



A Word from the Selectmen . . .

According to the record, this is the Town's 185th Town Meeting. On March 10, 1767, the necessary officers were elected, but no money raised. How different is our present day Meeting with money the paramount issue! As your servants, we have tried to spend your money as judiciously as possible, but there is a limit to how far a dollar can be stretched and also there is a limit to our authority.

We hear much stress and talk laid upon "tax rate"—which is simply a factor in the matter of tax computation. What does definitely matter—and really effects your pocketbook—is how much money you raise at this meeting. You ALONE can accurately estimate how much you can reasonably afford to spend. Our Budget Committee, at considerable effort, has listed certain sums for expenditure. Please give their estimates your earnest consideration, before you vote.

In conformance to Article 14 of the 1951 Report, we disposed of the Half Track at a sacrifice, and purchased a Ford-Marmon-Harrington Truck with snow plow, which is doing good work.

The cemeteries under the care of Mr. George Geer, show the care for which we have long hoped. As Trustees of Trust Funds we wish to acknowledge receipt of \$100 from Emma Fitch for the care of the John M. Tewksbury lot in Edminster Cemetery and \$100 from Maude Welcome and \$100 from Helen Cutler for the care of the Harlan and Lyman Hunter adjoining lots in the Child Cemetery.

May we at this time express our thanks and appreciation for the kindly cooperation we have received from all heads of departments and residents of Cornish.

We have tried to give you a clear, concise report of the financial transactions during the past year.

Our single hope is—that it meets with your approval.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.) To the Inhabitants of the Town of Cornish in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Cornish Town Hall in said Cornish on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to allocate 35% of the Highway Maintenance money to be used for winter maintenance only.
- 4. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to using \$500 of the Highway Maintenance money for ditching and culverts on the so-called Clark Camp Road.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to set aside the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) of the Maintenance money for repair and maintenance of the Mountain Road at South Cornish from Benware's to the Newport Town line. Work to be done as soon as conditions permit. (By request.)
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$820.40, the State to contribute the sum of \$5,469.36 for Town Road Aid.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell the V-8 truck; proceeds of said sale to be applied on the purchase of a new truck; balance to be paid in two equal payments the first to be met by the 1952 levy and the second by a long term note.
- 8. To see if the Town will appropriate \$750.00 to resurface and oil a portion of the Center Road to begin at Cunningham's Corner. (By request.)
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to have the Highway Agent appointed by the Selectmen hereafter. (By request.)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the rights in the Town House School as voted in the 1951 School District Meeting.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to move the Town House School building and attach it to the Town Hall and remodel it for use as a Community House.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to cap or replace the ceiling in the Town Hall.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to increase the size of the present platform in the Town Hall. Also to raise the height of the platform at the same time and raise and appropriate money therefor. (By request.)
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Treasurer of the Trustees of Trust Funds the same rate of compensation as is paid other town officers.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 to be added to the capital reserve fund for purchasing highway equipment.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer on property acquired through tax sales and liens.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town Clerk keep office hours three days in the West side of Town sometime before April 1st each year at some proper place; announcement of the time and place to be made to enable the residents of that side of the Town to register automobiles and dogs at that time. (By request.)
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.
- 20. If the foregoing Article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan and to compensate him at the same rate of other Town Officers.
- 21. To hear reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of Civil Defense Director

Neither disaster from enemy action nor from natural causes made it necessary for your Civil Defense Organization to "go into action"—and for this we are indeed grateful.

It is becoming increasingly apparent that in the event of hostilities Cornish is not likely to be the direct or immediate victim of enemy attack, but would be required to house and provide for evacuees from other stricken areas. This opinion has governed our deliberations and activities during the past year, and is presently held.

Throughout the country, press and radio constantly emphasize the inadequacy of civil defense preparations, particularly on the local level. Cornish C.D.O. is not unmindful of the importance of adequate and proper preparation and planning, but we believe the course we are following is reasonably sound and well attuned to our capacities and facilities.

Early in 1951 careful and accurate inventories of certain supplies, equipment and facilities were completed; which indicated that Cornish is ready and able to do it's part should the occasion arise. We thank all who helped to bring this important survey to such a successful conclusion.

Classes in elementary First Aid were held during the early part of the year under the able direction of the Medical, Nursing and First Aid Unit—and were fairly well attended.

A course of training for Auxiliary Police Units to be used in civil defense was prepared by the Superintendent of New Hampshire State Police and was made available to all members of the Cornish C.D.O. Police Unit.

All the members of your local defense organization have served well and faithfully and the director wishes to take this opportunity to thank each one for his or her helpful interest, cooperation and support. They are listed here for your information, and they would welcome volunteers to serve on their respective units.

SCHOOL WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the Eighth day of March, 1952, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To determine what provision the school district will make for the increased enrollment for the school year 1952-53, and to raise and appropriate any additional money necessary for tuition, classroom space, teacher and/or tuition.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip a new elementary school and to acquire any real estate which may be necessary for such purpose.

- 11. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for constructing and equipping a new elementary school and acquiring any real property that may be necessary for its location; and whether the district will vote to authorize the issue of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued, including their sale, the time and place of payment of principal and in accordance with the municipal bond statute, New Hampshire Revised Laws, Chapter 72, as amended by Chapter 55 Laws of 1949.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$4,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for School Building purposes.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to take any action on the transportation of high school pupils, and to raise and appropriate any money made necessary therefor.
- 14. To see if the district will vote to buy a school bus, and to raise and appropriate any money for such purpose.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

School Board

Report of Superintendent of Schools

In this year of world tension and strife, we can be grateful that our educational system remains strong, that our boys and girls can continue to enjoy twelve years of free public education. Probably this is so because the majority of our people recognize that education for democracy should have a high priority in our efforts to maintain our ideals of citizenship and government.

However, we are faced with acute problems in maintaining and improving our educational institutions in this time of inflation, shortages and world dissension. In New Hampshire, and particularly in our Union No. 5, most of the solutions await a major decision on financial support. We are reaching a crisis in many of our towns where the real estate tax alone cannot provide sufficient funds.

The General Court changed the formula for state support of schools during its last session. The new formula's purpose is to equalize the tax effort throughout the state. It is an improvement but some inequities remain. Chiefly, it fails to recognize the differences in transportation costs. Some districts must transport practically every pupil over back roads, at great distances. Other towns with equal or greater financial ability have their school populations centered around the school buildings and this expense is relatively small. There is certainly nothing equitable about this problem as it relates to high school pupils. In most rural areas, these pupils have to find their own means of getting to school, often at great expense to parents. In larger communities, the majority need walk only short distances. A large share of the cost of transporting school pupils is provided by some of the states. formula provides for a better means of fund distribution as far as it goes. Yet it is only in partial effect because the General Court appropriated half enough funds to maintain it.

Unwilling to be classed as one who gives destructive criticism, I venture my recommendations. In place of our \$600,000 state support program, we should have a \$3,000,000 assistance program. Approximately \$1,000,000 of this should be used to aid needy communities in building, divided in such a way as to give some impetus to cooperative districts. A considerable portion of the amount should be earmarked to equalize transportation costs and make district transportation of high school

pupils possible. The balance can be divided generously under the present equalization formula, with a portion set aside for emergency situations. The whole program should be provided after a thorough examination of the state tax structure. Some new form of equitable tax must be devised, and the sooner the better. We have a clear choice, it seems to me, between such a program for New Hampshire or bankruptcy for our small communities. Our neighboring state of Vermont has a program of state support totaling \$2,700,000, and Maine provides over \$6,000,000. New Hampshire, with a higher per capita income than either of its neighbors, can support this healthy contribution.

If there are people who feel that education costs are exorbitant and we are not getting our money's worth, they might consider these facts. 1) The percentage of our national income spent on schools has decreased from approximately four percent a few years ago to less than two percent at present. This is far less than the proportion spent in Russia and England. 2) Our total yearly costs in New Hampshire are about equal to the best of two large bombers. 3) We spend more in America for our liquor than our education. 4) The anticipated deficit in the President's federal budget, about \$15,000,000,000 for one year, is about equal to the total cost of all new school buildings and plant modernization needed throughout the United States, for greatly increased school enrollments.

(1). "Individual freedom and national strength depend upon the clear thinking of informed citizens. The part which our national school system, both public and private and from elementary grades through professional and technical schools, can play in preparing Americans to meet present and future problems is being jeopardized by inadequate financial support."

We have made a great deal of progress in school plants by completing one new school, and improving all others in the eight towns. However, only four districts now have adequate buildings, and the efforts in the other communities to provide something better are being defeated by inflation.

Charlestown has a lovely new junior-senior high school. Currently it would cost \$300,000 to build. Our indebtedness is \$195,000. Holden School has been converted to a nice elementary building that can house three hundred pupils without crowding. Automatic heat has eliminated several problems.

Acworth School District has completed its work in changing the town school to a modern two-room structure, one of the best in the area. We have redecorated the interior of the Sarah Porter School in Langdon, and have just added automatic oil heat. The two schools of Unity now have automatic heating, with a completely new central plant at Center School. Minor improvements have been made in Goshen, Lempster, Croydon, and Cornish. In Lempster and Cornish, taxpayers and interested groups are accumulating reserve funds, hoping the day for new schools will soon arrive.

The boards of each district have approved increased salaries for our teachers. I strongly recommend these increases in spite of high taxes. Generally, the level of salaries in Union 5 is below that of some surrounding unions. Teachers should have salary consideration to offset increased taxes and living costs. This coming year may see the teacher shortage reaching its peak. I hope we can find competent, energetic teachers for every school. I am indeed grateful for the loyalty and effort of our teaching staff in Union 5. I urge parents to get better acquainted with them and extend to them the respect and appreciation that is their due.

All of us who know Mrs. Hasham, our school nurse, regret deeply that she has reached retirement age and must leave the service of our boys and girls. Her kindnesses have made a place for her in the hearts of the people in Union 5.

At every district meeting, we elect a new school board member or two and charge our officers with carrying out our wishes. We hope that they can provide improvements, and often expect these to be accomplished with extremely limited funds. I want to emphasize that our school board members are striving their utmost to provide the best schools possible with the funds available. They spend long hours each month determining the best policies and guiding educational affairs according to school law in the most economical means. They are more deserving of your praise than your criticisms.

In spite of minor emergencies, increased enrollments and inflation, we probably will close the books in every district in June without deficiencies.

Our new budgets again are higher. Two major increases are in teachers' salaries and tuition costs, neither of which we can control. We have prepared honest budgets, and we shall strive to live within them. We are practicing every economy possible, consistent with good education.

I am grateful for your faith, your kindnesses, your financial support. Though the cost is high, we must continue to believe in our children and prepare them as adequately as we can for the hectic times emerging.

Report of School Nurse

There are many signs that lead us to believe that the health and development of the children has very much improved in my twenty-one years of service as your school nurse. The change for good is a credit to the parents and to the teachers of the children, and we like to believe the result of the school health program.

Along with the daily routine work, there have been additional demands to meet. We work closely with other health and welfare agencies that have been of tremendous help to us. On a few occasions, we have had the assistance of physicians in our program for better health.

We have in our files a long list of corrected visions. The list of children who have had treatment and corrected hearing is not small.

Our records show that many of the pupils who pass through your schools have had complete dental care, either during the clinics at school or at the clinics held in the dentist's office. Our records show complete recovery from rheumatic fever, found at school. We also have records of children who were treated for mental illness. Some are still in institutions. Our records of tonsillectomies—a part of the national child recovery program in 1933, which has continued through the years—is long. The orthopedic list in our files is active. We are grateful to the New Hampshire Crippled and Handicapped Children Society. This service has monthly clinics open to school nurses for the treatment of needy children.

Your school nurse has attended periodic workshops for knowledge of new trends. The work is not done. There are new problems arising every day. My part in this important service has nearly ended. Thanks to all who have made it a pleasant and worthwhile career.
