WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Amherst in the
County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified
to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Amherst, on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all the necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to allow the usual discount on taxes: 3 per cent. to July 1st, and 2 per cent. to August 1st.
4. To see if the town will vote to give the Town Treasurer authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the town will vote to buy forest fire equipment and raise and appropriate money for the same.
6. To see if the town will vote to install an electric light on the Catholic Cemetery road, near the Milford town line, raise and appropriate money for same.
7. To see if the town will vote to repair the road from Route 101A at So. Merrimack to the Hollis town line, about 1000 ft., and raise and appropriate money for the same.
8. To see what action the town will take in regard to acquiring more land for Cemetery purposes and to raise and appropriate money therefor.
9. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax collector's deeds.
10. To see if the town will vote to elect the Overseer of the Poor instead of holding office by appointment.
11. To see if the town will vote to install an electric light at end of Souhegan St., and raise and appropriate money for the same. By petition.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$959.11, State to give \$3836.42 for classified road improvement.

13. To see if the town will vote to receive State Aid; the State to pay \$1846.00, the town to pay \$1846.00. Must be expended on the Mont Vernon road. The State will not co-operate on both Article 12-13.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to building an addition on the fire-house for the housing of the Lawrence and Yankee fire engines and raise and appropriate money for the same. Land to be given to the town by the Taylor heirs without any cost to town.

15. To see if the town will vote to install one more electric light at Baboosic Lake, raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see what action the town will take on installing a heating plant in the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to fix up Trombly pond for fire protection.

18. To see if the Town Meeting will appoint a committee to study the subject of a Town Forest and report at the next annual meeting.

19. To see if the town will vote to buy a dump truck, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

SEXTON'S REPORT

1938 was full of improvements and disasters in our cemeteries. The hurricane demolished about thirty of our shade trees leaving refuse and stump, broken fences and stones. 1939 means a larger lay-out of money to clean up, repair, etc. to make them even partly as neat as before. The stumps are our biggest problem to master; some can be buried but most of them will have to be gotten out and carted away.

But we have the satisfaction of having a few good improvements this last year. Six of the lots at the entrance were made over and seeded, getting away from those upkept lots that make the whole cemetery look bad. Also we have a small monument at the town poor farm cemetery denoting burials are there. It was the intention of the Sexton to add a small bronze tablet to it this year, but looks now as if it would have to be added some other time. The marker will probably be painted this year making it set out a little more prominently and preserving the cement of which it is made.

The old stone posts on the lower west side of Meadow View were taken down and the fence removed and the land plowed and seeded with white clover and grass making a place for a few lots if necessary.

It is the intention of the Sexton to start a few improvements at Cricket Corner Cemetery this year; although the fence has got to be repaired, very little more probably can be done.

The most important thing that confronts us this year is burying ground. The Committee appointed by the Moderator last year made an effort to get substantial information and signature by which the town can discuss and vote on this town meeting.

For the benefit of those not knowing the condition: there is a restriction barring any burial within twenty rods from the home of Martha L. Hubley, for which a ransom of \$250 can be paid by the town to said Mrs. Hubley to remove this restriction and the town can use this town property for burial purposes.

FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT AMHERST TOWN LIBRARY

Herewith is submitted the fifty-ninth annual report of the trustees of the Amherst Town Library for the year beginning February 1, 1938 and ending January 31, 1939, with the library board consisting of Miss Bertha L. Piper and Mr. George Howard re-elected for a three-year term, Mrs. Harold Perry and Mrs. Robert Telfer (the latter elected to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. J. A. Crawford's resignation) whose terms are to expire in 1939, and Mrs. Willis Fisher and Mrs. Donald Davis whose terms will close in 1940, and Miss Rosalie Norris, librarian.

Meetings were held the last Wednesday in each month except during the summer, with Mr. Howard, chairman, Mrs. Davis, secretary-treasurer (succeeding Miss Piper who had so admirably filled the position for almost nine years), and Mrs. Fisher and Mr. Howard, the library or building committee.

In addition to the routine business of reports from the librarian and secretary and payment of bills incurred in the running of the library, the board points with pride to the following accomplishments throughout the year: a thorough revision of the Constitution and By-laws; a "modernizing" of the magazine list to include *Life*, *Woman's Home Companion*, *Reader's Digest*, *National Geographic*, *Good Housekeeping*, *Time*, *McCall's*, *Boy's Life*, *Popular Mechanics*, *Popular Science*, *Pictorial Review*, *Atlantic*, *Harper's*, *Ladies' Home Journal*, *American Girl*, *Child's Life*, and *Yankee*; a long-needed pruning and cutting away of the shrubbery; installation of a new system of circulation of books and magazines (the old method was next to the most antique in the state!); repair of the wall clock; the purchase of a Merriam-Webster unabridged dictionary to replace the 1888 Webster;

and new duplex shades for all the windows.

These achievements, particularly the shades and dictionary, were made possible only by a policy of strict economy practiced by the board these past years, especially since the interest from the trust funds has dropped from \$199.84 in 1929 to \$85.67 this year. The board often wonders as it juggles the income to fit a Mother Hubbard budget if the town can realize the handicap the lack of funds imposes upon the board, compelling a rigid surveillance of fuel, an apology of a salary for the librarian, a limited number of new books, and the hours of the library—a subject of criticism by many—to be only from 2 to 5 on Wednesdays and 6:30 to 8:30 Saturday evenings. The figures of the State Library Commission on an ideal appropriation for a town of 1100 allows one dollar per capita, making our total income of \$582.00 seem rather inadequate.

The board would like to call attention to needed repairs in the not too distant future. The ceilings, walls, and woodwork should be done over. The furnace should be carefully examined since it appears deficient in performance and the objects in the historical room as well as the books are not helped any by the sharp irregularities in room temperature which an oil burner would overcome. All this requires money, the board well knows, but that we have an exceptionally fine library for a small town and a surprisingly large number of summer visitors who judge the town by its buildings are equally obvious.

The library board feels a justified pride in the town library with its dignified gray stone, its beautiful trees and shrubbery, the many valuable objects of interest in the historical room, and reading material far superior to that of most small libraries. The board regrets that more of the townspeople do not enjoy a better acquaintance with their town

library; however, it hastens to express gratitude and appreciation for all those who have shown interest by patronage and generous gifts of books.

The year commenced with a balance of \$6.33 and an appropriation of \$450.00. The fines amounted to \$40.00 (including \$6.40 from the sale of old books and magazines and a gift of \$1.50) and the interest from the trust funds to \$85.67, making a total income of \$582.00. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Amherst:

I herewith submit my twentieth report which is the thirtieth in the series of such reports.

Supervisory Union No. 40

The same five districts comprise this union as it was reorganized and grouped in 1933. At the annual meeting of the joint board of the Union last spring the apportionment of expenses was changed somewhat so that now the several districts contribute to the superintendent's salary account as follows: Amherst 17%, Brookline 8%, Hollis 14%, Milford 56%, and Mont Vernon 5%, and to the office expenses (clerk, postage, office supplies, etc.) Amherst 25%, Brookline 10%, Hollis *, Milford 60%, Mont Vernon 5%.

*Hollis later voted to pay \$50 for the current school year.

Teachers and Instruction

One change only has occurred in the teaching staff, Mr. Allan E. Boerker of Kingston, New York, a graduate of Dartmouth College in 1938, replaces Mr. Hanson who after two years of successful teaching in Amherst accepted a position in Bristol, New Hampshire at a substantial increase in salary. Miss Forbes and Miss Boutelle continue at the Clark School in grades I-II and III-IV. Miss Gott has grades V-VI at the High School building. Grades VII-XII have instruction under a departmentalized plan, with the teaching staff as follows:

Mr. Ayer, Headmaster, Mathematics and Economics; second year of service in Amherst.

Miss Baker, English and French; fourth year of service in Amherst.

Miss Piper, History, Latin, Mathematics; thirty-first year of service in Amherst.

Mr. Boerker, Science and Mathematics; first year of service in Amherst.

Miss Elsie F. Wheeler of Greenville is serving her fifth year as Supervisor of Music in the schools of Amherst, Brookline, Milford, and Mont Vernon.

Clark School

This new building is now being occupied for the second school year. The Building Committee made a full report last year. It should be reported, however, that a few additional things have been done, including the building of more lunch room tables by Mr. Tracy, improvement to grounds by completion of grading lawn and shrubbery. It might be well to consider enlarging the ventilating grill and eventually to weatherstrip the windows as the air leakage now makes it difficult to heat the rooms on a cold windy morning.

This attractive building has many visitors from out of town, especially School Board members and special committees from other School Districts where new construction is being considered.

Transportation

Routes are necessary to all sections of the district. The work is put out for bids each year. At the present time Mr. Malcolm D. Clark has the contract for the current year except for two children who live near Wheeler's corner and who ride to Milford with the Hartshorn children. Mr. Clark has routes as follows:

1. Ponemah, nearly to the Hollis line, 26 pupils.
2. Chestnut Hill, 45 pupils.
3. Manchester Road to Bedford line, 7 pupils.
4. Lake, 6 pupils.
5. Christian Hill, 13 pupils.
6. North, 6 pupils.

A small section of Mont Vernon in the east part of the town was set off into Amherst for school pur-

poses in 1844. This situation has never been changed so that Amherst is responsible for the schooling of all children from this area including the transportation; likewise a section of New Boston on Chestnut Hill has to be taken care of by Amherst including transportation. Some years there are no children to be provided for, other years several have to be transported.

Repairs and Needs

Needs:

1. Stools for laboratory.
2. Gas (bottled type) for laboratory.
3. Better fume hood with exhaust for laboratory.
4. New floor for main room in the High School.
5. Painting of High School building.
6. Another coat of paint on Clark School exterior.

The last statement about repairs was in the 1937 report and since then the following things have been done:

1. Fence at the High School repaired and painted.
2. Well at High School cleaned.
3. Installation of bubbler on second floor at High School.
4. Fire hose and rack at Clark School.
5. Installation of electric clocks at High School.

Adult Education

Again there is an opportunity for correspondence courses for persons over sixteen years of age who are not in school. Mr. Albert N. French of Durham continues in charge of this area with headquarters at Milford. Mr. Edgar L. Paris is now State Supervisor, replacing Mr. F. C. Reagan who served us so well in that capacity.

8. Maintains democratic family relationships.

C. The Objectives of Economic Efficiency

The educated producer—

1. Knows the satisfaction of good workmanship.
2. Understands the requirements and opportunities for various jobs.

3. Has selected his occupation.
4. Succeeds in his chosen field.
5. Maintains and improves his efficiency.
6. Appreciates the social value of his work.

The educated consumer—

7. Plans the economics of his own life.
8. Develops standards for guiding his expenditures.
9. Is an informed and skillful buyer.
10. Takes appropriate measures to safeguard his interests.

D. The Objectives of Civic Responsibility

The educated citizen—

1. Is sensitive to the disparities of human circumstance.
2. Acts to correct unsatisfactory conditions.
3. Seeks to understand social structures and social processes.
4. Has defenses against propaganda.
5. Respects honest differences of opinion.
6. Has a regard for the nation's resources.
7. Measures scientific advance by its contribution to the general welfare.
8. Is a cooperating member of the world community.
9. Respects the law.
10. Is economically literate.
11. Accepts his civic duties.
12. Acts upon an unswerving loyalty to democratic ideals.

All of us—school officials, parents, pupils, and citizens in general—have a responsibility in the accomplishment of these objectives. May we fully measure up to our responsibility.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools,
Amherst, N. H.:

The following is my sixth report of the health work in the Amherst schools.

The medical inspection was made in September and October by Dr. Oscar Burns, the nurse assisting. The result of this examination will be found in the School Physician's report.

A dental clinic was sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association for the pupils in grades three and four. Pupils in other grades could have their dental work done by paying the clinic fee. Sixty-one children had their work completed at this time by Dr. Richard Lawrence of Milford. Each year shows great improvement in the condition of our children's teeth. Plans are already under way for a similar clinic to begin in March. The clubs of Amherst have always generously contributed to this clinic each year.

Tonsil clinics have been held at the county hospital during the summer months.

Visual examinations were made by the nurse, and sixteen were found to have defective vision. Some of these have already been taken care of.

The hearing tests were made with the state audiometer and eight children were found to have defective hearing.

The Red Cross has furnished cod liver oil to some of the children needing it. Many articles of clothing have been distributed by the Red Cross.

Three children were vaccinated by the school physician after the medical inspection.

Forty-seven school room visits were made during the year for health work, and home visits were made as necessary for remedial work and health instructions. Sixteen mornings were spent in the dental clinic.

In closing I wish to thank all the school officials and others who have assisted me with my work during this year, and I want parents to call me if I can help with health problems of the school children at any time.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and Citizens of Amherst:

I herewith submit my second annual report.

School opened for the year on September 7, 1938 with 40 pupils registered in the High School, six of whom were seniors. Since then two freshmen, one sophomore, and one senior have entered and one post-graduate and one freshman has left so that the registration on January 31, 1939 was 42 in the High School, including 7 seniors, 11 juniors, 14 sophomores, and 10 freshmen. There were 19 in grade VIII and 15 in grade VII.

Attendance has been excellent and to date only 10 tardinesses have been recorded in grades VII-XII, an average of only one for each eight pupils over a period of twenty-two weeks.

The activity schedule opened for the year with an outdoor hike and picnic in October. On Armistice Day the entire group in grades VII-XII went to Milford and took part in the parade there.

Continuing its record of presenting the better type of play, the Triple Entente Association chose "The Five Little Peppers" for its fall dramatic production. The characters were well portrayed by the cast and a large and appreciative audience attended the performance, given in the Town Hall on November 23.

Twenty-six Amherst alumni dating back to the class of 1918 attended a special alumni party at the Town Hall on December 23. The program for the afternoon included an address of welcome by Randolph Kruger with appropriate responses by the alumni, two reels of movies, and the playing of a girls' basketball game between the high school and alumni.

Ten members of the staff of the school magazine, The Broadcaster, accompanied by Miss Baker,

attended the Greater Boston Press Conference held at Boston University in January.

On February 7, sixty-five members of grades VII-XII accompanied by Mr. Ayer and Mr. Boerker enjoyed a winter sports party at Bragdon's Ski Tow. The kindness of Mr. Bragdon and Mr. Clark, the latter furnishing the transportation free of charge, was very much appreciated.

Teams in both girls' and boys' basketball were continued this winter and much pleasure and real benefit was derived by those participating in this sport. Over half of the entire enrollment of grades VII-XII was included on the two squads. The schedule included games with Milford Seconds, Hollis, Hancock, Antrim and the Alumni. The cooperation of parents and friends in providing transportation for out-of-town trips helped to make the season a success. The girls were coached by the Headmaster, and the boys by Mr. Boerker.

In an effort to improve the ability of pupils to express themselves in writing, this year's 7th and 8th grade contest, sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association, was an essay contest instead of the former prize-speaking type. The topic for the essays was along the lines of what can be done to improve recreational facilities in Amherst and a great deal of interest and many valuable suggestions were the result. It is planned to conduct the Grange contest for grades IX-XII along the same lines sometime in March or April. In addition to this, all members of the high school have submitted essays to the American Youth Forum contest.

Some mention may be appropriately made at this time concerning the new period arrangement under which grades VII-XII have been operating this year. In order that pupils may have more opportunity to work under the personal supervision of individual teachers, the periods have been length-

ened from forty-five minutes to one hour each. By this plan part of the time is devoted to teaching and the remaining part given over to supervised study as needed, at which time the various classes start the assignments for the following day. This enables the teachers to make sure that the assignments are understood and that each pupil knows what he is to do. Under this arrangement many of the pupils who use their time efficiently can complete all assignments during the school day, and be relieved of what is known as "home work." This is especially true of the lower grades. However, as the pupil progresses in high school, more is expected of him and a certain amount of time at home must be devoted daily to the preparation of lessons.

I wish I could impress upon the minds of all parents the need for the growing boy or girl to have regularly assigned duties in and about the home for which he is responsible. Nothing so often helps high school pupils more than to have to be responsible for something outside of school. And be sure that your boy or girl has a place where, by himself, he can spend a little time in thought and careful preparation of a lesson if he has one to do! Give him a definite schedule for home study and make him follow it! You will be pleased with the results, I feel sure.

May I express my sincere thanks to the members of the teaching staff who have helped make this year one of the best. Miss Piper, Miss Baker, and our new teacher, Mr. Boerker, all have heavy schedules, but are always ready to give what assistance they can regardless of what the task may be. Their untiring efforts are a constant source of joy to me. And to Mr. Phelps are due the thanks of both teachers, pupils and Headmaster for his excellent cooperation and long hours of efficient work.

In closing may I express my sincere thanks to

members of the School Board and to Superintendent Bales for their valuable assistance and patience. They are ready at all times to do that which seems best for the children of Amherst.

And to you citizens who are trying to make Amherst children good citizens of tomorrow, thank you.
