You are hereby notified to meet at the School Auditorium in said Andover on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March next, at One of the Clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Ordinance as recommended by the Planning Board and Selectmen.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Sign Ordinance as recommended by the Selectmen.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to change its system of highway management by having the selectmen appoint a full time road agent beginning in 1968.
- 7. To raise and/or appropriate the sum of Six thousand, five hundred (\$6,500.00) dollars for the purchase of a truck of a capacity to do the work of town road maintenance and the plowing of roads. (By petition)

Selectmen's Report To The Town

This year your Board of Selecemen would like to point out to Andover citizens the fact that this is still a rather small rural town with a rural tax base. We note this because during the past year your Board has been very conscious of an increasing demand for services from townspeople.

The problem here is that a town in Andover's situation is not able to provide the services that well-off suburban communities do. People who move here from such communities, we feel, must learn to adapt themselves to the normal conditions of country living rather than trying to push Andover into policies it cannot afford to support.

Unless its citizens are prepared to pay substantially higher taxes, Andover cannot afford to plow its roads every time an inch or two of snow falls, it cannot afford to maintain lush grass in its cemeteries, it cannot afford any kind of regularly scheduled local police coverage, it cannot afford to keep a dump attendant on hand every day, it cannot afford as much grading of gravel roads as sometimes appears necessary.

This Board is fully aware of the lack of thoroughness and frequency with which some of the normal tasks of town government are carried out. But also we are aware of the very stringent restrictions of the budget under which our town government operates. When there are many jobs to be done, and sufficient money can be raised to do only a few of them, someone has to decide which jobs are most important. This is one of the tasks of your Board of Selecemen.

In performing this task, the Board should, of course, be responsive to the wishes of the town's citizens. The Board's judgments may not always agree with those of all citizens, but they are based on what the Board considers to be in the best interest of the whole town.

Sometimes a priority judgment may be questioned — and sometimes quite rightly. Sometimes — and this not so rightly — a judgment may run into conflict with townspeople who have particular problems which they consider to be of prime public importance but which the Board of Selectmen, in view of its knowledge of budgetary limitations and other town problems, does not.

HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES

Town roads and their care usually stimulate considerable discussion in Andover — and this year is no exception.

The Budget Committee has made some noteworthy changes in the highway department budget proposed by this Board. As a result of a legal petition submitted by a group of citizens, there is an article in the warrant to see if the town will raise and appropriate \$6,500 for purchase of a town truck. The Budget Committee approved this item and, feeling its possible approval by the voters would bring about a decrease in road maintenance costs, reduced the Selectmen's request for this latter item from \$16,000 to \$13,000. Recognizing the

need for funds to operate and maintain the truck, the Budget Committee increased the general highway expense item from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

Budget Committee and Selectmen agreed that ownership by the town of any more equipment than the grader would be more practical if the road agent were hired (and fired?) by the Selectmen instead of elected. Two points are involved here: (1) a man hired for as long as he performs good work is more apt to take good care of the town's rolling equipment than a man elected for one year; (2) if the town begins buying equipment, an elected road agent position will be less desireable for experienced men who have their own equipment and at the same time become more attainable for any inexperienced man who has a dollar to file for election.

Therefore, we have included an article in the warrant to see if the town will vote to have the road agent appointed by the Board of Selectmen. It is our feeling that it is not logical to support the truck purchase without supporting this one too.

This Board would like to note that it is not keen to undertake responsibility for day-to-day maintenance of the town roads, which, in effect, it would do under the proposed change of system. Under the existing system, the elected road agent is directly responsible to the people and responsible to the Selectman only to the extent that they represent the people and control the purse strings.

Before voting on these articles, we ask you to think about these points: (1) For snowplowing and some summer maintenance work, it still will be necessary for the town to hire a second truck; (2) The town last year paid road agent Keyser about \$6,300 for truck rental (this including driver for most of the hours involved) and \$1,179 for rental of truck and driver with automatic sander: (3) Town highway payrolls in 1966 totaled \$6,785. It seems likely that a good road agent cannot be hired except on a full-time basis, and this probably cannot be done for less than \$5,000 to \$6,000 per year. Also, the road agent often will need to hire additional men; (4) the logical continuation of the policy involved in purchasing a truck is for the town to purchase a second truck and a loader and build a shed workshop in which to house them all.

Finally, we should note that this is not a new discussion. An article was included in the warrant for the 1963 town meeting to see if the town would choose to have its road agent appointed. No article was included for purchase of equipment, but it was suggested that approval of the article would eventually require purchase of town equipment and construction of housing for it. The article was not approved at that time.

Another item proposed by this Board and changed by the Budget Committee was the annual \$2,500 appropriation for permanent bridge repair. This item was first submitted to the town meeting in 1964 with the comment in the Selectmen's Report that "... Wooden stringers and planks deteriorate so rapidly that in the long run this construction is more expensive than a better bridge, as well as being a continual source of liability and annoyance." The \$2,500 appropriation was voted by the town in 1964, as well as in 1965 and 1966. Three cement bridges and one steel culvert bridge have been constructed with the funds, and some material is on hand for another cement bridge. This Board agrees with the 1964 Board as to the wisdom of this policy and disagrees with the Budget Committee's action.

Road agent Keyser believes a \$1,500 appropriation is necessary to complete reconstruction of the bridge on the Holt Road, planned as this year's main project. Originally, it was planned to complete this bridge in 1966, but high water early in the fall prevented the work. The bridge on the Ted Hall Road on Beech Hill was rebuilt instead.

We will quickly review other construction work performed in 1966. Town Road Aid funds were expended on the Flaghole Road starting at the Andrus farm and working toward Franklin. Available money was not sufficient to complete this project, which moved through some rough terrain and was located at the point in Andover farthest removed from available gravel. A stretch of about 1,000 feet remains unfinished. We give first priority to completion of this job with 1967 TRA funds. Probably about half the money will be used in Flaghole. At this time, your Board has made no decision about where to use the balance or where to use this year's Duncan Fund allocation.

The 1966 Duncan Fund money was spent in putting a mix surface on the road from Mitchell Underpass to the power station. This is a road without houses, but it carries heavy truck traffic as well as school buses and was always difficult and expensive to maintain in its former gravel state.

Road sealing projects in 1966 included half of this new underpass road, North Street in Andover village, the Beech Hill Road between the Elmer Clark and Clyde Currier residences, the west side of Shaw Hill and a portion of the switch road. The Peg Shop Road was surfaced with a penetration treatment that also was paid for from the asphalt and patch appropriation.

IMPROVING ANDOVER'S LOOKS

Your Board was pleased with the very helpful cooperation of nearly all the people contacted in regard to violations of the junk car law. With only a pair of exceptions, one of them most unfortunately clearly visible from Route 11, the town's citizens have complied willingly with the new regulations.

We feel the sign ordinance approved by the 1966 town meeting has been generally effective. The erection of some large signs was prevented. However, a dispute with a major advertising company about the changing of one of their signs has made us aware of some possible loopholes in the ordinance as originally drafted. Therefore,

two amendments are included in this year's warrant, one to prevent the changing of an existing sign from one mon-resident advertiser to another, the second to stipulate a penalty for violations.

Cleaning up junk automobiles and controlling a growing billboard problem (in a May census of signs, we counted 101 between the eastern junction of Routes 4 and 11 and Potter Place), is only a small start toward the big goal of making Andover a better place to live. But it is a very visible start.

NEW HISTORY

One of the most noteworthy developments of 1966 was the publication of Ralph Chaffee's History of Andover from 1905 to 1965. This fine volume is a credit to the town. We hasten to point out that copies are available from the town clerk for \$7.50 each. Mail orders are \$7.75.

Town maps also are available for 25 cents each.

RESCUE SQUAD AND AMBULANCE

The year saw the beginning of a new rescue squad in Andover. Formerly operating under Civil Defense, this now has become an independent unit. Dr. Emile Boselli is president. Carl Meier is captain, and Ralph Chaffee is secretary-treasurer.

Through contacts of Dr. Boselli, the rescue squad received a big boost through the very generous gift of a used Cadillac ambulance from the rescue squad in Rivervale, New Jersey. Serviced and repaired by a Job Corps training unit at Camp Kilmer, N. J., the ambulance came to Andover in fine shape.

The rescue squad is available for ambulance calls any time of day or night. No charge is to be made for service. There are, of course, certain expenses involved in maintaining the vehicle. The rescue squad has made an appeal for support from the townspeople. This kind of help is needed to keep this worthwhile unit going.

You will note there is a request for a \$200 appropriation for the rescue squad in the town budget. This was submitted by the rescue squad and approved by the Budget Committee. Purpose of the money, to quote the squad's letter of request, is "... to cover the maintenance of the new ambulance and any emergency expenses pertaining thereto." Behind the request is the squad's wish to have some reserve funds available in the event that public support is not forthcoming to a sufficient degree.

CIVIL DEFENSE


We have the following report from John Knox, who assumed the office of Andover Civil Defense Director in 1966:

"In the forthcoming year, I hope to continue to bring to Andover residents more knowledge of civil defense and the necessity of further protection. We here in Andover may not be in very much dangr of atomic blasts, but we could be in grave danger of radioactive fallout. Knowledge could prevent your death and that of your children. Last

spring eight Andover ladies took the adult education course. This winter, twenty people are taking the medical self help course. This is only a start, I hope, in bringing the knowledge to the residents of Andover that is so sadly needed."

TOWN OFFICE HOURS

Starting March 21, your Selectmen will meet at the town office every Tuesday at 7:30 p. m.



The new shoulder patch adopted for use this past year by the Andover police force was designed by Chief and Mrs. James Humphrey and depicts the Bog Bridge, more commonly known as the "old Cilleyville bridge." The Bog Bridge (1887) was the last built in Andover and probably the shortest. Obsolete now by reason of road changes, it was restricted to pedestrian use only in 1957, but is being preserved as a museum piece and cherished relic of a bygone era. P. C. Atwood was the builder, and the cost was \$522.63. Located on Pleasant Brook in plain view at the junction of busy U. S. Route 4-A and Route 11, this old structure is probably among the best known and most photographed covered bridges in New Hampshire. The shoulder patch has a brown background, with the lettering, illustration and border trim in gold.

Report of Forest Fire Warden

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people — those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres — a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

- If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Dont leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important instruct your children that matches are not play things.

In our financial statement, the amount reported as "Cooperative Aid" covers not only expenditures for actual ribes eradication, but also state and federal funds spent in 1. detailed mapping and inspection of areas prior to actual control work, 2. research work that has reduced the size of the control area, and 3. research in control methods to reduce costs of control work. The mapping survey provides a permanent record which is of great value in planning future examinations and workings of white pine stands in your community.

Because details of control work can vary in communities, it is not possible to cover all in a brief statement. However, the supervisor of the control project in your town will, in the course of his planned public relations work, contact you and members of your Board in the near future to discuss the present status of the project and his future

plans as it pertains to your community.

Control of the White Pine Blister Rust disease has been established on 98.7% of the entire state control area (2,500,000 acres). We are fast approaching our goal when the entire area will be on a controlled basis, requiring only minimum funds to maintain this condition.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE TOWN BUILDING ORDINANCE

(Recommended by the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen) Section III.

- B. (New paragraph) No mobile home or trailer shall be moved out of town without a permit. (There is no charge for a permit.) Section III
- C. No mobile home or trailer park shall be established in the town unless the owner or caretaker lives on the premises. A mobile home or trailer park is any plot of ground upon which two or more mobile homes or trailers are located. Anyone wishing to establish a mobile home or trailer park must apply to the Building Inspector for a permit. A permit will be issued at his discretion after reviewing the case. The Building Inspector shall refer to the Sanitary Laws and Regulations of the New Hampshire State Department of Health, Mobile Home and Trailer Parks, when necessary.

Andover Libraries

The Trustees of Andover's two Public Libraries present the following report for 1966:

The Trustees and Librarians have continued to work toward meeting, by 1968, the standards set by the Statewide Development Program for member libraries. The advantages to small libraries of such membership are very great and with the advent of the Service Centers, one of which will be in Franklin, and the availability of the Common Borrower's Card, our small libraries will have the advantages of city libraries.

Emphasis on the Library as an educational facility is being stressed nationally and by the State, and in a small way, your libraries are trying to keep in line with this emphasis.

William Adams Bachelder Library: Mrs. Keyser, the Librarian, has just completed her Sophomore year at Plymouth State College and in spite of a heavy study program continues to serve the library efficiently and well.

Since the Mollie Bachelder Room is used frequently for meetings and programs by townspeople, more dishes have been purchased for their convenience.

Andover Town Library: Mrs. George has taken another State Extension Course in Library Techniques, thus furthering her professional knowledge and making her more valuable in her position. She has worked diligently with the School staff to aid the pupils in Library Service, since the School is without a library. Because of the concentration of effort in a very small amount of time on Thursday afternoons, an experiment, instituted by the Board at the Librarian's request has been tried. This is a regular paid assistant during the three hours when the pupils are at the Library. This has proved to work the best of all the systems tried this year, and hopefully, will be continued.

The woodwork and bookcases were all painted in the Spring, giving the Library a clean and cheerful look. The library was closed for about two weeks at the request of the State Police who used it for questioning citizens in the Delano murder case,

A gift from the Columbia Record Company of about twenty recordings has been received, catalogued, and is available for distribution. Also, a grant of \$100 for reference books from the Federal Government is on deposit with the State Treasurer, and the books will be available early in 1967.

The Trustees: During 1966. General Library Policies were written and

adopted. These include a Book Selection Policy. If anyone is interested, there are copies on file in both libraries.

The resignation of Mrs. Amos Johnson was accepted with regret in April, and Mr. James Grosvenor was appointed in her place by the Selectmen.

In April, your Chairman attended an Institute on Library Management at Simmons College as one of two laymen chosen from New Hampshire, and with Mrs. Ottati a Public Relations Workshop in Laconia. In July, I went to the Trustees Section meetings of the American Library Association as a delegate from the N. H. Library Trustees Association, and in October, I was elected President of the N. H. Association for 1967.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Andover:

Again it is my pleasure to report on the activities and achievements of the Andover Elementary School.

We have continued in our efforts to offer a good basic elementary background and preparation for the work of high school. The special class organized last year on a part-time basis has been expanded this year to a full time class, with a program and materials adapted to the needs of the pupils involved.

Several pupils from the New London area and one from Sutton have been accepted into this class as tuition students.

Since New London will operate its own special class next year, we will not be able to depend upon tuition income to aid in the support of this program. However, careful consideration should be given to the possibility of continuing such a program. Indications are that such a program provides the individual attention and assistance with educational problems that would not be available to such an extent to pupils in the regular classroom.

Mr. Martin Feuerstein has assumed the duties of school principal and continues with his classroom teaching. The school program, including activities, continues an attempt to appeal to the wide range of interests found in our school population.

The eighth grade testing program has been continued this year under the supervision of the State University at Durham. This is a state-wide program, partially supported by Federal funds, which enables us to compare pupil achievement in Andover with that of other pupils in other towns and cities in New Hampshire. In addition these test results are helpful in the proper guidance and direction of these pupils as they enter high school.

It has been a pleasure to work with the School Board, and with the school faculty in providing these educational opportunities for the pupils of Andover.

- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500) to establish a contingency fund to meet the costs of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6000) to defray the cost of establishing a special class at Andover Elementary School for the school year 1967-68.
 - 11. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title I,

Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

12. To conduct any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
