 1974.
- 20. To see if the Town will authorize a Town Tax Map Committee and appropriate \$500.00 for expenses.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Commission as set forth in RSA-A; said commission to consist of five (5) members.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO MINIMUM LOT SIZE FOR RESIDENTIAL, MOBILE HOME, COMMERCIAL, INDUSTRIAL AND BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENTS

I. LOT SIZE

A. DWELLING, SINGLE FAMILY

The minimum lot size for a detached residential dwelling unit other than a mobile home designed for and occupied by one family only hereinafter erected, installed or located in the Town of Webster shall be a minimum of 43,560 sq. feet. (1 Acre); provided however that in the case of lots abutting on the Blackwater River or on any natural or artificial lake or pond having an area of ten or more acres, such minimum lot size shall be 30,000 sq. feet; subject also to the following:

- (a) Such lot shall have not less than 150 feet frontage on a public highway or private way which serves it;
- (b) Provided however that paragraph (a) shall not apply to a waterfront lot, as above described, but every such waterfront lot shall have not less than 100 feet frontage on the water;
- (c) Buildings hereafter erected on any lot shall meet the following setback requirements.

1. Minimum setback from highway -30 feet

2. Minimum setback from sidelines – 20 feet

3. Minimum setback from waterfront -30 feet

- (d) No conforming lot now in use or hereafter established for residential use shall thereafter be so reduced in size as to make it non-conforming hereunder.
- (e) This ordinance shall not apply to non-conforming lots with residences or dwellings already situated on them, nor to vacant non-conforming lots conveyed by deeds recorded, on or before the effective date of this ordinance.
- (f) There shall be adequate width and area on every lot after the erection of a residence, to permit the parking within the lot of at least two cars for each family dwelling.

B. DWELLING, MULTI-FAMILY

The minimum lot size for a residential building designed for or occupied by two or more families with the number of families in residence not exceeding the number of dwelling units provided, hereafter erected, installed or located in the Town of Webster shall be as follows:

(a) Dwelling to house 2 or 3 families - minimum lot size - 3 acres.

- (b) Dwelling to house 4 families minimum lot size 4 acres.
- (c) Minimum lot size for a dwelling to house more than 4 families shall be subject to approval by Board of Selectmen and Planning Board after such time as building and sanitary disposal plans have been submitted for review.

Subject also to the following:

- (a) Such lot shall have not less than 200 feet frontage on a public highway or private way which serves it.
- (b) No conforming lot now in use or hereafter established for multi-family dwelling shall thereafter be reduced in size as to make it non-conforming hereunder.

(c) Multi-family dwellings erected on any lot shall meet the following minimum setback requirements:

1. Minimum setback from highway, sidelines or waterfront -50 feet.

- (d) There shall be adequate width and area on every lot after the erection of a residence, to permit the parking within the lot of at least two cars for each family dwelling.
- (e) This ordinance shall not apply to non-conforming lots with multi-family dwellings already situated on them.

C. MOBILE HOME

The minimum lot size for a detached unit designed for residential occupancy and capable of being transported after fabrication on streets or highways on its own wheels or on flatbed or other trailers, and arriving at the site ready for occupancy except for minor and incidental unpacking and assembly operations and being placed on jacks or other temporary or permanent foundation and connected to utilities hereafter installed or located in the Town of Webster for use as a residence or dwelling shall be 43,560 sq. feet (1 acre) provided however that, in the case of lots abutting on the Blackwater River or on any natural or artificial lake or pond having an area of ten or more acres, such minimum lot size shall be 30,000 square feet; subject also to the following:

- (a) Such lot shall have not less than 150 feet frontage on a public highway or private way which serves it;
- (b) Provided however that paragraph (a) shall not apply to a waterfront lot, as above described, but every waterfront lot shall have not less than 100 feet frontage on the water;
- (c) Mobile homes hereafter installed on any lot shall meet the following setback requirements:
- 1. Minimum setback from highway -30 feet
- 2. Minimum setback from sidelines -20 feet
- 3. Minimum setback from waterfront -30 feet
- (d) No conforming lot now in use or hereafter established for residential use shall thereafter be so reduced in size as to make it non-conforming hereunder;
- (e) There shall be adequate width and area on every lot after the erection of a residence, to permit the parking within the lot of at least two cars for each family dwelling.
- (f) This ordinance shall not apply to non-conforming lots with a mobile home used for a residence or dwelling already situated on them, nor to vacant non-conforming lots conveyed by deeds recorded, on or before the effective date of this ordinance.

D. COMMERCIAL, INDUSTRIAL AND BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENTS

Minimum lot size, for commercial, industrial and business establishments, hereinafter established, shall be subject to approval by Board of Selectmen and Planning Board after such time as building and sanitary disposal plans have been submitted for review.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This year's warrant contains an article for a new fire truck costing \$24,000.00. The Selectmen have been reluctant to place this large purchase before the voters in previous years, because of the property tax rate increase that would result. We feel this is the year to make the purchase as full payment can be made without increasing the present tax rate.

With the acceptance of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for 1972 and 1973, we will have over \$20,000.00 in cash toward payment of this equipment, which would be delivered in December of 1973.

The present equipment was donated to the Town in 1945. It has certainly given the Town its money's worth! We have reproduced a copy of the original donation letter so that it will become part of the permanent records of the Town of Webster.

We have waited for several years to have someone donate replacement equipment but to no avail, until now. The return of our own money in the form of Federal Revenue Sharing is the closest we could come to a gift.

Your acceptance of this article at Town Meeting is urgently requested.

I would expect the Town of Webster to form a Fire Company with enough suitable men and someone would have to be chosen to be in charge of the company. I myself shall be very happy to render my services to form such a company and also to teach the men how to man the pumper and care for the equipment. This pumper is very simple to operate and can be done with one man providing there is not too much line of hose to be carried through buildings.

You may transmit this message to the townspeople and I shall be looking forward to their reaction and hearing from them in the near future.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

This has been a year of expenses that could not be helped. We had very few fires but we did run over our appropriation. Our normal expenses were around fourteen hundred dollars but we had other expenses such as eight hundred feet of high pressure hose. The cost of this hose was around twelve hundred dollars. We also had to buy a new pump that was a little over six hundred dollars. Our tank trucks and equipment are getting old, so our up keep is more each year. It is hoped that this year we can replace our oldest tank truck for a more up to date one. Our oldest tank truck is twenty nine years old. It is almost impossible to get parts for it, and is not powerful enough to haul the load it is required to.

I hope we are as fortunate as far as fires are concerned for the coming year as we have been in the past.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

POLICE REPORT

This past year has been an eventful one for the Police Department, starting out with the purchase of a cruiser and the renovation of the cellar under the library to make office space. This came about by monies obtained through the N. H. Highway Safety Agency and the Governor's Commission On Crime and Delinquency on a matching fund basis. Materials were purchased for the office and the labor was contributed by the Department members.

Some of the Department members attended inservice training seminars sponsored by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council at the N. H. Technical Institute in Concord, Combat Pistol Training in Hopkinton and Tear Gas School in Franklin.

Because of the need for training and the Department being part-time, it is not feasible for the members to take two to six weeks at a time to attend various police classes.

I would like to thank the members who took time from their jobs to attend the seminars and to work on the office.

Statistics this last year have shown a decrease in crime in some of the metropolitan areas throughout the country but at the same time an increase in the suburb and rural areas. A 20% increase in serious crime along was shown in New Hampshire last year.

It is my hope that throughout 1973 the Department can continue to take advantage of special training to further up-grade the Department.

TOWN MEETING

March 7, 1972

Meeting called to order at 8:40 P.M., by Moderator Robert Roby, followed with a prayer by Rev. C. Elsie Dame. It was voted to dispense with reading the warrant.

Article 1. The slate of newly-elected town officers was read by the Moderator, as follows: Selectmen for three years, Robert P. Robillard; Town Clerk, Ruth A. Stebbins; Treasurer, William E. Phelps; Tax Collector, Helen E. Scribner; Road Agent, Robert Mock; Auditors, Mabel M. Anderson and Eleanor M. Richardson, all for one year; Library Trustee for three years, Sylvia Hock; Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, Roy E. Roby. Results of the vote on the Planning Board Question was 92 Yes and 93 No, with a recount later, showing 93 Yes and 94 No. (Concerning adoption of the zoning ordinance, as proposed)

Article 2. \$21,800 was raised for Town Charges: Town officers' salaries, \$5500; \$2700 for Town Officers Expenses and Town Reports, with \$500 included to cover the salary of the Selectmen's Clerk; \$1000 for Election & Registration; \$3900 for the Police Department includes \$2000 for a police cruiser, which was voted after a lengthy discussion; the need of insurance to cover this was approved. Other sums voted were \$1600 for Expenses Town Hall and Other Town Buildings (includes Grange Hall rent), \$1800 for Fire Department, \$2000 for Insurance, \$200. For Planning & Zoning, \$500 for Damages & Legal Expenses. \$100 for Civil Defense and \$1500 for the Town Dump, an increase of \$600 from last year's appropriation, to provide a fire ring around the dump.

Article 3. \$15,000 was voted for Summer Maintenance and \$15,000 for Winter Maintenance, also \$200 for Street Lighting and \$1000. for General Expense of Highway Department.

Article 4. \$741.92 was voted for Class V Road Construction.

Article 5. Voted to raise \$500 for Town Poor and \$500 for Old Age Assistance.

Article 6. \$800 raised for Town Library.

Article 7. \$300 voted for Old Home Day. Passed over Memorial Day.

Article 8. \$1500 voted for Care of Cemeteries.

Article 9. Voted in favor of appropriating \$70 toward operating deficit of Concord Hospital.

Article 10. Standing vote . . . 130 to 0 in favor of empowering the Selectmen to borrow for the town by issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$95,000, in anticipation of taxes for the year 1972.

Article 11. Following a discussion, \$300 was raised for maintenance of the playground and skating area.

Article 12. Voted to pass over this article, concerning petitioning the Tax Commission to revalue all the taxable property of the Town. 45 Yes 5 No.

Article 13. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the U.S. Army Reserve for the construction and relocation of the road to the town ball field and to raise \$500 for materials needed to provide drainage, markings and seeding.

Article 14. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to establish the position of Deputy Tax Collector.

Article 15. Passed over this article in regard to the Town retaining lands acquired by tax sale.

Article 16. Voted in favor of approving amendments to the Constitution, as proposed by the 1971 General Court. Yes 135 No 84.

Article 17. Passed over this article to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate the purchase of a sanitary land fill site, etc.

Article 18. Passed over (to authorize the Selectmen to require a building permit for construction of all units designed for commercial, industrial, business and residential occupancy).

Article 19. Passed over (to authorize the Selectmen to require a permit for the installation of a mobile home in the Town of Webster).

Article 20. A request for a dog ordinance, calling for a constant control of dogs was discussed, followed by a vote to pass over the discussion in regard to this. A request for a study of abandoned roads was brought up, also a three year term for Road Agent; the latter to be in the next town warrant.

The meeting adjourned.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

The initial stage of the Pillsbury Lake Municipal Park began early Summer with earth moving operation and the installation of Playground equipment, Baseball field and the Municipal building. Winter activities include skating directly off the playground area. Further work proposed in this program will include improved drainage and additional ground work. The area lights have been installed.

An interim report was presented by Environmental Engineers, Inc. reporting progress on new water sites. Test borings have been completed, and show an excellent location for a ten-point water supply. Primary water analysis by the State of N. H. Water Pollution Board indicates water of good quality. Additional engineering tests and reports are forthcoming.

The well on Deer Meadow Road was serviced and tested with the analysis showing excellent quality.

Mr. James R. Pickering was appointed by the Commissioners as Municipal Superintendent whose responsibilities will be the maintenance and supervision of the Water and Parks Department.

Mr. Charles Schaufus, Bacteriologist, was appointed as advisor to the Commissioners. He will conduct a program of water analysis both from the water system and the Lake.
