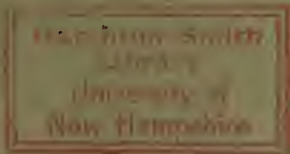

## TOWN WARRANT

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

*Article 1.* To bring forward your ballots for the necessary Town officers for the ensuing year and the ensuing three years.

*Art. 2* To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.

*Art. 3.* To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor, and assistance to the aged.

*Art. 4.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. to be used as the Town's share of W.P.A. projects to be sponsored by the Selectmen.

*Art. 5.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500. for the maintenance of highways and bridges and for any other necessary expense of the Town.

*Art. 6.* To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes up to the sum of \$15,000. if needed.



*Art. 7.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for the Town Library.

*Art. 8.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15. for the care of the clock on the Church.

*Art. 9.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for the care of the New Cemetery; \$50. for the care of Joppa Cemetery; \$10. for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road; and \$7. for the care of the Beals Cemetery.

*Art. 10.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$797.60 for the construction of Class V. highways, the State to contribute \$3,190.40.

*Art. 11.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000. for the tarring of Class V. roads, under the direction of the Selectmen.

*Art. 12.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to gravel the road from the Donald Street school house to the old Charles Bursiel homestead.

*Art. 13.* To see what action the Town will take regarding the Adam Chandler Trust fund.

*Art. 14.* To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lay out and accept Johnson St. from its present terminus to Woodlawn Ave.

*Art. 15.* To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept Wilkins St. extension from the Manchester city line to the residence of Mrs. Ruby Gray.

*Art. 16.* To see if the Town will take any action regarding repairs to the Town Scales.

*Art. 17.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200. for the purchase of snow plows and snow fence.

*Art. 18.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25. to pay for the pumping of water to the New Cemetery.

*Art. 19.* To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and of other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST CONTROL

White Pine Blister Rust control as conducted in this town during 1940 by the State Forestry & Recreation Department and the Federal Bureau of Entomology was a part of a nationwide program of protecting white pine growth from a bark disease, which, though not spectacular, represents a very serious menace to this tree if not controlled. Throughout the northeastern states, where white pine is especially important, counties, towns, cities, and individual owners have co-operated with State and Federal agencies. In the Far West, upon the National Forests and holdings of large lumber companies, Blister Rust control is recognized as a necessary practice in growing white pine. Recently, the Federal Government reaffirmed and emphasized the need of White Pine Blister Rust control by the passage of an act authorizing financial assistance to such states as are carrying on control measures. All towns and their citizens are strongly urged to co-operate with the State and Federal governments in their efforts to maintain control of this destructive disease.

The following financial statement shows expenditures made in this town during 1940 for Blister Rust control by the agencies indicated. Persons interested in the detail of control work and the life history of Blister Rust may receive a circular by applying to the State Forester, Concord, N. H.

Robertson was elected chairman and Mrs. Etta Hodgman as clerk. Mr. Robertson was appointed to represent the School Board on the Municipal Budget Committee.

All members of the Board attended the Union meeting at Hudson on May 9, 1940, at which Fred W. Hall was unanimously re-elected Superintendent of Schools.

There was no change in the teaching staff in Bedford this year and the teachers are continuing their same effective and efficient work.

A law passed at the 1939 session of the State Legislature requires corrective instruction for handicapped children. Early in the fall the hearing of all the children from the third to the eighth grades was tested with the audiometer. From this test it was found that there were four children who had defective hearing of a sufficient degree to require lip-reading. Lip-reading for these children has been provided since that time. There already seems to be an improvement in the quality of work which these children are doing.
