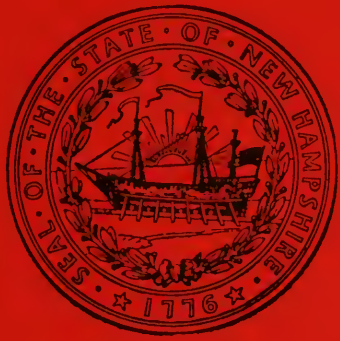

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM
1:00 P.M. TO 6:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Eaton in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Evans Memorial Building (Town Hall) in the Town of Eaton, County of Carroll on Tuesday the eighth of March at one o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subject herein after set forth. The polls shall open for balloting at 1:00 P.M., or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. Voting on Articles 1 and 27 shall be official ballot. The remaining Articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at 8 o'clock in the evening.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Including Town Officers' salaries, Town Officers' expenses, Election and Registration expenses, expenses of the Town Hall and other buildings, Social Security, Police Department, Fire Department, Insurance, Civil Defense, Health Department, Vital Statistics, Town Dump, Town Maintenance (summer and winter, Highway Subsidy and general expenses), Street lighting, Town Road Aid, Town Poor, and Old Age Assistance, Recreation, Cemeteries and Interest, Planning and Zoning, Legal expenses, Capital Reserve and Unemployment Compensation.

Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to have Property Taxes collected on a semi-annual basis.

Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, if necessary.

Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or disperse of any real estate aquired by the Town through Tax Collector Deeds, reference RSA 80:42.

Article 6. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for a part-time secretary for the Planning Board, Board of Adjustment, Conservation Commission and the Office of the Selectmen.

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Tax Collector to ap-

point deputies, with the approval of the Selectmen, who shall be sworn in, have the powers of Collectors and may be removed at the pleasure of the Collector as set forth in RSA 41:38.

Article 8. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund as established under Article No. 11, at Town Meeting on the 9th of March, 1982.

Article 9. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the installation of two (2) dry fire hydrants, one located at Crystal Lake opposite the Jonathan Goodwin home, and the other located at Pollard Pond opposite the Fred Pollard home, for the safety needs of homes in both the Eaton Center and Snowville areas.

Article 10. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the removal of the existing oil fired forced warm air furnace and for the purchase and installation of a new furnace and burner for the Evans Memorial Building (Eaton Town Hall).

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for the purchase of a new highway truck and to authorize the withdrawal of \$7,500.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the use of setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated, and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,314.91 maintenance allotment (Duncan Fund) for the maintenance of Class V roads.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,672.61 which is a State Additional Highway Subsidy allotment for the purpose of construction or reconstruction of Town roads.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Eaton Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1983 receipts, said funds to be placed in a special conservation fund IAW RSA 36, A:5.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Eaton and to the health and welfare of the people of Eaton.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 in support of the North Country Senior Meals Program. Agreeable to petition signed by John W. Cass and others.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$232.00 for the support of the Children & Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley. (C&Y)
Agreeable to petition signed by Nancy Bean and others.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to petition signed by Liza Snyder and others.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc.
Agreeable to petition signed by Harry Fowler and others.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the 1983 Capital Budget of the Memorial Hospital, North Conway.
Agreeable to petition signed by John W. Cass and others.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$409.60 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum equal to \$1.60 per person in the Town of Eaton.
Agreeable to petition signed by Philip C. Kelly and others.

Article 23. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to assist the Northern Carroll County Family Planning Programs.
Agreeable to petition signed by JoAnn L. Kelly.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the support of the Community Action Outreach program.
Agreeable to petition signed by Mark Provost and others.

Article 25. To see if the Town of Eaton will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to be turned over to the Conway Village Recreation Commission to help assist the programs of the Conway Recreation Center.
Agreeable to petition signed by Judith M. Goss and others.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for Eaton-resident use of the Conway Public Library for one year.
Agreeable to petition signed by Alexander A. McKenzie and others.

Article 27. Are you in favor of the amendment to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board as follows:

To add (page 5) at Article 5, Section B, Rural Residential District

Zone RR1, permitted uses:

- j. Gravel pits operated in the Jackson Forest by the Town of Eaton exclusively for its own use.

Article 28. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

EATON TOWN MEETING

1982

The annual Town Meeting for Eaton, N.H. was called to order on March 9, 1982 at 8:00 P.M. with Ellsworth T. Russell as Moderator.

Mr. Russell read the "Call to meeting" and the articles of the Warrant and then announced that he had a special piece of business to present before continuing with the articles of the Warrant. He then called the retiring Selectman, Samuel B. Head, to the podium and read the following letter from Governor Hugh Gallen:

"Dear Mr. Head;

Twenty years as a selectman for the town of Eaton is a record to be much admired. On behalf of the residents of the State of New Hampshire, I would like to extend my congratulations and my thanks to you for serving your community in such a competent and faithful fashion.

Your dedication, honesty and integrity while serving as a Selectman sets an outstanding example for all public servants.

Once again, please accept my congratulations.

HUGH J. GALLEN"

Charles Hurl stepped forward and read the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, Samuel B. Head has, over a span of at least twenty-four years, served the people of Eaton in several public offices, including Selectman; and, WHEREAS, he has earnestly sought to pursue the ends of justice and good government by his knowledge of the statutes, and, WHEREAS, his townspeople appreciate this service so quietly given; so, there-

fore, be it hereby

RESOLVED, that the people of Eaton thank Samuel B. Head most sincerely for his past service and hope his experiences, capabilities, and good judgment may continue to assist the Town of Eaton; and, further, that this resolution of appreciation be spread upon the minutes of this meeting as part of the written record of the Town."

Mr. Hurl made the motion that this resolution be approved as read and that the Resolution be spread upon the minutes of the meeting and that a copy be presented to Mr. Head. The motion was seconded by Douglas Blue. The vote was unanimous in favor.

Mrs. Shirley Blue then presented Mr. Head with a scroll signed by residents of the town, as follows:

"In recognition of your honest perserverance, impartial judgment and dedication to the well being of the community, we, the residents of Eaton, sincerely thank you. March 9, 1982."

Article 1 was on the ballot. Elected to office were: Ellsworth Russell, Moderator; Bernard Hurley, Selectman; Elwyn Thurston, Highway Commissioner; Nancy Bean, Supervisor of the Checklist; Douglas Blue, Auditor.

Article 2. Charles Hurl moved to raise the sum of \$103,317.51 as shown in the budget of the Town. Alex McKenzie seconded. The motion carried 63-0.

Article 3. Alex McKenzie moved to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into an Agreement with cooperating towns for the purpose of disposing of solid waste and the recovery of energy where possible in the most economical and efficient manner, so as to meet Federal and State requirements. Charles Hurl seconded. Motion carried 93-21.

Article 4. Alex McKenzie moved to raise and appropriate the estimated sum of \$5,100.00 for the first year's pro rata share of the initial capital investment in the Cooperative proposed under Article 3, which provides for the formation of the Mt. Washington Valley Regional Solid Waste Cooperative. Charles Hurl seconded. Questions were asked as to what would happen if the other towns did not approve the article. The answer was that if one or two small towns did not approve, the others would still go ahead, but if Conway failed to vote this agreement, then it would have to be dropped for the time being, and this money, if appropriated, would then become a surplus in the general fund at the year's end. The vote was called and the article passed 54-8.

Article 5. Barbara McKenzie moved to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State or other assistance as may be available for the construction of an Incinerator Plant and to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as per NH RSA 33:7b et sq., as amended. Charles Hurl seconded. Carried 58-1.

Article 6. Charles Hurl moved to appropriate the sum of \$4,897.45 (Duncan Fund) for the maintenance of Class V roads. Alex McKenzie seconded. Carried 69-0.

Article 7. Alex McKenzie moved to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the revenue sharing fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated, and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or to take any other action hereon. Estimated amount \$4,500.00. Alice Linscott seconded. Carried 54-0.

Article 8. Barbara McKenzie moved to appropriate the sum of \$4,261.35 which is a State additional highway subsidy allotment for the purpose of construction or reconstruction of town roads. Charles Hurl seconded. Carried 63-0.

Article 9. Alex McKenzie moved to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1982 receipts, said funds to be placed in a special conservation fund IAW RSA 36 A:5. Mary Gospodarek seconded. Carried 66-0.

Article 10. Alex McKenzie moved to authorize that the Conservation Commission be empowered to manage the Creative Concepts Land (Timber) under the provisions of RSA 31:112 (II) and that any proceeds from said stumpage be placed in the Eaton Conservation Fund. Charles Hurl seconded. Carried 58-0.

Article 11. Charles Hurl moved to establish a capital reserve fund for the purpose of reappraisal of the town and to raise \$5,000.00 per year for same. Alex McKenzie seconded. Eugene Kleinmeier pointed out that the town has not been appraised since 1960. Carried 51-2.

Article 12. Alex McKenzie moved to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Town of Conway for support and contribution to private independent ambulance service in form and manner as the Selectmen shall determine appropriate provided the town shall bear only its share of expense of support in relation to its population to the total population of all participating towns. Charles Hurl seconded. Carried 54-1.

Article 13. Alex McKenzie moved to authorize the Selectmen to

borrow money in anticipation of taxes, if necessary. Charles Hurl seconded. Carried 52-0.

Article 14. John Cass moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the 1982 General Operating Budget of the Memorial Hospital, North Conway. Madeline Cass seconded. Carried 48-4.

Article 15. Joan Simonds moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$221.00 for the support of the children and youth project of Mt. Washington Valley (C & Y). Suzanne Russell seconded. Carried 52-0.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place the cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

Owing to lack of funds, the proposed survey of remaining uncataloged Town lands could not be continued. The poor market for timber and difficulties in obtaining economical access to marketable stumpage made it impossible to raise survey funds from this potential source. Our negotiations continue with Forest Land Improvement of Tamworth and with owners of rights of way into the "Creative Concepts" area. It is hoped that the work on our management plan can be continued in 1983.

Some clearing of a remote section of Brooks Pasture was accomplished, and further volunteer work to open up views in this parcel are planned.

The blueberry crop on Foss Mountain was not commercially harvested because the cost would have exceeded the value of the crop. On the brighter side, townspeople had an easier time picking berries from fields that had not already been raked. A reasonably good crop from the Brooks Pasture fields provided income of \$697.62. This money has been deposited in the Conservation Fund as voted by the Town. Income from Foss Mountain would have gone into the general revenues to reduce taxes. The same is true of total payments of \$561.60 received from the sale of sawlogs and pulp cut in the Jackson Forest in 1981-82.

During 1982, the Commission began receiving copies of applications for dredge-and-fill and gravel-pit permits. These have included the State's project to widen a bridge across Route 153 near Camp Waukeela, a culvert and pond on the Stewart Road, and reopening gravel pits in four areas. From the viewpoint of conservation, the Commission found no objections to the projects submitted. Authority for the actual work and granting of permits must be given by the Planning Board.

In this connection, members of the Commission became concerned about possible impact of these and other future projects on the wetlands. At one meeting, in particular, Planning Board, Selectmen, and Soil Conservation representatives were invited to attend and discuss with the public the problem and our responsibilities. This dialogue continues, and the Commission is seeking the counsel of the State organization of Conservation Commissions. An ad hoc committee of the whole will continue to study until the problem has been satisfac-

torily resolved. It is the present view that the Conservation Commission is charged with responsibility for information gathering, keeping the wetland ordinance up to date, and acting in an advisory role. Regulation is the prerogative of the Planning Board and is so defined in the statutes.

No child of appropriate age was interested in accepting a Conservation Camp scholarship this year.

Interest has been expressed in finding and clearing up graveyards in the Town. Work has been started on the Fernald cemetery. Information from gravestones will eventually be sent to a central state file, and townspeople with graveyards on their own property will be encouraged to participate.

It was suggested that "cadets" or volunteer Associate Members of the Commission, without vote, be recruited to help expand the work of the commission. Many such individuals might prove to be candidates for later appointment as Commissioners.

One member reported on slaughter of deer in the region by coyotes. Another reported the welcome news that a loon seemed to have adopted Crystal Lake.

As provided under its bylaws, regular meetings of the Commission are held at 7:30 p.m. local time on the second Monday of each month from April through November at Arthur and Alice Evans Memorial Building (Eaton Town Hall). Special meetings are given advance publicity. They are all, by law, open to the public. The Commissioners welcome active participation, especially by residents and taxpayers.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The districts of School Administrative Unit No. 9 have seen a great deal of activity on the part of the staff of their local schools and the SAU office in activities which have led to the continued provision of quality education. The recently completed evaluation of elementary schools, which was combined with the State Department of Education's review of how well the schools met minimum standards, gives the citizens of SAU No. 9, as well as the staff, a great deal to be proud of in terms of the education it affords the children who live here. The support that the community has provided the schools and the teaching staff is greatly appreciated and has helped facilitate quality education in School Administrative Unit No. 9.

The staff of the individual schools of SAU No. 9 have begun to implement, for all grade levels, a drug and alcohol abuse program. This program has been developed in response to a growing national as well as local need to provide children with the skills to make proper decisions regarding the use of alcohol and drugs. The program is being developed in conjunction with the alcohol and drug abuse section of the New Hampshire State Department of Education. It is hoped that the community is aware of the seriousness of this problem, and we encourage you to accept your responsibility in dealing with this issue. It is through school and community cooperation that we will be able to provide a healthy environment for our children.

Computers, it seems, affect every phase of our daily life. It is currently estimated that 85% of all employment has some contact with a computer. To meet this challenge microcomputers are being purchased for our schools. At the elementary level children are learning about the use, history, and resources of the computer as well as being assisted in their classroom instruction by computer programs. On the secondary level a computer programming course has been instituted. The continued development of computer curriculums and use of the computers will prepare the youngsters to not only be computer literate but also give them the skills to compete in the world they now face upon graduation.

Activity continues on the goals established by the SAU No. 9 school boards in the spring of 1981. Specifically, a computer curriculum for grades K-8 will be implemented this spring to improve the math curriculum. Teachers will continue to stress improvement in the curriculum area of writing. Also, the principals and teaching staff in conjunction with our office will be working together to develop a plan for monitoring each individual child's academic progress for the major curriculum areas. The realization of these goals has been accomplished after many staff hours of planning, attending workshops, and training.

The purchase of diesel buses has proven to be a major cost saving undertaking. Many of the districts will realize a substantial savings in fuel costs. Another cost saving project which has been undertaken during the past year was the modification of school buildings to improve their energy efficiency. The insulating of windows and changing of lighting to more energy efficient types were but two of the projects which will result in lower energy costs to the school districts. The concept of providing a quality education at a fair and realistic cost is a goal that is being achieved and will continue to be a goal.

In closing, I, as Superintendent, wish to thank all my fellow educators, citizens, and students for the courtesies, considerations and cooperation extended to me in the school districts that I have represented since July 1976. It has been a pleasure to have served you all and to have had the opportunity to work along side such a number of professionals that I deeply admire and respect.

Our goal has been to constantly improve the educational opportunities for all of our children, and through a lot of hard work and cooperation this has been occurring. It is my hope that everyone within all of our communities will work together and accept their individual and collective responsibilities to make this beautiful valley a fine, wholesome place to live and work. It is my hope that parents will reawaken in themselves and their children the true spirit of family and become acutely aware and concerned with what their children are doing in their personal lives as well as in their educational program. It is my hope that persons will work to contribute to the community, both as elected officials as well as supporters of community activities in order that life for all becomes better. Let everyone work from a positive aspect, and with this, much will be achieved.

Our children are a valuable resource. Our schools are striving to improve themselves and, therefore, improve the education for children. We need the cooperation and concern of the community together with the schools in order to assure a brighter and more secure future for everyone. It is my hope that I have contributed to that and that this effort shall continue to grow and prosper. EATON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEEETING

March 9, 1982

The annual meeting of the Eaton School District was held on March 9, 1982, at 2:00 p.m. with Samuel B. Head as Moderator.

Articles 1-5 were voted by ballot.

- (1) School Board (3 years) - Laura Mahoney
- (2) Moderator - Samuel B. Head
- (3) Treasurer - Holly B. Gardner
- (4) Clerk - Suzanne C. Levesque
- (5) Auditor - Jane Gray

Article 6. Alex McKenzie moved to authorize the Eaton School Board to apply for, accept and expend monies from any source during the fiscal year in the name of the School District. Charles Hurll seconded. The motion carried 23-0.

Article 7. Alex McKenzie moved to renew the School District's Tuition contract for a five (5) year period from 1 July to 30 June 1988 with the Conway School District for grades 9-12. Charels Hurll seconded. After Superintendent Kautz explained that such a contract would hold with the Conway School District despite the pending withdrawal from SAU No. 9 and be renewable again for another five year period, the motion carried 32-0.

Article 8. Alex McKenzie moved that the School District raise and appropriate \$3,900.00 to the the per pupil cost of four Eaton children attending Conway School District kindergarten. Mary Gospodarek seconded. Superintendent Kautz cited certified early childhood educators, a more consistent program, and greater available resources as the advantages of public kindergarten. Transportation is to be provided one way and attendance is at the parent's discretion. If overcrowding should pose a future problem, the Conway School Board could vote to recall public kindergarten. Motion carried 23-4.

Article 9. Charles Hurll moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$155,538.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Joan Simonds seconded. Allan Robotham inquired about the increase in budget item 2550-656-86 (supplies, gasoline). School Board member Fred Goss replied that the increase was to prepare for possible gasoline price increases and other unexpected expenses for repair on the aging school bus. The motion carried 34-0.

Article 10. Joan Simmonds made a request that the printing in the Town Report be larger another year.

Superintendent Kautz thanked Marcia Heath for her years as a School Board member praising her for her propriety and responsibility to the job in the interests of good education for all the Eaton children.

Paul Hennigan moved to adjourn the meeting. Charles Hurl seconded. The motion carried 31-1. The meeting adjourned at 2:27 p.m.

SPECIAL EDUCATION DIRECTOR'S AND TITLE I COORDINATOR'S REPORT

By Elaine M. Woodman

It is the purpose of the State of New Hampshire to insure that the State Board of Education and the local school districts of this State provide a free and appropriate public education for all children. Included in this is the education of all handicapped children. Special education means instruction specifically designed to meet the unique needs of the educationally handicapped student. This instruction is team designed; is delivered in a variety of settings; and services the youngsters in our community ages 3-21 years of age no matter what the diversity of need.

Tremendous support was given in the SAU No. 9 communities concerning federal changes in the special education law. The sensitivity and caring for the well-being of others was demonstrated; and parents, teachers, and friends addressed the continued need for special education to the legislature.

One of the largest areas of growth has been the efforts in the early childhood area. To ensure early intervention, monthly diagnostic pre-school screening programs have been developed. A team of individuals skilled in a variety of disciplines observe, assess, and prescribe a plan to help these youngsters. Three center-based programs have been implemented in the locations of Tamworth, Conway and Bartlett. Home-based support services and inter-agency communications have all been strengthened. This will develop a cooperative effort in addressing the needs of our children and provide them with the support they need as early as possible. The major benefit of this program is prevention of learning problems.

At the elementary schools, programs vary from consultation and program modification in the regular classroom structure to the varied amounts of resource room specialized programming. We are attempting, to the best of our ability, to make sure that the program fits the child's needs rather than the child fit the existing program.

The goal for the entire special education department this year has been to bridge the gap between regular education and special education. If children learn best from modeling their peers, then the least restrictive environment, the mainstreamed classroom, offers an appropriate learning experience for students. Whenever possible, children receive the expertise of both special and regular educators.

Staff development is an ongoing process in special education. Special education teachers are constantly pursuing results from current research studies on working with both the handicapped and children

with minimal learning deficits. This is highly commendable and ensures that these specialized programs for children constantly improve rather than maintaining the same.

Parents, as the first and primary teachers of their children, play a significant role in the success of any school program. Their involvement in special education is twice as valuable.

Title I serves approximately 200 children in grades 1-8 in SAU No. 9 who need extra help in reading skills. With the Federal funds granted to SAU No. 9 schools, specialists and trained tutors are hired for each of the elementary schools and the junior high school to write and implement educational plans for remediation of reading difficulties. Emphasis is on supplementing basic reading skills while creating a positive attitude of confidence in students.

When a decision has been made that a child needs Title I services, the Title I staff will receive permission from the parent to test and work with the child. Staff members confer with the classroom teachers and individualize instruction. Title I activities enrich and supplement, but do not take the place of, classroom reading. Students work at their own pace on materials geared to their own diagnosed needs and abilities.

In conclusion, it is with much pleasure that I share with you our efforts in special education and Title I. It is because of parents, teachers, students, board members, and the community - working, supporting and trusting one another - that has resulted in quality special education programs for handicapped children and Title I support programs in our schools.
