NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN

Each year one of the major responsibilities of the Selectmen is the highway program . . . the need to keep passable and in reasonable condition our almost forty miles of roads. Three categories of funds are available for this purpose, namely, TRA, Duncan Fund and town appropriations voted in the budget. Since the inter-relation of these three has been confusing to many people, we felt that further explanation might create a clearer picture.

TRA (Town Road Aid) is money allocated by the state at a set sum for each mile of Class V highways (roads maintained by the town). The receipt of this aid is contingent upon the town contributing about fifteen percent of the amount given by the state. The total amount of state and town funds is then used each year for a project that is recommended by the Town and subject to approval by the state as the best possible use of the money. From that point, state personnel handle the construction work and the funds.

This year the North Wilmot Road was scheduled for completion. The widening, ditching and graveling of the final stretch of Teel Hill was finished in early fall. At this time the state decided they did not want to do the black-topping because of the poor fall weather which they felt would result in a poor surface. We were concerned that the winter layover might necessitate more basic work on the hill but there seemed to be no alternative consistent with our desire to have the best possible road. Since the road will be finished before July, it will have no effect on TRA funds for 1963. State officials, Selectmen and Road Agent will meet this spring to jointly determine the location of our next project.

The Duncan Fund (also called Class V Highway Maintenance) is the state program of assistance for towns with large road mileage but relatively low total town property valuation.

According to more stringent rules laid down by the state recently, this money may be used only for widening, ditching and graveling of roads of specific width, the purchase and installation of culverts and the oiling of roads. Snow removal and bridge construction are excluded. In 1962, the Road Agent decided to spread this money over a group of four small trouble spots on our roads. This decision has proved advantageous and has resulted in reduced routine maintenance and easier removal of snow in these areas. In your town report, the spending of this money is listed under Summer Maintenance or General Highway Expenses depending on the type of expenses incurred.

The amount of money raised by the town for its roads has been fairly adequate and in keeping with everyone's desire to keep expenditures at a minimum. However, it is increasingly evident that the appropriation for General Highway Expenses is lagging behind our needs. The cost of items in this category has been rising each year. We are suggesting an increase of \$1.000 in this year's budget.

The problems involved in summer maintenance of a Town Dump are not new. As the only unsupervised and "open-at-alltimes" dump in this vicinity, we have been playing host to the indiscriminately dumped refuse of transients, residents of surrounding communities and all who did not wish to be bothered by health and sanitation measures. The results of our generous hospitality have been evesore conditions, a poor health and sanitation situation, intermittent fires requiring excessive supervision by the fire company and a rapidly exhausting space potential for the future. So, albeit with regret for possible inconvenience, we last year posted regulations for limited but adequate usage of the dump and installed supervision to enforce them. The results have been gratifying. The dump is more sightly and the fire hazard is greatly reduced. Also, since it is state approved as a result of these changes, any cost of a forest fire arising from a dump fire would not have to be borne by the town alone. It is planned to put the same rules into effect at the end of the snow cover this spring.

Last year the town and school budget, as adopted, amounted to about \$51,000. Of this amount \$5,450 was removed from surplus and we had \$6,330 of revenue from sources other than property taxation. This reduced the amount to be raised by taxation to about \$39,000. This year the proposed town and school budgets comes to a total of \$53,000. However, our surplus fund is smaller this year and should not be lowered by more than \$2.500. We estimate added revenues to be about the same. Thus, the total amount to be raised by taxation this year, if the budgets are adopted as presented, will be approximately \$45,000. This will result in a minimum tax rise of 60c to a maximum of 90c per hundred. The exact amount cannot be predicted because several added revenues such as the school surplus as of this June and the Interest and Dividends tax are not known at this date. However we may deplore this increase, it is difficult to find any areas of the budget which can be reduced and still provide adequate services for the Town of Wilmot.

We have appreciated the fine cooperation we have received, not only from the other town officers, but from each and all of you.

- 10. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Co., Inc.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by the Town through Tax Title.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to hold the Business Meeting of the Town Warrant at 7:30 P.M. in future years.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

WILMOT VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY INC.

This is a financial statement of the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company Inc.

In addition to the town appropriation of \$1,000, the members of the Fire Company during 1962 raised the sum of \$1,210.62 by means of socials, an auction, a supper and donations.

We installed a new hot air furnace at a cost of \$595. A 100 foot length of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose was purchased for \$160. The balance of \$364.75 was paid to the Franklin National Bank on our loan for the GMC truck.

In 1961 we purchased a new portable pump to replace a pump which had been in service since 1943. During the year members of the Fire Company repaired the old pump and returned it to workable order. New rubber suction hose and a strainer were purchased for \$107.65. This gives us a portable pump for each truck.

By vote of the membership the sum of \$200 was set aside to be known as the Truck Fund. They hope to add to this in the future for the purpose of purchasing a new fire truck or use it to repair our present trucks in emergencies.

The members of the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company Inc. wish to thank the Selectmen and the townspeople of Wilmot for their cooperation in assisting us to improve our Fire Company.

PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed, cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and aesthetic values in the 2,200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man-caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- 2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to instill in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 0 fires. We burned 0 acres. Permits issued: 105.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

Throughout this past year your school board has continued its program of re-evaluating the equipment, teaching aids and physical properties of our schools to bring them into conformity with modern educational standards and needs.

In both schools, the lighting and bathroom situation is now excellent. New textbooks in Science and Mathematics are now in use as are new encyclopedias in both schools. The TV educational programs are proving excellent and have been of great help.

In the upper school, removal of the stove and clothes storage from the classroom was made possible by central heating and has improved the health conditions as well as providing more classroom space. We plan to make portable the presently stationary blackboard which will make the space even more flexible. The inside of the school building has been completely repainted, new shades are being added and the insulation of the furnace room completed. Newly installed combination storm and screen windows are providing more draft-free warmth and should give more insect-free cross ventilation in the warmer months.

In the lower school, combination storm and screen windows have been installed. We also have plans for a portable and much-needed blackboard.

Two major problems remain for next year — namely, desks in the upper school and heating and space improvement in the lower school.

In the upper school, all of our desks and chairs are of the same type (wooden and east iron, one piece) which do not adjust sufficiently to always insure proper seating for the varying sizes of children in the upper age group. Quantity-wise, we are presently using three borrowed discards from the Danbury school district and next year our needs will be greater. Many of the desks in use now are beyond economically sound renovation

and should be replaced. It is the feeling of the school board that in the interests of better educational usage we should at this time outfit the upper school with modern desks more compatible with the individual seating needs. New lighter weight desks will also make for easier physical arrangement of our multiple-grade school.

For the lower school, our census indicates we will have 34 children in the first four grades next year. The lower school could and has handled this number but changes should be made. Approximately one-third of the classroom is now unavailable for use because of the presence in the room of the space heater and the large billboard that acts as storage for the children's clothes, boots and lunches. Central heating, located under the back toilet section, would heat the front hall, toilet rooms, floors and main school room. The elimination of the health hazard of drying wet clothes in the classroom, cold floors and drafty toilets and hall is an important consideration for the age group in this school. These factors, together with the need for more heated space, has caused us to recommend the installation of central heating in the 1963 budget.

With the additions of the above, we feel that our schools in most essential respects can be compared favorably and without apology to any in their class.

We also wish to thank our teachers, bus drivers, helpers of all kinds, and the citizens of Wilmot for their cooperation in the interests of better schooling for our children.
