ACWORTH TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Acworth in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to bring in your votes for Town Officers to the Town Hall on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next between the hours of two of the clock in the afternoon until eight of the clock in the evening; and,

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Acworth on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at seven-thirty of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will empower the Selectmen to serve as Pound Keepers, Measurers of Wood, and Fence Viewers.
- 2. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
 - 3. To see if the Town will direct the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to pay to the Crescent Lake Association, Inc. (a non-profit organization), the sum of \$250.00, in order to increase police protection for property within the Crescent Lake area, to which the Crescent Lake Association, Inc., will match, dollar for dollar, to hire the services of Mr. Edward Bruno for year-round protection of cottages and road patrol.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) for improvements to the Acworth Silsby Free Library building and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500.) for a truck and for a trailer and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000.) for a Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate three thousand dollars (\$3,000.) for early debt retirement of the South Acworth Bridge debt and authorize withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

- 9. To see if the Town will accept the Budget as submitted and recommend by the Budget Committee.
- 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, by means of public competitive bids, selected standing timber on Town Forest Land, in such amounts to benefit the remaining forest, and to use all revenues obtained from this Article to accelerate repayment of principal of long-term debt.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Champney Lot located on the west side of Keyes Hollow Road, East Acworth.
- 12. To see if the Town will accept two hundred dollars (\$200.) in trust, for the perpetual care of the Everett Knight cemetery lot (Section 1, Lot 3, new part of the Acworth Cemetery).
 - 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this Meeting.

ARTICLE 1: Voted to empower the Selectmen to serve as Pound Keepers, Measurers of Wood, and Fence Viewers.

ARTICLE 2: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 3: Voted to direct the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent.

ARTICLE 4: Voted to pay the Crescent Lake Association, Inc. (a non-profit organization), the sum of \$250.00 in order to increase police protection for property within the Crescent Lake Area, to which the Crescent Lake Associatin, Inc. will match dollar for dollar, to hire the services of Mr. Edward Bruno for year-round protection of cottages and road patrol.

ARTICLE 5: Voted to appropriate a total capital outlay sum of \$8,000.00 for reconstruction and repairs to the Acworth Silsby Free Library building, to be commenced during 1978.

ARTICLE 6: Voted to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$13,500.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund for use as set offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith:

ARTICLE 7: Voted to accept the Budget as amended and recommended by the Budget Committee. The Budget now reads \$147,838.00 after passing Article 4 police protection for Crescent Lake Area for \$250.00 a year.

ARTICLE 8: Voted to establish a Recreation Committee per R.S.A. 31:47 to consist of Five (5) persons whose duties it shall be to select and obtain the use of suitable areas for non-commercial recreational purposes. This committee to be appointed in 1978.

ARTICLE 9: Voted to empower the Planning Board pursuant to R.S.A. 36:19-a to review, and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses whether or not such development includes a subdivision or resubdivision of the site.

ARTICLE 10: Voted to consider supporting a County solid waste facility, if such a facility is found feasible to construct and operate. (See letters on pages 56-57).

ARTICLE 11: Voted to consider joining a neighboring town in a solid waste transfer station operation, if this operation should prove more economical than individual town operated stations. (See letters on pages 56-57).

ARTICLE 12: Voted to take a consensus vote of the qualified voters as to whether the Historical Society should further proceed with a HISTORY OF ACWORTH, as outlined in the Society's Report. (See pages 54-55). By Society Request.

ARTICLE 14: Voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, by means of public competitive bids, selected standing timber on Town Forest Land, in such amounts to benefit the remaining forest, and to use all revenue obtained from this article to accelerate repayment of principal of long-term debt.

ARTICLE 15: Voted not to change the classification of Grout Hill Road from A. Supplee's property included, to and including R. Wilson's property Lot II from Class VI to Class V. By Petition.

ARTICLE 16: Voted not to empower and direct the Selectmen to Lay Out a Class V Highway, upon receipt of a petition to do so, from Ingoldsby's dwelling north to the Max Boy dwelling. By Petition.

ARTICLE 17: Voted not to authorize the Selectmen to Lay Out a Class V Highway of that portion of Road #92 (North End) from Acworth Town to Derry Hill which presently is Class VI. By Petition.

ARTICLE 18: Voted not to authorize the Selectmen to Lay Out a Class V Highway that section of the Old Stage Road (#102) from the Storms/Brown driveway westerly to the Colburn dwelling (formerly Hunt) westerly boundary presently classified as Class VI Highway. By Petition.

ARTICLE 19: Voted not to return to the unofficial ballot system for the election of Town Officers. (See Minutes of Article 4 of March 8, 1977 Town Meeting).

The Business Portion of the Meeting recessed at 12:20 and after the counting of ballots the Meeting was fully adjourned at 2:20 A.M.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

REPORT OF ACTIVITIES FOR 1978

The structural repairs of the Library were completed late in the year. These repairs, along with the improvements to the School, the refurbishing of the Church and the enlargement of the Town House have enhanced the beauty of the Commons and increased the functional use of the buildings. Use of the Town House has increased substantially because of the improved meeting quarters for both large and small groups.

The major rebuilding of the Acworth-Charlestown Road has been started. As monies are available, increments of this road will be rebuilt each year. The major repair of the Grout Hill Bridge is the fourth bridge crossing the Cold River to have been completed in as many years.

Tax Map work continues to progress to completion. A total of four public presentations were made, each covering a different section of the Town. These presentations were very informative and brought out some ownership questions, practically all of which have been resolved. We can now be sure that all Acworth land has been recorded on the tax roll.

One of the Selectmen's more frustrating problems is the control of dogs. Dog damage to farm animals amounted to \$677 in 1978, plus \$45 veterinarian fees. During the latter part of the year a concerted effort was made to gain control over this problem. As a result, dogs registered and licenses issued increased by over 60%. Identification of roving dogs will be easier and unlicenses dogs can be handled properly, reducing the possibility of nuisance and damage.

Even with the progress that has been made, there are still problems that need attention. The annual review of real estate assessments with the necessary on-site appraisal of all new construction, plus the tabulation and computational work required to establish the tax rate, continues to be a major problem for your Selectmen. The time required increases each year because of the increasing activities of subdividing, building and transfering of ownership. The 1978 tax roll includes 585 property owners, covering some 900 parcels of land and 370 buildings spread over 37 square miles of the Town. More than 50 transfers of title were processed.

The new Tax Map and indexing system will ease the problem of keeping ownership records current. Methods to reduce the bookkeeping and computational load are being investigated. Hopefully, these improvements will reduce the task to a more reasonable level. However, the option of a separate Board of Assessors should receive serious consideration.

In the immediate future of 1979-1981, the problems of solid waste disposal will have to be dealt with. Our present method of disposal does not have the desired environmental standards. There is no easy low-cost way to meet Federal and State standards. At this time, a cooperative effort with the County and/or neighboring towns is being studied. Your Selectmen are cooperating in this study as authorized by you in the 1978 Town Meeting. Results of this study will be publicized via local news media.

The Selectmen want to thank Mrs. Christine Barnard for the many years of competent and dedicated service of supervising the summer maintenance of the Town Commons. Mrs. Barnard has been performing her special service for approximately two decades. We are most appreciative of her faithful services which will be sorely missed in the future.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The Board of Adjustment held 6 public hearings in the year ending December 31, 1978. 7 requests for variances were granted; 1 request for variance was denied.

Our activity this year was considerably greater than in previous years, and from all indications will continue at the same or at an increased rate. As with previous years, a number of requests which might have required action by this Board were able to be resolved at the Planning Board by adjustment on the part of the applicant to permit the request to be brought in line with the zoning regulations. This in great measure lightens our load, and provides for a speedy and equitable resolution of differences.

The Board has at present 2 rulings which have required legal action, and these have been referred to the Selectmen and Town Counsel for appropriate action. Resolution of these by the lawyers and/or courts is pending at this time.

In light of the increased activity of the Board, which entails expenditures for public notice of meetings and correspondence, it would seem prudent to institute a fee system to defray the costs associated with our work. We have so recommended to the Selectmen.

The Board of Adjustment meets at the Town Hall on the first Thursday of each month, at 7:30 P.M. Those wishing to meet with the Board should contact a member of the Board prior to the meeting they will attend. Applicants for variance should bear in mind that 30 days is the minimum time required for processing a variance.

We wish to thank the Planning Board and the Selectmen for their cooperation and assistance during this past year.

REPORT OF TOWN COUNCIL

The year 1978 required relatively little legal activity on behalf of the Town of Acworth. There were three matters of active litigation, as follows:

- 1. The Davis and Symonds Company decision and agreements from 1975 involving Pierce Brook Estates was brought back before the Court on behalf of some of the residents of that area in an attempt to get the Company to complete some of the road work that it had been ordered to do. Additional work was done on the roads as a result of several court hearings during the year. Further court hearings may be necessary, but hopefully more work will be done on the roads during 1979.
- 2. Court action was initiated against a local family in March of 1978 for construction of an addition to their dwelling without a Building Permit nor a variance from the Zoning Board of Adjustment in order to satisfy set back requirements from the highway. This case is scheduled for trial in March 1979, and the Town will try to recover its legal fees in the enforcement proceedings.
- 3. Also continued for Court action in March 1979 is an appeal from a denial by the Acworth Zoning Board of Adjustment of a variance to construct a cottage on a substandard lot on the north shore of Crescent Lake.

There are no other cases initiated or pending for or against the Town as of February 14, 1979.

REPORT OF THE ACWORTH PLANNING BOARD — 1978

The seven member Planning Board continues to hold regular meetings on the last Tuesday of each month for pre-scheduled subdivision hearings and to accept new subdivision applications. Other meetings during the year were held by appointment to handle additional subdivision material and discuss proposals submitted by applicants, in addition to working on the Master Plan and Site Plan Review Regulations.

The following is a summary of subdivision activity for 1978. The Board heard twenty-three applications; twelve were processed to an approved completion; nine are pending or in progress; and two were determined not to constitute a subdivision. The twelve applications processed to completion created thirteen new parcels of land. These average in size from five to twenty acres.

At the end of May, the Board held a hearing at the eastern end of the Charlestown Road per requirements of R.S.A. 253:18, "Scenic Roads." Ten people attended and viewed the Town reconstruction site. There were no objections to the proposed plans and approval was granted.

Also during late May and continuing into July, the Board developed a set of Site Plan Review regulations for non-residential use. These have been written and adopted per R.S.A. 36:19-a. Sample forms in use by other New Hampshire towns were used for guidance along with technical and printing assistance from Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.

The Master Plan has been completed with minor revisions and updating to reflect any significant changes in current land use and Town attitudes. Plans indicate that printing and binding will be completed during early 1979.

The Acworth Conservation Commission developed a plan to have one of its members present at all the monthly Planning Board meetings and report to its own members the current activities of the Planning Board. This has been done on a rotation basis, giving all members an opportunity to participate. The Planning Board has benefited from this attendance and it is hoped that the practice will continue.

The Planning Board welcomes that public to attend any of its meetings and would also welcome the presentation of questions and opinions in order that the Board may better represent the whole Town.

Our past Chairman, Robert Yale who had held that position since the creation of the Commission chose not to accept re-appointment this year. We regret his absence and wish to publically extend our thanks to him for his past efforts on behalf of the Commission. Several new members have been appointed and Kristian Fenderson was elected Chairman.

For the first time this year Commission members have been regularly attending Planning Board meetings on a rotating basis. The Commission felt that it would be advantageous to both the Planning Board and potential subdividers if potential matters of land and water conservation could be brought to our mutual attention during early stages of proposals. We have had excellent relations with the Planning Board regarding this new policy and wish to thank them for their co-operation.

On November 9, The Commission showed the film "Farming and the Land" which dealt with the alarming loss of farmland in southern New Hampshire. We were fortunate in having Gordon Gowen, Farm Bureau Policy Board member with us to discuss some of the economic factors contributing to this problem. In addition to Mr. Gowen, Bruce Clement, Cheshire County Co-operative Extention Agent, and Carol Rees of N.H. Organic Farmers Association presented their perspectives on the problem.

In addition, when possible, Commission members have attended area meetings relating to conservation matters.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE TOWN OF ACWORTH

Nine and a half percent of the population of Acworth, or 45 different people, received VNA services in 1978. Services included skilled nursing care, occupational therapy, nurse evaluation and health promotion visits, and clinic. A number of health screening programs (including cancer, diabetes and blood pressure) were offered, and flu vaccinations were provided free of charge.

Sixty percent of the services provided by the VNA are paid for by Medicare, Medicaid or other insurances. However, because the VNA provides care regardless of an individual capacity to pay, 40% needs special funding. A part of this additional funding is realized through fund drive receipts, private contributions and memorial gifts. The balance must come from community tax support. Without tax support fully 35% of the VNA's services would be sacrificed.

It is necessary for the VNA to request a substantial increase in tax support in 1979. As the cost of living rises fewer people can afford the cost of health care, so VNA income is correspondingly reduced. VNA expenses, unfortunately, increase along with everyone else's. It was hoped in 1978 that the Agency could realize more funding through special appeals. But, again, the inflation crunch reduced anticipated total contributions.

Without additional local tax support, those with the greatest need would have to be denied services. Especially hard hit would be the elderly, the terminally ill able to be cared for at home because of VNA help, and young mothers who need special guidance in parenting and good health practices.

In the long run a few more tax dollars for the VNA can save the community many dollars that would otherwise have to be spent on hospitals, nursing homes and other special services.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT — 1978

Although our school is the most remote of any in the district, the district goal is that all attendance areas have the same quality of education. I am confident that this goal is realized in Acworth.

Our district is mandated by law 94-142 to offer a program for the handicapped from ages 3 - 21. We are doing it, but it requires a lot of transportation from Acworth to the learning disability centers. District-wide it requires personnel of 25 to offer this program and still some are sent outside of the district. I bring this up only to show that this is a service of the district (of which there are many) of which we are recipients by being a member of the district.

The enrollment in the school has gone down steadily which makes the per pupil cost rise. Presently the cost per pupil is around \$600 more to offer the benefits of a small rural school. According is growing and so will the school. We can probably double our enrollment and handle it within our existing building.

We have continued to improve the playground this year by bringing in fill, grading and seeding, enlarging the asphalt play area, and installing a new backstop and rail fence.

New carpeting was installed in the lower grades' room and painting was done. In the upper grades' room window shades were replaced. All windows have been equipped with storm sash. Also, the installation of a fire alarm system and emergency lighting was completed.

We are most fortunate to have the same teachers who continue to give our children a very high quality of education.

Many interested citizens assist throughout the year with special services for the children. If I were to single out projects or names I would be sure to leave some one out. They are greatly appreciated by teachers and pupils as well as myself.

The Parents' Club is very supportive in its fund-raising projects and extra curricula activities which they provide for the children.

Accountability is a word that will be heard frequently in our district, state, and nation. The State Board of Education has mandated that each school district have in effect by 1981 a comprehensive planning program, which will lead to reliable reporting of student performance to the community and the state. Dr. Wescott, Superintendent of Schools, will cover what has been done and what will be done to comply with this mandate in his report to the district.

I have served as the Vice Chairman of the district board and as delegate to the State School Board's Association. This has afforded me the opportunity to attend many state conferences as well as regional meetings. All our meetings are in the Fall Mountain Regional High School library and open to the public. We encourage people to come and participate.

I feel that we have experienced another year of dynamic leadership under Dr. Westcott, and we can look forward to continued progress.

This completes three years on the board. I have found it a learning and rewarding experience as I have endeavored to give Acworth good representation.

ACWORTH SILSBY LIBRARY REPORT 1978

The repairs to the Library have been completed and the building is in excellent condition. All requirements for insurance regulations have been met. Storm windows have been installed throughout. This work was covered by funds from Revenue Sharing.

In the 1979 budget, money is requested for installation of a Waterless Toilet. The present facility in the basement does not meet sanitary codes and should be relaced.

The school and Library continue to work cooperatively for the best interest of the children. Older children visit the Library on Tuesday afternoon and the younger ones on Thursday. At that time they have a story read by Mrs. Christine Grant or Mrs. Deborah Hinman. Various exhibits were held throughout the year; Christmas books, 4-H prize awards, books on insects. Anyone who entered the children's room met "Sherman", a papier mache dinosaur, exhibit by the youngsters in Mrs. MacDonald's class. In conjunction with this the Library showed books on prehistoric animals.

Once again community organizations contributed to the book fund; Community Aid, Female Charitable Society, Woman's Club. Various individuals also donated. Due to the inflated cost of books these gifts are sincerely appreciated.

Mrs. Newton attended three District Advisory Council meetings and two book buying exhibits. In October Mrs. Maurice Miller was a delegate to the New Hampshire Conference on Library and Information Service. For reasons of economy the Bookmobile service may be curtailed by the State. This was a point of discussion at the Conference. Accord residents have been urged to write letters to the State Library to protest this action. An article appeared in the January 1979 issue of "New Hampshire Profiles" in which our Library received favorable publicity. One For The Books by Tom Richmond quotes Mrs. Newton on the necessity for continuing Bookmobile service.

Salaries must be increased to conform to the Federal Minimum Wage Law and the budget so indicates. To continue as a member of the State Development Plan the Library must be open a minimum of eleven hours per week. This is based upon population increase. Acworth is nineth in the State in per capita circulation in the population category of 2000 or less. This further justifies the extra hours weekly. The budget is presented upon an eleven hour week.
