TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby instructed to meet at the Veterans' Memorial Building, in said Town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

By vote of the Selectmen, the polis for this meeting will remain open from ten o'clock in the forenoon until seven o'clock in the afternoon, and as much longer thereafter as the Town, at the opening of the meeting, may vote.

1. To elect a Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Library Trustees, Trustees of the Trust Funds, Cemetery Trustee, Auditors and all other necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.

2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, for building and repairing bridges, for the suppression of moths, for the police department and municipal court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries of Town officials, for the Board of Health, for the expense of the Town halls, for the support of libraries, for State and County taxes, for the observance of Memorial Day, for aid to the Derry Visiting Nurse Association, for playground purposes, for co-operating with the State and Federal governments in control of insect pests and white pine blister and for all other necessary charges

arising in said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey any real estate acquired through deeds from the Collector of Taxes or as a reimbursement for assistance furnished to citizens, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will authorize its selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes of the municipal year in which such debts are incurred and made payable therefrom by such vote, and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will direct the Collector of Taxes to allow a discount to all persons paying their taxes within such period as the Town shall limit, to fix the rate of such discount, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the unencumbered surplus funds of the Town the sum of \$20,000.00 to be added to the capital reserve fund to be used for the construction of a sewerage system and sewerage disposal plant for said Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for playground purposes, said sum to be expended in the discretion of and under the direction of the Board of Selectmen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be expended upon the state road leading from Shute's Corner to Windham Junction, the State of New Hampshire to contribute the sum of \$10,000.00 for that purpose, making a total sum of

\$15,000.00 to be expended thereon, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the unencumbered surplus funds of the Town the sum of \$4,000.00 to be expended for the purpose of new high-way equipment, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. By request of the Parent Teachers' Association, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 to supplement a gift of Mrs. Gilbert H. Hood in the same amount for the purpose of constructing a dam in the railroad archway at Hood's Pond, which dam will improve the recreational facilities at Hood Park, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey the Town Hall and Town Hall lot at East Derry, and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt or to amend and adopt the zoning ordinance to be submitted by the Zoning Commission appointed at the recent special Town Meeting, and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 for piping to and installing a fire hydrant at the Elm's Corner in East Derry, the pipe to be connected to the water hole on the Hampstead Road above the residence of Nathaniel G. Head, and pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to move the town dump from its present location, and to see if the Selectmen will negotiate to purchase land near or at so-called Secret Pond, on Kendall Pond Road, for a new dump

site, or any other tract of land suitable for this purpose which will not be detrimental to the health of the public, and to raise and appropriate any sum to do such, and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one per cent (1-100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1945 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Merrimack Valley Region Association, and pass any vote relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light at a suitable location on Union Street, also to vote to tar this street, and pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen from time to time to install such additional street lights as may appear to be necessary, and pass any vote relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Part 22 of Chapter 188 of the Session Laws of New Hampshire for 1945 relating to the construction of sidewalks and sewers, and pass any vote relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to construct and install a sewerage system and sewerage disposal plant for the Town of Derry, and pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds of the Town of Derry in an amount not exceeding the sum of \$500,000.00 for the purpose of constructing and installing said sewerage system and sewerage disposal plant, said bonds to be issued in ac-

cordance with the terms of the "Municipal Bond Statute" of the State of New Hampshire and to be repaid from the proceeds of sewer assessments and sewer rentals or from both as required by statute, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in co-operation with the Federal Government, to install a sewerage system and sewerage disposal plant provided any Federal funds should become available for such purpose, and pass any vote relating thereto.

22. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

23. To appoint any necessary committee on any article embraced in this warrant.

24. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before such meeting.

DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The year has been a difficult one in several respects.

The resignation of Mrs. Ann Edwards was accepted with regret. Mrs. Ethel Campbell filled in for several months and her service was efficient. She did not wish to continue as the regular assistant and Mrs. Lillian Jensen was secured in her place.

After the resignation of Mr. Dinsmoore the librarian kept up the janitor work until the services of Mr. Merton Mills were secured.

The interior of the library is in need of renovating. The beginnings were made in the past year. The floor

was sanded and asphalt tile laid. The hope of the trustees is that the work can be continued by degrees until the interior has been completed.

Despite the difficulties experienced the staff has continued to render the highest type of service. The borrowings continue to be good and the diversity of the tastes of the reading public is sufficiently wide in range to be indicative of a variety of interests existing in the community.

A new set of encyclopedias were acquired during the year. The reference books are kept up to date by acquisitions as frequently as funds permit and needs arise.

That the library has been able to continue to render the same high type of service is a tribute to the conscientious and loyal efforts of your librarian, Miss Edith Hall. She willingly accepts any responsibility to make the service as fine as any library can render.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The 41st annual report is herewith presented:

The Junior High students were given the usual instruction in the use of the library. The question has been asked "just how much benefit does the student receive from this instruction?" This year we gave two classes in Junior High the Fitchburg library test for high schools. Sixty-six of the 99 children passed this

test with a mark of 70-94. This test was made up for senior high school where the student is supposed to have had at least two years of instruction before taking the test. One of our classes was a 7th grade with only a few weeks of study in school and one practice period here in the library.

The Junior High science class came to the library for practical study in mineralogy. The mineral collection is something new with us this year. One collection of rocks and minerals was given by Mrs. Lula Reynolds the other specimens of New Hampshire minerals taken from the Hopkins' collections. Mr. Hopkins, was before his death a teacher of mineralogy. This collection was given to the library by his wife. Both are on display in the Reading Room.

Our school box record is above average this year. The teacher keeps the record of the number of books read from the boxes. When the books are returned she sends in her report. In this way we are able to have a very accurate record of the books read during the school year.

Our circulation has increased a great deal. The stimulating effect of school box reading has increased our daily circulation in the junior department. Here we have had an increase of 663 books over last year. Adult reading has also shown a decided gain once more.

We are happy to report our 1945 inventory showed only 16 books missing from the library shelves. A little higher loss is noted in books lost in circulation. Many of these have been lost through carelessness of those moving from town and not returning books to the library before hand.

We wish to call attention to the article in the Public Laws of New Hampshire Chapter 266 Section 26.

"If any person shall wilfully or maliciously write upon, injure, deface, tear or destroy any book, map, chart,

plate, picture, engraving or statue belonging to any school, college, town or public library, he shall be fined not exceeding \$50., or be imprisoned not exceeding 30 days, or both." Perhaps a careful reading of the above law, a copy of which is posted in your library, may be a warning to those who have been careless in their use and handling of the books in the library.

Again on May 1st, we began re-registering our patrons. Borrower's cards are dated and renewed as of the card date. This renewal keeps our files alive and active. Cards are good for a three year period. Date of expiration being found in the right hand corner of the borrower's card.

In February Mrs. Edwards was called home by the illness of her parents. Mrs. Ethel Campbell was appointed in her place. Mrs. Campbell has been a very fine assistant. Mrs. Lillian Jensen is also assisting with the library work at present.

In November we changed our library hours. We open as usual at 2:00 but do not close during the supper hour. We close each night at 8:00 except Saturday, then it closes at 8:30. This change pleases the public, now many stop for their books on the way home from work instead of coming back later in the evening. This arrangement gives the public the same number of hours but closes the library an hour earlier. This early closing is appreciated very much by the library staff.

Catholic Book - Week was observed this year. Mrs. Lena Spear arranging a very fine exhibition of books and posters.

Book-Week was very quiet. The librarian visited each grade, showing new books and telling stories to the younger children. Many fine books were on display during the week and later placed in the Children's Room for circulation. Maps and posters were arranged around the room to add to the attractiveness of the display.

A group of Currier and Ives reproductions were loaned to Pinkerton Academy for their use during National Art Week.

The purchase of the new 1945 American Encyclopedia is a very fine addition to our reference library. It is used extensively by the students from Pinkerton Academy and Junior High.

A second gift of interest this year is a set of mounted reproductions of the pictures found in the book "Rabbit Hill", Robert Lawson, author and illustrator. This book being the winner of the Newbury Prize for the finest story book for children this year.

Mrs. Harriet Low, Trustee, and your librarian attended the New Hampshire Library Association Meeting. This meeting was held in Laconia October 25-26.

The new tile floor is very attractive and is receiving many favorable comments.

We wish to thank the Derry Garden Club for decorating the library for the holidays. The many friends who have given us books. To Mrs. Hopkins, and Mrs. Reynolds for the minerals. The Viking Press for the mounted pictures and the Newspapers for their publicity during the year.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Trustees of Taylor Library the following report for the year ending December 1945 is respectfully submitted:

In the passing of the chairman of your board, Mr. Winslow Emerson, the staff of the library expresses sincere regret. It feels it has lost a sincere friend and executive. The library has carried on the usual activities. It has been open as usual each Tuesday and Saturday afternoon and evening, except July 4th and December 25th, 103 days.

It has sponsored the Congregational Church reading course.

The circulation has fallen off slightly during the past year, felt in the juvenile department. The largest circulation in children's books was at the time of the story-telling hour, but after a time interest in that lapsed. Recently the teacher in the East Derry school district is stimulating an interest in reading and trying to prepare them for the required reading in the higher grades. Consequently the children are coming oftener to the library and showing more interest in what they read. The library will do its utmost to cooperate.

Five summer transient visitors expressed appreciation of the opportunity of taking books from the library.

Your librarian attended the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association and gained renewed interest and stimulus therefrom.

The impact of our war economy continued to affect the schools. The effect as in the immediate past years was reflected in the rapid turnover of teacher personnel.

The action of the legislature in liberalizing the provisions of the teacher Retirement System was responsible in large measure for the loss of three veteran teachers. Words cannot convey the appreciation of the district for the many years of loyal conscientious service.

rendered to the pupils, schools and community by these teachers. Mrs. Alice Fisher, Miss Nellie Webster and Miss Grace Hunt had served as teachers in Derry a total of 99 years. Miss Hunt had taught in Derry 40 year, Miss Webster 33 years and Mrs. Fisher 26 years.. It was with regret that the school board accepted their resignations but also with a realization that legislative action had made it possible for the state to recognize in a financial way the obligation it owed to these teachers for the many years of public service.

Mrs. Priscilla L. Pelletier and Mrs. Winnifred S. O'Malley resigned during the summer.

Miss Effie Plante resigned to accept a position in Manchester.

Miss Mary Mrsos accepted a position in Laconia.

Miss Etta Merrill left to accept a position as critic teacher at the Wheelock School at Keene Teachers' College.

Miss Olive Cahoon was elected music supervisor in a Massachusetts system.

Mr. Henry Hastings took the headmastership of Alton High School.

Mrs. Ruth Lievens returned to Henniker.

Mrs. Barbara Myers resigned Jan. 30.

In every case teachers of experience were elected to fill existing vacancies.

Mrs. Martha Moore and Miss Alma Hinds were elected principals of West Side and Floyd schools respectively.

Mr. Jesse L. Pellerin accepted the principalship of Derry Junior High School.

Miss Flora Amatruda was elected to teach Oak St. Grade III.

Miss Lyle Hood succeeded Mrs. Pelletier.

Miss Beatrice Hastings was elected teacher of Home Economics.

Miss Beatrice Jennings replaced Mrs. Fisher in the sixth grade at Floyd.

Miss Gretchen O'Mara and Miss Carol Raymond were elected to the 3rd and 2nd grade positions at Floyd School.

Mrs. Bertha Wiggins returned as teacher of grade three at West Side.

Mrs. Mildred Jamosz was elected to the second grade position at West Side.

Miss Priscilla Mills was secured for the sixth grade position.

All teachers who were elected to these positions were graduate of accredited normal schools or teachers colleges and had the benefit of previous teaching experience.

The problem of teacher supply is still serious and the number of graduates from teachers colleges is not sufficient to alleviate the situation. It is probable that it will be four or five years before the supply of teachers will even approximate the demand. The normal loss through marriage will be accentuated and the available replacements will be fewer in number. Up to the present we have been fortunate in that the number of substitutions necessary has been lower than usual. The lack of substitutes has created serious situations in cases where accident or illness has caused the absence of the regular teacher over a long period. The supply of teachers has brought about a condition where salaries are being and will continue to be raised for two reasons. The law of supply and demand is operative in the teaching field as in all others. Secondly advancing wage scales and salary schedules in many fields has caused an economic situation where salaries should be raised to retain good teachers in the field.

The adoption of salary schedules by many communities which are considerably in advance of any previously in use has created a condition which can be handled only by taking steps to meet the competition for teacher services.

The Junior High School program of extracurricular activities is being resumed under a more normal basis. Physical education classes meet four days weekly. The fall season is devoted to intramural schedules primarily because there is no opportunity for interscholastic competition in recognized fall sports. The winter season the boys and girls both engage several neighboring schools in basketball. The spring season is devoted to baseball for the boys and softball for the girls. Although the program at present is equal to many programs of physical education offered in New Hampshire the need of a program which will include more of our boys and girls and permit the recognition and correction of remedial physical defects is becoming more apparent. The statistics of the medical boards who served in induction centers during the war and up to the present revealed a need for a program designed to bring boys and girls to maturity with greater physical vigor than is now the case. One method suggested in lay and professional circles is the development of a fuller program of physical education administered by trained physical educators.

Music is both curricula and extra curricula. The children of the elementary schools under the supervision of the music director aided by the teachers produced last March a program, "The Music Shop" which was a successful one from an artistic and financial point of view. The proceeds of the program were contributed to the Red Cross Fund Drive in town. A substantial sum was realized. The project is already in preliminary stages for this year's production. Instrument-

al as well as choral work are part of the work of the music department and many youngsters are receiving the benefit of this type of instruction. With the technological advances that industry has made in recent years the worthy use of leisure time has become a more serious problem. Music offers an opportunity to develop hobbies which fall into this category. The fuller development of this department with a greater number of individuals participating is one of the positive approaches to the control of juvenile delinquency.

The declamation contest was held as usual in the spring with awards being made at graduation time. This develops talents that are an asset to our boys and girls in adult life. The following boys and girls participated in the program.

The Junior Red Cross were more active this year due to the fact that greater opportunities for service were presented. The military hospitals were in need of certain types of equipment that children could make or provide. Under the chairmanship of Miss Kendrick and with the cooperation of all teachers the members of the Jr. Red Cross furnished to the Red Cross 100 Christmas carol booklets, 36 stuffed animals, 160 ash trays, 24 lap boards, 26 joke and cross word puzzle books, 12 handkerchiefs, 3 sets building blocks and 24 writing boards. In addition edible tree decorations and Christmas favors were distributed through the Inland Camp Committee of the Senior Red Cross. These activities which tend to develop a spirit of service are worthy of the time and effort expended.

The U. S. Treasury department has asked for a continuation of the stamp sale through the schools. The schools therefore have continued to offer stamps for sale. The patriotic theme is stressed less than previously and thrift and regular savings stressed more. The sale of stamps has declined in the schools as in other agencies but the support of the program by the children is still praiseworthy.

The usual program of maintenance was carried out. The cleaning and painting was carried on by the janitors. In addition to the usual maintenance program the following items can be classed as major repairs which were completed during the summer.

Installation of adequate fire drill signals at Floyd and West Side schools was completed. The signal for a fire drill could only be sounded from one location previously and the gong was inadequate to really serve its function. Now the signal can be given from stations on each of the floors and the gongs are adequate so the warning can easily be heard from any place in the building. In addition Klaxons were installed as recess warnings at both ends of the Floyd building.

The coal bin partition at Floyd previously was made of wood. Weakened by fire some time ago it was a source of some worry as to the length of time it would serve with safety. The wooden partition was removed and replaced by a cement block wall reinforced with steel rod. The safety from fire and collapse due to the weight of the coal were both removed at one and the same time.

The room on the basement floor of Oak St., which did not have adequate artificial light to conform to lighting standards was rewired and new fixtures installed. The room now can be used for study purposes and is regularly used for music classes.

The returns on the boiler at Floyd began to show signs of deterioration. Emergency repairs were made during the year. During the summer the main returns in the boiler room were replaced. The returns throughout the basement area should be replaced soon to prevent emergencies arising. The radiators in the ventilating system have been out of repair in one of the shafts for several years. The radiators are being taken out and repaired to restore the full efficiency of the ventilating system.

The cess pool at West Side has been the source of trouble the past few years. This past summer an auxiliary dry well to take care of the excess water was constructed. This has apparently taken care of the existing trouble for we have had no backing up in the toilets.

The usual repairs that are carried on by the janitors include refinishing the floors throughout the building, painting two rooms each year, refinishing desks and any minor repairs such as setting glass, repairing furniture and minor plumbing. This program keeps the men busy through most of the summer. It is, however, an economy for the town and enables the school district to hire men capable of rendering this type of service since they are employed on a full year's basis. In a period such as we have been and are passing through, the district has been fortunate to retain the services of Messrs Chase, Chadwick and Verge.

The usual program of testing was administered in the spring and fall. The results are encouraging in many respects. Without exception reading results are in excess of anticipated results. The norms for each grade in reading were in excess of established norms. This fact is of vital importance for reading is vital to many subjects and mastery in this vital tool subject is a source of encouragement. There are one or two things that need some bolstering and an effort is being

made to remedy these weak spots. It is a source of satisfaction to teachers to realize that the progress of pupils is commensurate with ability and grade placement.

The usual policy of book and supply purchasing has been continued. There is now but one more grade purchase to be made and the schools will be equipped with new arithmetics from grade 3 to 8. Science book acquisitions are gradually meeting the needs of the junior high school in this field. The need for furnishing science readers throughout the grades will be achieved gradually so that your children will have sufficient scientific background to cope with everyday problems in this scientific age. Spellers are a need that must and will be met in the near future. Adequate supplies are furnished so that the work of the pupils is not impeded by lack of regular equipment.

The first acquisition in the science field in the way of apparatus and chemical supplies is the beginning of an effort to build this department so that pupils may acquire a scientific attitude in their approach to problems.

This general field of supplies is one of the problems of education as well as of all types of endeavor. Deliveries of books, supplies and lumber are well behind any schedule previously encountered. Normal delivery of two weeks is now easily 3 or 4 months and in exceptional cases 8 - 10 months. Such abnormal delays were not anticipated. Orders were placed well in advance but even so the delays were greater than anticipated. In an effort to counteract this situation some orders are being placed for regular supplies now. There are two reasons for this. One to place orders before anticipated advances and secondly to attempt to guarantee no delays in the ensuing year.

The purchase of an audiometer by towns of the supervisory union has enabled the school nurse to check hearing loss at her convenience and at a time when the pupils tested could be at their physical peak.

This year the epidemic of mumps retarded the work. The use of the audiometer was necessarily limited because of this epidemic which was closely followed by the usual winter colds. Under normal conditions the testing and retesting can be completed early in the year so that necessary adjustments for children handicapped by a hearing loss can be made.

Budget

The gross budget shows an overall increase of \$6,704. The main contributing factors are estimated increases in high school tuition, teachers salaries, and the inclusion of the amount now required by statute to cover the town's contribution to retirement funds.

The increase in high school tuition cost is due to two factors, increased costs and increased enrollment. The district's liability for high school tuition is set by the average cost of high school instruction on a state wide basis. A study of the state average instructional cost over the past five years indicates the reason for an increased estimate based on one of the two factors.

The average increase for the past two years is \$6.905 and for the past five years the average annual increase for the four years since 40-41 is \$8.40. With these facts in mind the estimate is based on \$120 which allows for an increase of \$5.41. The enrollment as of Jan. 31, 1946 at Pinkerton Academy and in the 8th grade is 264 so that potentially there is a possibility of

an enrollment of that figure. This, of course is high for mortality always accounts for some loss of potential high school enrollment. The budget estimate is based on a mortality rate of 16 2/3%. This means that the budgetary estimate is based on an enrollment of 220. This is a conservative estimate but results in an increase of \$5,300 in this item. Teachers' salaries as explained previously in the report are in the same category as wages and salaries in other fields and an increase in this item is in line with the general trend.

By law we must now include the item for retirement and this new expenditure is set by the retirement board. It amounts to \$575.58. These three items account for an increase of \$6,850.58. Decreases in other items nullify increases other than these and allow for a decrease of \$145.89 in the above total so that the net overall increase is \$6,704.69. In addition the assets estimated show a decrease of \$897.82 primarily due to the fact that the budget does not indicate that we can safely estimate any cash on hand at the end of the current year. These two figures (\$6,704.69 and \$897.82) make up an estimated increase in tax levy of \$7,602.51 in the the proposed budget.

Conclusion

Your schools are operating well. The loyal conscientious work of all employed is primarily responsible. Teachers have worked with your children to provide them with an opportunity to further their education. Janitors have kept the buildings in good condition and everyone has tried to maintain schools at a high level of efficiency.

The school board have given time and thought to the problems incident to the operation of schools in a period of material and personnel shortages. Their advice and counsel have assisted greatly in the solution of the

many difficulties which are a natural concomitant of the times. I am deeply appreciative of the cooperation that all concerned with the welfare of the schools and the well being of the pupils have extended me.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools in Derry Village:

Statistical Reports Enrollment

The district has been exceedingly fortunate in these times of teacher shortage to have retained the services of trained experienced teachers. Mrs. Alice Follansbee and Mrs. Frances Smith have provided the children with the type of instruction that the district may be

proud to have provided. The pupils are making normal progress in the face of some difficulties. These difficulties are primarily in the field of supply. In last year's report the situation in regard to paper quotas in the publishing field was indicated. The same situation is somewhat aggravated this year. Normal delivery on book and work book orders is a month or less. As this report is written we are still waiting some back orders that were acknowledged some 10 months ago. In view of this fact orders for next year's supplies have been placed in order to insure full delivery in ample time to provide the pupils with all materials when needed.

Fortunately this situation has not held in any other field. Paper supplies were delivered in sufficient quantity to enable pupils to have sufficient quantity and quality to carry on normally. The only real problem in the field of supplies has been pencils and pencil sharpeners. The pencil problem is seemingly overcome for a good quality pencil is now available and will continue to be. Pencil sharpeners as yet are not available in quantity but occasionally they are delivered. A price advance has already occurred in some types of paper and a general advance may be anticipated.

This year we have had sufficient fuel so that there has been no interruption in the year's calendar. There has been fewer interruptions due to weather. The problem of pupil health has caused the greatest interruption in pupil progress. Mumps and severe colds have caused more than the usual number of absences. As the winter wanes, it is hoped that we may be free of this type of interruption.

The usual cleaning and maintenance program was completed during the summer. The need of renewing the roof in the rear of the building was made apparent during the winter. The problem of sewage is still present. Due to conditions beyond control the work plan-

ned for last summer was not completed. The level of the cesspool needs to be raised so as to prevent surface water from filling it. As soon as possible this condition will be remedied.

The usual program of testing confirmed the statement made in regard to pupil progress under the present teachers. The results were satisfactory especially so in the field of reading. All grades were above the anticipated norm.

The completion of the adoption of new arithmetics is now accomplished. It is anticipated that the use of the new series will produce results in the field of problem solving that will enable the pupils to show a greater degree of proficiency in this phase of arithmetic.

There was one change in teaching personnel. Mrs. Frances G. Kelley succeeded Miss Ruth Napier. This phase of your children's education is still in capable hands.

The budget shows an increase of \$1,077.88. There are four items which are responsible for all of this increase. The greatest portion of the increase comes in the item of high school tuition. This increase is easily understandable. The legal liability of the district is governed by the average instructional cost of the state. The following figures for the past five years reveal why it is necessary to budget more for this item.

An increase of \$33.60 per pupil has taken place in the past five years. Provision for an anticipated increase is allowed in the proposed budgetary figure. The two special items mentioned earlier in connection with

maintainance are responsible for the increased estimate in minor repairs. A study of teachers' salaries revealed that the salary schedule needed to be revised upward to attract and retain the type of teacher the district desires. The fourth item is a new one. The amending of the State Teachers' Retirement Bill now requires that the district become a contributor to the fund. The amount of the contribution is dependent on the yearly payroll of teachers who are members. The amount of payment is determined by taking a percentage of such payroll. This percentage can vary from 2 - 6% dependent upon the condition of the fund.

The trend of elementary education like many other of our institutions is not clearly indicated. The clearest trend discernible is the assumption of greater responsibilities for the care of children. In accord with this trend it is now being emphasized that we owe a greater responsibility for the physical well being of the pupils. The reason for this emphasis is the poor record made by American youth in draft examinations. The feeling generally expressed is that we, in school, should provide a program of physical education that would recognize and correct remedial physical defects in order that our young people would arrive at maturity with full unimpaired physical vigor. How far such a program will extend and how intensive it will be is a question which time will answer. It is almost axiomatic that health is our greatest possession and the home and school should exercise vigilance to preserve and protect it.

That the work of your school has proceeded so well is an indication of the whole hearted cooperation of parents, pupils, teachers, school board and citizens. This cooperation makes it possible to render service to the pupils of your school. I recognize that your schools can be maintained and improved only in so far as this

cooperation is evidenced and practiced. It has been both a privilege and a pleasure to render service where such cooperation has been present.
